Bulldogs Lose Opener to Jackson Team

Chelsea High Bulldogs basketball team suffered from foul trouble and was a loser in its initial game of the season Friday evening with Jackson St. Mary's at Jackson.

Lack of height was given as one of the reasons for Chelsea's loss of the game. A rash of fouls spelled doom for the Bulldogs. With 6'7" Steve Lange outreaching the Bulldogs rebounders and 6'3" Jerry Stark gathering 10 more rebounds the St. Mary's Celts overcame a three-point Chelsea lead at the end of the third quarter to win the game. The Celts scored 15 points in the final four minutes of the fourth quarter to win going away.

The overly scrappy Bulldogs committed numerous unnecessary fouls against the Celts. Ed Wendell, Gary White, David Clark and Charles Schmunk all fouled out of the game before the Celts put on their surge to win.

Gary Dresch led Chelsea's scorers with 16 points. Others who scored are Charles Schmunk, 9; Gary White and Dave Clark, 8 each; Mike Tarasow and Dennis Stoffer, 7 each; Dick Laubach, 4; and Oren Wireman, 2. With White and Clark out of the game the superior height of St. Mary's paid off by grabbing many rebounds normally gathered in by Chelsea.

In addition to foul problems the Bulldogs shot very poorly from the floor, making only 16 out of 66 attempts. Many close-in shots were missed.

The game was typical of opening season contests with both teams having the jitters. At times it appeared that complete confusion reigned on the court as both teams were pressing with a man-to-man defense. The fouls then slowed the action down.

Chelsea led most of the game, but seven points was the most (Continued on page five)

African Safari

Editor's Note: Frederick Wagner and Patrick Merkel, who left Chelsea Oct. 4 on the first stage of a 10-month trip to Africa, have written their first letter to The Standard. Their travels will give Wagner credits toward a Master's degree and Merkel undergraduate credits at Central Michigan University.

Wagner is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Wagner, 319 Concord St., and Merkel is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Merkel, 320 S. Main St. Wagner graduated in June from Michigan State University. Their letter, received here this week, was dated Nov. 22. It reads as follows:
November 22, '64
Red Sea near Massawa, Ethiopia
Dear Friends:
This is the first of our articles concerning our trip.
The trip to Europe and Africa has been going well. We traveled across the Atlantic Ocean aboard the USS United States.
Upon landing in Le Havre, France, we proceeded directly to Cologne, Germany, where we purchased two German B.M.W. motorcycles. After assembling our camping gear we left for Paris, France for our international driving permits.
While traveling through Germany, we visited Robert Smith, who was a fellow classmate and the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Smith of Chelsea.
The next country that we traveled through was Italy. Here we visited the cities of Venice, Piza, Rome, Naples, Messina and Palermo, Sicily.
In Palermo, Sicily we made the first major decision of our trip. We had to choose between taking a ship from Palermo to Tunis, or a ship from Palermo to Massawa, Ethiopia. As things turned out, we chose the ship heading to Ethiopia.
After one month and 15 pounds lighter, we are aboard the Norwegian freighter, the M. S. Concordia Fonn of Hauge, Norway. She is a 9,500-ton vessel heading for ports in the Sudan, Ethiopia and the Persian Gulf. The ship regularly visits the Island of Sicily, Italy, France, Canary Islands and many ports in the U.S.A.
The crew life aboard ship is like any other eight-hour job. The men begin work at seven in the morning and finish at five in the evening. The officers also follow a routine of this nature. The ship has 42 members in all, with most of the mates being from Norway, except for five Spaniards, one Italian, and one Englishman. The average age of all is approximately 30, which makes for a young and happy crew. The daily food is based on a diet of potatoes, fish, vegetables and various meats. Sardines and cheese spreads are always found on the table along with coffee or tea.
The seaman have a union, but are not required to join. The union acts as the bargaining unit, but has had little success in achieving their demands. Advancement can be gained in a crew member's life by attending special schools. The only cost is for books, while tuition is free. The school session lasts for a 10-week study period, for which one rank can be attained. Along with this schooling, the crew member must accumulate a certain amount of years on the sea before he can advance to the next higher rank.
Life for us on the "Concordia Fonn" has been a new and wonderful adventure. Our job is classified as "engine boy." This means we clean the engine with soap and water, or with cutting oil from seven in the morning till five in the evening.
The officers and crew of the "Fonn" are very warm and hospitable. They are sincere and energetic. We have made many new friends and have received many courtesies aboard this ship. We have been very fortunate to sail with such nice people, and we shall always be indebted to them.

