

Annual 4-H Fair Starts Wednesday

Approximately 2,500 Entries Scheduled For Exhibition

Next Wednesday, Aug. 11, is the opening day of the annual Washtenaw county 4-H Fair at Ann Arbor and it has been announced by Frank Gendron, Washtenaw county 4-H club agent, that approximately 2,500 entries will be exhibited.

The fair brings to a close the summer 4-H club work and includes dairy, beef, sheep, swine, and horse projects; food preparation, food preservation (canning and freezing), photography, and vegetable and flower gardening.

Exhibits are to be entered from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Wednesday and judging will begin at 4 p.m. on flower, vegetable, garden, crops and conservation exhibits.

At 8 p.m. the finals in the dairy and livestock judging contest will take place. Selected during the contest will be the top five who will be the county's judging team for state competition.

Events scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 12, are judging of beef, fine wool sheep and poultry at 9 a.m.; judging of other breeds of sheep at 1 p.m.; horse show at 3 p.m. and rabbit judging at 3:30 p.m.

At 8:30 p.m. Thursday there will be the annual talent show.

Friday will feature dairy judging of Holstein, Jersey, Ayrshire, Guernsey, Brown Swiss and other breeds at 9 a.m. Swing classes will also be judged at 9 a.m.

The big showmanship contest on dairy and beef cattle, sheep and swine will take place at 8:30 p.m. Friday as the final event of the three-day fair.

Livestock exhibits are scheduled to be released at 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

The annual fair will be held in the customary location on the fair grounds in Ann Arbor.

