## Wrestlers Pin 58-0 Defeat on Dundee Team

### Strong Bulldog Matmen Set School Records in Ninth Consecutive Win

Chelsea's winning wrestling squad was too much for Dundee's experienced grapplers to deal with last Thursday, and the Bulldogs walked away with their first shut-out victory in the four-year history of Chelsea wrestling.

The victory over Dundee gave the Bulldogs their ninth consecutive win.

The score of 58-0 set a school record for the highest number of total points won in a match. The previous record was 45. Chelsea's 11 straight pins set another school record, while John McKeighan (138) tied the record number of individual points in a match as he won a 18-0 decision. All the other Bulldogs won by pins.

Mark Lancaster, Paul Stahl and Lauren Boyer are now tied for the most pins of the season, each with four.

Bill Lounsbury (120) checked in with the fastest pin of the night at Dundee, 20 seconds. Mike Hen-

dricks (138), one of the undefeated Bulldog wrestlers, won his fifth straight victory of the season with a third-round pin. Lauren Boyer (154), the other undefeated veteran, won with a 47-second pin in the first round. Boyer has won his last four matches by pins.

Senior John Bergman, in the first varsity match of his career, pinned his man in the third round. Mike Gaken (142) rounded out the match with the 11th straight pin of the night.

Chelsea's next match will be against Saline Jan. 25, 7 p.m., at Chelsea.

The Bulldogs' two-game winning streak came to an abrupt end at Manchester last Tuesday night, Jan. 10, as the Dutchmen overpowered Chelsea, 76-60.

The loss wasn't softened by the fact that the Bulldogs had held a 10-point lead at half-time. Manchester overcame that lead with ease in the third quarter, as the Bulldogs fell apart. In that third quarter, Manchester put 25 points on the scoreboard, while Chelsea could manage only eight.

In the first half, it looked as if the Bulldogs had the game well within their grasp as they out-shot, out-rebounded and generally out-hustled the Dutchmen. At one time in the second quarter, the Bulldogs led, 32-15.

John Lixey led the first-half Chelsea attack with 17 points and Wes Stinehelfer followed with eight.

The Dutchmen reversed the trend of the game in the second quarter as the Bulldogs seemed to fall asleep. The steady shooting of center Art Feldkamp, who scored 12 points in the first half and 10 in the second half, and the hustle and scoring ability of forward Larry Fielder—playing his first game since early December—kept the Bulldogs off balance in the second half.

John Lixey led scoring for Chelsea with 20 points. Wes Stinehelfer had 8, Larry Gaken, 7, Craig Houle, 6, Kim Filintot, 6, and Jack Risner and Ken Blass each hit for 2.

Council announced that in the future all zoning requests should be submitted through the Village Planning Commission.

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**INTERIOR GUTTED:** There wasn't much left of the living room in the house at 126 E. 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## Fire Destroys Interior of Don Coppennoll Residence

A fire early Saturday morning caused extensive damage to the Donald Coppennoll residence at 126 E. Middle St. and ruined most of the family's possessions, although no one was seriously injured in the fire.

Accounts of the fire indicate that Don Coppennoll was sleeping in the living room early Saturday morning when he was awakened by smoke and fire. He managed to alert his wife and their little girl, Camela, 2, who were both sleeping in downstairs bedrooms. The Coppennolls' nephew, Ronny Collins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Collins, Cavanaugh Lake, was also staying with the family. He was sleeping in an upstairs bedroom.

All occupants of the house escaped without serious injury, although Don Coppennoll suffered minor burns on his back. He was treated and released at the local medical clinic.

The fire apparently started in the living room, Coppennoll said that he did not know whether he might have fallen asleep while smoking. The family said that they suspect defective wiring in the living room may have caused the blaze.

All of the interior of the dwelling was destroyed.

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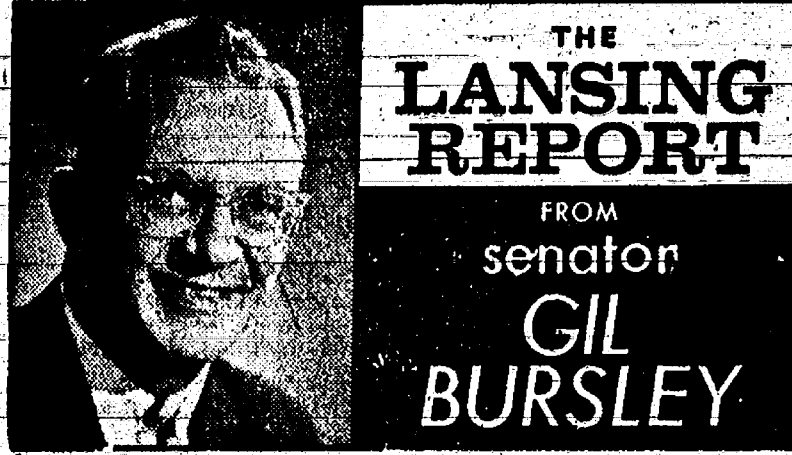

### Reduction Upward

Michigan's four percent sales tax could conceivably undergo its first cut in history this year if proposed fiscal reform is accomplished by the legislature.

Gov. George Romney is very aware that he will need some Democratic support for his tax revision plan if it is to pass.

At least one Democratic legislator has already indicated he could help the Governor if certain conditions were included to make the revision adequate, equitable and fair in his mind. One of the conditions cited by Rep. George F. Montgomery, D-Detroit, is that the sales tax be dropped from food purchases.

Removal of the sales levy on food has been proposed many times before; usually in bill form combined with prescription drug sales.

Since so many other things are sold in grocery stores these days, most of the ideas presented in past sessions have specified that the tax-free status would apply only to grocery items: meats, fruits, vegetables, and some staples, but not to candy, soft drinks and alcoholic beverages.

Basic theory behind proposed elimination of the sales tax from food and drugs is that the low income family spends a big share of its funds on these items and deserves a break.

Michigan's sales tax has never been decreased since it was first enacted in 1933.

In 1961, following a vote by the people, the legislature raised the rate from three to four percent.

### What Is Mental Retardation?

The incidence of mental retardation is appalling. Of the year's crop of babies in the United States from 100,000 to 200,000 are born destined to be mentally retarded. At present there are approximately five and one-half million mentally retarded individuals in the country. This figure is expected to rise by a million by 1970.

There are three levels of mental retardation. At the first level are the mildly retarded who are educable and may be found within most of our public schools in special classrooms. The moderately retarded generally attend a day school and will eventually be involved in unskilled or semi-skilled labor. The third type, the severely retarded, will never be capable of taking care of themselves and in most cases are institutionalized.

The causes for mental retardation are numerous. Three-quarters of these cases are born with this defect without a clear diagnosis. However, one-quarter of all cases may be attributed to a specific

disease or other factor that may be identified. These causes include German measles during the first three months of pregnancy, meningitis and syphilis. Retardation may also be caused by an RH blood factor of incompatibility, lead poisoning, lack of oxygen or an accident which damages the head. There are a number of metabolic disorders that also cause mental retardation. The most common one is PKU or phenylketonuria.

