

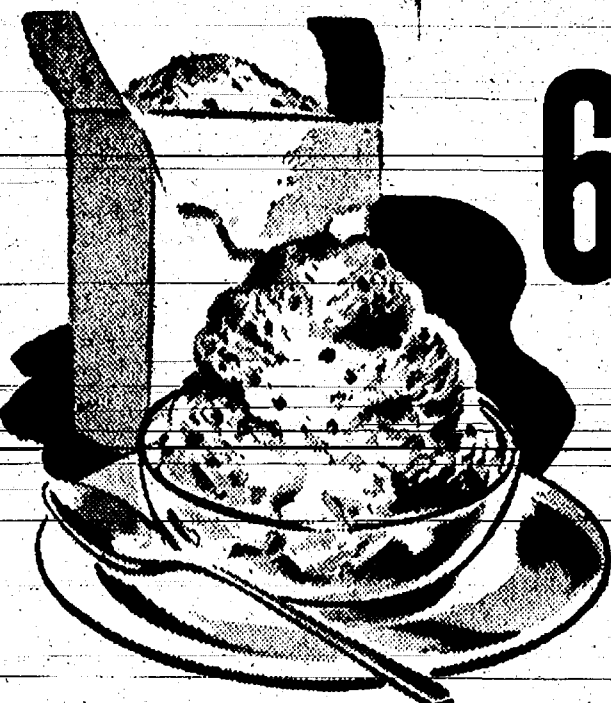

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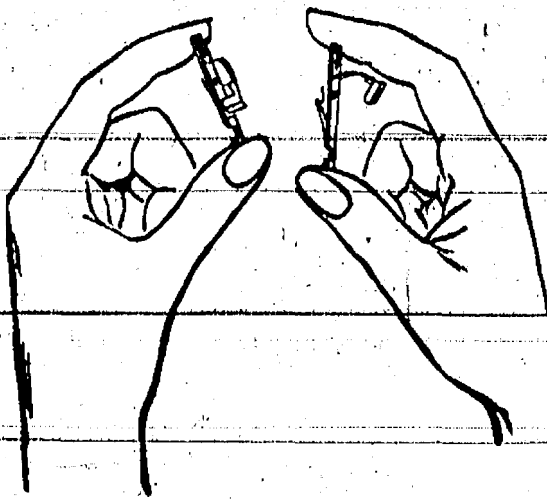
Booster feeding through plant leaves shows promise

Many plants and trees absorb food through their leaves. This discovery opens up possibilities of larger, faster-growing crops by applying additional fertilizer as a spray. Michigan State College Agricultural Experiment Station is studying ways of making leaf feeding practical to the average grower. Among plants which respond readily to nutrition through their leaves are tomato, celery and corn, as well as apple trees. 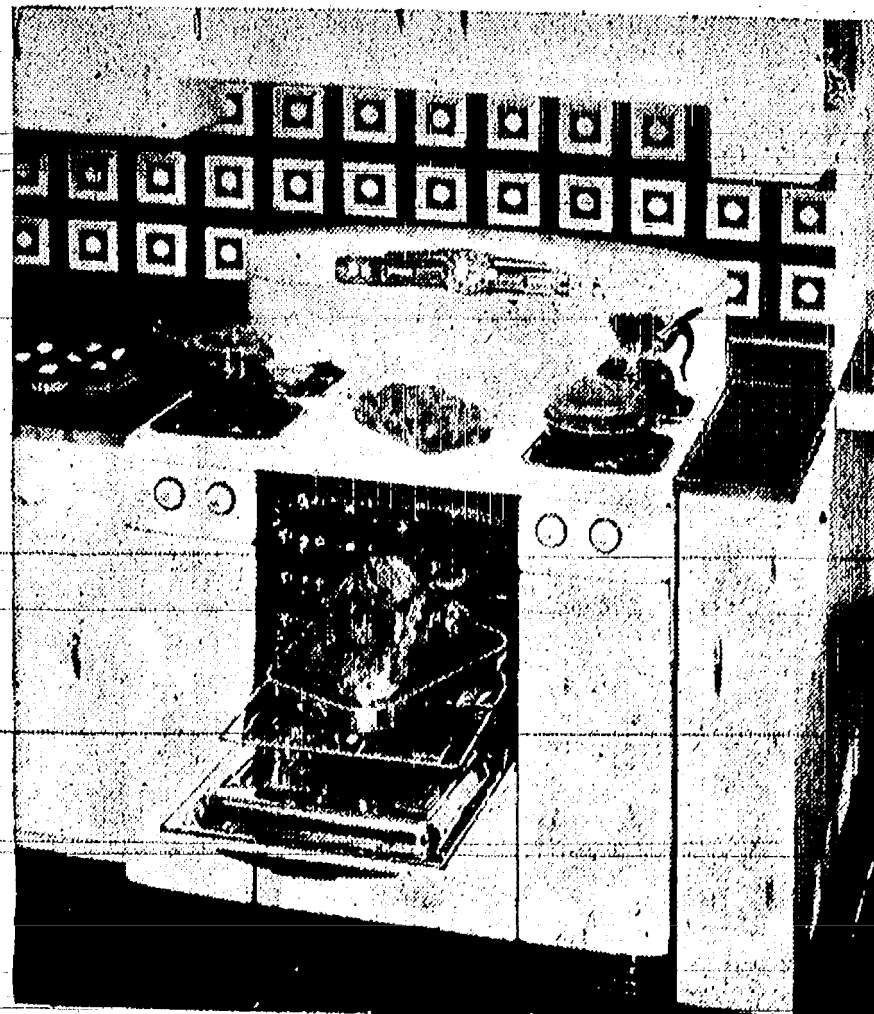

circuit would be used for endurance testing, including performance of transmissions, brakes, steering mechanisms, suspensions and shock absorbers.

To increase the severity of the tests, two three-quarter mile lengths of rough brick and Belgian Block road are included in the projected network of roads, to give cars and trucks a rougher shaking than they will ever encounter in normal use.

The concrete-surfaced straight-away test strips—one of them two miles long, the other about a mile and a quarter long—would be used principally to determine effects of wind on car operation, study brake effectiveness after exposure to water, record transmission and engine performance from cold starts, and determine acceleration and fuel economy.

Controlled Hazards Planned

Adjoining one of the straight-away strips, a 100-foot long water trap provided in the proving ground designs. It would duplicate the most severe type of road splash conditions.

A mud pit, also 100 feet in length, would simulate the worst imaginable bog conditions—containing mud of controlled consistency to a maximum depth of two feet, supported on a concrete base. Similarly a sand pit, 100 feet long, would contain an 18-inch depth of sand to subject cars to rigorous tests of such vital mechanisms as transmissions, propeller shafts and center bearings and axles.