Mrs. Inez Rank Gets Degree After Teaching 28 Years

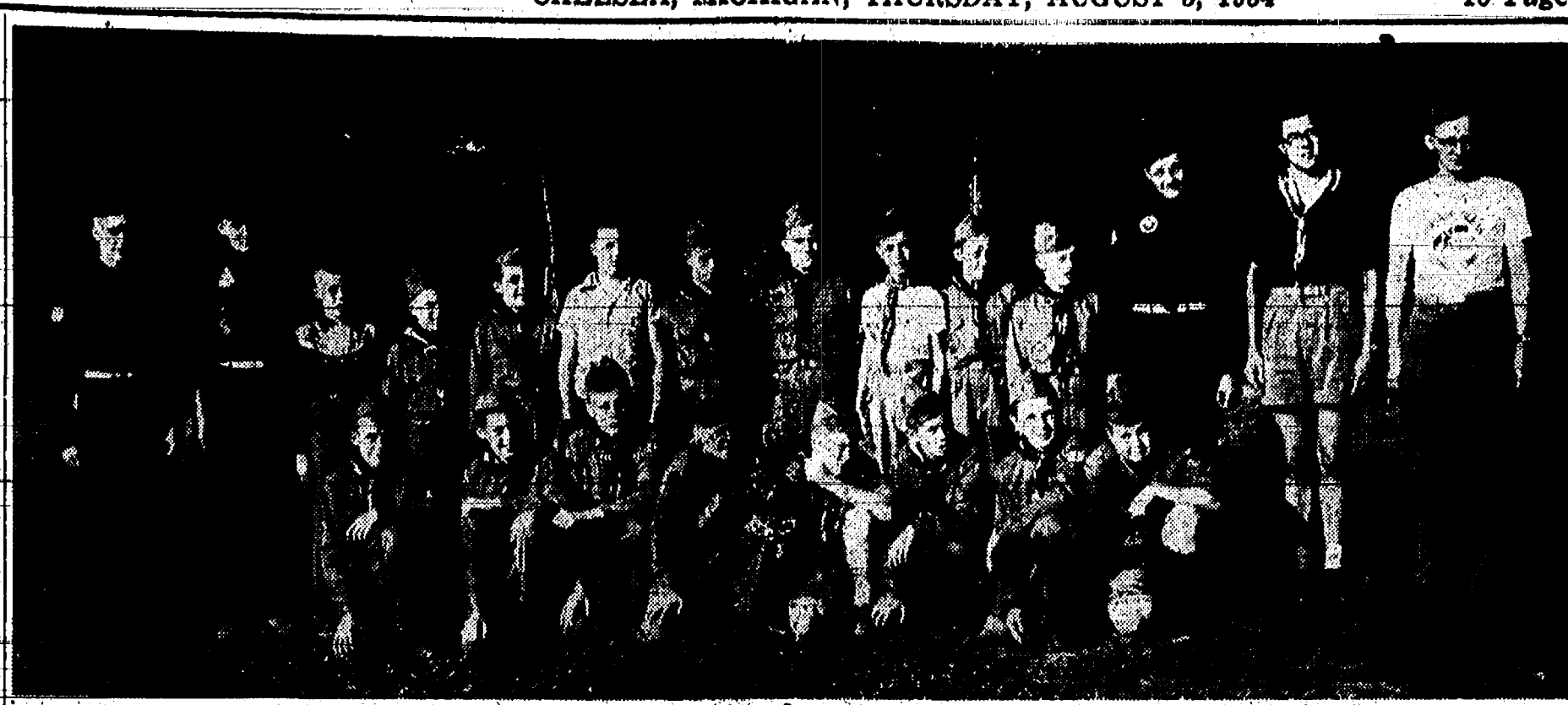

County Agents Attend Milk Producers' Extension Meet

Donald B. Johnson, Washtenaw county agricultural agent, and Wilbur Dexter, assistant county agent, attended the annual Extension Service meeting of the Michigan Milk Producers' Association, held Monday in the Fisher YMCA in Detroit. All county agents of the state had been invited to the meeting.

Dr. Dale Butz, extension specialist at Michigan State College, was panel moderator. One of the principal points brought out at the meeting is that the Michigan Milk Producers' Association is a farmer-owned and farmer-governed cooperative. As an association it is looked upon as a marketing agent for the producer although its status as a co-operative brings it under the jurisdiction of anti-trust laws which prohibit it from bargaining for consumer prices.

Arthur Hagen of Saline, had recorded the Sunday morning service and, for the retiring pastor's pleasure, played the recorded sermon Sunday evening.

The congregation at Zion Lutheran church had previously honored Rev. Brueckner with celebrations of the 25th and 50th anniversary of his ordination and on the latter occasion in Aug. 1949, presented him with a new car.

Born at Pine Hill, April 4, 1877, Rev. Brueckner was a son of a minister, the late Rev. Herman Brueckner. He said his father had always hoped he would take up the ministry but for a time after graduating from Wartburg College at Waverly, Ia., he was successful employed as a buyer for a large Chicago department store. He said it was in 1897 that he decided to return to his theological studies at Wartburg Seminary, Dubuque, Ia., and August, 1899, in St. James Lutheran church, Toledo, Ohio, he was ordained.

Rev. Brueckner served as pastor of the Toledo church until 1911 when he went to Alpena as pastor of St. Paul's church, coming from there to the Rogers Corners church in 1926.

From 1919 until 1922 he had also served as president of the Michigan District of the American Lutheran church and for almost 35 years he was on the board of directors of the Synods and Old Folks Home at Toledo.

Rev. Brueckner Honored on Retirement from Ministry

Farewell Delivered on 55th Anniversary of Ordination

Rev. M. W. Brueckner, who some time ago announced his resignation as pastor of Zion Lutheran church and his August 1 retirement from the ministry, preached his final sermon as pastor there Sunday morning, the 55th anniversary of his ordination.

In the evening the congregation honored him at a gathering in the parish hall, which included a program beginning at 8 o'clock and a reception later in the dining room. At the reception he was presented with cash gifts from the congregation, the church Brotherhood, Ladies' Aid Society and Luther League.

The program opened with an especially appropriate hymn by the assembly, "Forward in Spirit, Serving the Lord."

Rev. Brueckner spoke briefly on his behalf, one of his sons, Rev. Theodore Brueckner, of Saginaw, spoke also.

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Klager Wins GOP Bid for Sheriff Post In Heated Contest

'Pat' Cleary Loses Gubernatorial Bid To Donald Leonard

Donald S. Leonard will oppose Gov. G. Mennen Williams, seeking his fourth two-year term in the coming general election, Leonard's nomination as the Republican candidate having been conceded by other candidates as early as 2 a.m. Wednesday.

Leonard's running mate will be Clarence A. Reid, who was unopposed for the nomination as lieutenant-governor on the Republican ticket.

Philip A. Hart, Governor Williams' choice, won over George S. Fitzgerald for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant-governor. The Republican nomination for sheriff in Washtenaw county went to Erwin L. Klager who led the six candidates seeking the nomination by approximately 841 votes.

The Democratic candidate for sheriff is Lawrence Oltersdorf who defeated Robert Kidd.

In the only other real contest in Washtenaw county, Patricia Newkirk Hardy received the Republican nomination for register of deeds which was sought by four candidates.

