**Conferences Will
Replace Student
Report Card Plan**

Parent-teacher conferences are being held in the elementary schools from Monday, Nov. 26 through Monday, Dec. 10, in place of sending out report cards for the six-week period just ending.

The parent-teacher conferences are an experiment which is an outgrowth of suggestions made through the Parent-Teacher Council, which is a representative group of parents selected at meetings of the parents to attend the Council meetings. These Council meetings are held in October, December, February and April during the school year.

A systematic plan has been worked out for getting the opinions of the parents before the group and the majority opinion indicated that a trial of the plan should be undertaken. The Parent-Teacher Council acts only as an advisory capacity and any official action taken on matters pertaining to the school must go through the Board of Education in the regular manner.

If the trial proves satisfactory to a majority of the parents, the Parent-Teacher conference plan of reporting on the pupils' school progress has already been worked out in other schools and successfully in other schools.

Proponents of the plan state that both parents and teachers get a more complete overall report of the pupil under the conference system than is possible in written reports. Each parent is allowed 20 minutes of consultation with their child's teacher at appointed times.

An experiment here is being carried out only in the elementary grades at present. Grades 7 through 12 will receive their report cards as usual next Wednesday.

**Police Solve Mystery
of Broken Windows**

During the past two weeks Chelsea police have been investigating reports of broken windows in the vicinity of Jefferson street. The windows were broken by shots fired from an air rifle and George Doe, police chief, found that two young boys were responsible.

The boys were brought to police headquarters and reprimanded and were warned of the consequences of repeating the vandalism. Their parents were notified for four windows they had broken.

Chief Doe pointed out that there is a village ordinance which provides that parents can be held responsible if their children shoot air rifles. Parents may be fined if charges are pressed against them by persons suffering damage from the shooting.

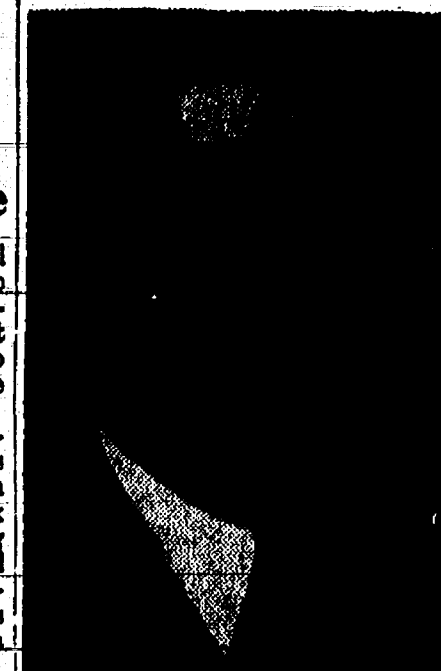
The Chelsea group first visited Ward 6 in which all the patients were to undergo surgery Monday. They then went to Wards 3 and 4 where the traction patients were visited.

Roy Harris died last Thursday morning at St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor, where he had been a patient the past week. Funeral services for Mr. Harris were held at the Staffan Funeral Home at 2:30 Saturday afternoon with Rev. W. H. Skentelbury officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove cemetery.

The only survivor of Mr. Harris is his daughter, Audrey, who lived with him at the family home, 404 McKinley street.

Mr. Harris was president of the village from 1935 to 1940 and had also been a councilman. For 20 years he was employed by the New York Central Railroad and was with Palmer Motor Sales for several years before going to work at the Chelsea Spring plant. He had worked at the Spring plant five years when he retired in 1947.

Some years ago he was in partnership for about a year in the tin shop business known as Updike and Harris. He was a past master of Olive Lodge No. 156, F&M, and was a member of the Congregational church.

At the time of his death Mr. Harris was 70 years old. He was born Sept. 3, 1881, in Pinckney and moved to Dexter in 1895. May 18, 1902, he was married to Jane Van Natter of Dexter, and they came to Chelsea to make their home five years later. Mrs. Harris died Aug. 15, 1937.

Gives Blood****30 from Local Plant
Contribute Blood
for Armed Services**

Approximately 30 employees of the Central Fibre Products company participated this week in a voluntary blood donor program, part of the group going to Ann Arbor for the purpose Monday and the remainder going Tuesday.

Monday's contingent reported at the Red Cross blood donor unit in the VFW building in Ann Arbor, as Tuesday's group went to the ROTC headquarters building on the University of Michigan campus.

The list of volunteer donors was headed by Harold Jones, vice-president and general manager of Central Fibre company. Others on the list are Leon Marsh, general shop foreman, Robert O. Earlie Riser and Mrs. Anthony Jurgens, although not employees of the Fibre company, also volunteered as blood donors.

A number of others, including employees and friends, volunteered but were unaccepted because of rules regarding age and other factors.

The large-scale participation of Central Fibre employees in the blood donor project is reportedly the result of an appointment made privately by Robert O. Rankin to give blood. He regularly donates blood for the benefit of the servicemen who may need it because of his special interest in the program since his son, Seaman, 3rd Class Robert D. Rankin, is serving with the U. S. Navy. He is now on land duty in French Morocco in North Africa.

The idea caught on so rapidly that most of the employees of acceptable age and health conditions, voluntarily offered to participate.

While Rankin is credited by others at the plants as being the one who started the project, he himself disclaims the fact, saying that everyone in the plant who volunteered did so because he or she felt the blood donor program for the benefit of servicemen is a patriotic service in which they wanted to have a part.
