During this past year there has been much examination and discussion of the Head Start Program. The Westinghouse Company, at the request of the Office of Economic Opportunity, has made a study of the program. The study has been the subject of much controversy and misinformation in the news media. As a member of the House Education and Labor Committee, I have studied the report carefully and feel a clarification is necessary of the relationship between the Westinghouse study and the Head Start program.

Background
 Head Start was conceived as a program to prevent pseudo-retardation due to cultural deprivation. It was a program to help children from low socioeconomic groups who were living in an environment which might not provide the opportunity for development of their true potential. This was the first national program designed to reduce these risks.

The Westinghouse Learning Corp. of Ohio studied the impact of various Head Start programs on more than 2,000 children. Tests were used to evaluate the understanding and learning ability of children as well as their personal development. The investigators found that the Head Start programs were effective in a few of the areas studied. Not surprisingly, the summer programs where students might be enrolled for only 30-45 days, contributed little to the children's growth.

The reactions to these findings have been diverse. The Westinghouse Study has been cited by those who support our early childhood programs as proof that a program is needed. Detractors of these programs cite this study as proof that programs such as Head Start cannot be effective.

A Perspective
 I feel that some of the more vocal participants in these arguments may have lost perspective on the basic issues. The Westinghouse Study is not an evaluation of the Head Start Program. Head Start was designed with medical, social and developmental goals. The Westinghouse Report

