## State Traffic Survey Set for Intersection

### Township Board Requests Stop Light for US-12 Crossing

Sylvan township Supervisor Elba Gage last Wednesday received the following self-explanatory letter.

Elba H. Gage,  
Supervisor of Sylvan Township.

This is in reply to your letter, dated Dec. 4, 1952, in which you request the installation of a stop light at the intersection of M-92 and US-12 in Sylvan township, Washtenaw county.

Traffic surveys and accident diagrams of the above intersection have been ordered so that a complete study of this intersection may be made.

As soon as the results of these surveys are available, you will be contacted and proper traffic control measures discussed.

The letter was in response to Supervisor Gage's request for a survey as a preliminary to asking for the installation of a traffic light at this crossing where frequent accidents have occurred.

Gage made the request after a resolution to do so was passed at the monthly meeting of the township board on Dec. 4.

Accidents have occurred at the intersection with increasing frequency.

The flasher signal installed there several years ago, seems to have little or no value, in cutting down the speed of through traffic on US-12.

Several fatalities have resulted following accidents at the intersection. Most recent of these was the Nov. 29 collision in which Louis Kuhl was injured. Mr. Kuhl died Dec. 8 at St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor, where he was taken following the accident. He had been attempting to cross the highway on his way in to Chelsea when his car was struck broadside by an eastbound car.

Have for some time sought action leading toward satisfactory traffic control at the intersection.

Cited as an additional hazard is the hill on US-12, a short distance west of M-92. Eastbound drivers, it is claimed, do not notice the flasher light at the intersection until they are well over the hill. North and south traffic on M-92 finds it difficult to get across the highway because of the almost constant appearing over the crest of the hill.

Expected increase of traffic as the Chrysler Proving Ground develops is given as another reason for the necessity for installation of more effective controls at the intersection.

Recorded Christmas music added to the holiday spirit which prevailed.

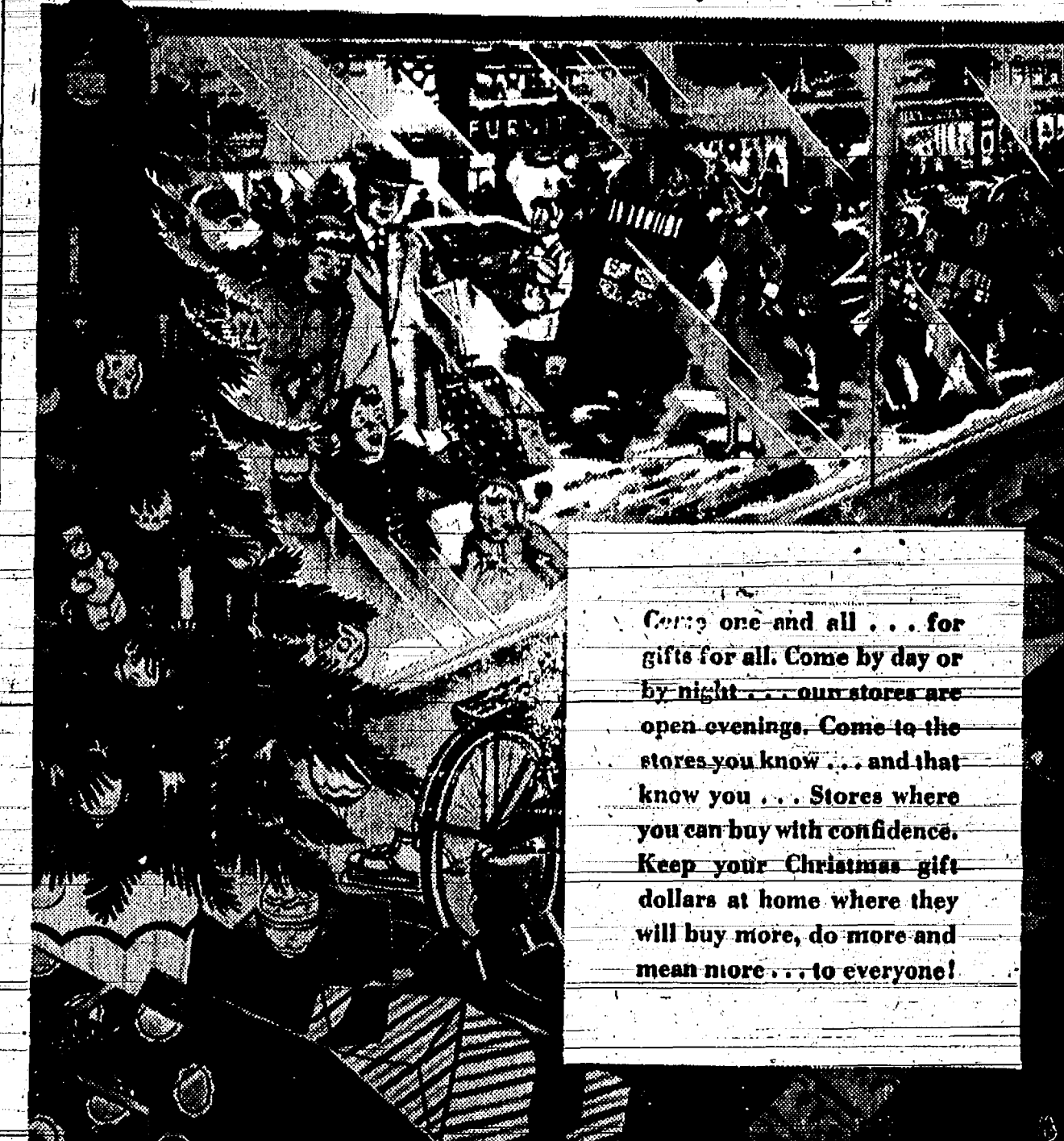
The patients were presented with gifts and all the workers on the staff were also remembered.