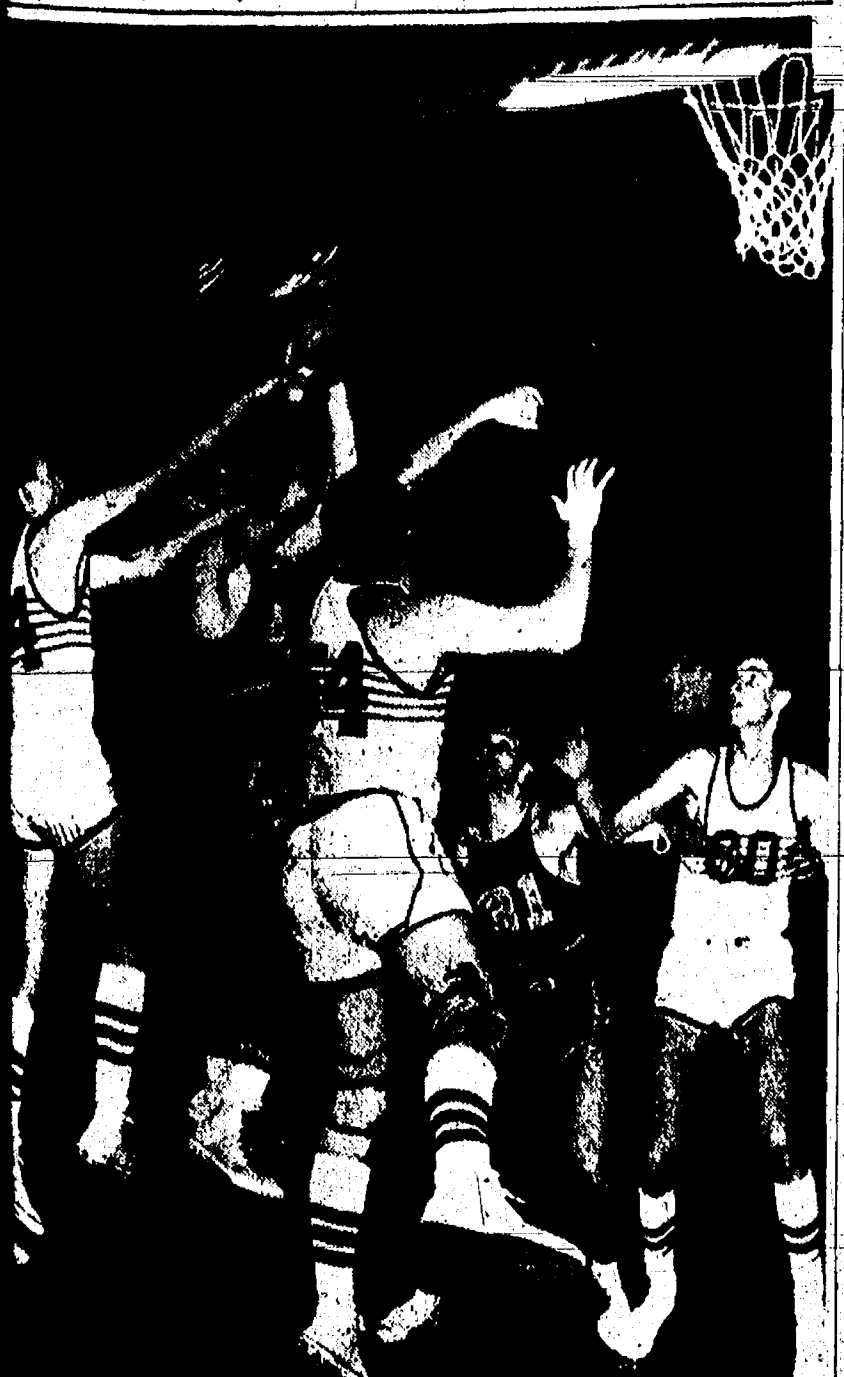
Tickets may be obtained at Chelsea Lanes now and through Dec. 13 or from most any Key club member.

Difficult Job

A long, long session of the 1966 legislature is almost assured by several factors, not the least of which is the impending state government reorganization.

Odd-year sessions are traditionally longer than those in election years, but the Democratic majority-Republican administration situation makes for an even more intensive fight over reorganization than was previously anticipated.