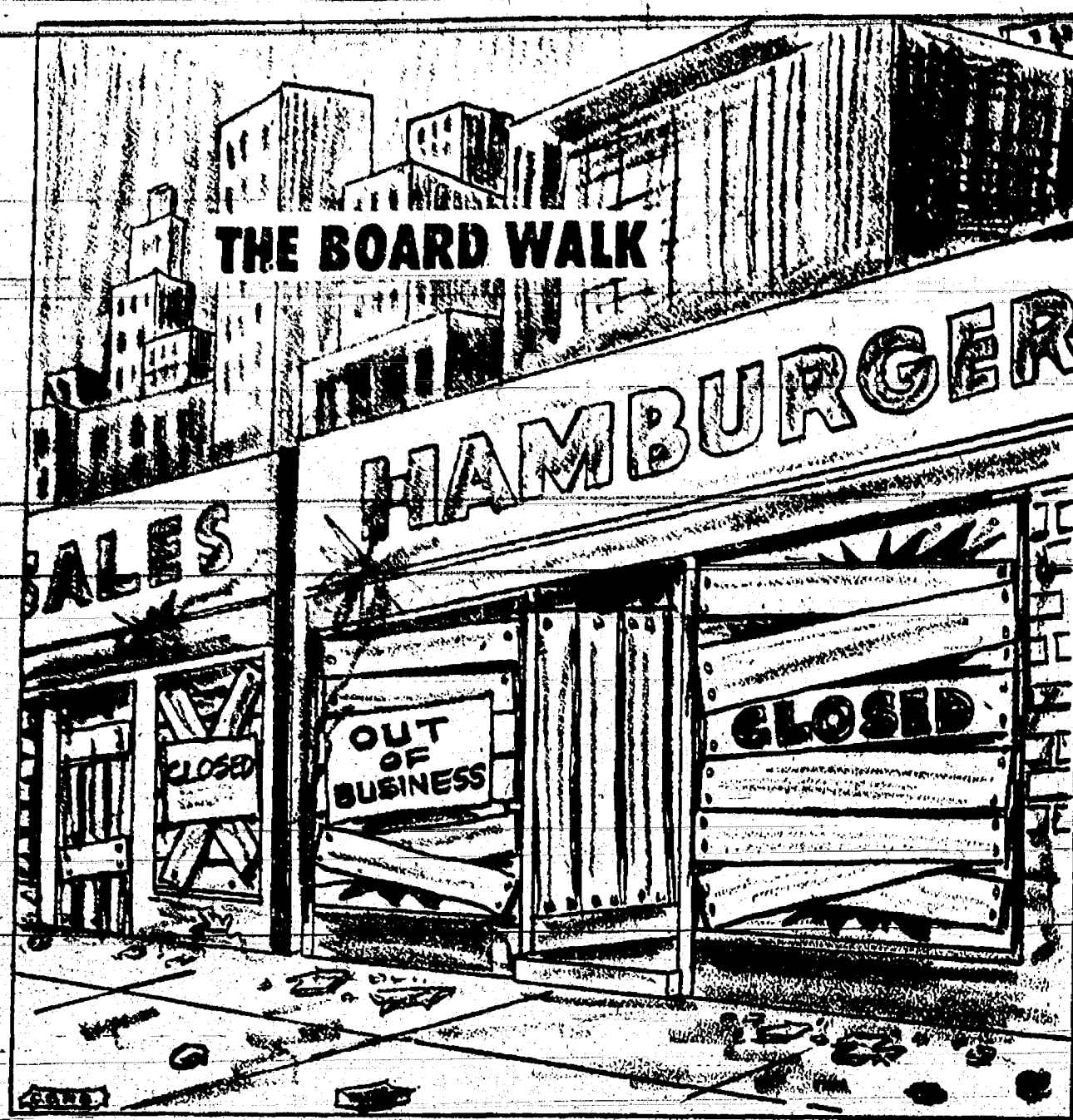

The rising tide of higher interest rates charged by banks is sweeping into Michigan triggering anew the drive for increased home interest rate legislation.

Several Michigan banks have announced they will follow the national pattern—touching off earlier this month in New York—of charging their best customers a record 8½ percent, up 1 percent.

Bankers generally defended the higher "prime rate" as essential to meet a heavy demand for loans from corporations that had been priced out of the bond and short-term loan markets because of climbing interest rates there.

The surprise development started a new flurry of activity in the state legislature to enact a controversial bill increasing the state usury ceiling from 7½ to 8½ percent, immediately.

Michigan's usury maximum covers conventional home and small business loans. Installment loans and revolving credit accounts are governed by another law.

House Minority leader Robert E. Waldron, R-Grosse Pointe, floor manager of the home loan bill, said the "pressure for the passage will be even greater now."

He said some legislators were holding out because of predictions interest rates would fall. "These predictions have not come true," he said. "We need some remedies right now."

Waldron said the Michigan money market will get tighter and tighter, and new housing starts smaller and smaller if the legislation is not passed.

variably in advance," the personality of the weekly was quite different from that of The Chelsea Standard mailed out June 26, 1969.

The front page furnished news of general interest, national news especially about New York, and fiction stories. Pages abounded with ads about patent medicines. One offered \$5,000 to "persons producing any medicine able to show one-third as many living permanent cures of rheumatism and neuralgia as Dr. Fittler's Vegetable Rheumatic Remedy, and \$100 to persons not cured by it."

Headlines on news items were small, bold-faced and uniform, although display ads bore numerous illustrations and a large selection of sizes and styles of type. Many bore the name of Glazier, and many others were from firms out-of-town.

On occasion where a news item merited more than a small headline was a five-deck headline giving the "thrilling details of the terrible conflagration in Boston," among other information.

Competition Begins

A competitor arose in 1889 when William Emmert, Jr., founded The Chelsea Standard, printed at Main and Park Sts. The paper sported a smaller five-column format than its established competition. Display advertising filled with illustrations leaped from the front page, and news of national, international and local interest quickly occupied the middle columns.

The paper was published Fridays and was much briefer about local items than its later descendants. "Two weddings have occurred in our vicinity within the past week and we wish them all long and happy lives" was the entire account of local weddings one week.

Although the paper was still heavy with foreign, national and general news, local items were given more emphasis than in former years. The Chelsea Standard was still chock full of Posa's "cure for consumption" and "Emm's cocoa breakfast for many subtle maladies ready to attack at a weak spot."

