Thompson's embraces state smoking ban

Owners initiate policy months before deadline

Whether the public is on board or not with the Michigan smoking ban passed by the state Legislature in December, it's going to be illegal to light up in bars and restaurants beginning in May.

Local resident Lynda Collins, owner of Thompson's Pizzeria, decided that she would go ahead and start enforcing the policy now so her customers have time to ease into the fresh new reality.

"We were going to do this before the state mandates it in May," Collins said.

Her daughters and many other family members work at Thompson's. Three coworkers became pregnant last year, which required a temporary moratorium of smoking at the Thompson's bar.

"People were very kind and did not smoke because of that fact," Collins said.

She picked up the signs

which read, "Thank you for not smoking, this is a non-smoking establishment," on Jan. 4. One is posted on the door, and several smaller standee signs are spread out around the bar top.

Another factor in the decision was the size of the restaurant.

"We mostly cater to families with small children, and I want them to feel comfortable bringing their families in here without doing the second-hand smoke thing," Collins said.

She said that she would like to encourage people to quit smoking for their own sake.

Collins' daughters smoked until they became pregnant, and Collins herself smoked several years ago.

"You start when you're 16 because you think it's cool, and the next thing you know you can't stop," she said. "I was a smoker for a long time, but I quit when I got pneumonia."

When the License Brewing Association contacted her for support, Collins quietly agreed with the smoking ban legislation and offered no support to the lobbying effort.

When asked what she thought it would do to her business, Collins figured that it wouldn't matter much, with the quality of her food being the main draw.

"We don't have many smokers," she said. "We have a couple of groups, but there have been no complaints yet. I've had a couple people come up to the bar and go to light a cigarette

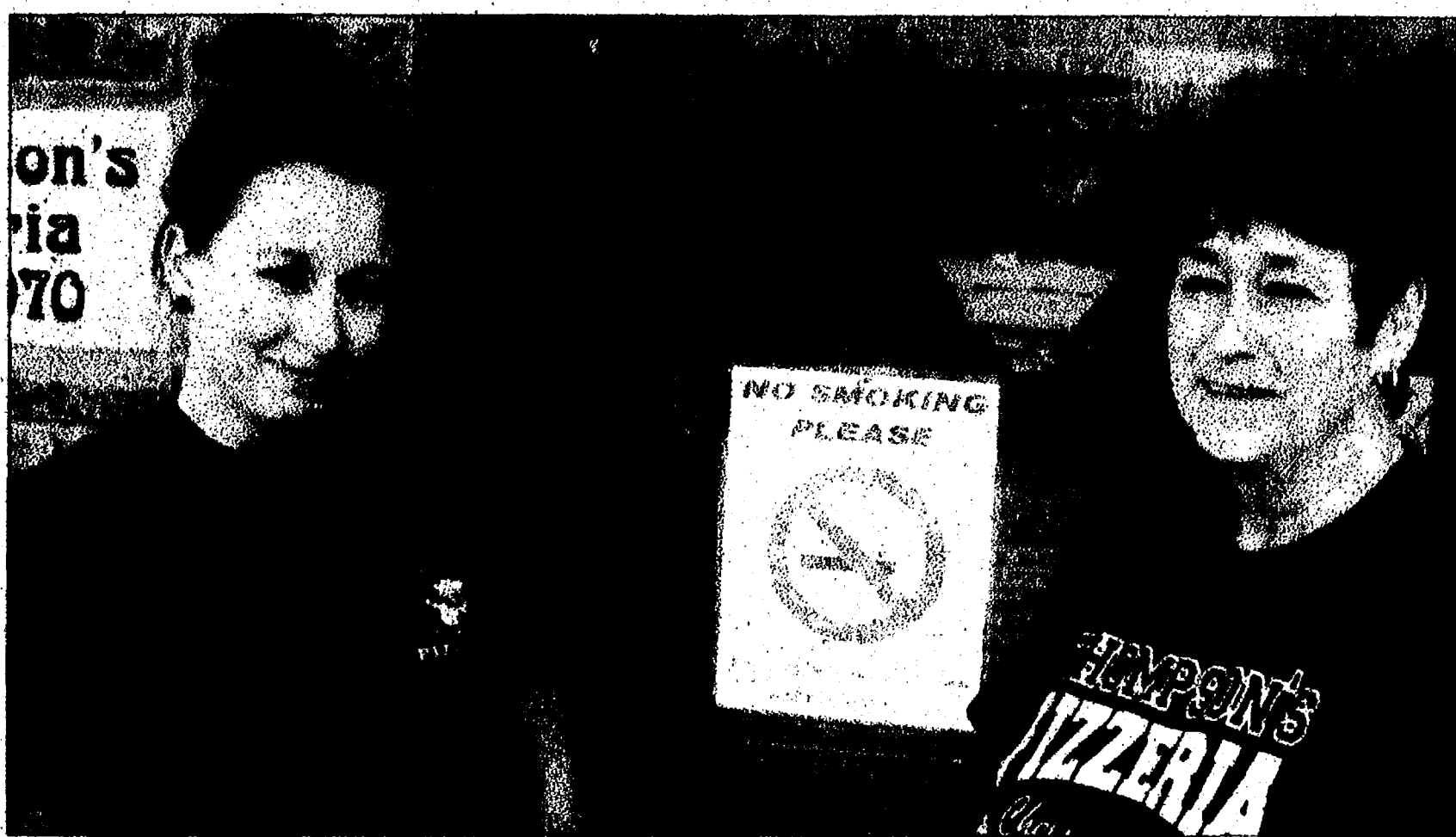

and we have to tell them 'no.' Andy Polsinelli, a restaurant patron, said that he hasn't smoked in 14 months, so he appreciates the change in policy.

"I love it," he said. "Not only is the temptation gone, but I can't stand the smell now that I don't smoke anymore, and it just makes the place so much cleaner."

Adam Wszola, another patron, said that as a non-smoker he has been going to smoke-

CHS graduate continues fight with cancer

A spaghetti dinner fundraiser to benefit local Chelsea resident Robert Wood will take place from 4 to 8 p.m. Jan. 22 at the UAW Post 1284 located off of M-52.

The dinner is \$5 per person or \$25 per family and includes spaghetti, rolls, salad, dessert and drinks. Thompson's Pizzeria is catering the event.

Wood, 25, a graduate of Chelsea High School, was first diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma in 2007.

"When I was diagnosed in 2007, I underwent six months of chemotherapy, which sent the cancer into remission," he said. "When I went in for my three month check-up, doctors discovered the tumor had

Wood said despite the numerous hospital visits, he

remained positive. Then, doctors found a new tumor growing in his lung. "Radiation therapy shrunk the tumor, but now we're looking at other options," he said.

Yardley, PA - Journal Register Company announced Thursday the appointment of John Paton, 52, as chief executive officer.

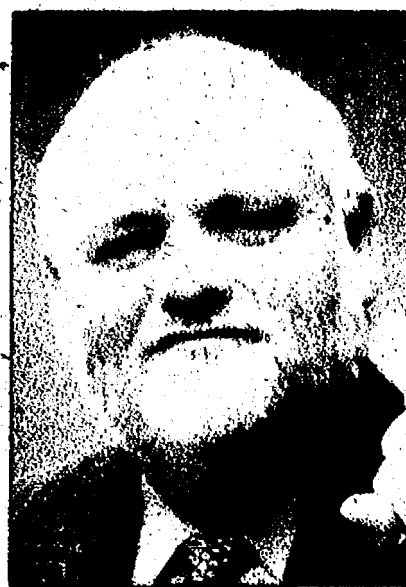
Paton joins the company from ImpreMedia LLC, where he has been chairman, chief executive and president of the U.S. Hispanic media company that he co-founded in 2003.

New at the library

If you've ever thought about learning a language, the Chelsea District Library recently launched an online resource that you've got to try. Whether you are looking to brush up on the Spanish you learned last semester, learning how to ask for the restroom before your trip to Tokyo, or fulfilling your lifelong dream of becoming fluent in Italian, you're going to enjoy using Mango Languages.

Mango Languages is language-learning software that you can access online from anywhere — in the library, at home or at school. It currently offers 12 languages to choose from, including English as a Second Language instruction in several different languages. The program approaches language learning with real-life situations and conversational realities.

You also have the power to adjust how you learn — if your time is limited, you can go from main lessons into condensed lessons. If you are refreshing your language skills rather than starting from scratch, you can jump right into a vocabulary or phrasebook review. Since the process is visual as well as auditory, you'll be able to recognize words that are written as well as spoken.

If you create a free account, Mango will start tracking your improvements and saving your progress, so you'll always be able to pick up where you left off if you get interrupted in the middle of a lesson. It also records your statistics, so you'll recognize areas where you need more review and gives you proof and bragging rights for quizzes you've aced.

For the bilingual wannabe on a tight schedule, the library also offers language learning audio books so you can learn on the go. The library has Pimsleur language programs in a broad selection of languages that users can take anywhere with headphones.

Lifelong education is part of the Chelsea District Library's mission and we hope you'll take full advantage of what we can offer.

free establishments.

"If someone lit up right now while I was eating, I would be a little annoyed," he said.

Wzola's friend Matt Wood said he only smokes at bars.

"I only smoke when I drink, so it's going to be less of a temptation for me," he said. "When everyone else is smoking it's just kind of a habit thing. I just grab one. It's more of a social thing, so it doesn't bother me one way or another."

Wolverine Bar proprietor Joe Merkel said he isn't too worried about the ban's effect on his customer traffic, but he is concerned about how it will be enforced.

"I have no info from the state on it," Merkel said. "I got a flyer from the Michigan Restaurant

Association with a little one paragraph statement of when it's going to happen in May, but it doesn't give any detail about whose going to enforce it."

He doubts that the health department has enough manpower to do it themselves. He also doesn't know what the fines are.

"I think the law has passed, but they don't have all of the particulars worked out yet," Merkel said.

He too has "no smoking" signs available and ready for when the no-smoking section becomes the entire interior of his bar.

"Some people are going to complain, but it's just something we're going to have to live with," he said.

Though doctors have indicated the cancer is becoming more aggressive, Wood said he remains positive and undeterred to beat the disease.

"My grandpa went through cancer when he was 80 years old. I keep reminding myself that it could be worse," he said. "There are good days and bad days."

Brenda Bower, Wood's friend and second mother, said it was only by luck that doctors discovered the cancer early on.

"He was always coming home tired and sleeping a lot," she said. "We had an X-ray done and that's when they discovered the tumor."

Woods said when doctors first diagnosed the cancer he was terrified.

"I got light headed at first and then I was just like 'OK, what do we have to do? Let's just do it.'"

When word spread of the diagnosis, Woods said the outpouring from the local community was overwhelming.

"It's very positive to see how many people are supporting me," he said. "I have incredible support from my family and friends. There are too many people supporting me not to remain positive."

As a cancer patient, Woods said he has also approached life differently as well.

"It makes me think a lot more," he said.

Woods is active with the American Cancer Society

through the Relay for Life program and as a legislative ambassador for ACS.

"I send letters to our representatives and senators in Lansing encouraging support for cancer initiatives," he said.

The latest lobbying effort was for the smoking ban in restaurants and bars across the state.

"ACS really pushed hard for the smoking ban this past year," he said.

A recent electrical engineering graduate of Kettering University in Flint, Woods also maintains his job with FAAC Inc. when he is feeling well.

"They are really great with him," Bower said. "When they heard he was diagnosed, they held a fundraiser luncheon and raised \$3,000."

Wood said he enjoys working for the company and looks forward to the day that he can return full-time.

"You'll never understand (cancer) until you go through it. I'm lucky that my cancer hasn't limited me too much, but it has flipped my life totally upside down," he said.

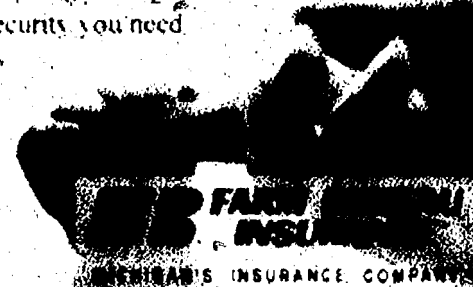

'Doctor Snowflake' shares talents at Gifts of Art

Dozens attend annual crafts workshop

Retired University of Michigan physician Thomas Clark, also known as "Doctor Snowflake," had perfect weather for his annual snowflake paper-cutting demonstration Jan. 12.

More than 50 wanna-be snowflake artists filled the U of M Taubman Health Center North Lobby to attend his 22nd workshop.

Clark says he has been perfecting his snowflake art for 25 years after learning the intricacies of the paper-cutting art form in 1984 from a secretary.

"Folding is the key," he says, while noting that several people had already gotten started folding and cutting.

"This demonstration is

already interrupting you from making snowflakes," he says, smiling.

Armed with simple instructions left on the tables, some snowflake artists already had tried their hand at the craft.

Gail Reed of Albion had visited Doctor Snowflake's exhibit while her husband was at the hospital for an appointment.

"I was amazed by the exhibit and wanted to give it a try," she says, adding that she brought along friend Nova Wyse of Livonia.

Both women were able to leave the two-hour presentation with several snowflakes that they created, including one with a Christmas tree design and another with a snowman design.

To get started, snowflake making uses white copy paper, or "typewriter paper," as Clark called it, a pencil, scissors and a hole punch.

Doctor Snowflake's annual snowflake exhibit of paper

cuttings is on display through Feb. 8.

The hand-cut designs are intricate works of art. Yet, as a group, they tell stories that encompass much more than the sum of their parts, according to information from Gifts of Art, the program that brings art and music to the U of M Health System.

"Gifts of Art's mission is to incorporate the arts into the environment of care in order to help calm and bring comfort to our patients, visitors and staff," says Carrie McClintock, communication coordinator at Gifts of Art.

