School bond renewal plan could be on May ballot

The Chelsea School Board approved allowing the district's financial officers to prepare a bond application of approximately \$18.7 million in preparation for a meeting with the Department of Treasury on Jan. 8. Final board approval will be voted on in February. If it moves forward as expected, the bond will go to the district voters in May.

This bond would extend the current millage rate by an additional five years, but would not raise the tax rate.

Superintendent David Killips said that state finances do not look promising.

"The Chelsea School Board has taken the preliminary steps necessary in

order to proceed with a May 5, 2009, bond issue," Killips said. "This would be an extension of the current 7 mills so tax rates would not increase. All bond payments would be concluded in 2025, as previously planned."

If the current local trend continues, student enrollment is expected to decrease for the next school year. An amended budget is expected to be presented in February.

The school district is working with Kingscott Architects, Granger Construction, Thrun Law and Stauder and Barch Financial Consultants to complete the application. These are the same firms the district used in the 2004 bond vote.

"The purpose of the bond is to help maintain the general fund for classrooms by keeping busses, technology and capital improvements in a separate fund," Killips said. "Because the state has not been able to adequately fund public education (Chelsea has averaged a 1.5 percent increase during the last seven years in student funding), the bond extension

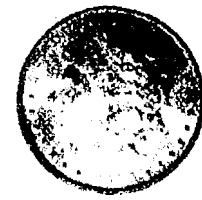

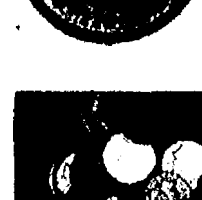

"Around Town with Linda" will feature Chelsea's Deb Mantel, singer, songwriter and business owner, beginning today.

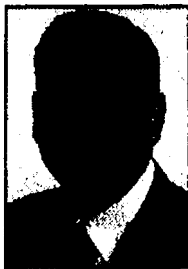
"Around Town with Linda" features interviews conducted by the local host Linda Meloche.

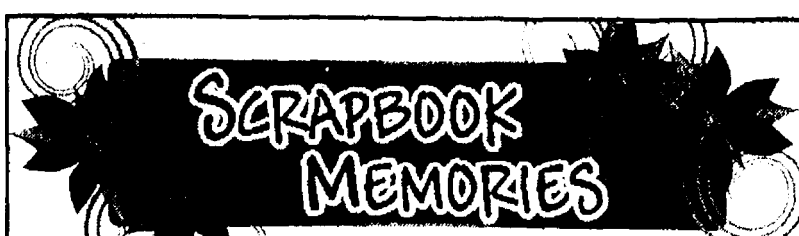

is one of the limited options that are available to local school districts in order to maintain programming for students."

Killips added that this particular option is the only tax option that does not increase the current tax rate the district levies.

The bond program would fund bus purchases and technology for the next 10 years. It would also be used to maintain the facilities that have been provided by the Chelsea community.

"A major focus would continue towards energy management within the school district," Killips said. "The district must now meet with the Department of Treasury in January to gain their approval. Once approval is given the Board of Education would be presented with a resolution in mid-February calling for the election."

If approved, the bond vote would take place on May 5, 2009, the normal school board election date.

In other school board news:

Rob McDowell, who currently spends about 20 hours per week in the capacity of energy manager, spoke to the Board about energy efficiency during a Dec. 1 meeting.

The district has just completed its first year of a four-year contract with a Dallas-based company called EEI (Energy Education Inc.) that assists districts with maximizing their energy efficiency and minimizing dollars spent on energy.

McDowell implements recommendations, as well as works to raise awareness and accountability for all those in the school district to minimize energy waste.

Overall, in the first 12 months, the district has already appreciated a savings of \$177,000 (18 percent) for utilities, and improvements continue.

"I'm proud of what we've accomplished. It's good for the environment, it's good for the taxpayers, and it's good for the schools," McDowell said.

Andrew Ingall, executive director of instruction, reported that the school district has received a grant for \$500 to purchase touch screens for special needs students. They also received a grant for \$10,000 to assist

needy children in the district, which will be distributed through social work services at Faith in Action.

The board approved a resolution to certify State School Aid Act funds in the amount of \$20,400 to be used to provide preschool education to four-year-old children with extraordinary need for special assistance.