The Democratic candidate, William L. Schaules, was unopposed.

The late Blair Moody, whose name had been printed on the ballots before he died, was given a large number of votes as memorial tribute. He had been seeking the Democratic nomination as U. S. senator. His death, left Patrick V. McManus unopposed for the nomination. McManus will be running against Senator Homer Ferguson in the coming election.

N. Moyer Injured In Crash with Runaway Truck

Nedra Moyer escaped serious injury Friday morning when a huge truck loaded with 33,000 pounds of roofing and tar, out of control because its brakes had failed, struck the rear of her car before jumping the curb, snapping off a big tree and pinning the driver in the cab of the truck.

Miss Moyer was treated at St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor, for bruises and sprains of the back. The rear of her car was badly damaged.

The accident occurred on Huron street in Ann Arbor, at 6:30 a.m. as Miss Moyer was on her way to work at the Michigan Bell Telephone company.

According to reports of the accident, the truck driver, Marion Truman, of Mendon, was frantic, trying to stop his truck after the brakes failed and the emergency brake burned out. He had almost succeeded, he told officers later, but the vehicle picked up speed on the down grade east of the Jackson-Dexter avenue intersection. In an effort to avoid hitting construction workers and other cars on the street, he headed his car over the curb onto the level of Marquette House, slid along in front of the next house east and then hit the tree and a house at 621 West Huron street. The cab of the truck had passed the tree but the truck trailer struck it, snapping it off and sending it crashing down on the truck and pinning the driver in his cab with his head under the dashboard.

His injuries were listed as a broken shoulder, multiple rib fractures, severe throat cuts and a crushed hand.

The truck is owned by Steel Motor Service of Detroit.

A high-lift power dirt loader was used to hold the tree off the cab of the truck while police officers at the scene pried the top of the cab up so Truman could be removed.

Delegates Named To Conventions

Delegates to the Washtenaw county Republican convention whose names appeared on the ballots in Sylvan township in Precinct I and the number of votes they received are: Walter Mohrlock, 126; Leigh Palmer, 129; William Schatz, 131; Precinct II: Robert Foster, 176; Nabel Holmes, 121; Paul Maroney, 128; and Walter Riemenschneider, 140. Each precinct was entitled to name four delegates. A few scattering votes were written in.

In Lima township, John Keusch received 72 votes and Louise Wilson Tinker 36 votes for delegates to the Democratic convention and scattering votes were cast for Republicans.

Freedom township's county convention delegate candidates, Will Reno and Edwin Schable, received 18 and 16 votes, respectively, for the Republican convention while Democrats wrote in scattering votes.

Delegates in Lyndon township included Orson Beeman and Richard Schuler, Democrats, each 8 votes, and Republicans Spencer Boyce, 6; Homer Stoffer, 2; and several scattering votes.

In Sharon township Alfred L. Barr (R) received 94 votes as a delegate with some scattering votes written in.

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Gen. Herbert Vogel Nominated to TVA Board by President

Brigadier General Herbert D. Vogel was nominated Monday by President Eisenhower to the board of directors of the Tennessee Valley Authority, according to reports from Washington, D. C. It was stated that the president will name him TVA chairman when his appointment is confirmed by the Senate, probably following hearings by the Senate Public Works Committee next Monday.

Congressmen from Tennessee have been quoted as saying that General Vogel is "unusually well qualified" for the position and that the Tennessee Valley people might consider themselves "very fortunate to have him head the Authority."

Others called him "able and forceful" and with good views on the Tennessee Valley Authority.

General Vogel for the past two years has been in charge of the Dallas, Texas, headquarters of the Army Engineers Southwest Division.

Washington newspaper had been stating the past ten days that General Vogel was being considered for the TVA post and that the Administration had been seeking a qualified man who shares the president's philosophy on the subject of public power.

The president has been known to say he favors cooperation between the government and private industry in development of the nation's power resources.

General Vogel's retirement from the Army is scheduled for Aug. 31 and, pending confirmation by the Senate, his duties with the TVA would begin after that date.

General Vogel, who had previously held important Army posts in the Panama Canal Zone and in various United States areas in connection with his work in hydraulic engineering, served in the Pacific theater during World War II.

He was born and attended school here before getting an engineering degree from the University of Michigan. He graduated from West Point in 1924. He subsequently earned additional degrees in other schools in this country and abroad.

He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Vogel.