Much research is being conducted in the fields of pathology, biochemistry, psychology, genetics, and social work, etc. We now have the famous diaper test for PKU and have found a way to control it when discovered by a strict diet. Hydrocephaly (fluid on the brain which causes pressure on the brain and an abnormally large head) may now be corrected by surgery and the insertion of the hatter valve which drains the fluid. Jaundice created by the RH factor may be prevented by a complete blood transfusion in the infant at the time of birth.

We have accomplished much but we have much more to discover and learn about this problem. Remember that with this great incidence of retardation it affects approximately 1 out of 30 families every year. These articles are part of a community service project called HELP MRS (Help Emotionally Disturbed Little People and Mentally Retarded to Succeed) sponsored by the Chelsea Jaycee Auxiliary.

These facts and figures have been taken from information printed by the NARC National Association for Retarded Children.

Parents, in seeking to help their children, might remember that responsibility often develops unsuspected talent.

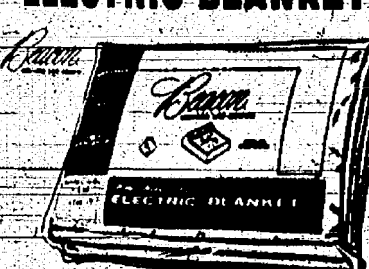

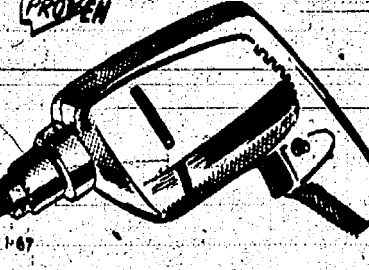

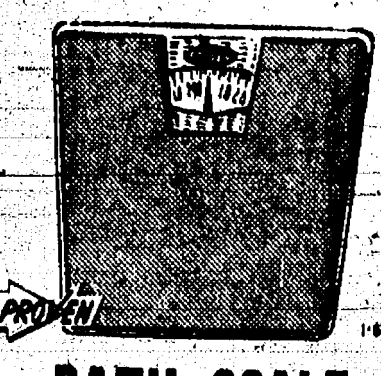

### Elector Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths, and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

### Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

### Transfer of Registration, Application, Time

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the 30-day next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day), provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

### Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request, the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

## W. Vivian Returns To Position with Conduetron Corp.

## Economic Act Amendment Offers New Rural Resources

Additional and much needed resources for hard-pressed, low-income Michigan rural people desiring to improve their farm income or start businesses will be provided through an amendment to Title III of the Economic Act recently signed by President Johnson.

This fact was pointed out this week by Carl L. Robinson, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor for Lenawee, Monroe and Washtenaw counties with offices at Salline, Michigan.

"This important Economic Opportunity Act amendment increases from \$2,500 to \$3,500 the maximum war-on-poverty loans that the USDA Farmers Home Administration can make to individual Michigan farmers or other rural residents," county supervisor Robinson said.

This amendment also authorizes additional credit to borrowers as long as their outstanding indebtedness for an economic opportunity loan does not exceed \$3,500.

"The new economic opportunity loan provisions will more adequately cover the financing of needed land, working quarters and equipment needed to establish many Michigan economic opportunity individual enterprises on a sound basis," Supervisor Robinson explained. "Another important point is that the program can now supplement original loans with necessary capital for improvements or expansion."

Since this Office of Economic Opportunity loan program started in January 1965, the Farmers Home Administration has extended \$10,180 in credit to five local families and \$52 million in loans to more than 30,000 families throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

Economic Opportunity borrowers throughout the nation are operating more than 400 different kinds of non-agricultural enterprises in addition to farming as a result of credit extended through this program.

No one can condemn the goodness in being a Good Samaritan, but there are times when common sense should tell us NOT to be a Good Samaritan. A Good Samaritan motorist is victimized by a hitchhiker almost every day. In one place or another, an incident of robbery, rape, murder or physical violence is reported. Just as you can not tell a book by its cover, you can not, in an instant of stopping, determine a deserving, decent hitchhiker from a thumb-bum hoodlum. Yet, despite widespread police warnings, drivers continue to pick up hitchhikers. These Good Samaritan drivers are literally asking for trouble.

Not too long ago, the New Jersey state police investigated turnpike hitchhikers. They found 162 runaways, 98 AWOI, service men, 7 escapees from mental hospitals, and 5 escaped convicts. In addition, fingerprints identified 500 others with criminal records.

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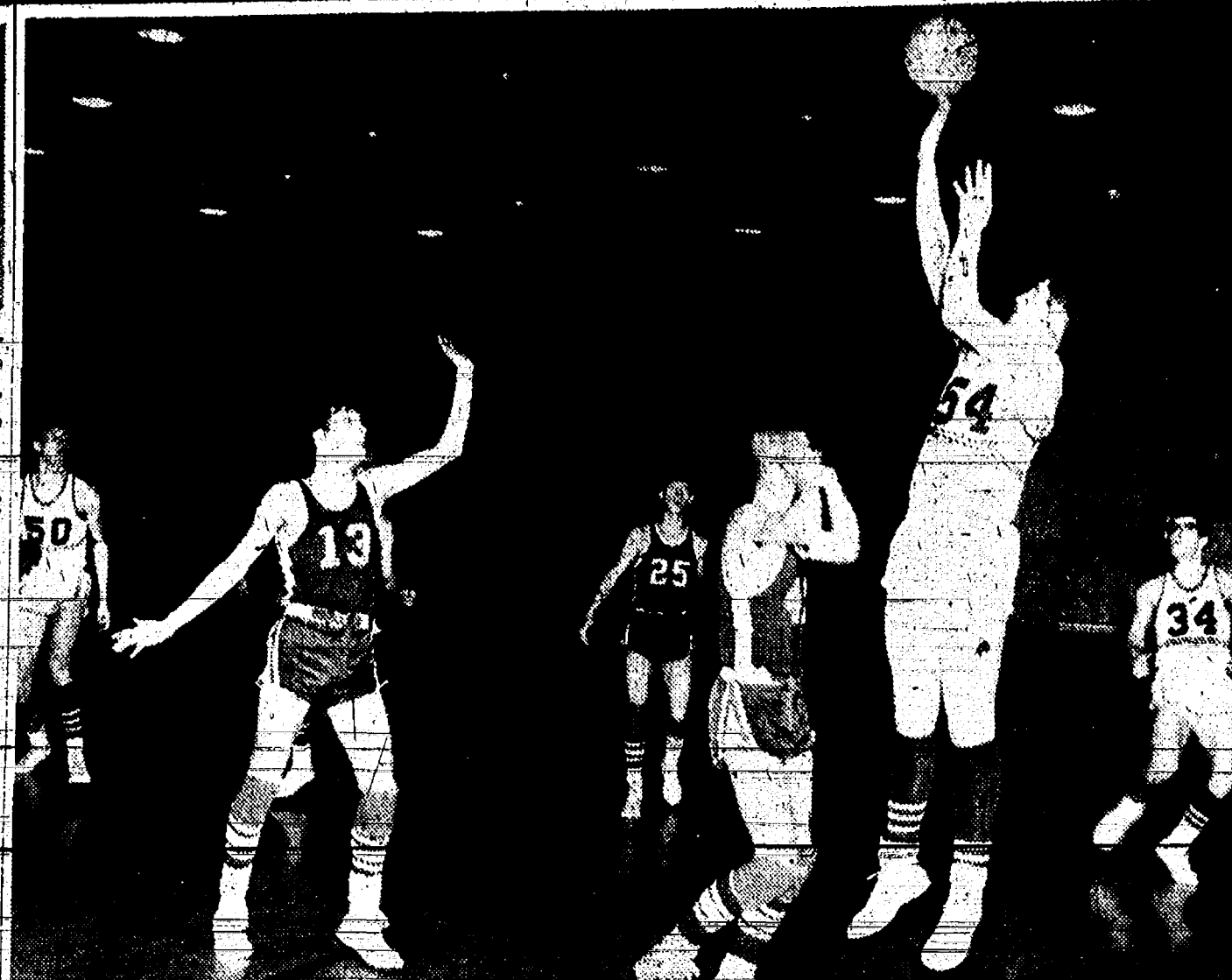