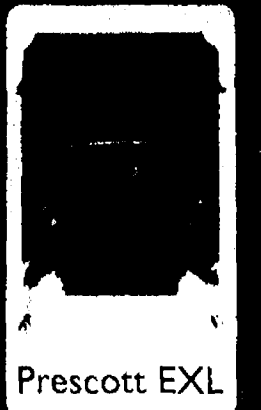

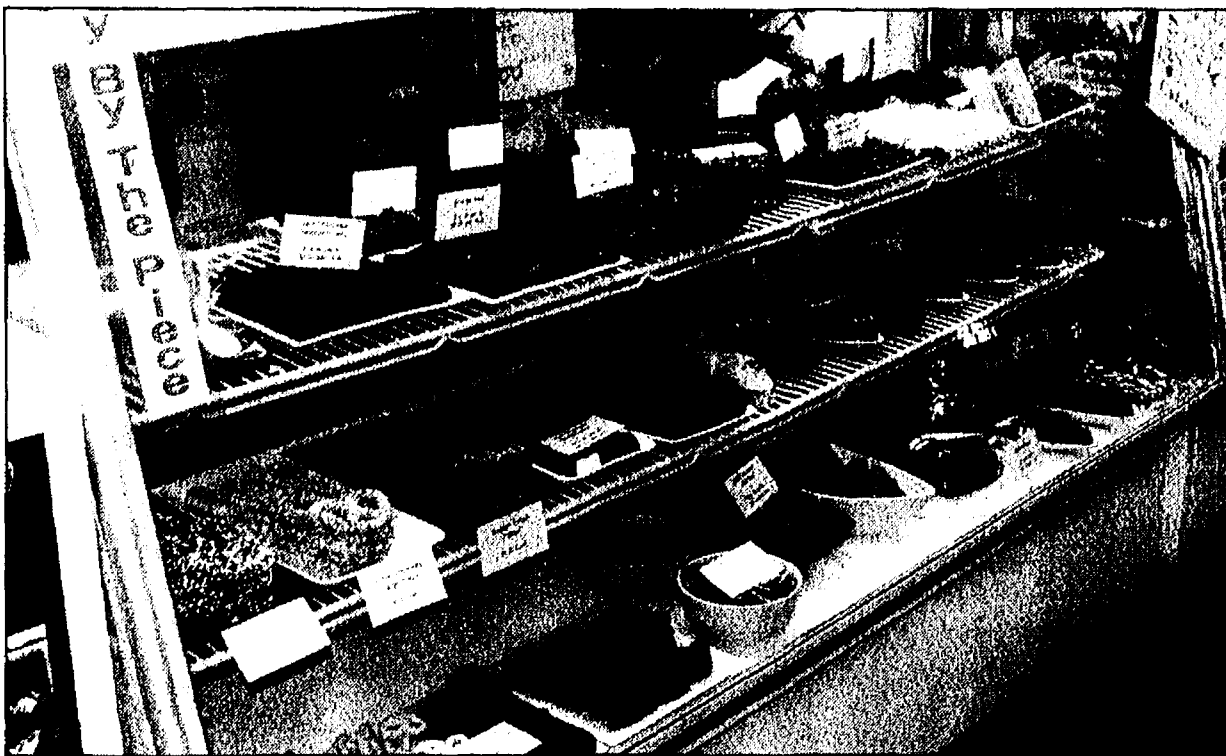

La Jolla Fine Jewelry, 111 S. Main Street, owned by Gloria Miller and son Curtis Miller, offers beautiful jewelry to satisfy the tastes of anyone on your list this year. La Jolla is a custom studio that caters specifically to each customer. The friendly owners are eager to help with unique and custom pieces, 14 and 18 carat gold, sterling silver, colored stones and diamonds, opals, and Tahitian pearls.

Located across the street at 108 S. Main Street, Winans Jewelry is another option for fine jewelry, sterling silver, and pearls. They also carry clocks and watches. Fourth generation jewelers have been serving Chelsea since 1898.

Chelsea Teddy Bear Company at 400 N. Main sells interesting and unique teddy bears and other stuffed animals that can be customized to suit individual preferences. The store is boasting about two of their bears that are 100% manufactured in the USA. "Pancake" (\$12.95) is a basic ten inch bear that kids are raving about. Business owner calls suspicious van advisory into question

To say that Jackson business owner Gerald Cortese is disappointed in the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department is an understatement.

Many of Cortese's employees working for his company, Jerico Inc., as official Kirby Company sales agents have taken a lot of heat from the public following the release of a department advisory.

The advisory detailed several encounters with a suspicious van that ranged from benign suspicious encounters to seemingly serious situations in which residents were very nearly in danger.

The Dexter Leader and The Chelsea Standard published a story based on the report in the Nov. 27 edition of both papers.

At the heart of the advisory was a description of a van described as blue, green or a

combination of those hues, and an undetermined number of occupants of various descriptions approaching several residences in the Dexter area.

The suspicion and subsequent advisory are some of the results of a string of home invasions that have been occurred throughout the county in the past several weeks.

In those incidents a van and its occupants pull up to a home, knock on the door and, if no one answers, break the door down and go on a robbery spree loading easily carried valuables into the van and speeding from the scene.

Cortese was vehement in reporting that his employees and the perpetrators of the home invasions are definitely not one in the same.

"All of our guys wear nametags with a picture on it," he said.

Probably the most frustrating thing for Cortese was the fact that nobody called the number on the card and talked to somebody at his office, who would have gotten a hold of him immediately to straighten out the misunderstanding.

Cortese himself takes a van and a crew of agents out into his company's territory to conduct their business.

"It's crazy ... everybody had my business card and nobody called," he reiterated. "If we're such bad people why didn't someone take the initiative to pick up a telephone (and contact me)?"

Cortese wasn't only disappointed in the advisory going out and putting targets on his employees, but also the discrepancies.

"It (came) out that we have a van out there with no license plate?" he said. "Let me put in very bluntly. It's a

bunch of (B.S.). Someone's on a witch hunt and they're liable big time."

Cortese says that he has already retained an attorney and will be pursuing undetermined action against the offending party or parties.

"I went through this multiple times with somebody down there at the police department and now it's in my attorney's hands."

The report also may not have come out of the sheriff's operation through official channels.

The Dexter Leader received a message forwarded through the Dexter Area Chamber of Commerce with the advisory. It has also been reported that it went out through a source in the Dexter Community School District.

Cortese says that talks with Sgt. Lisa King, who named herself in the advisory, indicated that the Dexter

chamber was the point through which the advisory reached the media.

He also said that she denied ever sending it out to the chamber, but did say that she indicated that she sent it to a neighborhood watch group, which Cortese believes is how it got out into the public.

The advisory also said that the people in the van (have) not been named in any burglaries (YET), but appears to be up to no good."

Cortese says the damage is done, particularly to Huey Brown, one of his managers and the recipient of the most damning witness accounts in the advisory.

He was suspected and described by a witness in the first of three incidents on Dancer Road, and he was also reported to have tried approaching a resident of Trinkle Road, between Lima Center and Dancer Road.

The man reported following the van on Dexter Chelsea Road at Bunker Hill and said a man fitting Huey's description attempted to get out of the van and approach him, which caused him to flee to his home and call police.

According to Cortese, the worst thing that might have happened is a puzzled conversation.

"He's one of the sharpest kids I got," he said. "Is it a racial thing? He is a black man."

Cortese said that he has heard a wide variety of feedback from customers.

"One guy told me, Saturday, when I knocked on his door in Jackson, 'I read about you guys in the newspaper ... I never talked to someone famous,'" he said. "Someone else said 'I read about you guys in the newspaper. Don't ever knock on my door again.'"

Chelsea City Council

City approves payment methodology for Chelsea State Bank property purchase

Chelsea is one step closer to making 305 S. Main Street the permanent home for city government operations.

The City Council voted unanimously in favor of a purchasing methodology brought forward by Chelsea City Manager John Hanifan.

The city would pay \$495,000 from its existing fund balance upon closing on the property with Chelsea State Bank, which owns the building, parking lot and adjacent property along Main and Summit streets.

The \$1.53 million transaction will also be paid for with \$500,000 from future Downtown Development Authority Tax Increment Funds (TIF), and another \$500,000 will be financed over seven years with an installment purchase con-

tract with Chelsea State Bank. The annual payment for the installment purchase will be approximately \$80,000, according to city officials.

On Aug. 12 the city issued Chelsea State Bank a notice of intent to purchase 305 S. Main, parking lots and two nearby vacant lots.