'Shock' Booklet Being Given Out By State Police

Michigan State Police have undertaken a new shock treatment campaign against unsafe driving by distributing a booklet, "Death on the Highway," to violators of traffic laws.

The booklet, published by Dean H. Robinson, of Berkley, contains 18 pictures—newspaper photographs of fatal accidents. They depict in stark manner how motorists can and do die on the highways.

"The pictures in this booklet aren't pretty," the introduction

says. "They're gruesome, they're horrible—but they are true. No one likes to look at bones sticking through flesh from compound fractures or faces smashed beyond recognition from windshields—or heads and arms severed from the body, but that's what happened 105 times a day last year."

The State Police have been provided with 15,000 copies of the booklet, and a supply is being carried in each patrol car. Each person receiving a copy is asked to pass it along after having looked it over.

Although the officers are using tact in the distribution, they hope the powerful message in the booklet will leave its impact upon everyone who sees it. It's all part of the intensive effort to check the alarming accident toll.

Grass Lake Cook Book of 50 Years Ago

Lists Favorite 'Recipes for the Sick'

A copy of "The Grass Lake Cook Book," compiled approximately 50 years ago, was brought to the Standard office during the past week by Mrs. Susie Hulce.

Advertising of merchants of surrounding communities was included among the pages of contributed recipes. Noted on pages of Chelsea advertising was that of W. P. Schenk & Co., "Largest Department Store in Chelsea, With a Branch Store in Grass Lake." Listed were all-wool ingrain rugs at the following prices: 7'x9' feet, \$5.00; 9'x10½ feet, \$7.50; and 9'x12 feet, \$8.50.

Also advertised were men's suits at \$5, \$7.50, \$10 and \$12 and boys' long pants suits from \$4 to \$8.50 each while knee pant styles were priced at \$1.50 to \$4.

Glazier Stove Works carried an advertisement of the "New B and B-Wickless Oil Cook Stove, Ideal For Summer," at \$2.50, and the H. S. Holmes-Mercantile company mentioned the fact that their prices on dry goods, cloaks, suits, carpets, shoes, housefurnishings, clothing, furniture, hardware and crockery were lowest because their stocks were bought in large quantities to supply their stores here and in Lansing and Stockbridge.

Another ad invited people to "come to Chelsea for your dental work. Dr. Avery, over Raftery's Tailor Shop, pays all your expenses.

Turnbull & Witherell, Chelsea attorneys at law, also carried an ad in the old cook book.

Recipes "for the sick" included wine whey, the ingredients being one pint boiling milk and two glasses of wine, cooked one minute. Directions stated, "Then take

out the curd, and sweeten and flavor the whey."

Another recipe for the sick was baked milk which required a moderate oven for eight or ten hours of baking in "a jar covered with writing paper, tied down." At the end of the prolonged baking, the recipe stated, the milk "will be thick as cream and can be used by very weak persons."

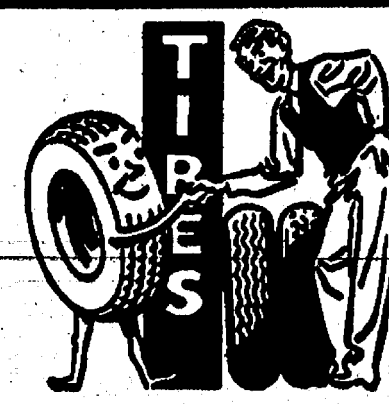

Michigan National Guardsmen Begin Annual Summer Field Training Sessions

Michigan National Guardsmen at their greatest strength in history, 10,845 strong—will take to the field and the air during August for their eighth post-war field training. The training, announced by Brigadier General George C. Moran, Adjutant General of Michigan.

Elements of the Michigan National Guard will be in training at five sites beginning Saturday, July 31, and running through Saturday, Sept. 4, the Adjutant General said. Largest of those elements, the 48th Infantry Division and several attached units, will train at Camp Grayling Aug. 7 to 21. Expected attendance at Camp Grayling is 8,700 officers and men.

Company A, 878th Engineer Aviation Battalion, stationed at the Detroit-Wayne Major Airport, will inaugurate the field training season for Michigan Guardsmen, General Moran said. The 40 officers and men of this unit will train July 31 to Aug. 14 at Camp Williams, Camp Douglas, Wisconsin.

After spending one week with the Division at Camp Grayling, Detroit's 146th Antiaircraft Artillery

Battalion (Automatic Weapons) (Self-Propelled) will fire at targets over Lake Michigan Aug. 14 to 21 from Camp Claybanks. A Regular Army installation, Camp Claybanks is located in Oceana county.