The Chelsea Standard was purchased from Emmert by O. T. Hoover in July, 1891 and continued in the same tradition. The First Consolidation Glenn Stimson bought The Standard and then consolidated The Standard and The Herald in 1905. The first issue of The Chelsea Standard-Herald came out Jan. 11, 1906, complete with four pages of color comics and features.

Standard-Herald a circulation of 1,800. A full-page ad offered The Standard-Herald and Ann Arbor Daily News together for \$2 per year by mail. The new 12-page paper sported seven columns, maps, pictures and illustrations.

The third paper to be started in Chelsea, The Tribune, offered competition to The Standard-Herald. The Tribune came out Sept. 19, 1907 with C. H. Young & Son listed as publishers. The first page contained local news, and the other seven pages were advertisements, fiction stories, and general news. The Tribune grew into a bi-weekly published by Charles Young & Son, then sold to Ford Axtel, C. W. Klammer, a newcomer to Chelsea, bought it around 1922.

Meanwhile, the competing Chelsea Standard-Herald was bought from G. C. Stimson by O. T. Hoover, a former Standard owner, in March, 1908. He changed the name back to the briefer Chelsea Standard. The eight-page paper made frequent use of pictures, illustrations and a variety of type faces, although the news photograph had yet to become popular here. Color printing had also come and gone and the paper was printed in black and white.

Local news was gaining importance and short, newsworthy items dominated the front page.

M. W. McClure took over the Standard in December, 1920 and sold it a year and a half later to E. H. Aherns. Aherns was publisher for only five months before McClure bought it back in November, 1922. Two months later, A. B. McClure, the publisher's brother, bought half interest in the business.

On Jan. 1, 1924 the McClure brothers bought the Tribune from C. W. Klammer, thus adding a third paper to the ancestry of the present-day Chelsea Standard.

When the McClure brothers dissolved their partnership in 1928, they sold the paper to E. E. Brown of Ann Arbor. Brown, an experienced newspaper publisher, took into his employ George Davis and Freeman A. Huston, long-time printers around Chelsea, and G. F. Adams, a newcomer to Chelsea.

In December, 1928 M. W. McClure concluded that he would like to return to Chelsea and

bought The Chelsea Standard for the third time.

McClure published the paper for a total of 26 years before selling it to Mr. and Mrs. Walter Leonard. Leonard came to the Standard from the composing room of The Michigan Daily and, prior to that, several weekly newspapers and commercial printing houses throughout Iowa and Illinois.

The Leonard assumed management and ownership April 1, 1947 and have published The Chelsea Standard continuously since that time.

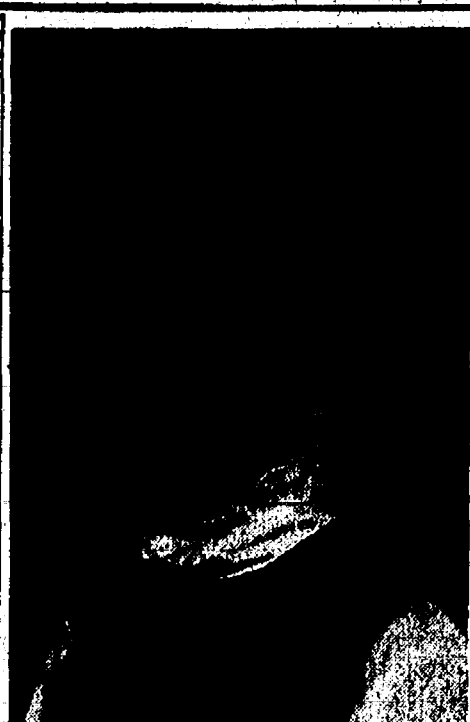

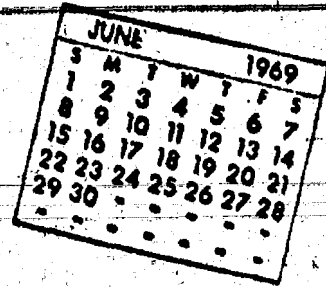

Two CHS Students Leave Tonight for Study in France

Heidi Sprague and Robbie Dvorak wouldn't exchange summer plans with anyone in Chelsea.

