We Can Sell America to World If We Concentrate Our Skills

With respect to our apparent inability to make ourselves understood to the world, to present our ideas and ideals effectively, in short to "sway the minds of men," Vice-President Lyndon Johnson has been widely quoted as saying that a nation that can popularize corn flakes should be able to tell the world about itself.

In answer to this, Charles H. Brower, president of Batten, Barton, Durstine & Osborn, Inc., declares that this nation can sell itself and its viewpoint to the world—if it uses the same concentrated methods and skilled effort that popularized corn flakes. And it had better start!

In an address before the Economic Club of Detroit, Brower urged an early meeting in Washington of "people who know how to sell" and the establishment of a "Department of World Affairs"—on a prestige level with the State Department—which would "deal with the people of the world... drain from their minds the poison of Soviet lies and tell them the truth about America."

He noted that corn flakes are not sold by the president of the cereal company, that "automobiles are not sold to the consumer by the presidents of Chrysler, Ford or General Motors" but by a sales staff and an advertising staff at headquarters, "and a large staff in the field."

Brower admits that selling America to the world is a more complex job than selling it to Americans. He also recognizes that certain "sophisticates" in the Washington woodwork, who decry our affluence and the force that stimulates it, must be made to realize that advertising is "the first essential in any economy based on competition and freedom of choice" and the force that "furnishes the financial strength to keep our free press free."

Without it "the machinery in factories may begin to rust a bit. The mines will close down. The highways will develop potholes. But long before the taxes dry up, the state will take over."

He notes, too, that a sales convention "has just wound up in Moscow," where sales managers flown in from the global branch offices "were briefed on the new pitch for next year." This Communist Party Congress, he said, displayed the product, spelled out the goals, assigned sales quotas and deadlines—and means business.

It is time now to hold a sales convention of our own in Washington, thinks Brower, and brush up on our "commodity freedom"—"the most valuable thing that man has ever produced."

We think his countrymen-at-large, as well as those who heard him speak, agree that:

"Our duty as Americans is clear: we must sell America—instead of giving it away."

