Cagers Defeat Dexter, 72-68, With Late Rally

Odds are that when a team holds the lead, however marginal, through three and a half quarters, the team ahead will claim the game.

Dexter's Dreadnaughts, once believed in such odds but when Chelsea drew a pair of wild cards to turn the tables and emerge the victor, 72-68.

Jeff and Gary Dils both connected for jump shots at the five-minute mark in the final quarter to tie the game up for the first time all evening, 57-57. Before that Dexter had held a five- to eight-point lead over the Bulldogs.

"It changed the momentum of the game and really sparked us," Coach Robin Raymond said.

The first three quarters saw Chelsea playing consistently but playing catch-up. Dexter took an 18-14 lead in the first period and then outscored the Bulldogs, 20-19, in the second stanza for a 38-33 half-time edge. Third quarter was more of the same.

Following the Dils' ignition, Chelsea and Dexter exchanged the lead several times before the Bulldogs took a three-point margin with one minute left. Matt Feeney completed one of two free throws with 45 seconds remaining when Dex-

ter came down for an open lay up only 15 seconds before the buzzer. Bulldog John Dunn blocked the shot which would have tied the score 68-68. Dexter took the ball inbounds, but Don Schrotenboer got the rebound just seconds before Matt Feeney was fouled. Pressure notwithstanding, Feeney stood cool at the line for two good shots.

Charlie Bridges took scoring honors with 16. Jeff and Gary Dils were good for 13 each; Mike Machesky, 11; Don Schrotenboer, six; John Dunn, four; Matt Feeney, four; Brad Knickerbocker, three; and Jesse Coburn, two.

From the floor, Chelsea made 31 of 74 for 42 percent while Dexter completed 22 of 58 for 38 percent. Keeping the Dreadnaughts in the game was their free throw average as they made 24 of 30 for 80 percent. Bulldogs made 10 of 20 for 50 percent.

Chelsea out-rebounded Dexter, 48-27. Bridges had 11; Schrotenboer, 10; Gary Dils, eight; Jesse Coburn, six; and Mike Machesky, four.

Both teams accumulated 21 turnovers while Chelsea added up 24 fouls and Dexter had 16. Bulldogs host Saline on Friday, Feb. 23.

Fred Pearsall Retires from Gas Company

Jeff Dils Leads EMU to Championship

Jeff Dils and the Eastern Michigan track team came away from the Central Collegiate Championships in Normal, Ill., as the outstanding performers.

Dils was named the outstanding athlete of the meet and Eastern won the team championship with a total of 92 points.

The junior from Chelsea led his Huron teammates to victory by winning the 55-meter hurdles in :07.38 plus a sensational effort in the 500-meter run.

Dils won the 500 meters in 1:02.35 which is the fifth fastest time ever in this event. This time also qualified him for the 600-yard dash in next month's NCAA Indoor Championships in Cobo Hall.

Four Chelsea High Wrestlers Qualify for Regional Contest

This Saturday, Feb. 24, four Chelsea wrestlers will compete at Willow Run in the Class B Regional Tournament for the privilege of going to the state finals at Mt. Pleasant.

Chelsea's qualifiers were led by co-captain Chuck Young who boosted his record to 30-5 in winning the 132-lb. weight class, during district competition in Hartland last Saturday.

Finishing third were Alan Augustine, who moved his record to 23-7 by winning three times and losing once, and John Whitaker, whose record is now 24-6. John provided one of the outstanding comebacks of the afternoon when he came up with five points in the last 20 seconds of his third-place match.

Bart Bauer won his first two matches and then lost two matches

and finished fourth. Chelsea's only other victory was by Tom Bareis who pinned his first opponent and then was eliminated in the second round by the eventual champion.

Chelsea placed ninth out of 20 teams. Coach Richard Bareis noted that Chuck Young wrestled the best he has all year and that John Whitaker really gave a courageous performance.

