Too delicate to attend school regularly in har native England, Frances Ridley Havergal's father had sent her to visit friends in Dusseldorf. Exhausted from sightseeing, Miss Havergal sat, by chance, to rest in front of a painting of Christ on the cross. Over the wreath of thorns she noticed the wording: "This have I done for thee; What hast thou done for me?"

Inspired by the painting, she wrote a few lines of poetry. That night at the home of her friends she threw the scrap of paper into the fire. Then there took place one of those strange incidents that shape the destinies of men. A gust of air blew the paper out onto the hearth.

I gave my life for thee, My precious blood I shed, That thou might'st ransomed be, And quickened from the dead; I gave my life for thee, What bast thou given for Me?

My Father's house of light, My glory circled throne I left, for earthly night, For wanderings sad and lone; 1 left it all for thee, Has thou left aught for Me?

> RECIPE OF THE WEEK Petate Pancakes O'Brien

(Makes 8) 1 egg, slightly beaten 3 tablespoons flour % cup milk

2 tablespoons each, minced onion, green pepper, and pimiento. Balt and pepper-to taste

2 cups (firmly packed) grated raw potatoes. Mix eggs and flour until smooth; stir in milk; add remaining ingredients. (Peel

and grate potatoes just before adding to batter to prevent their darkening). Drop mixture in circles (4 cup each) on well greased griddle. Bake over medium heat about 5 minutes on each side, or until potatoes are tender. These are delicious with pot roast or with ham or bacon and eggs for breakfast.

If food spills in an oven, try to cake turner or a similar instrument. When the oven has cooled. scrub with brush and use scouring powder. Leave the oven door open until dry, so that no burned food odor or cleaner odor will remain. Freezing unit pans and trays from the refrigerator should be removed and washed in hot soapy water, then rinsed well. The same applies to racks and shelves.

The inside of the refrigerator is best washed with cool water in which one tablespoon of borax or baking soda has been dissolved. Rinse with a clean damp cloth and wipe dry. This all helps to cut down odors.