"The perfect symmetry of snowflake design contributes to the metaphorical meanings," according to a description of the exhibit.

This year's exhibit contains the new series "Noah and the Flood," as well as a favorite from the past, "Exodus," the story of Moses.

After taking a look at the exhibit, Tommy Diehr, 11, of Ypsilanti, talked his mother into sticking around and giving the art form another try.

He'd done it before at the Ypsilanti library.

"This is my first time," says Raynette Kempf of Ann Arbor.

"I think it's all in the folding," she says. "So far, it's pretty neat."

Denise Rodgers, a U of M oncology coordinator for ears, nose and throat, says she had seen Doctor Snowflake's exhibits over the years, but hasn't had a chance to give it a try herself.

"It's my first time," she says, adding that each exhibit tells a story.

In fact, Doctor Snowflake has published 11 books of his art work that range in theme from "The Night before Christmas in Snowflakes," to face cards and trees, as well as Shakespeare

sonnets and Bible stories.

Commissioners to cut back on expense accounts

The Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners has put into effect an expense account reduction that will see the fund nearly halved.

The measure is intended to send a message during a time when employees are forgoing raises and union negotiators have been asked to accept cuts to their member benefits.

Commissioner Jeff Irwin, D-District 11, called the new flex accounts convoluted and said at last week's meeting that going from \$73,151 -- based on the 2009 budget -- in total line items spread out among the 11 commissioners wasn't enough of a cut.

The new flex account is a \$38,500 fund split equally between the commissioners to help pay for their travel expenses, provide them a meeting stipend and cover other expenses incurred in the course of conducting county business.

The cost-cutting measure had been voted on last year. The Jan. 6 meeting was an organizational meeting at which the current chairman and vice chairman are elected, and the board's rules and regulations are passed, with amendments if necessary.

Irwin and Leah Gunn, D-District 11, both wanted to go further. Gunn had proposed eliminating expense accounts entirely last year.

"It would have been much stronger if we had just said, 'Look, we're cutting travel by 50 percent, we're going to get rid of our per diems and that's going to save \$60,000 or \$80,000,'" Irwin said. "It would save more money ... my feeling was that the budget would be more transparent, more easy for the citizens to understand, and therefore a stronger leadership role for the board to take."

In the previous compensation structure, stipends for meetings/conferences and travel expenses were nearly

90 percent of the expense line items. Commissioners receive \$25 per meeting, plus mileage.

The commissioners also receive a base salary. The board chairman receives \$18,500, the Ways and Means Committee chairman receives \$17,500, the chairman of the working session receives \$16,500 and the remaining commissioners receive \$15,500 each, according to the 2002-2008 budgets.

The commissioners also work their own day jobs. Their employer information and personal salaries are not disclosed to the county, according to officials at the county administrator's office.

A proposal to discontinue commissioner retirement benefits was brought back up by Gunn. The measure was tabled last November. It could save the county \$42,000 per year, but the change cannot take effect until Jan. 1, 2011, due to the fact that there are statutory protections in place that prohibit the

commissioners from altering their compensation while in office.

Gunn and Barbara Bergman are the only two commissioners who qualify for retirement under the Washtenaw County Employees' Retirement System, which most of the county's employees fall under.

The old Money Purchase Pension Plan has an immediate vestment provision whereas WCERS has an eight-year period, so commissioners qualify after 16 years of service under the new system instead of immediately under the old one.

The commissioners are the only ones who remain on the MPPP system. They contribute 7.5 percent of their salary pre-tax and receive a 100 percent employer match.

Local social worker to talk about addiction

Addiction is the No. 1 disease in America.

That's the word from Nancy Quay, a licensed social worker who will present "Chemical Dependency and the Family," 7:30 to 9 p.m. Tuesday at the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital Education Center Auditorium, 5305 Elliott Drive in Ann Arbor.

One in four adults is chemically dependent, and one in three families have at least one addicted member, Quay said.

"That means in a neighborhood of 30 houses, 10 of them include a family member with the illness of addiction," she said.

One in four children live in a home where alcoholism or alcohol abuse is present daily, and they are at significantly greater risk for emotional problems, physical health problems and learning difficulties.

Children in homes with addiction are three times more likely to be verbally, physically or sexually abused; four times more likely to be neglected and four times more likely to develop addiction problems of their own.

"For example, one stat is that one in four children lives in a household with at least one alcohol-affected member," Quay said. "In a classroom of 30 kids,

about seven or eight come to school with the deficits caused by family addiction."

Chemical dependency costs industry more than \$1 billion per year, with 75 percent in lost productivity and 25 percent in medical and treatment costs. And alcohol and drugs account for 52 percent of all traffic fatalities, Quay says.

In Tuesday's presentation, she will give a basic definition of family and discuss family roles and structure. She will give a brief overview of the disease of addiction, then tie the impact of the disease back to the list of family roles, and provide action steps to take. There will be plenty of time for questions.

and loss in the workplace; leadership of groups; getting the most out of a leadership team; and addressing cultural influences within a group.

Quay, who earned a master's degree in social work from the University of Michigan, has lived in Ann Arbor for more than 30 years, where she enjoys the farmers' market, Kerrytown, Gallup, Fuller and Argo parks, Huron Metro Parks, and the Ann Arbor Art Fairs.

She has worked with a wide variety of adults and teens on an even wider range of issues, and with people of different ethnicities, races and cultural backgrounds.

"People share common needs to be accepted and loved; to understand themselves, and to live as fully as possible," she said.

Quay's presentation on Tuesday is part of the annual Education Series offered by Dawn Farm in Ypsilanti, a non-profit community of programs providing chemical dependency services.

The program is free and open to the public. Registration is not required.

OUR TAKE: Editorial Great Lakes need protection from invaders

New alarms have been sounded about the menacing
Asian carp invasion of the Great Lakes. Reportedly,
there was a recent discovery by the U.S. Fish and
Wildlife Service that the invasive carp may have
bypassed an electric barrier intended to keep them
out of the Great Lakes.

A number of sports fishermen and environmentalists are
saying this is cause for concern and a "sense of urgency and
emergency" is needed.

Actually, considering the priceless value of the Great
Lakes to our state, it should be troubling to all residents. The
large fish, which can reach a body weight of 100 pounds, eats
plankton, the tiny creatures that are the foundation of the
food chain in the lakes.

According to the local experts, the fish would have a simi-
lar ecological impact as the zebra mussel. They would impact
the bottom of the food base and therefore the food chain for
sport fishermen.

Sport fishing is big business in Michigan. It is estimated
that the sport brings in \$4.5 billion on the big lakes alone, \$7
billion in the entire Great Lakes watershed.

Officials are worried that if the fish make it up the Chicago
Sanitary and Ship Canal to Lake Michigan and become estab-
lished, it's just a matter of time before they come to our area
and affect fishing and recreational boating on the county's
lakes and rivers.

The fish are more than just a nuisance and ecological
threat — they are a danger to people. Asian carp can jump up
to 10 feet clear of the water. Disturbances such as boat motors
seem to trigger an aerial ballet. Videos posted online show
hundreds of the large fishing leaping on the Illinois and
Mississippi rivers, and some boaters have been struck and
injured by the flying fish.

The ravenous carp have been migrating northward in the
Mississippi and Illinois rivers for decades. There has been
some positive movement in trying to save our Great Lakes
from the carp. Federal officials have said they would use \$13
million in Great Lakes restoration funds to step up the fight
against invasive Asian carp.

The money will be used for engineering projects to prevent
the carp from slipping into Lake Michigan near Chicago.

They include closing conduits and shoring up low-lying lands
between the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal, which leads to
the lake, and other waterways. Federal and state officials poi-
soned a six-mile section of the canal recently to prevent the
carp from getting closer to Lake Michigan while an electrical
barrier was taken down for maintenance. They have prom-
ised to consider other measures.

Meanwhile, Michigan Attorney General Mike Cox has
announced that his office will file suit in federal court to
force the closure of Chicago-area locks that separate the
Great Lakes from Illinois waters shown to contain Asian
carp. Common sense should tell all of us we need to protect
our Great Lakes. They are our greatest asset and our biggest
hope for ever becoming an economically strong state again.

Consequently, we need to protect the lakes from not only
invasive species of foreign aquatic life, but also from human
predators, if they become a problem.

Family history leads down many roads

My relatives have been
ringing out the old by

Allmendinger's arrival.
The story says that on one of
his early visits from Buffalo,

small fruit trees and was prob-
ably the first of the horticultur-
ists who have made Washtenaw
farms in Lodi (Township) and
brought his family here in
1830."

Perhaps there's a genetic
reason I planted a bunch of

peach trees when I was living in
Virginia and I have a desire to
garden.

But I can say with certainty
that the musical genes enjoyed
by Clara, Ruth and Helen
Allmendinger skipped my gen-
eration.

During that reunion, a let-
ter was read from Elizabeth
Gutekunst, a family member
who arrived in Ann Arbor in
1832 and described the pioneer
life of that day.

I sure wish I could get my
hands on that letter.

Various branches of the fam-
ily followed him to Ann Arbor
and the rest is history, as they
say.

Now, I have to figure out on
which exact branch of the tree
my side of the Allmendinger
family blossom rests.

Since writing about my fam-
ily in the A2 Journal, lots of
people have come forward to
find out if they are my relatives,
and to many of them I haven't
been able to say with complete
certainty.

But, to all of you, I plan to
figure it out.

My relatives have sent me all
kinds of family information. I
just have to match it up to the
many branches of the large
Allmendinger tree.

I will find out which one of
those seven original brothers,
who came here from Germany,
is my side of the Allmendinger
line.

My dad wasn't big on family
genealogy; one Allmendinger
was as good as another one in
his book.

But I'd like to know for sure
who came before me and how
everyone intertwines.

What is the trade-off for airport expansion?

I enjoyed reading Austen Smith's comprehensive story about the
proposed expansion of Ann Arbor Airport in the Dec. 31 edition
("Residents speak out against possible airport expansion"). A proj-
ect like this deserves the kind of thorough review Smith provides,
and I look forward to follow-up stories.

While the drawbacks of the plan are clear, particularly to nearby
residents, the benefits are a bit tougher to find, apart from the
suggested safety benefits of having a longer runway; however,
even an expansion supporter, airport manager Matthew Kulhanek
concedes, according to Smith, "...most of the overruns — literally
an aircraft running past the end of the runway — were caused by
pilot error."

So what are the benefits for the residents of Ann Arbor and the
immediately adjacent townships? Because the airport is owned
by the city of Ann Arbor, I'm concerned we, as residents, will be
liable for any financial issues arising from possible increased use
of the facility by more and larger aircraft. (To get a general sense
of the airport's finances, check out pages 30-34 of the city's annual
financial report. Go to: www.a2gov.org and search for the PDF of
CAFR 2008. The 2009 report is not yet online.)

Furthermore, something that, as a citizen, I'd like to know more
about is the potential environmental impact of the expansion, not
just the impact of adding additional square footage of concrete,
but the impact of possibly more and larger aircraft using the facil-
ity.

In addition to the noise, airports are notorious for the hazard-
ous air pollutants generated by idling aircraft — pollutants such
as ground-level ozone, carbon monoxide, sulfur oxides, nitrogen
oxides and lead, according to the Transportation Research Board
of the National Academies.

In addition, the run-off from the runways, particularly the pave-
ment de-icing materials continue to pose a threat to groundwater
and aquatic life despite changes in de-icer formulations, according
to a study published last year in the Journal of Environmental
Science and Technology (Corsi, Gels, Bowman, Failey and Rutter
2009). There are also aircraft de-icers, jet fuel spills and other
potential toxics adding to the run-off stew.

One final note, what about capacity? There are already many
large airports within a 60-mile radius of Ann Arbor besides Metro
in Romulus, including Oakland County, Flint, Lansing, Willow Run
and Windsor, as well as dozens and dozens of smaller municipal
and private airports. So where is the need for an expansion coming
from? Is it an expressed need voiced by the community that owns
the airport or is it a need of those who benefit financially from the
airport?

If the latter, I'd be very interested to hear what they have to
offer the rest of us in return for having to live with the potential
increases in noise, air and vehicle traffic, pollution and environ-
mental degradation.

Company C celebrates 20 years

This year marks the 20th anniversary for Chelsea High School's Company C. Formerly known as the Washington Street Show Choir, the group was given its name in reference to the school's location on Washington Street.

Company C is an extracurricular music performance program at CHS. Members are invited to join based on auditions.

Steven Hinz, vocal music instructor at CHS, has been the director of Company C for all of its 20 years.

"When the Washington Street Show Choir was launched in 1990, I was looking to start a creative outlet for students that combined popular music, musical theater and jazz with choreography and full stage productions," Hinz said. "This program was an extracurricular complement to the classical choirs that met during the school day. WSSC replaced two student groups - The Contemporaries for young women, and The Silhouettes for

men."

In the early years, the WSSC group traveled to performances and regional competitions with other high school show choirs. The annual year-end show was called "Cabaret," and performers sang solos, duets, etc. and participated in a few large group numbers. In the early days, all of the group's costumes matched and usually featured a fair amount of glitter. The format, as well as the group's name, has changed over the years.

When the new high school opened on Freer Road, the name was changed to "Company C."

"In 2006, it was time to move Co. C into its new era. The old format of cabaret was beginning to become a little stale, and there was a need to expand in a new direction," Hinz said. "There was also a need to give students a full experience of training as music theater performers by focusing on singing, dancing, and acting. Our new fully staged musicals, written specifically for the strengths of the students, have proven to be very successful."

The first presentation using this new format was "Sentimental Journey," set around World War II. The new style was wildly popular, and the rest was history.

Another aspect of the annual show is Jr. C (formerly known as "Sharing the Light"). Jr. C is an opportunity for elementary-aged children to participate in Company C. They learn one or two songs that are inserted into the annual spring musical. Information to participate in Jr. C will be delivered to the students in the spring.

