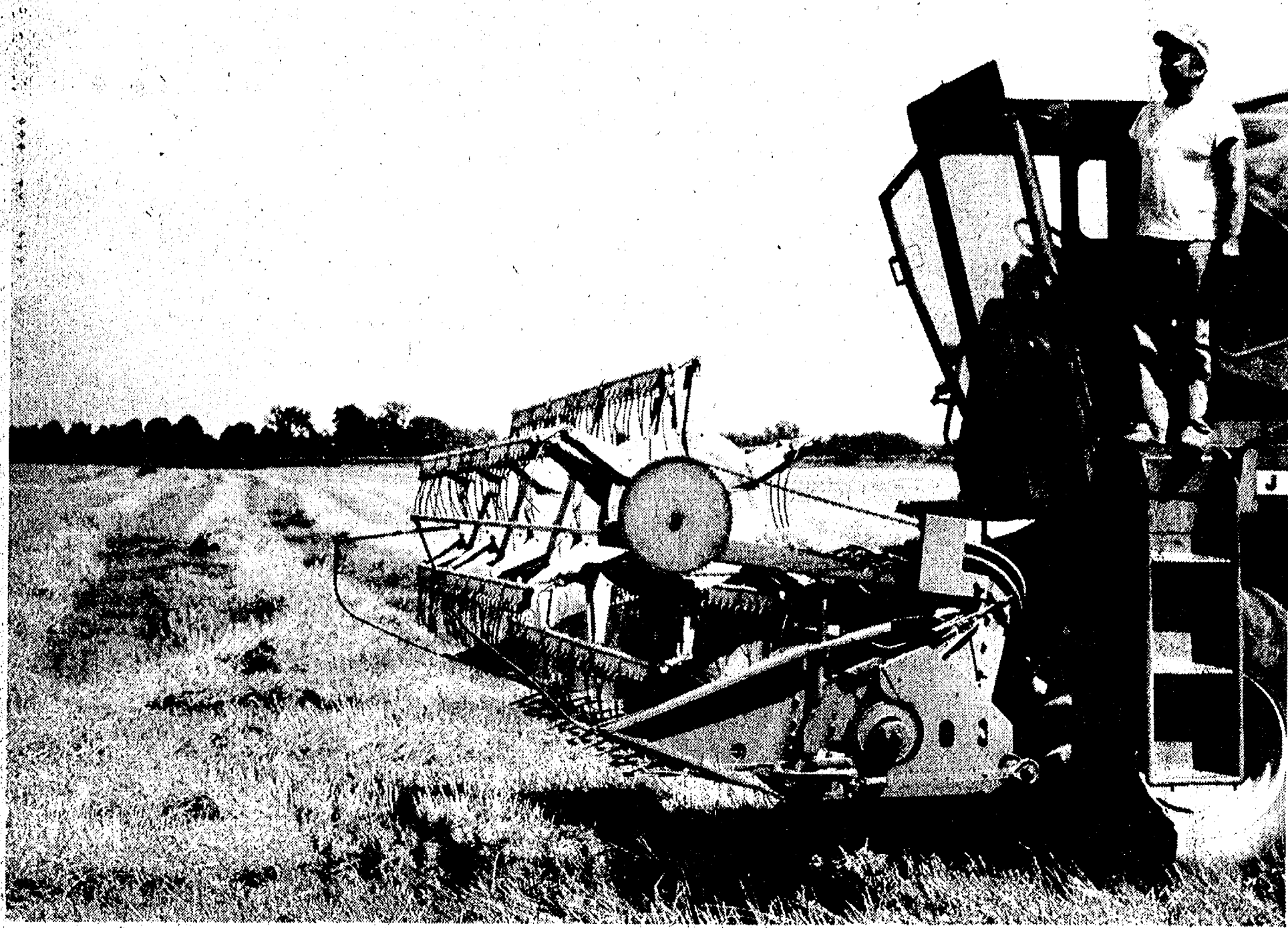

## Wheat Crop Harvest Nearly Completed; Yield 'Below Average'

Local wheat harvesting is in full swing following a bout with good weather and if there's no rain within the next couple of days, the harvesting process should be "just about done," according to Jerry Heydlauff of Honegger's and Co.