And no wonder—tonight they board a Pan-American plane at Detroit-Metropolitan Airport for France, where they will live for the next two months as two of 40 U. S. high school students in France through "Youth for Understanding."

The girls were selected through tests and questionnaires locally, and financed through a \$1,400 French club scholarship fund. French club members sponsored movies, an assembly, basketball games and other events to raise just over half of this amount, and contributions from several Chelsea organizations boosted the scholarship to the needed \$1,400.

Heidi and Robbie will both be seniors at Chelsea High school next year. One of the qualifications was that the students be returning to school in the fall, so the recipients will be able to share their experiences with others.

Heidi, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Sprague, has completed three years of French. This will be her second summer of foreign living, since she spent last summer in Mexico as part of Musical Youth International. This group of students from Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, and the Great Lakes area was comprised of a choral and orchestral group. Heidi played flute in the band.

They traveled to many cities in Mexico, staying with local families where they stopped.

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Although the Mexico trip was a trip to a foreign country with a group of U. S. youths, it differed in that the students did not stay with the same family all summer. In fact the longest they stayed at one home was three nights.

In France, the girls will stay with one family, selected by a committee in France, all summer. Heidi will stay with the Rivault family in Noisy-Le-Grand, 15 miles from Paris. Their four daughters are ages 23, 21, 18 and 15. Heidi plans to attend classes with them if school is still in session. Their father is a history teacher at a high school there.

All together, approximately 1,400 students are traveling to France, Germany, Italy, Japan, South America and other places through Youth for Understanding. Since only 40 will be living in France, the two girls feel fortunate to be chosen.

While Heidi is there, she will celebrate her 17th birthday. "I'm interested in learning about their customs—little things like how they celebrate birthdays," Heidi explains. "I hope to become proficient in their language and habits."

Robbie agrees. "The purpose of the trip is to combine learning the language with promoting understanding between the countries."

The girls will probably have an opportunity to see other countries there, since crossing from country to country is about as difficult in Europe as traveling from state to state here.

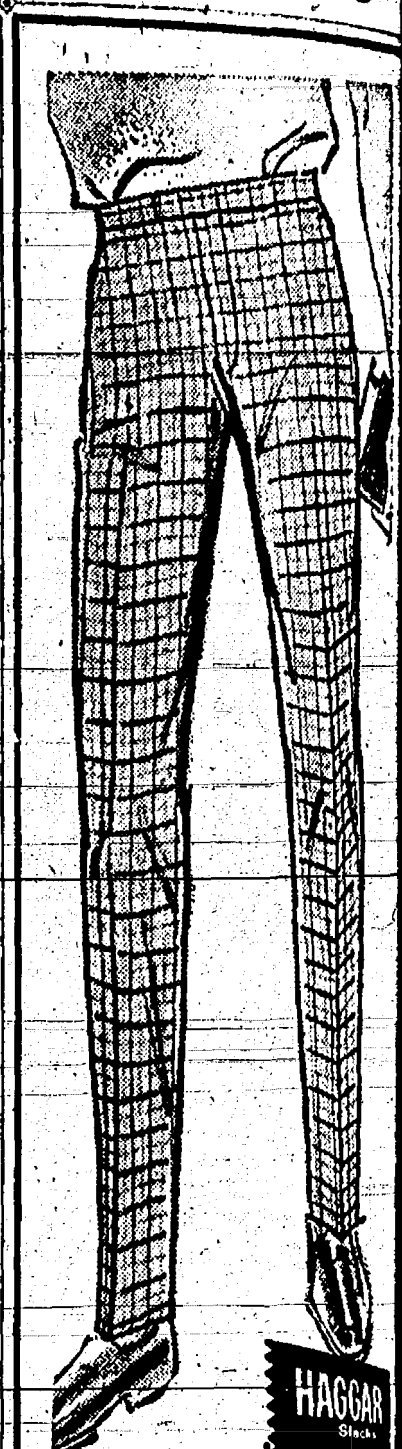
Robbie, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Dvorak, has never been away from home for more than two weeks at a time. Home for Robbie has always been Chelsea. Although she admits she and her family are just a little apprehensive, they agree that the opportunity is tremendous.