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## School Board Hopeful of Adjusting Teachers' Salaries

Robert K. Taylor, Treasurer Chelsea Board of Education, last spring the Board of Education entered into a collective bargaining agreement covering salaries and other employment conditions with the Chelsea Education Association, the exclusive bargaining organization for all our teachers.

The manner in which CEA representatives conducted themselves during negotiations showed them to be the true professionals they are. This competitive of local teachers demonstrated a fine spirit of co-operation and dedication to the community they serve. They remained concerned for a sound,

reasonable approach to the resolution of our problems through out.

In this atmosphere, we were able to conclude a three-year contract on June 30 without having to experience the turmoil, ill-feelings and crises which many of our state's school districts faced and are facing even now.

It could have been otherwise. The CEA's goals, in which they feel well justified, are no less than those of all teachers throughout the state. These goals and desires were by no means vacated, nor were their responsibilities abrogated, when the CEA contracted without resorting to the threat of walking out, imposing sanctions, playing to public opinion, or other tactics to force more than the Board felt it could handle at the present.

They chose rather to work in harmony to continue their dedicated service in the education of our children. They chose, in large measure, to place their faith in the School Board and in the community.

The written contract is founded upon our pledge as concerned men to ask this school district to support a program of sub-

stantial teacher salary improvement for next year.

Our written contract will be in force for three years. Next year's salary is already fixed. It provides for a modest increase over this year. We are not legally obligated to change it. But I believe we must for several reasons: It is not sufficient for the services rendered and its importance to the community; it is not competitive with wages and salaries elsewhere in the community and in other professional fields, and it will not be adequate to compete for and hold the kind of teachers we all want in the Chelsea system.

Between now and spring's millage election the Board will consider this problem. I am hopeful they will agree to present you a millage proposal containing enough to do a fair job for our teachers.

Visit a school board meeting in the near future and express your feelings on the question of adequate teacher salaries. Your comments and support will be of great interest to us. Your concern will be appreciated by the teachers charged with the responsibility to educate your children. They deserve it.

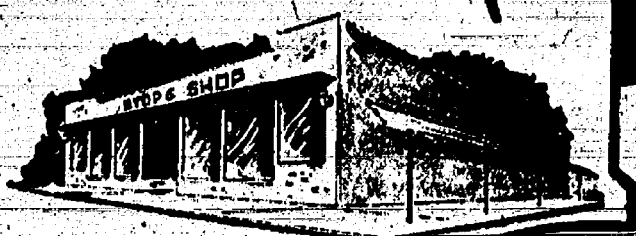

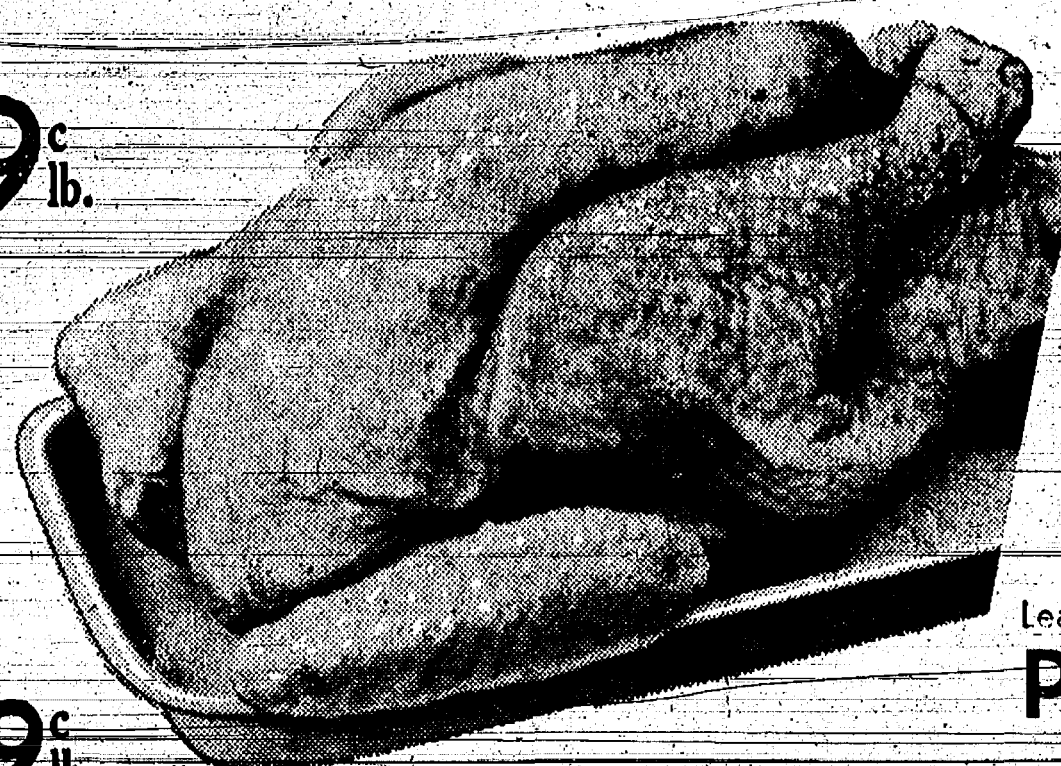

## Ordinance 69

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING, REGULATING AND LICENSING PEDDLERS AND SOLICITORS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF IN THE VILLAGE OF CHELSEA, MICHIGAN.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the business of peddler or that of solicitor or canvasser, as defined in Section 2 of this Ordinance, without first obtaining a permit and license in compliance with the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 2. Definitions.

A. The word "person" as used herein shall include the singular and the plural and shall also include any person, firm, partnership, association, club, corporation or society, or any other organization.

B. The word "peddler" as used herein shall include any person, whether a resident of the Village of Chelsea or not, traveling by foot or any type of conveyance, from place to place, from house to house, or from street to street, taking or attempting to take orders for the sale of goods, wares, merchandise, personal property of any nature for future delivery, or for services to be furnished or performed in the future, whether or not such person has carried or exposes for sale a sample of the subject of such sale, or whether he is collecting advance payments on such sales or not.

