## Memorial Day Services Slated Next Monday

Memorial Day services to honor deceased veterans will begin at 9:30 a.m. Monday when veterans, school bands, officials and residents gather to parade through village streets enroute to Oak Grove Cemetery.

Parade participants are expected to meet at the municipal parking lot at 9:30 a.m. where they will line up for the 10 a.m. step-off under the guidance of parade marshal Pat Merkel. Officer of the Day will be armor captain James K. Knott.

Led by color guards of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, the parade will follow Main St. to Park, Park to East, East to Middle and Middle to Oak Grove Cemetery. Following will be a firing squad and Chelsea veterans.

Steve Bergmann will direct the Chelsea High school band which will provide marching music for Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts and Brownies who will march behind the cars of Memorial Day speakers.

Beach Middle school band, directed by Warren Mayer, will be

next in the parade, followed by children walking and riding decorated bicycles.

Upon arrival at Oak Grove Cemetery, memorial services to past American veterans will be held. Master of Ceremonies Ray Lutovsky will open the services, followed by an invocation by the Rev. Franklin Giebel. The American Legion Auxiliary will then place a wreath in memory of those who died in American and Foreign Wars.

The Memorial Day observance will continue with a selection from the high school band and an address by Lt. Col. Ralph Cowan, retired U. S. Army infantry officer and veteran of WW II, the Korean War and Vietnam. He is currently employed as an admissions officer by Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti.

Concluding the service will be a salute from the firing squad, taps and "The Star Spangled Banner" played by both bands. A benediction from the Rev. Giebel will end the ceremony.

The parade will then re-form to march back to the parking lot.

## Five Qualify For Girls State Track Meet

Chelsea's girls track team qualified five Bulldogs for the state finals in last Saturday's regional at Milan. To qualify, girls had to finish in the top three in their events at the 16-team meet.

Girls going to state are the 880 relay team of Chris Johnson, Kathy Honbaum, Tracy Bohlander and Debbie Honbaum, and shot putter Mary Boylan.

The 880 relay continued to shine as it has all season, finishing second to Lincoln in a time of 1:50.4. Boylan earned her trip by tossing the shot 34'1", for third place. She also finished fourth in a strong discus field with a personal best throw of 104'1". Mary holds school records in both throwing events. Debbie Honbaum also scored in the 220, where she placed fifth with a 27.6 clocking.

"The girls should be proud of themselves," said Coach Bill Bainton. "The four on the relay team, along with Sue Heller who runs on it sometimes, worked very hard all season. We have consistently bettered last season's best time. Mary has been a consistent win-

ner in both the shot and discus all season. We were hoping she would get to state."

The 20 points earned the Bulldogs 11th in the 16-team field. For the second consecutive year, the winner of the Chelsea Relays won the regional. Monroe St. Mary did it last year and Dexter won this year with 77 1/2 points.

Lincoln and Saline finished third and fifth, respectively, and South Lyon's Cheryl Scheffer ran away with the mile and two-mile runs. The strength of the Southeastern Conference this spring was evident.

After Wednesday's conference meet, some of the Bulldogs will run in the Jackson Honor Roll meet Tuesday, May 28 at Northwest. Then, for five of them, it's on to the State Class "B" Championships Saturday, June 2, at Houseman Field in Grand Rapids.

## R. Phillips Acquitted In Assault Charge

Robert M. Phillips, 22, of 521 Lane St., was acquitted on charges of felonious assault Friday, May 18 in Washtenaw County Circuit Court.

The charges stemmed from a Dec. 23, 1978 incident in which Phillips and neighbor George Lovely engaged in an argument at a party in Phillips home, culminating in the shooting of Lovely with a .22 caliber rifle.

Lovely was struck in the upper chest by the bullet and was taken to University Hospital for treatment. Chelsea police found and arrested Phillips at his home.

Phillips was arraigned on charges of assault with intent to murder, which were later reduced to charges of felonious assault by 14th District Court Judge Kenneth Bronson. Conviction of felonious

assault carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment.

The trial was heard in Washtenaw County Circuit Court where felony cases for the 14th district are held. Jurors were selected on Monday, May 14 and the proceedings ended Friday, May 18 with a not guilty verdict brought in by the jury at approximately 4 p.m.

In the course of the week-long trial, Phillips took the stand in his own defense. At one point, Lovely told the judge that he felt he may have caused Phillips to shoot him, but Lovely was not permitted by visiting circuit Judge Roy Daniel of Oakland county to read his statement to the jury.

Phillips was defended by Jack Garris of Garris & Garris of Ann Arbor.

