

Independents Lose Game to Williamston

Local Ball Team
Now in Fourth Spot
in League Standings

Last Sunday at Williamston, the Chelsea Independents suffered their fourth loss of the season, 8-5. Don Alber pitched for Chelsea and gave up 11 hits as his teammates were able to collect only seven hits off starter Oscar Dunkel of Williamston. It was the second time this year that Williamston has defeated Chelsea. The other loss came earlier in the season by a score of 7-3.

Chelsea scored first in the second inning when Oscar Hansen singled into right field to score Jerry Lehman who had previously walked and moved down to second base on a fielder's choice. Williamston came right back in their half of the same inning to score four times on two hits, four bases on balls and one error. They scored again in the fourth and added two more runs in the fifth before they wound up their scoring with another run in the eighth inning.

The Independents tallied their second run in the fifth inning when Oscar Hansen scampered in from third on an infield grounder. In the eighth inning Chelsea scored their last three runs when with two out and Dick Merkel on second, Jerry Lehman singled to left field to score Merkel. Don McClellan then sent a three-run pitch to the outfielders for a triple which chased Lehman home. Don was then scored by Oscar Hansen's second single of the afternoon.

Hitting honors of the afternoon went to Oscar Dunkel, the Williamston pitcher, who collected three hits, walked once and drove in two Williamston runs in five trips to the plate. Chelsea is now in fourth place in the standings with a 5-4 average in the won-lost column.

Parking space for 18 cars will be available at Pierce Park when grading and graveling is completed this week. The parking lot is the contribution of Irwin Klumpp who is donating the gravel and all the labor for the project. Another recent contribution for the park is a fine teeter-totter donated by Mr. and Mrs. Otis Titus. Chamber of Commerce members and their families and friends are holding their annual picnic at the park this afternoon and evening. Those who attend will bring their own basket supper.

Camp Crile Will Hold Open House

Camp Crile, on the Sullivan farm, North Territorial road, said to be the only camp in the world for epileptic children, is planning an open house to be held next Thursday afternoon. Myron Poe, camp director, invites all interested persons of the community to attend. Poe, a teacher in Boynton school, in the southwest section of Detroit, said this week that applications from approximately 100 children who wished to attend the camp had to be turned down this year and that future plans for the camp include building a recreation hall and four or five cabins for boys and girls when finances permit.

The camp is financed entirely by the Michigan Society for Crippled Children, Inc., which was founded by Mrs. Frank J. Crile of Detroit, in 1937. Mrs. Crile became interested in epileptic children when her daughter was principal of the White public school for epileptic children, on Charles street on the east side, in Detroit. At that time children, teachers, and the principal slept at the school five nights a week, in addition to being present for the regular school sessions. The White school is still the only known public school in the world exclusively for epileptic children.

While epileptic children from all over the state are accepted at the camp, 60 per cent of them come from the Detroit area, Poe said. They range in age from six to 16 years. Mrs. Crile's plan for a camp for epileptic children resulted when she found such children were not provided for in other camps. The project is financed entirely by means of private contributions and benefits from bazaars and dinners put on by the society. The society also conducts a drive for contributions each year but no public or state assistance is received.

Camp Crile operates for eight weeks each summer. The camp opened this year on June 21 and the fourth two-week camp period will be completed Aug. 19. The staff includes Mrs. Lillian Forbush, as cook; Adolph Koss, a Detroit school teacher and psychologist, as senior boys' counselor; his wife, Edna Mae, as senior girls' counselor; and Mrs. Katherine Poe, wife of the director, resident registered nurse. Mrs. Poe was formerly head nurse at Children's hospital in Detroit.

Activities at the camp are all directed toward proving to the epileptic children that they can do what other children do, with the exception of swimming. There is no lake on the camp property. The camp program is aimed at overcoming emotional problems brought about by the attitude of parents and society in general. Parents of epileptic children often make one of two serious mistakes, Poe said. Either they pamper and spoil the child, or they reject him. At the camp, a special effort is made not to pamper the children, but to counteract the home pampering by teaching the children to do everything possible for themselves.

In their protectiveness toward epileptic children, Poe stated, parents do so much for them that they cannot even tie their shoe laces or dress and shower themselves when they arrive at camp. The children are thrilled to dress themselves and learn to do things they can go on long hikes. One seven-year-old girl, who is a partial paralytic, hiked seven miles, although at home she was so pampered that she was not allowed to walk at all without assistance. She pleaded with camp officials to let her go. "My Mommy I can walk by myself," she said.

Legend Reith, who owns a farm about four miles from camp, has given the camp children free run of his place. Many of the city children see ducks, chickens, farm animals, and corn and wheat fields for the first time in their lives. The children also enjoy rowing on the village lake on the farm. They are amazed when they see where country children attend classes. They keep toads and frogs where they find on their hikes. (Continued on page eight)

County Convention Delegates Selected by Ballot This Year

Washtenaw county voters this year for the first time elected delegates to the county conventions from candidates they themselves had nominated. Both the Democratic and Republican parties nominated their candidates for county delegates by petition instead of by precinct caucuses as done in former years.

