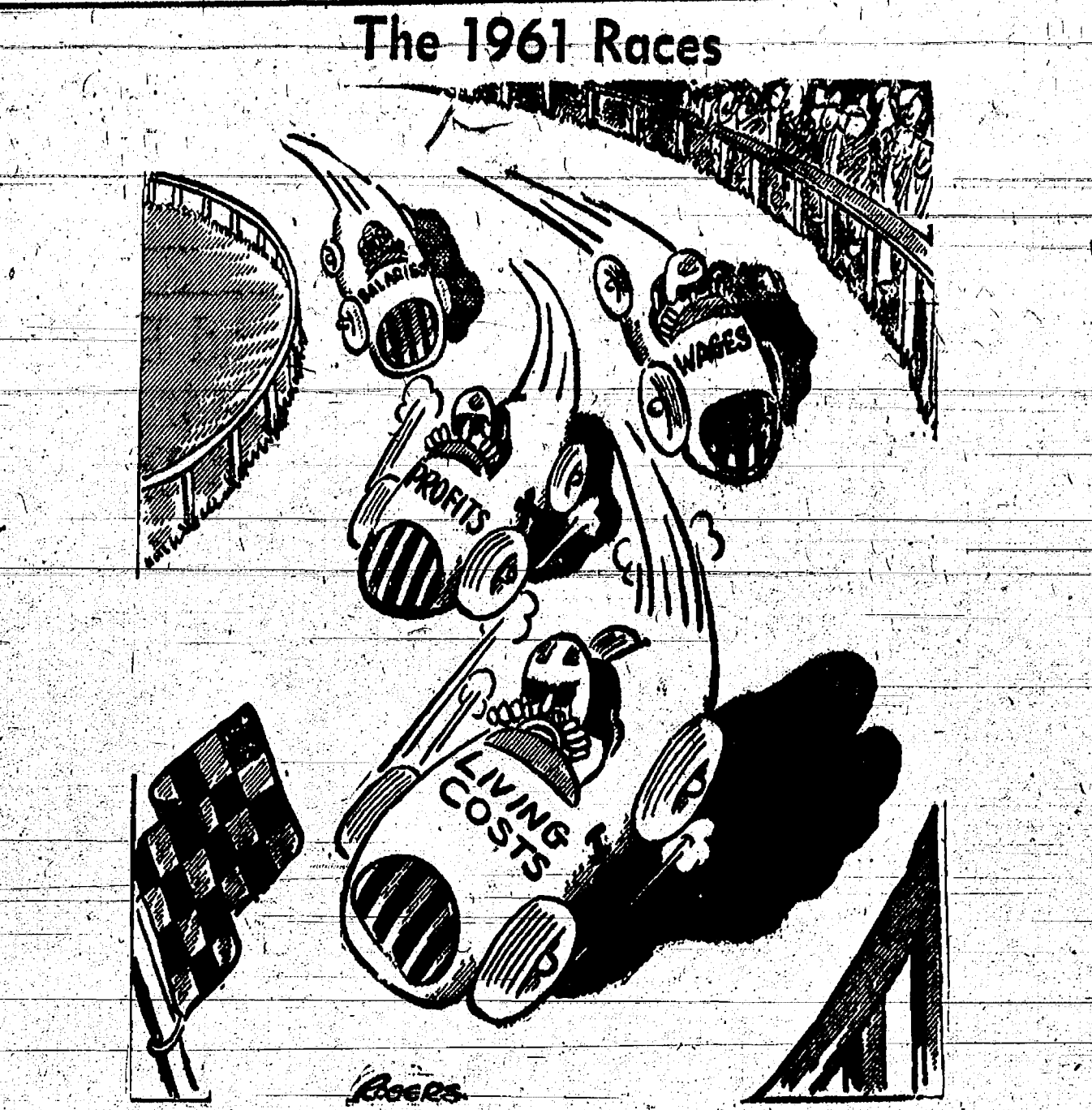

### MICHIGAN MIRROR

State of Michigan scientists keep a sort of long range eye on atom bomb testing throughout the world.

Their aim is to make sure surface waters in the Water Wonderland do not accumulate excessive amounts of radioactivity. Actually, the men of the Water Resources Commission who check the lakes and streams have no real connection with the testing of nuclear weapons.

But the number of atomic devices around the world are reflected in the Michigan reports.

Latest report from the commission showed only one-tenth the amount of radioactivity recorded in surface water during the latter part of 1959 was present during 1960.

Loring F. Oeming, chief engineer for the Water Resources Commission, said the lower levels of radioactivity seen in 1960 stemmed from the fact that there was no nuclear bomb testing since late 1958.

He said that during the five years that regular tests have been made, radioactivity levels have fluctuated in direct relation to the extent of atomic weapons testing by the United States and other countries of the world.

Even at their peak, radiation levels were well below recognized permissible concentrations, Oeming said.

The Water Resources Commission maintains 32 sampling stations with 13 of them located on the Great Lakes or connecting waters, he said. Fourteen municipal water supplies are also constantly checked.

Cities which have their water supplies watched are Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids, Charlevoix, Petoskey, Escanaba, Marquette, Alpena, Saginaw, Port Huron, Mount Clemens, Detroit, Monroe, Flat Rock and Dundee.

All testing stations are at public water supply intakes, industrial water intakes or other strategic locations.

