Bulldogs Win from Dundee Friday Night

Flat Rock Team Will Play Here Tomorrow Evening

Chelsea traveled to Dundee last Friday night to deliver a 26-6 defeat to their hosts.

The local team racked up two of their touchdowns in the first quarter after recovering two Dundee fumbles, a third TD in the third quarter, and the last in the fourth quarter. Dundee made their lone score in the last minutes of the final quarter.

Chelsea took the pigskin on their own 20-yard line at the opening kick-off and moved it up to the 47 where on fourth down, the ball was booted to Dundee's 35. Dundee fumbled and Clark recovered for Chelsea who then marched to the 12-yard line. From there Knickerbocker went the remaining yards for a TD. Bareis booted the extra point and Chelsea had a lead, 7-0.

Chelsea kicked the ball to Dundee's 35 where Lowe fumbled and Bauer recovered for Chelsea. Chelsea then moved to Dundee's 30 only to be thrown for an eight-yard loss by Butcher and LaMond. Knickerbocker threw the ball to Bertke who went to the 25-yard line. Proctor went the last four yards for a TD; the extra point was booted by Bareis, and Chelsea led, 14-0.

Chelsea kicked to Dundee, who received on their own 21 and moved all the way to the six-yard line where they received a 15-yard penalty for clipping. Because Dundee was unable to move the ball Chelsea took over on their own 22. The first quarter ended, 14-0.

The second quarter resumed with Chelsea taking the ball on their own 22 from which they moved to their own 46 where the ball was fumbled and Drmandian recovered for Dundee. Dundee marched the ball back to the 17 where Heiden was thrown for a two-yard loss by Clark. Weyher threw a pass to Lowe who was brought down on the 13 by Dick Bareis. May then handed the ball off to Busch who was hit by Buerle and thrown for a five-yard loss and Chelsea took over the ball on their own 17.

Dundee received the pigskin on their own 25 and moved it to the 45 where it was fumbled with Chelsea recovering. Chelsea then moved the ball from the 45 to the 6 where Proctor snapped a pass to Bertke in the end zone for a TD. The extra point was missed so the score was 20-0. The remainder of the quarter was a see-saw affair with neither team threatening and the quarter ended with the score standing 20-0.

The fourth quarter found Dundee on Chelsea's 40. May handed a pass to Heiden who bobbled the ball and Phil Bareis took it out of his arms. Heiden and toled the pigskin all the way to pay dirt. The try for extra point was not good so the score stood 26-0.

Dundee now moved the ball from their own 35 to the eight-yard line where Heiden went the last eight yards for a TD. The try for extra point was missed and the game ended with the final score reading 26-6.

Chelsea plays host a Flat Rock here Friday. Kick-off time is at 7:30 p.m.

Edmund C. Gentner Dies Following Prolonged Illness

Edmund C. Gentner, a life-long resident of this vicinity and a descendant of Elisha Congdon, one of the founders of Chelsea, died at his home, 316 Jackson street, early Monday following several years of illness.

Mr. Gentner was custodian of the Chelsea Public school from 1922 until he retired in 1945, and for six years prior to 1922, he had been employed at the Federal Screw Works.

For 35 years he was a member of the Chelsea volunteer fire department, retiring as captain in 1945. He was a member of the Congregational church and the Modern Woodmen of America.

Born in Lima township Nov. 10, 1871, he was a son of Christian and Mary Congdon Gentner. He was married March 30, 1899, to May Young, and for six years following their marriage they made their home on a farm in Lima township. They have lived in Chelsea since 1905.

Survivors are Mrs. Gentner, a son, Floyd, eight grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, and a brother, Fred Gentner. A daughter, Mrs. Marian Buku, died Jan. 21, 1952.

Funeral services were held at the Staffan Funeral Home at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon, with Rev. W. H. Skentelbury of Litchfield, officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove cemetery.

Mrs. Inez C. Walker, Dies Tuesday at Her Home in Ypsilanti

Mrs. Inez C. Walker, age 78, died Oct. 7 at her home on North River street, Ypsilanti, after several months of illness.

The Washtenaw County Road Commission has acquired property adjoining the present Chelsea yards on West Middle street as the first step in a long-range plan leading to construction of a modern garage and storage building.

Howard Minier, Road Commission manager, in making the announcement, said acquisition of the property, located to the west of the present yards, is in line with the Road Commission's plan of developing and maintaining the Chelsea yards to help provide increasingly better service for the roads in this end of the county.

The newly-acquired property includes the property of Mrs. Thomas Howe and the small building which formerly housed an automatic laundry, together with the lot on which it is located.

With 500 feet of frontage on West Middle street, the property extends north to the New York Central railroad right-of-way.

According to agreements of the sale, Mrs. Howe has been given a life lease on the property and will continue to live in her home there.

Membership in the Needlework Guild is acquired by contributing two new articles of clothing or household linens during the year, or by contributing financially.

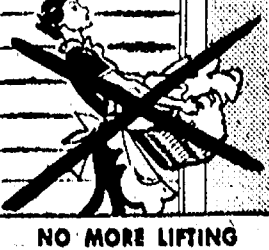
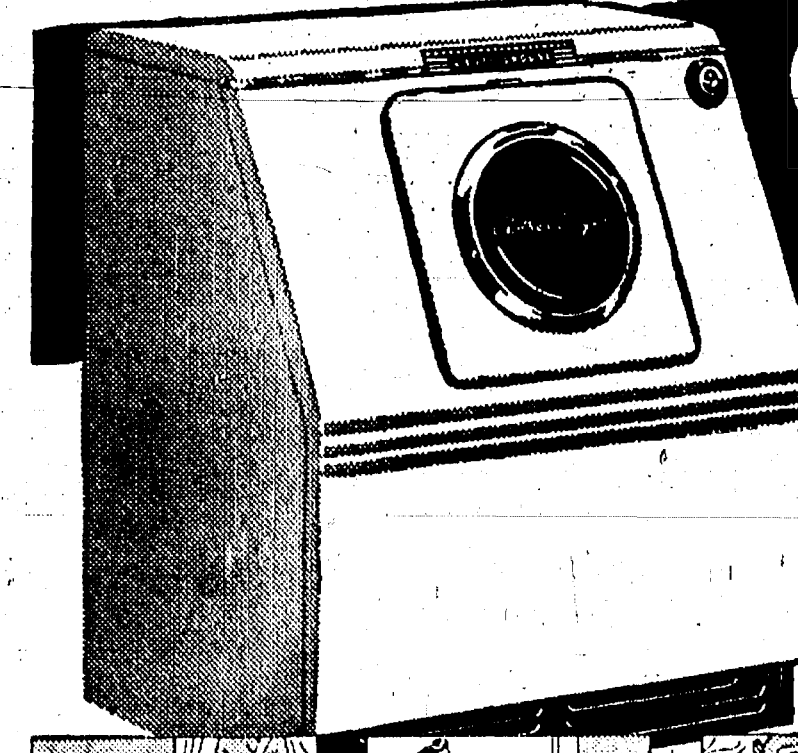