A condominium would be created to separate the existing city office and the bank's operation.

The city hired A.R. Brouwer to complete site design services.

City officials looked over the firm's site design diagrams, which showed a basic block layout of two different possibilities for an approximately 10,000 square foot police station as well as the public parking that would be created.

The new police department will be built on the

vacant lot at the corner of South Main and Orchard streets.

Police Chief Ed Toth has expressed "strong" interest in locating law enforcement operations to Main Street for logistical reasons, as well as due to the uncomfortable nature of the existing police station.

The deal will also secure additional parking that the city and DDA hope will mitigate parking scarcity dur-

Thanksgiving turkey Is nation finally catching on to our Lions?

Let's get this straight: The talking heads who follow the National Football League for a living are making waves from California to New York about taking the annual Thanksgiving Day game away from the Detroit Lions, who have hosted the event since 1934 — which makes the Motor City tradition older than 24 current NFL teams.

The problem, of course, is that the rest of the nation has finally caught up with what we knew all along: The Lions are horrible. They have been bad this year, winless in a dozen games. They weren't much better last year, despite a 6-2 start, or the year before that or the year before that.

While parity reigns in the NFL, the Lions buck the system and play consistently pathetic football. They manage poorly. They hire poorly. They coach poorly. And as a result of all of that, they put a poor product on the field.

None of this is anything new. Since Detroit was crowned as

"City of Champions" in the 1950s, the Lions have languished in professional football purgatory. Every so often, they grab lightning in a bottle (Barry Sanders, Billy Sims, Lem Barney, etc.) and compete for a few years.

If anything, the Lions are the anti-NFL NFL team. While the league strives to make every team and every game competitive, the Lions continue to buck the trend.

That leads to some of the most

unique results in the world, such as Matt Millen holding on to his job for the better part of a decade, despite the fact that his teams finished almost 60 games under .500. Or the fact that former coach Wayne Fontes is the Lions' all-time leader in career victories — and losses — with an all-time mark under .500. It leads to the fact that legends like Don Shula and Chuck Knox coached here, but were never given the head coaching job.

It led to this scenario nearly two decades ago: Russ Thomas was the Matt Millen of his day, running the Lions for nearly two decades as they floundered here and there. When he retired, owner William Clay Ford dedicated a "game" to him — on the road, in Atlanta. That was one of the few things in Lions' history that actually made sense. Had Thomas been honored in Detroit, he would have been handed in effigy.

The Lions are bad for a lot of reasons, many of them going back decades. To get a good handle on them, take a walk through

the ABCs of Lions' football through the eyes of a beleaguered 52-year-old fan:

"A" is for Andolsek. Eric was a fine guard out of LSU, a potential All-Pro, who was killed after his fourth season on the team in 1991. He was working in his front yard when a truck ran off the road and ran him down. There is a trend for disasters on this team.

"B" is for defensive tackle Bob Bell (1971-73) or offensive tackle Lynn Boden (1975-78). You think the Lions have made poor draft picks in the past decade? Bell and Boden were two of the worst — and that was three decades ago.

"C" is for Stoney Case, former backup quarterback. If he had been any good subbing for an injured Charlie Batch on the last Detroit team to fight for a playoff berth in 2000, Ford never would have hired Millen and the Lions might actually be mediocre, instead of horrible.

"D" is for Ty Detmer and his seven interceptions at

Our Chelsea History



What style and what year was the Chelsea Post Office completed?

- A. Art Deco 1947
- B. Starved Classicism 1937
- C. Commercial Victorian 1900

Answer B. In early 1930s, about 40,000 post offices were built across America as WPA projects under president Franklin D. Roosevelt. The Chelsea Post Office appears almost the same as it did in 1937. Inside and outside features preserved are the tiled lobby with brass mail boxes, two desks, postmaster's "look out" over the mail workers area from a hidden catwalk, granite steps and aluminum lanterns. The front facade limestone carvings in the three large lintels represent mail delivery by plane, train and ship. During planning and construction Mr. Witherall was the postmaster and Spence Brothers of Grand Rapids were the builders. The mural "Way of Life" by George Fisher was added in 1938.

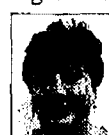

Chelsea Area Police Briefs

A Chelsea patrol officer was parked on South Street at 7:40 p.m. Nov. 16 on the corner of Park and East streets watching a red light when a white Chevy Silver made a right hand turn onto east bound park street against the light.

The officer pulled the driver over at the stop sign on East and the driver proceeded through an intersection and pulled to the curb in the 200 block of Park Street.

When the driver was asked for his license, registration and proof of insurance, he told the officer he didn't have his license on him, but provided the other two items.

When ran through LEIN, the license came up restricted, and it had expired in 2004. The driver had also been arrested previously for operating while intoxicated in 2003.

When confronted the driver claimed that part of his probation included a breathalyzer activated ignition system or interlock system, and that he had it over-turned in court. He also told the officer that he never bothered reapplying for the

license because of the "additional cost."

The restriction for an interlock system still applied to the driver, according to police. He was issued a civil infraction for disregarding the yellow light and a misdemeanor violation for expired operator's license.

Chelsea police responded to a 911 call regarding an unknown medical problem at 10 p.m. Nov. 16. The call originated from the 500 block of Lane Street.

Upon arrival the Chelsea Area Fire Authority found a 31 year old female, who was unresponsive.

Resuscitation efforts were unsuccessful.

Police suspect substance abuse for the death.

The woman lived with her grandmother and was her primary caregiver.

The grandmother was placed into the care of the Washtenaw County Adult Protective Services department.

Someone used their vehicle to forcibly push another vehicle into a garage in the 6000 block of Sibley Road at

10:45 p.m. Nov. 17.

The single-family one-story brick ranch style home with two car garage was found with a Chevy pickup truck protruding into the garage door, police said.

The corner of the garage and residence structure was pushed in and a section of bricks was found lying on the hood of the homeowner's truck.

Pieces of a broken grill and a plastic "Ford" blue oval grill ornament was found lying directly behind the pick-up truck.

Police found a single set of vehicle tracks in the newly fallen snow. The tracks came from a west bound vehicle and entered the driveway.

A set of tracks led directly to the back of the truck, more tracks backed a short way from the vehicle then turned and went west bound through the flower bed lining the driveway, the side yard and exited back onto west bound Sibley.

