Rules Listed for Christmas Light Contest

Offer Cash Prizes for Best Outdoor Home Decorations

Many Chelsea residents have been in the habit of decorating their homes and lawns with attractive lighting effects during Christmas seasons of past years and remarks have often been heard that Christmas lighting contest would prove of great interest in the community. However, no one ever did anything about it until this year when the Chamber of Commerce decided to sponsor such a contest and is offering substantial financial prizes for winners of first, second and third place.

In announcing the Christmas lighting contest, David Strieter, Chamber of Commerce secretary, emphasized that the contest is for outdoor residential lighting only. There will be no prizes for commercial or industrial entries but displays by groups other than residents would help greatly to beautify the community for the Christmas season.

Prizes for first, second and third place winners are to be \$15, \$10 and \$5 respectively.

Rules of the contest are given as follows: Lighting displays must pertain to the Christmas theme with originality and simplicity stressed.

Outside decorations only are to be eligible for judging with the exception that inside lighting which may be seen from the street will be counted, also.

Decorations must be in operation from Dec. 18 through Jan. 1, and must be in working order on the night of the judging which now is set for Dec. 22 from 7 until 9 p.m.

Entry blanks must be sent, not later than Dec. 18, to David Strieter, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, 121 So. Main St. Entry blanks are printed elsewhere in this issue of The Standard.

Cagers Win Thriller from Manchester

Victory Won in Overtime Period for Varsity Team

Chelsea Bulldogs won a hard-fought victory over Manchester's Dutchmen in an extra period of Friday's game, moving from a 50-all deadlock to a 55-50 triumph.

In the fourth quarter, tension mounted as spectators sat on the edges of their seats, while the lead saw-sawed back and forth, or paused briefly at a tie score.

The first quarter found Chelsea taking the lead over the Dutchmen, 14-12 as Bob Barika, scoring seven and Alken with five, led their respective teams.

Manchester struck through the air with long shots in the second quarter to take the lead 30-27. Bob White and Tom Eisele each scored four points for the Bulldogs, while Bill Allen snagged eight for the Dutchmen.

Shortly after the half, Chelsea tied briefly with Manchester at 34-all, only to have the visitors regain a four-point lead. A fast, hard-fought fourth quarter saw the score and lead change frequently. In the last second the score was 50-48, Chelsea, as Jack Evisler was awarded two free throws, tying the game 50-all as the buzzer rang. The extra three minutes, in the first overtime period in four years of Chelsea play, cinched the game for Chelsea, as the Bulldogs snaggled five points to put the game out of Manchester's reach.

Bob White led the Bulldogs with 18 points, while runners-up Neil Biehler and Bob Berke each snagged 14. Bill Alken led Manchester with 17 points while Jack Evisler and Jerry Fennel each made 13.

The Chelsea Bulldogs suffered their second defeat at the hands of the Little Dutchmen, 33-39. Jimmy Greenwood led the "Pups" with 18 points, while Lloyd Schneider and Harold Stott added five and four points, respectively. Fouls racked up 16 points, while Mitchell made 12 for the visiting B team.

Chelsea's girls' team opened their season against Manchester during the same afternoon with a ten to eight victory. Chelsea monopolized the game during the first half, with Dixie Rowe scoring five of the six points. Manchester was scoreless.

The second half saw a Manchester come-back with Evelyn Dresch making Manchester's first basket, while Dixie Rowe and Judy Gilbert made a basket each for Chelsea.

During the fourth quarter, Chelsea was held scoreless as Manchester racked up six points to make the score 10-0.

Dixie Rowe scored seven points and Judy Gilbert placed three for Chelsea. Evelyn Dresch and Jo Miller each made four points for Manchester.

Tomorrow night the Chelsea boys' teams open their Huron League season at Lincoln. Reserve game will start promptly at 6:45.