More than 1,100 officers and airmen of the Michigan National Guard will conduct their second field training since the Korean emergency at Alpena National Guard Base Aug. 21 to Sept. 4.

During the same period, the 300th Antiaircraft Artillery Battalion (Gun, 90-mm) of the Upper Peninsula and Marquette will train at Camp Haven, some seven miles north of Sheboygan, Wisconsin. Expected attendance is 430 officers and men.

For three Guard leaders, field training at Camp Grayling will mark their first field experience in new commands. Major General Gordon A. MacDonald, Detroit, will attend his first field training as commanding general, 48th Division, and camp commander.

Similarly, Brigadier General Cecil J. Kennedy of Flint will attend 1954 field training as the new assistant commander, 48th Division. At this year's training, Colonel Ralph H. Franklin, Huntington Woods, will have his first opportunity to command his 48th Division Artillery units in one area. All three officers received their new commands early this year.

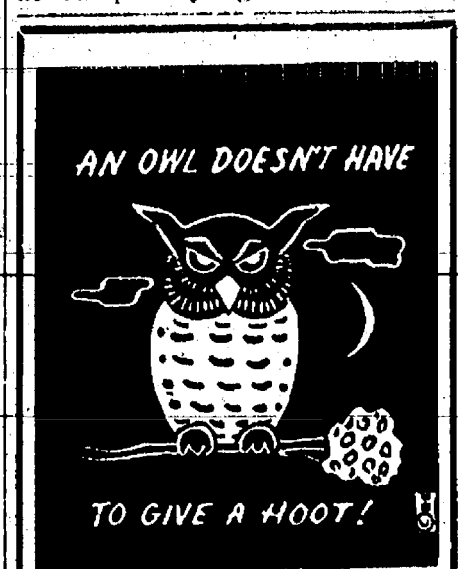
General Moran will observe his fourth field training as deputy commander at Camp Grayling. He has served as The Adjutant General of Michigan since 1948.

Field training this year not only will mark several firsts for new commanders, General Moran said, but Michigan Guardsmen also may establish a new field training attendance record. Last year the state's Army National Guardsmen created a 95.6 per cent attendance record. The Michigan Air National Guard, still in the reorganization state after Korean emergency service, had an 82 per cent record.

Michigan Guardsmen reached their greatest strength in history on June 30 when units reported a total of 10,845 officers and men. Average pre-World War II strength was 5,000 and previous postwar high was 10,826, achieved in 1949.

Highlighting 1954 field training at Camp Grayling will be the traditional events associated with the visit of Gov. Williams on August 14 and 15. The Governor will review the massed troops of the 48th Division Saturday afternoon, Aug. 14, and deliver the principal address at the memorial services Sunday morning, Aug. 15.

On the training side, a two-day command post and field exercise is scheduled for all units during the second week. Small unit training, range firing, and other similar types of training will occupy personnel throughout the two weeks at Camp Grayling.

