Independents Unopposed in Village Voting

Chelsea's annual village election will be held Monday, March 12 at Sylvan Township Hall for the purpose of filling the expiring terms of village clerk, three village trustees, and two Library Board trustees.

Six Independent Party candidates will appear on the ballot, the result of nominations accepted during the nine-minute village caucus held on Feb. 12. The candidates are unopposed but write-in candidates are possible.

On the ballot for two-year terms as trustee are incumbents Mike Sweet and Lyle Chriswell, and newcomer John Popovich who was nominated to fill the expired term of Jack Patrick.

Incumbent Thomas Neumeyer is seeking his second full term as village clerk while contenders for the three-year terms as Library Board Trustees are incumbents William Chandler and Jean Eaton.

Both Chriswell and Sweet are seeking their second full term as trustees.

John Popovich, 46, resides at 519 McKinley St., with his wife Lynne and two children, ages 9 and 11. A native of Chelsea, he graduated from Chelsea High school class of 1950, and attended Cleary College, Ypsilanti, for three years. Popovich is employed as general manager of Faist-Sprague Buick-Olds, Inc., and is a member of St. Mary Catholic church.

Popovich spent eight-and-a-half years in service with the U. S. Air Force in the Korean and Vietnam wars. He was discharged as a S-Sgt. He was commander of the American Legion for one year and is presently treasurer of that organization.

Mike Sweet, 40, lives at 745 S. Main with his wife, Jeanette. He is the father of eight children. Sweet was born in Stockbridge and graduated from Stockbridge

High school in 1957. He attended Jackson Junior College for two years and has been employed by the Chelsea Milling Co. for the past 16 years as shipping and sales coordinator. Sweet is a member of St. Mary Catholic church.

Sweet has served in a variety of community activities including vice-president of the Chelsea Recreational Council for one year; treasurer of Chelsea Band Boosters for five years; treasurer of Chelsea United Methodist church for two years; and bowling league president for one year.

His civic involvements include one year as reporter for area Cub Scouts; two years as reporter and member of the Board of Directors of the Chelsea Junior Chamber of Commerce; and four years as a coach for local children's sports. He served in the U. S. Army for three years stationed in Korea.

Lyle Chriswell, 48, lives at 201 Wilkinson St. with his wife, Patricia. Born in Chelsea, Chriswell graduated from Chelsea High school in 1948 and has been employed by Palmer Motor Sales, Inc., for the past 22 years, currently as sales manager.

Chriswell is a member of the First Congregational church of Chelsea and a former member of the Chelsea Jaycees. He was president of the Jaycees in 1974 and served two three-year terms as a Chelsea United Way committee chairman. He was a seaman with the U. S. Navy from 1952-54, stationed in San Diego, Calif.

Thomas Neumeyer, 29, lives at 722 S. Main with his wife Martha, two sons ages 6 and 3 and their one-year-old daughter. Born in Detroit, Neumeyer graduated from Lutheran High East, Detroit, in 1967. He received a BA degree from Concordia Teacher's College, (Continued on page seven)

Swim-A-Thon Raises \$4,500 to Benefit Pool

Nearly 150 boys and girls accounted for more than 225 miles worth of swimming and \$4,500 in pledges during the third annual Chelsea Aquatic Club Swim-A-Thon on Friday, Feb. 23.

"All of the money we collect from the pledges is turned directly into pool equipment and supplies to improve the total recreational and educational facilities of the pool," according to Larry Reed, pool director and coach.

Only a handful of the 150 swimmers failed to swim 100 yards (1 1/2 miles) Reed reported.

Shannon and Shelly Springer led

the group in pledges with \$200 each. Prizes will be awarded to those who turn in the most money including an electronic digital stop watch for those with more than \$150; choice of a warm-up top or electronic game for those with \$100 or more; and trophies for those with more than \$50.

Reed stated that the money earned will be used this year for about 120 hooded sweat shirts for the younger swimmers who are not part of the school team, and a back-up system for the electronic timing system to increase the accuracy of swimmer's times.