The homeowner was standing at his front door and had just turned off the front porch lights when a gray Ford truck with wood

racks turned into his driveway and struck his parked truck, police said.

The homeowner identified the driver as an acquaintance of 30 years by use of a flashlight.

Officers went to the suspect's house and confronted

him. He said the witness was a liar and claimed to be home all night.

The man was arrested for outstanding felony warrant third degree operating while intoxicated and driving while license suspended, and police said they

would seek a warrant for the current incident.

Officers found tire tracks at the scene and at the suspects house matched up when they looked at the "aggressive tread pattern" on the suspect's tires.

ing heavy influxes of traffic into the Chelsea downtown.

The motion was moved and seconded by Councilpersons Frank Hammer and Cheri Albertson, respectively.

Albertson pointed out that "the public may want to know payment is commensurate to what the city is currently paying the bank."

The city had been paying \$90,000 a year to lease about half the ground floor and the entire basement of the bank branch. Under the purchase agreement, that \$90,000 will be applied to


the purchase.

Under the agreement, that \$90,000 would be applied to the purchase this year, along with \$150,000 in budgeted

Capital Improvement Plan funds, plus \$300,000 each from the

city's General Fund and DDA funds.

The city and DDA would also pitch in \$115,000 each for the next three fiscal years to complete the purchase.

EMU football team awarded for record-breaking win over CMU

QB Andy Schmitt wins national honor

YPSILANTI, Mich. — A record-breaking performance by the Eastern Michigan University football team in the 2008 season finale paid off in a host of awards for the Eagles.

Eastern closed out its season with a thrilling, 56-52, upset win over a visiting Central Michigan University squad Friday, Nov. 28, in Ryneerson Stadium.

EMU redshirt-junior quarterback **Andy Schmitt (St. Johns, Mich.-St. Johns)** completed 58-of-80 passes for 516 yards and five touchdowns and also rushed nine times for 38 yards and one score in the win over CMU.

Schmitt's 58 completions against Central broke the NCAA collegiate record of 56 set by Jarrod DeGeorgia of Wayne State (Neb.) against Drake, Nov. 9, 1996. Schmitt set EMU and MAC single-game records for pass completions (58), and pass attempts (80), and established additional EMU records for passing yards (516), total offensive plays (89) and total offensive yards (554).

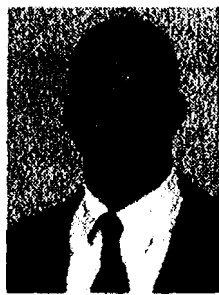
For his efforts, Schmitt was named the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision National Offensive Player of the Week by the Walter Camp Football Foundation. The foundation honors one offensive and one defensive player of the week during the regular season. Recipients are selected by a panel of national media members and administered by the Walter Camp Football Foundation.

In addition to that award, Schmitt was also selected as the Mid-American Conference West Division Offensive Player of the Week for his standout play versus the Chippewas.

EMU punter **Patrick Treppa (Livonia, Mich.-Stevenson)** earned the MAC's West Division Player of the Week award for his contributions to the Eagles' victory.

Treppa, a 5-foot-10, 157 pound redshirt sophomore, punted four times for a 40-yard average with a long of 49 yards and had one punt downed inside the 20-yard line against CMU. Treppa's 30-yard punt, under extreme pressure with less than two minutes left in the game, went out of bounds at the CMU 29-yard line, letting the defense set up a stand that helped the Eagles preserve the win.

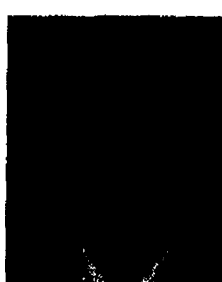
The Eagles also received an outstanding effort by senior wide receiver **Tyler Jones (Belleville, Mich.-Belleville)** who tied a FBS single-game record for pass receptions with 23 for 170 yards against the Chippewas. That record tied UNLV's Randy Gatewood who recorded 23 receptions, Sept. 17, 1994, against Idaho.

driving or waiting in long lines in itself doesn't cost any money, but what valuable thing could you do with those extra few hours this season? Bake cookies; visit a friend; go sledding with the kids; organize a box of photos – you get the idea.

Local businesses create and maintain jobs. They are also more likely to treat their employees better than the big businesses do.

The taxes they pay help to fund city services, most of which are probably invisible to the average citizen – until you no longer have them.

Studies have shown that businesses return about 70% of every dollar that consumers spend back into their community. They donate money to support local charities, our schools, and our children.

For a while, we kept up the façade by walking downtown and reminiscing, until we realized illegal drugs

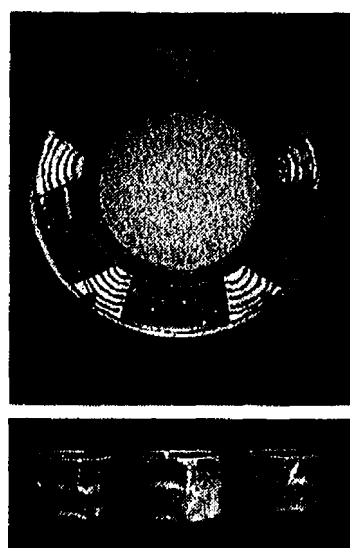

"F" is for former quarterback Joe Ferguson, once a standout Buffalo Bill, who was nearly dismembered by Wilbur Marshall of the Chicago Bears during a game in the late 1980s. Rumor had it that Ferguson survived the hit.

"G" is for Aaron Gibson, the first-round offensive tackle from Wisconsin who ate his way out of the league.

"H" is for Jeff Hartings, the offensive guard from Penn State. Hartings was good, but Millen didn't think he was good enough for a decent salary increase. He went to Pittsburgh and helped win a Super Bowl. The Lions are still looking for a left guard nearly a decade later.

"I" is for former Lions LeRoy and Sedrick Irvin, because they weren't named Michael.

"J" is for poor Dick Jauron, the current Buffalo coach, who had to play for the Lions (1973-77) and coach for them.

"K" is for Jeff Komlo, a former starting quarterback from Delaware. Need we say more?

"L" is for the late Looney, Joe Don. Asked to carry in a play during the 1960s, he told the coach, "If you want a messenger boy, call Western Union."

"M" is for end Earl McCullough, the speedster out of USC. Fast, really fast. But couldn't catch a cold.