Fair Board Offers Site for Ambulance

John Fontana of the Fontana-Taylor Ambulance Service and Earl Heller, executive vice-president of the Chelsea Community Fair, are expected to meet in the next few days to discuss the possible location of an ambulance sub-station in "Little Red," it was reported recently.

No date has been set although Heller anticipated "we will meet in the very near future."

Fontana-Taylor has been looking for a suitable location for its over-sized ambulance unit since they were awarded the county contract in December, 1978. The contract is for five years and stipulates that Fontana-Taylor locate two ambulances west of the north-south access of Ann Arbor-Saline and Wagner Rds. They have a deadline of March 6.

The previous contract with Horne-Vinson was more specific and stated that an ambulance be located within the village of Chelsea.

"We have received eight or 10 phone calls since the recent publicity concerning our plight," Fontana said, "and one of those calls was from Earl Heller who offered us the use of a building on the fairgrounds," he added.

Since the two have only had a brief telephone conversation, both declined to speak specifically on the offer.

"Little Red," as it is known, is a pole barn measuring 40'x100' with a concrete floor and access to water and sewer connections which were there when the site housed

the one-room school. During the fair, the building holds agricultural exhibits.

According to Fontana, it is the responsibility of his company to find suitable housing both for its ambulance and crew. "We would be willing to renovate the building at our expense; share the renovation; or lease a building," he explained.

"Right now we are investigating some of the offers that have been made before we make a final decision," Fontana added.

Heller explained that "our offer was made because we don't want to see Chelsea without a ready ambulance. As a group we are concerned with the health and safety of Chelsea and area residents."

Currently an ambulance call from Chelsea means a 20-25 minute wait. If the emergency is serious, the Chelsea Fire Department has four emergency medical technicians who may be called to the scene to help stabilize a victim until the ambulance arrives. The Chelsea volunteers are trained at least on a par with ambulance attendants and are capable of all but transporting victims.

Because all calls for a fire, police, or ambulance are handled by the same dispatcher at the Chelsea Police Department, it is possible for someone with an emergency to make only one phone call for a variety of services including a request for an ambulance and having the Chelsea Rescue Squad called to the scene.

School Board OKs Curriculum Changes

Chelsea Board of Education approved several changes in the 1979-80 high school curriculum and with an eye on the future, approved the initial stage of contract negotiations with the district's teachers.

During its regular meeting Monday, Feb. 19, the board approved the elimination of three classes, combining two classes, and adding three new classes for the upcoming school year.

To be eliminated are agricultural mechanics, foundry, and short story, while ancient literature and British literature will be combined. New classes included advanced soils, plants, animals and farm management; advanced welding and fabrication; and introduction to journalism.

According to Superintendent Raymond Van Meer the agricultural mechanics class was offered on an irregular basis while little interest was shown by the students in the foundry class. "The report of the curriculum committee suggested that these be dropped in favor of offering advanced courses in classes with widespread student interest," he explained.

Currently the high school offers a soils, plants, animals, and farm management class and a combined welding and fabrication class. The advanced class will be the natural sequence to those existing classes offering in-depth study.

The committee also suggested that the ancient literature and British literature classes, now offered individually for one semester, be combined as a one-semester class. "The two classes have a common theme for easy adaptation to this plan. When offered separately there is barely enough material to be presented in a full semester," Van Meer said.

With what Van Meer described as a "growing interest on the part of students for a regularly published student newspaper," an introduction to journalism class will be added "hopefully in the spring," he said.

Currently the high school has a one-semester publications class. "Our intentions are to offer the journalism class in the spring and the publications class in the beginning of the school year to provide students with a continuous product (Continued on page five)

Varsity Swim Team Defeats Willow Run

Combining 19 lifetime bests, two varsity records, and two freshman records, Chelsea outdistanced the Class B power Willow Run, 95-75, in high school varsity swimming action.

Bulldogs also defeated Marysville, 105-66, taking all but one event. Chelsea now stands at 11-2, a record in the team's history. "Our first victory was without a doubt the most important for the team. Willow Run was 7th in the state meet last year and graduated only one of their swimmers since then. They are expected to finish in the top 10 of the state meet," Coach Larry Reed stated.

