## Federal Screw Employees Go Out on Strike

Some 153 members of the UAW Amalgamated Local 437 walked off their jobs at Chelsea's Federal Screw Works before noon Tuesday, after failing to accept the terms of a new three-year local contract. Their old contract expired April 30.

Members of the local voted 81-54 in favor of the strike, and have maintained around-the-clock picketing since the walk-out first began. Jobs affected by the strike include automatic screw machine operations, grinding, inspection and secondary operations.

Federal Screw Works manufactures screw machine parts for the automotive industry, along with piston parts for several smaller business firms.

Hershel Howard, UAW Local 437 bargaining committee member said Wednesday that the union went on strike after voting down

the new contract offer, but had not yet specified their new contract demands.

"They just wanted to strike," he said, "and will tell us later this week what they want. A meeting has been scheduled to get the body back together." No negotiations have been set for this week, and Howard expects the strike to continue at least into the middle of next week.

According to Howard, picketing has been peaceful and orderly. All unions have been honoring the line, and as a consequence, no parts have been allowed in or out of Federal Screw Works.

When contacted for his view of the strike, Vincent Doherty, Federal Screw Works general manager, was unavailable for comment.

However, he had left a message with his secretary which stated, "On the strike, management has no statement to make."

## Kindergarten Fall Round-up Slated Tonight

Registration for fall kindergarten classes will be held tonight 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. in the North Elementary school cafeteria. It is important that children beginning school this fall register at this time so kindergarten classes may be planned.

To register, a child must be five years old by Dec. 1. The state requires parents to present school registration with a birth certificate from the county clerk's office of the county of their child's birth.

Upon registering their child, parents will receive a school medical form to be used in recording information about a child's physical examination, immunizations and health history. The form must be returned to the school office prior to the beginning of the school year.

School officials will provide information about transportation, health, school readiness and other pertinent data at the time of registration.

Any parents unable to attend the May 5 registration meeting may call either North or South school, at 475-9131, to register. Arrangements to complete the required registration forms should also be made at that time.

Persons from 17 (with parental consent) through 65 years of age who are in good health, qualify as donors. No one is accepted as a donor if in Red Cross opinion, the blood contribution may be harmful to the prospective donor or to the recipient of the blood.

VFW Post members and VFW Ladies Auxiliary will be working with the Red Cross all day Saturday. The Ladies Auxiliary will also be responsible for the refreshments and the dinners for the Red Cross workers.

## Symphony Band Tops in State Festival

Expectations that Chelsea High's Symphony Band would once again be judged superior were confirmed Saturday, April 30 in Traverse City when the band received a Division I rating in the State High School Band Festival. Chelsea's 75-member group was among 17 bands at each of three sites entered in the state competition.

In their critique of Chelsea High's performance, judges at the festival stated the local musicians "produced an extremely mature sound for a high school group, and delivered a highly musical performance."

As a result, they retained only one piece, "Imperatrix," for their final competitive performance.

In addition to praising members of his band for their outstanding achievement in Traverse City, Bergmann complimented the group for their excellent behavior on the overnight trip. "I'm proud of them for receiving a Division I rating, and particularly proud of their well-behaved, mature attitude throughout the trip."

## Hospital Fund Campaign Tops \$700,434 Mark

Chelsea Community Hospital's Care Campaign topped the \$700,000 mark with 278 gifts totaling \$720,454, it was reported recently at a meeting of the Campaign Steering Committee.

The campaign was officially launched in February with the objective of raising \$1.2 million to be used in the purchase of the hospital's surgical center, currently leased from private owners.

"We are now more confident than ever before that the \$1.2 million goal will be achieved," reported Paul Mann, chairman of the Hospital Board of Governors. "It will be achieved if all our publics continue to support this vital facility in the same manner as previous contributors," concluded Mann.

Willard Johnson, hospital administrator, noted that "The successful conclusion of this \$1.2 million Care Campaign and the securing of a long term loan will permit moderation in the future cost of health care here at the hospital."

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## MICHIGAN MIRROR

**Gov's Salary for Art**  
 Gov. William Milliken, long a millionaire, will accept part of a pay raise voted for him by a special state panel next year. But he'll turn back \$5,000 of

the hike to the state, with the instructions that it be used to finance an abstract sculpture planned for a grassy mall near the Capitol. Putting some art on the now

vacant plot will likely cost up wards of \$100,000, officials say, but the governor's money will be in the pot. Meanwhile he'll collect a \$50,000 a year salary.