The 1963 Constitution gave the legislature until 1966 to set down new government divisions, sharply lessening the number of independent agencies. Democratic leaders in the two houses would like nothing more than to draw their own plan for the administration of state government.

To turn this job over to Republican Gov. George Romney could be disastrous to many of the Democratic appointees still holding top-level jobs in various departments to which they were named in the Williams and Swainson administrations.

Considerable time will be needed to accomplish reorganization, however, because the initial recommendations made to the legislature next year may not meet with Democratic approval.

Joint House-Senate committees have been working on implementation of the new Constitution, the past two years, including the interim period between sessions.

Because the Republicans controlled the 1963-64 legislative session, the top men on these committees were not Democrats and there were more GOP members on these working units.

Thus, the original recommendations to be made next session likely will be the result from these GOP-controlled committees, which have been in consultation with Romney's office during their deliberations.

Some agencies with Democratic chiefs likely would be made subdivisions of other units if Romney and GOP legislators had their way, but Democratic lawmakers will be out to preserve the high rank of those administrators who share their political persuasion.

Drunk Drivers

Attention must be given to an underlying problem if a major cause of traffic accidents is to be reduced, according to Secretary of State James M. Hare.

Hare notes that it has been estimated that the drinking driver causes up to 75 percent of all fatalities and personal injury accidents. This includes both the alcoholic and the so-called social drinker.

"In many cases, the real problem of alcoholism and its underlying psychological causes are completely ignored," said Hare. "Perhaps what is necessary is a law which would provide for automatic referral of such a person to an alcoholic treatment center and a suspension of his license until he is given a clean bill of health."

Tougher laws dealing with drinking drivers are definitely needed in any event, said the Secretary of State.

Hare emphasizes punitive action without treatment of the real problem would be valueless, however. Under present law, a person's license is taken if he is convicted of drunk driving twice in a year, but many get a lesser penalty if they prove a need for the license.

A considerable number of Michigan citizens are affected annually by the drunken driving law. In the first 9 months of this year, Hare's department revoked or suspended 4,635 licenses under this law, and 5,487 persons lost their licenses during all of 1963.