Chelsea Bands Rated Tops in District Meet

Compliments flowed as eloquently as the music which had inspired them following the performances of Chelsea High school 9th grade band and symphony band on Saturday, March 3.

Perfect scores of 1's were earned by the 73-member symphony band and the 43-member 9th grade band, both directed by Steven Bergmann. The students participated in the annual District 12 Band Festival at Livonia Clarenceville High school along with 17 other area schools.

Judges issued only five Division I ratings among the 18 schools, two of which were received by Chelsea. According to Bergmann it is the first time in known history that both the 9th grade and symphony bands were given straight I ratings in all four categories.

Each school was required to perform three selections of prepared music, followed by the impromptu performance of two additional numbers to test sight reading abilities. Students were given seven minutes in which to study sheet music for the selections.

Praising the freshmen musicians was Charlene Colegrove, sight reading judge who said "they offered a fine interpretation. Their phrasing was outstanding and they followed the director so well."

Tom Course, one of three judges

who scored the 9th grade students on each of the three musical selections, commented, "I like this band very much. It shows excellent training and skill development and plays musically. They have good dynamic control and style as well."

Applauding the symphony band was Judge Larry Dickenson. "This is an outstanding group in any class level. You and the director represent the best in what instrumental music is all about. You were a privilege to listen to."

While Chelsea is listed as a Class B school, it plays Class A and Class AA music.

9th grade musicians performed "Burst of Flame," by Bowles; "Music for A Ceremony," by Morressey; and "Chelsea Suite," by Thielman.

Selections played by the symphony band included "The Gallant Seventh," by Sousa; "American Civil War Fantasy," by Bilik; and "Suite of Old American Dances," by Bennett.

As a result of the exceptional performance by the symphony band, members have qualified to play in the state band competition to be held in the Lansing area on April 28.

"I am extremely proud of both bands. Their hard work and dedication to music has more than paid off," Bergmann commented.

Cagers Defeat Dexter in First Tourney Game

Contrary to what might be expected, Chelsea faced the team they defeated twice already this year with some uneasiness.

"We knew there was a large revenge factor on the part of Dexter and it is always hard to defeat a team three times in one season," Coach Robin Raymond said.

The first evening of tournament play on Tuesday, March 6 did see the Dreadnaughts put on a strong showing in the first quarter, taking a 17-11 lead, but a tough Bulldog defense kept the rivals to 58 points while a hustling offensive found the baskets easy for a 73-58 win.

Chelsea has now qualified to compete against South Lyon in the second round of the Willow Run tournament on Thursday, March 8 at Willow Run. Winner of that game will advance to the championship game and meet the winner of the Willow Run-Lincoln game on Saturday, March 10.

Tuesday's game was nearly identical to the Bulldog-Railsplitter encounter with Chelsea handing in a final quarter free throw extravaganza. For the evening, Bulldogs earned a 71 percent from the free throw line, thanks in large part to Charlie Bridges who collected 12 of 16—eight of them in the final period.

Search Continues for Ambulance Substation

Fontana - Taylor Ambulance Service of Ann Arbor is "looking fast and furiously" for a suitable ambulance substation in the Chelsea-Manchester area as its March 6th deadline passed unsuccessfully by.

In the meantime, Fontana has, and will have, an ambulance "driving back and forth between Chelsea and Manchester day and night until we find the right place," according to Nancy Fontana, co-owner of the service.

Fontana-Taylor began the search more than 90 days ago when they were awarded the five-year county contract replacing the services of Horne-Vinson. "We have run into insurmountable problems along the way," Fontana commented.

Only last week, Fontana reported that they had found a pole barn and house for sale half-way between Chelsea and Manchester and has made an offer. "It was perfect. The location was good for both villages with an answer time of just five minutes to either town and we could have renovated the pole barn for the ambulance and crew in less than a month," Fontana stated.

A few days later, however, Fontana-Taylor learned that the deed had restrictions and that they would have to apply for a condi-

tional use permit from Sharon township—a process that would take at least six weeks. There is no final word on that piece of property, reported Fontana.

A number of other offers, including one by the Chelsea Community Fair, have been put on the back burner or removed from consideration entirely because of Fontana-Taylor's wishes to remain in close proximity of Chelsea and Manchester.