Within Washtenaw county, approximately 18,000 acres of wheat is grown annually; white and red wheat are the primary crops. White wheat is the basic type grown in the Chelsea area while south of I-94, red wheat is raised.

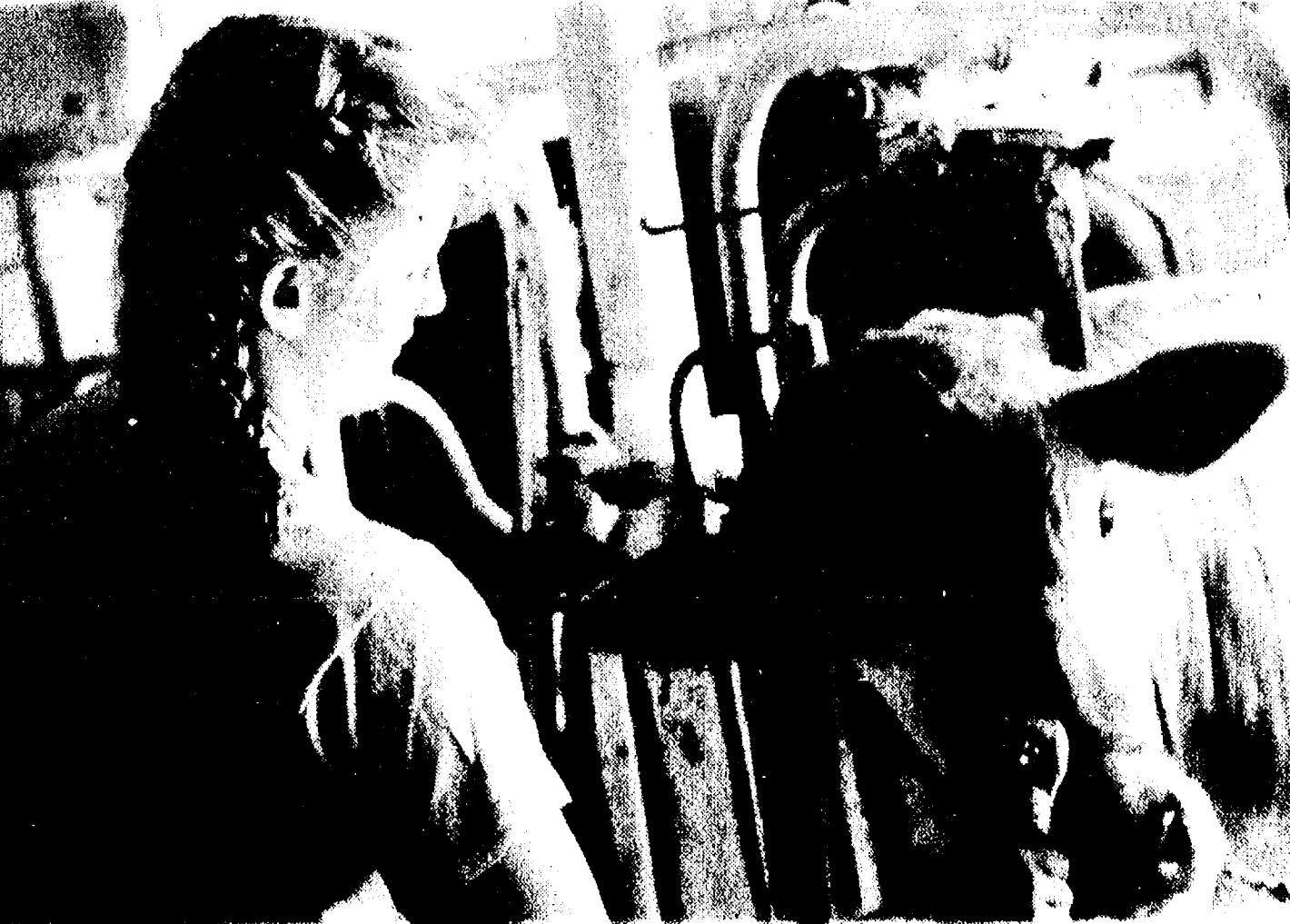
Approximately two-thirds done with the harvest, Heydlauff explains that this year's yield ranges from a high of 58 bushels per acre to a low of 10 bushels, indicating a less than average crop. A profusion of weeds has been cited as a problem with this year's crop.