"I'm really looking forward to it—I can't wait to meet the family and the people."

She hopes to improve her two years' worth of French there. "The French speak much more rapidly than what we learn in class, and it will be harder to understand." One could compare French to native spoken English is related to native spoken English.

Both girls agreed that their goal is the same, "I want to experience, learn, and see all I can while I'm there."

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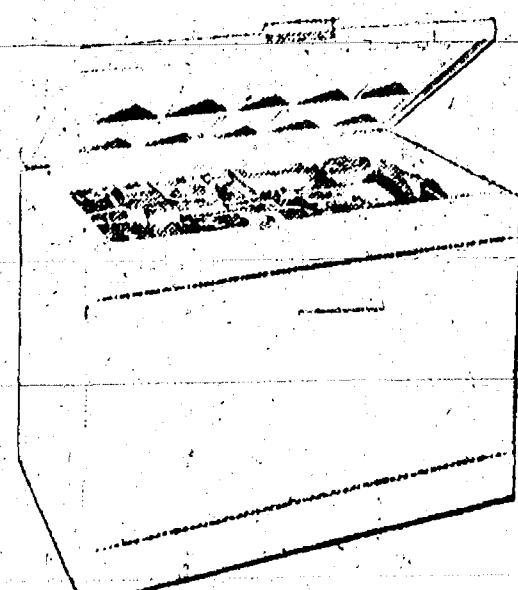