Leading the way against Willow Run, which has defeated Chelsea twice in as many years, was Todd Oxner with tremendous improvement in the 100-yard freestyle with :54.7 and 200-yard freestyle with 1:59.7.

John Robbins collected two freshman records in the 200-yard IM with 2:22.1 and the 100-yard backstroke with 1:03.9. Phil Hoffman recorded victories in the 100-yard freestyle and a varsity record in the 50-yard freestyle with :23.7.


Notable performances were turned in by Charles Wiesner, :32.7 in the 50-yard breaststroke and :59.0 in the 100-yard freestyle; Craig

Wirtz, :26.9 in the 50-yard freestyle and Mike Mason, :24.7 in the same event; Doug Pichlik, 88.6 points in diving and 1:24.5 in the 100-yard breaststroke; Paul Schumann, 6:12.7 in the 500-yard freestyle; Scott Prohaska, :53.9 in the 100-yard freestyle; and Andy Weir, :28.5 in the 50-yard freestyle, 1:06.6 in the 100-yard freestyle.

Chelsea took all but the 50-yard freestyle event against Marysville but took second, third and fourth to outscore the opponents, 9-7 in that event.

Bulldog times were posted by Andy Weir, 1:06.5 in the 100-yard freestyle and 2:32.7 in the 200-yard freestyle; Phil Hoffman, :52.8 in the 100-yard freestyle for a varsity record; Scott Prohaska, 5:17.9 in the 500-yard freestyle; Todd Oxner, 5:24.1 in the 500-yard freestyle; Mike Mason, 5:47.2 in the 500-yard freestyle; Kirk Myers, 1:11.7 in the 100-yard backstroke; and Craig Wirtz, 1:00.1 in the 100-yard freestyle.

According to Reed, "the team as it now appears will qualify both the medley and freestyle relays for the state meet plus swimmers in the 200-yard freestyle, the 200-yard IM, 50-yard freestyle, the 500-yard freestyle, the backstroke, and in diving. (Continued on page four)

Legislature To Begin Work On Property Tax Overhaul

The legislature has targeted Michigan's property taxes as an immediate area of reform as the new session gets underway. The House Taxation Committee plans to begin work almost immediately on a \$450 million tax shift proposal shifting from property taxes to income taxes.

The Senate Finance Committee also has listed property tax relief among its top priorities for the year and is expected to begin deliberations concurrently with House discussions.

Under the plan proposed in the House, the personal income tax rate will be increased from the present 4.6 to 5.5 percent. Offsetting that will be an increase in the personal exemption, from \$1,500 to \$1,800 and increased property tax relief.

The proposed changes would come in the circuit breaker concept. The circuit breaker grants income tax credits for property taxes for anything over 3.5 percent of household income. Taxpayers would, under the proposal, determine the credit from a flat rate table instead of calculating 3.5 percent of income.

The proposal would increase the state credit to 75 percent of the taxes in excess of 3.5 percent, from the current allowance of 60 percent, and the amount of rent considered to be allocated for property taxes would go to 20 percent, from the current 17 percent.

For senior citizens and disabled persons, who get 100 percent credit

for taxes paid over the income limit, the proposal provides those credits at the time property taxes are issued in December, instead of on income tax returns.

Legislative leaders are pressing for adoption of the plan by April, so the state can start withholding the new income tax rate. This would give the state time to collect enough money to begin paying out credits with the December tax statements.

Criticism of the plan is expected to center around claims the plan is an attempt to create a graduated income tax, a concept voters have repeatedly rejected in Michigan.

Also the plan is expected to be criticized as a possible tool for school administrators to promote more millages. However, to discourage higher local millages, the plan calls for tax credits paid only on a certain portion of school millage.

Mills collected above the limit will be ineligible for the credit.

The proposal is similar to one drafted last year, but not formally discussed by the legislature. Under the original plan, the income tax rate was to be increased to 5.6 percent, the exemption increased to \$1,700 and the circuit breaker increased to provide a total tax shift of about \$300 million.