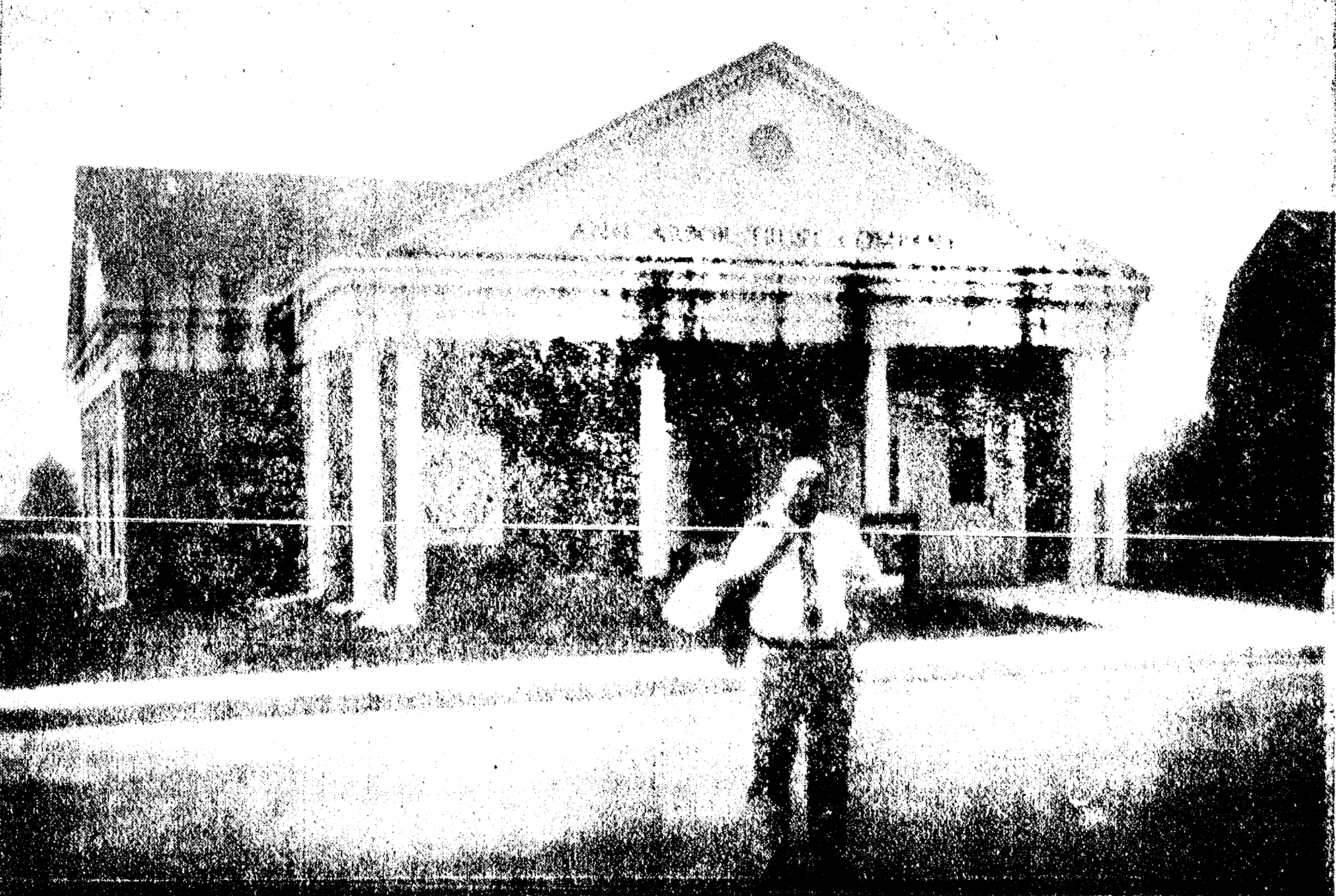

### Budget Process Behind Schedule

Due to a spat between the executive and legislative branches of government, the state budget will not likely be completed prior to the summer recess.

A deadline of July 1 will not likely be reached as revenue and proposed budget figures between the two branches do not correspond.

The state's new fiscal year, however, does not begin until Oct. 1, but the budget writing process normally is basically complete by the summer so public schools and the state's institutions of higher education have an idea of their budget prior to the opening of fall classes.

Sen. Jerome Hart (D-Saginaw), chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, blamed Governor William G. Milliken for submitting unrealistic budget figures.

He added that because of a threatened deficit in the current fiscal year, increased budget and revenue problems in 1979-80 and uncertainties due to implementa-

tion of the tax limitation amendment, the budget writing process is far behind schedule.

"The governor's proposed 73-80 budget is currently well out of balance and it was out of balance when he presented it to us (the legislature), and I am fairly certain he knew it. I can understand emergency supplemental requests but I cannot tolerate executive budgets being purposely out of balance when they are presented," Hart said.

Management and Budget Director Gerald Miller, on behalf of the governor, denied that the budget proposals are deliberately out of balance. He said, however, because the legislature has not accepted some recommendations of the governor and because of a worsening economic situation, revised budget proposals will be submitted.

The department has presented to the governor options for revising the budget, but no final decisions have been made.

Major factors leading to a re-

vision of the budget are \$15 million extra needed to provide full 7 percent pay raises to civil service employees and extra money required for Medicaid and aid to dependent children programs.

Hart points to those two items plus revenue estimates from the Senate and House fiscal agencies that are lower than the governor's, some \$50 million extra needed in the 1979-80 budget because of various obligations that were excluded in the governor's budget and changes required in the budget format and process due to the tax limitation amendment.