While Fontana has had several offers from local community groups and individuals, most of their search efforts have been directed through real estate companies. "What we are finding, however, are parcels of land in chunks of 50 to 100 acres and owners are not willing to chop off a five or 10-acre parcel," Fontana said.

The ambulance company, which has full responsibility for finding, renovating, or building a substation, is looking for a 30'x50' building with at least a 12'x12' opening to accept the truck-size ambulance and house a crew of two.

They are searching for property within the boundaries of Baker Rd., Jackson Ave., M-52, and Dexter-Chelsea Rd.

Currently, Fontana has seven ambulances in service (two more (Continued on page eight)

'Brigadoon' Opens March 15 at CHS

"Brigadoon," the haunting musical fantasy about a Scottish town that has gone to sleep and awakes or a single day once each hundred years, will be the next attraction at Chelsea High school.

It will open on March 15 and play through March 17, with Todd Wurster, Pat Powers, and Tracy Catell in the three leading roles that were sung in the movie version of this stage success by Gene Kelly, Van Johnson and Cyd Charisse.

Written by Alan Jay Lerner and Frederick Loewe, who are also the authors of the greatest success of the century, "My Fair Lady," "Brigadoon" won the N.Y. Critics' Circle prize as the best musical of its first New York stage season, 1946-47.

The wistful tale told in this spell-binding musical revolves about a sudden landing near a Scottish village—a quaint place that appears on no maps. It is a community of idyllic peace where the inhabitants know no strife. It comes to life one day every cen-

tury, and then dissolves again into mist. It is an oasis of dreams, and the breaking of the peace by one disgruntled soul, would suffice to make it disappear forever.

From this mystic and poetic bit of legend Lerner has spun his dreamy tale of a romance between one of the 20th century Americans and a 17th century girl who is still only 19 years old. Loewe has composed songs that blend with the mood thus conjured up. The sparkling and joyous score has remained ever fresh, and is as full of song-hits as it ever was.

The daintiest of them all, "Come to Me, Bend to Me," is one of the great favorites of our time. Some of the other hits of the show are "The Heather on the Hill," "Almost Like Being in Love," "There But for You, Go I," and "From This Day On." One of the funniest songs, "My Mother's Wedding Day," relates the doings of one of the most sophisticated wedding-parties ever known, and "Down on McConachy Square" is (Continued on page eight)

Laetrile Treatment Approved By House Committee

Cancer patients may soon have the option in Michigan to get laetrile on a prescription basis under legislation approved by the House Committee on Public Health.

The bill is virtually identical to a measure passed overwhelmingly by the House last December but the legislation died when the 97th Legislature adjourned.

Under the bill, doctors cannot be disciplined by the state for prescribing laetrile when requested by a patient.

Before receiving the drug, the patient must sign a waiver saying that he or she recognizes that laetrile is not approved by federal authorities and that there are other forms of cancer treatment available.

Laetrile could only be dispensed by licensed pharmacists after receiving a prescription. All laetrile containers would have to carry a notice that the drug is not approved by the Federal Food and Drug Administration.

The bill also allows the manufacture of the drug in the state. Bill sponsor Rep. John Kelsey (D-Warren), whose wife died of cancer, said the principle effect of the bill is to give a person a choice of treatment. "It places a legal and moral obligation on the part of the physician that when he diagnoses a person as terminal he has to tell the patient about laetrile, even though he might not believe in it," Kelsey said.

Credit Unions Can Offer Checking Services

An Ingham County Circuit Court has affirmed a ruling by the state Financial Institutions Commissioner allowing state-chartered credit unions to offer share draft accounts, services similar to bank checking accounts.

Judge Thomas Brown said the decision was supported by competent, material and substantial evidence.

Credit unions pay interest on dividends on the share draft accounts which are offered by 221 of the 595 state-chartered credit unions.

The ruling may bring about banks paying interest on checking account balances in order for them to be competitive with the credit unions in this area.

