

## Cassidy Lake Pair Charged with Murder

### Victim's Body Found in Small Septic Tank on Camp Grounds

Anthony G. Bedard, 17, listed as missing from Cassidy Lake Technical school since March 31, was found dead in a septic tank on the school grounds last Thursday. At first believed a suicide, the possibility he was a murder victim was investigated after discovery of a stab wound in the heart. The body was weighted with a cement block fastened at the waist with wire.

Yesterday murder warrants were issued against Sylvester Salva, 21, of Detroit, and Jack Howard, 19, of Muskegon, two inmates at the camp.

One of the two was said to have confessed the stabbing, although it was not stated which one had made the confession.

Bedard was serving a term of one to four years for larceny from a building. He was the son of Mrs. Ruth DeBlauwe, of Mariborough avenue, Detroit. He was sentenced Jan. 11 after he pleaded guilty in a Detroit court to a charge of stealing a gun from the home of an uncle.

## Camp Director Addresses Bethel Adult Fellowship

Dr. William C. Morse, director of the U. of M. Fresh Air Camp, stressed the importance in a child's life of assurance that he is cared for and loved in his talk before 35 parents of children six years of age and under, at the Bethel church Adult Fellowship meeting Tuesday, April 29.

Dr. Morse said all problems of child rearing can be easily ironed out if children are truly sure of their parents' love. Methods of discipline, he said, are not nearly as important as nurturing the security of feeling in the child. Seemingly harsh punishment is never held against parents if the children are sure that the parents have their best interests at heart.

On the other hand, Dr. Morse said the often-advocated method of reasoning with children, while it has its good points, does not give the desired results when the child's parent relationship lacks the important quality which assures the child he is loved.

Answering questions regarding specific problems of parents, he emphasized the tremendous difference in children which must be taken into account in solving behavior problems.

The drowning victim is survived by his widow and two sons, Danny and Jerry.

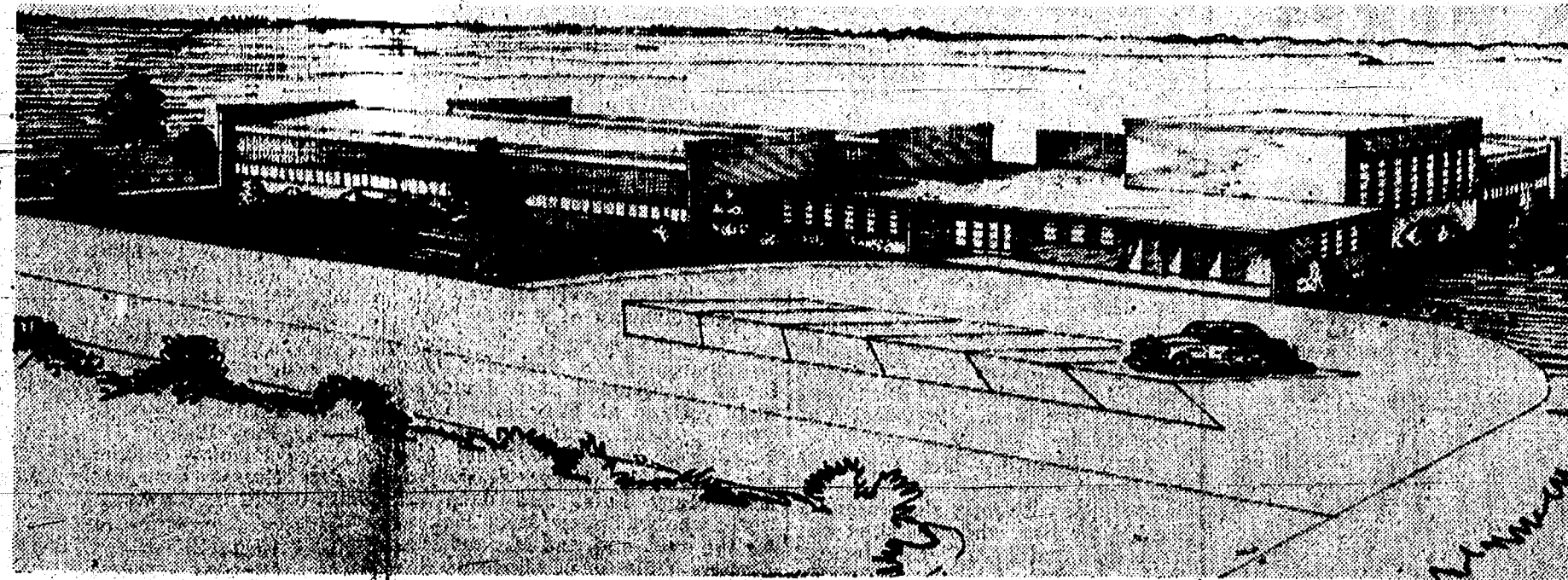
Mitchell lived in Chelsea for a period of five years while he was employed at the Federal Screw Works. They returned to Lansing about 15 years ago.

CHELSEA'S NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL as it will appear when completed, is shown by the above architect's drawing, while the small photo to the right gives an idea of the work done to date. The L-shaped building will contain 14 classrooms, the early elementary grades to occupy the east wing and the later elementary grades the south wing. In the center, just to the left of the north entrance, will be the rest rooms, a combination teachers' room and health clinic, office space and a room for books, teachers' supplies and other storage. The kitchen adjoins the "multi-purpose room" (the higher portion of the building). The all-purpose room will be used as a gymnasium, an auditorium and cafeteria. The boiler room is at the west end of the building. Directional glass block will provide bi-lateral lighting, while regular glass windows form a clear vision strip beneath the glass block portions of the outer walls.

Construction was held up for three days the past week because of the plumbers' strike in the Ann Arbor area which began last Thursday. Pipes for the radiating heating must be installed before the concrete floors can be put in.

Inc., of Kalamazoo, are the architects who designed the new building. General contractor is Wallace Bjorklund, of Douglas, while United Piping and Erecting Company of Lansing, has the mechanical contract, and City Electric Company of Ann Arbor, is doing the electrical work.