"Plants and animals taken from the water at the Charlevoix and Monroe testing stations are checked further to determine how much radioactivity is absorbed, Oeming said.

Data which comes out of the monitoring program is used by federal, state and local governments in a variety of ways, and by private concerns, he said.

Under a 1961 law, pari-mutuel tickets bought by forgetful wagers on horses which run in the money are paid to the State Board of Education. If the holder of the ticket doesn't show up within a year after Sept. 1 of the year in which the tickets was purchased.

Though the total of money collected in this manner is small in comparison with annual budgets for state agencies as a whole, it usually amounts to several thousand dollars.

All money escheated to the state eventually goes into the Primary School Interest Fund.

From there, it is evenly divided among the school districts on the basis of the number of school-age children (five to 19 years old) living in the district, whether they attend school or not.

State school aid payments to districts are reduced by the amount received by the district from the Primary Fund, however, so it is really the state's General Fund which profits most directly from the uncashed racing bets. Still, the net effect is to make more money available for use by schools.

Rabies-infected Skunks hit a new high in Michigan during 1960.

Forty-four out of 70 cases of rabies recorded by the State Health Department were among the pungent smelling, black-and-white little animals that roam Michigan's woodlands.

Fourteen dogs, six cats, five cattle and a bat also were found to be infected with the disease last year.

Even though the 70 cases reported last year were 18 more than were discovered during the previous year, the record was still less than 10 per cent of the all-time high incidence year-for-rabies, 1930.

Some 715 cases of the dread disease were recorded in 1940, with 598 of them in dogs.

Since that time, the Health Department said, a drive to have all domestic dogs vaccinated against the disease has paid off. Pets still need to be immunized, the department said, and Spring, when both domestic and wild animals start to move around more, is a good time to have it done.

### Paper Ballots Mislead Many Voters

Six State Senators—three from each party—squeezed into woolen undergarments and braved the Upper Peninsula last week to conduct an election recount. It developed the temperature at home reached -11 degrees while they wore a temperature -4 in Escanaba.

The outcome was that Senator William E. Miron, (D) of Escanaba, won re-election with a majority of 66 votes over Kent T. Lundgren, (R) a Menominee druggist, instead of the 125 votes reported in the original returns.

So the Senate will remain divided by 22 Republicans and 12 Democrats.

The recount was not important to anyone except the two candidates, and the outcome will not deter Lundgren from trying again in 1962. In 1958, he was beaten by the Democratic incumbent by 1,048 votes.

But the discoveries of the Senate recount committee, headed by Senator Clyde H. Geerlings, (R) of Holland, should interest every Republican politician, particularly the new party chairman to be chosen Saturday in Detroit.

For the Senators, by quick manipulation of a pencil, found the 62,041 "lost" voters who disappeared in the November election returns after they had voted for President.

In every precinct checked by the recounters, from four to 10 per cent of the voters had marked their ballots for Kennedy or Nixon, and had gone about their business without further ado. The percentage was so large, all six Senators agreed that most of these citizens thought they were voting a straight party ticket.

There can be no other answer.

At the top of the paper ballot was the vignette of the party. Under it was a circle for voting a straight ticket—a circle that could be admired as an adornment by anyone who had not read voting instructions, Kennedy-Johnson were on one column under the circles and Nixon-Lodge were on the other.

"When they voted for Kennedy or for Nixon, these citizens were confident they were voting for all of the candidates of their party," Senator Geerlings concluded.

