## Bargains, Food, Activities Highlight 19th Annual Chelsea Sidewalk Sale

Sales, entertainment, and a host of activities will highlight the 19th Annual Chelsea Sidewalk Sale this Friday and Saturday, July 31 and Aug. 1 in downtown Chelsea.

The final community-wide event before the Chelsea Community Fair begins at 8 a.m. on Friday and winds up at 5 p.m. on Saturday. It will also be the first festival downtown since the completion of the Downtown Development Authority's streetscape project.

As usual, one of the highlights of the

event, as well as the primary reason for it, is the sale of drastically discounted merchandise by downtown businesses. Some merchants have to move seasonal merchandise to prepare for fall, others use the occasion to sell slow-moving or discontinued products. Sidewalks are usually filled with products ranging from clothes to hardware.

There will also be more than 30 craft booths and information booths on Main St. and South St. next to the post office, as well as at the Chelsea

Depot. Area craftspeople sell everything from pottery to jewelry to stuffed animals.

Assorted food vendors will be set up on E. Middle St. Corn on the cob will be provided by The Common Grill and Cleary's Pub. Chelsea Music Boosters will sell sno cones. Kiwanis Club of Chelsea will have its Kiwanis Kitchen on hand to serve up sausage sandwiches, munchies, and beverages. Domino's Pizza will sell pizza. The Big Dipper will serve ice cream, and an elephant ears trailer will be available.

Downtown Merchants Association will have free balloons and drinks at major intersections.

Several special events are also planned.

McKune Memorial Library will host a pre-schoolers reading program on Friday from 11 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., featuring stories, games, and finger plays. A similar elementary program will be held on Saturday from 1 p.m. to 1:30 p.m.

First United Methodist church will have a pancake breakfast in the church basement on Saturday from 7:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Ages 3 and under are free. Ticket prices are \$1.50 for children and \$3 for adults. Proceeds will benefit the church's building program.

Chelsea Farmers Market will be held as usual in the eastern Municipal Parking Lot from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday. Market vendors will be sponsoring a drawing for prizes which are available at the market. The grand prize will be a hand-crafted walnut clock made by Ray Schairer. Other prizes include a framed pressed paper heart, a hand-made basket, t-shirts, a fern, and a scarecrow. All prizes are on display at State Farm Insurance downtown.

## Voters To Nominate Candidates for Variety Of Positions Aug. 4

Voters in western Washtenaw county will be able to nominate party candidates for local, county, and national seats in the general primary election next Tuesday, Aug. 4.

The primary, the prelude to the November general elections, has a much fuller slate of Republican candidates than Democratic candidates for the various positions, especially in the townships elections, where Democrats appear to be an endangered species.

In many cases the primary will essentially be the election since many final candidates will have no opposition in November.

Each voter will be able to select candidates in one party only. Anyone who votes in more than one partisan section will have his ballot rejected.

In Sylvan township, which includes most of the village of Chelsea, there is only one contested position. Republicans Luann Strieter Koch and Blake Thomson are fighting to take the clerk seat, now held by Mary Harris, who is not running for re-election. The remaining candidates, all Republicans, are running unopposed: Gerald Dresselhouse for supervisor, Fred Pearsall for treasurer, and Reuben Lesser, Jr. and Earl Heller for trustees.

Dexter township also has one contest, a three-way Republican race for two trustee seats among incumbents Doug Smith and Earl Dolezky and newcomer Harley Rider. Republican supervisor Jim Drolett is running unopposed for re-election, as is Republican treasurer Julie Knight. Clerk William Eisenbeiser, the only Democrat on the township ballot, is running unopposed.

In Lyndon township, the incumbents, all Republicans, are running unopposed: John Francis for supervisor, Linda Wade for clerk, Geraldine Reith for treasurer, and Barbara Roderick and L. Duane Noah for trustees.

The situation is the same in Lima township, where the incumbents, all Republicans, are running unopposed: William Van Riper for supervisor, Arlene Bareis for clerk, Betty

Messman for treasurer, and Harold Trinkle and Bob Heller for trustees.

Sharon township has two races. Republican incumbent clerk Duane Haselschwerdt is being challenged by Republican Sandra Thompson. There are also three Republican candidates for two trustee seats. Incumbent Willard Blumenauer is being challenged by newcomers Gary Blades and Reno Feldkamp. Republican supervisor John Savage and Republican candidate for treasurer, Rita Burkhardt, have no opposition.

In Freedom township, all Republican incumbents are running unopposed: Robert C. Little for supervisor, Julie A. Schaible for clerk, Walter A. Hiebert for treasurer, and William L. Uphaus and Dale E. Weidmayer for trustees.

Webster township also has a slate of incumbent Republicans who are running unopposed: Donald Zeeb for supervisor, Wana Baldus for clerk, Janis Keogh for treasurer, and Paul Kleinschmidt and Hugh Mosher for trustees.

Scio township has more contests than any other western county township, but all the candidates are Republicans.

Candidates for supervisor are incumbent Robert Tickle and Larry Grant; for clerk, incumbent Gay F. Korschuh and Anne L. Schoppel; for treasurer, incumbent Donna E. Palmer and Daniel DeSmayther; for trustees (four seats), incumbent Charles Ream, Jerry S. Schiecher, E. Spaulding Clark, Aaron A. Machnik, Robert Rayer, David Poppenger, and incumbents George H.J. Smith and Janet Gearson. Marie Anderson is campaigning actively as a write-in candidate.

