MMPA Head Issues Blast at U-M President

The head of one of Michigan's largest farm organizations this week criticized the "short-sighted and selfish" viewpoint of University of Michigan President Harlan Hatcher.

Glenn Lake, president of Michigan Milk Producers Association, said Hatcher's denunciation of state funds allocated for agricultural research and rural extension work were hardly fitting for the head of an institution dedicated to the betterment of the entire state.

"We have no quarrel with Mr. Hatcher's desire to obtain more money for his research projects," Lake said, "but we would expect him to sell such experimental programs on their own merits, rather than try to funnel money away from existing programs of proven value."

"Mr. Hatcher calls the 2500 employees in the Ann Arbor area whose jobs he implies were generated by U of M," Lake added, "but he ignores the thousands of jobs in the state which depend on a prosperous and efficient agriculture."

"Nearly 780,000 jobs in Michigan are directly or indirectly created by agriculture," Lake said, "or about 25 percent of all job opportunities. The asset value of agriculture in Michigan is 4.3 billion dollars, equal to that of all our automotive and steel plants put together."

"We would expect a man of Mr. Hatcher's stature to recognize these facts," the MMPA president concluded, "and to acknowledge the tremendous service to the state being performed by Michigan State University's work in agricultural research and extension which are in part financed by state appropriations."

The University of Michigan leads all public universities in number of alumni who hold presidencies of leading industrial firms.

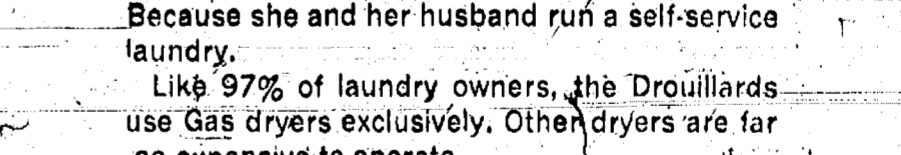

additional judgeship would require a net addition of cost to the county amounting to \$24,000, including the cost of services of court personnel and office expenses, and the \$8,500 county-paid salary for the judge.
All circuit judges in Michigan are paid \$12,500 a year by the state, and the counties augment this salary.
If the bill passes in the Legislature, the vacancy will be filled by an appointee of Gov. George Romney who will serve until a successor is elected in November, 1964, takes up duties in January, 1965.

The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

### Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 491.-The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, in a District, County, Township, City or Village, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P.A. 1954.)

### Transfer of Registration, Application, Time

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day), provided that no such transfer shall be made for any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

### Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election day by executing a request over his or her signature in the original and duplicate registration cards, and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the signature thereon in charge of the registration records shall compare the record and with the signature upon the applicant's registration card such fact upon said request and the application for transfer shall be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The Clerk who shall file with the Township, City or Village the application for transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any elector in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of the elector in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

## Catholic Social Services Reports 1,005 Cases Handled

Approximately 800 area persons, including clergy from most of the Catholic churches of the county, were present Wednesday evening for the fourth annual dinner of Catholic Social Services of Washtenaw county. The dinner was held in the Michigan Union ballroom at Ann Arbor.

Principal speakers during the after-dinner program were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilbur P. Suedkamp, director, and the Rev. Fr. J. A. Trese, assistant director, of Catholic Charities, Archdiocese of Detroit.

The Rev. Fr. Trese spoke on the topic "Private Agencies and the Changing Scene," and Monsignor Suedkamp on the topic, "Catholic Charities Moves Ahead."

Both commended Miss Marguerite M. Parrish, executive secretary of the Catholic Social Services of Washtenaw county for her work and for the excellent report she gave at the meeting.

In her report, Miss Parrish mentioned that Catholic Social Services is now a part of United Fund and Community Chest programs in Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, Whitmore Lake and Dexter. This is described in the annual report as "a real step forward" since it is "an indication of community acceptance, and a social agency cannot function without the support and acceptance of the people of the community."

Miss Parrish said that of the total of 1,005 cases listed for the year 1962 603 cases involved Catholics, 259 Protestants and 143 mixed. The agency's services are available to any Washtenaw county resident regardless of racial, nationality, religious, social or economic background. While almost 500 of the cases during the year came from the Ann Arbor area, Ypsilanti had 176, and others were from Chelsea, 84; Dexter, 86; Manchester, 22; Milan, 20; Saline, 14, and Whitmore Lake, 24. Cases handled by the agency included 357 where marital problems were involved. Other included: geriatric problems, 32; personality problem children, 147; personality problem adults, 131; physical illness, 11; economic problems, 30; employment, 21; mentally deficient children, 15; boarding home applications, 67; and miscellaneous, 53.

