Saying goodbye

Friends, family honor Gentz with memorial ceremony in Chelsea

Friends, family and members of the military said their final goodbyes to Grass Lake resident Joel Christopher Gentz at a memorial service June 24 at St. Paul United Church of Christ in Chelsea.

Gentz, who was killed on June 9 in Afghanistan while participating in a rescue mission, was remembered for his sense of humor, unwavering commitment to serve others and courage to take on monumental challenges.

"We're all here because we've known Joel, loved Joel and lost Joel," Gentz's aunt, Karen Hannah said fighting back tears. "None of us can explain how this happened or why, but we have to take what we learned from Joel and put it into practice.

"I've learned he loved his wife, Kathryn, his mom and his dad, all of his relatives and 'the guys.' I have learned about his

will miss him." Gentz's siblings, Rachel and Jared, shared stories of camping, swimming, spying on neighbors and other "unofficial" training they put their brother through long before he was jumping out of planes and rescuing soldiers in foreign lands.

"It became a tradition for us to go spying on our neighbors when we visited Rochester, N.Y.," Rachel said. "We would get all decked out in spy gear and head out into the neighborhood."

Rachel said one of her favorite memories was when a neighbor's sensor light turned on and Joel dropped to the ground "Army crawling" his way to safety. Jared said one of his favorite

Firefighters respond to local emergencies

Lightning strikes two homes in Chelsea during thunderstorms By Daniel Lai Heitage Newspapers

A string of recent heavy con thunderstorms in the str Washtenaw County area has gen kept the Chelsea Area Fire Authority on its toes. CAFA responded to two emergency

calls on June 23. The first call came in at 11:30 p.m. for a house fire on Boyce Road in Lyndon Township. Firefighters from seven area departments responded to the scene. According to GAFA Chief Jim Payeur, flames were already coming from the roof of the structure by the time emergency crews arrived. "We received a

call from a passerby who noticed the fire," Payeur said. He said it took about 90 minutes to get the fire under control. No injuries were reported. "The homeowners weren't

there at the time," he said. Payeur said the cause of the

fire is still under investigation. "We're not sure if the fire was caused by a lightning strike

*or by something else entirely." he said. Payeur said damage to

the home was significant. CAFA received assistance from the Dexter, Manchester, Stockbridge, Unadilla Township, Scio Township and Pittsfield Township fire departments.

Payeur said the department . also responded to an emergency call involving a lightning strike on a barn near M-52 south of Chelsea.

"There was no damage that we could find," he said. "The owners were really lucky." On June 24, CAFA firefighters

On June 24, CAFA firefighters responded to a call in the Silver Fox subdivision in Sylvan Township around 7 p.m. Payeur said by the time firefighters arrived on scene, smoke was already coming from the house

"We called for mutual aid but were cancelled it after quickly being able to knock the fire down." he said.

Payeur said the cause of the fire was a burned out dehumidifier. No injuries were reported. "The homeowner was

extremely happy because we were able to rescue her cat," he said.

Area residents buy into yard sale fever

obin Early was passing through Dexter Village June 18 when she spotted toys laid out on blankets on the front lawn of a residence at the corner eye. of Baker and Main Street.

"I'm just grabbing some of these doohick-eys for my children." Early said while rifling through a pile of toy vehicles.

"I found Buzz Light-year," she squeals while holding up her prize.

Early doesn't usually "do garage sales," but she knows that her 3-year-old son will appreciate fresh booty for his toy chest.

Early is among many people who take note of Aaron Kennedy's corner yard sale, which is primarily packed with toys and clothing appropriate for young children and babies.

"My advice to anyone having a yard sale is, if you want to have one (in Dexter), Main and Baker is the place to be," she joked. Kennedy is actually a Huron Farms subdivi-

sion resident, and is simply administering the sale on another homeowner's property, who also donated items. It's a unique partnership in which both individuals can take advantage of the location. The details of the agreement hadn't been hashed out yet, Kennedy said, but she guessed that the take would be split down the middle.

Friday was the first day of the two-day-effort to sell items that had been cluttering up their basements. Having started at 6 a.m., Kennedy said that their yard sale had raised \$400 as of noon that day.

It's a pretty good experience for someone who had no previous experience with holding garage sales, but since she was cleaning the unusable items from her basement she figured she would raise some funds for a family vacation

"It has been an all-week thing for us," she said. "I'm just glad that people are buying. I don't even mind a little haggling since I just want it gone."

"The Etch-a-Sketch will be good for the car, but I don't know about the binoculars," Alethea says to her daughter.

"That's what's great about garage sales, it's only a dollar," Alethea says.

She plans on having her own yard sale in Saline at her mother's house, which is more of a moving sale in her case.

"I've been procrastinating though," she said. "We were supposed to have it last summer, but it's a lot of work.