"S" is for, well, the best of the Lions. Sanders (Barry, Charlie and Daryl), Schlesinger, Schmidt, Sims, Skladany, Spielman and Studstill — all good ones. Of course, that's not counting dogs like Karl Sweetan (quarterback, 1966-67) or Pat Swilling (linebacker, 1993-94).

"T" is for Altie Taylor (running back, 1969-76). One of my childhood memories is of Dick Butkus running Taylor out of bounds at Wrigley Field. He actually chased him over the benches and down into the dugout. I think Altie survived.

"U" is for Utley. Mike was the guard opposite Andolsek. He was paralyzed during a game in 1991.

"V" is for Vardell, otherwise known as "Touchdown Tommy." They used to sub him in for Barry Sanders on the goal line offense. The key question is, why would anyone want to substitute for Barry Sanders on the goal line?

"W" is for Ware, Andre. Need we say more?

"X" is for what the NFL would like to do with Detroit's Thanksgiving Day game.

"Y" is for Yepremian, Garo. Nice little kicker in the 1960s and '70s. Started here, won Super Bowls in Miami. Typical.

Hate Crime Legislation

In today's world, there can be no tolerance for violence or other types of crimes against a person who is different from you or me. I am proud to announce that my House colleagues and I recently voted to create a new offense called a "bias-motivated," or "hate," crime within our state's Penal Code.

Under this new law, a person is guilty of a hate crime if they select their target based on one of the following characteristics:

Disability. This term is defined in the bill to include physical and mental disabili-

ties from disease, injury, congenital condition or functional disorder that limits one or more major life activities.

The others are gender, national origin or ancestry, race, color or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression of gender.

We need to send a strong, clear message to anyone who would target a resident of this state based solely on the fact that they are different, and this legislation does just that.

Woodward Light Rail

With the high cost of living, and our economy in recession, a high-quality public transit system is a necessary component to get our state's economy back on track. Michigan has one of the most under-funded public transportation systems in the

country, which is ironic, seeing as our state revolutionized the transportation system.

Last week, the House passed a plan that authorizes the creation of a nonprofit corporation to operate a street railway system in certain cities. Under this law, parts of our state will begin to see street railway cars, trolleys and other forms of public transit. Lack of fast, effective public transit for hundreds of thousands of people is blocking job creation and economic development for the entire region, which affects our whole state.

Clearing the way for the Woodward Light Rail system will help spur job creation, attract more employers and stimulate economic development. Private investors will be the sole source of funding for construction of a new

light rail system, and not a single tax dollar will be used.

New Jobs Training Program

Recently, the House voted in favor of a new jobs training program – an important step toward creating new jobs and getting our residents back to work.


The program makes the most of Michigan's community colleges, which are key centers of higher education and job training that help prepare workers, attract job providers and boost our economy. Strengthening partnerships between community colleges and employers will help create the versatile, high-quality workforce we need to ensure that companies can do business in Michigan.

A similar program in Iowa has helped attract more than 2,000 training projects and

create more than 138,000 new jobs since it was established. Having this new option of responding to employers' requests for skilled workers gives Michigan a powerful new economic development

tool that will help attract more job providers to our communities, train our residents so they can get back to work, and get Michigan's economy back on track.

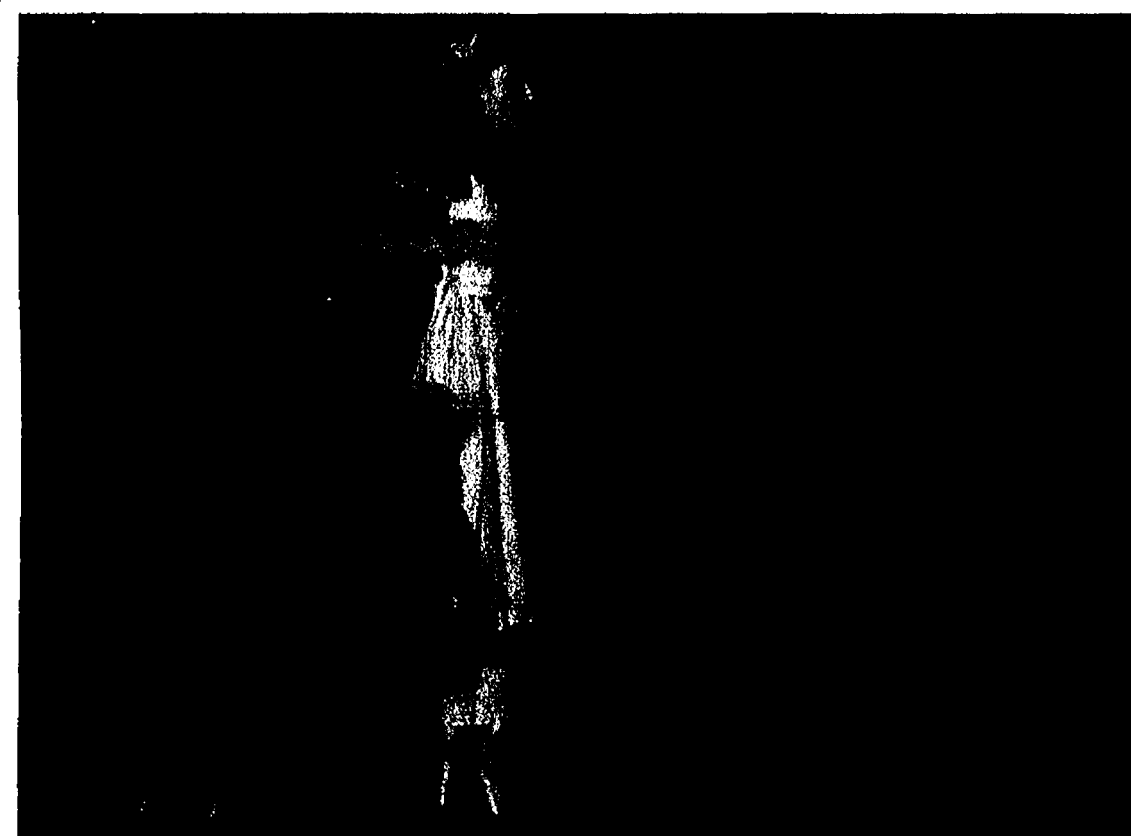

showed heart, courage and a never-give-up attitude, which is always so inspiring, but the overall execution and play just seemed a bit down this year compared with other seasons.

Other than that, the state finals were, as usual, a blast to attend. To sit for 12 straight hours and watch four consecutive games, go home, and come back and do it all over again the next day, is indeed strange, when I think about it. But, I wouldn't have it any other way.