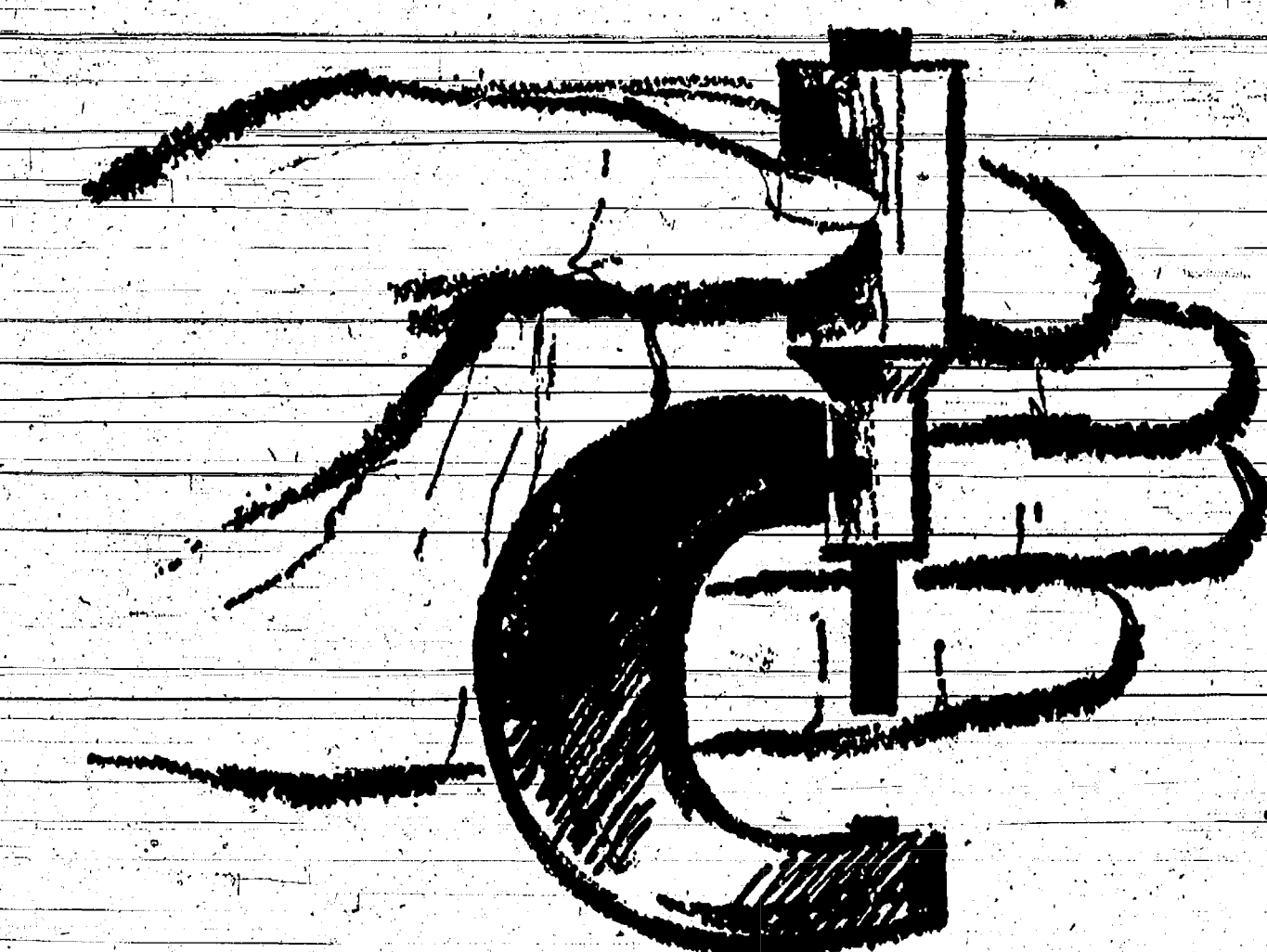

## Your Social Security

### Check Your Account...

The amount of benefits payable to a worker and his dependents, or to his survivors in the event of his death, depends upon the amount of wages posted to his social security account. Robert Kehoe, administrator of the district office in Ann Arbor, pointed out today that the Social Security Administration is responsible for keeping an accurate and up-to-date record of each worker's earnings; however, the responsibility of employers and employees in maintaining accurate records is also needed in maintaining these records. A person working for someone else should be sure that his employer gets his correct name and social security account number on his pay stubs. If a person is self-employed, he should be sure that his name and social security account number are on his quarterly reports of earnings sent to the Internal Revenue Service.

A person who is self-employed should pay his social security self-employment tax and report his net earnings at the end of each year. These reports are based on records of income and expenses or sales slips and invoices, or some other way depending on the nature of the business. Copies of self-employment reports and the business records upon which they were based should be kept for future reference.

Kehoe stated the Social Security Administration encourages working people to check their social security accounts at least once every three years to ascertain if they are getting proper credit. A convenient card form for requesting a statement of the earnings reported to your social security account is available at the nearest social security office, Kehoe said. The Social Security Office in Ann Arbor is located at 114 South 4th Ave.

### Washtenaw County Vehicle Registrations Show Sharp Increase

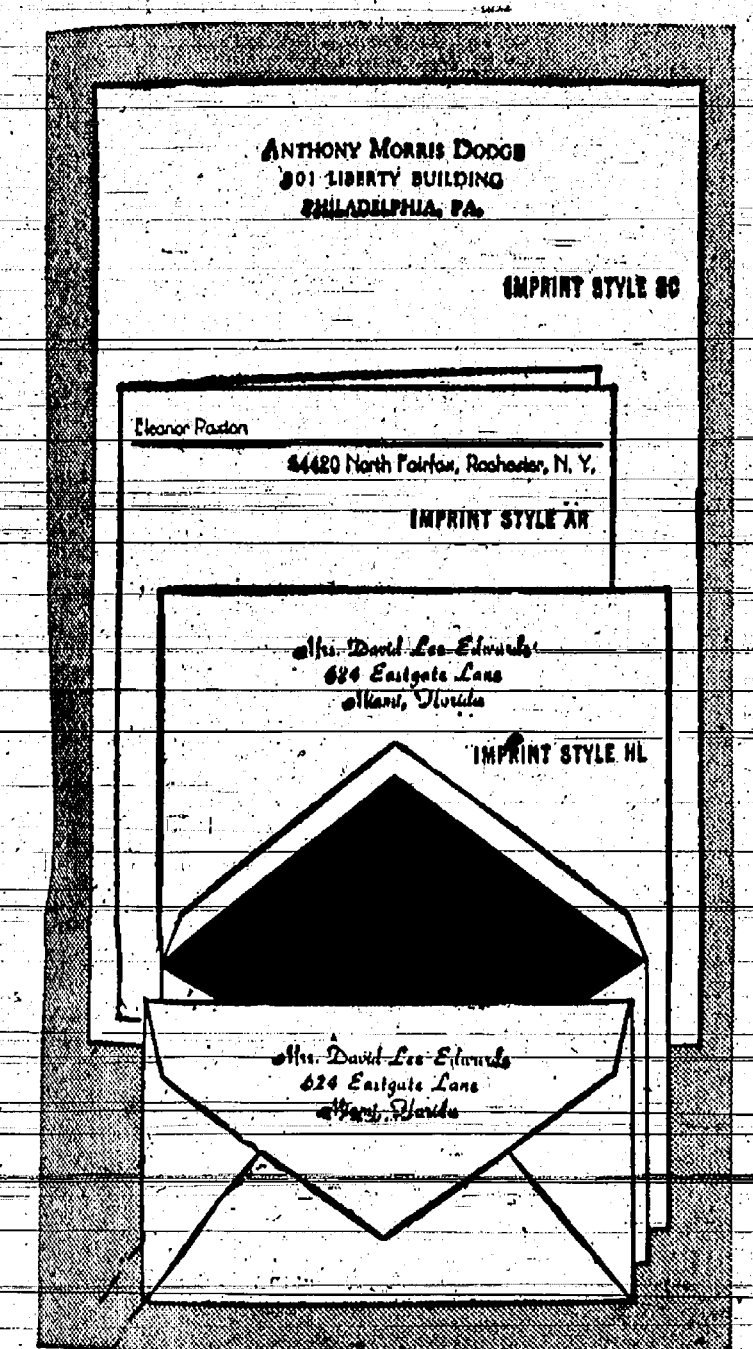
During 1960 Washtenaw county vehicle owners paid \$1,250,670.81 to register 78,103 units of motorized equipment. It was reported this week by Secretary of State James M. Hare.