House Taxation Committee Chairman Rep. George Montgomery (D-Detroit), author of the tax shift proposal, said he was not totally satisfied with the new plan and hopes to persuade committee members to give all property own-

ers a 100 percent tax credit. He suggested age is not a satisfactory qualification for setting a property tax credit.

Life Insurance Tips

The Insurance Bureau, Department of Commerce, declares that consumers should be aware of all facts and make careful comparisons before they cash in a life insurance policy or replace one with another.

To help in the decision-making process, the bureau has prepared a booklet called "Consumer Alert" of brief tips about life insurance replacement and a two-page information statement to actually compare an existing policy with a proposed new policy.

Insurance companies and agents are required by the insurance commissioner to furnish these materials to all policyholders interested in revising their life insurance and to sign the forms after they are completed.

Clem Webster and Ed Doolittle drug their sunset law discussion back to the country store Saturday night, but before Ed could rattle off many more places where Government ought to be trimmed Zeke Grubb came up with a motion to strike straight at the root of the evil. Why not cut back on them groups that come up with all the laws about cutting back everywhere except where they're standing at the trough, was Clem's question. He said he was talking about state legislatures, but mostly about Congress. The way to cut down on Government is to cut down on them that decide how big and how much.

This notion got the fellers so stirred up Clem and Ed never did get back to the item they had carried over from the agenda of the week before. In general, the fellers was of a mind that what Clem had in mind couldn't be done cause it sounded to good. But it was Josh Cloughopper, that don't have much to say at the sessions, that give the best reason to do it. Josh allowed that we got a heap of fine and honest folks in Government, and we got some that ain't so fine. If we thin them out, Josh said, we'll have a better chance of telling which is which. Bug Hookum was full agreed with Josh. Bug said it looks like the gravy is gitting to thick to stir, and about the only way taxpayers can thin it down it to thin out them they send to watch the pot.

Fer instant, Bug said, he had saw where 22 state legislatures have come out of foursquare fer a constitutional amendment to force legislators in Washington to

balance the federal budget. Without fail, Bug went on, ever one of them states come out at the same time fer trimming their state budgets while keeping up services by putting in fer more money from Washington. North Caroline, fer one, gits a fourth of its budget from federal programs, but the governor is pushing for the amendment; lower state taxes and a state budget built on \$2.5 billion in federal funds. And Congress keeps changing tax laws so more big companies can slip through more loopholes.

Zeke said the Constitution started us off with 26 Senators and 65 Representatives, and now we got 100 Senators and 435 Representatives. He said we could cut our present number in half and take a big step towards balancing that budget. Ever one of them 535 in Congress has got more staff than they know what to do with, declared Zeke, so the fewer the more useful work to go around. There's got to be somepun to plumb about a \$47,000-a-year job a man will spend \$6 million to keep, like Sen. Jesse Helms did last year, said Zeke, and then after he was elected he begged more money to pay off campaign debts.

Final, Mister Editor, the fellers caucused and come up with a good two-point program. First cut Congress in half. Then tell them that's left to cut out last week of ever session. That's when the pork barrel full of \$10 million bills to pay fer all the little wheel-greasing projects back home slip through in the rush to close up shop.







His offer was received with enthusiasm because an ambulance base on the fairgrounds would cut down answer time drastically. The fair board asked Heller to investigate more thoroughly because there would be necessary changes to make. The public, the village, and any one who might need emergency transportation should support him and the fair board," he stated.

During the latter part of the board meeting, Archie Bradbury's 33rd birthday was observed with

a cake, valentine candies, a very large and very good mince pie, and hot coffee.

School Board OKs Curriculum Changes

gram," Van Meer stated. "One semester of publications is not enough time for students to learn the ways and means of putting out a paper on a regular basis. With the added class a bi-weekly publication will be far more feasible," he said.