"If only we could skip to the sale part," she said before going to pay for her children's prizes.

Alethea is right. Skipping to the sale part would make yard and garage sales easy, because plenty of hard work goes into preparation for the big day.

For example, each item must be tagged and priced accordingly. The seller must then spread the word either through social media, signs, newspapers, online sites or word of mouth. It also makes sense to set up a refreshment table, as well as tables and benches for showcasing sale items.

So is it worth all the hard work and preparation just to sell items priced at \$2 or less? It is if you want to manage any clutter in your home. At least, that's what Scott Stoll has come to find. Stoll moved from Ann Arbor to Chelsea

recently and got together with other family and friends to hold a multi-family yard sale.

Everyone accumulates stuff in their homes, and yard sales are a great way to purge the things you no longer love," he said.

Old clothes, Nintendo games, baseball cards, books, dishes, furniture and Beanie Babies were among the popular items the Stoll and Richards families had for sale.

Business had been brisk, he said, adding, "We would rather have these things go to a good home."

He said the families advertised in several newspapers, on Craig's List, every bulletin board they could find, as well as inside Chelsea Community Hospital. They also put up multiple signs on the road directing people to the site.

Some yard sales, however, extend beyond a single family or two. If they are anything like the yard sale Mary Covington of Ypsilanti recently took part in, then a single yard couldn't possibly hold all the stuff.

Covington is a resident of the Normal Park subdivision in Ypsilanti. She took part in the annual communitywide mega yard sale, which the neighborhood holds each spring as both a customer and a seller

"I have a couple yard sales every year, but the Normal Park community sale is one of the best of the year for buyers and sellers because there are about 200 yard sales in the neighborhood all going on at once," she said. "I mostly sell things." that I acquire over the year and just don't have a use for, or things I didn't sell at the last yard sale. Sometimes I sell things I buy at other yard sales.

Covington also said that even though she has her own yard sale, she also frequents other yard sales in the area.

"I think I do it out of habit," she said. "It's a fun way to spend a Saturday afternoon and I just love getting good deals on things."

Most items are priced at \$1 or \$2, with some items, like a double stroller, toddler bed, a desk and a train table, going for \$50.

Kennedy plans on having another garage sale later in the summer to sell the rest, and whatever doesn't catch the eye of opportunistic bargain hunters will go to Purple Heart or the Salvation Army.

One certainty above all others is that the stuff "is not coming back into my home," Kennedy said loudly.

Mother-in-law provides advice on hosting the perfect garage sale

Tith peak garage sale season in full swing, some people who have never set up one of these makeshift showrooms might be considering doing so for the first time this year.

After all, there are many good reasons for having a garage sale."

Sales of this kind can potentially bring in extra income that, in a less then lackluster economic climate, can help with everything from paying utility bills to facilitating a night out on the town.

Giving your neighbors a good deal can also help encourage a sense of community and togetherness.

Another good reason is that garage sales pronote the concept of recycling and reusing, both of which can help us become better stewards of our environment.

However, garage sales can be intimidating or some people, which is why those holding the sales must be thoughtful about how they orchestrate their event if they are to attract a liverse clientele.


Many people still hold to the old notion that only worn out and dirty items can be found at these sales, and that nothing of value could ever be sold at them.

And there are those who don't like the idea of aving to barter for items, and worry about falling prey to overzealous backyard salesmen.

As the one holding the sale, doing your best o alleviate these concerns can potentially bring in a much larger crowd than the steadfast yard sale crew, and will greatly increase the likelihood your profits will be to your liking, To seek out advice concerning the compoients of a good garage sale, I decided to talk to ny mother-in-law, Shirley Zabczynski. The first thing to do, she says, is simply make your sale look appealing, which will help advertise the fact you are selling things of interest.

"A good idea for someone giving a garage sale is putting your most interesting items near the road," she said. "I usually don't stop if I don't see anything interesting."

Just as easily as a nice looking item can draw customers in, one bad one can quickly turn them away.

'Don't put out soiled or dirty things," Shirley said. "It gives shoppers a bad impression of the whole sale."

Putting out broken items and not labeling them according to their defect is also something. to avoid.

It seems like common sense, but Shirley said

properly. This means keeping plenty of small bills on hand. as well as a few rolls of quar-

It also doesn't hurt to wear an apron or a loose shirt with pockets. This gives you mobili-

Offer refreshments

Food attracts people. Free refreshments will attract even more people. But If you think, your yard sale will have a steady flow without a lemonade stand, you can always sell lood items for a cheap price. Good items to have on

she often sees sellers break this rule.

"If you put an item out that needs repair, just put a sign on it that it needs something," she satd.

Some people enjoy fixing things anyway and might buy a broken item.

