Big Fifth Inning Nets Five Runs For Local Team

Last Sunday the Chelsea Independents won their fifth league game of the season by defeating Lansing, 8-6. It was the second time this year that Chelsea has defeated this Lansing team. Marty Tobin has been the winner in both of them. In Sunday's game Marty gave up 12 hits, walked only three and struck out 13.

Chelsea took a one-run lead in the third inning on a walk, a fielder's choice and a double by Arden Musbach. But Lansing came back in their half of the fourth to score two times and put them in the lead. In the last half of Chelsea's fourth the Independents once more took the lead and this time they didn't lose it.

George Heydlauff led off with an infield hit, stole second and went to third after Hansen fled out to center. Miller then walked and with McClellan at bat Heydlauff stole home and Miller went down to second. McClellan then walked and Dick Merkel followed with a single into left field which scored Miller and put the Independents in the lead.

In the fifth inning Chelsea scored five more runs as nine batters were on base. The runs were scored on singles by Arden Musbach, Stan Knickerbocker, Don McClellan and Dick Merkel, plus two Lansing errors, two wild pitches, and stolen bases by Heydlauff and Jim Miller.

Lansing started a rally in the sixth but they were unable to overcome Chelsea's lead. In that inning they scored three times on three singles and two Chelsea errors. They also threatened in the eighth when they loaded the bases with singles but Tobin got out of that jam with only one run being scored and that was when he walked Reifender to force in Grove.

Settlement of Long Steel Strike Means Gradual Recall of Local Plant Workers

Steel production was to be resumed this week following settlement of the strike last Friday. The strike, said to be the costliest in American history, was in its fifty-third day when it ended. Announcement that the strike was over was made from the White House where the president had conferred with U. S. Steel Chairman Benjamin Fairless and CIO President Philip Murray.

The announcement that the strike was over did not include announcement of terms reached as to wages and other demands. The strike was reportedly no great victory for any of those involved—the union, the government, or industry.

The raise in wages of 16 cents an hour and provisions for increased vacations and holiday pay will be reflected in an increase of \$5.20 per ton of steel produced by the 380 plants involved.

Locally, resumption of the production of steel is expected to gradually bring about the recall of workers laid off as a direct result of the strike.

At Central Fibre Products, Inc., 60 per cent of the workers had been laid off. Donald Bacon, president of the company, said the plant will start recalling workers as fast as materials are received. He said the company is expediting shipments of steel by the end of this week. It will take two or three weeks, however, to get back to normal operations, Bacon said.

Chelsea Manufacturing Corporation is operating on the barest essential basis with only two men working. The situation will remain the same, at least through this week, according to E. P. Gorman, treasurer of the company. Although the company had steel on hand, operations were halted because customers cancelled deliveries and storage space at the local plant was taxed to its fullest capacity. Surnman said employees will be recalled as soon as possible.

Chelsea Products was not expecting to be affected by the steel strike unless it continued through to the end of the month.

Lowell Davison, plant manager of Chelsea Spring, said it is his opinion that it will take from 30 to 45 days to get operations back to normal at the plant. Approximately 40 per cent of the workday had been laid off because of the effects of the steel strike.

Auto Crash at M-92 Corner Injures Eight

Eight persons were injured in a collision at US-12 and M-92 at 1:50 Sunday afternoon. The injured included three Chelsea area residents and a family of five from Jackson. Those from the Chelsea area are Maltya Misalides, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Misalides, Richard Fletcher, 44, driver of one of the cars who lives on Grass Lake road, south of Chelsea, and Fletcher's son, Derrell, six years old.

The Misalides boy and Fletcher, driver of the pick-up truck in which he was riding, received head lacerations while Fletcher's son received lacerations on his chest and leg. The three were taken to St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor.

Members of the Jackson family involved in the crash were removed to Foote hospital, Jackson. According to investigating officers' reports, Richard Dressell, the father, and driver of the car, suffered a fractured collar bone and left knee abrasions. His wife, Irene, received four broken ribs and forehead lacerations. Larry, eight years old, received back injuries; Dick, 11, sprained his left ankle, and Mary Louise, 13, sustained left forearm cuts and leg and hip injuries. The family home in Jackson is at 2114 East Ganson street.

According to the investigating officer's report, the collision occurred at 1:50 a.m. on US-12, two miles east of Lima Center, no injuries resulted when two cars traveling east sidepassed each other as one suddenly turned out to avoid running over a tire rim on the road.

Charles Conrad Wieder of Wyandotte, and Kenneth Wolfe, of Kalamazoo, were drivers of the two cars. Both cars were damaged.

Outdoor Theatre To Be Constructed at Airport Site

Extensive grading has been underway at the former Washtenaw airport site at US-12 and Staebler road, east of Chelsea, where a \$100,000 drive-in theatre is reportedly to be constructed.

Co-owners of the proposed new theatre were said to be Ed. Carrow of South Lyon, and Arthur Robinson who now operates a drive-in theatre on Washtenaw road, east of Ann Arbor.

The Boomer Construction company of Flint, has been named as the contractor who has the job of building the theatre. According to announcements of the project, the drive-in, when completed, will accommodate 800 cars.

Paul Whitman, Soil township building inspector, said yesterday that he had not yet been contacted regarding a building permit for the construction of the outdoor theatre.

Many Bleary-Eyed TV Fans Miss Dem. Nomination

Television fans in Chelsea and vicinity lost considerable sleep last week watching the activities televised from the Democratic national convention which named Gov. Adlai Stevenson, of Illinois, as the party's candidate for U. S. president.

Many local people said they learned more about convention procedure during the Democratic gathering two weeks before, which nominated General Dwight D. Eisenhower, than they had ever known before.

A number of persons missed seeing Stevenson as he gave his acceptance speech and President Truman as he addressed the convention because they had given up and gone to bed when it seemed the actual nomination would be delayed for hours by the repeated demands for polls of the various delegations.

Area Farmer Is Injured in Train Crash

Reuben Haselschwerdt suffered a broken left arm and multiple fractures of his jaw, as well as severe bruising of the head and body and possible internal injuries when the cab of the truck he was driving was demolished by a New York Central train at the Lima Center road crossing at Four Mile Lake Friday afternoon. He was taken to St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor, by ambulance, where his condition yesterday was reportedly somewhat improved.

Haselschwerdt had a load of wheat in the truck and was maneuvering it into line for unloading at the Blass Elevator company. The truck apparently stalled with the front end on the track and the west-bound local passenger train sheared off the cab. Haselschwerdt was reportedly thrown 100 feet by the impact after he failed in his attempt to crawl from the cab through the right-hand door. A large share of his load of wheat was scattered in the road as the crash spun the rear part of the truck around.

The accident was witnessed by a number of farmers who were waiting in line at the elevator.

The mishap occurred at approximately 2:55 p.m. The Chicago-bound train, No. 323, was running a few minutes behind schedule, the regular stop in Chelsea being timed for 2:45 p.m.

The truck Haselschwerdt was driving belonged to Don Irwin, according to relatives. Haselschwerdt and Irwin were co-owners of wheat with the machine they own in partnership and Haselschwerdt had been delivering the wheat, alternately driving his own truck and Irwin's as they became filled.

Police Chief George Doe was called to investigate the accident.