The Senate fiscal agency is projecting state revenues will fall \$35.8 million under the governor's projected revenue level. They further charge the governor overlooked \$167 million in needed expenditures.

### Unemployment Levels Reach 24-Month High

Adding to the state's budget problems is the fact that Michigan's unemployment rate in April was the highest recorded since August, 1977.

The 8.8 percent rate represents 368,000 out-of-work employees in the state.

Employment Security Commission Director S. Martin Taylor, said normally April figures are down, but blamed the recent Teamsters strike for contributing to the current year's rate.

"At this point, we are uncertain if the trend of higher unemployment is developing since the Teamsters dispute and Easter both occurred during the survey week," Taylor said.

The 8.8 percent rate compares to a 6.6 percent figure for the 1978 period 8.0 percent for March.

The number of employed persons is about 3,888,000, which is about 610,000 fewer than in March.

More than 40 out of every 100 adults American males are armed forces veterans.

## Fuel, Weight Tax Receipts Jump 37%

State fuel and weight taxes collected by 37 percent in the first quarter of 1979 compared with the same period of 1978, the Michigan Department of Transportation reported today.

Receipts in Chelsea came to \$1,112 in the first quarter of 1979, as opposed to \$23,440 in the same period last year. For Dexter, the figure was \$14,512 in 1979 against \$1,543 in 1978. In Warren, the figure was \$1,617 compared with \$1,472, 134 last year.

The increase reflects higher gasoline, diesel fuel and license plate fees contained in a package of transportation bills approved last fall. Weight taxes were raised an average 30 percent, effective with the start of the new licensing year, Nov. 1, and fuel taxes went up two cents a gallon on Jan. 1.

Fuel taxes for the January-March quarter totaled \$124,230,707, up by \$23,412,416, or 23.2 percent, from the same three months of 1978. Receipts for the quarter included only two months' collection of revenue at the higher rates, since the state did not begin receiving the additional income until Feb. 1.

Weight taxes totaled \$150,922,463, an increase of \$49,784,906, or 49.2 percent, from the first quarter of 1978.

Interest earnings and miscellaneous revenues produced \$5,648,835, a total of \$280,891,946 in the Michigan Transportation Fund.

After deduction of collection costs and various grants totaling \$13,597,50, the \$267,292,444 is being distributed according to formula. The bulk is used for construction and maintenance of Michigan's some than 118,000 miles of state highways, county roads and municipal streets.

The state's new comprehensive Transportation Fund, which supports public transportation and rail programs, will receive \$22,118,573, or 8.3 percent of the total. The same fund receives a portion of

A 1975 graduate of Belleville High School, Gauthier joined the Navy in June 1975.

## Plan Ahead for Needed Trucks, Railroad Cars

Farmers are being urged by Michigan Department of Agriculture officials to plan ahead for transportation of needed supplies and equipment.

"With the existing shortage of rail cars and trucks, combined with the fuel shortage and recent strike situation, heavy demands for transportation services, equipment and facilities could cause problems," according to Dean Pridgeon, MDA's director.

"During the first part of spring, there are many requests for these services and farmers may be caught short."

Pridgeon suggests farmers anticipate their requirements and remain in contact with their transportation firms and truck brokers to make certain supplies and equipment will be shipped on time.

"A similar situation occurs when harvest season arrives and transportation is needed to move products to market," Pridgeon said. "Advance planning can help to alleviate problems and reduce transportation costs."

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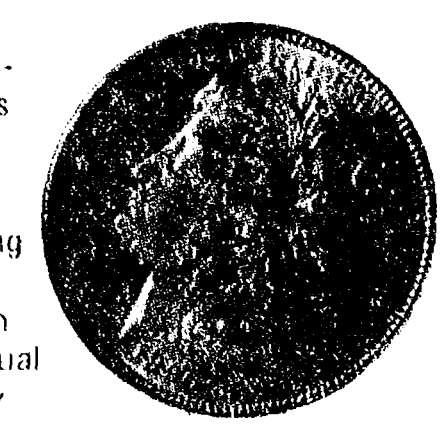

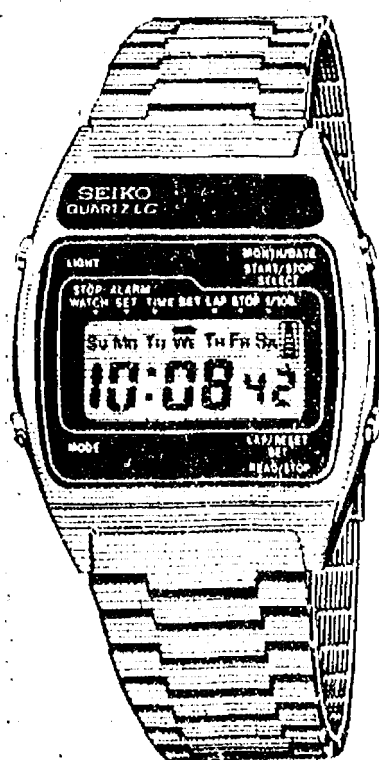

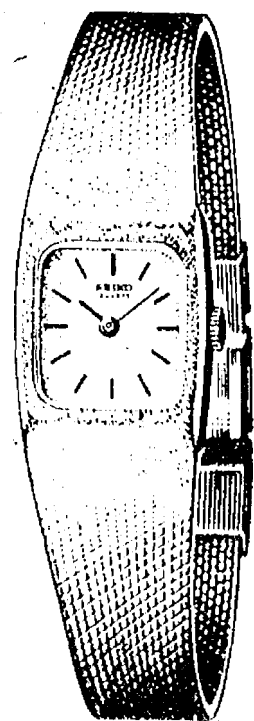
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## Summer Food Service Program Being Organized