## Section 3. Application.

Applicants for permit and license under this Ordinance must apply with the Village Clerk a sworn application in writing, in duplicate, on a form to be furnished by the Village Clerk, which shall give the following information:

- Name and description of the applicant.
- Address, both legal and local.
- Brief description of the nature of business and goods or services to be sold.

D. If employed, the name and address of the employer, together with credentials establishing the exact relationship.

E. The length of time for which the right to do business is desired.

F. If a vehicle is to be used, a description of the same, together with license number.

G. A photograph of the applicant, taken within sixty (60) days prior to the date of the filing of the application, which picture shall be 2" by 2" showing the head and shoulders of the applicant in a clear and distinguishing manner.

H. A statement as to whether or not the applicant has been convicted of any crime, misdemeanor or ordinance violation, the nature of the offense, the punishment or penalty assessed therefor.

I. At the time of filing the application, a sum to cover the cost of investigation of the facts therein stated, not to exceed Ten Dollars (\$10.00), shall accompany said application, the determination of cost to be made by the Chief of Police.

Section 4. Investigation and Issuance.

Upon receipt of such application the original shall be referred to the Chief of Police, who shall cause such investigation of the applicant's business and moral character to be made as he deems necessary for the protection of the public good.

If, as a result of such investigation, the character and business responsibility of the applicant are found to be satisfactory, the Chief of Police shall endorse on such application his disapproval and his reasons for the same, returning the said application to the Village Clerk who shall notify the applicant that his application is disapproved and that no permit and license will be issued.

If, as a result of such investigation, the character and business responsibility of the applicant are found to be satisfactory, the Chief of Police shall endorse on such application his approval, returning the same to the Village Clerk who shall, upon payment of the prescribed license fee, deliver to the applicant his permit and issue a license. Such license shall contain the signature of the Village Clerk and shall show the name, address and photograph of said licensee, the class of license issued, the kind of goods or services to be sold thereunder, the amount of fee paid, the date of issuance and the length of time the same shall be operative.

Section 5. Fees.

The license fee shall be for each individual salesman license the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per year; the license to extend until the expiration of the calendar year in which the license was issued.

No fee shall be charged for one selling products of the farm or orchard actually produced by the seller.

No fee shall be charged for one selling goods or services for charitable and non-profit organizations.

None of the license fees provided for by this Ordinance shall be so applied as to occasion an undue burden upon interstate commerce. In any case where a license fee is believed by a licensee or applicant for license to place an undue burden upon such commerce, he may apply to the president of the Village for an adjustment of the fee so that it shall not be discriminatory, unreasonable or unfair as to such commerce. The applicant shall, by affidavit and supporting testimony, show his method of business and the gross volume and estimated gross volume of business and such other information as the president may deem necessary in order to determine the extent, if any, of such undue burden on such commerce. The president shall then conduct his investigation, comparing applicant's business with other businesses of like nature and shall make findings of fact from which he shall determine whether the fee fixed by this Ordinance is unfair, unreasonable or discriminatory as to applicant's business and shall fix a license fee for the applicant, an amount that is fair, reasonable and non-discriminatory, provided, however, that the amount fixed does not exceed the fees as hereinbefore prescribed in this Ordinance.

Section 6. Bond.

Any applicant, not a resident of the Village of Chelsea for not more than thirty (30) days, shall file with the Village Clerk a surety bond, running to the Village in the amount of \$1,000.00, with surety acceptable to and approved by the said applicant, conditioned that the said applicant shall comply fully with the provisions of the ordinances of the Village of Chelsea and the statutes of the State of Michigan regulating and concerning the businesses of solicitor and peddler and guaranteeing to any citizen of the Village of Chelsea that all money paid as a down payment will be accounted for and applied according to the representations of the solicitor and further guaranteeing to any citizen of the Village of Chelsea doing business with said solicitor that the property purchased will be delivered according to the representations of said solicitor.

Section 7. The Village Clerk shall issue to each licensee, at the time of delivery of his license, a badge which, in the instance of a peddler shall contain the words, "Licensed Peddler" and in the instance of a solicitor, "Licensed Solicitor," the period for which the license is issued and the number of the license. Such badge shall be worn constantly by the licensee on the front of his hat or outer garments in such a way as to be conspicuous during such time as said licensee is engaged in peddling and soliciting.

Section 8. Peddlers and Solicitors are required to exhibit their licenses at the request of any citizen.

Section 9. It shall be a duty of any police officer of the Village of Chelsea to require any person seen soliciting or peddling and who is not known by such officer, to be duly licensed, to produce his peddler's license or his solicitor's license and to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance against any person found to be violating the same.

Section 10. Revocation of License.

Permits and licenses issued under the provisions of this Ordinance may be revoked by the Chief of Police of the Village of Chelsea after notice of hearing for fraud, misrepresentation, or false statements, any violation of this Ordinance or the commission of an unlawful act. Any person aggrieved by the action of the Chief of Police or Village Clerk in the denial of an application of license, or on the revocation of a license, shall have the right to appeal to the council of the Village of Chelsea. Such appeal shall be taken by filing with the council, within fourteen (14) days after notice of the action complained of, a written statement setting forth fully the grounds for the appeal. The council shall set a time and place for hearing on such appeal. The decision and order of the council on such appeal shall be final and conclusive.

Section 11. All annual licenses issued under the provisions of this Ordinance shall expire on the 31st day of December in the year when issued. Other than annual licenses shall expire on the date specified in the license.

Section 12. Penalty.

Any person, operator, proprietor, firm or corporation violating or permitting the violation of the provisions of this Ordinance, as hereinbefore set forth, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or may be sentenced to imprisonment not to exceed ninety (90) days, or both, at the discretion of the court.

Section 13. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 14. This ordinance shall be in force and effect twenty (20) days after its passage and after its publication.

## Elector Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which he is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

## Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

## Transfer of Registration, Application, Time

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address to which he wants his registration transferred, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, word and precinct number and record the new address, word and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day), provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

## Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration record, and (which) not be necessary for the elector to change his registration when such change is made in order to be eligible to vote.