"This total is \$97,700.57 more than the 1959 figure," Hare said. "A year ago Washtenaw county residents paid \$1,152,970.24 in taxes on 78,831 vehicles."

In releasing the Washtenaw county figure Hare pointed out that weight tax collections in Michigan had increased \$685,644.36.

State Park Permit Requirement Raises Many New Questions

Lansing—"If I buy an annual state park windshield permit, do I still have to pay 50 cents every time I come to the park? If I change cars during the year, can I remove the permit and put it on my new car?"

These are two of the many permit requirement has raised during its first month.

The answer to the questions above is "no." Parks users need either a \$2 annual or a 50-cent daily permit, not both. However, if a family owns two cars and has a permit on one, it must buy an annual or daily permit to enter parks with the other. Permits are not transferable from one car to another.

Here are other questions which parks managers are being asked: "You mean I even have to have a permit in the wintertime?" Yes, the permit requirement went into effect Jan. 1 at 55 of 62 state parks. Parks men are issuing violation notices to visitors who don't have permits on their cars. Persons receiving these notices either have a five-day "grace" period to buy annual permits or must purchase a daily permit before leaving parks.

Actually, it will pay those who plan to swim, picnic, and camp at parks this summer to buy their annual permit now so they can get the most for their money.

"Will the money from the permit go back into parks?" Yes. Pending legislative action, the Conservation Department will launch \$5,000,000 parks improvement and lands acquisition program in 1961. The program, to be financed by permit sales, calls for \$1,000,000 in "new" lands "purchases" and \$4,000,000 in improvements to campgrounds, picnic areas, parks utilities, toilets, bathhouses, and other facilities.

"Where do I put the permit on my motor scooter?" Any suitable place where it will be visible. For other vehicles, it goes on the lower right-hand corner of windshields.

Parts of Waterloo Area Require Permit On Auto Windshield

Under the provision of Act No. 140, Public Acts of 1960, which became effective Aug. 17, 1960, it will be unlawful to enter by vehicle without a permit, state parks or portions of state parks so designated by the State Conservation Commission after Jan. 1, 1961.

The act provides for the permit to be displayed in the lower right hand corner of the windshield. The cost for the annual permit has been set at \$2.00 and the daily permit at 50 cents when purchased at the park from park personnel, or an annual permit may be purchased for \$2.15 from some 900 authorized licensed dealers located throughout the state.

Those portions of the Waterloo Area requiring a permit for entry by vehicle will be state park lands at the Mill Lake Outdoor Center, Cedar Lake Outdoor Center, Sugar Loaf Lake, Portage Lake and Green Lake. For further information, call Chelsea Greenwood 5-8307.

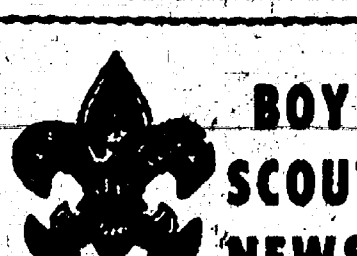

## Infectious Hepatitis Cases Running High Throughout Area

### No Epidemic, but Safety Measures Should Be Taken

Infectious hepatitis is being reported in greater numbers now than at any time since the explosive outbreak in Washtenaw county in 1955, says Dr. Otto K. Engelke, Washtenaw county health officer.

A total of 19 cases have been reported for January as compared to only 39 for all of 1960.

In the Chelsea-Dexter area two additional cases were diagnosed this week bring the total to six.

"It seems that the increase is general all over Michigan," Dr. Engelke stated.

Of the 19 cases reported nine have been school age children. Health Department records show Public health sanitarians and nurses are investigating each case and attempting to determine its source.

They also visit schools to ascertain what practices could be instituted there to prevent spread of the illness.

Several cases have been reported from nearly every village of the county Dr. Engelke said, the latest two villages from which reports were received being Dexter and Chelsea.