The 2009-2010 Company C members will offer two main performances this year. The first is a Showcase of Show Choirs at 7 p.m. Feb. 20 at Chelsea High School. Company C invites several show choirs from around Michigan to perform on the CHS stage along with them.

This year's annual year-end show is a musical titled "Shoes." It is a Caribbean version of the fairy tale story "The 12 Dancing Princesses." The performances will be held at 7:30 p.m. on May 14, 15 in the Chelsea High School

Auditorium.

Greenbelt area expands

A total of 709 acres was added to Ann Arbor's greenbelt in 2009, including 607 acres in Webster Township and 102 acres in Lodi Township. This brings the total acres protected to date to 1,782 acres.

Matching funds were received from Webster Township, landowner contributions and the Farm and Ranch Land Protection Program resulting in an average of one-to-one match for every dollar that the city of Ann Arbor spent.

A total of \$564,500 was provided by Webster Township, \$365,850 from landowners and \$2,085,500 from the Natural Resources Conservation Service's Farm and Ranch Land Protection Program.

"The Greenbelt Program had a great year. We added 709 acres to the greenbelt and closed on our biggest property yet," Laura Rubin, chair of the Greenbelt Advisory Commission, said in a news release.

"Along with lower land prices and good matching funds, city dollars are going further toward the goal of protecting the farmland and natural areas surrounding the city of Ann Arbor," she said.

"Last November, the citizens of Webster Township voted to continue their support in preserving farmland and open space," said John Kingsley, Webster Township supervisor.

"The Ann Arbor Greenbelt, federal and land owner partnerships in these development rights

purchases have made it possible for this land to remain undeveloped for future generations. Webster Township looks forward to working with these partners to accomplish even more results in the future."

The Conservation Fund is under contract with the city of Ann Arbor to provide real estate services for administering the Open Space and Parkland Preservation Program. The Conservation Fund is a national nonprofit that works with government agencies and nonprofits to protect working farmland, wildlife habitat and recreation areas.

The Open Space and Parkland Preservation Program, commonly referred to as the Greenbelt

Program, was approved by City of Ann Arbor voters in November 2003 to provide funding for the preservation and protection of open space, natural habitats and working landscapes both inside and outside the city limits.

Voters authorized 0.50-mill tax for 30 years, which provides funds for parkland acquisition within the city of Ann Arbor and for the preservation and protection of open space and agricultural land, natural habitats outside the city of Ann Arbor in the designated greenbelt district.

Road commissioners get federal funds, make appointments

Washtenaw County Road Commissioners were given a bit of New Year's good news at the board's first meeting of 2010.

The November check from the Michigan Transportation Fund is in the bank and it's 4 percent higher than in 2008.

"We're down 2.26 percent (total) from what we got in 2008," said Steve Puuri, managing director of the Road Commission, "but it does put us above our budget projection."

In fact, Puuri said at the Jan. 5 meeting: "We think we'll be in a more positive position than we thought."

The Road Commission received about \$1.23 million in 2008 and \$1.28 million in 2009.

In 2008, the Road Commission received about \$15.31 million in 2008 and about \$14.96 in 2009.

This is a difference of about \$50,300 from 2008 to 2009.

Through November, the Road Commission has received about \$14.96 million in Michigan Transportation Funds. The year-end projections are about \$16.216, and Puuri told Road Commissioners that unless something major happens, those projections will be met.

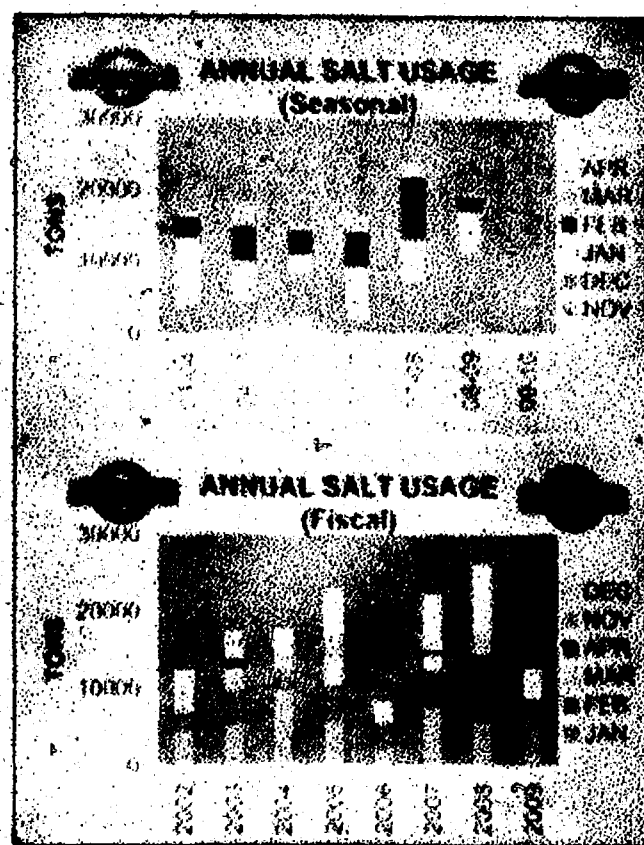
Appointments

In other business, Road Commission Chairman David Rutledge will continue to serve as the Road Commission representative on the Michigan Township Association.

Road Commissioner Doug Fuller will continue as the representative on the policy committee of the Washtenaw Area Transportation Study and Commissioner Fred Veigel will continue to serve as the Road Commission representative on the Washtenaw County Parks and Recreation Commission.

The commissioners voted to re-hire Allen Philbrick as the Road Commission's general counsel. He had been general counsel for 10 years prior to the appointment. Previously, he served as a litigation attorney for 10 years, Puuri said in an e-mail.

The Road Commission has three appointed attorneys who

are not employees. The commission appoints a general counsel, labor counsel and right-of-way condemnation counsel.

In addition, there are occasions when attorneys who specialize in issues concerning environmental or land development are contracted on an as-needed basis, Puuri said.

Three attorneys were interviewed for the position and Elmer White, who has extensive experience working with and for the Michigan Department of Transportation, was chosen to represent the Road Commission in situations where his specific expertise would be useful.

Snow costs

From Dec. 7 through Dec. 27, road crews were sent out 14 times for winter weather, and used 3,034 tons of salt and 1,115 tons of sand.

"Comparing the number of storms as of Dec. 22, 2008, to 2009, we responded to 27 storms using 8,130 tons of salt costing \$282,659 as compared to 10 storms using 2,222 tons of salt costing \$88,791," Puuri said in an e-mail.

He noted that in addition, there are labor costs, equipment rental costs, fuel, sand and other miscellaneous costs.

Lump sum payment for non-union employees

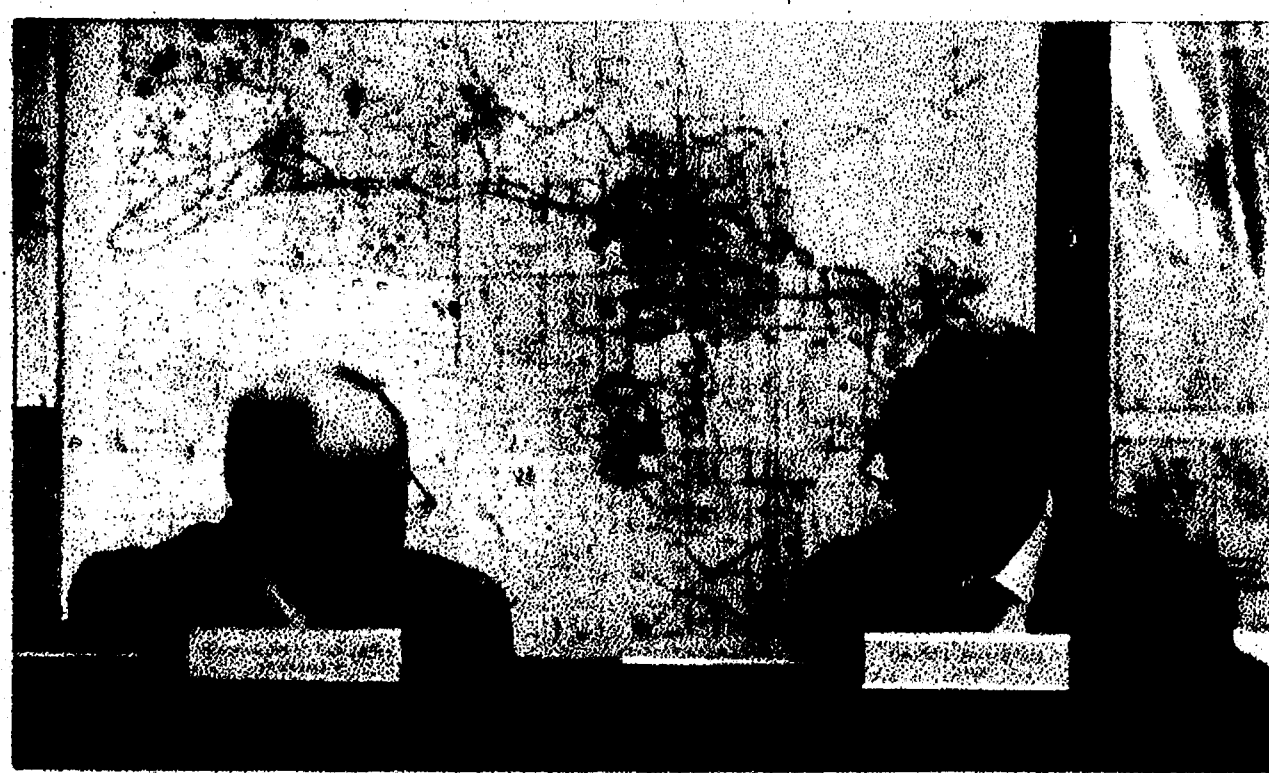
Twenty-one non-union employees of the Road Commission were given a \$750 lump sum payment in lieu of an annual raise.

"This employee group has absorbed the largest reduction in staff layoffs and reductions through attrition; meanwhile, these employees have accomplished some of the largest workload in our history over the last two years," Puuri wrote in a memo to the commissioners. The timing of the payment coincides with what ASME union employees will receive in their contract.

"Given the economic conditions we're all facing, I have reservations. But we've extended something similar to other employees," said Road Commissioner Doug Fuller before approving the measure.

Commissioner Fred Veigel tried to delay the payment until July 1, but did not receive a second on his motion.

There are 31 non-union employees, but the lump sum payment will be given to those not scheduled to receive a merit adjustment in conjunction with a performance review this year. In December, 2007, commis-

sioners approved a 1.5 percent annual rate increase for non-union employees. Since then, the group has received a \$500 lump sum adjustment at the end of 2008 and nothing in addition since that time.

In addition, non-union employees are required to contribute to health care premium costs. The total cost for the payment is \$15,750.

Meeting planned for bridge project

The Road Commission has scheduled a public information meeting from 6 to 8 p.m. Feb. 10 to unveil plans for a bridge replacement over Portage Lake canal. The meeting will take place at Dexter Township Hall, 6880 Dexter-Pinckney Road.

According to information provided by the Road Commission, the existing bridge on Dexter-Pinckney Road has been awarded Michigan Department of Transportation Local Bridge funding.

Construction is scheduled

to begin in late February or early March and conclude in September.

The meeting will include a brief presentation at 6 p.m., followed by an open house format for residents' questions.

Road Commission staff, a design consultant and the contractor are expected to be in attendance.

