

Winter Hits Local Area Once More

Some Roads Closed Sunday Because of Drifting Snow

Four to five inches of snow fell here over the past week-end and strong winds blew the snow into drifts so deep that several roads were closed, Wilbert Breitenwieser, Chelsea yard foreman for the Washtenaw county Road Commission said.

The storm had freakish qualities, heading across the county from the northeast to the southwest. Lyndon and the northwest portion of Dexter township were the hardest hit. Lima township and the Ann Arbor area had less snow and no drifts and Detroit had no snow.

The road crews from the Chelsea yards worked Sunday afternoon to keep the west end of North Territorial road open. They also fought drifts on the west end of Cavanaugh Lake road and on U.S. 12 about a mile east of the Jackson county line where an 18-inch drift left only two lanes of the three-lane highway open to traffic for several hours.

Because cars kept getting stuck in drifts on a number of roads, Breitenwieser ordered the following ones closed Sunday evening: North Territorial between Cavanaugh Lake and U.S. 12; Heim road between Hayes and Grass Lake roads; Winters road between Kalmbach and Musbach roads.

Monday morning road crews tried to clear Heim road with the truck plow but the road was too soft, so they went out with the power grader Tuesday morning.

Sunday's snowfall was the heaviest since the big snow of Christmas day and caused road workers here more trouble than they had experienced for some time, Breitenwieser stated.

He said roads in this area were in excellent condition before the snow came and if there is no heavy rain until after the snow has melted and disappeared they will still be in good condition.

Easter Seal Drive for Crippled Kids Enters Final Days

"The greatest dividend of human happiness is the knowledge that one is making possible a better life for someone else," Paul F. Niehaus, local chairman of the 1952 Easter Seal campaign, said yesterday. Niehaus is president of the Washtenaw county chapter of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc.

"Providing care for crippled children is an ideal way for the American public to find satisfaction," he continued. "The Easter Seal campaign which raises funds to support direct services to crippled children and adults presents a genuine opportunity for personal service."

"We have in our nation some eight million crippled children who are offered greater voluntary health services than any nation on earth. The movement to help them is one of the most important local as well as nation-wide movements. Daily it is making happy, productive citizens of those who might have been life-long dependents."

Niehaus, reporting yesterday on the progress of the Easter Seal drive here, said the response to date has been good. The campaign closes April 13.

Ensign Daniels is a 1951 graduate of the University of Michigan with a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration. He arrived home Friday to spend a 10-day leave before going to Bayonne, N. J., for five months of further study. His wife will accompany him to Bayonne and will make her home there.

Established in June, 1951, to meet the growing need for officers within the Navy's expanding fleet and shore stations, the Officer Candidate school is currently graduating more new officers annually than the Navy Academy and all the college ROTCs combined. The present enrollment of 1,500 will swell to 2,100 by October of this year.

U. of M. Professor, Robert J. Lowry, Wins Fellowship

Ann Arbor—Three University of Michigan faculty members were among 246 college teachers who were awarded fellowships for the 1952-53 school year by The Fund for the Advancement of Education. One of the three, Robert J. Lowry, an assistant professor of botany, is a native of Chelsea.

He is son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Lowry, now of Ann Arbor, and a grandson of the late Mark A. Lowry who were pioneer residents of this vicinity.

He was about 10 years old when the family moved to Ann Arbor. The Fellowships' purpose is to provide for research bearing directly on the effort to improve teaching by broadening and deepening the teachers' understanding of their own or related fields. Clarence H. Faust, fund president, said, Fund headquarters are in Pasadena, Calif.

The awards are a continuation of the faculty fellowship program started last year shortly after the fund was created by the Ford Foundation.

BULLETIN - Weight Limits Removed on All Washtenaw Roads

All weight restrictions on state and county roads in this vicinity were removed Monday morning, Howard Minier, Washtenaw county Road Commission manager said yesterday. He said the cooperation of truck drivers in keeping loads within the weight limits and the cooperation of the sheriff's department deputies in enforcing the weight restrictions had resulted in saving the blacktop roads in the county from serious damage during the spring break-up.