In the race for U.S. representative, 8th district, Republican candidates include Sandy Pensler, Dick Chrysler, John Mangopoulos, and Margaret O'Connor. The lone Democratic candidate is incumbent Bob Carr, although the district has recently been redrawn to include most of western Washtenaw county. Current representative is Carl Pursell.

Chelsea Village Planning Commission last week approved site plans for Chelsea State Bank's new building at Chelsea Shopping Center.

The 17,353-square-foot addition at their current branch bank at the corner of M-52 and Old US-12 will essentially become the bank's main office. Basic banking services will also be continued downtown.

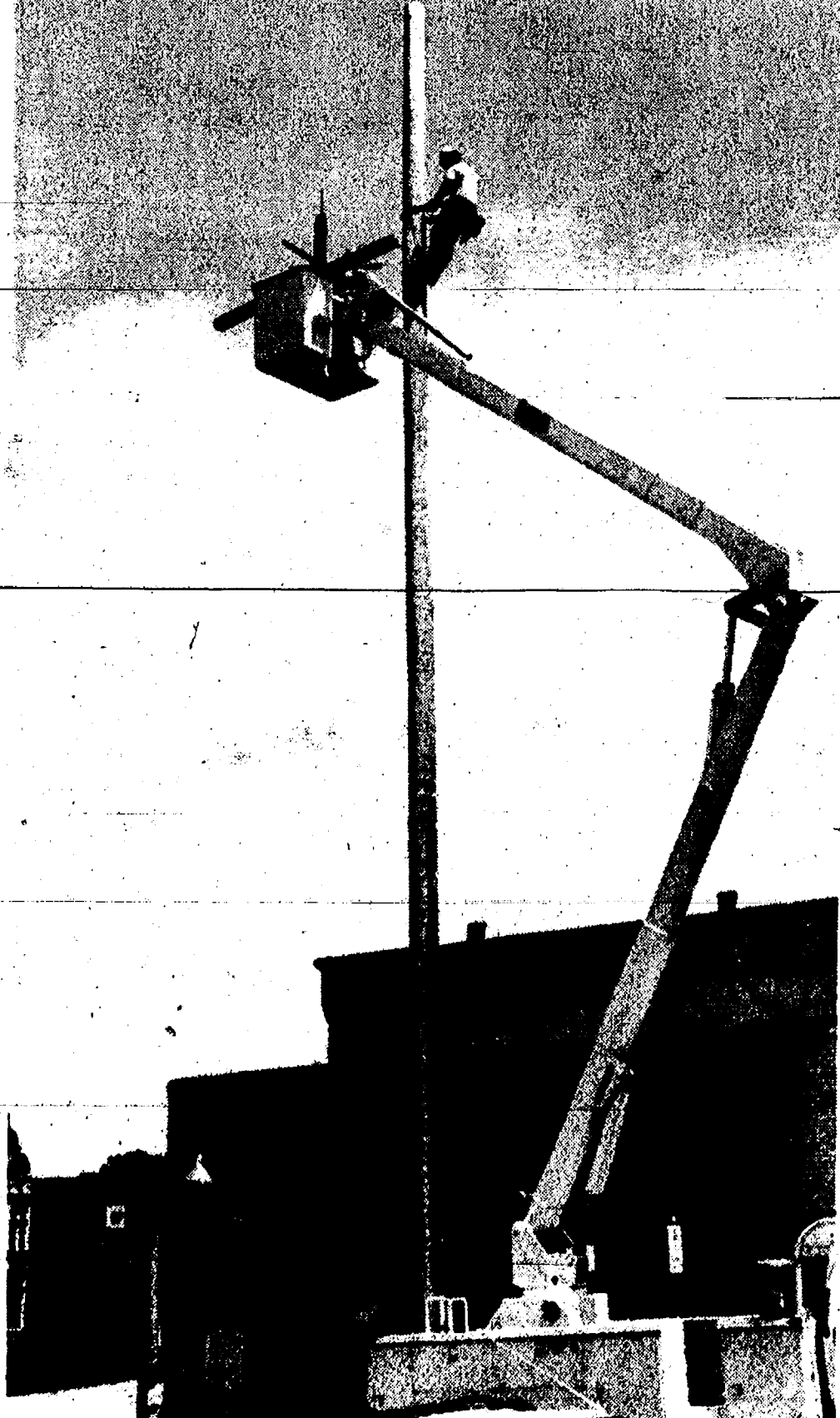
The commission also re-approved site plans for an office building proposed a couple of years ago by developer Rene Papo. His Chelsea Office Center is scheduled to be built off Old

US-12 just northeast of the M-52 intersection.