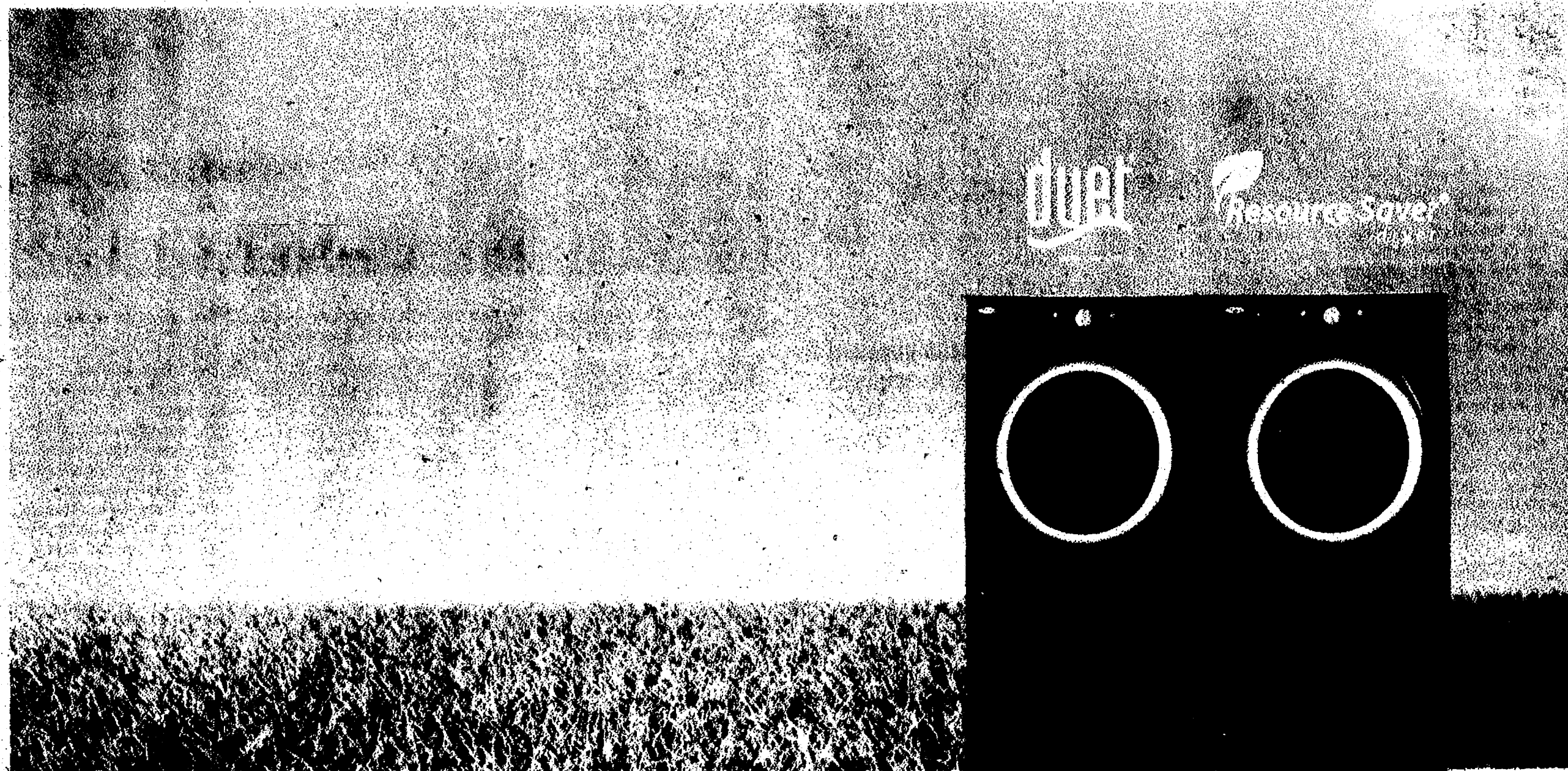

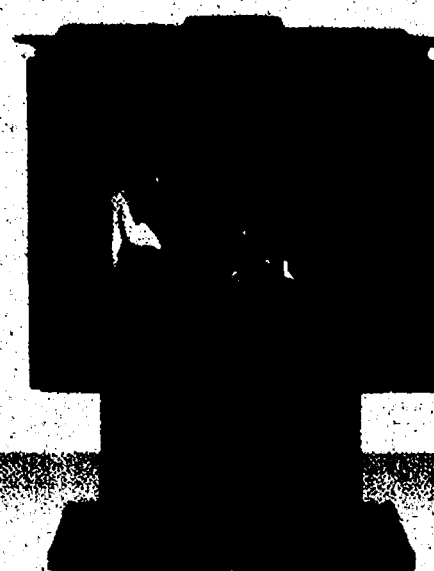

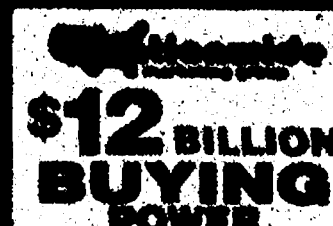

Ouimet enjoys public life

Washtenaw County Commissioner plans to seek 52nd District seat

As one of the most recognizable figures in Washtenaw County, Mark Ouimet leads an active life of public service.

Elected as county commissioner for District 1 in 2005, Ouimet is in his second term and plans to seek election for the Michigan House of Representatives 52nd District in November.

Ouimet, who also serves on various nonprofit boards and organizations, said he enjoys remaining active and "in touch" with the community.

"My father taught me the principle of adding value to time and trying to be a positive force in a negative situation," he said. "My family has a long history of community involvement, and I think politics is just an outgrowth of that."

"You do it for awhile and then you step away. For me, politics is not a career path. I was able to at a relatively early age understand the importance of being involved in your communities and giving back to your communities."

Prior to his election to the Board of Commissioners, Ouimet served as chancellor and chief operating officer for Northwood University and chairman and was CEO of Construction Loan One in Ann Arbor.

Ouimet also serves on the Ypsilanti Chamber of Commerce Board, the American Red Cross Advisory Board as chairman, board chairman of the Success by Six, United Way of Washtenaw County and C.S. Mott Children's Hospital.

"I get asked all the time to serve on boards, but the things that intrigue me the most are children and people who can't do for themselves for one reason or another," Ouimet said. "I strongly believe that we have a moral obligation to help people who cannot help themselves."

And, when he isn't at a board meeting, Ouimet can often be found at a board meeting in Scio Township, Sharon Township, Manchester, Dexter or Chelsea.

"I like listening to the elected officials in the townships or villages, but also listening to people in the audience. I want to know what is concerning them. What are their challenges?" he said.

"I do a door to door every year and listen to what people are saying and, because of that, I can interpret what their feelings and needs are."

"I don't sleep very much. I work all the time. However, I hope, when all is said and done, I can look back and honestly say I helped make a positive change for people."

Two of Ouimet's proudest achievements have been while serving as county commissioner.

"Two major things were road patrol and making sure we maintained affordable public safety in the western part of the county. Secondly, we balanced the county budget when we had a \$30 million deficit with very little fanfare and reduction of personnel and programs. We did it through cooperation with our union and non-union employees."

However, balancing the budget was no easy task, he said.

"Almost all of the programs that we fund bring great value back to the people who meet the greatest level of needs, so we had to find out ways to partner with other organizations, nonprofits and business in order to maintain a service and still be able to live within the budget restraints that we have."

Ouimet acknowledges his hectic schedule is not always conducive for a personal life, but he credits his wife and family for allowing him to maintain a high profile in the community.

"It is a juggling act. I am blessed with a wife that clearly understands," he said. "My grandson, Trey, also is given high priority. I try to spend a little time with him every single day. Whether it's taking him to the library to read or taking him to school — it's part of my life routine."

As far as the future, Ouimet said he will take it one day at a time.

"I'll know it's my time to step aside when I don't think I am contributing at the level I should be," he said. "I see a lot of people in politics who tend to stay longer than they should. I think I am my hardest critic about my level of performance, and when I don't meet those expectations I set for myself, then someone else should."

understood. Only 30 percent of eligible patients access hospice services at the end of life.

- Hospice provides a holistic approach to care that includes addressing the emotional, physical and social needs of patients and their loved ones.

Thousands of consumers complained to the Better Business Bureau in 2009 after signing up for a "free" trial offer online that resulted in repeated charges to their credit or debit cards, sometimes amounting to as much as hundreds of dollars every month. Read the terms and conditions of any "free" trial offer before handing over credit or debit card numbers.

4. Keep your computer safe. If you haven't already, install anti-virus software on your computer, and don't forget to regularly check for software and operating system updates and patches. Don't open attachments or click on links in e-mails unless you can confirm the e-mail came from someone you trust.

5. Never wire money to someone you don't know. Many scams require that the victim wire money back to the scammers. Scammers know that tracking money sent via MoneyGram or Western Union is extremely difficult. Even more troubling for victims is the fact that it's nearly

impossible to get your money back.

6. Fight identity theft. Always shred paper documents that include sensitive financial data, and dispose of computers, cell phones and digital data safely. BBB offers tips and checklists on what to shred and hosts annual Secure Your ID events nationwide to help you stay safe.

7. Ask the Better Business Bureau for help. File a complaint with your BBB if you have a disagreement with a business or have been ripped off by a scammer.

8. Create a budget and stick to it. If you're a cash-strapped consumer, setting a budget can help you stay afloat in 2010. The Better Business Bureau has advice on how to create a budget to help you get out of debt and stay out of debt at bbb.org.

9. Fight fake check fraud. Thanks to advances in printing technology, scammers have the ability to create very real-looking phony checks. Educate yourself on the common types of check fraud and be extremely wary of checks that come with claims that you've won the lottery, are eligible for a government grant or have landed a job as a secret shopper.

10. Get everything in writing. Don't just take a business' word for it. Get every verbal agreement in writing to limit miscommunication and misunderstandings between your expectations and what the business delivers.

Individual's personality affects financial decision making

All investors are not created equal. That's why financial planners start their first client meetings with a discussion of money attitudes, goals and risk tolerance — the driver at the root of all investment decisions. Some planners do this by general conversation, others by detailed surveys they ask their clients to fill out.

The survey route can be a more valuable tool because it forces clients to face their money issues, perhaps for the first time. Despite the difficulty in facing up to such key issues, individuals get a better idea of where their money strengths and weaknesses really lie. Often, the real difficulties lie in how money is spent.

The real value of answering a lot of questions about your risk tolerance is to tell you what you don't know — how the sources of your money, the way you made it, your money view, points and current methods of handling it will inform every decision you make about it in the future.

The most important thing a

questionnaire can reveal is your true money priorities and behaviors. Trained financial advisers use both conversation and surveys to reach some firm answers that might surprise you.

Are there particular money types? In reality, you'll find quite a number of surveys out there that define money types in particular ways, but you'll find personalities that are common on the scale from conservative to liberal. Deborah Price, a Financial Planning Association member and founder and CEO of the Money Coaching Institute, offers these scenarios in an article titled, "What's Your Money Personality?"

The Innocent: Price notes that innocents often live in denial, are easily overwhelmed by financial information and rely heavily on the advice and opinions of others. They tend to be the most trusting because they generally don't see people or situations clearly, which leaves them open to bad decisions at best and fraud at worst.

The Victim: She notes that victims are people who tend to

live in the past and blame their woes on outside factors and situations they claim they can't control. These people may have been abused, betrayed or have suffered some great financial loss, but they generally see life as a self-fulfilling prophecy that they can't change.

The Warrior: Generally seen as a successful person in the business and financial worlds, they will listen to advisers, but they make their own decisions. They tend to be great caretakers.

The Martyr: These people generally put other people before their own financial health. They use their money to rescue others based on their high expectations for themselves and the people they're rescuing, but these decisions may be costly in the long run.

The Fool: The Fool, explains Price, is a combination of the Innocent and the Warrior because they have no clue about what they're doing but they'll act fearlessly. They are financially adventurous and they act on impulse.

The Creator/Artist: These people often have a love/hate relationship with money. They're constantly struggling to make their finances work, but they often feel that caring about money means something bad.

The Tyrant: Price reports that this type hoards money and uses it to manipulate others. They may have everything they need, but they're never comfortable with their lives because they fear losing control.

The Magician: Price defines the Magician as the ideal money type. They're aware of their circumstances and responsibilities and can see situations very clearly.

A financial planner tries to see through the static to find out what you really need to create a solid financial life. But it might make sense to ask yourself a few questions before you and your planner sit down:

•How would you describe your financial status right now?
•What's important about money to you?
•What's your family history with money?

•What do you do with your money?

•If money wasn't an issue, what would you do with your life?

•Has the way you've made your money — through work, marriage or inheritance — affected the way you think about it in a particular way?

•How much debt do you have and how do you feel about it?

•Are you more concerned about maintaining the value of your initial investment or making a profit from it?

•Are you willing to give up that stability for the chance at long-term growth?

•What are you most likely to enjoy spending money on?

•How would you feel if the value of your investment dropped for several months?

•How would you feel if the value of your investment dropped for several years?

•If you had to list three things you really wanted to do with your money, what would they be?

•What does retirement mean to you? Does it mean quitting work entirely and doing whatever

er you want to do or working in a new career full- or part-time?

•Do you want kids? Do you understand the financial commitment?

•If you have kids, do you expect them to pay their own way through college or will you pay for all or part of it? What kind of shape are you in to afford their college education?

•How's your health and your health insurance coverage?

•What kind of physical and financial shape are your parents in?

One of the toughest aspects of getting a financial plan going is recognizing how your personal style, mindset and life situation might affect your investment decisions. "PWP members really enjoy being part of an extended family of single parents that makes meeting and making new friends easier, especially if they have relocated far from old friends and family members," Crawford said.

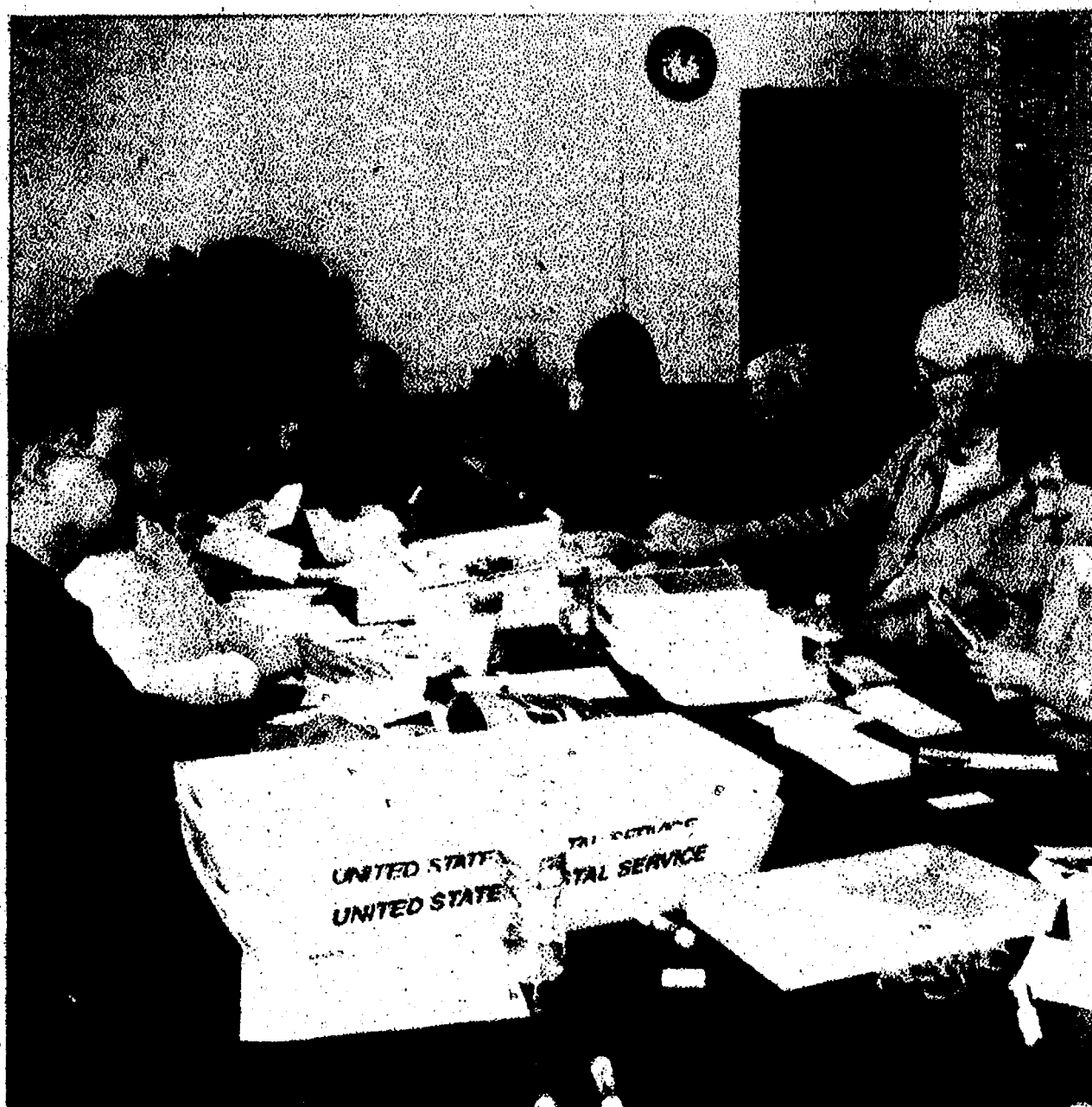
"Some enjoy parent activities like volleyball, card parties and dances, while others are more actively involved in family activities they can do with their children."

