(under authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended) OPEN SEASONS AND CATCH LIMITS ON PIKE, WALLEYE, SAUGER & MUSKELLUNGE

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on August 12, 1977, under the authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that its subject order of August 15, 1975, remain effective through December 31, 1977, and that the following order become effective on January 1, 1978:

It shall be unlawful to take the following named species except within the open seasons and daily limits prescribed (statewide regulations apply unless otherwise restricted):

Statewide open seasons on all waters not otherwise closed to fishing shall be from May 15 through February on wall-eye, sauger, northern pike, and muskellunge (including tiger muskellunge). The daily catch limit shall be 5' singly or in combination for largemouth and smallmouth bass, walleye, sauger, and northern pike; 1 for muskellunge (including tiger muskellunge).

The above regulations apply except that walleyes and sauger may be taken at any time from the Detroit and St. Clair rivers, Lake St. Clair, and Lake Erie; and that muskellunge in Lake St. Clair, St. Clair and Detroit rivers may be taken only from the first Saturday in June through December 15 of each year.







Helpful Information From Outer Space

Among the hardware orbiting the earth is a satellite that is being used to help U.S. farmers keep on top of crop production. The LANDSAT II satellite measures energy reflected from the earth's surface. Each crop reflects different amounts of energy reflected from the earth's surface. Each crop reflects different amounts of energy to the satellite so that once the information is fed to a comthe picture that's read puter. shows what is planted on U.S. farmlands.

But there's a catch. The satellite is pretty good at telling the difference between planted soybeans and corn. However, it sometimes gets corn and trees mixed up since they happen to reflect about the same amount of energy certain periods of the during growing season.


Enter the good old human being. Researchers check the computer picture with what they know is planted. Where do they get that information? From the ground work done by USDA's Crop/Re-porting Board. The Crop Report-Board gathers information from interviews with farmers, onsite inspections and from answers to survey questions mailed in by farmers. The information covers $\frac{1}{2}$ of one percent of the total acreage in the United States. The satellite people take this small sample, the computer picture, and then project acreage for the entire country."

They are not able to beat the Crop Reporting Board people in timeliness yet, but in the future both sets of information may play a large part in former decisions such as whether to graze wheat


or harvest it for gram. It may come from outer space, but information that helps the farmer get an edge on the market will be well used here on earth.



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

Predicts Ban On Saccharin

Saccharin will eventually be banned in spite of a current congressional moratorium on the issue, predicts a Michigan State University nutrition professor. Dr. Gilbert Leveille, a special advisor to the Congressional Office of Technology Assessment on the benefits and risks of the sweetner, also predicts that in coming years "all known cancercausing agents will be removed from the environment.'

Saccharin has been shown to cause bladder tumors in laboratory rats.

The nationally-known MSU nutritionist says that science is developing a number of saccharin alternatives, but noted that "it takes three to five years and \$1 million of testing before the Food and Drug Administration approves any given compund."

Dr. Leveille also notes that "there is no real evidence that artificial sweetners help people lose weight. Origins of 'sweetness' are often misunderstoodin cake, for example, the sweetness comes from fat, not from sugar."

Brazil, Japan Sign Ag Development Agreement

Brazil and Japan have signed an agricultural development agree-

ment under which each country will invest the equivalent of about \$30 million in production of soybeans, corn, and wheat. The Japanese Federation of Agricultural Co-operatives has supplied Brazil with a draft accord under which the federation would purchase agricultural products from a group of Brazilian co-operatives. The accord, if signed would become effective this year and initial purchases would be soybeans or soybean meal and corn.

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

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
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