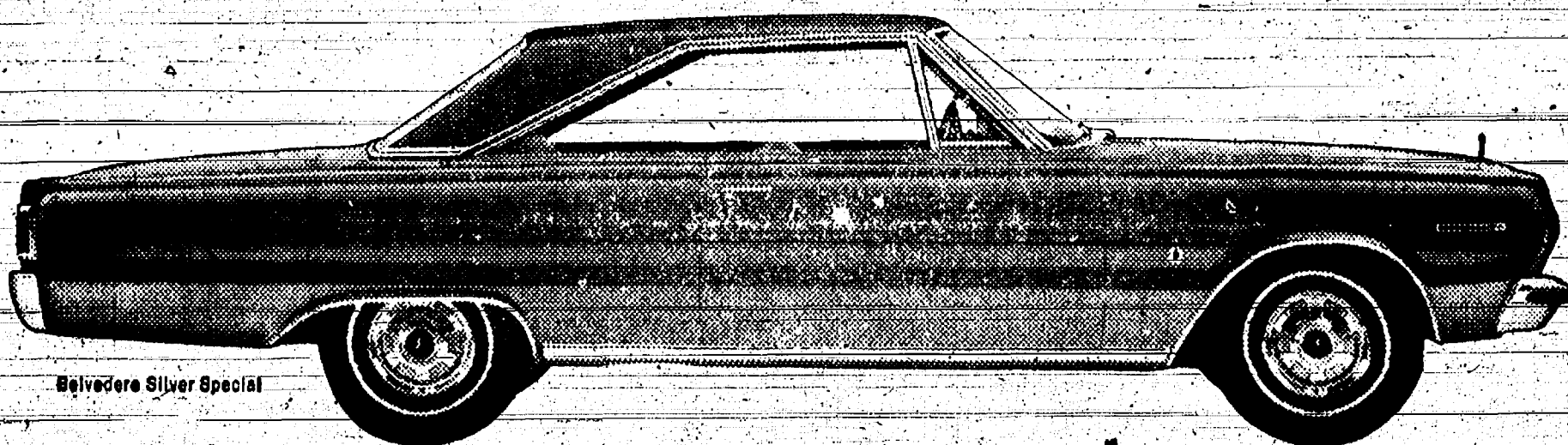

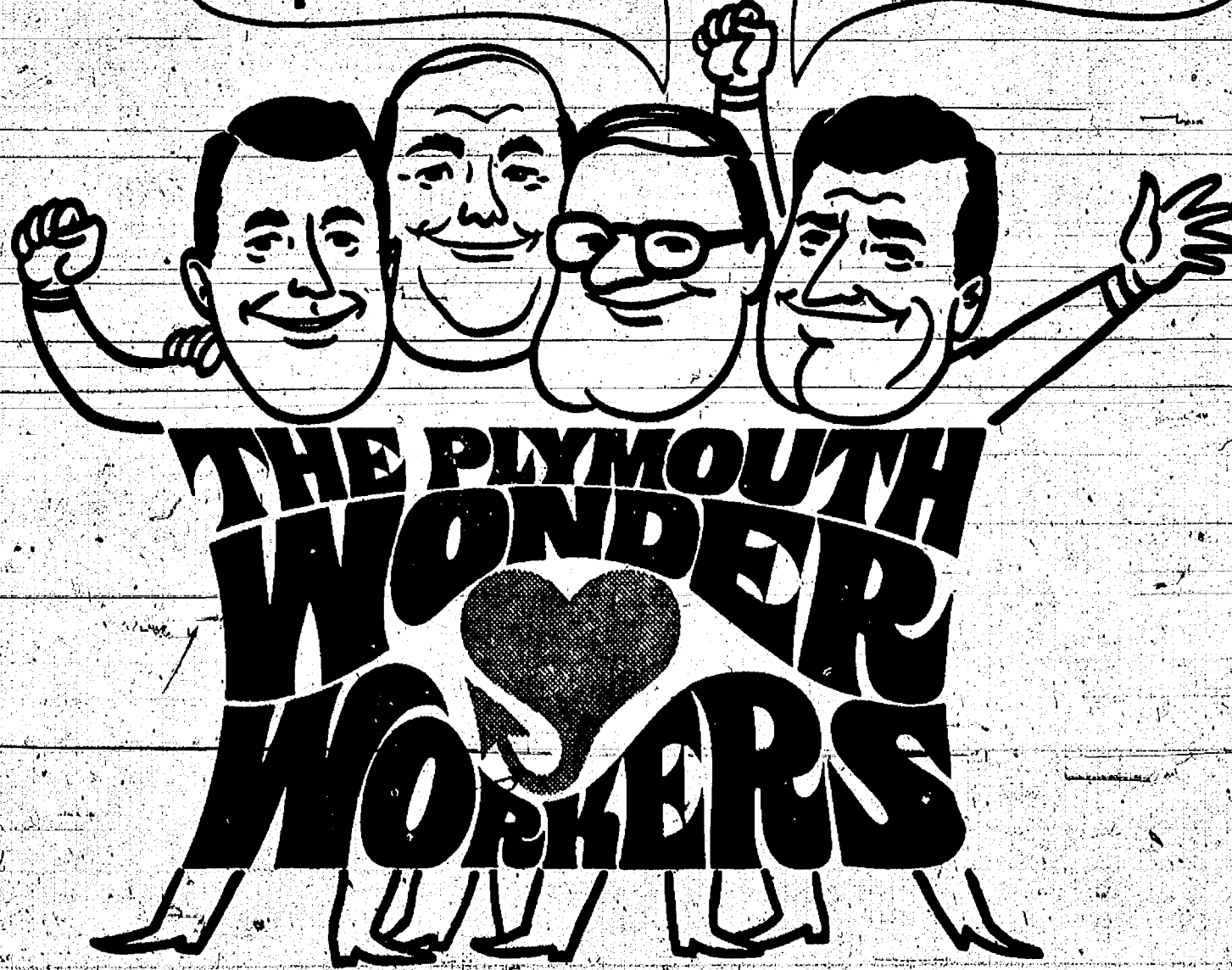

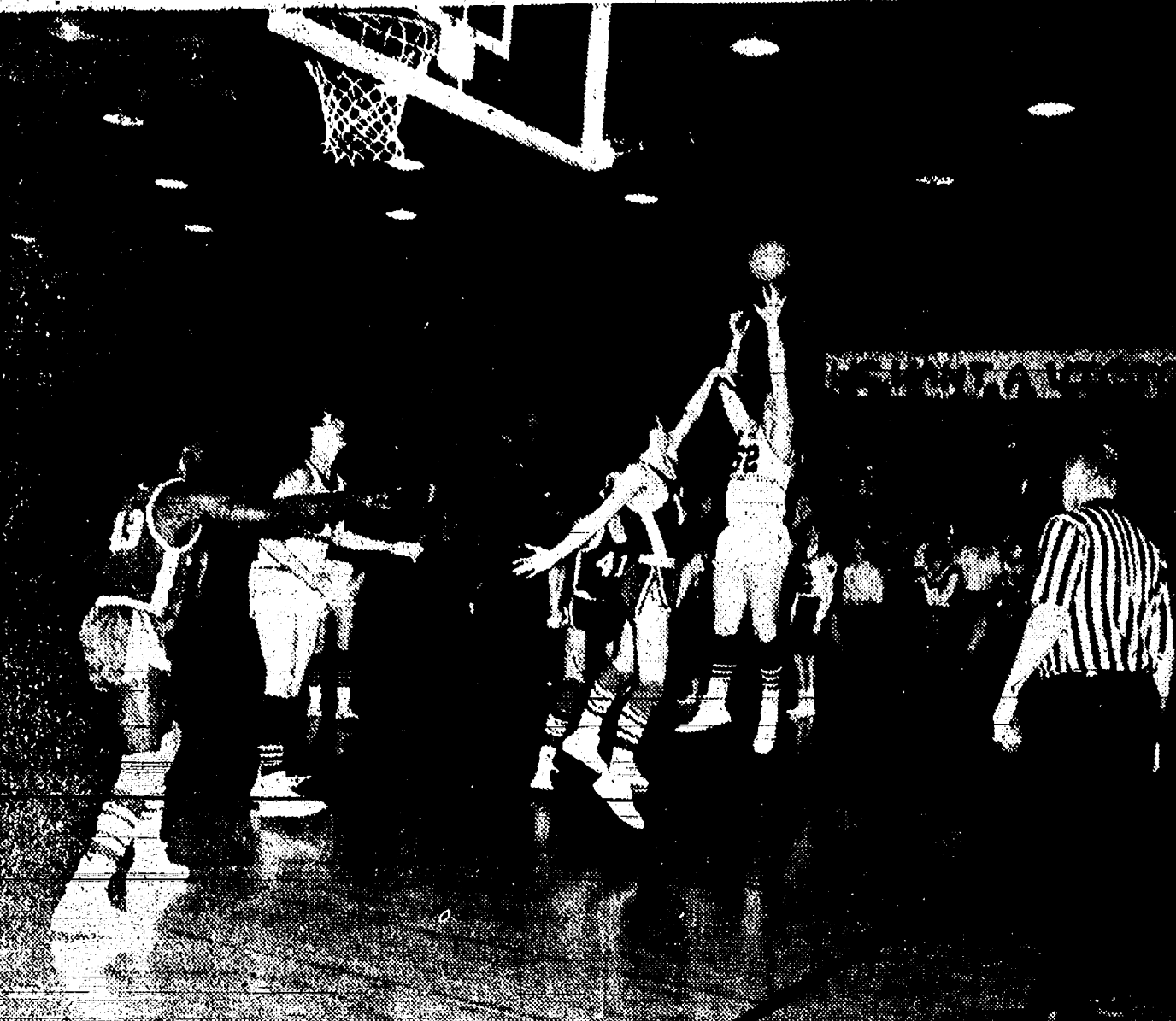

## F. Robinson Named Sport Magazine 'Man of the Year'

New York — Frank Robinson has been named Sport Magazine's "Man of the Year" for 1966 in its 20th annual "Top Performer" selections appearing in the current issue of the magazine.

The Baltimore Oriole superstar, who was also named Sport's "Top Performer in Baseball," had his finest season after being traded away by the Cincinnati Reds in one of the most controversial deals in baseball history. Robinson was sent to Baltimore for pitchers Milt Pappas and Jack Baldschun, and rookie outfielder Dick Simpson.

Say the editors of Sport in explanation of their choice of Robinson as "Man of the Year" and "Top Performer in Baseball": "Frank Robinson did it all. He led the league in batting .310; he led the league in home runs, 49; he led the league in runs batted in, 122. He became the first man in the majors to win the triple crown since 1950. He became the first man ever to win the Most Valuable Player award in both leagues.

"And he continued his onslaught in the World Series," add the Sport editors, "starting the rout of the Dodgers with a first-game, first-inning home run, and ending it in the fourth game with the home run that gave the Orioles a 1-0 victory and a sweep of the Series.

"Is it any wonder that that Sport should honor Frank Robinson as its 'Man of the Year' for 1966?" ask the editors.

Another special award covering the entire world of sports goes to high-scoring Rick Barry of the San Francisco Warriors, named "Top Performer in Pro Football," and Steve Spurrier of the Uni-

versity of Florida received the "Top Performer in College Football" award.

In basketball, Bill Russell of the Boston Celtics received the "Pro" citation and Cazzie Russell of Michigan was his "College" counterpart. High-scoring Bobby Hull of the Chicago Blackhawks won "Top Performer in Hockey" honors.

The "Top Performer in Boxing" was heavyweight champion Cassius Clay and Don Schollander of Yale captured "Top Performer in Swimming and Diving" honors.

World record-breaking distance runner Jim Ryun of the University of Kansas ran off with the "Top Performer in Track and Field" trophy, while Billy Casper took the honors for "Golf." The only four-legged winner, Buckpasser, is "Top Performer in Racing," completing Sport Magazine's 1966 awards listings.

## Dannemiller Seeks Probate Court Post

William F. Dannemiller, an Ann Arbor resident who maintains a law practice in Ypsilanti, this week joined two other announced candidates in filing for Washtenaw County's vacant probate judgeship.

Ross W. Campbell and Rodney E. Hutchinson had previously announced candidacy for the post. The election to fill the vacancy will be April 3. The entrance of a third candidate in the race ensures that a special primary will be held Feb. 20 to choose two candidates for the April election.

Filing deadline for the post was Monday, Jan. 16. The new judge will succeed John W. Conlin, who was elected to a circuit court judgeship in November.

Dannemiller, a resident of Washtenaw County for 25 years, is a graduate of the University of Michigan and the U-M law school.

He was on the legal staff of the Ford Motor Co. for two years and is now engaged in private practice associated with the Detroit firm of Sugar, Schwartz and Silver.