The Board also approved authorization for the Administrator to enter into formal contract negotiations with the Michigan Association of School Boards Labor Relations Services. This is the first part of a series of steps to be taken in drawing up a new teacher contract. The current two-year teacher contract expires on June 30, 1979. With the Board's approval to enter into formal negotiations with a MASH mediator, talks are expected to begin in mid-March, Van Meer said.

In an information report on the North Central Evaluation of Chelsea High school, the board learned that the high school received five citations, three of which were dropped upon clarification.

The two citations which remain

"are not serious," Van Meer reported. They include a shortage of approximately \$100 for the media budget and a shortage of preparation time for three teachers.

"According to the NCE we should be spending about \$100 more on our media department but that figure is based on student enrollment from last year. Because we had a drop in enrollment this year, I don't think we have a problem here," Van Meer said.

As for the teacher preparation time, the NCE suggests that teachers have two hours a day to prepare for their classes. "This is not always possible and is not a serious problem," Van Meer commented. If the three teachers were to be given an extra hour a day for preparation then another teacher would have to be hired to cover their classes during the day.

Jackie Rogers, director of the Community Education Department, presented the board with a report on the second semester of Community Education. The winter term has nearly 100 classes with 1,500 students enrolled, almost double that of the fall term.

Child Restraint Devices Available from Jaycettes

Many children in the Chelsea area will be much safer because of a new project being launched by the Chelsea Jaycee Auxiliary. Called "Buckle Up Babes," the project is intended to increase the number of area children who are buckled up in child restraint devices while riding in motor vehicles. The Auxiliary will be telling parents how important restraints are and will be renting seats to residents.

"Car crashes are the leading cause of death to young children," said Carol Smith, chairman of the Buckle Up Babes project. "But safely constructed restraint devices can reduce or prevent most of these tragedies. Our job is to convince parents of the need to use these restraints and then help them get good ones. That's what we're going to do," she said.

Smith pointed out that in 1976, 27 children 4-years-old or younger died while riding as passengers in automobiles on Michigan highways. Another 4,140 youngsters in this age group were reported as injured. But the total number of injuries is actually much higher since many young children are hurt in sudden stops or swerves. These injuries are not always reported to the police.

"If more people know how effective child restraint devices are in protecting their children, we are certain more children would be buckled up," Smith continued. "A safely constructed restraint device can reduce the probability of death in a crash by as much as 90 percent. The probability of serious injury can be reduced by 78 percent," she said.

Since some people may resist buying a restraint device because of the cost, a major part of the Buckle Up Babes program is loaning restraints for a small rental fee. They will have 12 restraints which may be rented by anyone in the area for a small fee. These restraints are designed for infants from birth to 20 pounds.

In the future, more restraint devices will be acquired through donations by members of the community and through purchasing new restraints.



"The new plan, whatever it turns out to be, won't be as good as originally planned but we will be back with a new plan," Fuller stated.

The U. S. Employment Service provides specialized services for various groups such as veterans, youth, older workers, the handicapped, rural residents and workers, and disadvantaged individuals, as well as employers.







JV Cagers Continue 7-Game Win Streak

A victory on Tuesday and one on Friday brought the Chelsea junior varsity cagers to a seven-game winning streak and a 9-3 SEC record.

Chelsea defeated Carlton Airport 64-47, and Dexter, 62-51. Carlton Airport came to Chelsea Tuesday, Feb. 13 with a 9-1 record in their conference, a 12-2 over-all record and two members with 18-point averages.

"Chelsea looked as if they were in for a long night when Airport opened up with a 6-4 lead in the first quarter," Coach Jon Schaffner commented. Junior Bulldog added another four points before the quarter's end to help close the gap.

Schaffner realized he had little to worry about in the second quarter when Chelsea outpaced Airport, 23-8. "This was a fine victory against a very good team," he commented.

While Chelsea missed their first two shots they made 10 in succession before a miss at the end of the second quarter. Junior Bulldog defense held Airport to zero field goals while they made three free throws and Airport had eight. Scoring for Chelsea were Riemenschneider, six; Jeff Price, two; and Carl Simpson, two.

