
TODAY'S **INVESTOR** By Thomas E. O'Hara

Be sure to add one-quarter teaspoon soda for each cup of maple syrup and cut down any liquids by one-half where sugar is eliminated.





One change is the inclusion of the home heating credit form in the income tax form, Previously it had been a separate document. In the new income tax form, a table is provided that en ables the taxpayer to calculate h s or her income in relation to heat ing expenses. If the energy bills represent a cartain percentage of income tax, a tax credit is allowed. Another change in the form asks taxpayers to list their school district. This was added to the form in order to obtain data based on separate school districts.

There is also a minor modification in the directions of the 1978 income tax forms. The directions are longer providing more example computations to clarify use of the form.

The latest example of this wrong-headedness is an interim report by the National Study Commission on Unemployment Compensation. Congress had referred to that Commission the question as to whether full-time students 16 and under should be exempt from the Act and employers not required to pay the tax on their wages, since they never qualify for benefits. The Commission said no, it didn't think it is a good idea, since it might encourage efforts for other exemptions