Commission Recommends Changes To Handle Divorce Cases

A preliminary report from the legislative commission on the courts has established a set of alternatives designed to unclog the circuit court system of divorce cases and make divorce proceedings more humanistic and provide greater protection for children.

Among the alternatives suggested is a domestic relations agency, existing independently of the court structure, which any married couple could turn to, even if they are not contemplating divorce, for problem counseling.

The agency could also provide pre- and post-divorce counseling and arbitration settlements.

The report also suggests that children of divorcing couples be represented to ensure their protection and rights.

Auto No-Fault Law Under Scrutiny

Hearings on revisions to the no-fault insurance law will begin next month by the Senate Commerce Committee.

The Supreme Court last June said the law is conditionally constitutional, but gave the legislature until December of this year to remedy certain portions of the law.

The proposed revisions are designed to make insurance available to all drivers at fair and reasonable rates and to review cases of motorists whose policies have been cancelled.

Committee Chairman Sen. Arthur Miller (D-Warren) said the committee's goal is to rewrite the law to establish reasonable rate-setting procedures which will protect the rights of both drivers and insurance companies.

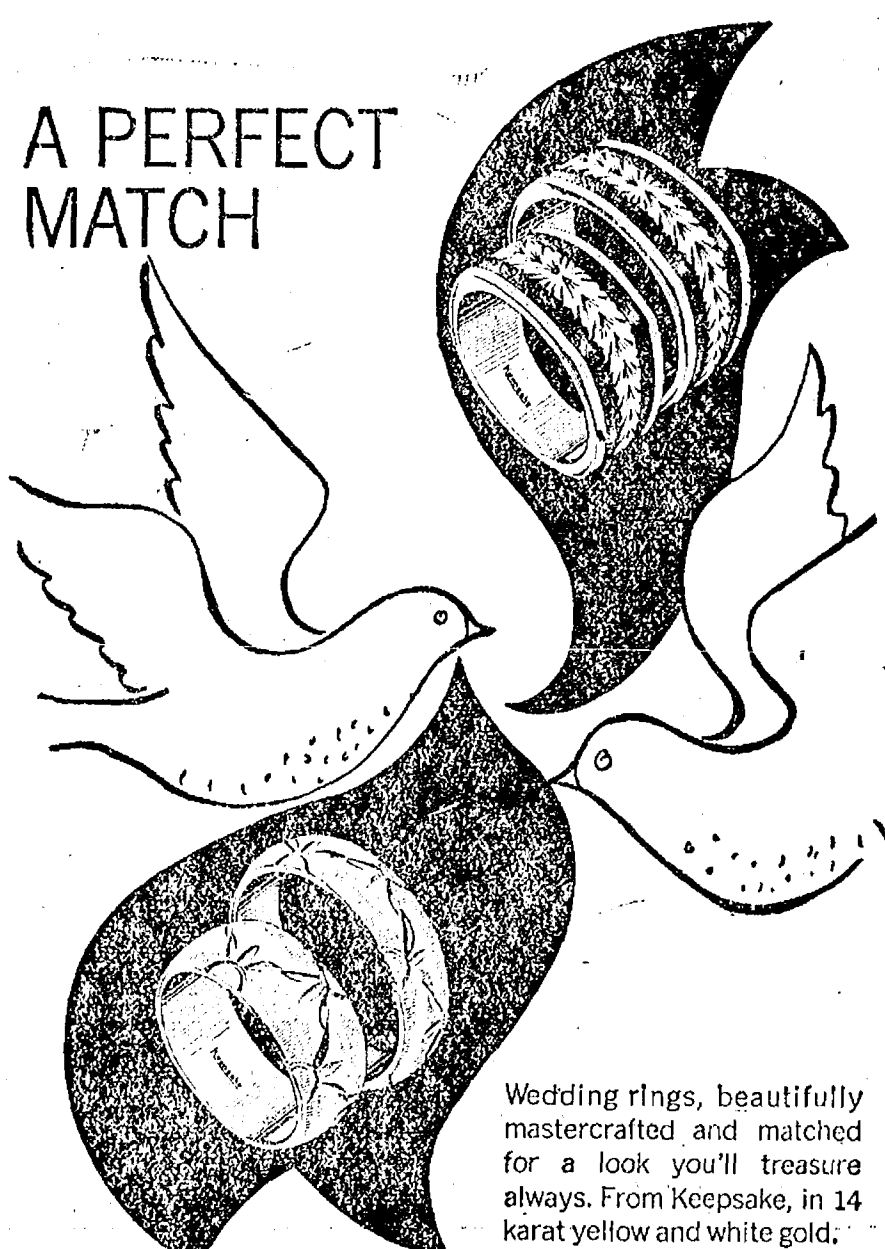

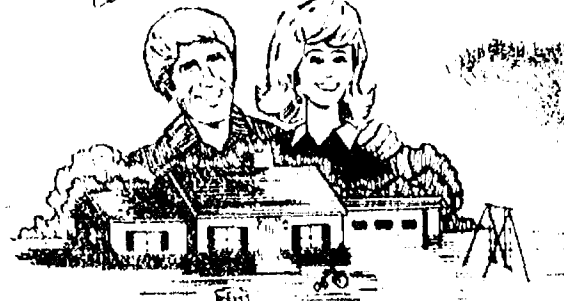

Varsity Cagers Hold On As Lincoln Rallies