**Arizona artist Michael Hiezer**, chosen to do the sculpture, was last in the news in Michigan several years ago when a mammoth piece of granite he cut from a Vermont quarry was placed on the lawn of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Although Hiezer and some others called it sculpture, many Detroiters were aghast. The rock was eventually removed and later blown up and the pieces distributed as souvenirs.

**More PBB Studies**  
 State officials interviewing more than 2,000 people for a long-term study of PBB's health effects have identified what they call a serious syndrome among 1520 farm families.

At least one member of each family claims that he or she no longer has the energy, the strength or the stamina to perform once routine chores or do the farmer's traditional job.

**Called in to examine the families** and see if PBB is responsible for their complaints is Dr. Clark Heath of the federal Center for Disease Control. Heath is coordinating the long-term study with state officials. And although he is the director of the CDC's cancer and birth defects division, state officials say his week-long visit in Michigan has nothing to do with those things.

He'll be checking out farm residents who say they're physically unable to do their jobs. Along with him will go a sanitarian who will check such things as the family's water supply and any pesticides the farm might be using. Officials are careful to say that they're not sure PBB has anything to do with the families' complaints. All the families, however, have had significant exposures to the fire retardant chemical.

**Another Democrat in the Ring**  
 State Public Service Commissioner William Ralls, who's made a name for himself by opposing utility rate hikes, has jumped into the governor's race while still sitting on the PSC.

That idea is irking Gov. William Milliken, who says he may ask Ralls to resign from the commission.

Ralls, 38, announced last week that he would quit the PSC on June 1, the same date that he will file papers with the state creating a formal fund-raising committee. Ralls says he intends to be the next governor of Michigan.

But between now and June 1, at least one major rate case is expected to come before the com-

Chelsea competitors were scattered throughout each of the meet's eight events which included the softball throw, high jump, long

jump, 50-yard dash, 220-yd. run, 440-yd. run, mile run and 440-yd. relay. By the end of the day, they had collected a total of five first-place awards; four second-place awards; three third-place awards; and three fourth-place awards.