At 3:40 p.m. Friday, July 23, a two-car personal injury accident occurred on M-52, three-tenths of a mile south of Jerusalem Rd.

According to Sheriff's Deputy Joe Yekulis, the rear-end collision occurred as both cars traveled north-bound on M-52. The driver of the first car, 18-year-old Steve Grau, had signaled to turn into his driveway while Susan Sherwood, 23, of Manchester failed to notice Grau and struck him from the rear, causing his car to spin 180° and come to rest on the south-bound shoulder of the roadway. Sherwood's car came to rest at a 45° angle, approximately 75 feet from the point of impact.

Sherwood was cited for failing to stop within assured clear distance ahead and was transported to Chelsea Medical Center by Huron Valley Ambulance, suffering from possible neck and leg injuries. Grau was uninjured.

According to Yekulis, Grau's 1977 Mercury and Sherwood's 1980 Chevrolet two-door were both severely damaged.

Through interview, all but two pieces of the missing merchandise was recovered. Chelsea Police Department anticipates the prompt return of the other items.

Warrants have been obtained from the Prosecutor's Office, charging the adults with larceny from a building while Juvenile Court petition papers have been submitted against the 16-year-old juvenile. All names are being withheld until arraignment on the charges.

### Tug/Barge Program May Become Subject of Legal Battle

The completion of the controversial Great Lakes tug/barge project may become the subject of a court battle after the builder shut down construction, claiming the state failed to honor an agreement to make quicker payments.

John P. Woodford, director of the Department of Transportation, announced that Upper Peninsula Shipbuilding Company (UPSCO) will be held in default of its contract with the state unless it immediately resumes construction at the company's Ontonagon shipyard.

The project was once hailed as a key to reviving the U. P.'s sagging economy as the original \$35 million construction of a tug and four barges to carry freight across Lake Michigan has now grown to over \$44 million.

The project is also the object of a federal grand jury investigation and political wrangling.

The company shut down the shipyard on July 2, idling 350

workers on the 120-foot long tug and 437-foot barge system, which is designed for use of transporting railroad cars and truck trailers on the Great Lakes.

The project is currently between 85 and 90 percent complete. When shutting down the project, UPSCO officials charged the state had reneged on a pledge to speed up payments to improve the company's cash flow.

They said the state had agreed in January to speed up, but not increase, payments to help the firm pay vendors and ship designers. In exchange, the company agreed to give the state expanded authority to examine its books in the over budgeted project.

UPSCO President Robert Rotundo said the shipyard would remain closed until the state paid a "considerable amount of money," but he would not specify any amount. He said the monthly state subsidies have been less than the amended contract called for, making it impossible for the

company to meet its obligations.

Woodford said that unless construction starts up again immediately, the company will be held in default and the state will take "such legal actions as we deem necessary."

Also, Woodford demanded UPSCO comply with its contractual obligation to allow auditors and representatives of the department access to its facilities, office and records.

Department spokesman Thomas Shawyer said the department was currently meeting with lawyers discussing what specific legal actions could be taken.

He added, however, that the department preferred not to talk about such actions because that would tend only to exacerbate the situation. Shawyer said the department would rather get an agreement from the company to reopen the shipyard and complete construction instead of going to court.

Woodford called upon the company to live up to contractual obligations by providing accurate and detailed production and financial schedules on a monthly basis dating from the signing last January of amendments to the original contract executed in July of 1979.

"Our intent and hope is not to engage in lengthy litigation with UPSCO, but to encourage the company to resume work and carry the contract to completion," Woodford said.

The state has already paid UPSCO some \$41 million on the controversial project, including \$5.5 million under an escalator clause covering the increase in the cost of labor and materials since the project began.