## Cage Quintet Wins in First League Game

Chelsea cageurs triumphed again in their Huron League opener by defeating Lincoln 46-44, last Friday evening on the Lincoln home court.

The Bulldogs wholly monopolized the scoring except for the first few minutes of play. The first period was topped by Chelsea, with Neil Buehler scoring six points. Lincoln not pushing her free shots.

Chelsea scored three field goals with Richard Draper bringing in two. Final quarter score was 12-6 in Chelsea's favor.

In the second quarter Chelsea still led over Lincoln in the total number of points. Chelsea was led by Bobby White whose long shots pulled in six points. Lincoln's Richard Sampler made four.

It was during the first half that an extra two points was scored for Chelsea by a Lincoln player who tipped a pass ball of Joe Greenwood into the Chelsea basket.

In the second half Lincoln started on a rampage against Chelsea with Jerry Kruger netting a total of 11 points in the third period, while Bobby White racked up four for the Bulldogs. The third quarter ended in a 35-30 score with Chelsea keeping the lead.

The last quarter of the game continued with Lincoln trying to regain its lost ground and Jerry Kruger still leading the scoring with seven points. The Bulldogs kept their fast pace ahead of Lincoln, with Joe Greenwood adding six points for Chelsea and the game ended with Chelsea, 46, Lincoln, 44.

In the statistical data Chelsea made 50 percent of their free throws, 14 out of 28. Lincoln came in with about 29 percent of their total free throws, making good on 10 out of 28. Bob Bertke was top scorer for Chelsea, with 19 points, and Neil Buehler followed closely with 11. Jerry Kruger topped Lincoln's scoring with 20 points.

The Chelsea Bulldogs, though not so fortunate, lost at the hands of Lincoln Reserves with a score of 31-21. Leading scorers were Ralph Owings with ten points and Ron Sparrow with 11, for their respective teams.

## Contest Entry Deadline Set for Saturday

David Strieter, Chamber of Commerce secretary, urges people of the community who plan to enter the Christmas outdoor lighting contest to send in their registrations immediately. There is still time to enter as he will accept registrations until Saturday night, he said yesterday.

Purpose of the contest, sponsored by the Chelsea Chamber of Commerce, is to make this Chelsea's "brightest Christmas." Prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 will be awarded the winners of first, second and third places, respectively.