Varsity Bulldogs towered over the Lincoln Railsplitters with a 21-point lead and only six minutes left on the clock but were almost brought to their knees when the Splitters rushed for 24 points before the buzzer.

Chelsea kept its cool in the Lincoln heat wave, however, as Brad Knickerbocker, Jeff Dils, and Charlie Bridges combined for seven of 10 free throws and the 63-59 Bulldogs victory.

"The score was close but we had control of the entire game even when we were up by only two points. Lincoln never had a chance to take the lead," Coach Robin Raymond commented.

Because the game was the last one of the regular season, Raymond attempted to have everyone play as much as possible. "I did a lot of substituting all through the game to give everyone some of the action," he said. Raymond also brought up Karl Albrecht from junior varsity to play in the second quarter and received two points from the 63rd junior.

Bulldogs took a 14-10 lead in the first quarter and steadily increased the margin for the next two periods, 31-24 by half-time and 50-35 by the end of the third.

"Lincoln put on a full court press two minutes into the fourth quarter and forced us into five turnovers. We combined this with an 0 for 5 from the floor for a bad showing," Raymond said.

It was only a partial bad showing, though, after Chelsea made good on seven of 10 freethrows in the last 1:58 of the game.

Brad Knickerbocker started the run with one good shot out of two tries, while Jeff Dils completed two. Lincoln made a five-point play to bring the score to 59-55 when Knickerbocker returned to the key line for two more points. Lincoln edged closer with two points and a 61-59 score but Charlie Bridges sealed the win with his two points.