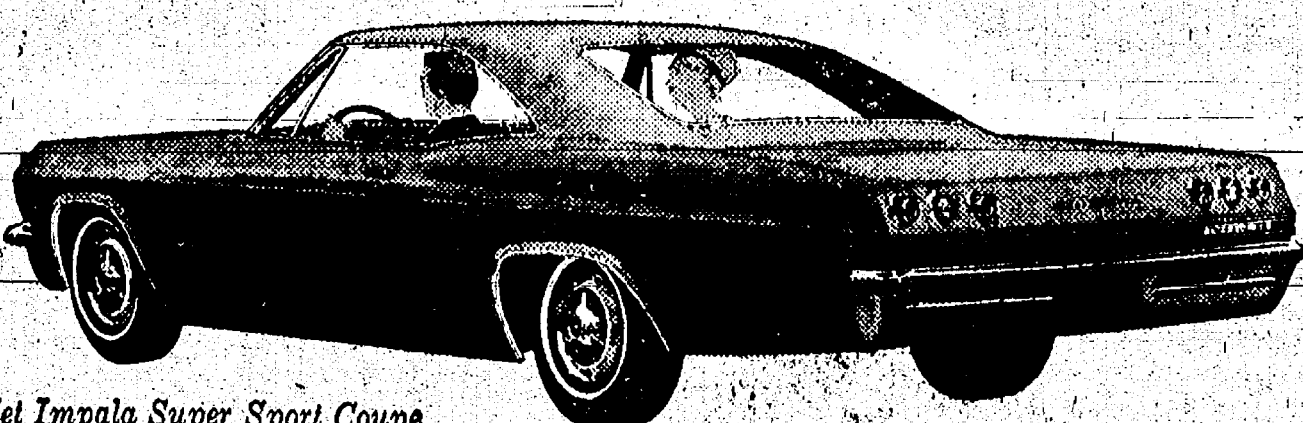

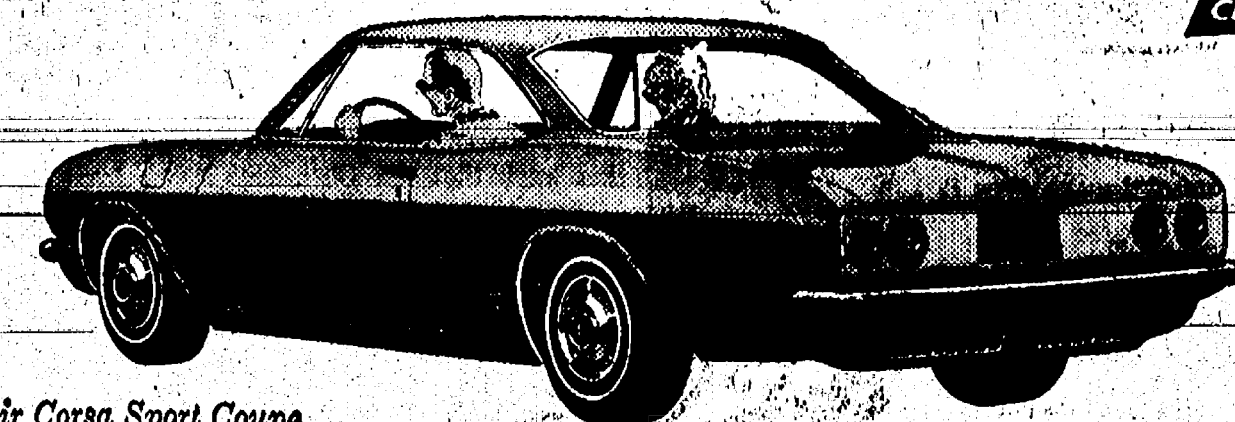

Dana Corp., UAW Reach Agreement

Tentative agreement was reached Sunday between the United Automobile Workers and the Dana Corp., covering about 180 workers at the firm's Chelsea Products Division, as well as employees of 10 other plants of the corporation in Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Terms of the three-year settlement affecting a total of about 6,000 workers, were withheld pending ratification votes by local units.

These provide for higher pensions and inducements for early retirement in wages-fringe benefits packages valued at 54 cents. The announcement by Mazzy and Hancy stated that terms of the settlement will be made public after local units have ratified the contract.

