# \*Apartment Tax **Exempt Status** Being Studied

A question of the taxability of the Chelsea Methodist Home apartments has again been brought into the limelight by a recent decision of the Michigan Court of Appeals to overturn a Tax Tribunal decision which gave authority to levy taxes on the apartments.


The property in question encompasses apartments adjacent the Home. The Methodist Retirement Homes has paid taxes on the units since their construction, but under protest, claiming that the apartments should share the tax exemption enjoyed by the Home itself. Sylvan township and the Chelsea School District contend that the units were taxed fairly.

Elmer Benson, executive director of the Chelsea Home, declined to comment on the situation because of current litigation, however he did give the rationale

"Our contention is that Chelsea Village Apartments is an integral part of our full-service retirement center. That means providing service for the independent, such as in the apartments, through those who need nursing


Chelsea School District, according to Superintendent Ray Van Meer, will file for a re-hearing of the case before the Appeals Court. If the request for the rehearing is denied, the district's legal counsel will apply for a leave to appeal from the Michigan Supreme Court.

Total taxes involved are approximately \$60,000 over the course of seven years, plus interest. Of this amount, 62 percent went to the school district and therefore would have to come from the pocket of the district if courts rule that the tax monies used in asking for the status. must be paid back to the Home.

Transportation Taxes Immune In our system of government by the people, one tax in Michigan found not to be subject to votor referendum is increased fuel taxes and license plate fees.

According to a recent unanimous state Supreme Court decision, voters do not have the right of referendum for or against the taxes, thus preserving \$147.6 million in revenue approved by the legislature in 1978 as part of a \$168 million transportation package.

The state's highest court said (in County Road Association v. Board of State Canvassers) the constitution and a 1951 law providing for allocation of fuel tax and license plate revenues "make transportation tax legislation unique."

The court said its ruling is rooted in Supreme Court decisions on 1927, 1951 and 1972 tax legislation. Those decisions barred

The court said it declined to modify earlier interpretations on use of the power of referendum since the framers of the 1963 constitution had ample opportunity to review decisions made up to that time and make revisions they believed necessary.

State Departments Ordered To Make Budget Cuts

With the uncertainty of the economy, Governor William G. Milliken has ordered directors of the state's principal departments to make plans to trim expenditures in fiscal year 1979-80.

Each director must submit a plan to reach certain goals, but each director has total discretion on how to reach individual goals. Total savings of state tax

dollars are expected to reach \$100

The largest single amount, \$29 million, is being demanded of the Department of Social Services, with the Department of Mental Health required to return \$20 million of its appropriation to the state general fund.

Excluded from the cuts were K-12 and higher education programs, the other two branches of government-legislative and judicial-and also the Department of Transportation, which is almost entirely supported by money from taxes designated for transportation programs.

#### **School Budget** Hearing Set For Oct. 29

Chelsea Board of Education will hold a public budget hearing at 7 p.m. Monday, Oct. 29 in the Board of Education room of the Administration Building, located on E. Washington St.

The public budget session will be followed by a regular public board meeting to act upon official school business. The Nov. 5 board meeting has been cancelled.







First Lieutenant Rodney K. Cole, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth H. Cole, 704 Jill Dr., Grass Lake, took part in "Constant Enforcer." a maneuver that saw American, German, Canadian and Belgian troops move through almost 4,500 square miles in central West Germany. "Constant Enforcer" was held to discover what problems NATO allies would face if they were attacked at a boundary line dividing two allies who didn't speak the same language and who were equipped with different weapons. The exercise successfully brought out the allies' strengths and and highlighted where improvements are needed.

Cole, 25, is a platoon leader with B Company, 1st Battalion. 6th Infantry of the 1st Armored Division. "In my job I am responsible for the health, welfare, training and employment of 50 and more soldiers," Cole said, "The hours are very long, often going 7 days a week. But the work is rewarding. I like the opportunity I have in the Army to travel and meet new people all the time."

He has only been in West Germany since June 10 this year but he has formed some positive impressions of the country and the people of our strongest NATO ally. "The people are extremely friendly, and the chance to become involved in a new culture is fun," he said.

A 1972 graduate of Grass Lake High school, Cole went on to Eastern Michigan University where he earned a bachelor of science degree in history and geography before he entered the Army in April, 1976.

"In the future, I plan to go back;

A Grass Lake soldier joined to college," Cole said, "I have three more years to serve in Germany and then I will decide about staying in. I have enjoyed my job and the people that I've met very much. If I had to do it all over again I wouldn't change a thing,"

#### Eaton Rapids To **Honor Former** Coach, Player

Two Chelsea residents will take part in a pre-game ceremony in Eaton Rapids this Friday, honoring their undefeated 1959 Eaton Rapids High school football team.

The Sept, 27 game with Milan saw the Bulldogs get on the scoreboard in the second quarter on a 27-yard Rod Robeson run for the goal line. The extra point attempt was no good.

Again in the third quarter, Chelsea picked up a TD, as quarterback Matt Villemure sneaked in on a two-yard run. The score had been set up by the fine running efforts of Matt Mc-Callum, Russell Harris and Robeson.

Finally, late in the fourth quarter, Chris Seltz lofted a pass to Kevin Richardson for a sixyard touchdown. Chelsea missed the extra point again, so the final score stood at 18-0.

The Bulldogs rolled up 328 total yards, 270 of them on the ground. Coach Wayne Welton cited "good blocking from our interior line of Todd Guenther, Mike Neibauer, Frank Waller, Doug Pagliarini and Carl Pate."

Robeson had 17 carries for 133 yards. Harris carried 14 times to roll up 107 yards. Matt McCallum caught four passes for 26 yards and David Weber snagged one pass for 26 yards.