If I didn't travel to the state finals, I wouldn't have the pleasure of experiencing the excitement of so many small towns throughout our state closing up their storefronts, rolling up their sidewalks and filling car load upon car load and bus load upon bus load and invading Ford Field. I wouldn't feel the joy of seeing students and young people caring enough to paint their faces in school colors, create signs and banners and show pride in their town and team by supporting and cheering, with every ounce they have, whenever their beloved team makes even the smallest of plays.

The state championship weekend is Ovid-Elsie, a rural, farming community located between St. Johns and Owosso just north of Lansing, making its first ever appearance in the Division 5 state finals and seemingly bringing the entire community to the game. It's an old farmer in a John Deere hat proudly wearing a sweatshirt that says "From the corn field to Ford Field. Go Marauders!" And it's a grown man, obviously an Ovid-Elsie fan, wearing a shiny Viking helmet, complete with horns, and walking next to his young son, who's also donning a similar helmet, but

one that's a bit too big and droops over his eyes. Both laugh as dad loudly yells "Go Marauders!" as they make their way through the sea of people to their seats.

As the crowd roars, it's a Lake Orion teacher strutting his stuff and dotting the "i" as the Dragon band spells out "Orion" during halftime of the Division 1 final.

It's fans from small-town Ubly, in Michigan's Thumb, rocking Ford Field in their first ever Division 7 state championship game, with a constant chorus of "U-B," followed by an even louder "L-Y." It's also watching an Ubly cheerleader drape a big, oversized bass drum over her tiny shoulders and march with her school's band at halftime.

It's the Upper Peninsula's Crystal Falls Forest Park players wearing candy cane striped black and white socks in the Division 8 final. It's Rockford fans sporting "Rock the Ford" T-shirts and seemingly painting the phrase on every Ram car and truck in the Ford Field parking structure.

And finally, it's the Inkster band putting on a hip-hop, tap your foot and bob your head halftime performance that had everybody at the Division 3 final dancing in their seats, including fans of opponent East Grand Rapids. A hard-scrabble, blue collar, urban suburb of Detroit, the Inkster drum majors wore white tuxedos, complete with top hat and tails, and led a band that entertained, not only with their instrument playing, but also with their movement and dance routines.

Though the play on the field during this season's championship weekend wasn't as top-flight as past years, the two-day football finals are still, and I bet always will be, one of my favorite times of the year.

then the combine is running. If the weather is bad then the equipment can finally get worked on and maintained.

While I'm planning out my afternoon hunt on any given fall afternoon, Matt is getting the combine ready to run soybeans or corn. He doesn't have the luxury to "get out there" the way most of us do. It's ironic really when you think about it. Matt lives on a farm, but can barely hunt it, whereas I don't live on a farm, but I hunt often.

Matt wasn't a bow hunter by trade, he focused on the gun season every year. Last year, however, we both went to Schupbach's Sporting Goods in Jackson and got Matt set up with a new bow.

Matt took the time to practice, but was unable to hunt with the bow last year. He was disappointed.

Things were going to be different for him this year, though.

I've been fortunate enough to hunt a nice "honey hole" in Dexter over the last four years. This area has produced many deer for the freezer and it had Matt's name all over it. Together, Matt and I put up a two-seated ladder stand and decided to give it a go for this year's bow season.

It was the second week of October and I called Matt like so many times before. We'd talk about the harvest, deer we've seen on the property and see if today might be the day to "get out there". Keep in mind that Matt always says no, therefore I expected the worst again. But, today was different and he agreed.

This would be the first time Matt would bow hunt (except once or twice in his youth) and I would be there with him. I was so excited for my buddy. I just hoped that we'd have deer nearby.

We drove out to the property and got our gear ready and made it to the tree stand. It didn't take long for us to see two deer out in the field feeding on a rye food plot. We had a number of squirrels, cardinals and other creatures making their way through the woods.

My tree stand was set up about 15 yards inside the woods to the east of a field. Would the deer cross the field to us or just walk off to another part of the property? It's funny, deer hunting is like a box of chocolates. You just don't know if, when or where they'll come from no matter how much you think you know.

The sun had just set, but we still had a lot of shooting light left. All of a sudden Matt said, "There's a buck in the field to our right, do you see it?" I did my best to see it, but I just couldn't locate the buck.

Looking back, I should have asked Matt how far out it was. The leaves were so thick, but Matt kept a close eye on his potential trophy. Matt kept asking me if I could see the buck making its way closer and closer to us, but I just couldn't see it.

Matt stood up carefully and prepared to draw his bow when I finally saw the gorgeous 8-point buck coming into view. "Wow, I think Matt's actually going to get this," I thought.

The buck finally stopped at 30 yards directly in front of us and snapped its head to the left and looked right at us. Without hesitation, Matt launched his arrow and put an excellent shot on his first deer ever.

This story is dedicated to all the farmers out there who work so hard to make their living and allow people like us to hunt their land. Thank you.

In other outdoor news, muzzle loader season begins Dec. 5 through 21 (Zone 3 only). Late firearm season is Dec. 22 through Jan. 1 (Antlerless deer only, private land only).

deer a few times up north before I was born. He traded his gun to his brother when I was younger."

Ledwidge's first hunting experience was in 2003. She was introduced to the sport by her friend, Glenn Maxwell.

"I went to his parents and sat with him in the blind a few times and practiced shooting his 12 gauge shotgun," she says. "He let me borrow his gun on my first hunt I went on by myself. He couldn't go because he had to work. That was the gun I shot my first buck with. After that, he took me to a gun shop in Adrian and I picked out my very first shotgun, one similar to his. I use that for firearm's season."

Ledwidge, 32, says she

enjoys deer and turkey hunting the most. She hunts with a shotgun and can't even try archery because of carpal tunnel in both wrists.

Her hunting appetite is only starting to get fed. Her menu has no limits.

"My goal is to travel to Africa to go on a safari hunt and out West to hunt an Elk," she says. "I am hoping to get a Michigan Black Bear tag next fall and travel to the UP for a few days to try and score a bear. I have actually made some hunting contacts in the UP and visited and scouted for bear for the last three years in preparation."

"I also love fishing and can be found out on my pontoon boat just about every day that is above freezing, fishing on Silver Lake. My grandma was the big fisherman in our family and I have many fond memories of going out on Four Mile Lake in Chelsea with her catching just about

everything under the sun on bread balls, corn and hot dogs."