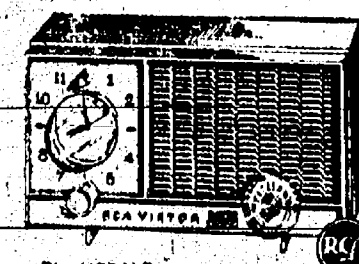

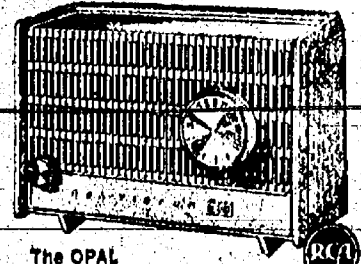

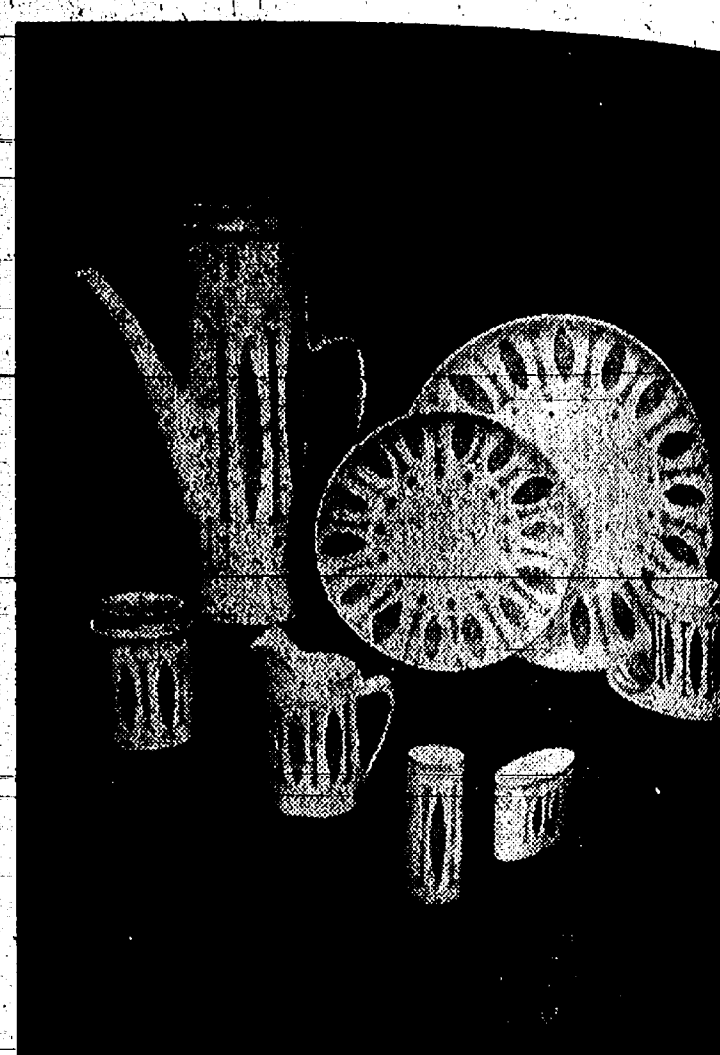

Bruce J. Schauer Sentenced on Charge of Negligent Homicide

Bruce J. Schauer, 18, who had pleaded "nolo contendere" (no contest) in Washington County Circuit Court Oct. 12 to a charge of negligent homicide, appeared in court Friday for sentencing and was placed on probation for two years.

Schauer was ordered to pay a fine of \$50, court costs of \$125 and restitution of \$1,389.30. The restitution covers expenses incurred by the family of the girl who was killed. She was the daughter of Mrs. Cecelia Howe of 543 W. Middle St., and the late James Howe.

At the tea, dolls will be on display before they are turned over to Chelsea Social Service for Christmas giving.

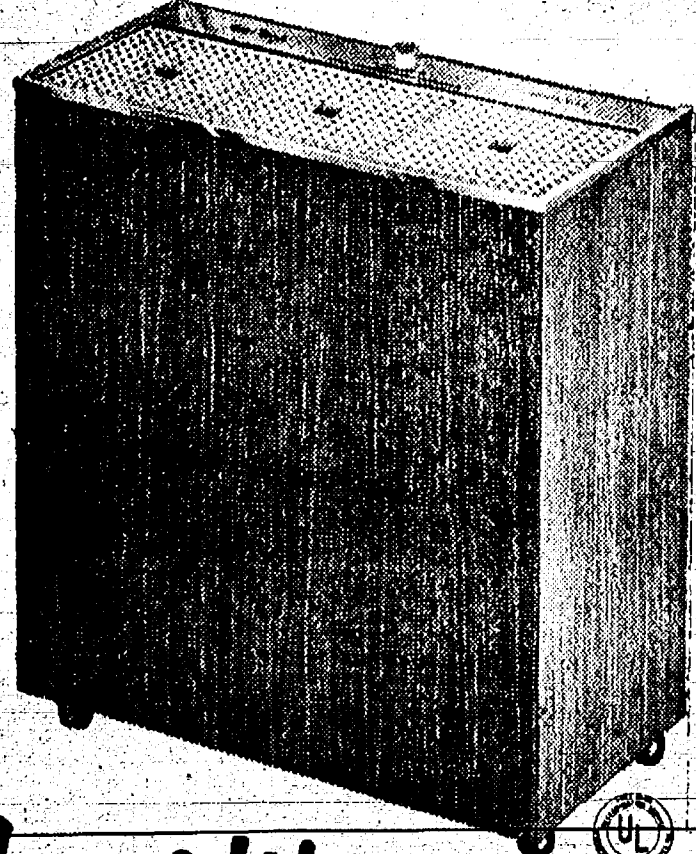
The doll project is an annual one—the Woman's club buys the dolls and women at the Home co-operate by sewing outfits to dress the dolls.

