

November 22, '64 Red Sea near Massawa,

This is the first of our articles concerning our trip. The trip to Europe and Africa has been going well. We traveled 'across the Atlantic Ocean aboard the USS United

States. purchased two German B.M.W.motorcycles, After assembling our camping gear we left for Paris, France for our international driving permits.

While traveling through Ger-Smith of Chelsen.

The next country that we traveled through was Italy. Here we visited the cities of Venice, Pizza, Rome, Naples, Messina and Palermo, Sicily. In Palermo, Sicily we made the first major decision of our trip. We had to choose between things turned out, we chose the ship heading to Ethiopia.

After one month and pounds lighter, we are aboard the Norwegian freighter, the M. S. Concordia Fonn of Haugesung, Norway. She is a 9,500ton vessel heading for ports in the Sudan, Ethiopia and the Persian Gulf. The ship regularly visits the Island of Sicily. Italy, France, Canary Islands and many norts in the USA-The crew life aboard ship is