All roads in this area came through the winter very well, Minier said, and he had received no reports of any roads in the county that are considered impassable at present.

Minier quoted some interesting statistics on the amount of salt used on roads in the county the past three years. In 1949-50, he said, 1987 tons of salt was used. The 1950-51 amount was 2686 tons and the 1951-52 season took 3664 tons. With the cost of the salt at \$10 per ton delivered to the yards, the cost this year was \$36,640.

Minier pointed out that the increased use of salt is believed to have prevented many accidents and resulted in the saving of many lives.

At about 3 o'clock the same afternoon, cars driven by Mrs. W. G. Price, 11745 U.S. 12, and Theodore K. Reynolds of 113 Gilbert street, Jackson, were involved in a collision in front of the Price home.

As reported to George Doe, Chelsea police chief, who was called to the scene, Mrs. Price, headed west, had stopped on the north side of the pavement to wait for traffic to pass before making a left turn into her own driveway but did not see the oncoming eastbound car. Reynolds said he thought she was going to stop to let him pass. When she didn't stop he tried to avoid the collision by swinging around in front of her car but he couldn't make it.

Both cars were slightly damaged but no one was injured.

THE TRANSFIGURATION did three things—it encouraged the Lord for the things before him; it showed the divine nature of the gospel, and illustrated that it comes from within. As the glory of Jesus came that day from within himself, so Christianity works from within outward.

The lesson also shows how service is to be regarded. When James and John asked for chief places in the Lord's glory, he told them that chief places were not his to give. They were to be won by those who would be great servants in his kingdom. Whosoever would be great among them must be their minister.

The verses from the Acts show that the dependence of the disciples was in the Holy Spirit. There appeared in the disciples a greatness that the people could not understand. "And they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jesus." Though they were unlearned in the Jewish schools of the day, they had learned in the greater school of Jesus. And the disciples also learned boldness. When Peter and John were brought before the Jewish authorities and were forbidden to speak further in the name of Jesus, they boldly declared they would hearken unto the voice of God rather than of man.

Lord, I'm Coming Home

The hymn that was written to save one soul

A song was running through his mind so he told his wife he would set it down on paper before he went to bed. He was 83 years old, but he often worked late, so Mrs. Kirkpatrick thought nothing of it. But when she awoke long after midnight the light was still burning in "the professor's" study so she called to him.

Music was born into William J. Kirkpatrick when he came into the world on the Emerald Isle in 1853. Music was part of him when he migrated to America as a youth and it was part of him when he was a Pennsylvania Volunteer, he led a fife band during the Civil War. And music was in his heart when he died in Philadelphia in 1921.

A religious Irishman, Kirkpatrick devoted his life to directing church choirs, playing church organs and writing church songs. And he set music to words from many another pen. In 1882 he took a poem by Fricilla Owens and started the words to a hymn "We Have Heard the Joyful Sound: Jesus Saves—Saves"—The same year he wrote music for Louisa Stoddard's "Thy So Sweet to Trust in Jesus" and three years later he composed the tune for "Where the Tree of Life is Blooming, Meet Me There."

In 1902 William Kirkpatrick was leading the music for a camp meeting in rural Pennsylvania when he questioned the sincerity of a soloist who was helping him. Sermons of the evangelist had failed to move the man and Composer Kirkpatrick decided on a unique plan. He wrote a song especially for his singing assistant. At the opening of the evening service he handed the song to his soloist and asked him to sing it. The singer did—and joined others that night at the altar.

That night in 1921 when Mrs. Kirkpatrick called her husband there was no answer. She found him sitting in his study chair. On the desk were unfinished words of a song and the last verse showed that he had worked rapidly. But he didn't quite make the deadline. William J. Kirkpatrick went out in the world as he came into it... with a song of the heart. Among other monuments to his memory he left a song he wrote to save the soul of one man. But any evangelist will tell you that tens of thousands of penitents have gathered around the altar to the singing of...

