### Winning ways Theater guild earns state title

The Chelsea Theatre Guild qualified for the State Final Festival for the first time this year, and came home with the state championship.

The group of high school thespians won the Class B State Final Feb. 18 for the Michigan Interscholastic Forensic Association Theatre Festival.


They advanced to the state competition with their production of "The Insanity of. Mary Girard" after earning top honors in districts at the MIFA One Act competition Jan. 28 at Holly High School

and in regionals Feb. 11 at Clinton Dale High School.

Thirteen schools advanced to the state finals. The 30member local guild received 258 points out of a possible 300 to take first place in the State Final Festival, which was held at the University of Michigan Power Center. They beat out Class B schools Bay City John Glenn, East Grand Holland Rapids, and Christian.

"I think they did excellent. I think the state performance was their best performance," said Ken Faulk, adviser and technical director of the production.

# Water, electric rates to increase for city residents

City manager calls hike a 'necessary measure' at public hearing

> By Jennifer McArdle Staff Writer

Proposed water and electrical rate hikes were the topic of a public hearing Tuesday in

Approximately 30 residents attended the hearing on the increase in utility costs,

to Chelsea City Manager Michael Steklac. "We have some issues with our water fund

and especially our electric fund," he said. "There's been some deregulation that's taking place in the electric industry and costs have risen significantly."

The cost of electricity is the biggest expense the Chelsea Electric Department faces, Steklac said, followed by health cere of fuel increased 120 percent over the budgeted amount. And last year the cost to pur-

In 2005, the Chelsea Electric Department retained Utility Financial Solutions to review the utility revenue requirements for 2006-2010 and to recommend electric rate adjustments. The results of that study show that the anticipated cost to provide electric service is more than the amount of revenue generated.

in revenue is projected based on the current

According to the study, the operating income for 2006 is projected to have a deficit of \$416,280. When non-operating revenues and expenses are figured in, a net loss of \$622,141 is projected for 2006. Those losses are expected to increase and possibly exceed \$1.3 million in 2010 if no changes are made in the electric rates.

A 15 percent electric rate increase is proposed for 2006 with an additional 4.5 percent See RATES — Page 5-A

In the end, the Register won its fight for access to documents-which were used to track down the criminals and public court records that revealed their histories. The newspaper also built its own data base from nearly 50,000 pages of inspection and complaint reports in Orange County. These efforts allowed the Register to unveil for the state's parents the uncomfortable truth. Throughout California, thousands of day-care workers had long criminal histories. The results of the data base analysis also showed pervasive problems of mistreatment, neglect,

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



Those patients who had prayer support, whether they knew about the praying or not, had a higher recovery rate. That's powerful.

Secondly, I can't ask God to bring peace to the world if my own mind, heart, family or neighborhood is in turmoil. Peace begins with each of us. Learning to practice self or inner peace will spread and multiply to the world. There are many books, tapes, mediation groups that help to calm the mind and

# Sudan native shares story of journey

By Rita Fischer Special Writer

acob Atem received scores of letters from pupils at Mill Creek Middle School after his first visit and decided he had to return to share his story again as a member of the "Lost Boys of Sudan."

In 1992, the young man was among thousands of boys who fled Sudan, traveling 1,000 miles on foot to a refuge camp in Kenya in hopes of getting on a list of 3,600 Lost Boys whom the U.S. government pledged to bring to the United States.

The boys, who had lost their families in the civil war, were literally on the run from lions, sickness, starvation and the militia. Some were forced at gunpoint into a river and many drowned, but Atem knew how to swim and kept going with his cousin, Michael, who also eventually ended up in Michigan.

"My village burned down and my cousin and I took off to the jungle," Atem said. "He tells me all the detail that I didn't know about Ethiopia as I was only 6 or 7 years old back then. My cousin carried me for many months so that we could survive."

What is Christmas in April\* Washtenaw - The Spirit of Giving?

It is a non-sectarian, non-profit, private organization. It is an annual one-day effort to repair and rehabilitate the homes of the low income, elderly and handi-capped homeowners. This year Christmas in April will occur on Saturday, April 29, 2006.

For the low income, elderly or handicapped in Washtenaw County, properly maintaining a home can be a difficult if not impossible task. Many of our neighbors cannot provide themselves with even the basic necessities we take for granted.

-Christmas in April does maintenance and repairs in the following areas: carpentry, plumbing, heating, electrical, plastering, painting, roofing, glazing, weather stripping, and locksmithing, as well as trash removal, cleaning and yard work.

Who is eligible for Christmas in April\* Washtenaw services?

Low income, elderly and handicapped homeowners who are not able to do the work themselves are eligible as are non-profit organizations. There are no complicated eligibility forms to fill out.

How are Christmas in April\* Washtenaw homes selected?

Various individuals, churches, community organizations and service groups refer houses to Christmas in April. A work-scope visit is made by a skilled tradesperson. A committee ultimately makes the determination as to whether or not the house meets the eligibility criteria, is in need and is within our purview. Individual homeowners may request our services by letter or phone.

Who sponsors and pays for the Christmas in April\* Washtenaw repairs?

Christmas in April receives funds from churches, business, corporations, foundations, services organizations and clubs, associations and individuals. All repairs are paid for by Christmas in April. Homeowners do not pay for services provided. Each year we buy many gallons of paint, boxes of nails, lumber, roofing tiles, sealant, pipes and in some cases even fixtures such as sinks and toilets. The average cost of the material for each home renovation is about \$1,250.


