RECEIVES GOVERNMENT WHEAT CHECK-Three Chelses



Darwin Downer, who finished harvesting his wheat Monday, July 14, is shown, at left above, as he received his check-in payment for the 1,000 bushels he delivered to the Blaess Elevator at Four Mile Lake which is the governmentapproved warehouse in this area. The check was delivered to himlast Friday, July 18. Others who received checks for their wheat the same day are Earl Bauer, of Dexter, and William Van Riper. Downer's check was presented by Margaret Vowell, secretarytreasurer in the PMA county office at Ann Arbor. Also present when Downer received his check were William Pritchard, member


Downer finished harvesting his wheat before the humid, rainy weather of the past week halted almost all wheat harvesting in this vicinity. His wheat averaged 38 bushels to the acre. Test weight of his wheat was 59 pounds, with a moisture content of 13.5 per cent. He harvested his 1,000 bushels from fields measuring approximately 26 acres. Van Riper finished harvesting his wheat Saturday, July 12, thus also reaping the advantage of the ideal harvest weather which preceded the humid conditions of the pastweek .-- The day he finished, he said, most of the wheat being tested showed moisture content of only 11 per cent.
