# Corncob Filler Used for Light-Weight "Insulated" Concrete

Ground corncobs, used as a filler, may roduce/a lower cost, lighter weight, better insulated concrete for Michigan; farmers, Tests by the Agricultural Experiment Station of Michigan State College, using variouscombinations of corncob, cement, sand, gravel, lime and limestone, have produced concrete slabs and blocks of sufficient strengths to meet many farm construction needs. Ordinary nails may be driven into the concrete without difficulty. Corncobs are out into pellets ranging from 1/6" to 1" thick, which are then thoroughly soaked in water before mixing. Wall and floor slabs of corncob concrete were, exposed to weather for 20 months, through 2 winters, and showed no apparent defects. 