"I'll trust Thy Jesus, believe Thy word, Lord, I'm coming home."
My soul is sick, my heart is sore,
Now I'm coming home;
My strength renew, my hope restore,
Lord, I'm coming home.

Coming home, coming home,
Never more to roam;
Open wide Thine arms of love,
Lord, I'm coming home.

EASY DOES IT

WHEN you are laundering delicate fabrics so fragile that they won't take starch—try this: Dissolve a small quantity of sugar in the final rinse water and run the material through that to stiffen it.

Adding salt to your starch water on a windy day, helps to keep the clothes starched while the wind whips them around during the drying.

If your clothespins have a tendency to give way long before their time, treat the pins, while new, to make them last longer. Place in a basin of boiling water and washing soda for 30 minutes, rinse in cold water and let them dry in the sun before using.

Linen, which does not take well to commercial bleaches, may be bleached by rubbing with lemon juice. Let dry in the sun. Repeat, if necessary.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Tomato-Cottage Cheese Salad
(Serves 6-8)

2 envelopes plain gelatin
2 cans condensed tomato soup
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup large curd cottage cheese

Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup soup; set aside. Heat remaining soup then add gelatin and seasonings. Stir until dissolved. Chill until the consistency of unbeaten egg white; fold in cottage cheese.

Pour into an oiled salad mold or individual molds and chill until firm. Serve greens and mayonnaise.

Fine fabrics which are difficult to dampen evenly for ironing can be wrapped in a wet towel for this purpose. Let stand in the towel at least 30 minutes before ironing to allow moisture to penetrate.

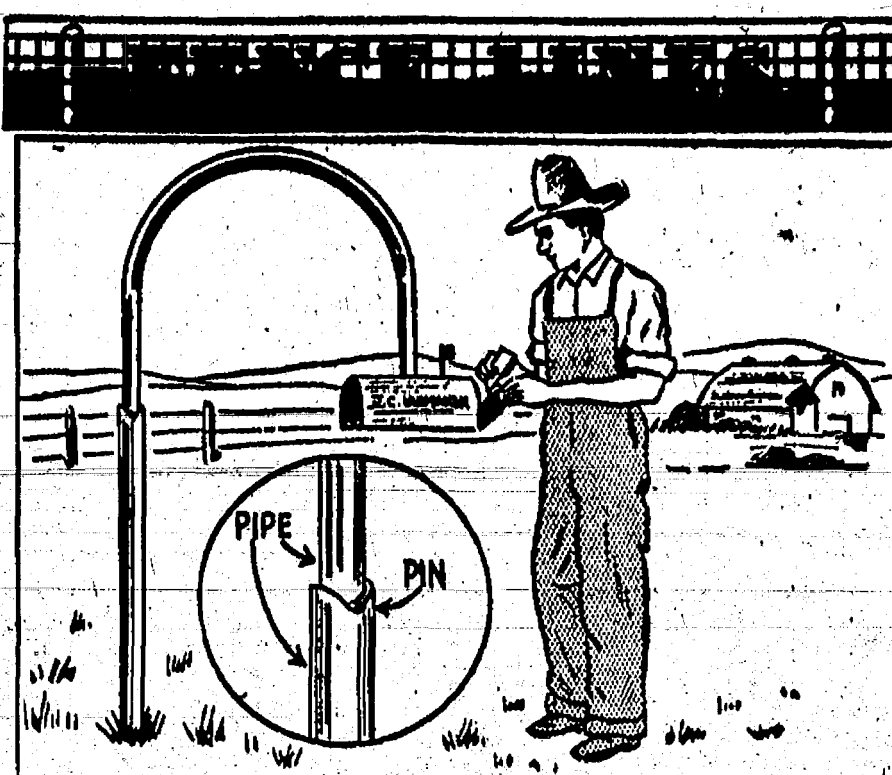