Of special concern to the agency, according to Miss Parrish, is the problem of unmarried mothers. She pointed out that 81 unmarried mothers had been assisted during 1962 and expressed concern over a trend toward a younger age group involved in this type of case.

Catholic Social Services' budget for last year listed a total income of \$82,633, of which \$48,825 came from the Archdiocese Development Fund, \$3,446.06 donated by the Good Samaritans; \$6,076.78 from adoptions, \$1,340.81 from general donations and \$82,500 from the Whitmore Lake Community Chest.

Nineteen adoptions were completed during 1962, Miss Parrish said.

In giving her list of statistics, Miss Parrish stressed the fact that each case mentioned involved a "person" and as such was the concern of the agency and all those involved in its administration.

The Good Samaritans, mentioned as one of the donors of funds, is an organization made up of citizens representative of Washtenaw county, organized in 1959 for the purpose of helping Catholic Social Services "carry out its work of mercy."

Membership is open to any resident of Washtenaw county. Mrs. George Eamon of Ypsilanti is chairman of the Good Samaritans board of directors.

Stephen J. Filipink acted as toastmaster at Wednesday's dinner.

Others at the speakers' table included the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John F. Bradley of St. Mary's chapel, Ann Arbor, who gave the invocation; John DeVine, chairman of the board of Catholic Social Services, who gave the address of welcome; the Rev. Fr. Francis Srebrnik, of St. Francis of Assisi Catholic church at Ann Arbor, who pronounced the benediction; Mrs. Eamon; Good Samaritans board chairman; and Miss Nina Greening of Chelsea, who was ticket chairman for the annual dinner.

## Council Briefs

F. B. Adams of Consumers Power Co., attended Tuesday's Village Council meeting to discuss possible purchase and transfer of Consumers Power Co. facilities in the newly-annexed area at the south of the village. He intends to proceed with plans for transfer, tentative costs, etc.

Motion made to authorize payment to Ayres, Lewis, Norris & May for engineering service for May 1, 1962 to Dec. 31, 1962, total amount being \$722.35.

Discussion relative to proposed sidewalk and curb construction in the Post Office area and motion made to accept subject to approval of contract price by the Federal Government, the low bid of Earl Schultz — \$1,958.06 for construction of curb, gutter and sidewalk at Chelsea Post Office; the Village to pay only for construction of curb and gutter on Main street—\$374.76 — plus engineering costs while the Government is to pay \$1,583.30.

Motion approved to authorize purchase of a new radio for the police car at \$300 and to authorize the police chief to sell the present police radio at the best price.

President Robert Daniels appointed George A. Staffan, Michigan-Week chairman for Chelsea.

Motion to renew boiler insurance on Municipal building with A. D. Mayer Agency at \$160.80 for three years.

Discussion with Fire Chief Ted Balmer regarding his letter of resignation as fire chief, effective March 19. The Council expressed "great reluctance to accept" the resignation. He has been chief for 11 years and the Council went on record with the statement that it is practically impossible to adequately express, on behalf of the people and the Council, their heartfelt appreciation for his time and efforts on their behalf.

Following "reluctant acceptance" of Balmer's resignation it was announced that the Fire Department personnel is expected to elect a new fire chief Tuesday, March 12 and will seek confirmation of their choice at the March 19 Village Council meeting.

Councilman J. Vincent Burg, II, the Civil Defense Committee, Washtenaw County Civil Defense Director Gerald Miller and Nelson IV representatives held a meeting regarding proposed construction of a Civil Defense Center in conjunction with the proposed new fire hall. The report of the meeting stated the Government will supply matching funds for a control center and the equipment necessary for a center adequate for the Chelsea area to cost approximately \$83,000—the government and the village to pay \$26,500 each. The Council stated that the cost of plans as suggested are prohibitive for Chelsea and therefore cannot be considered. An alternate plan is to be sought.

Approval authorized for membership application of Civil Defense Director Elwyn Beach in the U.S. Civil Defense Council.

Report of Area Planning Committee states that a survey of Chelsea's water design shows it to be adequate for a population of 7,300 and sewage facilities adequate for a population of 6,500. (Projected estimates of population for 1980 is 5,670.) Washtenaw County Planning Commission Associate Planning Director Malthe commended the various Chelsea Village Councils of recent years for their "foresight in instituting programs for the future which have provided

### Motor Vehicle Fund Collections Being Distributed

Lansing — The State Highway Department has started distributing the fourth quarter Motor Vehicle Fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages.

