The 20 silver dollars, which had been offered as a special prize for one of the purchasers of articles at the auction, went to Dennis Guinan.

Several merchants had various demonstrations and displays during the two-day affair.

Her guess was 29 hours, 29 minutes and 29 seconds. It actually required 29 hours, 17 minutes to melt.

Dangers in High Speed Are Present All Year Around

Chief George Doe of the Chelsea Police department, is reminding motorists that although speed control is being stressed during the current traffic safety campaign in Michigan, the dangers of driving too fast are present all year around.

"Speed," Chief Doe said, "is the leading traffic killer every day of the year. Although speed takes its heaviest toll during the summer season, it continues to show up as the predominant factor in traffic deaths during the fall, winter and spring.

"For several weeks the Chelsea Police department and other police agencies throughout Michigan have been urging motorists to practice strict, self-enforced speed control. The state law itself requires that speed be adjusted to all conditions.

"Last year, 1,604 persons were killed and 48,418 injured on Michigan streets and highways. That is an average of 138 casualties. The highest daily toll was recorded in July with 160 casualties.

"This traffic record is inexcusable when we realize that most of the accidents, injuries and deaths could have been prevented. One or more drivers were reported as violating traffic laws seven out of every ten fatal accidents. Of all the violations reported, 44 per cent were for driving too fast for conditions.

"Drivers should realize that the menace of speed can be checked only through their own efforts. They should remember that speed control is always a matter of life or death."

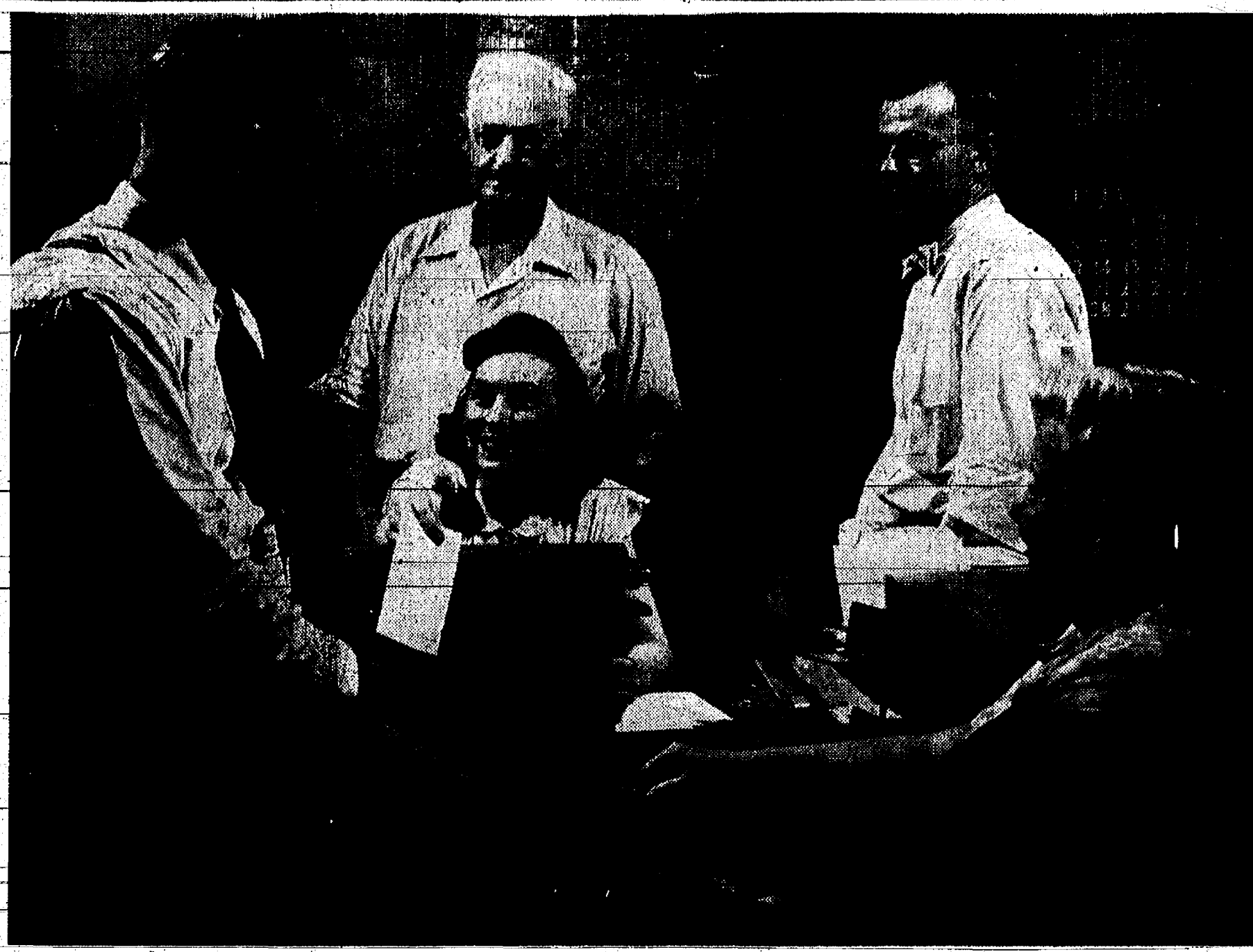
Former Chelsea Youth Promoted to Corporal at Camp Pendleton

RECEIVES GOVERNMENT WHEAT CHECK—Three Chelsea area farmers have earned the distinction of being the first in the state to receive checks in payment for their 1952 wheat crops under the government's price-support plan.

Downer finished harvesting his wheat before the humid, rainy weather of the past week halted almost all wheat harvesting in this vicinity. His wheat averaged 38 bushels to the acre. Test weight of his wheat was 59 pounds, with a moisture content of 13.5 per cent. He harvested his 1,000 bushels from fields measuring approximately 26 acres. Van Riper finished harvesting his wheat Saturday, July 12, thus also reaping the advantage of the ideal harvest weather which preceded the humid conditions of the past week. The day he finished, he said, most of the wheat being tested showed moisture content of only 11 per cent. The average moisture content of his wheat was from 13.0 to 13.5 per cent, while test weight was 59.5 pounds per bushel. His average yield from the 12 acres he harvested was 40 bushels per acre.

Humid Heat Threatening Wheat Crop

Chelsea, along with most of the country, has experienced record-breaking hot weather during the month of July. In addition to the 95-degree heat of the past week the humidity has added to the discomfort, especially in the Great Lakes area.

The hot weather, together with the high humidity and almost daily showers of the past 10 days have combined to bring about conditions which threaten the wheat crop not only in this vicinity but in various parts of the state. The dampness and heat is causing wheat to sprout before it can be harvested.

Most wheat in this vicinity had been considered of excellent quality before the unfavorable weather conditions set in, delaying completion of harvesting.

Some wheat brought in to local markets through July 13 showed moisture content as low as 11 per cent with test weights of 59 lbs. per bushel. Average moisture content was 13.5 per cent for the first few days after harvest was begun the second week of this month. Farmers and buyers alike said it was as fine a crop of wheat as had ever been raised in this area.