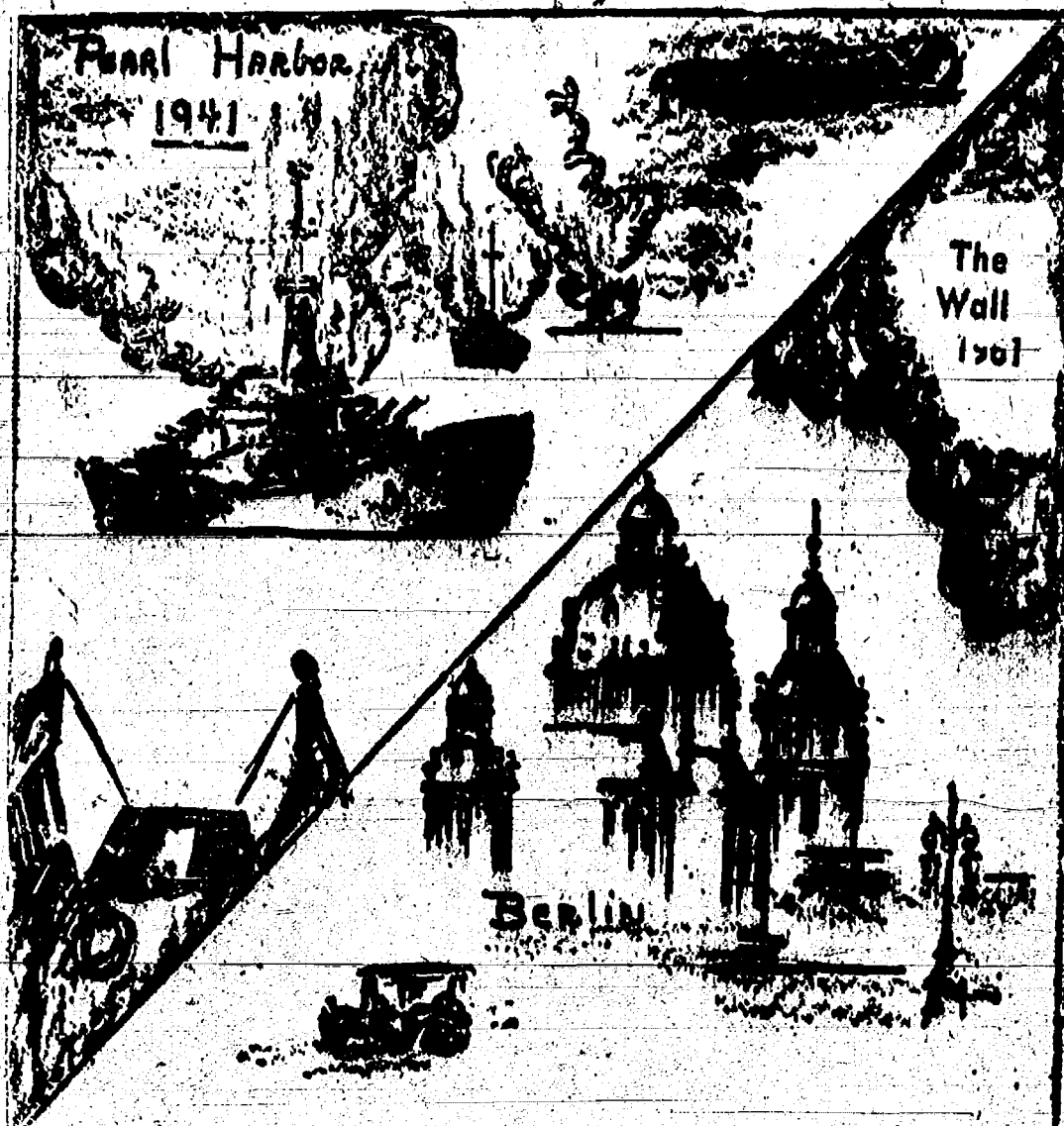

MICHIGAN MIRROR

Installment buying and "charge it" plans have grown in popularity with increasing speed in recent years.

Like many mushrooming facets of America's economy, the buy now, pay later plans have led to many problems for the consumer, probably the greatest of which is staying within a budgeted income.

With the growth in the use of credit purchasing, a large number of Americans have found themselves over their heads in debt. Others, classed as opportunists or enterprising businessmen depending on how you look at it, found this a chance to help themselves while managing other people's affairs.

"Debt management" came into the vocabulary only a few years ago. It means the planning and management of the financial affairs of a debtor for a fee.

A wage earner who has a lot of creditors hounding him for payment and threatening repossession, garnishment or worse, may hire a debt management firm to work out a compromise with the creditors, for a percentage fee.

Experience in Michigan indicated some of the debt management firms which arose nearly overnight were abusing the purpose of their existence.

Corporation and Securities Commission Raymond F. Clevenger said reports indicated some "un-

scrupulous operators" entered the field.

"It is said that in some cases money turned in (to the manager) is not passed on to creditors; that there are exorbitant forfeiture penalties when management plans are dropped and dishonest advertising and other abuses," said Clevenger.

Before the 1961 session of the legislature, the wage earner had only his own resources to rely on to correct any abuses. Most individuals who found themselves the victims of unreliable debt management programs had enough problems without adding this, lawmakers thought.

The more ethical segments of the debt management industry were also eager that a policing job be done to get rid of the undesirable practices.

This year Michigan became one of the few states which regulate the business of debt management by license.

"The new law provides that a debt management licensee must show financial responsibility, experience, character and general fitness to warrant belief that the business will be operated fairly and honestly," Clevenger said.

Insurance of payment relays is provided in the law through a requirement that licensees keep a separate bank account for the benefit of creditors and a 15-day

limit is imposed on the remission of funds to creditors.

Legislative apportionment, a possible Achilles' heel for Michigan's Constitutional Convention, may not be as tough a problem as it has been considered.

A plan presented to a con-con committee during its early sessions apparently has gained bipartisan support outside the convention hall.

The proposal was first voiced some years ago by former Democratic State Chairman Neil Staebler. It was presented to the Con-Con committee by present Republican Chairman George Van Peursem.

It called for a skeleton of State Senate apportionment with an automatic revision clause for each 10-year census. This seemed to fit what authorities say should be in a state's constitution: just framework.

The plan called for a 35-member Senate elected from districts to be spelled out in the Constitution. Each district would have seven members in the Senate. The representative units within each district would, or could, be changed every 10 years as necessary to adjust to population changes.

Although not a final solution, because apportionment of the Senate seats themselves would be left up to the legislature every 10 years, the proposal seemed to have a good chance to take some of the sting from the apportionment problem.

