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Chrysler Reveals Elaborate Plan for Proving Grounds

Newsmen, taken on a conducted tour of the Chrysler Proving Grounds last week, Tuesday, learned details of the vast undertaking by which the Chrysler Corporation is developing the former "mystery project" area into the largest proving ground of its kind in the world.

Plans for the use of the 3,800-acre area had been kept secret while the 52 farms were being purchased and even after the company, through its representatives, had successfully petitioned to have the road in the area closed to public use.

Announcement of the plan for the proving ground was finally made in February, 1951.

Since then a steel frame has been erected around the entire area, a gunnet-type military tank garage has been erected at the west edge of the area and a 100x600-foot garage and office building has been completed on the Chelsea-Manchester road.

Of greatest interest to the newsmen last week was the huge earthmoving project which is in progress.

Approximately 1,600,000 cubic yards of earth have been moved in the process of dredging and leveling the ground for the 4.7 mile high speed oval track which will allow speeds up to 140 miles per hour without side thrust. Concrete for the track will be laid next spring and summer.

About 75 persons are now employed at the proving grounds, mostly technical personnel.

Eventually, according to statements credited to Chrysler officials, "there will be a lot of people here." However, it was pointed out that the increase in the number of employees would be so gradual that the expansion will cause no immediate major housing problem.

Offered Blood

The "Temporary Chelsea Blood Bank Program" blood donor clinic, held here Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, was highly successful as indicated in reports of the number of volunteer donors and pints of blood contributed.

Figures available as The Standard went to press indicated that 237 persons in the community volunteered to donate blood. Some of these were found to be ineligible to contribute because of slight colds or other disqualifying reasons, leaving a total of 191 persons who contributed blood during the three-day clinic.

The blood bank program has already received three Chelsea persons this week according to Mrs. Dudley Holmes, Chelsea blood program chairman for the Red Cross. She said the blood was released for the Chelsea people as soon as their identification as Chelsea people was verified.

Mrs. Holmes said personnel directors in all the industries of Chelsea deserved credit for the way they scheduled free time for workers to go to the clinic to contribute blood. She said the cooperation of doctors and volunteer workers, including nurses, nurses aides, clerical and canteen help all contributed to the efficiency and smoothness which was noticeable throughout the clinic. The clinic was set up in the basement of the Congregational church with the Red Cross bloodmobile personnel in charge.