Because the disease is not concentrated in any one location, parents should not become unduly alarmed at the diagnosis of three or four cases in the schools, but should remember that this is to be expected and that the disease can be prevented in many instances, according to Dr. Engelke.

He explained that the virus disease is commonly associated with sewage, contaminated water and food, or with close intimate contact with such things as soiled clothing or other personal items.

Dr. Engelke advises that children in school should be cautioned not to exchange food with other children or borrow items such as pencils, etc.; also, to be extremely careful in washing hands when leaving the bathroom and before eating.

During 1952-53, a total of 120 cases of infectious hepatitis were reported throughout the county. Many of these were attributed to contamination of food and water by infected persons, Dr. Engelke stated. Others, he said, were attributed to the health habits of the children themselves.

"With the ever-increasing number of homes served by septic tank sewage disposal systems and private wells, it is possible that infections hepatitis will increase as a public health problem," said Dr. Engelke. "The intestinal waste of the patient suffering from the disease contains live viruses which produce hepatitis and these viruses, when discharged into septic tanks are not destroyed by the action of these tanks but may find their way to the surface of the ground if the septic tank fails, or may percolate through the soil until they reach the well which supplies the home with water.

"In either case, these viruses can produce other cases of infectious hepatitis."

The disease is recognized by fever, nausea with or without vomiting, fatigue, back and abdominal pains. Usually, the fever will subside in a few days and bile may be detected in the urine and the characteristic yellowish appearance of the skin may be observed.

The disease is rarely fatal but is usually severe enough to require medical attention and any child suspected of having infectious hepatitis should be taken to the family doctor immediately, Dr. Engelke said.

In some cases, when the attending physician believes it to be beneficial, gamma globulin may be given to children to help prevent development of the disease. The gamma globulin may not be necessary in all cases and in others the time elapsed between exposure and a visit to the doctor may render gamma globulin ineffective. Parents should rely on the doctor's advice in every case, Dr. Engelke said.

Dr. Fred O. Leeder of the Michigan Department of Health reports that figures of the state Health Department show that as of Jan. 24, when Washtenaw county had seven cases, Muskegon county had 22, Monroe county 22, Macomb county 18, Jackson county 17, Oakland county 16, and Detroit-Wayne county 23.

In the entire state, 335 cases were reported in January as compared to only 147 at this time in 1960.

Infectious hepatitis is running "quite high," said Dr. Leeder, in speaking of the state as a whole. He explained that the disease is cyclic in nature, according to public health authorities, the cycle being about six years in duration. This is borne out by the fact that the last outbreak occurred in Washtenaw county in 1953.

The disease is most prevalent in late fall and early winter when people are in more intimate contact than during the summer.

Dr. Engelke concluded with the thought that the burden of prevention of hepatitis is on the individual. Even with modern sanitation facilities this disease still poses a problem when individuals are lax in their own personal health practices.

If proper care were exercised, health department officials say, and available facilities used to full advantage, a great many of the cases of infectious hepatitis could be prevented.

**TO HOLD BASE**  
The United States reaffirmed its intention to retain the naval base at Guantanamo. The White House and the Pentagon both stated that the rupture of diplomatic relations with Cuba would not affect its operation of the base.

A Navy spokesman emphasized that the military units at the base as well as the nearby fleet units in the Caribbean were "neither being reinforced nor cut back."

## Law Requires Germination Test On Seeds for Sale

Growers who advertise seed of their own production for sale without first having a purity and germination test to determine if the seed has germination of 60 percent or higher and is free of noxious weeds are violating the state's seed law.

The seed section of the Michigan Department of Agriculture at Lansing makes purity and noxious weed examinations and germination tests at a nominal fee for growers, local elevators and seed men. In the course of a year hundreds of such analyses are made by the Department's skilled seed analysts.

The Michigan seed law does permit a grower to sell seed he produces on his own land to neighboring growers without complying with the tagging requirements of the seed act.

But if he advertises seed he has produced for sale by posting signs, in newspapers or by exhibiting samples in elevators or other places of business, he must comply with the law which requires the analysis for purity, noxious weeds and germination, according to the Department's director, G. S. McIntyre.

Surveys in Michigan and neighboring states indicate some growers have been planting seed of low vitality or seed with a high percentage of weed seed, or both.

In some cases this seed was grown by the grower himself or was bought from a neighbor without having been cleaned and tested for germination.

A good rule to follow in Mr. McIntyre's opinion is to read carefully the seed tag when buying seed. Good seed is comparatively cheap when compared to other costs in crop production. Seed of poor vitality containing weed seeds is mighty expensive in terms of results regardless of what the initial cost might have been, he believes.

**MEASURERS RADIATION DOSE**  
A tiny detector, which can be implanted in almost any body organ, is expected to give doctors a more accurate measurement of radiation dosage during X-ray or radio-isotope treatment of cancer.

It was developed by the Veterans Administration and is called the micro-radio-dosimeter, and consists of a glass rod less than a quarter of an inch long encased in a gold shield.

## Your Income Tax

The Internal Revenue Service today issued a reminder to all taxpayers that all interest and dividends, whether paid directly to you or credited to your account, must be included on your income tax return.

R. I. Nixon, District Director of Internal Revenue, stated that there are certain exclusions and credits which will reduce the tax liability on dividends. The Director added that taxpayers should check the instruction booklet and follow carefully the schedule on the return to make sure that the benefits are claimed correctly.