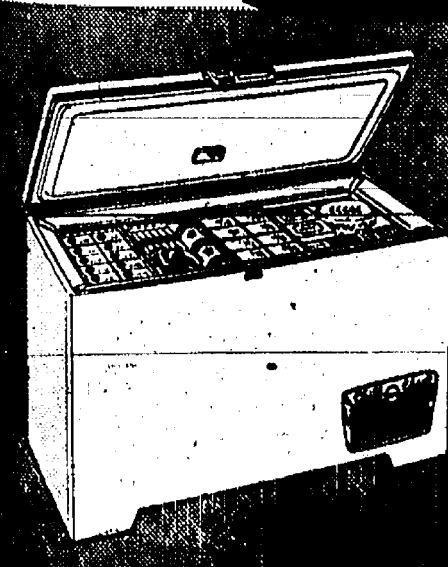

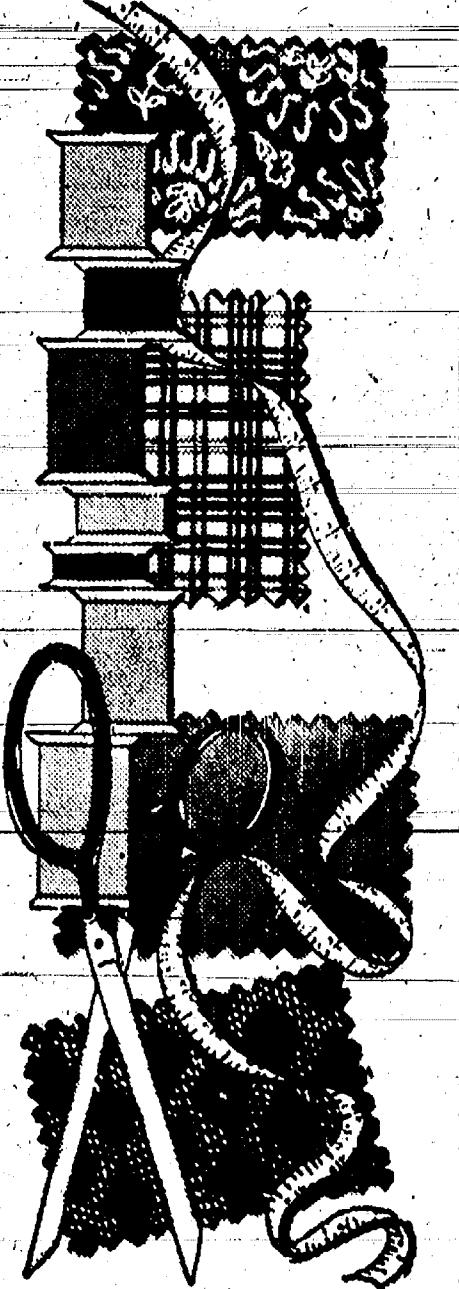

INSIDE THE CAPITOL

By Charles M. Ziegler
Highway Commissioner

The Federal Bureau of Public Roads has been generous in its praise for the expeditions manner in which Michigan has put its Federal-Aid highway money to work. Michigan has never, in all the years of Federal participation, lost a penny of Federal-Aid. States are permitted to let contracts after July 1 of each fiscal year against Federal funds allocated to them; but, many times reimbursements are held up because Congress has not appropriated the total amount of funds allocated. On several occasions the Michigan State Highway Department has had to wait, sometimes as long as a year, for Federal reimbursement of funds which were advanced to pay contractors.

Looking ahead to the increased allocations of Federal-Aid for highways which the Congress has stipulated beginning with the fiscal year starting July 1, 1955, the Michigan State Highway Department has placed under contract all Federal-Aid allocated to Michigan for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1954.

\$1 million of the Federal-Aid allocated to Michigan for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1954, has been placed under contract and \$12 million have been obligated by programs approved by the Federal Bureau of Public Roads. The balance amounting to \$3 million, has been programmed and is awaiting approval of the Bureau. These programs approved by the Bureau will be placed under contract as rapidly as State funds become available for matching dollar for dollar.

Programs to utilize the increased allocations of Federal-Aid for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1955, have already been stipulated under new Federal regulations which permit our programming one year ahead instead of six months as heretofore permitted.

Mobile Units Give Free Chest X-rays

Have you had a chest x-ray recently?

If it was at a mobile unit, you joined a stepped-up voluntary x-ray program that boasts a 44 per cent increase in the number of chest x-rays taken so far this year.

There were 128,091 small (70-mm) films taken by the mobile units of the Michigan Department of Health from January through May, 1954, compared with 88,799 films taken during the first five months of 1953.

Altogether, there were 2,444 "suspicious" or questionable cases found in 1953 in 212,937 small films taken and so far in 1954, there have been 335 suspected re-infected cases in 128,091 films. Suspected cases are turned over to local health departments for follow-up.

Since it is a voluntary program, the Health Department must depend on "good will" and the cooperation of those who believe an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Unchecked, TB can spread through a population with phenomenal speed. This makes finding tuberculosis cases so they can be treated a necessary key to further progress in TB control.

The Health Department now has 4 mobile x-ray units visiting Michigan counties with a goal of 300,000 x-rays set for 1954. Every county is visited at least once every three years and at present two mobile units are operating in Ottawa and Ionia counties and two units in the Alcona, Iosco, Oscoda and Ogemaw areas.

federal government to rid these waters of the eel-like parasite. Experts are sure that if they can "control" the lamprey to the extent that farmers control the corn borer, that the famous lake trout will be back in numbers almost as great as ever.

Electronic weirs have been set up across 28 outlets emptying into Lake Superior. These are designed to prevent the lamprey from swimming upstream where he can spawn. Because of the life cycle of the lamprey, it will be four years before it can be determined whether the project is successful in breaking the important link of the lamprey's life cycle. In the meantime, continuous research is being devoted to other ways to attack this costly menace to Michigan's fish world.