The Summer Food Service Program, sponsored by the Washtenaw County Community Services Agency, will have its first workshop Wednesday, May 30, 2 p.m. at the Ann Arbor Community Center, 325 N. Main St. All site sponsors and site supervisors are required to attend.

The Food Service program is designed to provide free nutritional meals for low-income children 17 years of age or younger, without regard to race, sex, religion, color, national origin, or handicap. It is funded by the United States Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service and administered through the State Department of Education. CSA is the only local sponsor of the Summer Food Service Program.

Primary goal of the program is to provide a replacement for meal programs available to children during the academic year through the public schools. The program begins June 6 and lasts until Aug. 31.

CSA officials expect to serve 35,000 box lunches and 40,000 snacks during the course of the program.

Any public or private non-profit organization providing recreational, educational or cultural enrichment activities for youth can qualify for meal service if at least one-third of the children attending are from low-income families or the site is in an area where low-income families make up at least one-third of the population.

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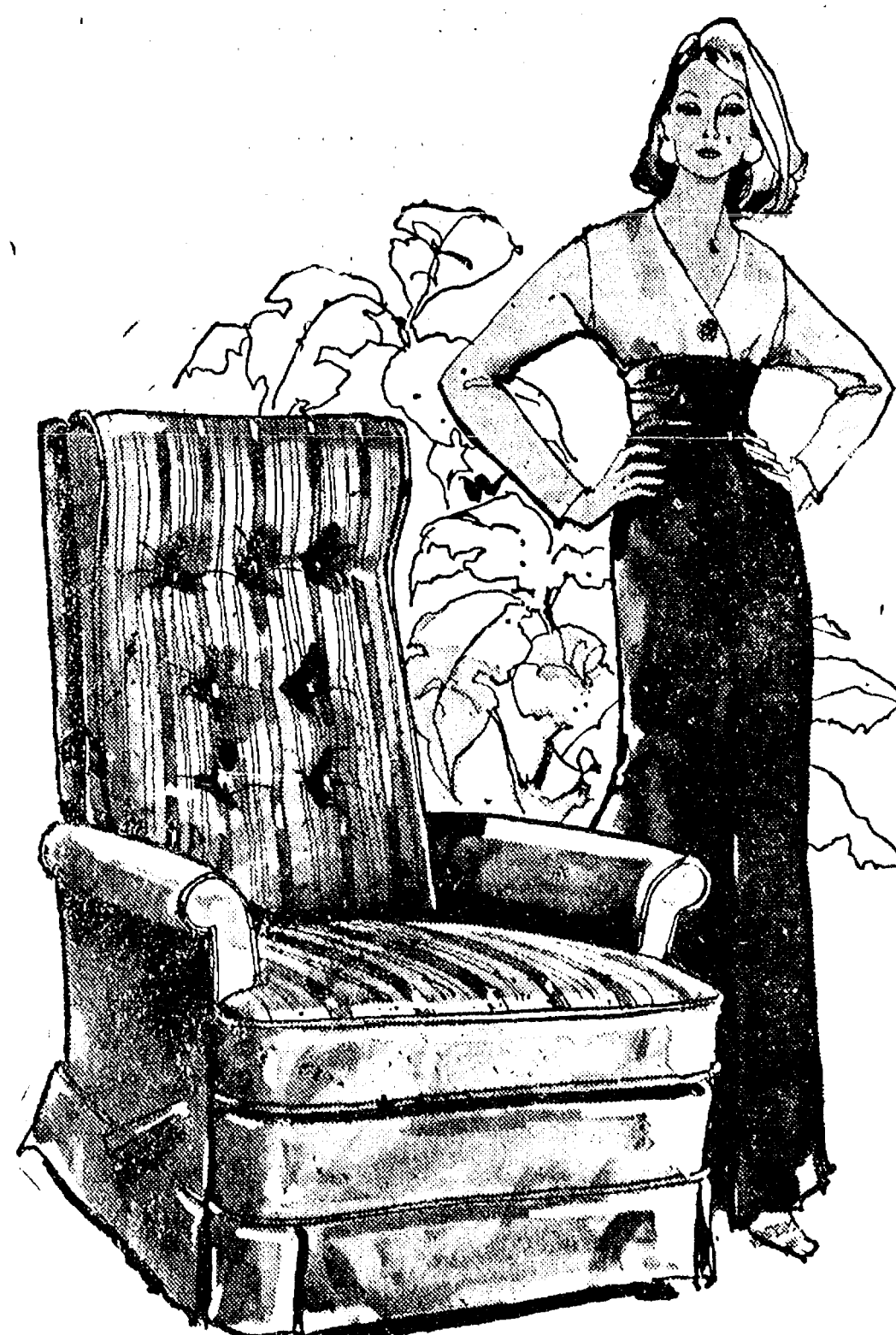

## Good Things Growing In Michigan

Asparagus, the first Michigan vegetable to appear in spring, is perfect when served with butter, salt and pepper, or combined with various seasonings and sauces.

