The practice and experience derived from the Albion tournament played a large part in Chelsea's decisive 48-32 victory over Manchester last Friday night. Chelsea monopolized the entire game.

The first quarter found Chelsea out front, 11 to 7. Dick Merkel led the Bulldogs with five points, while Jack Evisler, Jerry Fennell and Bob Eisenhower earned Manchester a bucket each.

The second quarter found Chelsea still leading by a score of 23 to 17. Joe Greenwood paced the Bulldogs with six, while Duane Trolz led Manchester with four. The half ended with Chelsea leading 23 to 17.

The third quarter found Chelsea racking up 13 points while Manchester connected for eight. Chelsea led 36 to 25. Dick Bareis led Chelsea with four points while Bill Aikens paced Manchester with three.

The fourth quarter had Chelsea out front, as the Bulldogs racked up 12 more points while Manchester gained seven. The game ended 48 to 32. Dick Merkel paced the Bulldogs with five while Duane Trolz, Jack Evisler and Jerry Fennell earned a bucket each for Manchester.

Joe Greenwood and Dick Merkel led the Bulldogs with 14 points each while Bob White accounted for seven points. Bill Aikens, Duane Trolz and Jack Evisler gave Manchester six points each and were assisted by Jerry Fennell with five.

Chelsea's Bulldogs defeated Manchester's second team, 30 to 31. Ralph Owings and Tom Eisele led with 11 points each while Phil Bareisably assisted with 10 points. Stan Dues led Manchester's second team with 12 points while assisted by Harold Dresch and Jim Kroske with nine and seven points respectively.

Mrs. L. B. Lawrence died Sunday morning at her home, 232 Jefferson, following a long illness. She was 87 years old. A member of the Chelsea Methodist church and a former member of its Central Circle, Mrs. Lawrence had lived in the present home since 1919.

She was born in Manchester township July 10, 1864, the third youngest of a family of ten children. She was the former Harriet Corinna Merriman, and her parents were George and Mary Kier Merriman.

Mrs. Lawrence graduated from Manchester High school with the class of 1885 and taught for two terms in the school in District 10, Sharon township, before her marriage to Mr. Lawrence April 15, 1885. They were married at the Merriman home in Manchester.

For 34 years following their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence made their home on the Nathan Fish homestead in Sharon township, coming from there to the Jefferson street address.

Rev. David Bryce officiated at the funeral service which was held in the Miller Funeral Home at 1:30 Tuesday afternoon. Cremation followed in Detroit.

Survivors are the husband; a son and daughter, George Lawrence and Mrs. Edith Irwin, at the family home; Mother, son, Robert of New York City; a sister, Mrs. Florence Young, of Santa Ana, Calif.; six grandchildren, Frederick Irwin, who lives at the Lawrence home, Donald Irwin, of Sharon township, Mrs. Maxine White and Mrs. Jean Johnson, of Chelsea, Mrs. Anne Lerohl, of Columbus, Ohio, and Mrs. Marcella Harding, of Boston, Mass. Also surviving are 11 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Staffan Funeral Home, with Rev. P. H. Grabowski officiating. Burial was in Bethel cemetery, Ann Arbor.

**BULLETIN  
3 Injured as  
Trains Collide  
in Dexter**

A 1300-foot stretch of track was torn up in the village of Dexter last night when the New York Central's east-bound Wolverine flyer was derailed after it struck a freight car that had jumped the west-bound track when one of the wheel trucks reportedly broke.

Although the sides of cars the entire length of the passenger train were sheared before the train came to a halt, only three persons were hospitalized with injuries described as "not serious." One of the injured persons was reportedly from Ann Arbor but identification had not been verified two hours after the accident. The other two were said to be from Detroit and New York. The injured were taken to St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor.

The smash-up occurred about 7:45 p.m. Railroad officials on the scene were heard to remark that the west-bound track could possibly be cleared by morning. Officials at the Ann Arbor depot said all traffic between Jackson and Detroit was being routed over the Grand Trunk lines by way of Lansing. Passengers headed for Ann Arbor had to find other means of transportation to reach their destination.

The Diesel engines on the passenger train were miraculously stopped less than 20 feet from the Dexter Co-op grain elevator when the front wheels hit the side track leading to the elevator.

Noise of the wreck brought crowds of Dexter residents to the scene and as news of the wreck spread, people from Chelsea, Ann Arbor and other neighboring communities joined the throng of on-lookers.

U. of M. Education Prof. To Address Elementary PTA

Dr. Robert Fox, assistant professor of Education at the University of Michigan and principal of the University's elementary school, will speak at the Elementary PTA meeting in the Home Ec. room at Chelsea High school next Wednesday, Jan. 15. **School Board  
Given Report  
on Enrollment****Net Increase of 40  
Pupils Noted over  
Last Year's Average**

At the regular Board of Education meeting held in the High school Monday evening, Superintendent Albert C. Johnsen gave a report of school membership. The report showed that there was an increase of 40 pupils compared with the average of a year ago. The increase comprises 24 pupils in the elementary grades and 16 in grades seven through twelve.

A report was also given at the meeting, on an evaluation of the recent parent-teacher conferences held in place of sending out written report cards to parents. Consensus of teacher opinion was that the conferences were very much worthwhile. The experiment was carried out at the time of the last marking period.

Figures quoted by Supt. Johnsen showed that there was an average of 82 per cent parent participation in the parent-teacher conferences during the week they were scheduled. This average would now be higher if the number of parents who came in after the scheduled week ended were added to the figure.

The regular report cards are being sent out Jan. 23 for the marking period ending Jan. 18.

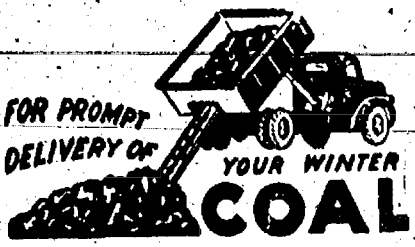

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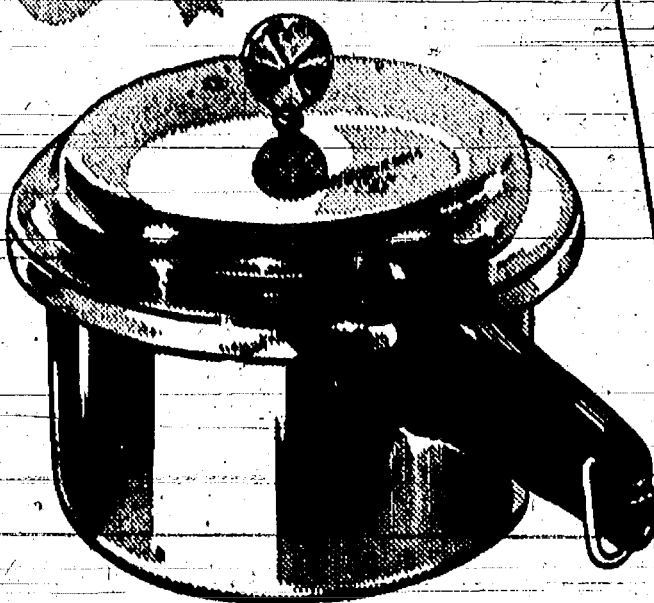