The Republican county convention will be held at 8 p.m., Tuesday, Aug. 12, at the Washtenaw county Court House. Sylvan township delegates are Mrs. Mabel Holmes and Paul Maroney for Precinct II, and Leigh Palmer and William Schatz in Precinct I.

The newly-elected delegates to the Washtenaw Democratic county convention will meet Wednesday, Aug. 13, to perform their first official duties in the Democratic county convention, to be held at the Washtenaw county Court House at 8 p.m.

In the contest for delegates to the Washtenaw county Democratic convention from Sylvan township William Rademacher leads in Precinct I with five votes. In Precinct II there was a tie with one vote each for William Rademacher, Edwin Eaton, Henry Ahnert, and Dona Joseph and Robert Howe. The board of county canvassers will give the final decision when they meet, probably today.

Primary Balloting Sets Records

DeVine Named by
County Republicans
in Heated Contest

Fred M. Alger, Jr., is the Republican party's candidate to run against Gov. G. Mennen Williams, the Democratic candidate for re-election in the November general election.

John W. Connelly, the Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, will be opposed by Clarence A. Reid, Republican, in the lead race, showing yesterday afternoon continued through the remainder of tabulation from state precincts still to report.

Balloting all over the state was exceptionally heavy for a primary election, although the percentage of registered voters who exercised their right to cast their ballot probably averaged less than 50 per cent.

The 660 voters who went to the polls Tuesday in Sylvan township are approximately one-third of the total number registered here. Walter F. Kantlehner, Sylvan township clerk, estimates that the registration in the township at this time is approximately 2,000.

Charles Potter won the Republican nomination for U. S. senator, and Blair Moody is the Democratic candidate.

Incumbent George Meader received overwhelming majorities over Arthur Lophore and Norman Sulzer for the Republican nomination as congressman. The name of John P. Dawson, the Democratic party's only candidate in the primary election, will appear on the November ballot as the party's candidate opposing Meader.

John L. Osborn (R) and Lawrence Oltersdorf (D) are the candidates for sheriff. Luella Smith (R) is unsupported for the office of county clerk, and Edmond F. DeVine (R) won the nomination for office of prosecutor. Louis C. Andrews is the Democratic candidate.

Other candidates named Tuesday are George N. Higgins (R) and Leonard D. Bennett (D), for state senator; Joseph E. Warner (R) and Viola B. Blackburn (D), state representative; William J. Vermer (R) and Richard K. Weber (D), county treasurer; Thomas Fitzgerald (R), and Mary Ellen Kirk (D), register of deeds; Murray J. Knowles, Jr. (R), and Roy Merrill (D), drain commissioner; and Edwin C. Ganzhorn (R) and William H. Dickson (D), coroner.

Ann Arbor voters defeated the proposal which would have put a 10 per cent municipal tax on admissions for amusements and sports where admission prices amounted to more than 26 cents. The vote was No. 5727, and yes, 3311.

Train Crash Injuries Fatal to Farmer

Reuben D. Haselschwardt died early Tuesday morning at St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor. He had been a patient at the hospital since he was injured in a truck-train crash at the Lima Center road crossing, east of Chelsea, Friday, July 25.

Mr. Haselschwardt had been a member of the Chelsea Knights of Pythias and the Farm Bureau. He was a former director for 10 years of the Dorr school, District No. 9, Sharon township, and was a director of the Southern Washtenaw Farmers' Mutual Insurance Co. He attended the North Sharon Community church.

Born Feb. 4, 1885, in Sharon township, he was a son of Conrad J. Haselschwardt and Mary Ellen Kirk. He had lived at the present family home at 4608 Sylvan road, in Sharon township, since his marriage, March 17, 1918, to Hazel Comstock, who survives.

Also surviving are a son, Howard; two sisters, Mrs. Helen Kilmer and Mrs. Otto Mayer; and four brothers, Milton, of Rochester, Ray, of Manchester, and John and Lewis, of Chelsea. A daughter, Eliza, died in infancy.

Rev. P. H. Grabowski of St. Paul's church, and Rev. J. Fontana of Ann Arbor, a former pastor of the North Sharon Community church, are to officiate at the funeral services which are being held at the Staffan Funeral Home at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Burial will be in Oak Grove cemetery.

County's 21st Case of Polio Reported

Washtenaw county's 21st case of polio was reported Tuesday morning to the Health Department office in Ann Arbor. All the cases, to date, have been in the eastern section of the county, none having been reported from the Chelsea area according to the Health Department.

