In fact, Michigan has found that adding fertilizers can kill every fish in the lake!

Difficulty here is long winters Fertilizers produce greatly increased plant growth. When cold weathhottom. This loss causes many plants to die. The resulting decay completely absorbs the limited oxygen available. The fish are suffocated.