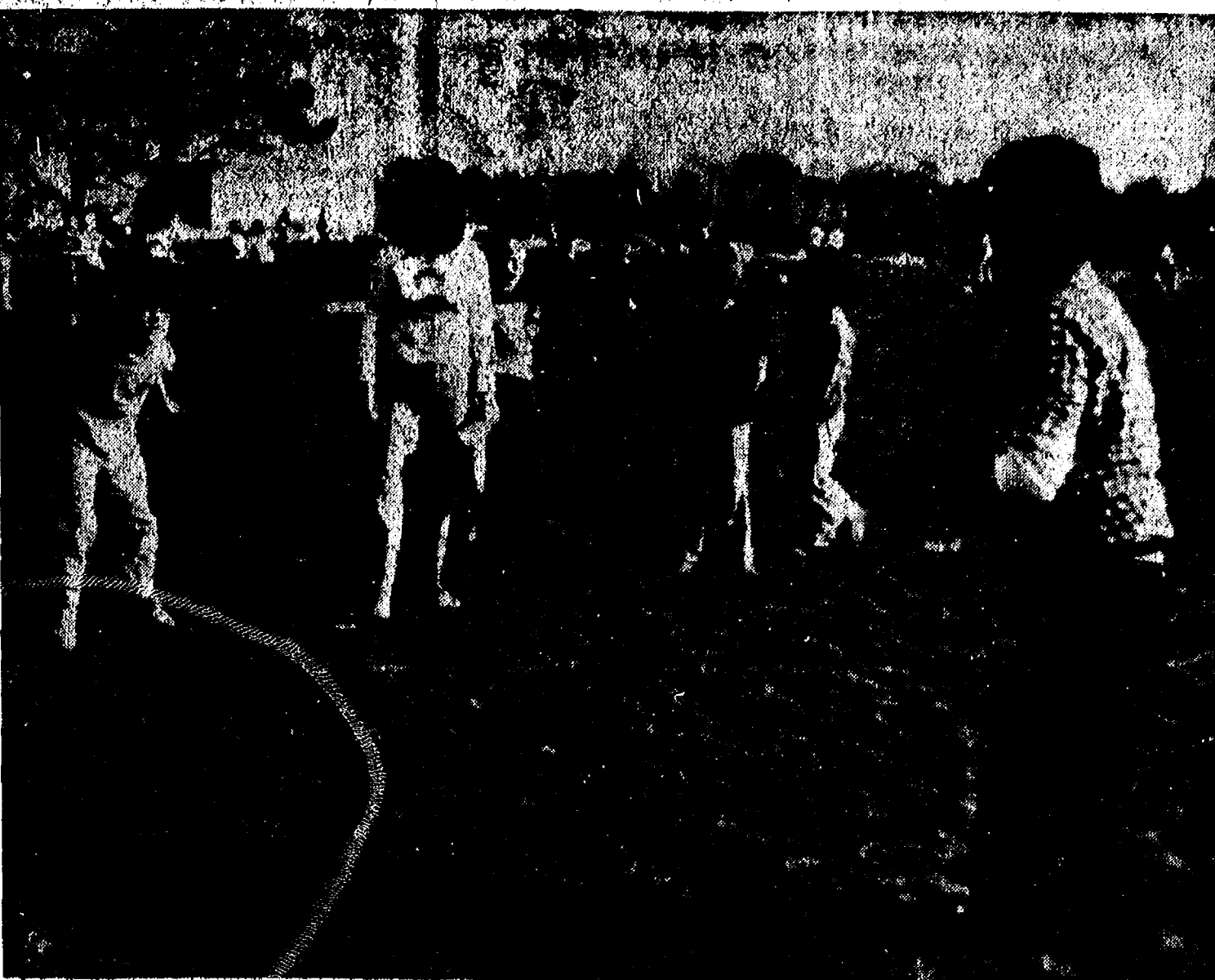

## ARE DAMAGES TAX DEDUCTIBLE?

As a homeowner, expenses from damage or improvements may affect your income taxes. For instance: damage to your home from, say, fire or windstorm may be partially deductible as a casualty loss. After subtracting insurance compensation, deduct \$100 for each accident and the remainder can be claimed as a tax deduction.

Improvements, such as a porch, garage, finished basement, and so on cannot be deducted. However, they can be added to the cost of the house when figuring profit on the sale. So, keep good records of such expenses. Try to preserve canceled checks and receipted bills. They will help substantiate the figures if necessary.

I'm just scratching the surface here. If this situation applies to you, I suggest you contact your nearest Internal Revenue Office for a copy of their pamphlet No. 530 "Tax Information on Deductions for Homeowners." It may save you some money.

However, in the bottom of the first, Milan erupted for 10 runs to take a commanding 10-2 lead which the Bulldogs could not overcome. Chelsea's only other offensive highlight came when Nadeau smashed a solo home run in the fifth.

Friday's game with Dexter, April 29, was a study in domination conducted by the Dreadnaughts. Dexter scored three runs in the first inning, three in the second, and two more in the third to ice the decision in its favor.

The Bulldogs could manage only three singles off Al Ritt, the Dreadnaught pitcher, and then failed to give their own pitcher much defensive support as they made four costly errors.

Chelsea will attempt to raise its 3-3 over-all record and 1-3 league record, when the team travels to Novi today for another league game. Saturday, May 7, the Bulldogs will host Jackson Northwest.

## Track Team Handed First Conference Loss

Brisk winds and 40-degree temperatures dampened performances for both Chelsea and Brighton last Saturday, as the CHS boys varsity track team finished behind Brighton, 58 1/2-99 1/2. The loss was Chelsea's first in dual meet conference competition.

As predicted, Brighton was strong in distance runs, placing runners in the top two of the 440, 880, mile and two-mile runs. They also tacked on a one-two finish in the 100-yd. dash to complete their sweep.

A few exceptions to Saturday's mediocre showings came in field events, and two running events.

Topping the list of exceptions was Phil Frame's school record breaking performance in the two-mile run. He finished the eight-lap course with a time of 10:13.2, shaving seven seconds off his old school record. However, he was only able to collect third place in the competition.

Chelsea's single double winner was Randy Sweeney, who crossed the bar at six feet to win the high jump, followed by a 16.6 winning run in the 120-yd. high hurdles. Sweeney also placed second in the pole vault, behind Chelsea's Matt Heydlauff, who cleared the bar at 13'6" to set a Brighton field record.

"The meet would have been a few points closer had our 440-yd. relay team not been disqualified for handing off outside the exchange zone," said Chelsea Coach Bert Kruse. "Yet even had we run exceptionally well, Brighton's depth would have prevailed," he concluded.

Kruse stated that though Brighton would be difficult to catch in dual meets, Chelsea still had a shot at the team in the conference meet.

Chelsea's next meet will be today when the Bulldogs host South Lyon, beginning at 4 p.m. Then on Saturday, the team will travel to Lake Orion for the Lake Orion Relays, a combined meet of Class A, B, and C teams. Field event relays at Lake Orion will commence at 1 p.m. with running events to follow at 5:15 p.m.

Track competition for Chelsea in the coming week will conclude in Milan, May 10, with Chelsea expected to win the battle with their hosts.