The project was originally to have cost \$35.5 million and the latest projected cost, is \$44 million.

Besides the \$41 million already paid to the company, another \$2 million has been set aside for special administrative costs, leaving another \$1.2 million due and payable to the company between now and upon completion.

The project has been criticized as a boondoggle since it began three years ago. The program was pushed through the Legislature by Upper Peninsula lawmakers and Governor Milliken as a means of cutting the U. P.'s high unemployment rates.

The contract was awarded by the State Transportation Commission without competitive bidding.

## Big Boy Team Claims Ann Arbor Fast-Pitch League Championship

Chelsea Big Boy's softball team won the Ann Arbor Men's Major Fastpitch League championship Tuesday night by defeating defending champion Wolverine Supply, 12-0, in a five-inning mercy game. The victory lifted Big Boy completely out of reach of any team in the league.

Wolverine Supply had been the big guns in the league in recent years, winning the league title the last three out of four years. The 12-0 win made a satisfying title-clinching night for Big Boy.

The Chelsea team started the year winning their first nine games. They clung to first place the entire season. They survived a mid-season slump where they saw their league lead reduced to one-half game at one point as a result of losing three of four games in a two-week period.

Since that time however, they came back strong to win six games in a row and three of those were very important contests against the contending clubs.

A 10-2 win over Central Cafe, an 8-4 win over Brewer's Gulf and the 12-0 win over Wolverine, along with victories over the lesser clubs, handed Big Boy its first title in the Ann Arbor circuit.

This is the second year Big Boy restaurant has sponsored the team and the league title now gives Big Boy its third championship trophy for 1982. The team is the Brewer's Gulf Invitational "Open" champions, and also hold the Scottsville Invitational "A" championship.

Big Boy competes Aug. 6-8 in the State Class A tournament held in Petoskey. This will be a 24-team double elimination event.

In the Tuesday night title winner, Big Boy got on top of Wolverine early and kept adding to their lead till the game became a rout.

In the second inning, Craig Houle was hit by a pitch, Al Augustine walked, Roger Bourne laid down a sacrifice bunt and the throw to first went wild, scoring Houle and Augustine. Bourne ended up on third base. After one out, Mike Laurerman batted out a home run. Bruce Wagner kept things going with a single, Todd Ortring continued his torrid play with a single, Wayne Welton drove in the fifth run of the inning with a double.

This five-run outburst in the second inning was the game breaker and made things quite easy the rest of the way. With four more runs in the third inning and another three runs in the fourth, the game turned into an easy win.

Mike Laurerman provided most of the fireworks for Big Boy. The centerfielder broke loose with a home run and a triple to drive in five runs and score two more. Todd Ortring provided Big Boy with a super defensive play in the top of the first inning. He made a sliding shoestring catch on a slicing drive to rightfield off the bat of slugger Mike Plesko, then threw to second base to double off a Wolverine runner and end the inning. Ortring also had two hits and an RBI to go with his sparkling glove work. Augustine, Bourne, Welton and Wagner were also instrumental in Big Boy's offensive show. Jim Strong picked up his seventh win of the year, pitching a five-hit shut out.

With the league championship securely in hand, Big Boy played Central Cafe Thursday night. Big Boy left little doubt as to which team is the league champ by defeating Central for the third time this year. The score was 4-0 and with only one game left in the league, Chelsea has now mounted a 4 1/2-game bulge over their nearest challenger.

Big Boy scored two runs in the first inning and two runs in the second inning, then relied on the five-hit shut-out performance of John Strong to gain the victory. Mike Laurerman had a hot bat for the second consecutive game, collecting a double and single. Bruce Wagner played an exceptional game, going three for four with two doubles and two RBIs and playing a steady second base. Houle, Welton, Augustine and Bourne also cashed in with base hits for Chelsea.

The victory by Strong gave him his 16th win of the year. The shut-out lowered his earn run average to 2.96 and he and his father Jim have combined for a 23-5 record and a 2.41 ERA.

Big Boy is now 16-3 in league play and 30-11 over-all.