Try french fried asparagus spears dipped in egg batter and fried in hot fat, asparagus topped with hollandaise sauce, or asparagus meringue pie! The good things growing in Michigan include the third largest production of asparagus in the nation—now available in markets.

Our state's farmers harvested 17,700 bearing acres of 22.5 million pounds of asparagus in 1978 for an 18 percent increase from the previous year, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

More than 90 percent of Michigan's asparagus goes to processing plants, making fresh supplies limited during the brief season. Look for asparagus with compact tips and tightly closed medium to thick stalks, bright green to purplish green in color.

Cook asparagus just long enough to become tender in a small amount of boiling salted water.

Rhubarb, the first fruit of spring, commonly referred to as "pie plant," is actually classified by

botanists as a vegetable. These colorful pink stalks nearly always are served as delicious desserts—usually in pies.

Our state is second only to Washington in rhubarb production with more than 850,000 pounds harvested in 1978, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Over half of the hothouse rhubarb marketed in the U. S. comes from Michigan, and Macomb county is the rhubarb center.

Hothouse rhubarb is colored a pink to rosy red and has a milder, more delicate flavor than field rhubarb, which is rosy to dark red in color. When looking for tender rhubarb for pies, jams and other desserts, choose medium to thick stalks with no strings.

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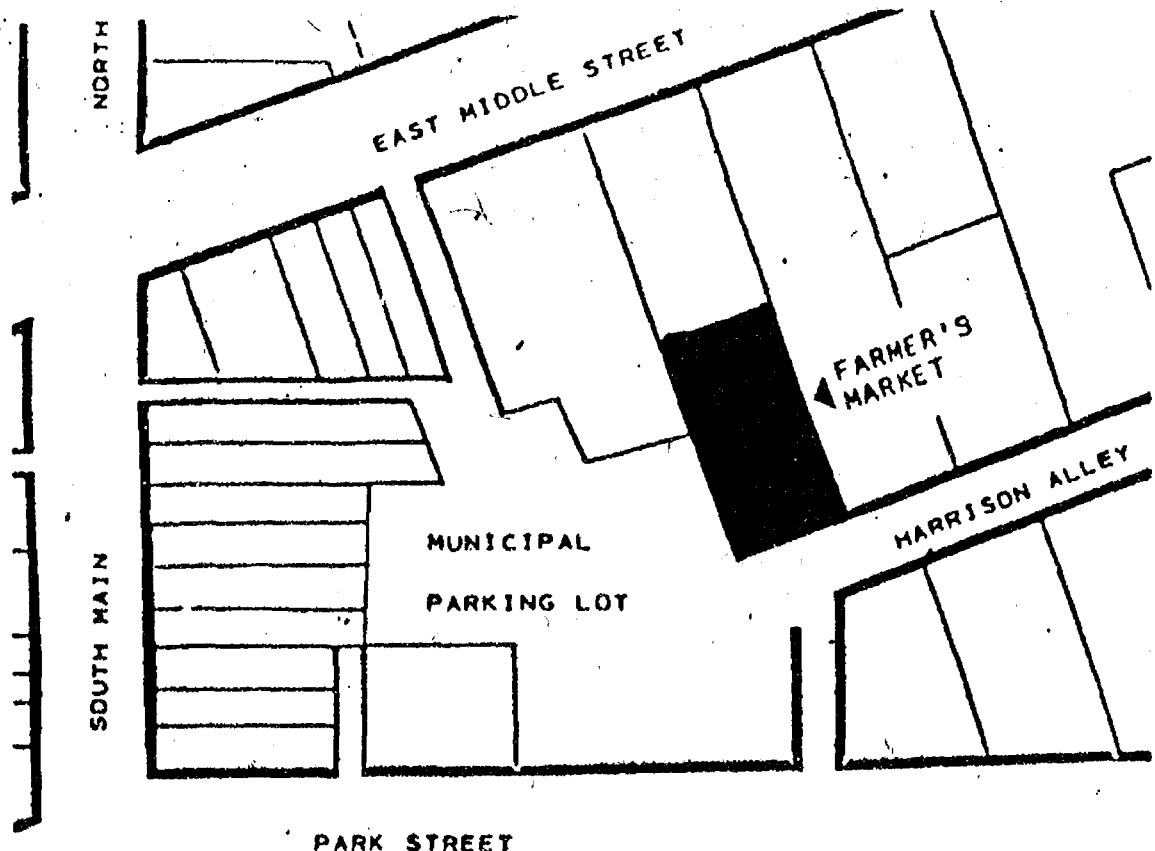