John C. Mackie said net receipts of the Highway Fund during October, November, and December of 1962, amounted to \$46,177,070, a decrease of \$1,839,825 compared to the same period of 1961.

Major reason for the decrease was that sale of 1963 license tabs fell off considerably compared to license sales during the same period in 1961 when motorists were issued their first new license plates in three years.

Washtenaw county's share totaled \$981,057 while Dexter received \$3,295; Chelsea \$5,682; and Manchester, \$3,857.

All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

After deduction of collection costs and the Waterways Commission's share, the money is distributed under provisions of state law which provides that 47 percent goes to the State Highway Department for use on state highways, 35 percent to the state's 83 counties for use on county roads, and 18 percent to 511 incorporated cities and villages for their roads and streets.

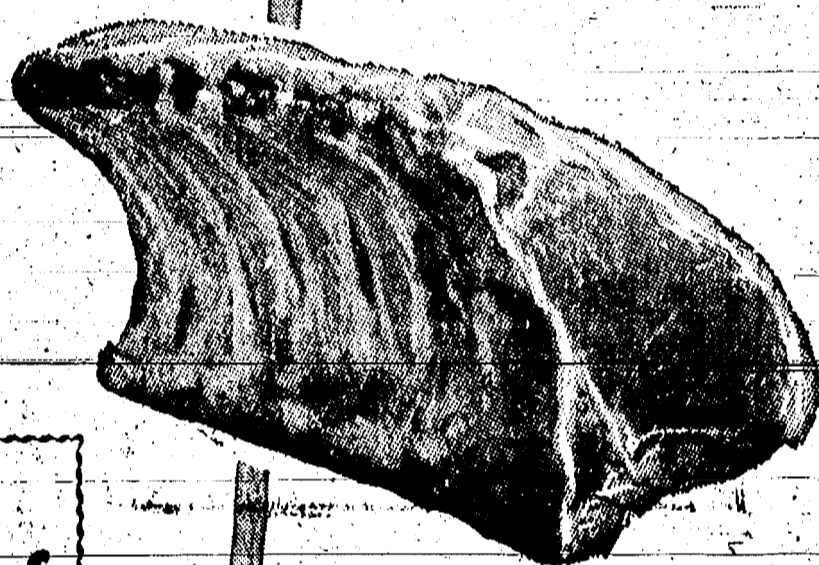

**Electors Unable to Make Personal Application, Procedure**  
SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the file of the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

**Unregistered Persons Not Entitled to Vote**  
SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.

**Transfer of Registration, Application, Time**  
SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved there, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the old address, word and precinct number and record the new address, word and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted for transfer the next day working day), provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

**Transfer of Registration on Election Day**  
SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

Co-operative leaders feel that local directors must frequently review their position and responsibilities to explore new means of maintaining and strengthening their business organizations, particularly since agricultural producers currently are steadily decreasing as a percentage of the total and the share of the total national income going to agriculture is becoming a smaller part of the total. They feel that agriculture must operate in a changing political and economical environment.

"Gearing co-operatives to meet this change" is part of the director's responsibility.

### Corn Clinic Scheduled Next Tuesday

"How much extra profit can I get from weed control with chemicals?"

"How should I apply chemical weed killers for best results?"

"What's the latest news on controlling corn rootworms?"

Corn growers can find answers to those and many other questions at a forthcoming series of Goigly Corn Clinics. These clinics have become important to corn growers who wish to exchange ideas and meet farm chemical specialists. This year's series of clinics will be held in more than 600 communities, 350 more than last year. Meetings will be held in most major corn areas, and most farmers will have several nearby clinics to choose from. Every person interested in corn production is urged to attend.

A session is scheduled in Chelsea on Tuesday, Feb. 26 at Chelsea High school, beginning at 8 p.m.

The use of today's safe chemicals to increase corn yields and lower production costs is fast becoming a standard corn growing practice. At the clinic, farm chemical specialists will discuss the basic principles of chemical weed control, how to get the most out of each herbicide dollar, how long chemicals are effective in the soil, how to apply weed killers for best results, and many other topics.

In those areas where growers are faced with a corn rootworm problem, the specialists will discuss what is known about these insects; the damage they do, and how to control them.

Note the date of the meeting and plan to come. A question and answer period following the program is expected to stimulate a lively discussion. In answering questions, the specialist will draw on experiences from all major corn growing areas of the U. S. as well as on local results.

The University of Michigan conducts a Center for Research on Teaching and Learning to study modern instructional techniques.