Chelsea's defense was led by Pagliarini and Weber, with 11 tackles each. Neibauer and Robeson, linebackers, each collected 10 tackles, and Steve Cattel excelled with eight.

Interceptions were recorded by Cattel, Harris and Neibauer, and Robeson recovered a Milan fumble.

That win set Chelsea up for an Oct. 2 humiliation of Dexter, 42-0. The Bulldogs scored three times in the first half on the sure ball handling of quarterback

In the opening quarter, Villemure unloaded a 24-yard

throw to Weber for a TD. Russell Harris ran in for the two-point conversion.

When Chelsea next got the ball, Villemure uncorked a 28-yard spiral to Weber for the score. Harris again took in the conver-

sion for two-points. Just before the half, Villemure galloped 53 yards himself to bring the ball to the five-yard line. Harris then took it in for the score, and Chelsea led, 22-0, at the half.

At the top of the second half, Harris took the opening kickoff 35 yards to give the Bulldogs good field position. Villemure then hit Weber with a 39 yard bomb to give Chelsea a 28-0 lead.

Russell Harris, later in the third quarter, flew 61 yards for the score and Rod Robeson carried the ball in for two, making the score 36-0.

The Bulldogs' final TD came in the fourth quarter on a five-yard run by Richard Cobb, which had been set up by a 56-yard Robeson

Chelsea's offense ran and passed for an awesome 453 yards against Dexter. Harris carried 13 times for 138 yards, Robeson had 14 carries for 125 yards and Villemure ran with the ball five times for 71 yards.

Villemure completed four passes in eight attempts for 108 aerial yards and threw for three touchdowns.

Defensively, Harris led with 11 tackles. Robeson collected eight tackles, followed by Neibauer with seven and Weber and Pagliarini, with six each.

Dexter fumbles were recovered by Jim Hayden and Rod Robeson, and Villemure and Don Hayden each had one interception.





CAUCUS RACE — Democrats have now decided to use a caucus system to select National Convention delegates next year; but if the Presidential Primary is held, delegates must still vote in accordance with the percentage results for each candidate.

**HOME HEATING** — The legislature moved quickly last week to approve HB 4726 which continues the Home Heating Assistance tax credit program. Speed was necessary to meet the Oct. 1 deadline for printing of the 1979-year income tax forms.

NOISE RULES — The Department of Transportation will hold a public hearing next Wednesday, Oct. 18, at 9:30 a.m. in the Law Building on proposed rules for controlling noise from trucks, cars, buses and motorcycles using Michigan public roads.

JUST A REMINDER — A series of Town Hall Meetings have been scheduled in the 23rd House District so that my constituents will have an opportunity to express your concerns and views on current legislation and tell me about any problems you have with state government. REMEMBER: Thurs., Oct. 11, 1979, 7:30, Scio township, 827 N. Zeeb Rd., Ann Arbor, and 10/25/79 at Summit township, 2121 Furguson Dr., Jackson, at 7:30.

BLUE BILL — A House subcommittee worked last week to complete their action on HB 4550, which would restructure state regulation of Blue Cross/Blue Shield insurance plans. The bill sets requirements for cash reserve levels; sets goals for cost containment, availability of services and quality of services; and spells out what to do if those goals are not met.

SENIOR POWER - The Public Service Commission has again pointed out that people who are head of a household and at least 65 years old may qualify for a special senior-citizen rate from Consumers Power Co. The rate is designed to help seniors who use less electricity than the average residential customer. Applications are available at Consumers Power offices.

NEEDED JOLT — The House Corrections Committee has recommended that the state Corrections Commisssion continue the JOLT program which brings invenile offenders into contact with convicts in prison situations, in order to discourage the youths from committing further crimes.

**BOARD DECISION** — Michigan's billboard-control program has run out of federal money but the Transportation Commission has agreed to continue the \$600,000 state allocation for removal of unlicensed highway billboards. As part of removals, signowners and landowners must be paid.

"The greater sandhill crane, one of Michigan's most unusual and impressive wildlife species," he writes. "has been struggling back from near extinction with little fanfare and a minimum of

help." Sometime around Labor Day week-end, two sandhill cranes were found dead in a field on Werkner Rd., near Chelsea and the Waterloo Recreation Area. An autopsy done by the DNR at Rose Lake confirmed that the two birds had been shot to death by a .22 calibre rifle.

The senseless slaughter of these cranes in Washtenaw county has also apparently received "little fanfare." Not one word about it in the press.

May I suggest that a more appropriate title for the story of their struggle to survive might have been "Rare Sandhill Cranes Shot Near Waterloo Area."

On March 21, 1978 the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms published in the Federal Register 11 pages of new rules that would enable the Bureau to determine who owns every dealerpurchased firearm in the United States. Apparently Robert Carr, representative from the 6th Congressional District does not agree with them for he says, "I have no objection to the regulations." Once again Robert Carr has proven he has no regard for our Constitution. The 2nd Amendment says "...the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed."







#### REAL ESTATE INSTALLMENT SALE

It is quite common, and in some cases even necessary, for the seller of real estate to finance the deal on his own. If it results in a substantial gain, serious consideration should be given to qualifying the transaction for the installment method of reporting the gain.

Generally, a gain is reportable for tax purposes in the year of the sale. If the seller has accepted notes or other obligations of the buyer, payment of income taxes could be a considerable fi-nancial burden since the seller has not yet collected the cash from the sale. To overcome this dilemma, a properly structured transaction could qualify for the installment method whereby the seller would report the gain proportionately in those years in which he collects the cash from the buyer.

In addition to receiving, cash in the year tax payments are due, the seller also benefits by deferring the taxes. To qualify for the installment method of reporting the gain, the seiler must. not receive more than 30% of the selling price in the year of the sale.
