Q, I recently obtained a mortgage on a house I purchased. The interest rate is 12 percent. My father said when he started out it was easy to borrow money at 3 to 4 percent. Could you tell me how long ago it was that you could borrow at such low rates?

A. Just about the time your father said it was. If he was a soldier in the Second World War, he was able when he came home to borrow at pretty low rates. In mid-April, 1946, U. S. Treasury 21/2's due Sept. 15, 1972-67 traded at 109½ to yield 2 percent according to Wayne Hummer & Company's Bank Bond Comment. A similar bond today yields 8.9 percent. As WH points out, consumer prices have risen by about the same percentage. This great increase in dollars we are handling doesn't seem to be making us more wealthy. Figures show our stand ard of living has not increased since 1969 and since 1973 has actually down 21/2 percent. Inflation has increased prices and the dollars we handle, but it hasn't given us more goods.

Q. The theory upon which they operate is perfect but in practice a lot of hitches occur. When a lot of them decide the time has come to buy, their buying drives prices up and only a few get the bottom prices. The opposite works on the high side when they start selling prices some down and few get the top prices.

Also these large investors tend to put their money principally in very large companies. These are very good and very sound companies but most of them do not grow as fast as many smaller companies. Investment Clubs put their money in very sound companies and in many of the same companies the very large investors buy but about 75 percent of their money is invested in smaller.

For instance, if you look at the stocks most widely held by Investment Clubs, the first 10 are about the same as the gain investtors own, but after that you get such companies as Kaneb Services, American Family Corporation, Amcord, and North Central Airlines. 

SSI, administered by social so rucity, makes monthly cash paynents to people in financial need who are 65 or over, or blind, or lisabled. It makes no difference how old or young a person is to eceive SSI payments because of olindness or disability.

A person does not have to be lestitute to receive SSI. An otherwise eligible person can own ome property and have some other income and still receive SSI payments. But, there are limits count in deciding if a child under

can be owned. A person can have assets, what he or she owns that count, worth an asset, nor does an older car. quections. Personal effects do not count. cash, jewelry, other real estate, phone directory.

Not all indome counts. Generally, the first \$20 of uncarned income in a month does not count. The first \$65 a month of earned income does not count. Above that, the SSI payment is reduced \$1 for each \$2 of earnings.

Living arrangements also can affect the amount of payment. A person living in someone else's household generally receives a reduced payment.

The maximum Federal SSI payment is \$189.40 a month for an individual and \$234.10 a month for a couple.
