Construction of a new Court House on the present site in downtown Ann Arbor was approved Tuesday afternoon by the Washtenaw county Board of Supervisors. Supervisors voted 28 to 7 in approving the proposal.

It was also voted to place on the November ballot a proposal for a bond issue to finance the construction of the proposed building. Amount of the bond issue is still to be determined, but it is believed it will be approximately \$3,000,000. Tentative plans for a Court House, designed by R. S. Gerganoff, estimate the cost of a proposed U-shape design on the present site at approximately \$2.650,000.