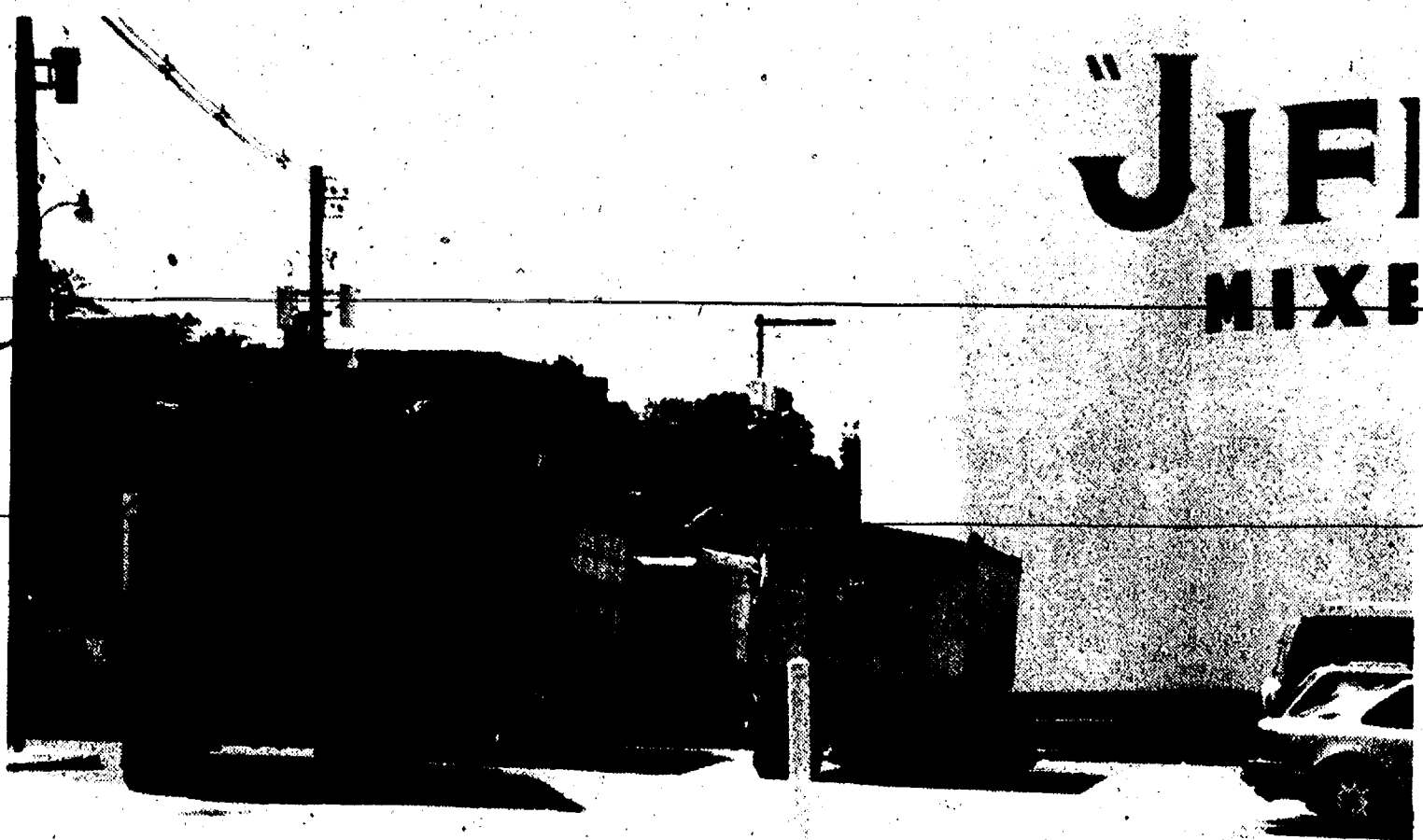
The plans had to be re-approved because the original approval expired.

The only difference is Papo will now have to conform to the village's new landscape ordinance, which has been passed since the first approval.

Several new members of the planning commission were sworn in. Commission members now include chair Tim Merkel, David Steinbach, Doug Denison, Kathryn Powers, Bill Bott, Tim Eder, Margaret Schlaner, and Terrence O'Hagan.

TRUCKS FULL OF WHEAT began lining up at Chelsea Milling Co. this week as the wheat harvest gets into full swing. The company gets most of its wheat from the thumb area of the state. Cool, rainy weather has delayed this year's harvest by nearly two weeks.

## Early Wheat Price, Yields Good But Weather Pattern is Concern

Wheat prices are up over last year and if there's no further deterioration of the crop, area farmers should be able to make a little money this year.

Provico Big-H of Chelsea saw the first loads of wheat arrive last week.

Price per bushel has been about \$3.10 for white wheat and \$3.20 for red wheat, which is about 80-85 cents higher than last year. Farmers are

reporting yields of about 70-80 bushels per acre, which Provico's Klaus Bachmann called "really good." A yield of 65-70 is about average.

The major concern last week is whether there would be enough dry weather to keep remaining wheat from sprouting. Bachmann said about 2-3 percent of red wheat had sprouted while 8-37 percent of white wheat had