Her memories of hunting aren't exactly old, but proudly displayed in her heart.

"They are all very fond memories and all very different memories," she says. "My most exciting moment was the turkey hunt in Stockbridge this spring. My mom's cousin let me hunt on his farm. It was very exciting to see eight mature toms within 12 yards. When I made the shot, I remember thinking that 'this was more exciting than any deer hunt I have been on!' Turkey hunting is also more of a challenge and after trying to call in a tom for over five years - this was a very exciting accomplishment."

Ledwidge admits that hunting is not easy, but rather a physical and mental challenge.

"It is a test of your ability,

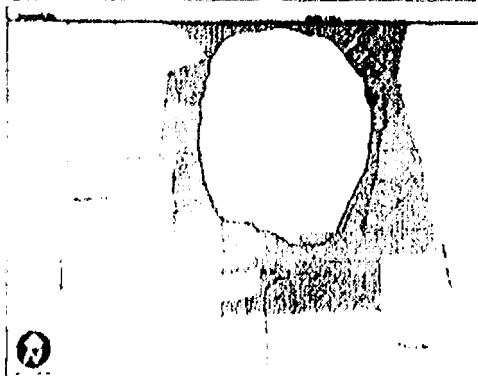

endurance and dedication," she says. "My mom takes every Opening Day off for deer season and waits for me to call her if I need help."

Ledwidge would like to see more women out on the hunt with her. She says there is no reason why hunting should be reserved for men only.

"It's very empowering to try something new and challenging," she says. "I would encourage anyone to study, research and practice before trying hunting. You need to be confident in your shooting ability and safety is always first. If you have a desire to challenge yourself, go for it! It has opened so many doors for me, allowed me to meet so many friends and companions, learn to cook venison,

make homemade sausage and jerky, and advance my skills in the outdoors.

"I now have gloves, warm slippers and a gun case made from the leather from my deer. There are so many resources that come from the deer and it is much better to use them, than for them to be wasted by a deer getting hit by a car or the deer starving in the middle of winter. It also gives me something that is in common to talk with others about in daily conversation.

"If you talk to any outdoorsman you will hear excitement in their voice and some very interesting stories that they are very proud of."

THE CITY OF CHELSEA, MICHIGAN ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment of the City of Chelsea Code of Ordinances, Chapter 32, Utilities, Article III, Sewers. The City of Chelsea Sewer Ordinance is amended by amending Section 32-736 to read as follows:

Sec. 32-736. Lien.

Charges for sewerage service furnished to any premises within the service area may be a lien on the premises, and those charges delinquent for six months or more may be certified annually to the proper tax assessing officer or agency, who shall enter the lien on the next tax roll against the premises to which the services have been rendered, and the charges shall be collected and the lien shall be enforced in the same manner as provided for the collection of taxes assessed upon the roll and the enforcement of the lien for the taxes. The time and manner of certification and other details in respect to the collection of the charges and the enforcement of the lien shall be prescribed by resolution of the City Council. This lien remedy does not preclude any other remedy provided by law. Those premises outside the service area that are served by the city's wastewater treatment works that have delinquent bills will be certified in their governmental units for collection as provided in the contract between the city and the governmental unit. In a case where a tenant is responsible for the payment of the charges and the City is so notified in writing, the notice to include a true copy of the lease of the affected premises, then the charges shall not become a lien against the premises after the date of notice. In the event of filing of the notice, the City may elect to render no further service to the premises until a cash deposit in the amount to be determined by resolution of the City Council is made as security for the payment of the charges.

Section 2. Non-Repeal. This Ordinance amendment shall not be construed to repeal by implication any other ordinances of the City of Chelsea pertaining to the same or similar subject matter.

Section 3. Effective Date. This Ordinance amendment shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication in a newspaper circulating within the City of Chelsea, Michigan.

Charges for water service furnished to any premises by the Waterworks System may be a lien on the premises, and those charges delinquent for six months or more may be certified annually to the proper tax assessing officer or agency, who shall enter the lien on the next tax roll against the premises to which the services have been rendered, and the charges shall be collected and the lien shall be enforced in the same manner as provided for the collection of taxes assessed upon the roll and the enforcement of the lien for the taxes. The time and manner of certification and other details in respect to the collection of the charges and the enforcement of the lien shall be prescribed by resolution of the City Council. This lien remedy does not preclude any other remedy provided by law. In a case where a tenant is responsible for the payment of the charges and the City is so notified in writing, the notice to include a true copy of the lease of the affected premises, then the charges shall not become a lien against the premises after the date of notice. In the event of filing of the notice, the City may elect to render no further service to the premises until a cash deposit in the amount to be determined by resolution of the City Council is made as security for the payment of the charges.

Section 2. Non-Repeal. This Ordinance amendment shall not be construed to repeal by implication any other ordinances of the City of Chelsea pertaining to the same or similar subject matter.

Section 3. Effective Date. This Ordinance amendment shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication in a newspaper circulating within the City of Chelsea, Michigan.

CITY OF CHELSEA ORDINANCE NO. 161

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 32, UTILITIES, OF THE CHELSEA CODE OF ORDINANCES BY ADDING ARTICLE VI, ELECTRIC SERVICE
ADOPTED: November 25, 2008
EFFECTIVE: December 25, 2008

THE CITY OF CHELSEA, MICHIGAN ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment of the City of Chelsea Code of Ordinances, Chapter 32, Utilities, by adding Article VI, Electric Service. The City of Chelsea Electric Service Ordinance is added as Article VI of Chapter 32, to read as follows:

Sec. 32-1000. Administration and enforcement of Michigan Electrical Code.

Pursuant to Section 8 of the Stille-Derossett-Lale Singe State Construction Code Act, Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended, the City assumes responsibility for the administration and enforcement of the Michigan Electrical Code throughout its corporate limits. The Superintendent of the City Electric Department is designated as the enforcing agent to discharge the responsibility of the City under the Michigan Electrical Code.

Sec. 32-1001. Authority to fix, alter, and amend electric rates.

The City Council is hereby authorized and empowered to fix the rates for electrical service to all users of electrical service within the City. Said rates may be fixed, altered or amended by resolution from time to time by the City Council after a public hearing, with notice of said hearing to be given by publication in a newspaper published and circulated in the City; said publication to be at least 15 days prior to the time of hearing.