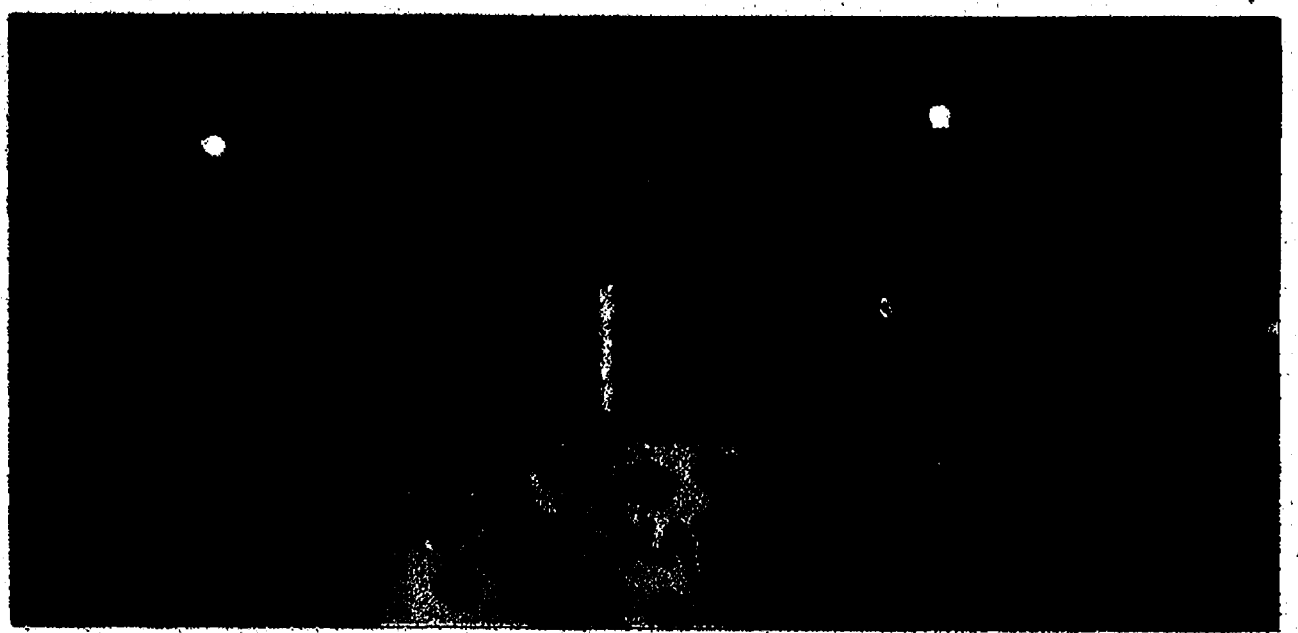

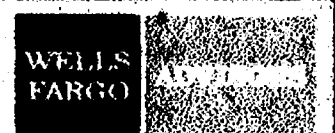

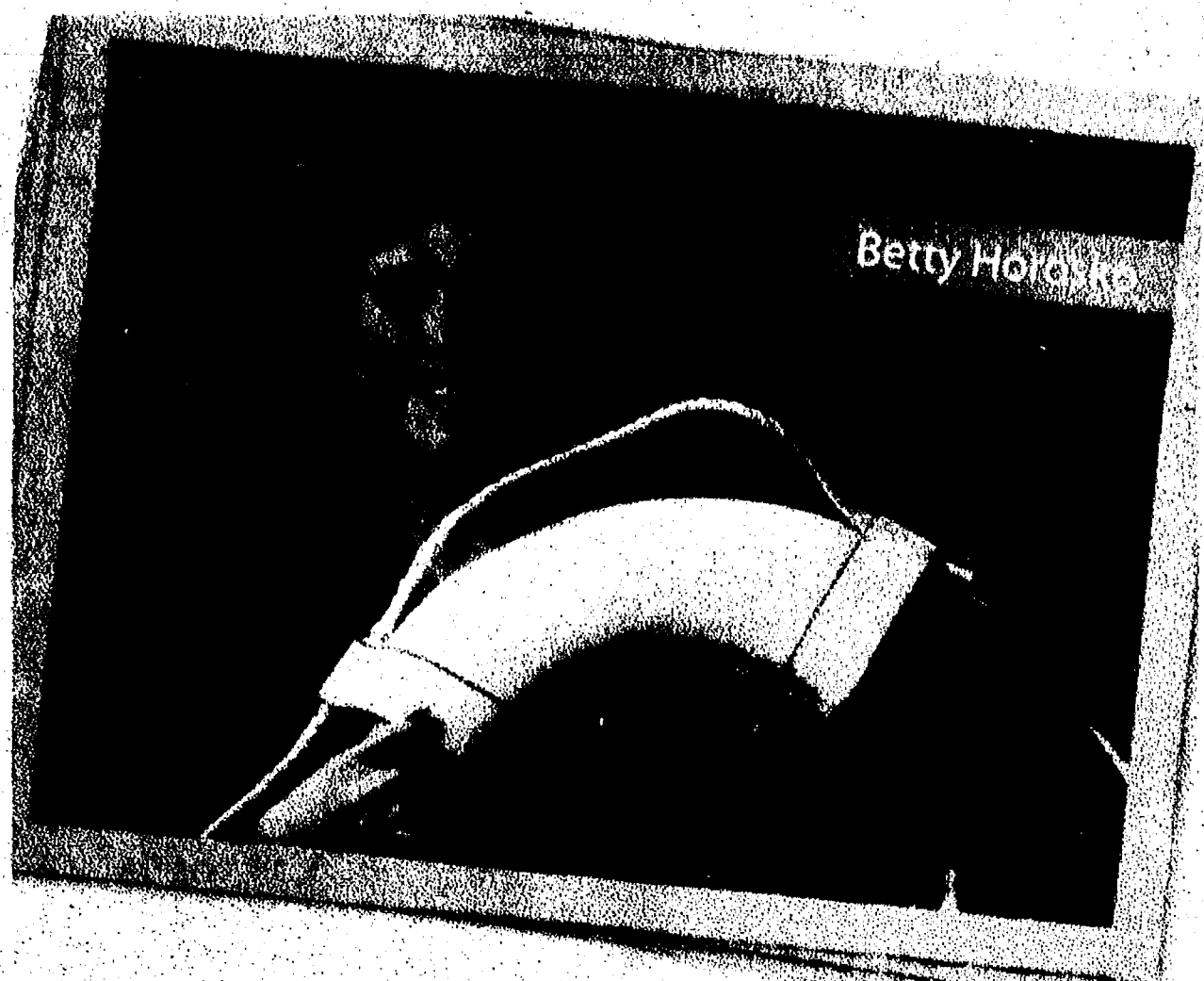

Achieve wellness by setting goals in 2010

It's January - that time of the year when many people promise themselves that they are going to make changes in their lifestyles to improve health or to lose weight. And right around the corner is February, that time of year when almost as many people have given up on those changes and fall back into unhealthy habits.

But this year, rather than leaping into something and quickly dropping out, perhaps try starting out slowly and methodically, setting reasonable goals and making small changes. Maybe dramatic results won't occur in the next week or even the next month, but by the time 2011 rolls around, you just might feel like a new person.

What does it mean to "be fit"? Thanks to the popular media, too many people define fitness as being a certain weight or fitting into a specific clothing size. But according to Dawn Lyons, fitness manager at the Chelsea Wellness Center, the word fitness is a misnomer - wellness is more accurate.

"Wellness involves being at a healthy weight for height and age, able to do everyday activities without being winded, and having a good quality of life," Lyons said. "Barring injury or disease, if your health stays relatively good, most people can stay active and maintain activities that they like to do. I still play

softball and golf. I don't do it as well as I did when I was 20, but I still enjoy it.

"Our senior population looks a lot different than it did 30 years ago. We have active seniors who are swimming, running and biking at 65 and older. Overall health is really important."

Exercising regularly provides many physical and mental benefits.

"People feel better, sleep better, every day activities become easier, and it's easier to manage weight," Lyons said. Exercise also helps to prevent or manage chronic disease.

"Some people with chronic health conditions such as diabetes or hypertension may even be able to control their diseases without medication if they are exercising regularly," Lyons said.

Local resident Shelly Beatty began swimming and lifting weights a year and a half ago and has noticed tremendous improvement in her health and well-being.

"It helps my lupus disease," she said. "I get really achy, and after swimming it goes away. It helps me be productive the rest of the day. I also sleep a lot better. I've greatly decreased the number of doctor visits per year by swimming. I think it actually saves me money to have the membership at the wellness center by decreasing my co-pays and extra medications I don't need."

Exercise is also a com-

mon stress reliever. Cindy Triveline, who has been running for over 20 years, calls it her "runner's high." "If I have a traffic jam in the brain, I run and I feel more focused," she said.

Endorphins, the chemical that researchers say relieve stress and pain, can be released in one moderately intense exercise session of 20 to 30 minutes. Besides relieving stress, exercise improves mood and mental focus, and also helps to prevent depression.

If now is the time that you're ready to reap the amazing benefits of regular exercise, there is a recommendation for those just starting out. The Wellness Center uses the American College of Sports Medicine guidelines for those who are new to exercising.

If it's been more than a year since the last physical exam, or if there is a family history of cardiovascular or metabolic disease before the age of 50, then it's a good idea to get a doctor's OK before beginning a new exercise program.

"Also, I can't stress enough to start out slow," Lyons said. "Some people are gung-ho the first day and then they're miserable for the next week."

A reasonable starting point might be to walk for 10 minutes and build from there.

Triveline said that it's okay to start out with baby steps. Beginning a running program might even mean mostly walking at first and occasionally running from one light pole to the next or one mailbox to another.

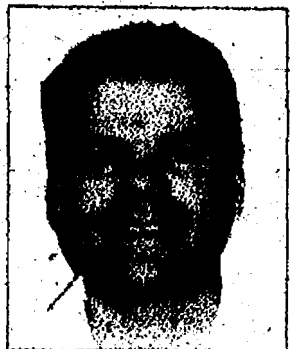

The Dynamic duo

Manchester's Ball, Schaible form top backcourt

Dynamic duos have played a major role on many championship teams in history.

The Pistons had Isaiah Thomas and Joe Dumars during the "Bad Boys" era of 1989-90. Pavel Datsyuk and Henrik Zetterberg led the Red Wings to the Stanley Cup in 2008, and Joe Montana had Jerry Rice during the San Francisco 49er's dynasty in the 1980's.

This season, the Manchester varsity girls' basketball team has its own formidable 1-2 punch in seniors Stephanie Ball and Tracy Schaible. Both share the point guard duties and give the Flying Dutch one of the more structured backcourts in the region.

After several seasons of sub-.500 records, including last year's 8-13 mark, the Dutch appear to be moving in a positive direction. Manchester (4-4, 4-2 Cascades) is three games better than last year at this time and off to its best start in Cascades Conference play in many years.

The two conference losses were by a combined seven points to league powers Napoleon and Michigan Center. The improved start has increased the hopes for Manchester's first district title since 1998.

"This team has good potential, and it's a matter of getting our confidence back," Schaible said. "We know we can win, and you can see it in us this season."

Manchester fans have been able to follow Ball and Schaible's development since youth hoops, as the duo has played together since fifth grade. When they reached high school in Fall 2006, then first-year varsity girls' basketball coach Cori Kastel jumped Ball and Schaible to the varsity level.

"It was a different experience playing varsity as a freshman," Ball said. "I'm still the same height as I was (5-3) then. I was small compared to the centers in the league."

While gaining varsity experience, Ball and Schaible were taken under the wings of the upperclassmen in Laura Coltre, Julie Fielder and Amanda Mutchler.

"I was nervous for my first game, but I could look up to the older girls to pick me up, and that helped me out more than anything," Schaible said.

Along with the upperclassmen, Ball had the benefit of learning the game from her father, current junior varsity girls' basket-

ball coach Mark Ball.

"My dad worked with me since I was little," Ball said. "I've seen him and coach all through school."

Both players saw an increased role last year and began to establish themselves as one of the best combinations in the league. They took turns rewriting the Manchester record books during the second half of the season.

Ball started things by hitting a Manchester record five 3-pointers against Napoleon Jan. 9, 2009.

Later that month, Schaible scored a career-high 26 points at Hanover-Horton, finishing just two points behind the school record. On Feb. 20, 2009 at Napoleon, Schaible buried five 3-pointers of her own, tying Ball for the school record.