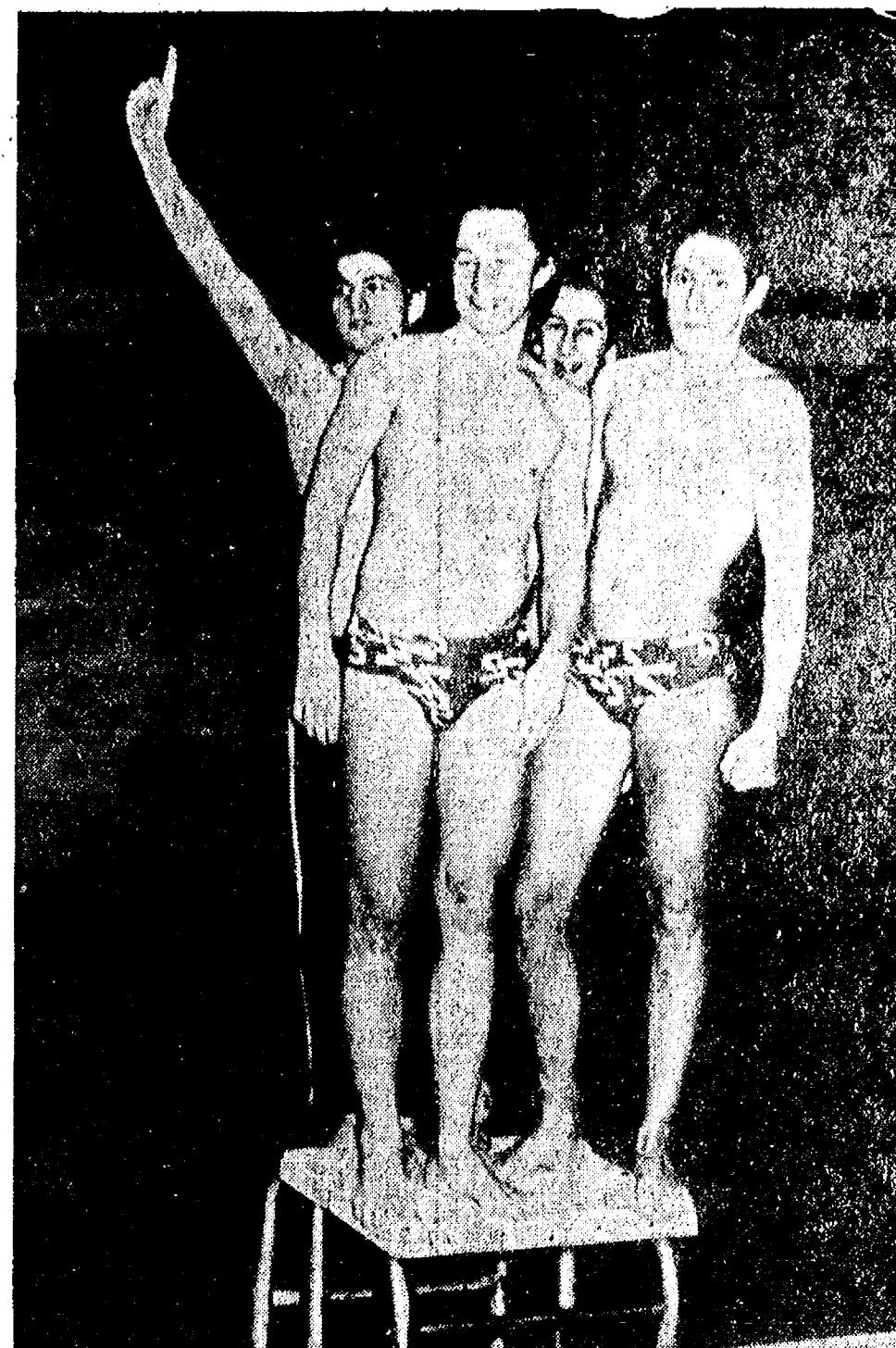
Don Schrotenboer with 15 points and Jeff Dils with 11 led the Bulldogs in scoring. John Dunn, Mike Machesky, and Jesse Co-burn each added eight; Matt Fee-ney, six; Brad Knickerbocker, three; and two each from Charlie Bridges and Karl Albrecht.

Lincoln outrebounded Chelsea, 50-31 but the Bulldogs made up the difference from the free throw line completing 19 of 28 for 73 percent compared to the Splitters' low 37 percent.

From the floor, Chelsea had 89 percent and Lincoln, 35 percent. Bulldogs collected 19 fouls, three less than Lincoln, and 16 turnovers, one less than the Splitters.

In the second quarter Chelsea outscored Jackson, 19-12, to close the gap to six points but then stumbled in the third quarter, taking 14 fouls to Christi's 18.

Top scoring went to Jon Riemenschneider with an impressive 22 points. Chris Heaton tallied 14; Sean Peterson, 13; Jeff Price six; Mike Lazars, six; and Mark Steinaway, three.

Riemenschneider again took honors in rebounds with 10. Heaton added seven, and Peterson three. Lazars made seven steals and Carl Schwarze, four. Assisting were Schwarze with eight; Peterson, six; Riemenschneider, four; and Lazars, three.

Entering the final conference game of the season with a 10-3 SEC record, Chelsea was in a make or break situation for second place—a long way from the first half of the year when the junior Bulldogs were 3-7.

