**Remodeling
Livery Stable
for Plant Use****Longworth Plating
Works Will Move
Into New Quarters**

The old livery stable on Jackson street, just east of the W. R. Daniels garage, has been undergoing extensive remodeling for the past three months and, according to present plans, will be ready for its new role as a modern, well-equipped plant for the Longworth Plating Service within the next few weeks.

The plating service, owned and operated by Marion Longworth, will move from its present location in the Tower building as soon as the remodeling is completed.

The 70x75-foot building has a new concrete floor. Approximately half of the first floor space will house the plating room which is being equipped with a track system. Material to be plated will be put into a barrel at the starting point and will follow through the various steps of cleaning, rinsing, acid bath, plating, and cold water rinses to the finished job.

The new equipment also includes an electric hoist. More work will be possible with less manual effort, Longworth said. He said it will be possible to expand operations in the new location and more equipment will be added as needed, to handle the larger volume of work.

An office, 9x16 feet, and a laboratory, 11x16 feet, will also be located on the first floor, with the remaining space reserved for storage. Storage space will also be provided on the second floor of the building.

Five men are now employed at the plating works, in addition to Longworth.

**Store Building
To House Attorney,
Insurance Offices**

The store building at 115 Park street, formerly occupied by Chelsea Appliance, is undergoing extensive remodeling to provide office space for James Hendley, local attorney, and Alfred Mayer, insurance agent.

The Mayer office will occupy the front part of the building and will be separated from the Hendley office by a solid partition. The Hendley office, at the back part of the building, will be reached by a hallway leading from the front entrance.

The Hendley office, approximately 600 square feet in size, will have a reception room, secretary's office, consulting office, and library. The move from the present office, Hendley said, will provide more available space for his office and will have the added convenience of being on the ground floor.

Hendley has been located in the present office since he became associated with the late John Kalmbach in 1936. He continued practice there following Kalmbach's death in 1942.

Mayer's office, entirely separated from the Hendley suite by the solid partition, will be entered from the hallway and will have one large room and two smaller private offices. The private offices will be at the east side of the building. The large room will have counter space similar to that in the present second-floor office space in the Freeman building.

Mayer said the move to the new location was planned as a convenience to the public as well as to provide more space for his office which is also the local branch of the office of the secretary of state for issuing automobile licenses.

The move to the new office will be made as soon as remodeling is completed, probably about Oct. 1.

**Schools Ready
for Opening
Next Week****New High School
Students Register
Today, Tomorrow**

School buses will make their first runs on Thursday, Sept. 4, which is the day school opens here for all classes. According to an announcement by Supt. Charles S. Cameron, the bus schedules of last year will be followed. These are familiar to all who were transported to school the past year.

Following the custom of the past year, also, all pupils, except those who live near the rural schools they attend, will be transported to Chelsea, and the second and third grades will be taken from there to the four rural schools where classes are held.

The rural schools of the district are the Riemenschneider, Savage, Sylvan Center and Pumpkin College schools. All second and third grade pupils should bring lunches.

Adjustments in the bus schedules may be made later, Supt. Cameron said, but for the present, last year's routes and schedules will be maintained.

Including the new, 30-passenger GMC bus, the Chelsea Agricultural Society district now has a fleet of seven buses and a station wagon.

Pupils in the district who will not be served by the bus schedule should call Supt. Cameron at once.

Kindergarten pupils are to be accompanied by their parents the first day of school and parents will be asked to come after their children Friday because it will be impossible to have the bus schedule set up for the newly-entered children before Monday.

Kindergartners who live within walking distance of the school should be brought to school at 1 p.m., while those served by the school buses should come in the morning.

Sale of lockers and text books for junior and senior high school pupils and registration of students not previously registered in the two high school groups are in progress today and tomorrow. The registration began yesterday and is being processed in the office of the high school principal, John Griffin.

Football candidates are reminded to have physical examination forms filled out and ready to hand in when equipment is issued at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 30.

**North Main Street
Work for This Year
Near Completion**

The North Main street road construction program, begun last May, is nearing completion on the work to be done this year. Village President Anton Nielsen, checking on the progress of the work this week, said it was almost finished.