When Chelsea came out after half-time they ran off 15 points against four by Airport in the first five minutes. By the end of the period Junior Bulldogs led, 52-35. Final quarter action saw both teams play evenly, tallying 12 points each.

Jon Riemenschneider shone with 29 points. Karl Albrecht contributed 10; Carl Simpson, eight; Jeff Price, four; Sean Peterson, four; Mike Wade, three; Carl Schwarze, three; Mike Lazarz, two; and Chris Heaton, one.

Top honors in rebounds went to Albrecht with 18. Riemenschneider, Lazarz, and Tobin, each added three.

Albrecht worked for four steals

Carl Schwarze, four; Carl Simpson and Sean Peterson, three. Mike Lazarz assisted in six baskets; Carl Schwarze, four; Carl Simpson, three; and Karl Albrecht, three. Albrecht added three blocked shots.

Chelsea led in rebounds, 35 to 27, and accumulated only 18 turnovers compared to Airport's 26.

Against Dexter, the Junior Bulldogs shot below 40 percent for the first time in five games but they more than made up the difference with a hustling defense.

Chelsea bounded to a 16-13 lead in the first quarter and ended the second quarter ahead, 24-20.

"The defense was a key factor in this game as it created 33 turnovers and helped us get off many more shots than Dexter, 74-48," Coach Schaffner said.

Chelsea outscored the Dreadnaughts, 56-34, from the field but Dexter outscored Chelsea, 17-6, from the free throw line. Dexter went to the line 30 times to Chelsea's 13.

Leading scorer for the Junior Bulldogs was Albrecht with 14 while Riemenschneider followed closely with 13. Peterson tallied 11; Lazarz, eight; Carl Schwarze, six; Chris Tobin, four; and two each by Simpson, Mark Steinaway, and Heaton.

Albrecht also led in rebounds with 18. Riemenschneider added nine; Lazarz, four; and Schwarze, three.

Peterson worked for four steals and Heaton, three. A total of 19 assists were turned in. Peterson had seven; Lazarz, six; Simpson, three; and Albrecht, three. Albrecht completed three blocked shots.

Remington Patented First Typewriter

E. Remington & Sons, Ilion, N. Y., became the first company to manufacture a practical typewriter under a contract dated March 1, 1873. The machine, which would revolutionize the business world, had two rows of black walnut keys with letters painted on them in white. All letters were in capitals, with numerals two through nine, a comma and a period. Six months after the contract was signed, the first machine went on the market. A visit to the Communications Collection of Henry Ford Museum, Dearborn, includes a look at a 1902 Remington Arabic typewriter and a 1908 Remington No. 9, the first visible writing typewriter.

The first state pension legislation to be found constitutional was in Montana in 1923, according to the U. S. Labor Department booklet, "Labor Firsts in America."

Speed Up Tax Processing With Label

Taxpayers can help speed up the processing of their Federal income tax return and receive their refund much faster by using the pre-addressed, peel-off label on their return, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The label, which is located on the cover of the tax return package, lists the taxpayer's name, address, and Social Security number. If any of the information is incorrect, the taxpayer should make needed changes directly on the label.

First Pencil With Eraser Patented in 1858.

The first pencil with an attached eraser was patented by Hyman L. Lipman of Philadelphia on March 30, 1858. Realizing the students' propensity for errors, Lipman provided a pencil with a groove at one end in which a piece of prepared rubber was glued. This freed pupils from the clumsy slate-and-chalk methods of earlier schooling. The primitive one-room schoolhouse atmosphere may be revisited at any of three different schools in Greenfield Village, Dearborn. They range from a log cabin structure to a sturdy clapboard building to a rather modern 100-year-old brick school, where Henry Ford once attended classes.

Kits for engraving and for preserving information on valuables are available from the Sheriff's Department. For additional in-


Fire Chief Urges Reflective Address Signs for Homes

First Steam Engine Brought from England

The first steam engine in America was put into operation on March 12, 1765, at the copper mines of Col. John Shuyler in New Jersey.