An excellent performance by Riemenschneider paved the way for the 52-46 victory over Lincoln last Friday and second place in spite of a poor shooting night and mish mish ball handling which saw Chelsea chalk up 27 turnovers.

During the first half, junior Bulldogs gathered a 15-10 lead in the first quarter and a 26-19 lead by the half-time. Riemenschneider outrebounded the entire Lincoln team, 15-14 during the first half. For the night, Riemenschneider starred in scoring with 19 and an equal number of rebounds.

Chelsea again outscored Lincoln, 16-12, in the third quarter

Varsity Swimmers Win Their Own Invitational League Meet

Chelsea High school varsity swimmers won their own league invitational this past Saturday with many record-shattering performances.

The team won five of 11 events totaling 363 points to second place Brighton's 294; Dundee (the 4th rated Class "C" team in the state) 240; Marysville, 157; and Lincoln, 142.

Chelsea kicked off with Craig Wirtz's upset victory over team mate Dave Mason with a school and freshman record of 292 points in diving. The second victory

came from Phil Hoffman who participated in one meet and three varsity records. Hoffman won the 50-yard and 100-yard freestyle races, and anchored the second place medley relay.

In the 100-yard butterfly, Dave Mason broke the freshman school and meet records by winning the event in :58.7.

The fifth Chelsea victory came from the freestyle relay composed of Mike Mason, Craig Wirtz, Todd Oxner, and Scott Prohaska.

Each Chelsea swimmer swam lifetime bests and placed in a minimum of two events. Eight

varsity records were broken. The medley relay of Hoffman, Dave Mason, Charles Wiesner, and Tom Gaunt broke the varsity record by nine-tenths of a second with 1:50.1.

In the 200-yard freestyle, Scott Prohaska broke the school record with a time of 1:54.6, and the 500-yard record with a clocking of 5:07.2. In the 200-yard I.M. Tom Gaunt broke the school record with a 2:11.3 performance.

Also in the I.M., John Robbins broke the freshman record with a time of 2:18.0. This combined with his freshman records in the 50-yard backstroke, :28.7, and 100-yard backstroke, 1:02.4.

Other tremendous performances were turned in by Chelsea's "B" medley relay of Robbins, Henri vanderWaard, Kirk Myers, and Andy Weir, who dropped 3.1 seconds from their best time and finished fifth in the meet.

In the 200-yard freestyle Todd Oxner improved two tenths of a second to 1:59.5 for third, Paul Schumann dropped from 2:19.6 to 2:12.5 for 11th place, and Doug Pichlik dropped from 2:37.0 to 2:23.2 for 16th place. In the I.M. Myers dropped from 2:29.8 to 2:23.4 for 6th place. In the 50-yard freestyle Mike Mason dropped from :25.1 to :24.6 for 4th place, and Wiesner dropped from :26.4 to :25.5 for 7th place.

In diving, Shawn Pierson improved his score to 157.2 points for 12th place. Myers cut his time in the 100-yard butterfly from 1:05.9 to 1:04.6 for third place. In the 100-yard freestyle, Mike Mason improved from :55.0 to :53.7 for 3rd place, and Wirtz improved from 1:00.1 to :57.7 for 9th place. Andy Weir also dropped from 1:06.6 to 1:03.7 for 13th place. Paul Schumann dropped from 6:12.9 to 5:56.5 for 6th place in the 500-yard freestyle. This combined with Prohaska's second and Oxner's 5:25.5 for third place.

In the backstroke, Gaunt was second in 1:00.7 and Robbins was fourth.

The 100-yard breaststroke has been a weak event for Chelsea all year but Saturday four Chelsea swimmers reduced their times and all placed in the event. Henri vanderWaard dropped from 1:11.9 to 1:11.5 for fifth; Charles Wiesner dropped from 1:13.6 to 1:10.9 for fourth; Shawn Pierson dropped from 1:31.0 to 1:17.2 for 10th; and Doug Pichlik dropped from 1:24.0 to 1:20.5 for 12th place.

In the meet's final event, the 400-yard freestyle relay, Chelsea's "A" team was first with a time of 4:42.7, a 12-second improvement from its preliminary swim.