They finished the season 1-2 on the team in scoring. Schaible averaged 10.1 points, while Ball averaged 10.

"It's always nice to look up and see our names on a record that could be up there for a while," Schaible said. "Sharing it with Steph makes it even better."

Both earned All-Cascades recognition as juniors. Ball was named to the All-Cascades First Team, while Schaible received All-Cascades honorable mention.

"I like to cut through the back door, and Tracy is so good at finding the open spot," Ball said. "Both of us like to run-and-gun and push the ball up."

Ball and Schaible have a almost cosmic connection when both are on the floor. Both

can play an up-tempo game and seem to know what the other is thinking before opponents can react.

"Steph and I see eye-to-eye and don't have to motion for each other," Schaible said. "We think the same way, and it's really cool to play with her."

The duo was named co-captains for this season along with fellow senior Megan Bossory.

According to Ball, the Dutch are an "independent team," and the captains try to be everyone's friend and keep any drama to the very minimum.

"We try to pick everyone up and not let them get down on themselves," Schaible said. "If you have fun playing, you can succeed."

Ball has seen Schaible develop into a more active leader in recent seasons.

"Tracy was always much quieter, but she began to break through her shell during her sophomore and junior years," Ball said.

As the second half of conference play approaches, the seniors are looking to get the Dutch to a higher level. Along with staying in contention for a Cascades title, both believe the Dutch will be a factor in the district playoffs, which begins March 2 at Hanover-Horton.

"It's been a while, and it would be great to put our year on the banners," Schaible said.

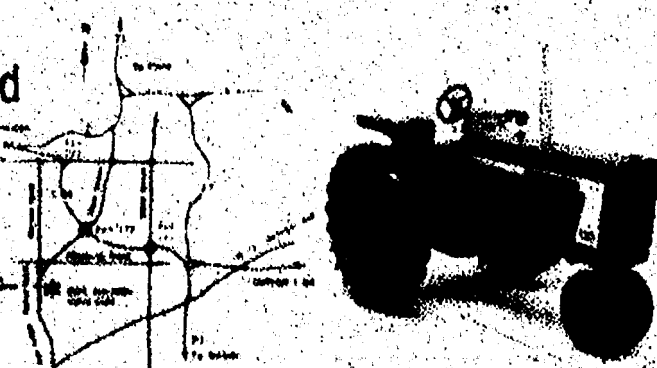

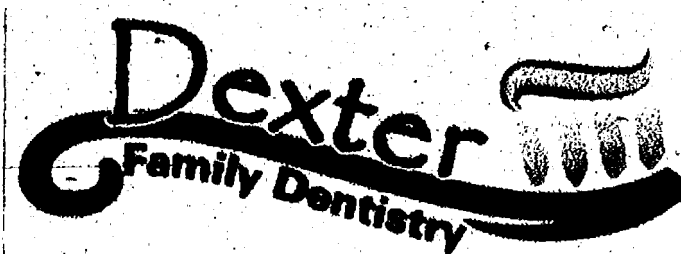

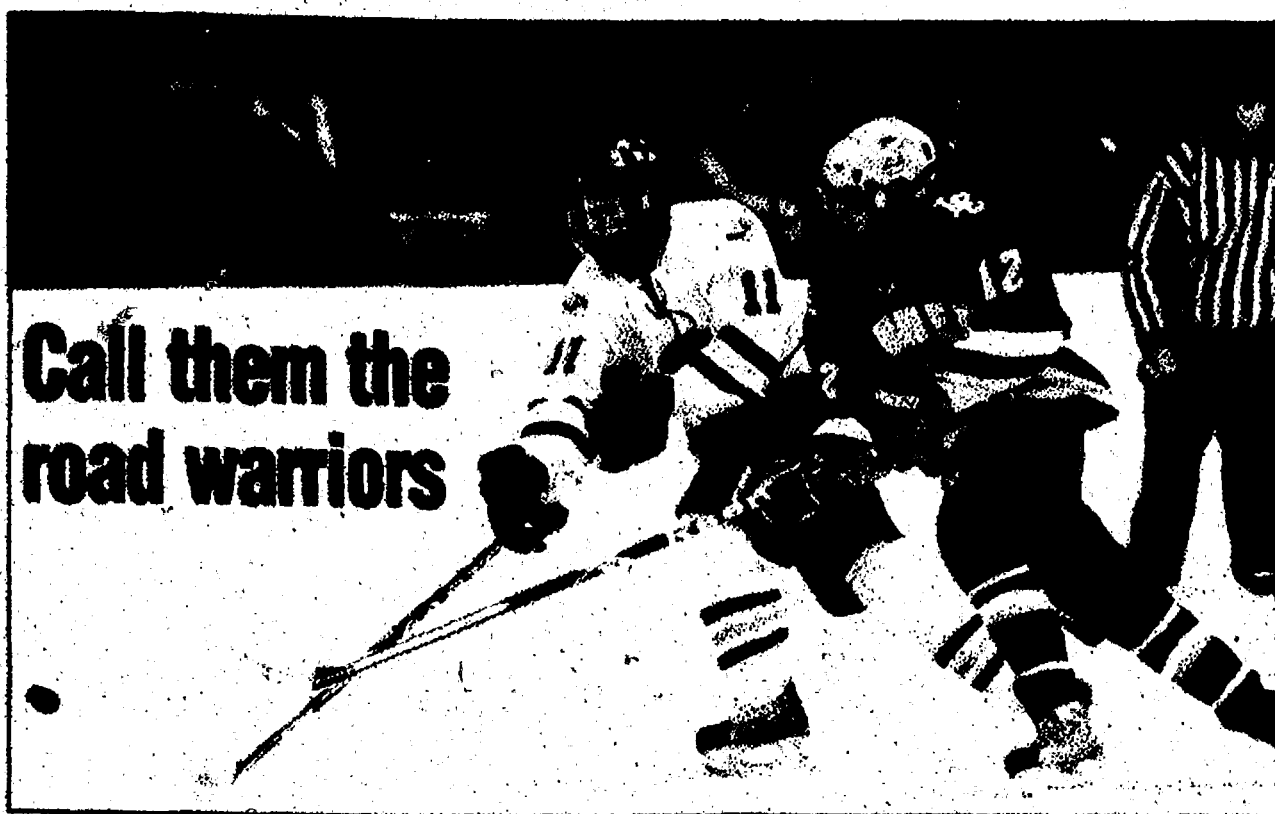

"We took three penalties in the third period and with a 2-1 lead against a good team, you

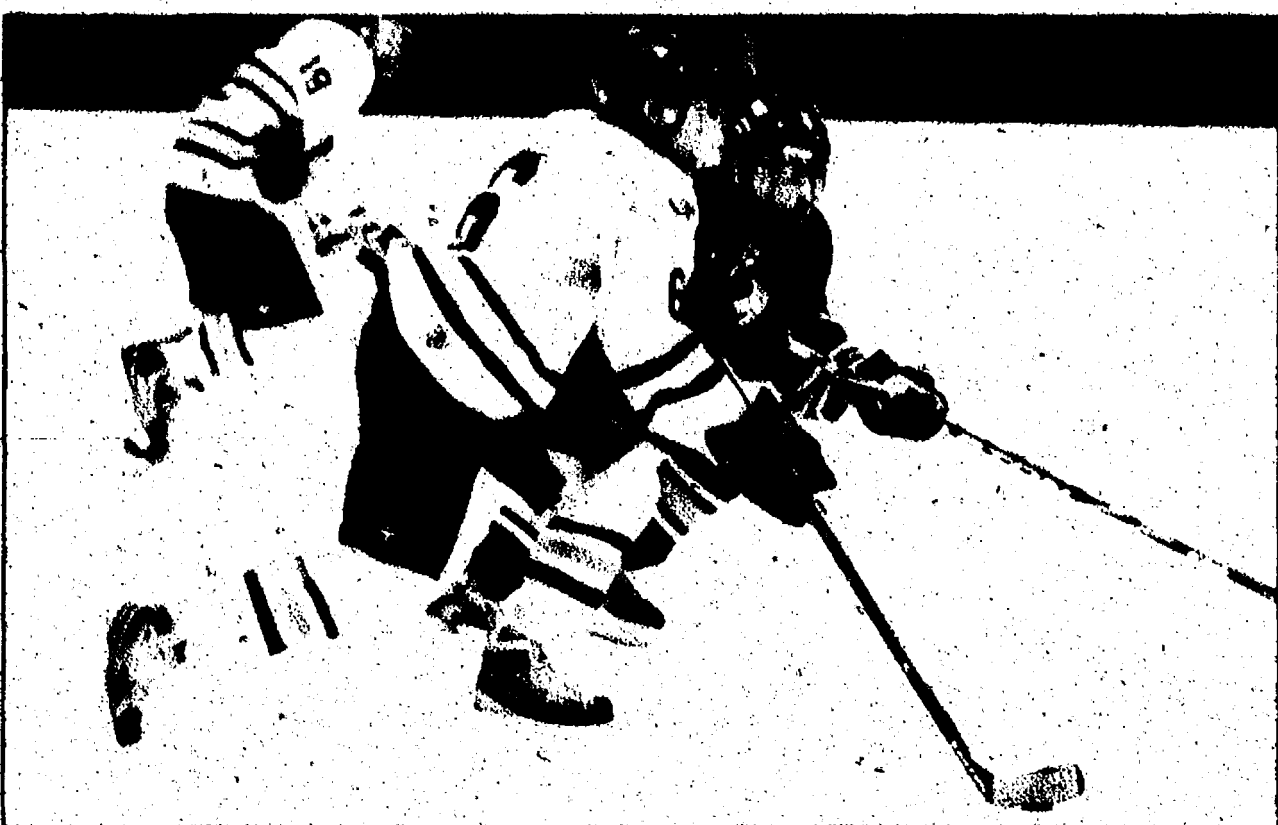
just can't do that," Wright said. "I thought overall we did a good job of killing off the penalties. A few times the puck just bounced the wrong way."

Four Chelsea wrestlers left Holly with perfect

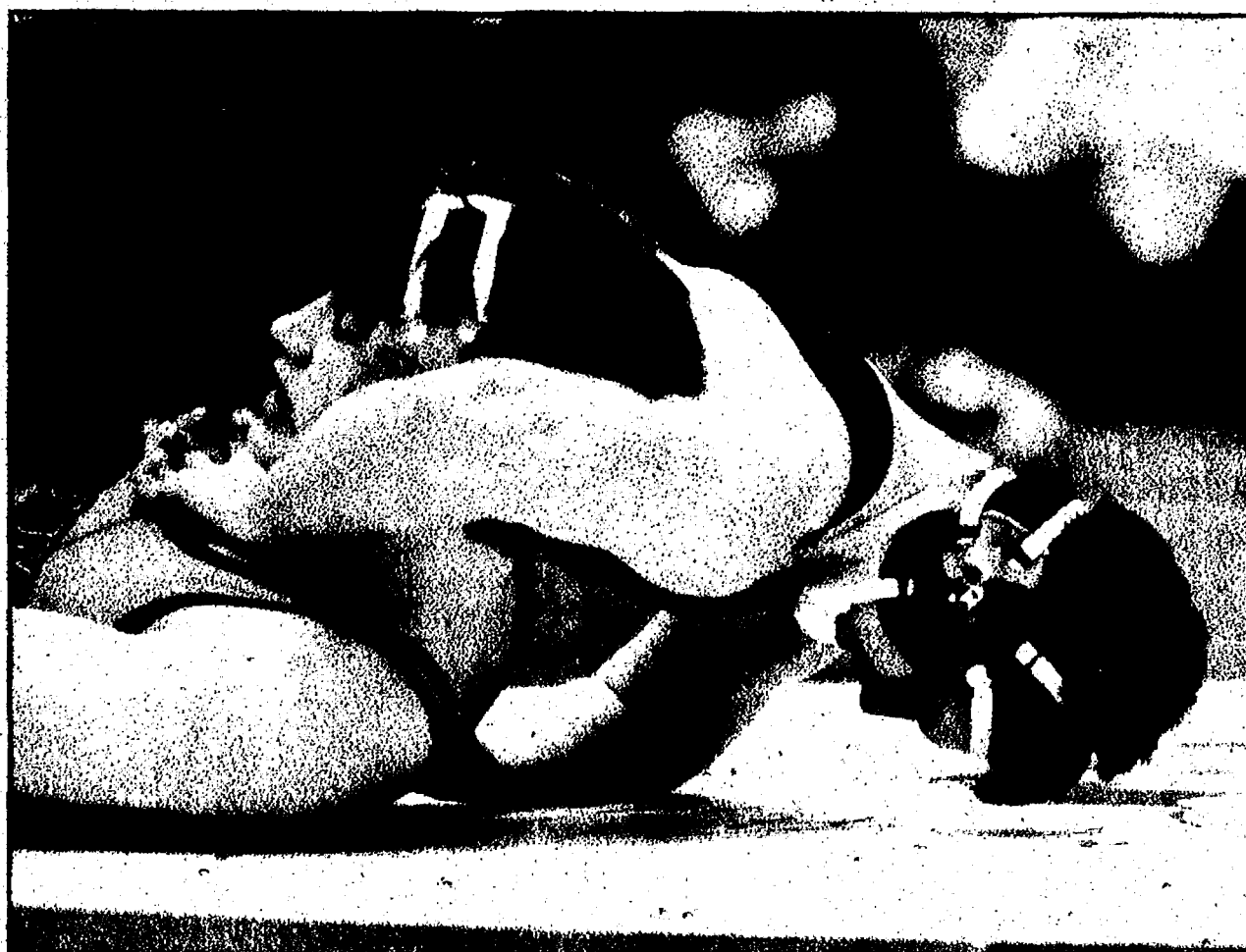

Steve Buss at 119, Matt Lindauer at 160, Kevin Watkins at 171 and Ricky Douglas at 189 all won two matches on the day.