The New York Central's Main street crossing will be finished this week. The crossing has been closed since June.

Gravel fill is being applied on the roadbed from the crossing to the North Main street bridge. As one layer becomes packed down another is applied. A seal coat will be applied when all gravel has been applied. This will complete the preparations for the pavement which is to be the final step of the improvement project.

Gould and Cross of Grand Rapids are the contractors in charge of the construction.

**Two Accidents,
Fire at Same Time
Sunday Evening**

Five adults and a baby riding in a 1951 Oldsmobile two-door sedan were uninjured when the car plunged through a guard-rail down a bank, narrowly missing a deep culvert, back up the bank and through the guard rail a second time, after being forced off the road by a car passing in the third lane of the three-lane highway on US-12. The accident occurred at 8:10 p.m. Sunday about a quarter of a mile east of the M-92 intersection.

While Police Officer Rolland White was on his way to the scene and was within 100 yards, two cars swerved each other as they were trying to pass, from opposite directions, in the center lane of the highway. Neither of the drivers nor two passengers in one of the cars involved, were injured.

McCarthy's injuries were listed as a broken neck, crushed chest and fractured skull.

Employed as an accountant at the Packard Motor Car company in Detroit, he had served two years in the U. S. Navy after his graduation from Dexter High school in 1945.

The body was taken to the Keene Funeral Home in Dexter and funeral services were held at St. Joseph's Catholic church in Dexter, yesterday morning. Burial was in St. Joseph's cemetery, Dexter.

Graveside services were conducted by American Legion Post 557, of which he was a member. He was also a member of the Dexter Knights of Columbus and the Holy Name Society of St. Joseph's church.

Survivors are his mother, Mrs. Theresa McCarthy; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Petrosos of Quincy, and Helen McCarthy, at home; and his grandmothers, Mrs. John Farrell, of Ann Arbor, and Mrs. Jay McCarthy, of Dexter.

With two holiday week-ends having already accounted for 56 Michigan traffic deaths this summer, State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs is urging motorists to prevent a deadly conclusion to the season by exercising extra care on crowded highways over the Labor Day period.

"In 1941," Childs said, "the combined traffic death toll for the three summer holiday week-ends, Memorial Day, Fourth of July and Labor Day, was 118, the highest in record. The lowest was 24 in 1940."

"Last year 14 persons were killed over the Labor Day period, Friday through Monday. It was the safest Labor Day week-end, from the standpoint of fatalities, since 1944, when only seven were killed. The highest toll was 46 in 1940."

"Drivers exercised a great deal of care and common sense last year and the week-end toll was comparatively low. The volume of traffic will probably set a new record this Labor Day if weather conditions are favorable, but nevertheless the toll can be further reduced if drivers are cautious. If they are, it will help bring the summer to a more happy ending."

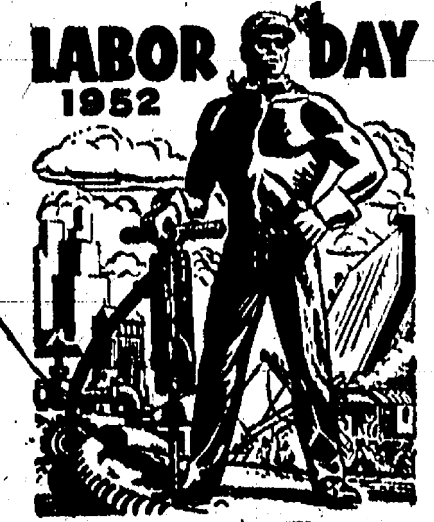

**Dexter Youth Killed Sunday
in Auto Crash East of Chelsea**

Edward J. McCarthy, 24, of Dexter, died enroute to St. Joseph's hospital, Sunday morning of injuries received when he apparently lost control of his car and it struck a tree. The accident occurred at 4:15 a.m. Sunday on Chelsea-Dexter road about a quarter of a mile east of the Lima Center road intersection.

McCarthy, 24 years old, was headed west, driving a 1950 Ford convertible, according to a sheriff's deputy's report. Frank Reed, Chelsea police officer, was called to the scene.