Sec. 32-1002. Authority to make regulations.

The City Council is hereby authorized and empowered to make by resolution all regulations it deems necessary for the efficient operation of the City electric supply system.

Sec. 32-1003. Authority to shut off service.

The City, through its representatives, in addition to other remedies provided in this Article, may shut off electric service to any user in the City if the charges for electric service are not paid when due, or if the user fails to comply with any regulations established for the operation and maintenance of the electric supply system. Electric service, once shut off, will be resumed only after compliance with all regulations and upon payment of a charge covering all past-due amounts and the cost of resuming service, which charge is to be set by the City Council.

Sec. 32-1004. Authority to inspect system.

The City, or any of its authorized representatives, may go upon premises served by the City's electric service system from time to time for the inspection of said electric system and to read meters placed thereon by the City to determine the amount of electricity consumed on the premises.

Sec. 32-1005. Tampering without permit prohibited.

No party shall tamper in any way, or connect with any part of the electric system, which is the property of the City, without a written permit issued by the Superintendent of the Electric Department. All connections or other activities authorized by permit shall be subject to inspection by authorized representatives of the City.

Sec. 32-1006. Violation a municipal civil infraction.

Any person or customer found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this division, or any written order of the Superintendent of the Electric Department in pursuance thereof, shall be responsible for a municipal civil infraction. In addition, any connection to the City's electric system in violation of this division is hereby also declared to be a nuisance per se and the Superintendent of the Electric Department is authorized to seek the appropriate equitable relief in the county circuit court for the abatement and restraint of such connections.

Sec. 32-1007. All energy to be metered; exceptions.

All energy sold to customers shall be measured by commercially acceptable measuring devices owned and maintained by the City except where it is impracticable to meter loads, such as street lighting,

temporary or special installations, in which case the consumption may be calculated.

Sec. 32-1008. Deposits.

The City is authorized to require a deposit from property owners, lessees, and occupants who make application for electric service. Such sum may be set from time to time by the regulation or resolution of the City. Any arrearages in the electric bills of the depositor or the consumer on the premises for which the deposit was made may be deducted therefrom as arrearages occur.

Sec. 32-1009. Right to refuse service.

The City Electric Department is authorized to refuse to furnish electricity to any person or to any premises for which there is unpaid electric charges on a previous account.

Sec. 32-1010. Authority to discontinue electric service.

The electric department is hereby authorized and directed to discontinue electric service after reasonable notice to any property wherein any connection in violation of this Article exists and to take such other precautionary measures when deemed necessary to eliminate any danger to the electric distribution system. Electric service to such property shall not be restored until appropriate connections are made consistent with this Article, and all dangers to the system are eliminated.

Sec. 32-1011. Lien.

Charges for electric service furnished to any premises by the Electric Department may be a lien on the premises, and those charges delinquent for six months or more may be certified annually to the proper tax assessing officer or agency, who shall enter the lien on the next tax roll against the premises to which the services have been rendered, and the charges shall be collected and the lien shall be enforced in the same manner as provided for the collection of taxes assessed upon the roll and the enforcement of the lien for the taxes. The time and manner of certification and other details in respect to the collection of the charges and the enforcement of the lien shall be prescribed by resolution of the City Council. This lien remedy does not preclude any other remedy provided by law. 

Faith: U-Turns, You-Turns & I-Turns

I drove into our parking lot this morning. There was still snow on the ground from last night. I noticed my vehicle was the second one to make tracks today. The first vehicle hadn't stayed, however. It simply drove into the lot, turned around and left.

That's not uncommon for us. Because our building is located a short distance from an exit off of I-94, many people use our lot as a turn around.

That may bother some of our congregants, but I haven't heard any. And I kind of like the symbolism.

A place where people can turn their lives around and begin to head in a new direction.

Isn't that one picture of what The Church at its best is meant to be? I think so.

And this is the season for turn-arounds. I know many in our culture will look for making changes Jan. 1 with New Year's Resolutions. And that's great.

But on the Christian calendar we are in a time period called Advent. Advent means "a coming or arrival" (Webster's Concise Dictionary).

Advent is the season when we:

1. Remember God in Christ Jesus coming to earth as a little, helpless Baby

2. Anticipate God showing up into our regular, everyday lives

3. Anticipate Christ's return to earth again at the consummation of all things

Long before Jesus was born, the Prophet Isaiah called the people to, "Prepare a pathway for the Lord's coming! Make a straight road for him!" (Isaiah 40:3 NLT)

Isaiah was trying to get people ready for an Advent.

Advent says that while God's arrival into our lives is a gift, there

are preparations for us to make.

Advent says that while God is the main character, we have a part to play prior to God's arrival.

One way we play our part is making U-turns.

Or maybe a You-turn.

Of course, it is always easier to see where other people need to turn around, isn't it?

"You can be a better parent."

"You should be a more supportive wife."

"You could be a more attentive husband."

"You ought to be a better friend."

"But I don't think Advent is about

correcting others. Our fixation upon others' faults is what Jesus refers to when he mentions getting the plank out of my own eye before I try to help you get the speck out of yours. Ouch.

No, advent is probably more about I-Turns. (To my knowledge, Apple has not coined the phrase yet. But if they do, would you be my witness that we thought of it first?)

Advent gives me a chance to ask, "What could I do to prepare for God's coming into my life?"

Local lenders suggest folks recognize rates

A small sub-set of people who should be taking advantage of falling mortgage rates are doing so.

What about the rest?

Mary Pierce, owner of The Home Lending Center in Dexter, says it's just a matter of awareness.

"We've gotten a few phone calls from people who are on top of it," she said. "I've had people with (Adjustable Rate Mortgages) just waiting for a lower rate. They're calling me because that's been on their minds."

Pierce wonders how many people with banks that have been in turmoil during the recent financial crisis have been properly informed.

Average rates on a 30-year-fixed-rate mortgage fell to 5.97 percent from 6.33 percent last week, according to Bankrate.com. Some brokers see low 5 percent rates on the horizon.

Borrowers with an average loan of \$200,000 would save \$63 a month if their interest rate dropped to 5.5 percent from 6.

Chelsea State Bank's John Mann says he has seen the Bankrate.com numbers, too.

"We agree, for most people, now is a good time to convert from an adjustable rate mortgage to a fixed rate one as rates fell pretty abruptly last week in general financial markets," Mann said.

Mann added that while he personally doesn't look at