He served as a referee in the juvenile division of probate court under Judge Conlin.

Dannemiller is on the board of directors of Michigan Children's Aid Society and has served as a project chairman for the Portage Trails Council of the Boy Scouts.

He is an elder and a member of the executive committee of the First Presbyterian church of Ann Arbor.

He lives with his wife, Kathleen, and their four children at 3871 Eli Rd., Ann Arbor.

In his announcement of candidacy Dannemiller said: "Judicial elections have far more importance than is usually accorded to them. The principal exercise of the authority vested in our government is through the powers of the judiciary. Judges must therefore be especially vigilant against the arbitrary misuse of this power."

"A probate judge must exercise a special discretion in the handling of cases which come before him, since he is dealing with human beings who are less than ordinarily able to take care of themselves by virtue of age, mental condition, or the emotional stress of recent bereavement."



## Understanding your HEALTH

Recently you may have read stories concerning outbreaks of scarlet fever and strep throat that occurred in the state. Well, both of these diseases can be very serious, and I think you should know something about these symptoms so a doctor may be immediately called in to treat your child should he appear to be coming down with either illness.

Warning signs of strep infection are sore throat and a fever. If your child has these you should call your doctor at once. Scarlet fever symptoms are the same in the beginning, but a rash may appear two or three days after the first indications.

The scarlet fever rash is first seen on the neck and chest, but later it may spread to every part of the body usually with the exception of the face.

Both scarlet fever and strep throat are caused by a bacteria known as streptococci and are highly communicable. A strep infection is always serious because the germs may cause damage to the heart, kidneys and ears. Rheumatic fever may also follow the infection. These and other severe complications may also follow scarlet fever.

Strep infections are usually spread directly by the infected person through droplets from sneezing, coughing or close personal contact. The disease may also be spread by contact with articles he has used—such as handkerchiefs, towels, drinking cups and dishes.

With the diagnosis of scarlet fever your doctor will recommend prompt action. He will advise you to put your child to bed at once in a room by himself, and keep other members of the family away. Above all, you should keep the child in bed until your doctor gives permission for him to get up—this is the best way to protect his heart and kidneys.

In order to protect others in your family you must take strict precautions to make sure that they do not come into contact with the patient or with articles that he has used. This includes objects that he may have handled when he was coming down with the disease. Remember, only the doctor and the person caring for the child should enter the sickroom—scarlet fever is highly communicable and can spread quickly through your entire family.

The most important thing to do then, is to call your doctor when you suspect symptoms that indicate the possibility of strep throat or scarlet fever. Prompt medical treatment can quickly render the diseases non-infectious and reduce the possibility of any serious complications.

