High Speed Chase Ends In Tragedy

A 23-year-old Chelsea motorcyclist was in critical condition at University Hospittal, Ann Arbor, Saturday night when his right leg was amputated following a collision with a sheriff's patrol car ear-

lier that day. On Monday, that same youth was reported to have undergone open-heart surgery at the hospital as a result of the accident.

Still in the hosiptal's intensive care unit is Kenneth Herrst, who according to official reports, led sheriff's police on a high-speed chase which began in Dexter and stemmed from a traffic violation. Herrst reportedly failed to have a license plate on the rear of his Bus transportation available: 4284 motorcycle.

Deputies said they pursued Herrst to Chelsea, to Manchester and finally to Jerusalem Rd., near Freer Rd., in Lima township. There the motorcyclist struck the front bumper of a westbound sheriff's patrol car and was injured. Some passers-by who claimed to have witnessed the accident, stat-

ed Herrst was forced to hit the patrol car after the driver of the vehicle slammed on his brakes in an attempt to stop Herrst, They said another patrol car was close behind, also threatening Herrst. Implications that the accident was avoidable were denied by local police, who had been called in

to assist in the chase: The chase, which reached speeds of more than 100 miles per hour, involved police cars from Manchester as well as those from Chelsea and three sheriff's patrol ve-

Sheriff Tom Minick said Herrst would be charged with fleeing a police officer.