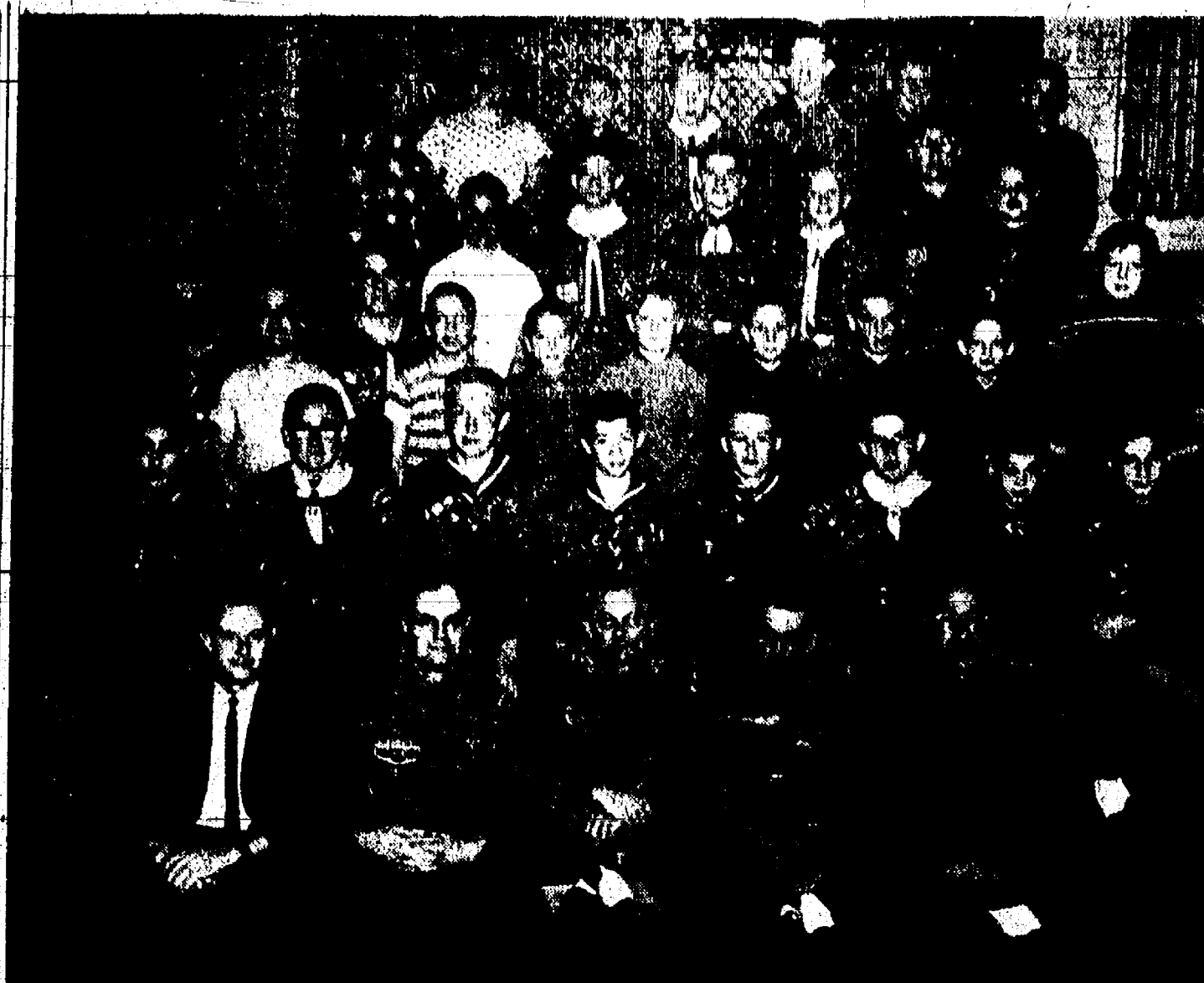
Transfer of Registration, Application, Time

SEC. 506. Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said registration record and the applicant shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk, who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

Linda Wahl Wins National Honors in English Studies

Linda Wahl, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Wahl, 7000 Clear Lake Rd., who is a senior at Chelsea High school has been cited as one of the outstanding students of high school English in the United States. The National Council of Teachers of English has named her a 1964 runner-up in its annual Achievement Awards competition.

It honors their high departments with certificates of merit.

The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

Transfer of Registration, Application, Time

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may, upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village, cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was transferred, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday, in which case such transfers shall be accepted during the next full working day), provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request, the election board, in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

Congressman-Elect Vivian in Washington For Briefing Sessions

Congressman-elect Weston E. Vivian of the Second Congressional District left for Washington, D.C. Tuesday, where he will spend about a week. He had a briefing session at the Department of State scheduled for afternoon Tuesday evening he met with the Secretary of Agriculture.

Wednesday Vivian took part in a day-long briefing session for all Democratic Congressman who were elected for their first term, last month. In the evening, the Congressmen were guests of President and Mrs. Johnson at a White House reception.

Vivian plans to spend the rest of this week and the first day or two of next week meeting with various officials in Congress and the executive branch. He will also be making arrangements to occupy office space in one of the office buildings assigned to members of the House of Representatives. The first step in this process consisted of a drawing among all newly-elected Congressmen. Following this drawing, Vivian will select the office which he and his Washington staff will occupy during the 89th Congress.