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## CHS Baseball Team Goes 2-2 for Week

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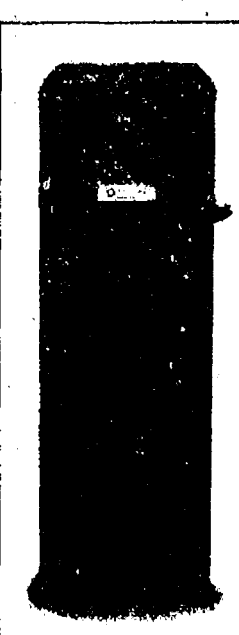

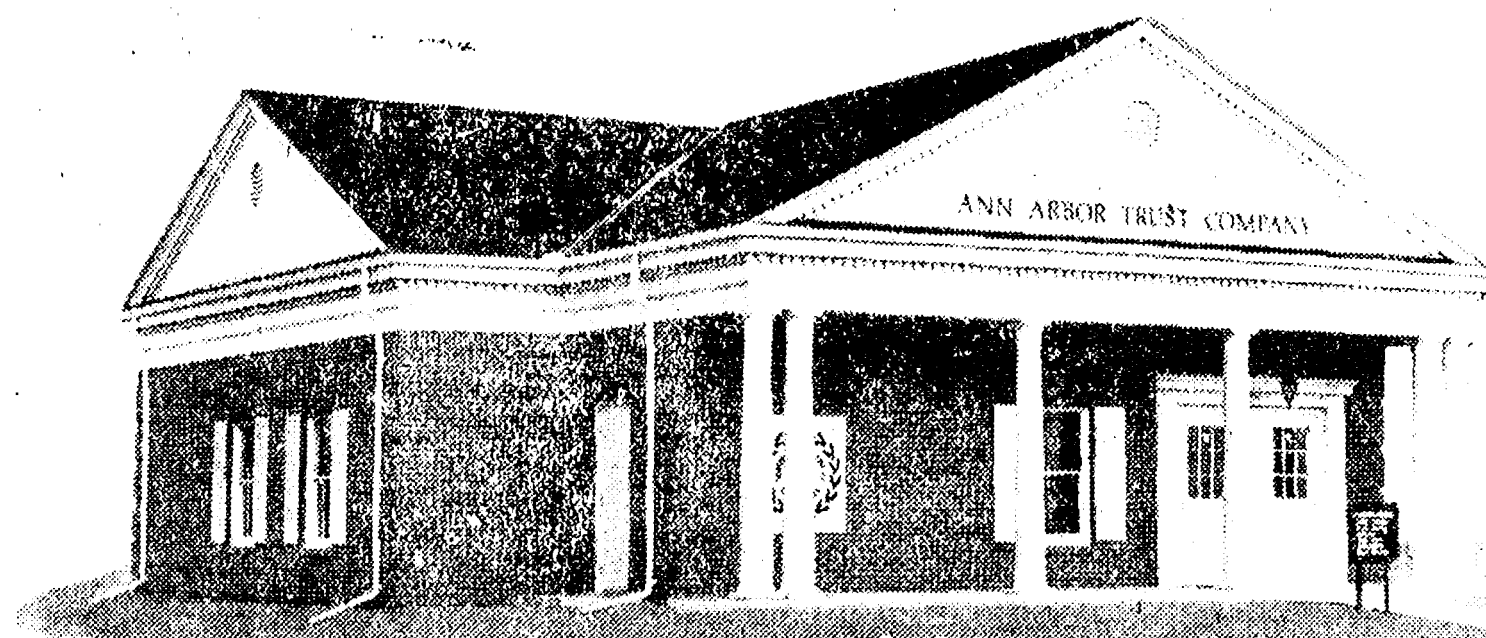

Glass should be clean and separated by color, with all foil or metal removed; cans should be clean and flattened with the labels removed. Used motor oil may be brought in any convenient container.