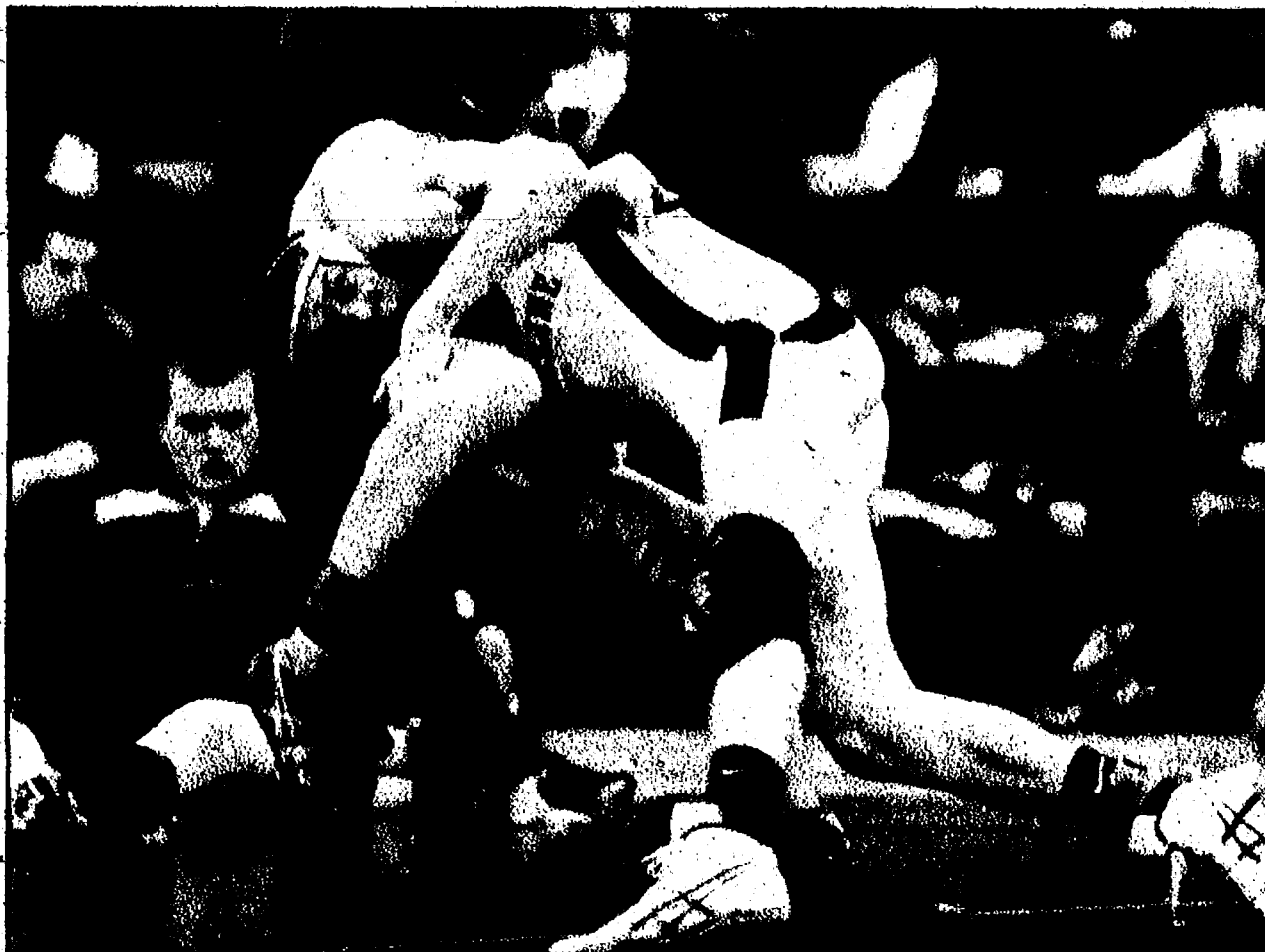

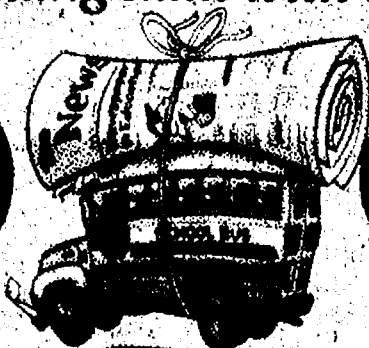

Bulldogs shoot down host Tecumseh

The Tecumseh game plan was simple. Pull back and cut off the inside passing lanes and keep Chelsea away from the basket.

The Chelsea counter-attack was equally as simple. Start draining threes until they come out of their shell. The Bulldogs did just that, led by the hot hand of Charlie McCalla, who made four of five three-point attempts in the first half in a 67-54 victory.

The Bulldogs improved to 2-0 in the Southeastern Conference and 5-1 overall.

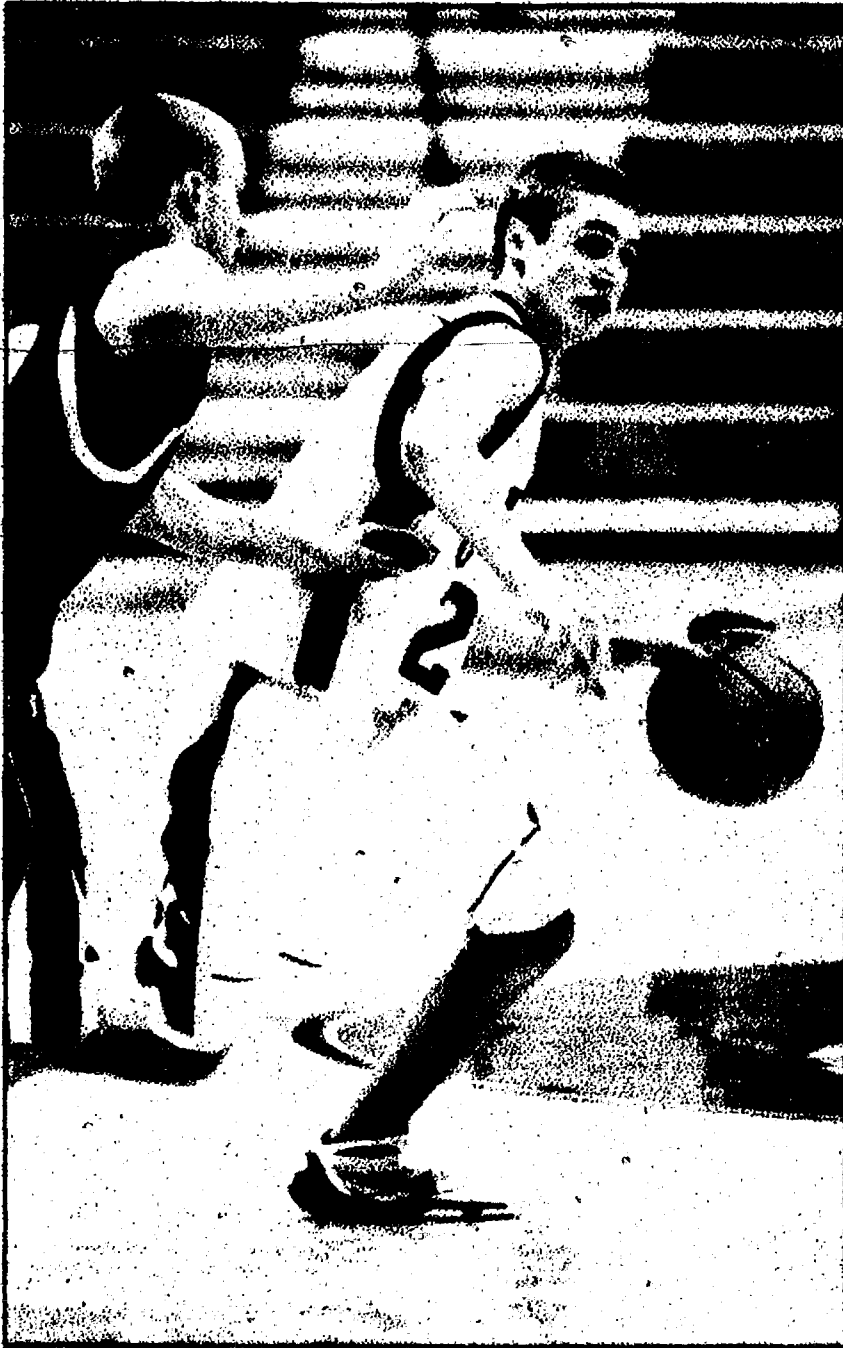

McCalla led all Chelsea scorers with a season-high 15 points, all on three-pointers. The 6-3 junior had 12 points in the first half to help set the tone.

In the second half, Raymond rotated all of his players in and out as all 15 saw action. In fact, 12 of his 15 players scored in the game.

There were a lot of numbers that added up to Chelsea's best game of the year.

The Bulldogs had a season-low 14 turnovers, while they forced 18 turnovers and had 10 steals. They shot 46 percent (24 of 52) from the floor and an amazing 62 percent (8 of 13) from beyond the three-point arc.

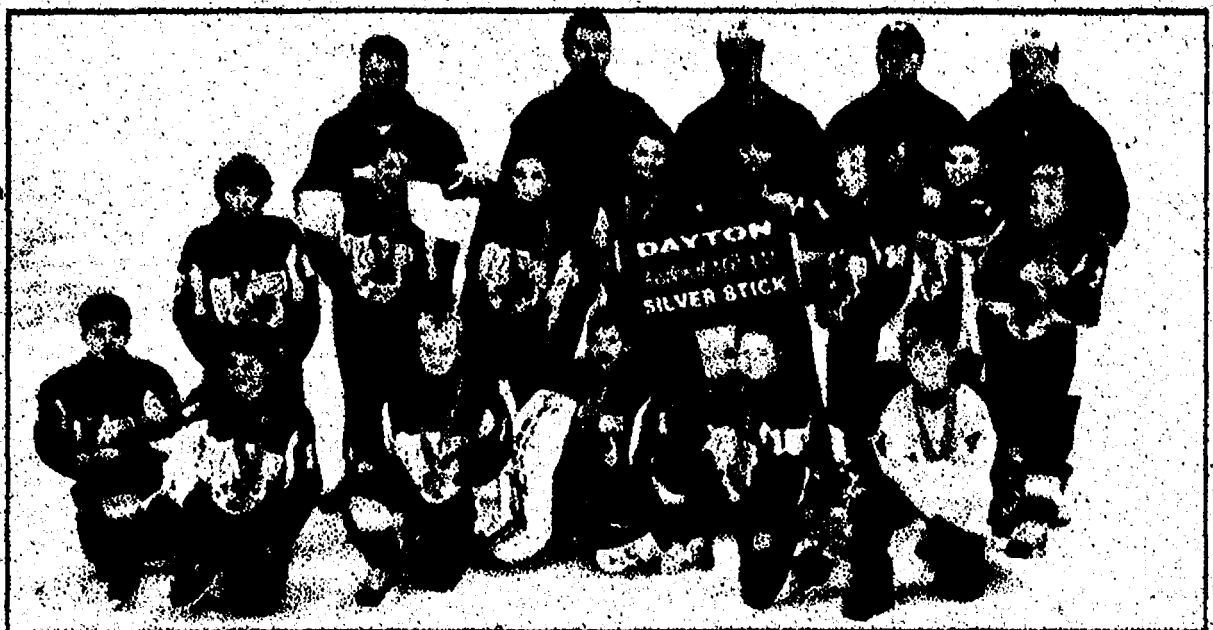

Chelsea's Chris Schoenberg kneels next to a deer he harvested last November. The 12-point buck had a 19-inch spread.

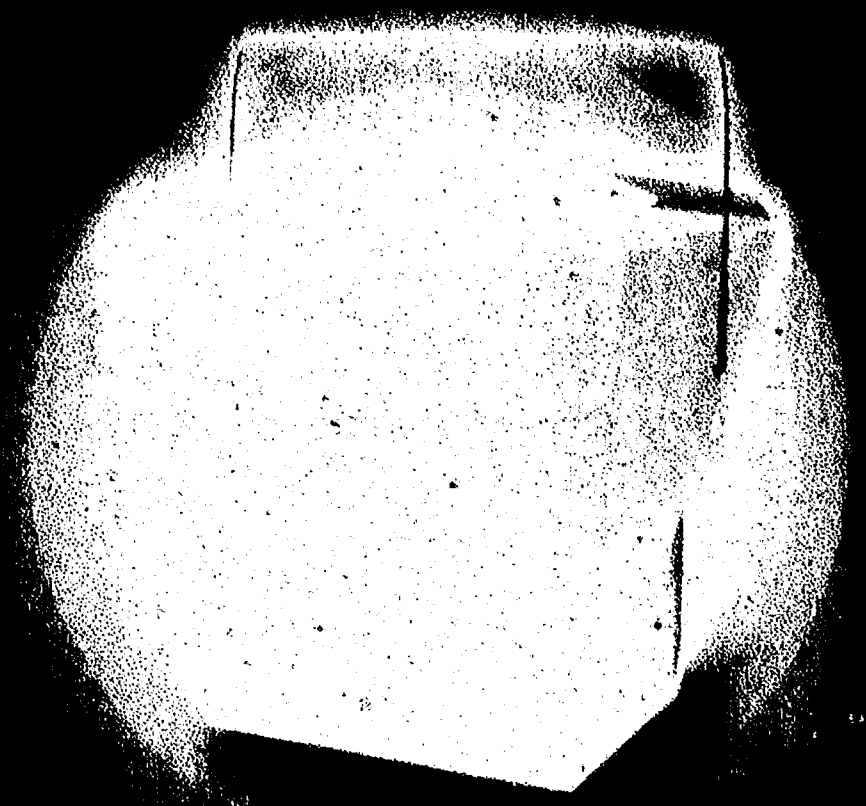

Columnist looks back at highlights of 2009

The year 2009 was filled with excitement in my personal, professional and outdoor life.