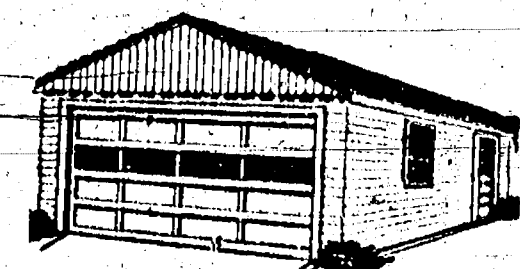

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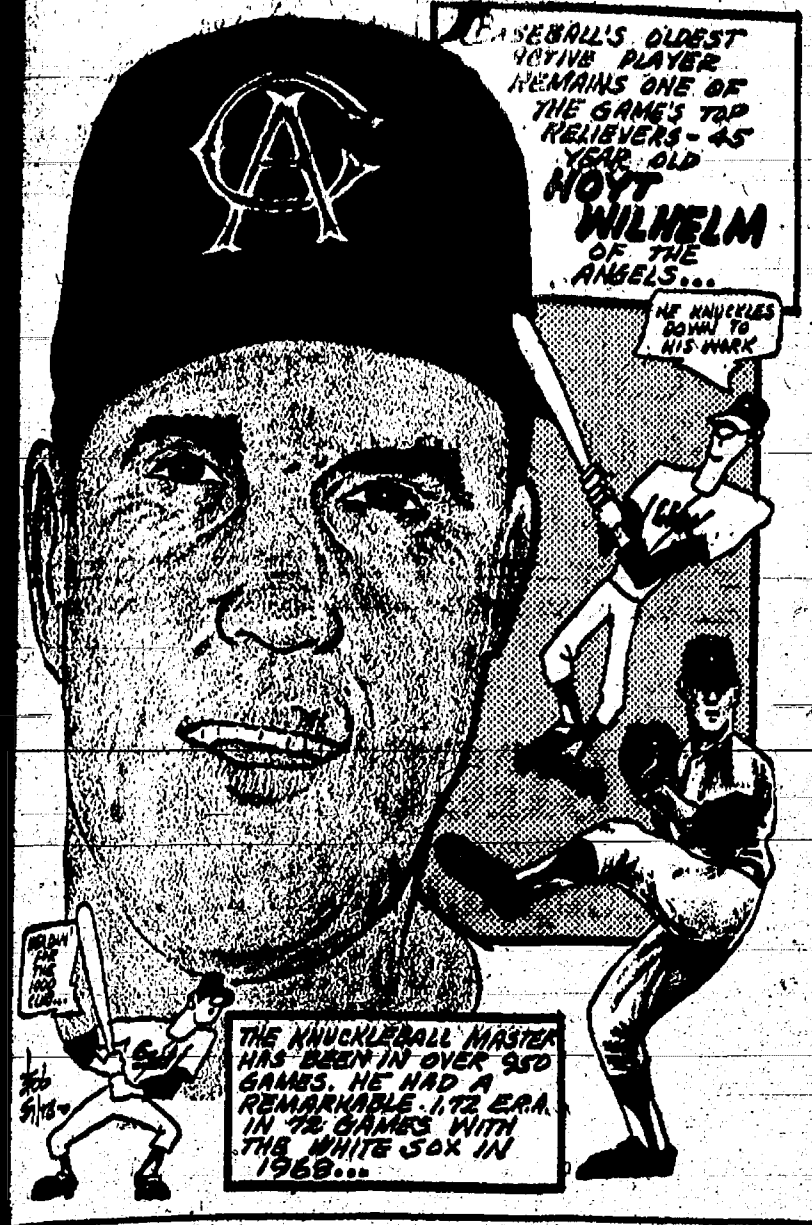
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Grass Lake Plans July 4 Celebration

High School Ball Team Shut Out By Ann Arbor Federal

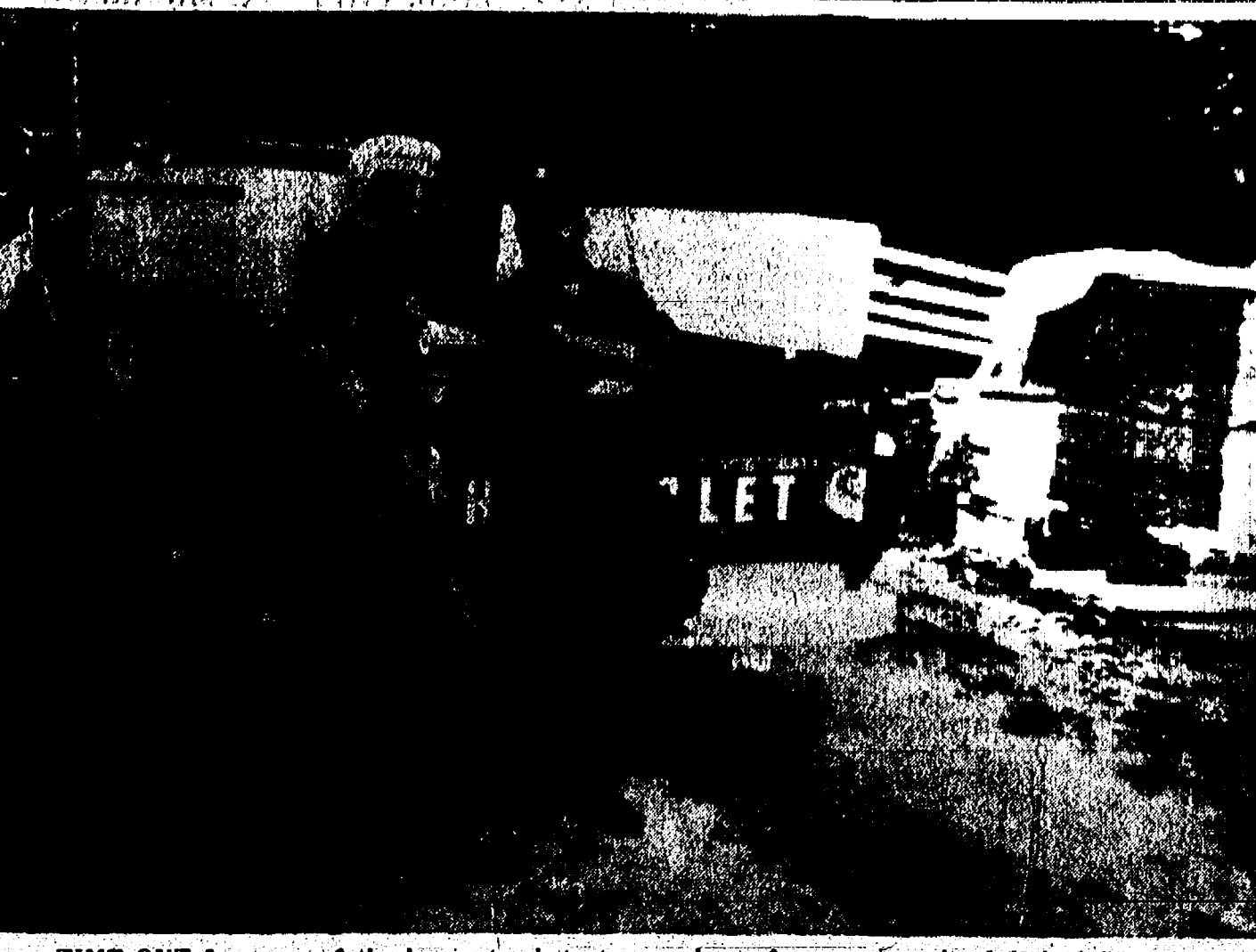
Ann Arbor Federal recreation baseball team knocked down Chelsea recreation high school team, Thursday as they scored four runs in the seventh inning.