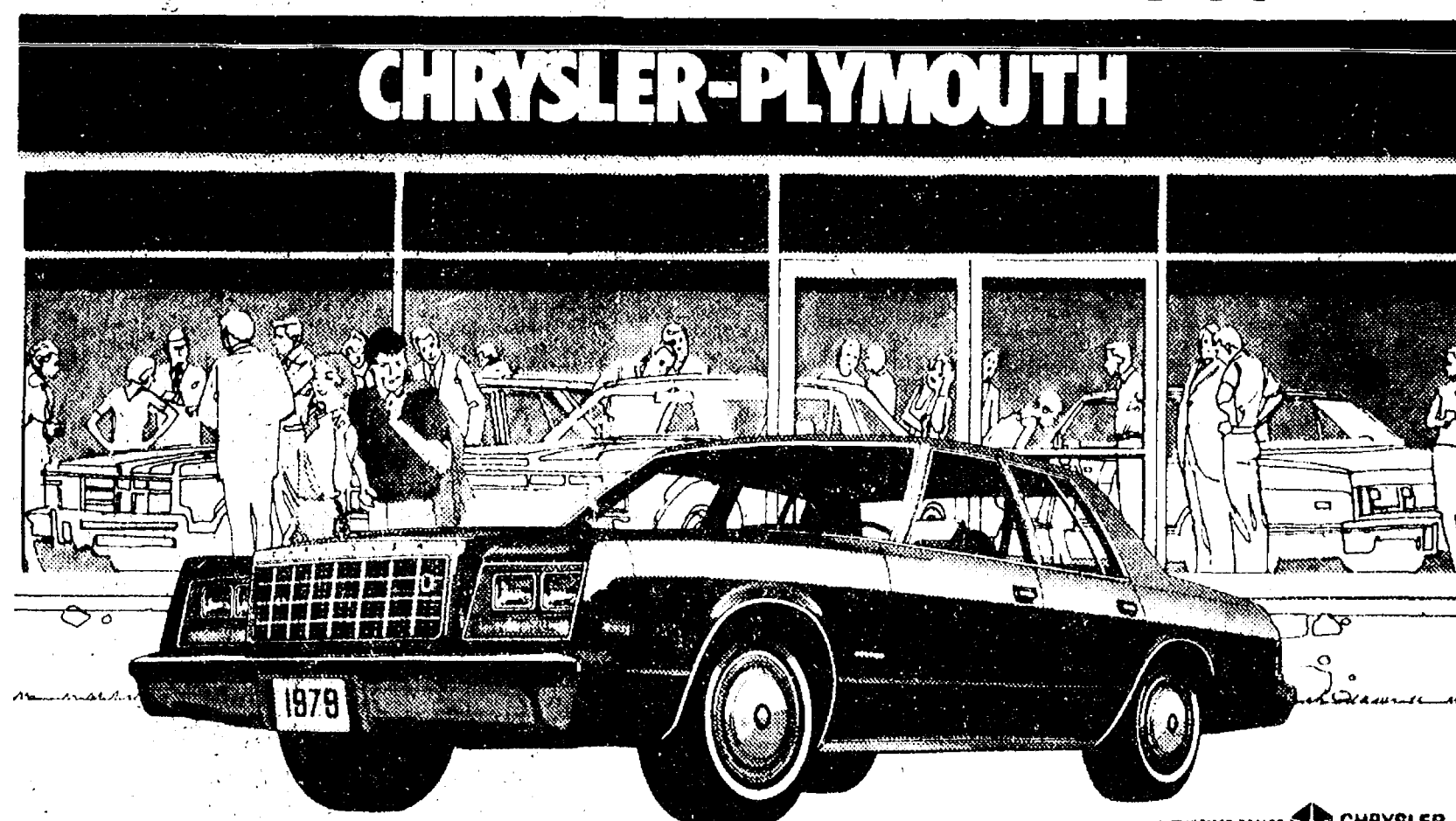

## Michigan Food Facts Booklet Now Available

The 1979 edition of Michigan Food Facts has been published by the Michigan Department of Agriculture in time for Michigan Week festivities, according to Dean Pridgen, MDA director. "Good things are growing in Michigan" placemats are also available. Pridgen said the 16-page booklet describes more than 50 food crops grown commercially in the state and displays the "Good things are growing in Michigan" theme on the cover and on the placemats. Major growing areas are identified in Food Facts for each crop and the state's production rank in comparison to other states is listed. "Although farm acreage in Michigan is less than at any time since 1880," Pridgen said, "our state leads the nation in production of five food crops and ranks fifth or higher in 17 others." Agriculture is the state's second largest industry with farmers receiving an estimated \$2.03 billion in 1978. With transportation, processing and marketing costs, total retail value of Michigan's agricultural industry was more than \$10 billion. ### Summer Slimnastics Class Starts June 12

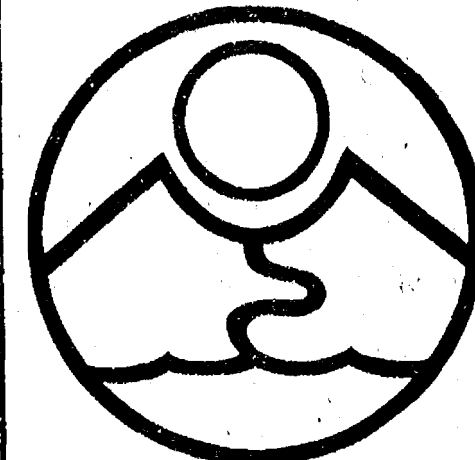

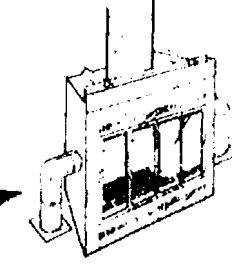

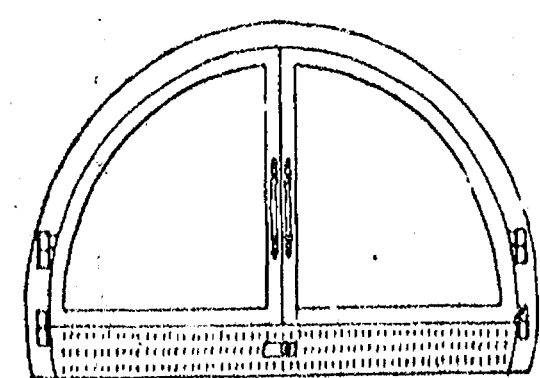

## ask THE GOVERNOR

by William G. Millham

**Question: What is the Michigan Efficiency Task Force?**

**Governor:** The Michigan Efficiency Task Force was a committee of private citizens from 142 companies and organizations throughout the state which was formed by me in co-operation with the legislature to evaluate state programs and operations.

