### Net Increase of 40 Pupils Noted over Last Year's Average

At the regular Board of Education meeting held in the High school Monday evening, Superintendent Albert C. Johnsen gave a report of school membership. The report showed that there was an increase of 40 pupils compared with the average of a year ago. The increase comprises 24 pupils in the elementary classes and 16 in elementary classes and 16 in grades seven through twelve.