Dana Corp. Reports New Sales Record

Dana Corp. set another all-time sales record for the nine-month period ending May 31. An increase of 14 percent over the comparable period last year was announced by J. F. Martin, Dana board chairman, on sales of \$460,000,000.

A before-tax profit of \$50,800,000 for the nine-month period resulted in an increase of 14 percent, equaling the sales increase. After-tax profits, with federal income and surcharge taxes applied, were \$24,800,000. This represents \$1.85 per share and compares with \$1.70 last year.

Continued high activity in the heavy truck market, combined with increasing service parts requirements and broader penetration of international markets were responsible for the record growth, according to Martin.

Dana had a two-for-one stock split on May 15 and increased dividends by 14 percent on June 16.

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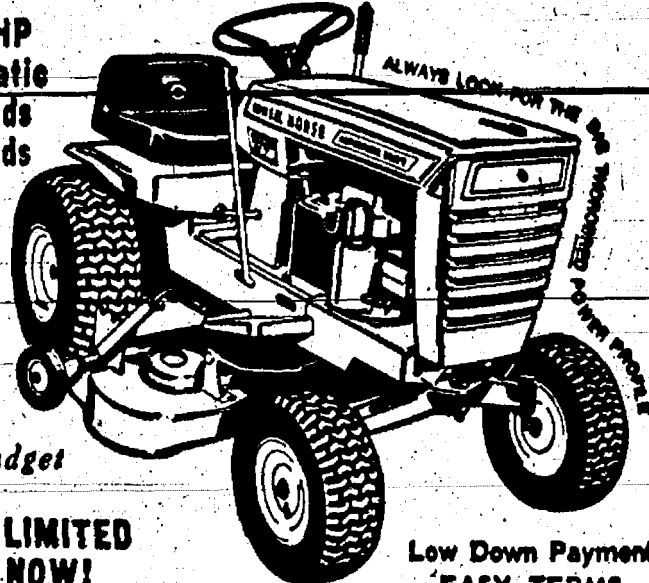
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