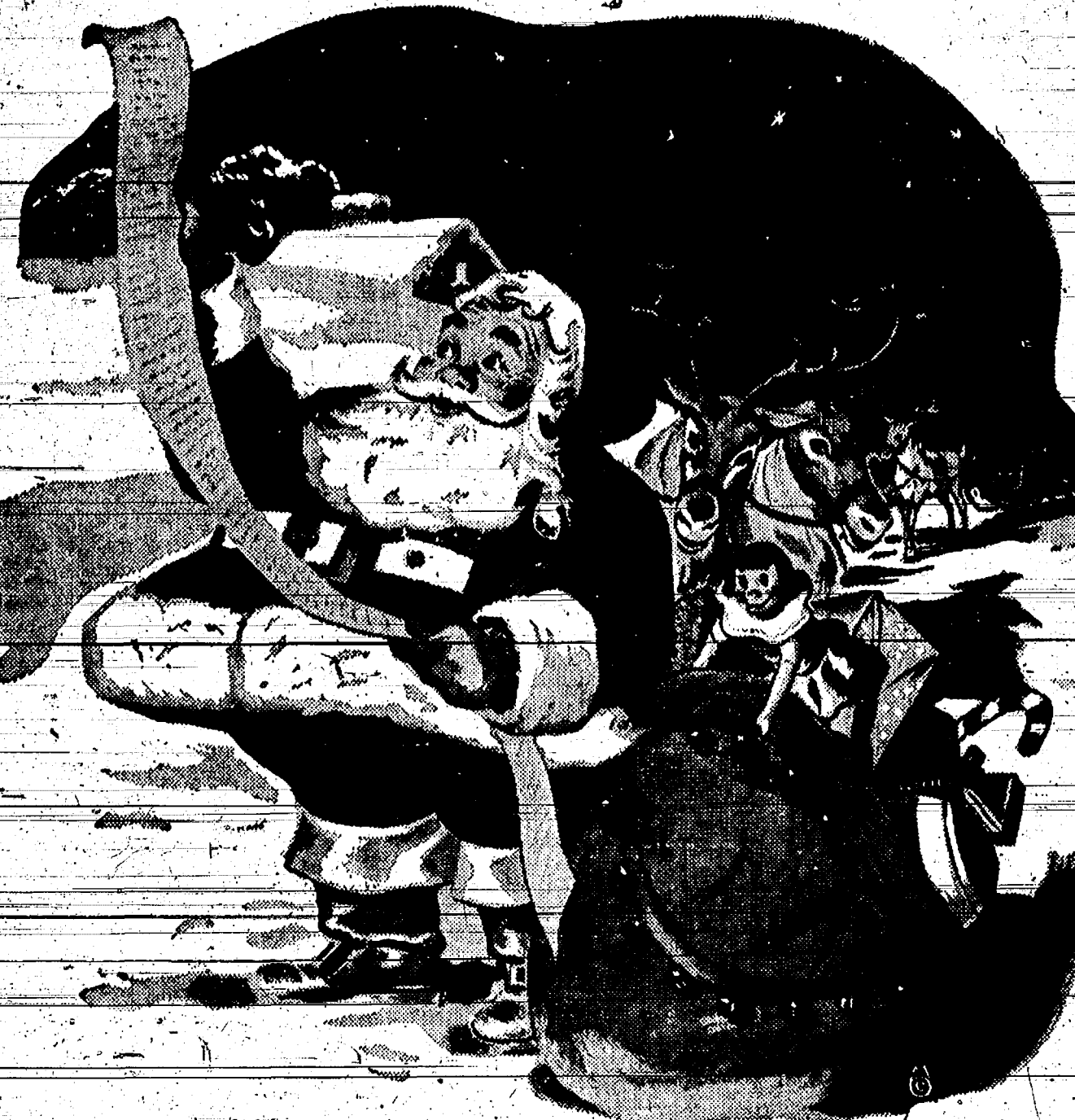

Recount of County Votes Is Underway

Recount of the gubernatorial votes in Washtenaw county was scheduled to begin in the supervisor's room at the Courthouse in Ann Arbor at 9:30 a.m., yesterday. The recount was to check the ballots of the 32 precincts in the county which vote by means of paper ballots. The 23 precincts where voting machines are used were not included in the recount.

The final result of the Nov. 4 election, according to official figures of the Board of County Canvassers, gave Gov. Williams 21,528 and Republican Candidate Fred M. Alger, Jr., 33,744 votes.

Washtenaw county is one of 52 counties in the state in which Alger had asked for a recount.

The remaining 30 counties, in which Williams is asking a recount, will not begin immediately because of the possibility that Alger will withdraw his recount request when the check of the 52 counties is completed. Ottawa county, the eighty-third county in the state, has been exempted from the recount because voting machines are used in all precincts.