The year started off with the Ice Fishing Derby on Cavanaugh Lake along with a couple other "hidden lakes" in Washtenaw County. The ice fishing was mostly slow, but we did have our share of luck catching bluegills, crappie and even a few northern pike on my trips. I never knew bluegills could taste so good in the deep fryer in the middle of winter.

I had made the decision during this time to hunt turkeys in the spring with a longbow and wooden arrows. I remember talking about Fred Barta, TV host of "The Best and Worst of Fred Barta." He's over the top in everything he does, but he never gives up and appreciates the simple things in life.

I, like so many other people, some time got caught up in the technology when it comes to hunting. So much so that it takes away the essence of the hunting experience itself. For instance, modern muzzle loaders of today should really be called single-shot rifles. They include a quick release breach plug, synthetic stocks, stainless steel barrels, fiber optic sights, scope mounts and 1.28 inch twist barrel. The powder even comes in pellets for easy loading and there are more sabot available than you can shake a stick at.

The same can be said for bow hunting. Compound bows are so technologically advanced that it can take away from the essence of shooting. I think these advancements are great, but can take over the top sometimes. Native Americans didn't have these technologies, yet they hunted effectively for centuries. My imagination marvels at how it must have been to live as a Native American not that long ago. They took down the largest of game using nothing more than a stick and string. It's simple yet admirable. It saddens me this style of hunting isn't promoted more.

I drew the early spring turkey season and was fortunate enough to shoot a large gobbler with my longbow and wooden arrow, all the while catching it on video with my son sitting next to me. This was the highlight of my 2009 hunting year.

The summer came along and I had a great time fishing with my son and other friends. Ricky learned how to fly fish and I watched him change from a little boy to someone a bit older. He can take the hook out of most fish and doesn't need my help in casting and retrieving fish.

The Cayman Islands was a trip I won't forget anytime soon during early June. I met up with my 27-year-old brother and he showed me a great time in the Caribbean. We caught tuna, barracuda and wahoo while deep sea fishing less than a mile off the coast. I got to feed stingrays and went snorkeling for the first time. It was a great time to say the least.

The vibrant colors are what I'll miss the most about going to the Caymans. The coral reefs and the tropical fish were so amazing, let alone the beautiful

Let me be the first to say that it's a great deal of work to shoot, then butcher deer in the heat of summer.

I did have some successes in shooting a nice 5-point with a bow at only three yards. I also shot a couple of does with my fancy muzzle loader as described above. The hardest thing for me to accept this fall was not getting that big buck that most of us dream about. Rationally, I get it, but I'm still disappointed none the less. I tried so darn hard this fall to get that buck, but it just didn't happen. Trust me when I say that I put in my time as a hunter and scouted my areas well.

I know you can't get a big buck every year, but I sure would like to try. But seriously, I had many wonderful moments in the woods this fall. I loved watching the leaves turn from green to glorious reds, oranges and yellows. Oh, and hunting when we've had that first snow,

there's nothing like it on earth.

The year was winding down when my son and I went to Canada for Christmas. My sister came home from England, where she's an elementary teacher in Essex. My brother Stan also came home from Whistler, British Columbia. He's a pro snowboarder and accomplished artist. He's also involved with the upcoming Winter Olympics.

We had a great time celebrating the Christmas season. It was the first time we were all together since 2006. I'm always reminded at how much I love my family when we're together at last. The highlight of our trip was when Santa got Ricky, a very nice snowboard. After opening the gift, we all went snowboarding, except for me. I skied instead, because I'm old school.

Evading Arrest

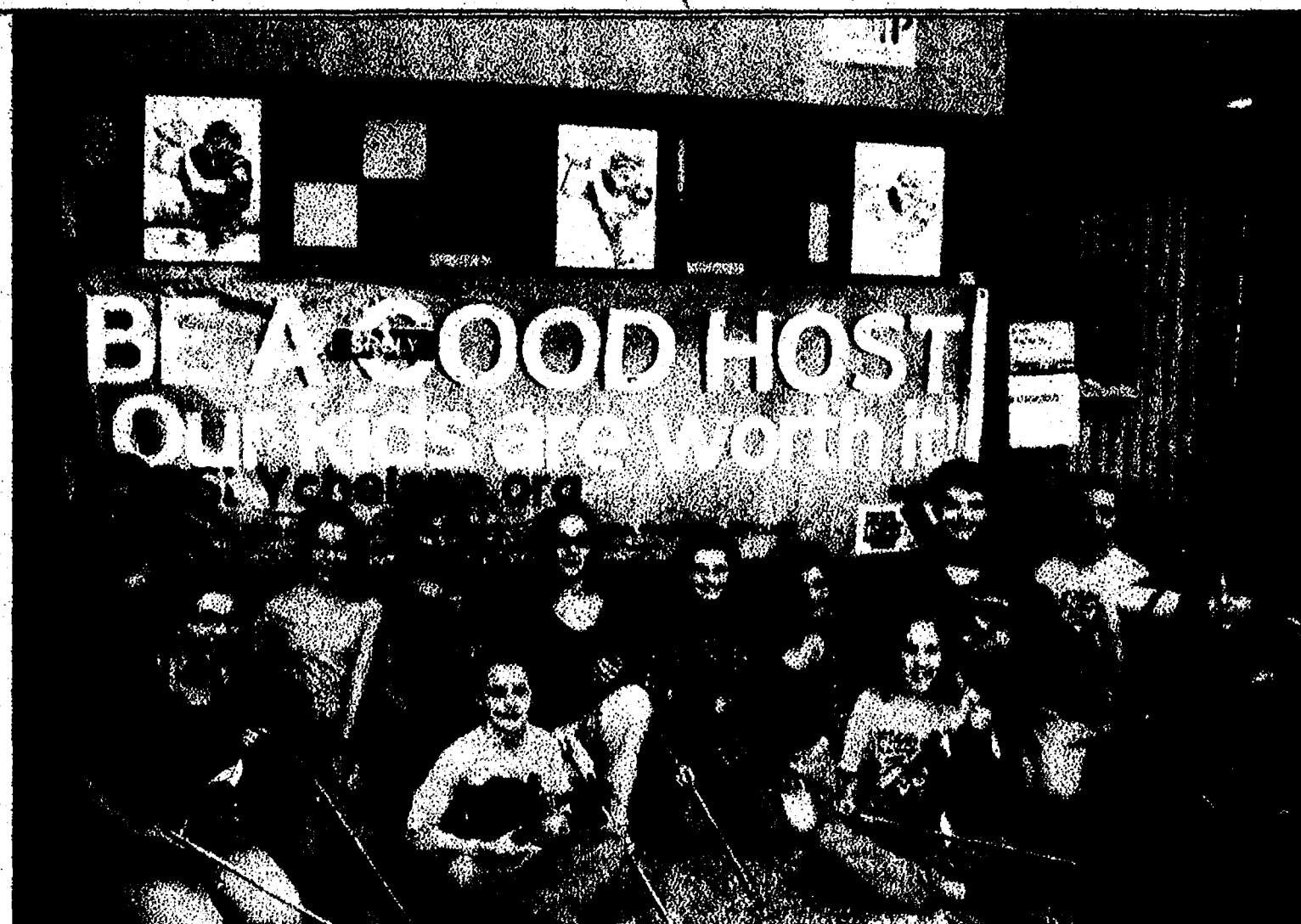

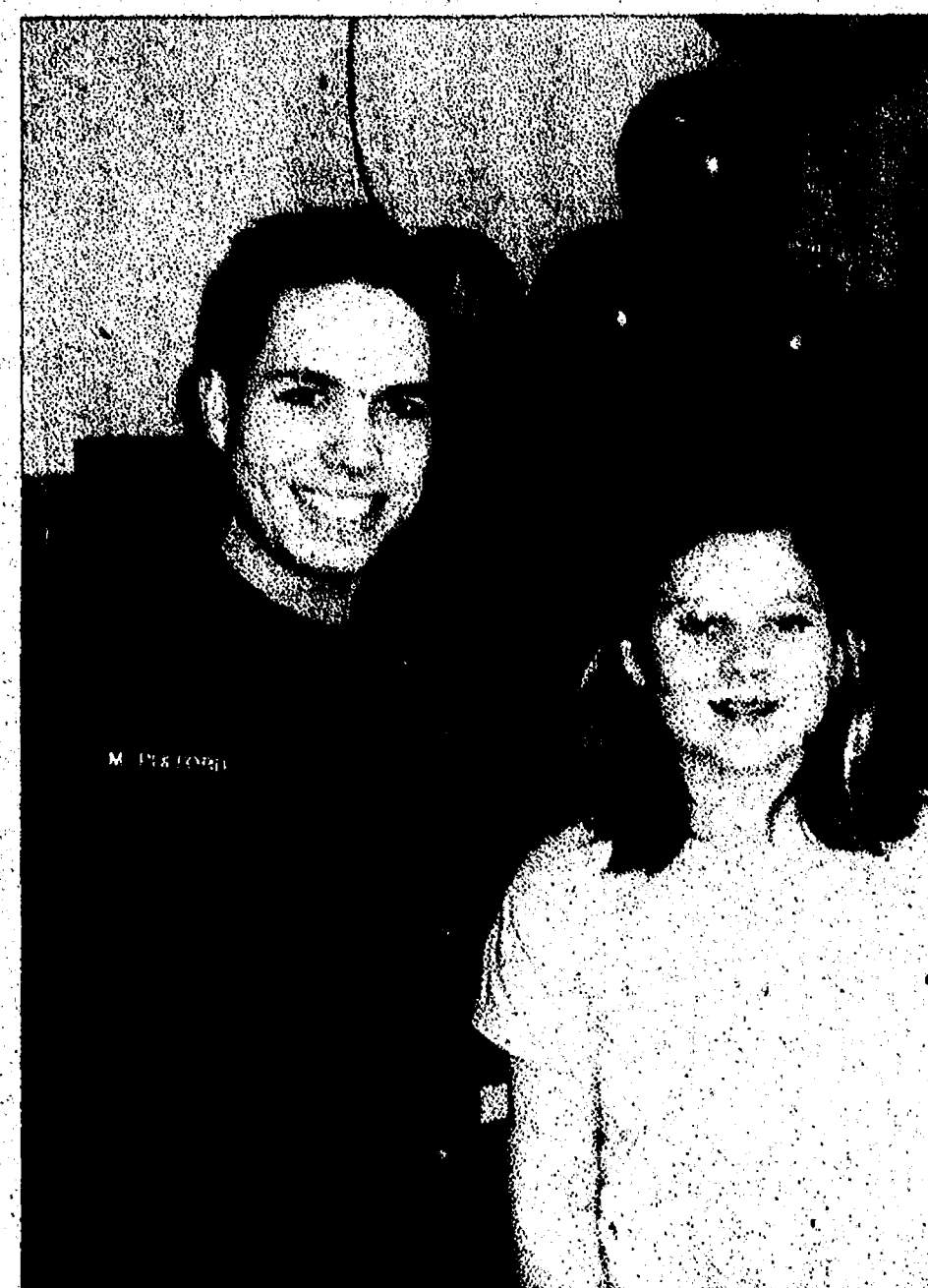

Drinks, tax and tips are additional.

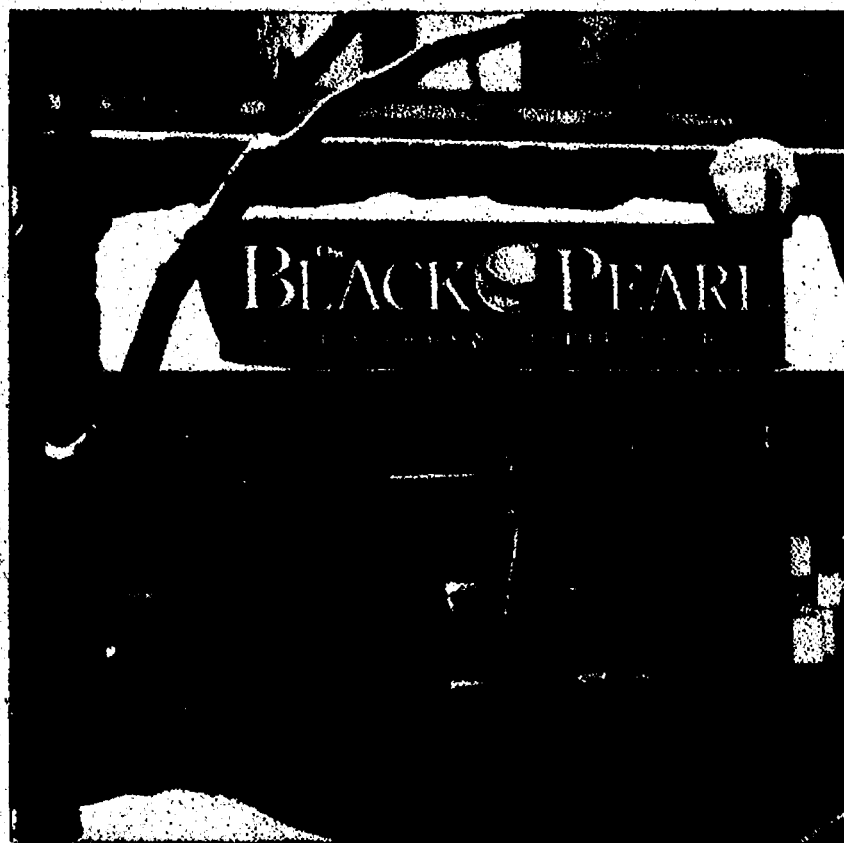
Last June was the inaugural event, said Maura Thomson of the Main Street Area Association, which is presenting the event.