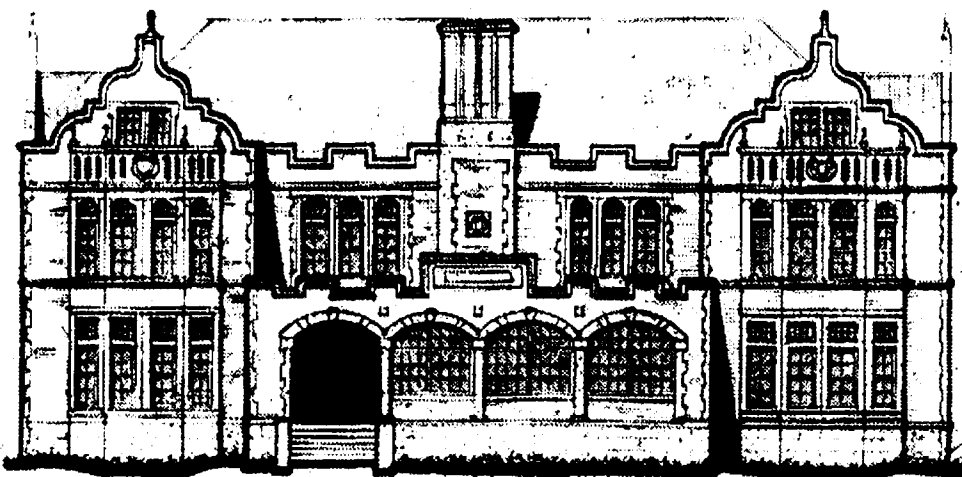
sprouted. The crop becomes less valuable the more it sprouts.

Test weights have been reported at 58-62 pounds, with a moisture content of 15-19 percent. Dry wheat is 13.5 percent, and Bachmann said most wheat would have to go through the dryers.

As of late last week, about 8-9 percent of red wheat and 2 percent of white wheat had been harvested.

Thursday, Aug. 8, 1968—

Voting turnout was reported light in Tuesday's primary election and that fact was evidenced in the Chelsea area. Less than one-third of the registered voters in Sylvan, Lyndon, Lima, Sharon and Freedom townships made it to the polls to choose candidates for the Nov. 5 national election.

### 34 Years Ago . . .

Thursday, Aug. 7, 1958—

In the hotly contested race for the Republican nomination as candidate for sheriff of Washtenaw county, George A. Petersen won by a vote of 5,718 while incumbent sheriff Robert E.A. Lillie received slightly more than 1,000 less—a total of 4,689, according to unofficial figures available yesterday.

Tickets for Washtenaw Farm Bureau Council's Chicken Barbecue to be held Sunday, Aug. 17 at the Rural Activities Center on Saline-Ann Arbor Rd., are now available throughout the county, according to board chairman Carl Lesser.

A sudden electrical and wind storm which struck the Chelsea area shortly after 8 p.m. Sunday darkened the southwest part of Chelsea, the north side of E. Middle St. and the Freer Rd. neighborhood for several hours and cut off telephone service for more than 200 homes as the result of trees and limbs falling on wires.

### Engler Calls for Immediate Parole Board Changes

Governor John Engler, testifying before a joint legislative conference committee, urged quick action on legislative reforms of the state's parole system, expressing hopes that the House might vote on a compromise when it returns to session next week.

Should an agreement be reached and supported by the House, Engler said he has been assured that the Senate will return to session to act on it prior to recessing until September.

While Engler and conferees agreed there have been problems with the current parole system, they pointed to charges of serial murder levied against a paroled inmate as the catalyst for immediate change.

"This is a very old problem that has had a great deal of new urgency," said lead House conferee Nick Ciaramitaro (D-Roseville).

"That (the murder charges against Leslie Williams) has reiterated the danger society faces. I think that means it's incumbent on us to develop a system to protect society."

Engler, who said the system lacks accountability, called for removal of parole board restrictions from civil service requirements, the direct appointment of the board by the director of the Department of Corrections, a four-year limit of service on the board, and an increase in the number on the board from seven to 10.

Emphasizing the importance of the board, Engler said, "This is not like handling a license. If we make a mistake here, the risk can be very serious."

Department Director Kenneth McGinnis said revised parole guidelines that have been im-

plemented by board members will not be mandated by them until they are codified. He said he did not know when the validation of the guidelines would be completed.

### "Endangered Beaches" Cited By Environmentalists

The Clean Water Fund nominated 34 "endangered beaches" along Michigan's Great Lakes shore as it blighted overdevelopment and destructive recreational uses rather than pollution for posing the greatest threat to the scenic areas.

The fund's report, based on a survey of 50 local officials, environmental groups, scientists, land conservancies and the public throughout the state, is designed to harness citizen action to protect Michigan's 3,200 miles of Great Lakes shoreline.

"Given the current failure of federal and state governments to address and prevent shoreline development, it's up to Michigan citizens to protect this resource," said Kathy Aterno, Michigan CWF director.

The following threats were identified:

- residential development for condominiums, cottages and summer homes (at 15 beaches);
- overuse, especially by off-road vehicles (six beaches);
- large industrial or commercial development (five beaches);
- actions by government agencies to destroy sensitive areas within inappropriate development (three beaches).

The list includes 15 Upper Peninsula and 19 Lower Peninsula beaches, with Little Presque Isle, north of Marquette on Lake Superior, the area

most frequently nominated as an endangered beach.

The Department of Natural Resources has proposed building a modern campground along the shoreline.

Other beaches threatened by department proposals include Platte Bay, Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore in Benzie county, where the Park Services has considered creating a marina; and Cross Village Shores in Emmet county, where the department has proposed a harbor of refuge amid habitat for threatened plant species, intertidal wetland shoals and adjacent scenic areas.

Improved land use planning, government land purchases, improved regulation and enforcement, rejection of development proposals and public education were recommended by those surveyed to preserve the beaches.