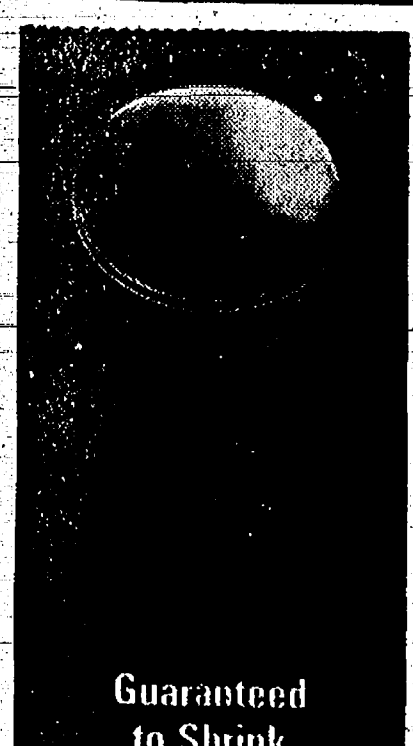

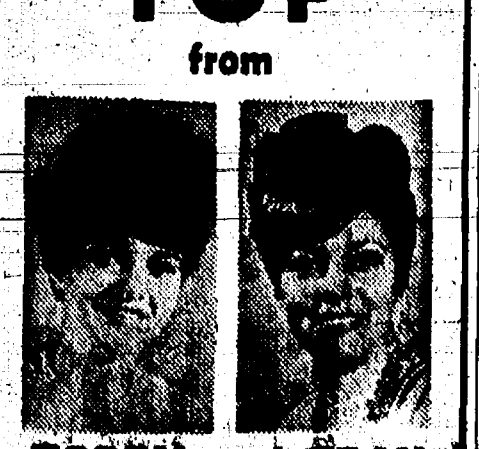

## MSU Experiments Helped Develop Food Irradiation

Some of the first experiments using irradiation to preserve foods were begun in Michigan State University's Department of Agricultural Engineering in 1955.

MSU scientists found that beta rays were very effective for destroying organisms in powdered products. Similar good results were also found when the beta rays were used to kill organisms within bacon and certain other products, such as wheat flour.

Practical uses are being found for this process which is being further developed by the U. S. Army.

## Modern Laundry Programs Set for Farmers' Week

Do year-in and year-out wash-day problems get you down? Up-to-date laundry methods are fading the blues out of old-fashioned Monday washdays.

Current laundry developments will headline Farmers' Week home-makers program Tuesday, Jan. 31 at Michigan State University.

Miss Mary Huck, director of home economics for Frigidare, will emphasize current laundry questions such as the handling of garments with durable press finishes.

In addition she'll discuss laundry care for other new fabrics, use and features on new laundry equipment and what practices a homemaker may use to contribute to a good laundry.

Miss Huck, who has a broad background in home service work, now directs all activities in home economics for her company, including automatic home laundering, food refrigeration and freezing, and electric cooking.

The home economist has been honored by organizations in Columbus, O., McCall's Magazine, and Ohio State University for her outstanding contributions to improved living standards. She's currently listed in the "Who's Who of American Women."

Miss Huck's discussion of up-to-date laundry methods is just one part of the four-day program for women offered by the Co-operative Extension Service. Other programs during the week will deal with water systems and supply, water using equipment, food preparation and spring fashions.