The Bulldog "B" team finished eighth improving its time by 14 seconds to 4:16.9. The swimmers on the "B" team were Weir, Schumann, Pichlik and Pierson.

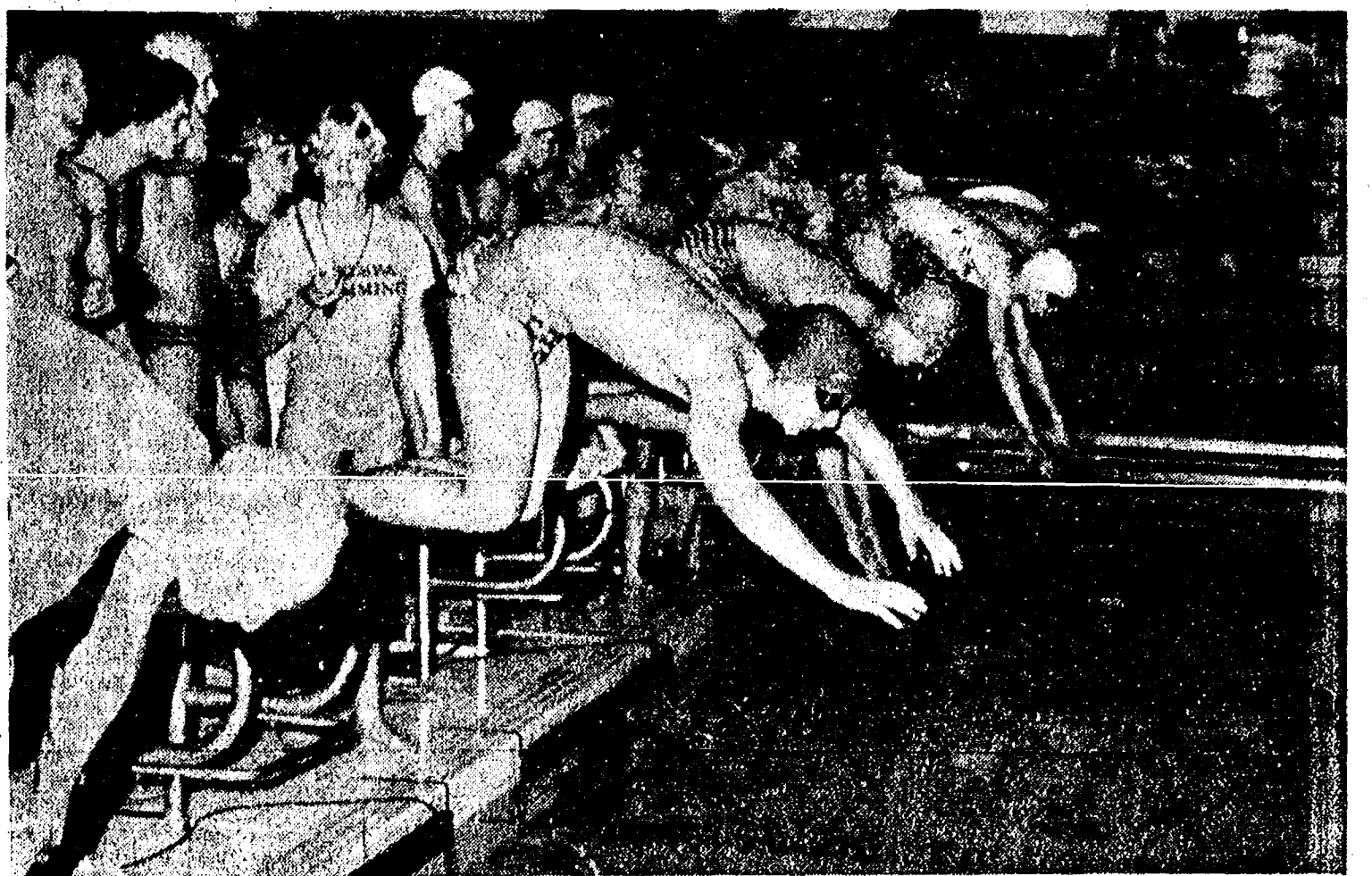