Leslie D. Lyon, lighting engineer with Consumers Power company, will select the winning entries on their merits for effectiveness, appropriateness for the Christmas season and simplicity. Expense of the displays will carry no weight in the selection of prize-winning entries, originality and simplicity being the principal qualifications to be looked for in the judging.

Would-be entrants are reminded that rules of the contest are as follows.

Lighting displays must pertain to the Christmas theme with originality and simplicity stressed.

Outside decorations only are to be eligible for judging, with the exception that inside lighting which may be seen from the street, will be counted, also. All decorations from the street, decorations which are inside areways or porches, and are not visible from the street, will not count, even though they are technically "outside" decorations.

Decorations must be in operation from Dec. 13 (today) through Jan. 1, and must be in working condition the night of the judging which is to take place Monday, Dec. 22, from 7 to 9 p.m.

Winners are to be announced in next week's issue of The Standard. David Strieter said yesterday that although the deadline for sending in entry blanks was set for today (Dec. 18), he would accept entries until Saturday evening. This will allow time for routes to be mapped out for the judging tour Monday night.

The person who called did not give his name or the exact location of the fire. If he had, a quick check could have been made with the Chrysler office and the costly run might have been avoided. According to the Forestry Department of Michigan State College, farmers can treat poles against decay, using a chemical you can buy in most hardware or drug stores. Several preservative products are available. One of the newest tested and found satisfactory is "Penta" (Pentachlorophenol); the researchers say, if possible, the poles to be treated should be air seasoned first for six months. 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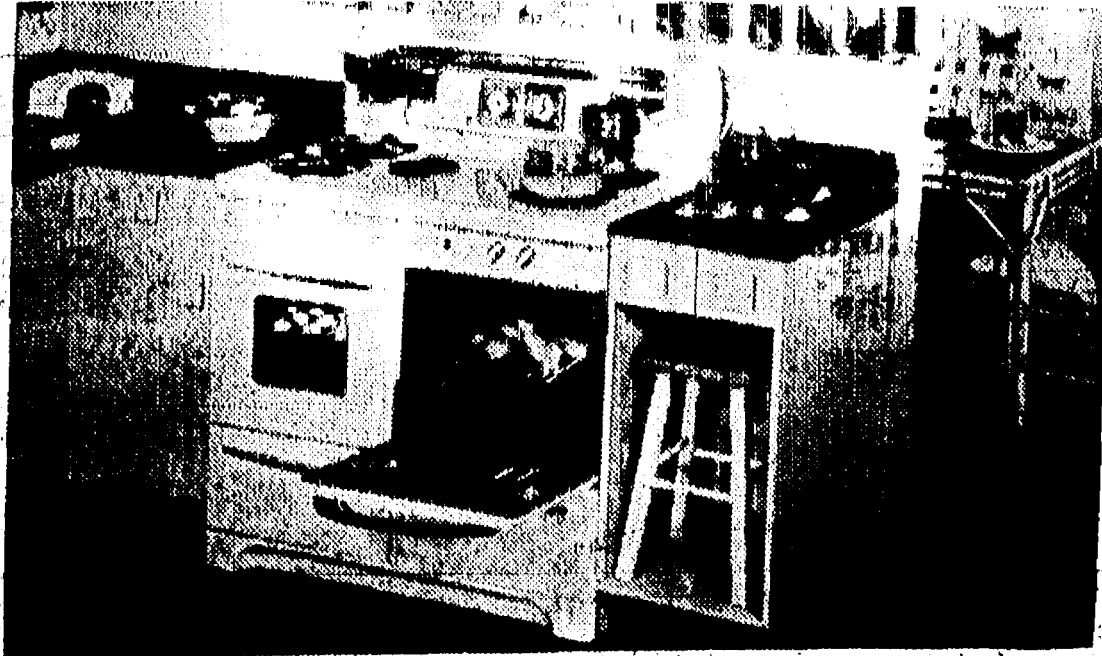

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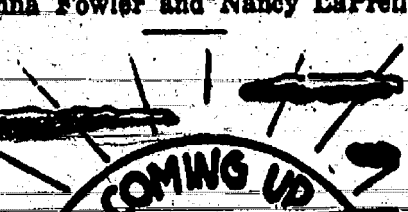