Director Nixon stressed that before signing and filing your return, you should make sure that:

1. Your name and address is printed plainly.  
2. All income is properly reported.  
3. All allowable deductions are claimed.

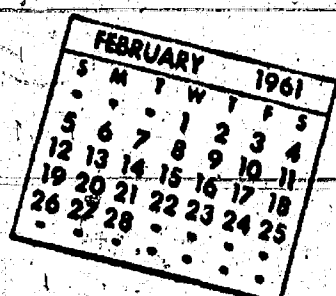

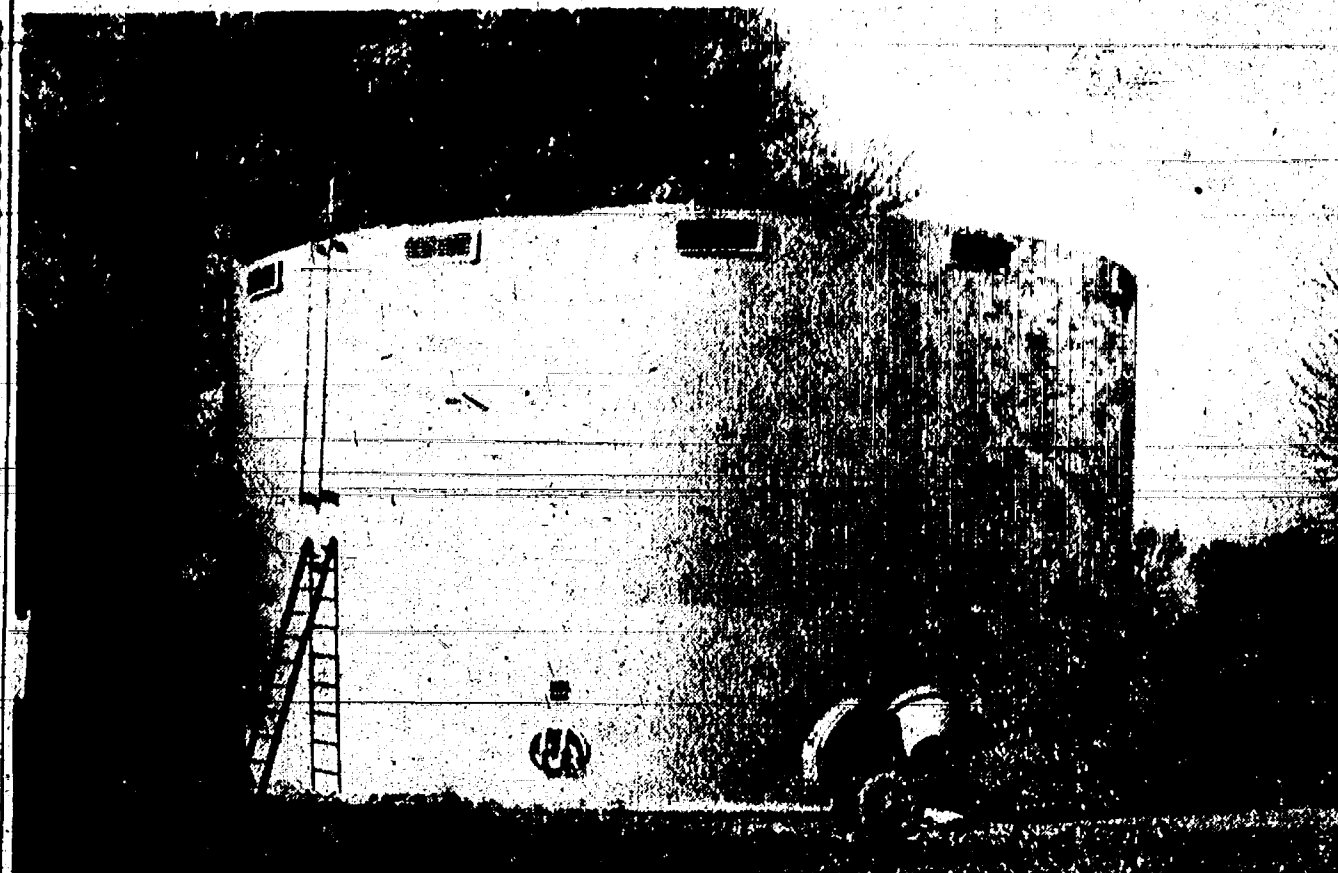

## County Purchases Of Savings Bonds Hit 86.7% of Quota

Combined purchases of series E and H United States Savings bonds by residents of Washtenaw county were \$3,408,886 in 1960, equivalent to 86.7 per cent of the Treasury assigned quota of \$4,000,000. It was announced today by John R. Meadows, chairman of the County Savings Bond committee.

The 1960 total compared with \$3,697,439 in 1959.

Meadows reported the county savings bonds sales goal for 1961 has been set at \$4,120,000.

Combined E and H purchases of \$25,043,000 throughout the state during December brought the Michigan total for the year to \$262,677 million, according to Delmar V. Cote, state director for the Treasury's U. S. Savings Bonds Division.

For the entire year Michigan E bond purchases totaled \$238,670,000 or 5.7 per cent more than in 1959. The investment in series H bonds for 1960 was \$24 million, an increase of 2.8 per cent over the 1959 amount.