### \$37.1 Million Deficit Expected After 1992-93 Vetoes

An estimated \$30 million in underfunding of critical state operations, including Corrections, the Medicaid program and the Grand Rapids Veterans Facility and Liability Insurance in Military Affairs, will contribute to a projected \$37.1 million deficit for next year, Management

and Budget Director Patricia Woodworth announced recently.

The deficit is based on 1992-93 appropriation levels after 56 vetoes totaling \$30 million in general fund spending, compared to the 210 items worth \$131 million the governor vetoed from the current budget.

After the governor's veto action, including less than \$2 million in vetoes expected in the general government budget (HB 5520) to be presented to the governor next week, next year's general fund budget will total \$7,987.2 million.

The under-funding is offset by the general fund vetoes and the lapsing of vetoed restricted fund spending into the general fund.

"We will continue to work closely with state departments throughout the fiscal year to try to avoid the need for additional cuts or supplemental appropriations," Woodworth said.

"The governor's vetoes are targeted to avoid the need for a restoration supplemental which last year made the budget debate a year-long activity," she added.

The Ann Arbor News Editorial stated that George Merkel would be an honest representative but knows little about state issues. 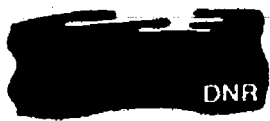

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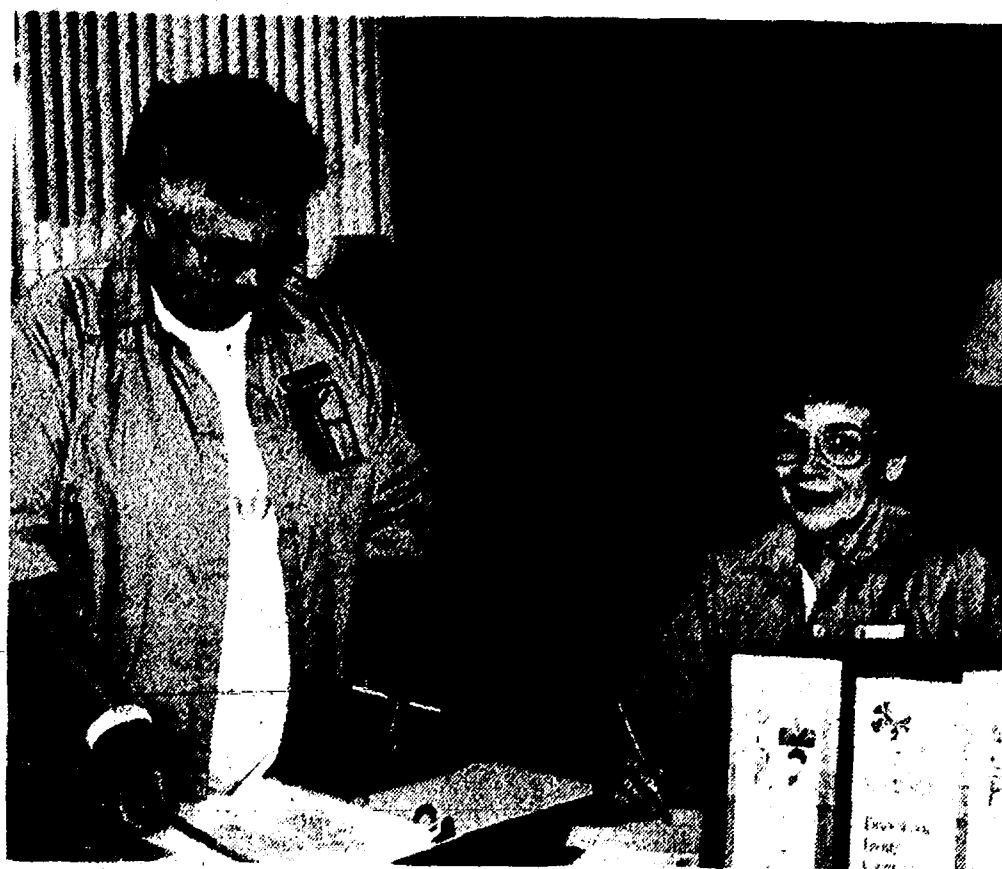

P.S.S. volunteers upon request will respond to a request from Admitting Office to escort a patient to a hospital service or nursing unit and help transport belongings. "Without further deterioration, and if the price holds, farmers should be able to make a little money," Bachmann said.

Bachmann said the export market for wheat is very weak, but he expects domestic demands to use up most wheat. Co-operative Extension Service Agent Bill Ames said the poor weather is affecting crops of all kinds. He said farmers can't get into the fields to cut alfalfa, and some crops are suffering root rot.

The majority of members told Chelsea Village Manager Jack Myers they are interested in constructing a transfer station as a collection point for trash generated by the western part of the county.

The village says its Werkner Rd. landfill could be out of space by the end of the year or shortly thereafter. It is interested in finding another place to take its trash since construction of another landfill seems to be out of the question.

The transfer station would be a place where all trash haulers, as well as township residents, could bring their trash. From there it would be hauled to a landfill, probably the Browning Ferris Industries landfill in Salem Township.

In addition to providing perhaps the most economical way for the area to dispose of its trash, the station is also seen as the only way small, independent trash haulers will be able to stay in business.

Myers plans to schedule a meeting with authority members and BFI to discuss a transfer station. BFI has indicated it is interested and could even provide financing. BFI would make its money from hauling charges (from the station to the landfill) plus landfill charges.