Members of Congress will take the oath of office on Monday, Jan. 4. Two days prior to this, Vivian will participate in a caucus of all Democratic Congressmen. At this Jan. 2 caucus, and subsequent ones early next month, decisions are expected to be made concerning the powers of the House Rules Committee, election of committee chairmen, and committee assignments. Decisions will also be made concerning the status of seniority of two or more Democratic Congressmen who actively opposed the national Democratic ticket, in the Presidential election.

THE NATIONAL OUTLOOK

By GEORGE HAGEDORN

★ The Right To Quit...

In our private enterprise system economic growth depends, obviously, on the freedom of individuals and corporations to establish new enterprises and expand old ones. It depends just as truly, but perhaps not so obviously, on the freedom to go out of business when the owners decide that is the best thing to do.

The reason is that every business operation involves risk, and few would be ready to undertake such risks in the knowledge that they might forever be denied the opportunity of calling it a day and cutting their losses. You might be willing to walk down a path even if you weren't absolutely sure where it was leading — but not if you were told in advance that you could never turn back.

Long Controversy
Yet there have been attempts on the part of federal regulatory bodies to limit or deny the right to go out of business — or to impose penalties that make business termination an ineffective way of cutting losses. One instance is the controversy between the National Labor Relations Board and the Darlington Manufacturing Company.

Darlington was a manufacturer of textiles which, after a series of difficulties, went out of business and liquidated all its assets in 1960. One of the factors, although only one, in the decision of the stockholders to liquidate was the fact that the Textile Workers Union had won a representation election early in the same year. The union had made promises to the employees involving demands that would have been very costly to the company.

After a long process of hearings, the National Labor Relations Board decided that Darlington was guilty of an unfair labor practice in closing down its plant. The Board then imposed the penalty on another corporation, Deering Milliken, Inc., which was part owner and sales representative for Darlington. Deering Milliken and certain other corporations for which it was also sales agent were held liable for paying wages or providing jobs for the displaced

employees from the time of Darlington's termination. Although this group had stockholders in common with Darlington, it also had stockholders who did not own shares in the liquidated company. Decision Awaited
The Board's decision was overruled by the U. S. Court of Appeals which decided that Darlington had an absolute right to go out of business and that the NLRB could not impose damages against other corporations. The union has appealed this decision to the U.S. Supreme Court which will consider it shortly.

If the Board's original ruling is reinstated, the immediate consequences for Deering Milliken and the other companies involved will be serious. Since eight years have elapsed, the cost of making up wages for unemployed workers would be huge. Persons who never owned any shares in Darlington, but who happen to be stockholders in the other companies, would have to bear part of this burden.

The ultimate consequences for the economy generally would also be serious. Investors could not be sure that, if losses developed, the alternative of going out of business would always be open to them. They would also have to face the fact that they might be required to pay penalties assessed

THE LETTERBOX

Dear Editor:

Dec. 10, our nation observes Human Rights Day. The United Nations has declared that liberty, equality and justice are the birthright of all men and women. In essence, these rights can be summed up in the Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Since this rule for personal relations, though worded differently, is a basic teaching of all the world's great religions, it would seem unnecessary to write it into a legal code of laws. Yet it has proved so difficult that it is uncertain when the UN Covenant on Human Rights will come into force. Everyone lies to consider these rights as his own birthright, but there are peoples and governments who, while demanding them for themselves, deny them to others... especially if of a different race, culture, color or religion.

It is our belief that human rights can only be established in terms of social status when members of the community think about reciprocal responsibilities and obligations, such as man to woman, woman to man; employer to employees, employees to employer, administrators to society, society to administrators, whether local, national or international, as responsibilities because of the shutdown of some other firm in which they had never been stockholders. This would hardly be the kind of atmosphere that encourages the new growth.

From 9 o'clock a.m. until 3 o'clock p.m. on each said day, for the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of the person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, to remain such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

Elector Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 115, P. A. 1954.)

Transfer of Registration—Application, Time

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may, upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village, cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved there, and the address to which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the old address, word and precinct number and record the new address, word and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election, unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day, provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application day by day by executing a request over his or her signature and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request, the election board shall place the registration card in the proper precinct file and the elector shall thereupon with the signature upon the applicant's registration card and the signatures of the election board members, be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.