"Although we naturally are somewhat disappointed not to have attained our sales goal," he said, "it is gratifying that we came nearer to achievement of quota in 1960 than in any of the three previous years. In 1959 sales amounted to 81 per cent of the goal; in 1958 and 1957 the percentages were 80.4 and 82.8, respectively."

Among industrial counties with the heaviest quotas, Genesee was in first position with sales of \$20,981,988, amounting to 102.2 per cent of goal attained. Wayne County was in second place with combined E and H bond sales of \$159,6 million, equal to 99.8 per cent of quota.

The state bond official stated employees are being asked to conduct vigorous promotions among their wage and salary earners this year and bankers urged to step up over the counter sales so Michigan will be sure to make its goal of \$277.1 million. May 1, 1961 marks the 20th anniversary of the bond program.

## County Justices Of Peace Attend Conference

Sylvan township justices of the peace — Chandler Rogers and George Brettschneider — were in Ann Arbor Friday to attend the second annual conference for justices of the peace of Washtenaw county. The conference was held in the County Building.

Judge Breakey instituted the conference last year after an investigation of justice of the peace courts here, and the rules which he laid down for the operation of these courts were praised by resolution of the Michigan State Bar Association, which called on other courts in the state to follow his example.

All justices of the peace who plan to hold court during the year are required to attend the conference.

Speakers at Friday's session were Ann Arbor Municipal Judge Francis L. O'Brien, Ypsilanti Municipal Judge Edward Denke; Prosecutor William F. Ager, Jr.; and George E. Stripp, justice of the peace in Ypsilanti township.

Was U-M Electrician for 35 Years Before Retiring

Henry C. Barais of 1123 South Forest Ave., Ann Arbor, a Cheelsea area resident many years ago, died suddenly Tuesday, Jan. 31, after suffering a heart attack. Today (Thursday) would have been his 80th birthday.

Before his retirement in 1948, he had been employed for 35 years as an electrician at the University of Michigan.

Born in Lima township, Feb. 2, 1881, he was a son of George John and Caroline Schneider Barais. In 1914 he was married to Sarah N. Taylor, who died Oct. 1, 1960.

He was a member of St. Andrew's Episcopal church, Ann Arbor, and a life member of Fraternity Lodge No. 262, F&AM.

## 1960 Wool Payments Apply Only to Sales Before April

Wool growers were reminded today that the 1960 program payments, to be made this summer, will be made only on wool and unshorn lambs which are marketed before March 31, 1961. That is the closing date for the 1960 program.

Mrs. Carolyn Stump, office manager, Washtenaw county Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office, also pointed out that applications for such payments under the 1960 wool program must be filed before the end of April 1961.

Mrs. Stump emphasizes that adequate records on the sales must support the information on the payment applications. For instance, producers' sales records for shorn wool should show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of producer, net weight of wool sold, and net proceeds to producer after normal marketing deductions.

Payments to producers for the 1960 marketing year will follow the same methods employed for the 1959 year. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage to be announced later this year will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool during the marketing year up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundredweight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the incentive payment per pound of shorn wool.

Under the 1959 wool program, growers in Washtenaw county last year received a total of \$113,201.26 in incentive payments earned under the marketing year which ended March 31, 1960.

program chairman for the evening. The meeting was held in the social center of the Methodist church.

Father Sarpiere has been in the United States only two years, he and the Rev. Father Joseph Legnani having come here from Como, Italy, especially to institute the new school, an innovation in the United States.

The two priests, associated with the order of the Servants of Charity, were active in similar work for mentally retarded boys in Italy and the late Cardinal Mooney was instrumental in bringing them to the United States.

Father Sarpiere explained that the new school eventually might have an enrollment of 200 boys from 8 to 15 years of age. The curriculum, he explained, will include a general course of study in addition to agricultural work, the plan being to make the boys in their charge an "asset to society."

The school project is financed with funds from the annual Archdiocese of Detroit Development Fund (ADF). Estimated cost is \$600,000.