Three Ann Arbor attorneys and two from Ypsilanti were appointed to supervise the ballot recount as special assistants of the attorney-general. Chairman of the group was Hugh E. Wilson, of Ann Arbor. The remaining four are Arthur C. Lehman and Richard P. Whitaker of Ann Arbor, and Eugene B. Calder, Jr., and Edward S. Tripp, of Ypsilanti.

Township and city clerks were being notified when the count of the votes in their respective precincts were scheduled so they could be present at the opening of the ballot boxes.

Members of the Board of County Canvassers include Francis W. Schilling, of Ann Arbor, Adolph P. Grass of Dexter, and Ross K. Bower of Ypsilanti.

Grade School Nearly Ready for Inspection

Necessary forms for processing final approval of the \$20,000 loan to the Chelsea Agricultural Schools district by Kenower-MacArthur & Co., of Detroit, successful bidders, were signed at the meeting of the Board of Education Tuesday evening. It is expected the firm's approval will follow and the loan will be received here by the end of the week.

In other action the Board approved installation of a gas tank and a pump at the southeast corner of the elementary school property on Maywood avenue for the convenience of school buses and to eliminate extensive bookkeeping records for tax refunds.

The date for final inspection of the new school has been set to take place immediately after Christmas. Final approval will not be forthcoming, however, until the school has been in use for from one to three months and a sum equal to 10 per cent of the cost will be retained by the Board until then.

The new school is nearing completion, with carpentry almost entirely done and tile floors expected to be completed this week. School officials are making plans to move in during the Christmas vacation.

All evening activities and meetings of clubs and organizations will continue to be held in the present school building, the Board announced. Reason for the decision is that there is no equipment in the new building as yet, to accommodate these activities and meetings.

Blood Bank Now Serving Community

Industry, Labor Cooperation Helps Successful Start

In compiling her complete report of the Temporary Chelsea Blood Bank blood donor clinic held here last week, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday Mrs. Dudley Holmes, Red Cross blood program chairman, noted that 96 pints of blood were obtained for use in the Chelsea area through the "5-2-2-1" Red Cross blood plan. This plan provides that out of every 10 pints contributed under the blood bank plan, five remain for use in the community, two are for servicemen, two for plasma and the tenth is for insurance in case of short pints or breakage. A total of 191 pints was contributed during the three-day clinic.

As stated last week the blood program had benefited three Chelsea people even before the conclusion of the blood donor clinic. Since then a young Chelsea mother was also provided with needed blood after efforts to purchase blood for her were unsuccessful.

Many people of the community have also been supported with blood donations by the Red Cross, prior to the start of the Temporary Blood Bank program, Mrs. Holmes said. Those who were supplied with blood during the past two weeks are Eldon Weinberg, Mrs. Bessie Cook of Alton, who is a sister of Charles Cameron, Mrs. Phyllis Hopper-Passow, and Paul Belser.

When the 96 pints of blood for local use is exhausted it will become necessary to have another blood donor clinic and it is estimated this will probably be next spring. All who had a part in arranging the past week's clinic feel that the success of the program in amounts of blood obtained and in speedy help given Chelsea people in need of blood transfusions demonstrates that a permanent blood bank plan would be a good thing for the community.

Mrs. Holmes suggests that people plan now to be ready to donate blood at the next clinic.

Many younger women, who donated blood for the first time in last week's clinic, later expressed to Mrs. Holmes their amazement at the ease with which it was accomplished without any pain.

Numbers of donors from the industries are listed by Mrs. Holmes as follows: Chelsea Spring plant, 126; Chelsea Products, 33; Central Fibre Products, 28; Federal Screw Works, 23; Chelsea Milling Co., 12. In addition, 13 citizens of the community and seven from the faculty of Chelsea Agricultural Schools contributed. Mrs. Holmes credits the work of Mal Bruce, personnel director at Chelsea Spring company with being responsible for the large number of the plant's workers who signed up to contribute. She commended personnel directors of all factories for their work in scheduling free time for employees to go to the clinic.

Mrs. M. J. Baxter was in charge of the reception clinic which was held in the dining room and kitchen of the Congregational church.

Women who worked with Mrs. Baxter helping to serve fruit juice, coffee and light lunches to those who had donated blood were Mrs. D. A.