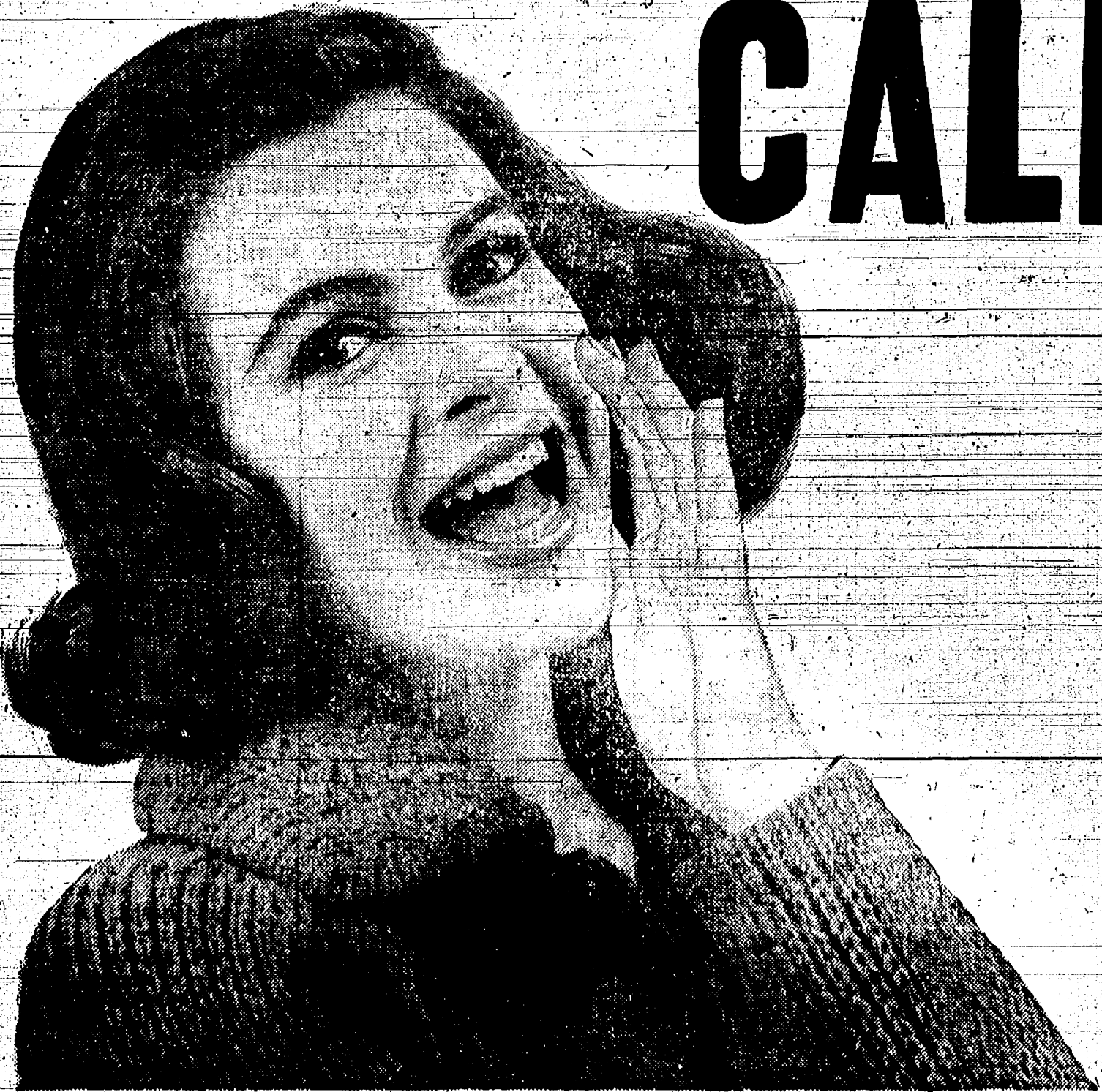

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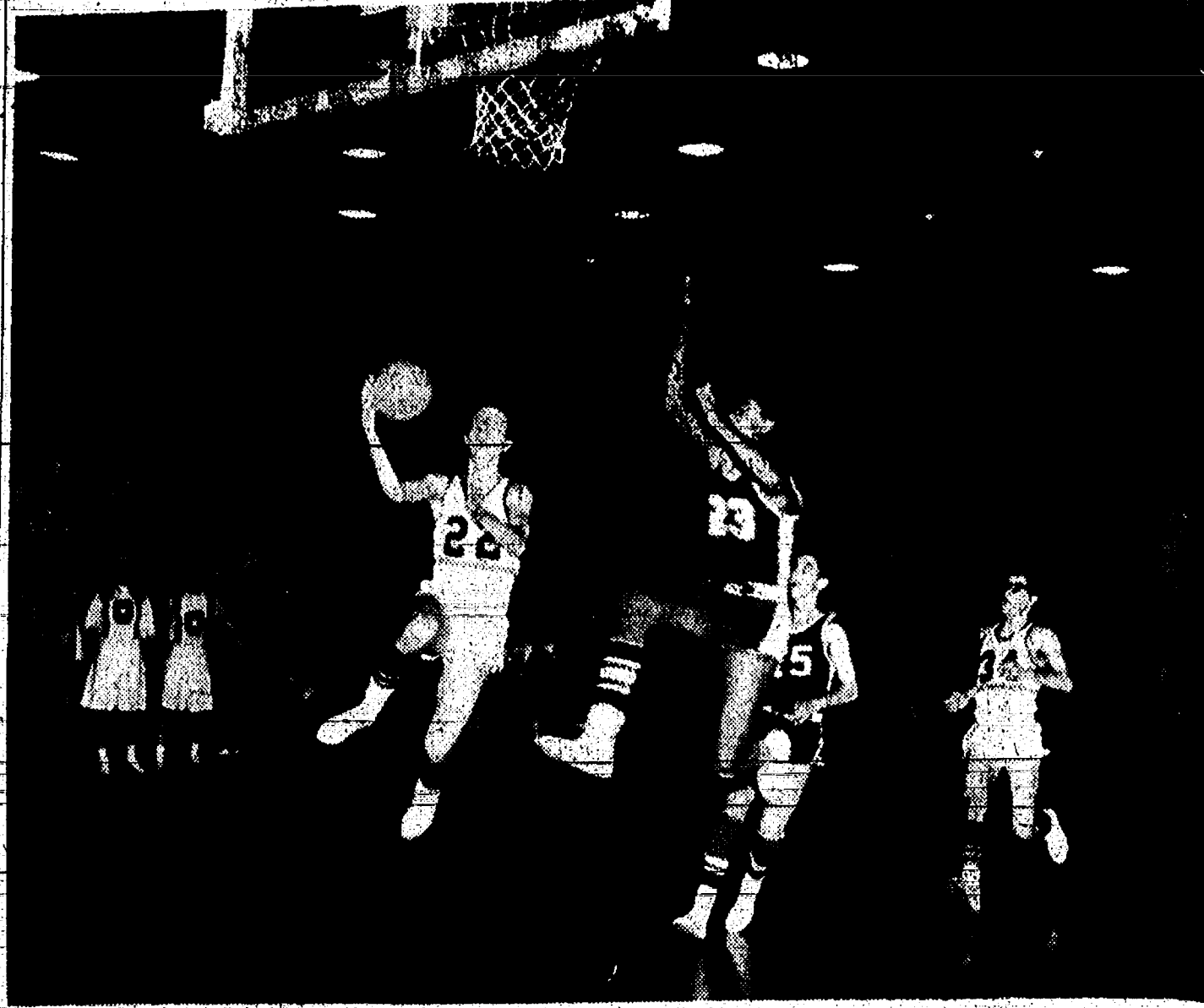

The officers of the local church were unanimous in expressing an interest in working with Chelsea St. Paul's United Church of

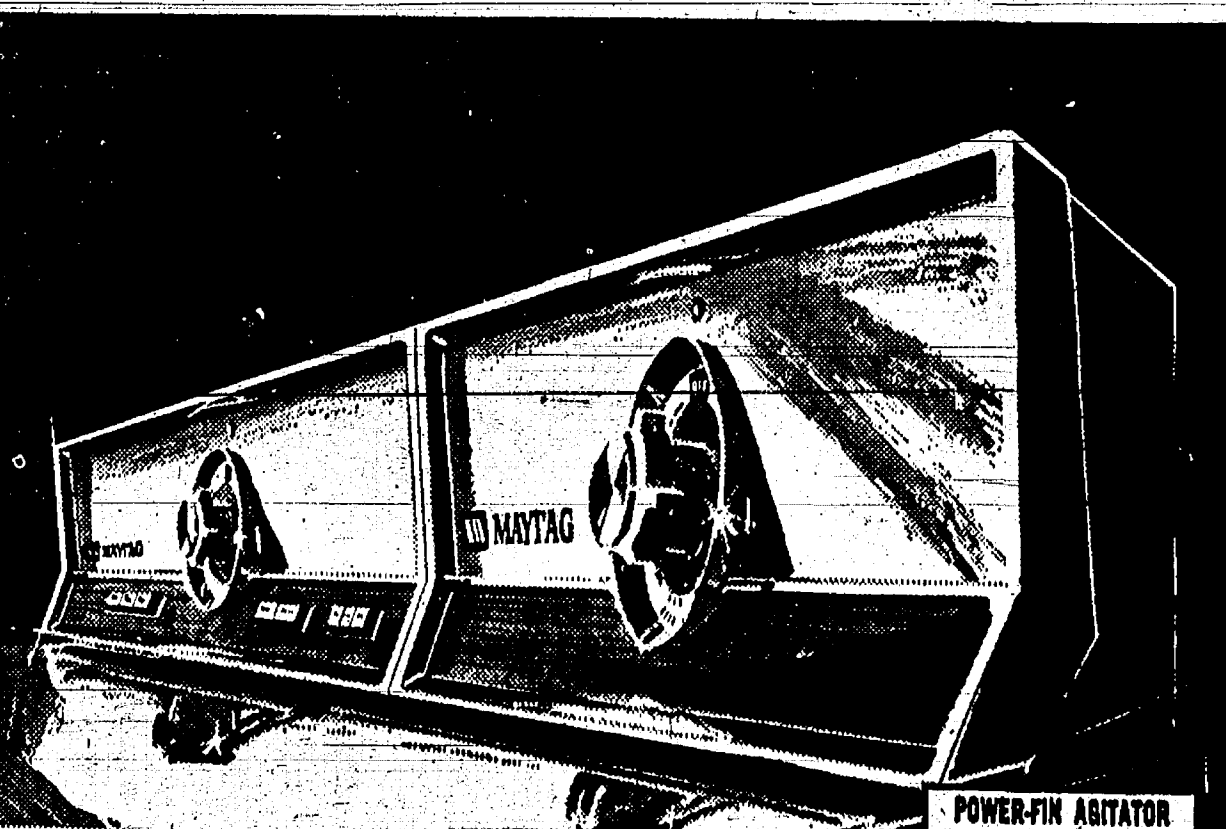
Christ for a better and more cooperative outreach in the community.