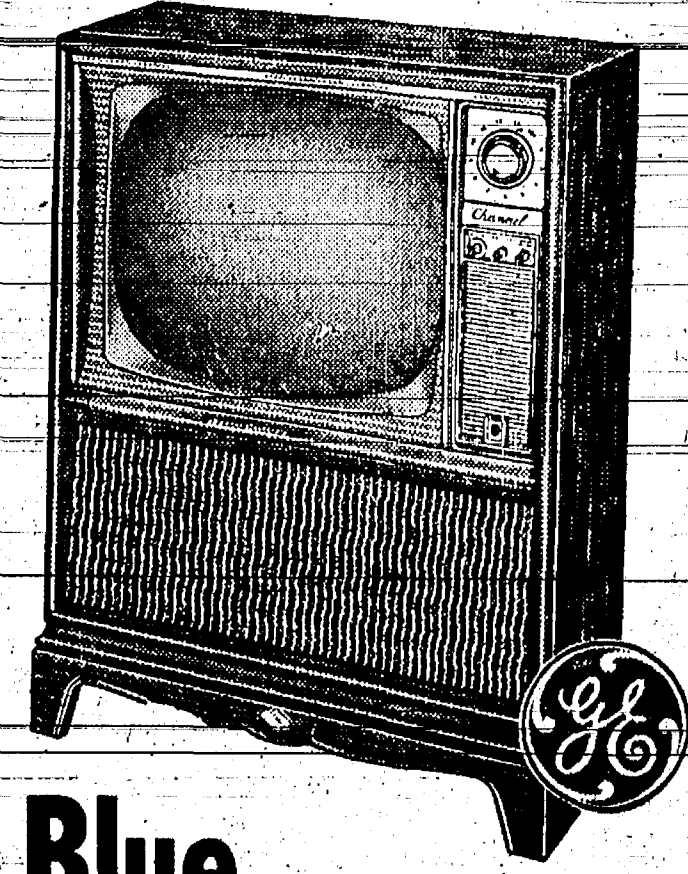

## National School Principals Body Will Meet in Detroit

Chelsea High School Principal Charles Lane will represent Chelsea at the annual conference of the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASPP) in Detroit's Cobo Hall, Feb. 11-15. This will mark the first time the NASPP, a department of the National Education Association, has convened nationally in Michigan since its organization 45 years ago.

Themed "Individual Competence and the National Welfare," the conference is expected to attract a record attendance of more than 7,000 secondary school principals from throughout the nation, including 650 from Michigan.

Major speakers include such well-known leaders as Paul-Henri Spahn, secretary-general of NATO; George Romney, president, American Motors Corporation; Dr. David D. Henry, president, University of Illinois; James C. Worthy, vice-president, Sears-Roebuck and Company; and Will Scott, manager, product-planning office, Ford Motor Company.

General sessions will spotlight two key issues affecting secondary education: the college admissions squeeze ahead and a report on testing project of the NASPP-American Association of School Administrators and the Council of

Chief State School Officers. Both of these programs feature such noted authorities as S. A. Kendrick, vice-president, College Entrance Examination Board, New York; Stephen Roming, dean, College of Education, University of Colorado; Charles C. Holt, director, Joint Project on Testing of the NASPP, AASA and CESSO; and David B. Tustin, professor of education, Columbia University, and chairman of the Joint Committee on Testing.

Eight large discussion sessions will be jointly sponsored with other organizations or agencies: Atomic Energy Commission, U. S. Information Agency, NEA Research Division, National Council for the Social Studies, National Council of Teachers of English, National Congress of Parents and Teachers, American Association of School Librarians and NEA Department of Audio-Visual Instruction.

Presiding at the conference will be James E. Nancarrow, principal, Upper Darby (Pennsylvania) High School, NASPP president.

Representing the Michigan Education Association will be Dr. E. Dale Kennedy, MEA executive secretary and members of the MEA headquarters staff.

## Federal Land Bank Reduces Interest Rate

6,700 farmers who borrowed from the Federal Land Bank in 1960 will have \$335,000 more to spend in 1961 as the result of interest rate reduction of 1/2 per cent effective Feb. 1, according to Robert Hall, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Ann Arbor.

These farmers borrowed more than \$67 million from the bank at 6 per cent. However, because of the long-standing policy of the Land Bank to provide credit at the lowest possible cost, the interest charged on this group of loans is being reduced to 5 1/2 per cent until further notice. The immediate result to these Land Bank borrowers is a saving of \$335,000 the first year; these savings may exceed 2 or 3 million dollars in full.

These borrowers have the further assurance that the interest charged on their loans cannot exceed the stated loan rate, but may be reduced still further if conditions warrant.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Ann Arbor, managed by Robert Hall, covers the counties of Washtenaw, Wayne and Livingston.

## Mystery Farm Identified as Former 'Hadley Place' Is Now Owned by Robert Meyers

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Meyers, who are active in the Jaycees and Jaycees Auxiliary as "Bob and Virginia" Meyers, now own the farm shown in the Jan. 26 issue of The Standard as "Mystery Farm No. 135." However, it is well-known to most area residents as the Hadley farm, because the Hadley family had owned it since it was secured from the U. S. Government in the 1830's by a Stephen Hadley. It is located at 11497 Hadley Rd., in Chelsea township.

Bob and Virginia Meyers bought the farm in 1957 from Jane Hadley Kirchoff (Mrs. Martin Kirchoff) of Plymouth, and moved here from their former home in Detroit. Meyers is employed by Michigan Bell Telephone Co. of Ann Arbor and neither he nor Mrs. Meyers had ever lived on a farm before, however, Mrs. Meyers says they "love it" and are constantly working on improvements.

On the 50 acres of land which comprises the farm now, they keep sheep, some beef cattle and their two riding horses. Mrs. Meyers is interested in caring for the stock and keeps herself busy about the place.

In delving into the history of the place, Mrs. Meyers said, she learned that ownership passed from the original Stephen Hadley to his son, Stephen, and then to the latter's son, Justin Hadley. Justin later sold it to his brother, Harrison Hadley, father of Mrs. Kirchoff who sold it to Bob and Virginia Meyers.

Mrs. Kirchoff rented the house at one time to the former Eloise Hadley, now Mrs. George Kunzel-

AMERICAN FOOD INTAKE

The average American consumed an estimated 1,488 pounds of food this year.

The Agriculture Department reported that the average American ate a little over 400 pounds of dairy products, except butter, and approximately the same amount of fruits and vegetables.

The average meat consumed was 178 pounds followed by 146 pounds of flour and cereal and 108 each of potatoes and sugar and other sweets.

The lowest category of below one hundred pounds covered 67 pounds of butter, 41 pounds of eggs and 17 pounds of coffee, tea and cocoa.