The northern townships in the authority, Sylvan, Lima, Lyndon, and Dexter, as well as Manchester village, have indicated they are interested in the idea. Bridgewater and Manchester townships still want to find out what is involved.

"I'd say the idea of a transfer station was greeted with no anxiety and a reasonable feeling that it will be possible to work it out," said authority vice-chair Frank Hammer, who also chairs the Chelsea village solid waste committee.

In other authority news, contracts for the materials recovery facility at the village landfill were scheduled to be signed by this week. The building could be constructed and made operational by sometime in September.

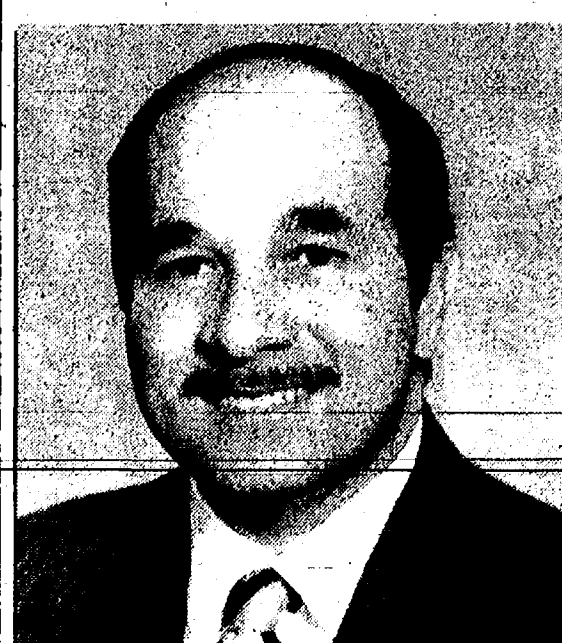

## State Agricultural Funding Total Shows Modest Growth

The final state Department of Agriculture budget signed by Gov. Engler provides slightly more funding for next year's programs. \$27.2 million is budgeted for 1992-93, compared to \$26.6 million this year, according to Ron Nelson, legislative counsel for Michigan Farm Bureau. "When you consider that inflation is projected at about three percent, this is really a hold-the-line budget even though it is up slightly," he said. "The good news is that the food safety programs important to Michigan consumers will continue to receive adequate funding."

The Michigan FFA also got some good news in the state agriculture budget. Nelson said \$30,000 was approved for 1992-93 activities. "When you're looking at \$30,000, it seems like a lot of money. But when you're looking at a total state budget of \$4 billion, it really is small change. However, it's very important small change, because with those dollars FFA has the financial backing to do the things they do so well, and that's working with youth in leadership training."

