

Furniture Refinishing

Having read my two preceding articles, you've climbed into some clothes, taken the table to be polished to the cellar, spread by layers of newspaper around, opened all the windows. And I've bought a remover, probably a semi-paste, which seems the most practical for the job you have in mind.

Does neatness count?

No. Pour the remover into old cans and really slop it on, the thicker the better. Wait. If it's thin, push it in about five minutes with a blunt instrument (corner of a small board) against it. If the instrument is through to bare wood, you remove the sludge with a paper and steel-wool pads.

Your finish is made up of several layers. The blunt instrument test may inform you that a remover has not reached bare wood. Load up your old brush with additional remover and slop it over. WAIT.

How about pieces that are only varnished—shellacked or oiled?

Ten to 15 minutes ought to be sufficient.

On veneered and other fine surfaces, never use metal instruments scraping. Even a putty knife rounded edges can produce fine scratches. As mentioned in the first article, it's a good idea to whittle out a scraper shaped in the general form of a regular putty knife.

Scrape on the edge of a metal scraper instead of digging the finish out with a knife. When scraping with a scraper, but when you have to go against the grain, use your fingers to keep the wood from fraying up over fibers.

After I get the finish off, I find I'm still struggling with the stain. Apparently the wood itself had a base stain or any finish was applied.

Kaare was graduated from Michigan State University in 1952 and taught vocational agriculture for three years before joining the Extension Service staff. He is the extension director in Kalkaska county and has developed an effective forestry program.

Hovey is extension agent, agriculture, in Bay county. He holds both BS and MS degrees from Michigan State University. He has worked primarily with young farm families in helping them organize successful farm management programs.

Patterson is county extension director in Allegan county and has carried out extensive programs in soil testing, poultry management and dairying. He has organized numerous classes of farmers for intensive study of soil fertility and farm management programs.

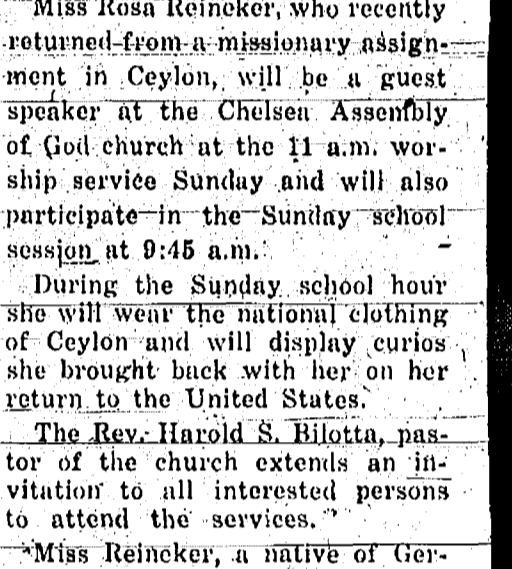
During the Sunday school hour she will wear the national clothing of Ceylon and will display curios she brought back with her on her return to the United States.

CD Director Charges State 'Fallen Down'

Gerald Miller, director of the Washtenaw county CD office, told the delegates at a six-county Civil Defense meeting Friday that "one of the biggest problems is the lack of clear-cut policy on all levels of government. We're in a mess."

The meeting, held in Detroit, was called by the Inter-County Supervisors Committee and was attended by Civil Defense directors from Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Monroe counties.

The delegates contended the state had "fallen down" in providing a strong Civil Defense office, with enough funds and had failed to take a firm role in overseeing local Civil Defense agencies.

They also contended many local Civil Defense plans are written to get matching federal funds rather than to be concerned with survival and that confusion exists on all governmental levels on Civil Defense.

Purpose of the meeting was to discuss area Civil Defense problems.