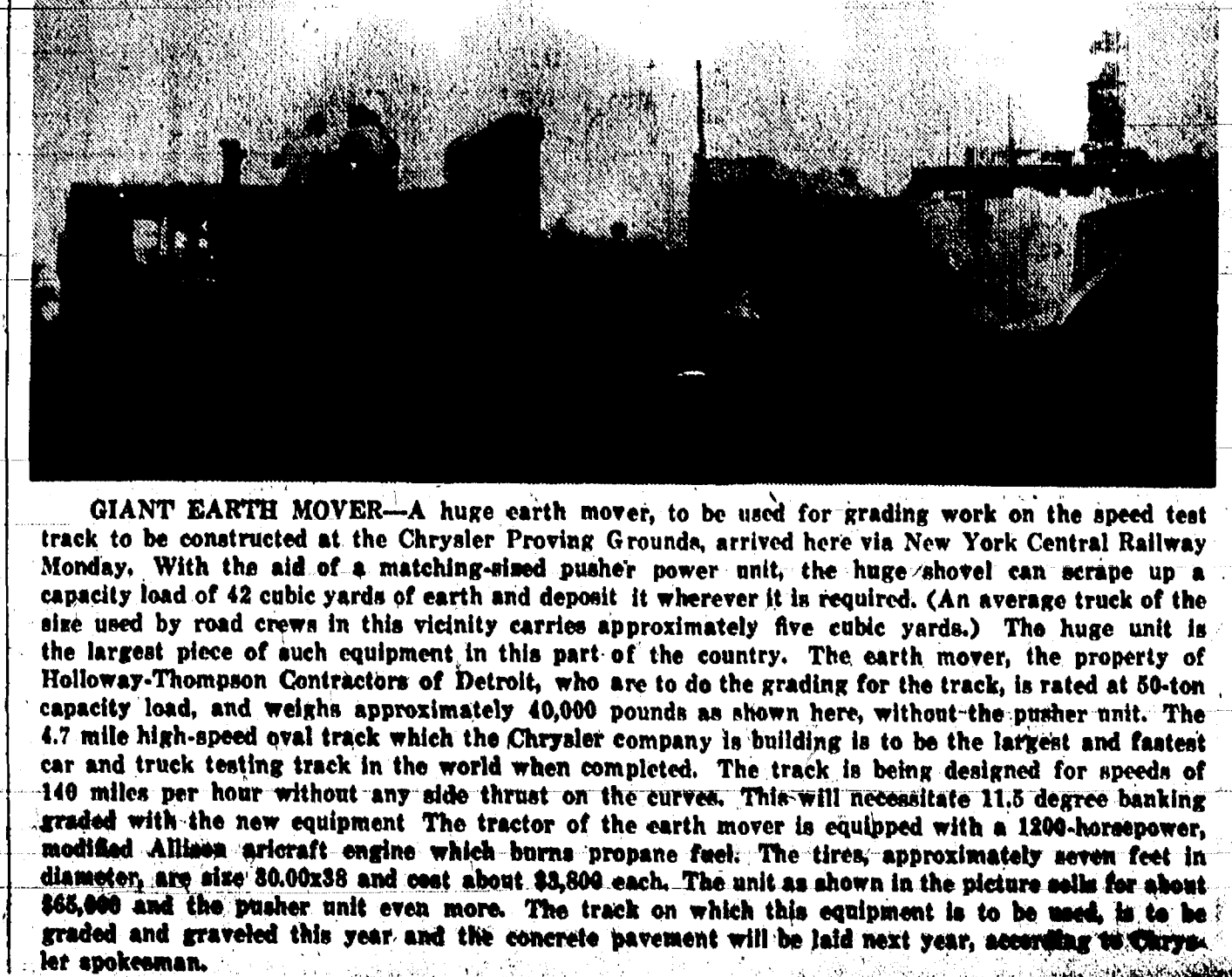
Summer Recreation Champions Crowned

The car left the highway and ran 200 feet into the field on the north side of the highway before his wife, riding with him, was able to stop it.



GIANT EARTH MOVER—A huge earth mover, to be used for grading work on the speed test track to be constructed at the Chrysler Proving Grounds, arrived here via New York Central Railway Monday. With the aid of a matching-sized pusher power unit, the huge shovel can scrape up a capacity load of 42 cubic yards of earth and deposit it wherever it is required. (An average truck of the size used by road crews in this vicinity carries approximately five cubic yards.) The huge unit is the largest piece of such equipment in this part of the country. The earth mover, the property of Holloway-Thompson Contractors of Detroit, who are to do the grading for the track, is rated at 50-ton capacity load, and weighs approximately 40,000 pounds as shown here, without the pusher unit. The 4.7 mile high-speed oval track which the Chrysler company is building is to be the largest and fastest car and truck testing track in the world when completed. The track is being designed for speeds of 140 miles per hour without any side thrust on the curves. This will necessitate 11.5 degree banking graded with the new equipment. The tractor of the earth mover is equipped with a 1200-horsepower, modified Allison aircraft engine which burns propane fuel. The tires, approximately seven feet in diameter, are size 30.0x38 and cost about \$3,500 each. The unit as shown in the picture sells for about \$65,000 and the pusher unit even more. The track on which this equipment is to be used, is to be graded and gravelled this year and the concrete pavement will be laid next year, according to Chrysler spokesman.