The spirit of non-partisanship in the Constitutional Convention went with the wind in discussion of some relatively minor employee appointments so party support of proposals will probably be a prime factor in their success.

If Staebler, still a strong voice of his party, and Van Peursem can agree on a solution it would appear the Con-Con delegates have a good chance of finding an answer.

There can be little doubt that agreement on apportionment would make the job of selling the Convention's product to the people much easier.

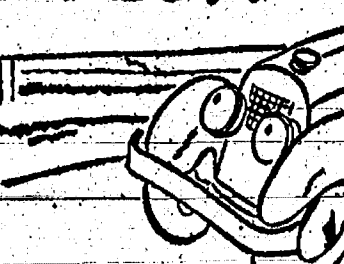

SCIENCE TOPICS

★ You'll Live Longer, Statistics Say

AVERAGE LENGTH of life is at an all-time high of 69.7 years in the United States. If you are 22 years old you can expect to live 50 years more; if you're 40, you can expect to live a third of a century more; if you're 50, you have a quarter of a century due you.

And if you've already reached that "high" of 60, why, the statistics say you can expect to live an average of 11.7 years more!

LIVING LONGER depends a lot on your alertness. For example, cold weather means closed windows in homes and automobiles. If you have nausea or dizziness accompanied by a headache, don't pass it off as motion sickness in a car.

Instead, open the windows and breathe the fresh air for several minutes. The surgeon general of the Public Health Service says: "By the time a victim is suddenly aware that he is being seriously poisoned by carbon monoxide he may be only seconds from unconsciousness."

FALLOUT SHELTERS are providing tax savings in six states. Maryland, New Hampshire, Ohio and Wisconsin have laws exempting shelters from local property taxes; Oregon reduces the increased value of the entire property by amount of the shelter.

up to \$1,500; while New York provides for a \$100 allowance on the tax valuation of a home for each person the shelter is intended to accommodate. AUTOMATION and new production methods have created a switch in the carbon dioxide business, says Cardox. Output of liquid carbon dioxide, which is easier to handle and produce, exceeded the annual output of dry ice for the first time last year.

But that's not the end of dry ice—its use will continue in local delivery trucks and portable containers.

PLENTY OF JOBS will be available in three fields. There's a shortage of veterinarians, even though there are 21,256 in the U. S. According to the American Veterinary Medical Association 300 to 500 veterinarians should be trained in laboratory animal medicine for important medical and chemical research. Second, nuclear physicists are seriously needed, says the Atomic Energy Commission. Third, the Federal Aviation Service estimates that 28,000 men will be needed in aviation—17,000 of them as controllers, 9,000 as electronics and maintenance specialists.

SOLAR HEAT is used to dry grain in tests now being conducted by the Department of Agriculture. Designers of the heat-collecting device predict it also will be useful in warming animal shelters and in providing supplementary heat in rural homes. MONKEYS TALK monkey signals too!

Red Cross Sets New Water Safety Instructor Course

The Red Cross annual Water Safety Instructor training course will start at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 16, at Tappan Junior High school, 2851 E. Stadium, Ann Arbor, according to Dr. Earle Ziegler, chairman of the water safety committee.

The free co-educational class is open to anyone in the county who holds a current Red Cross Senior Life-Saving certificate and will be at least 18 years of age by April 1962. The class will meet one night a week for 16 weeks which is

a new schedule for this course. The course work will be spread over a longer period of time to allow the candidates time to practice their skills between sessions. The Water Safety Instructor rating is required before anyone may teach in the Red Cross aquatic program and has been set as the minimum qualification for positions as Life Guard with the State of Michigan. This course will be the only one offered by the local Red Cross before summer and the class size will have to be limited. Registration may be made by calling the Red Cross office at 662-5548 before the deadline of Dec. 14.

Furniture Refinishing



by BOB WILKIN

Here are a few tips you may find helpful in your furniture refinishing ventures.

Did you know — that those pesky white spots which appear on furniture surfaces can be polished away? A steel-wool pad of the finest grade dampened with linseed oil, a furniture polish, or a good paste wax will do the job on dull finishes.

For medium surfaces which are neither dull nor glossy try rubbing with your household scouring powder dampened to a paste-like texture with water.

If the whitened surface is a high gloss, dampen your steel wool pad with the pre-wax cleaner you use on your automobile.