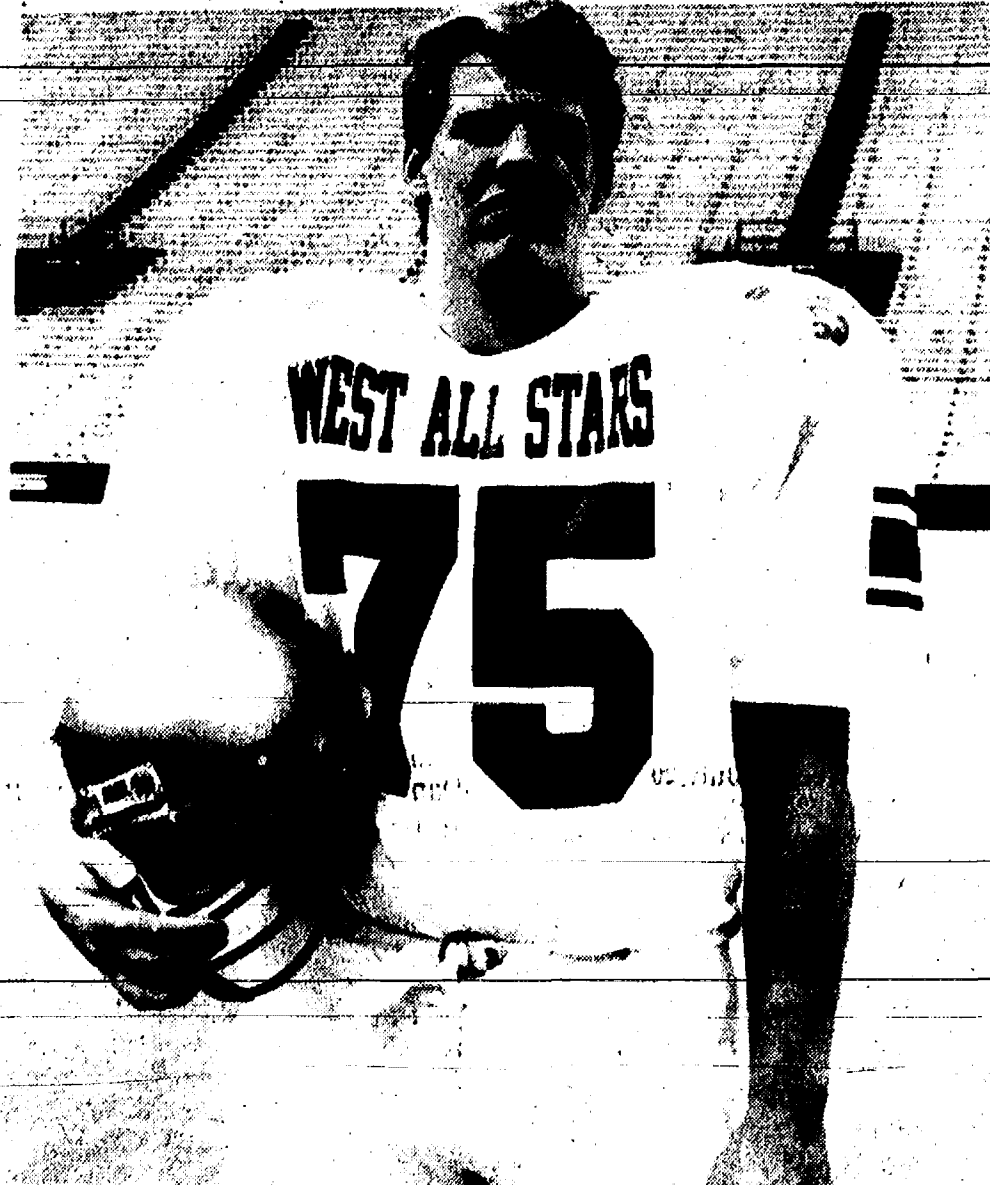
### APOLOGY

## The Rev. Theodore Brueckner To Preach at Zion Lutheran

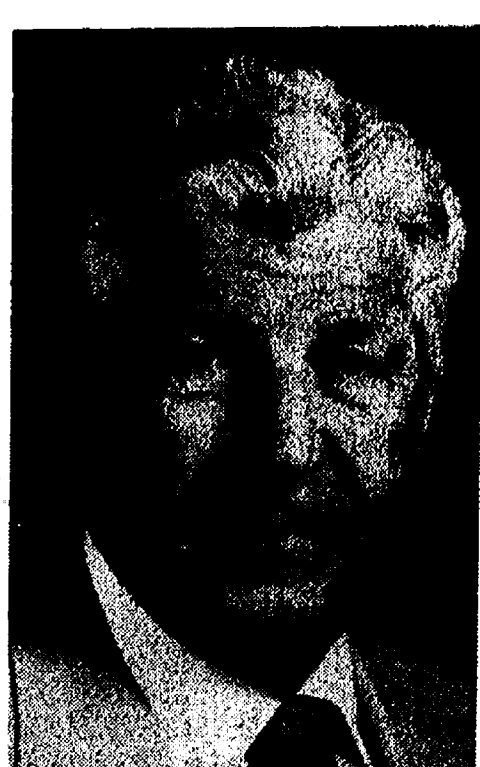

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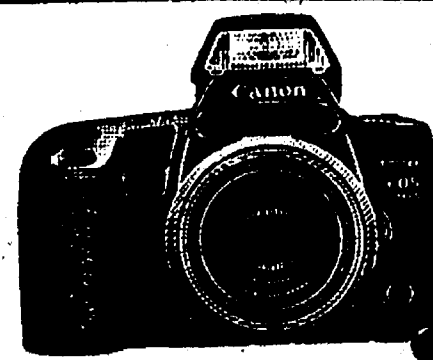
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## Everybody's Science

### ★ Bait Minnows Can Be Sentinels of Water Pollution

Bait minnows or even clams could be the "environmental canaries" of the 90's, their illnesses giving an early signal that something is wrong in the environment. At the turn of the century, canaries were used to detect toxic gases in mines.

Unlike the canaries that died in mines, the minnows known as mummichogs are cared for by scientists while being tested and are released back to home waters along the East Coast.

"We're testing mummichog minnows as indicators of water quality to be sure farm chemicals—fertilizers and pesticides—are used safely," said George Gassner, a U.S. Department of Agriculture biologist.

"Mummichogs are prone to liver tumors in the presence of carcinogens," he said. "We are using a magnetic resonance imaging scanner to detect invisible tissue damage as a sign of liver lesions." Later, these lesions can form tumors.

He said the fish are kept alive so they can be returned to their natural habitat for long-term monitoring once they have been tagged. He has been doing the research at the Environmental Chemistry Laboratory operated by USDA's Agricultural Research Service at Beltsville, Md.

Gassner said the work is part of the lab's search for biosensors—living plants, animals or tissues used to detect pollutants. Other aquatic candidates for magnetic resonance scanning, he said, include clams, oysters and crayfish. All share key criteria with the mummichog: They're abundant along the East Coast and they remain in the same area all their lives.

Each mummichog is gently anesthetized and wrapped in a plastic foam blanket to protect against handling and drying while undergoing tests. Gassner's scanner is a smaller version of the one hospitals use to diagnose patients.