Under the direction of Oscar Lundin, retired General Motors vice-president, some of the top management experts in Michigan conducted a comprehensive review of state management, applying tested management techniques.

From these reviews, 562 separate recommendations were made, representing millions of dollars in potential savings.

To date, the state has implemented about 65 percent of the suggestions, resulting in \$101 million in savings during the last two years and a one-time saving of \$11 million.

The task force itself has proven to be the most cost effective state effort I have ever seen. The members contributed time and services totaling nearly \$1.25 million. For every dollar in private funds spent to operate the committee, we saved nearly \$100 of the taxpayers' money.

As we enter the age of limits in this state, our challenge is to use the resources we have more efficiently. In the context of the very tight budget situation we face in this state, \$112 million we have saved is critical.

Each dollar saved through eliminating waste and inefficiency is another dollar available to meet the needs of our mental health system, our educational system, our criminal justice system and our human service programs.

**Question: Is Michigan facing a gasoline shortage this summer?**

**Governor:** The national energy situation is continually tightening. The anticipated gasoline shortfall this month in Michigan reflects this national problem. It is possible that this shortfall could extend into the summer. However, that remains to be seen.

We must take steps to minimize the adverse effect of a gasoline shortage on the Michigan public. I have urged Michigan motorists to reduce optional driving and to use alternative transportation and car-pools wherever possible.

It is important that each individual try to conserve as much gasoline as possible. I encourage Michigan drivers to consider carefully whether each trip is necessary.

The legislature is working closely with me to alleviate any effect this gasoline shortage may have on Michigan's tourist season. The

Senate is now considering legislation which would give the Governor emergency powers to deal with the energy crisis.

While this legislation will help us through the summer months, the clear need in the long run is for the federal government to establish a national energy program that will enable the states to make appropriate conservation plans.

**Question: Do you support HMO?**

**Governor:** Yes I support Health Maintenance Organizations (HMOs). I believe that HMOs should be supported by both the public and private sectors as one means of health care cost containment.

In spite of vigorous efforts to bring our health care costs under control, expenditures continue to rise. The adverse effects are felt by all of us. The rapid rise in medical bills is quickly reflected in higher insurance premiums, lower profits and lower take-home pay.

Much of the increased expenditure for health has provided programs for people who needs were not formerly met. All of us have benefitted from improvements in access to and quality of care.

Nevertheless, a significant amount of money and resources has been expended in ways that do not improve people's health. Unnecessary tests, the provision of services of marginal value, duplication of hospital facilities, unnecessary surgery—all of these have contributed to inefficiency and high costs.

HMOs can have a broad impact on health care costs by providing a competitive force within the health care industry. If they can provide high quality care and comprehensive services at rates below what people typically pay, they will attract customers.

**Slippery Idea for Sanitary Seating**

In the days of outhouses and privies there was always a problem of maintaining a sanitary seating situation. One inventor patented a special seat on May 18, 1880, which solved at least one problem but may have created others. His privy seat was framed with rollers so no one could stand on it. The problem then was how to stay on it when seated if the rollers were too well oiled. The results of more than three centuries of American inventiveness are on exhibit in the massive eight-acre Hall of Technology of Henry Ford Museum, Dearborn. Some of the artifacts are as far-fetched as the privy seat while others are as practical as the light bulb, which celebrates its 100th birthday this year.

## Large Barn Destroyed By Blaze

Chelsea firemen fought a losing battle with a swift blaze that destroyed Wallace Smith's barn at 12845 Dexter-Chelsea Rd. last Thursday afternoon, May 17.

Smith speculates that the fire, which completely demolished the building and trapped 12 pigs and a number of laying hens inside, was ignited by faulty wiring in a brooder — a heater for baby chicks.

The Smiths were frustrated in their early attempts to summon Chelsea firefighters to the scene, as three successive calls to the firehouse were answered by a man telling them they had a wrong number.

In desperation the Smiths drove into town to summon aid, only to find that someone else had reached the firehouse by phone and had alerted firemen.

### Electric Locomotives Pioneered in 1800's

The Baltimore and Ohio railroad line was the first to use an electric engine to pull a passenger train instead of the conventional steam locomotive. The company tried the electric version in the 3.6-mile long Baltimore tunnel on May 1, 1895. It was not, however, the first time an electrical train had carried people. Experiments had begun as early as 1850 and in 1880 Thomas Edison ran his own specially designed electric train 1½ miles around his Menlo Park, N. J., laboratory. Edison's original electric train and shed are part of the historic Menlo Park Compound structures which are now among the many historic buildings in Greenfield Village, Dearborn.