Did you know — that white shellac is hard to work with and therefore, for most jobs it should be mixed with orange shellac? When you've once opened a can of any shellac, pour the unused portion into a glass jar for storage. Shellac will darken when kept in a once-opened can.

Did you know — that by brushing over two or three coatings of shellac with a coat of clear varnish you can have a finish that has all the wearing quality and beauty of shellac plus the protection of varnish against alcohol stains, humidity and the like.

Did you know — that warped table leaves can be straightened? First, with a good semipaste remover, strip the finish off the leaves. Dampen a small portion of your lawn. Lay the leaves on the ground, concave side up near the dampened area and pour hot water on them.

Then flip them over so that the wet, concave sides are face down on the dampened earth and the sun can get at the dry, convex (humped) sides. A good hefty rock placed atop the hump should speed things up a bit. Depending upon the warp, the straightening process will take from a few hours to a few days.

Did you know — that tired old finish can be snapped up by a good scrubbing with soap and water followed with several applications of a mixture of equal parts of turpentine and linseed oil. After the final application has been allowed to soak for an hour or so, wipe the surface dry. Then go to work with a good canuba wax.

While this activity makes fish more food-conscious, it also makes them more alert and wary.

Dates Set for MSU's Annual Farmers' Week

Michigan State University will play host to more than 40,000 visitors for the annual Farmers' Week, Jan. 20-Feb. 2.

For 47 years MSU has staged the winter event which attracts farmers and the agricultural industry from Michigan and adjoining states. Prof. Byron Good of the University's animal husbandry department is general chairman of the program.

Theme of the 1962 week will be, "A Century of Land-Grant Progress." This is in keeping with the University's observance of the centennial year of the founding of the nation's land-grant schools a hundred years ago.

Over that span of time, MSU has grown from a pioneer as a struggling, agricultural school to one of the country's great universities. Agriculture has always received major emphasis at MSU and Farmers' Week stands as a monument to this long service to farmers. Farmers' Week is one of few remaining in the nation — and ranks as one of the top events of its kind.

Wednesday, the traditional "big day" of the week will feature farm programs in agriculture and the role of politics to the farmer. Thursday will highlight a session sponsored by the agricultural economics department, "The Battle Against Farm Costs."

Special programs have also been arranged for homemakers and Tuesday and Thursday will feature special youth activities. Exhibits chairman Robert Maddox reports that both MSU and dozens of commercial companies will again erect hundreds of displays for the week. Complete programs for the week will be available after the Christmas holidays.

Recommend Treatment For Those Motorists Who Won't Dim Lights

Grand Rapids—An irate motorist recently gave fair warning to fellow motorists who fail to dim their headlights.

State Police at Rockford said two motorists leaving Grand Rapids both had their brights on.

The lead driver was annoyed when the car behind failed to dim his beams for approaching cars.

Oncoming vehicles would retaliate by turning on their brights even though the lead car dimmed.

The other driver still wouldn't dim his lights, so the angered driver got out of his car at a stop sign and kicked in both of the other car's headlights.

Heart Disease Toll High

More men than women die of heart disease, and almost six times as many deaths are due to it in the United States as in France or Japan.

The World Health Organization of the United Nations reports that 40 percent of deaths in the U.S. of men aged 45 to 64, and 22 percent among women in the same age group are caused by arteriosclerotic and degenerative heart disease.

In Japan and in France, heart disease mortality rates for men in this age span run at only seven percent and for women, four percent. Different ways of life, dietary habits and methods of diagnosis are reasons for the differences, WHO said, after studying mortality rates in this category in 24 countries.

From 18 to 24 inches of refuse and dirt had to be removed at this point before the original grade line of the drain was reached. Drain Commissioner John Flook said much of the drain trouble is the result of dumping of junk and other refuse into the creek bed; in fact, using the drain as a dump. Guarding against this practice through the years might have prevented much of the drain clean-out expense. Flook also pointed out that easement right-of-way of 66 feet on either side of the creek is included as drain area and any junk or construction within that distance is actually on the drain site and could be detrimental to its proper flow. The dragline shown in the creek bed is used for all clean-out except in locations under culverts and bridges where hand digging is required. Flook commented that the work done some time ago at Veterans Memorial Park on North Main St.—construction of a retaining wall and general clean-up (much of it by volunteer work)—was a real asset to the drain project. The drain clean-out already completed has greatly improved the flooded condition in the eastern end of the village, water level having gone down approximately three feet in the past two or three weeks.