He said environmental scientists and managers from federal, state and local agencies could use the scanner technology to periodically monitor the minnow for the quality of waterways. (Agricultural Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture)

During the period 1980-2005, growth in one-half of the 30 fastest increasing occupations will be generated by the rising demand for health services. 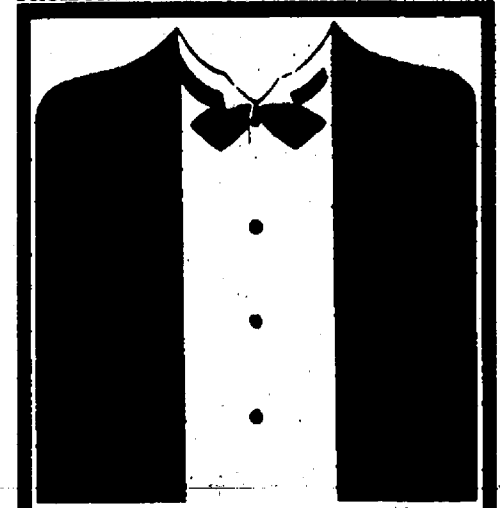

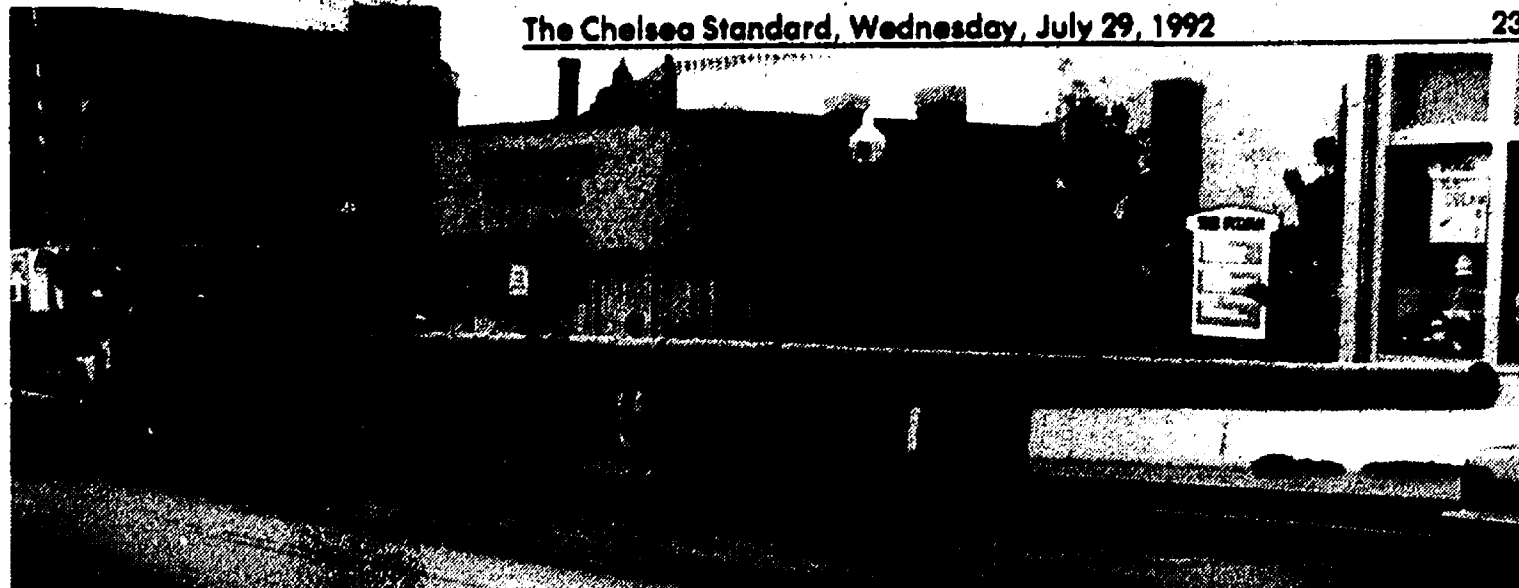
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UTILITY POLE in front of the Sylvan building was finally removed last week after about six years in what was initially called a "temporary" location. At the time the pole caused more controversy than just about any

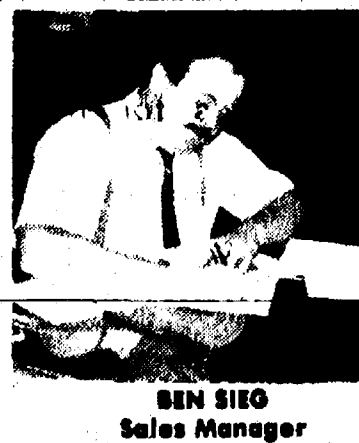

## Food 'Facts' To Forget

Fasting can cleanse your system and is a good idea occasionally.

Truth: There's no evidence that a fast can "cleanse" your body in any way, and no evidence that your body needs cleansing beyond the usual measures of bathing, or showering with soap and water. Nor will a 24-hour fast result in lasting weight loss: you lose primarily fluids and quickly regain this "lost" weight. For a person in good health, there is no danger in a self-imposed 24-hour fast, and some people derive satisfaction from an occasional fast. But fasting for more than two or three days may be dangerous and should be undertaken only under medical supervision.

If your body needs fluids, you'll feel thirsty.

Truth: Not always. Thirst is usually an adequate reminder of your need for fluids, but there are exceptions. For example, elderly persons may not feel thirsty when their bodies need water. Also, during physical activity a person may become significantly dehydrated before he or she feels thirsty. Exercise in warm weather may compound this problem.

During exercise, it's possible to lose up to two quarts of water before you notice your fluid loss. Also, when you drink, your thirst will feel quenched long before your fluid loss is really replenished. That's why you should always drink (plain water is best) before, during and after exercise. This is important in cold weather as well as hot.

If you eat less, your stomach will shrink.

Truth: No, your stomach cannot shrink. If you eat enormous amounts, it can expand to accommodate your intake, but it does not grow and become larger. If you diet for several days your appetite may drop, but not because your stomach has become smaller.