Many people are uncomfortable at garage. sales, and not pricing your items can make . customers even more uncomfortable. A price tag creates a tangible context that can still be flexible.

"Just mark things and people can ask you to lower the price if they want," she said.

Another important factor is to give some serious thought to the time and date of your sale because you want to have hours that accommodate the needs of your clientele.

'Garage sales used to be Thursday through Saturday, but now I'm seeing more Sundays, Shirley said, citing the need to be open when people with a more traditional work schedule are available.

Also, Shirley said it's worth finding out if your subdivision has an annual block sale, as participating during this time will maximize your potential customer base.

Finally, once you are ready to sell, be sure to advertise appropriately so people know where. to find you, Shirley said.

"I first look in the local paper to find garage sales," she said.

Having appropriate signage in the neighborhood is also important.

"Make sure your sign is brightly colored and you write in bold, dark letters," Shirley said, indicating if she cannot read a sign from the street, she often keeps going. "I would also put up a few more signs, even just arrows. Getting though the subdivisions can be tough."

Re flexible

Yard sales might be a way to eliminate junk; but they're also a way to make money.

So, what makes one yard sale good and another a fail-

Being a good haggier. doesn't huit one's cause because, at the end of the day, the point is to have visitors leeve with as many items as possible. Sometimes that means bartering or selling some items in bulk or bundles. it might also mean creating 'clearance" bins and offering buyers a cookie with lemonade.

Here are a few basic tips to

holding a good yard sale, based on the best practices observed at area yard and garage sales over the past month. By mastering these, the only hard part will be picking and choosing which items are ready to say "goodbye."

Don't be atraid to hvite friends

Crowds attract more crowds. By inviting your friends and neighbors, it will make it easier to attract people who are driving by Larger crowds mean more merchandise will be sold. While you're at it, adventise

your yard or garage sale on area bulletin boards, Craig's

List, in newspapers, at work, online and at grocery stores.

Treat your yard like a store

There's nothing more unattractive than an unorganized * yard sale. Buyers want to get in and get out without having to sift through piles of junk. So set up display areas and sep-arate items by theme or use. For example, if you're selling a dining set, consider reconstructing a dining table setting that places sale items among your own things. Set the scene and buyers will be attracted to. the area.

Not that weather isn't a frequent topic of conversation in this state — you know the old joke, "Don't like the weather in Michigan, wait 10 minutes."


But these extreme weather conditions are downright scary.

OUR TAKE: Editorial Illegal immigration is hurting the country

With all due respect to his office, we have to ask, what is President Obama thinking?

On second thought, we probably know — politics. The Justice Department last week was reportedly preparing to file a lawsuit against the state of Arizona because of its new illegal immigration crackdown — this, even before the law takes effect July 29.

With all of the problems facing America — from terrorism to the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq (1) the very shaky economy — the president doesn't need to create an even bigger mess of the immigration problem.

The lawsuit merely complicates what should be a very simple action. Arizona is trying to enforce the illegal immigration laws that are on the books. The federal government should be supporting the state, not wasting valuable tax dollars on a contentious and highly political lawsuit.

Justice Department officials are said to be contacting several government agencies to determine the best approach to block the statute. The consensus is that they will challenge Arizona's authority to establish immigration regulations, arguing that the federal government should do that.

It looks like a case of where two different law enforcement agencies are fighting over who has jurisdiction in a bank robbery. While the two agencies are bickering, the bank robber is escaping.

It should be more important to catch the robber rather than argue over jurisdiction, and we believe that most law enforcement agencies would opt to catch the criminal first.

In the case of the federal government, we would have hoped that the crime — illegally entering the United States — would be more important to deal with than who has jurisdictional authority. ともないたいというないというの

We sympathize with Arizona officials, who are inundated with illegal immigrants and the problems associated with them. It's not just a case of people crossing the border illegally. Many of those intruders are hardened criminals and drug dealers. South Arizona communities are threatened daily by the crimes some of these people are committing.

Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer signed the law that makes it a crime for an immigrant to be in her state without proof of legal residency. Further, it directs law enforcement to stop and question individuals about their immigration status if officers reasonably suspect they are in the country illegally. This simple attempt to establish some order to the chaotic problem of illegal immigration has brought Brewer and Arizona national criticism.

FROM THE BLOG EDUCATION MATTERS: By Martha Toth Should teachers get incentive pay?

Should K-12 teachers be paid according to how well-their students learn? This is one of those ideas that sounds like a no-brainer. After all, aren't other professionals routinely evaluated and compensated in some way. that relates to their accomplishments? Why shouldn't teachers. too, be rated on their effectiveness and paid more when they do a better job?

The problem, it seems to me, is how their effectiveness can be fairly evaluated. Looking at student outcomes seems reasonable, but that is not simple. We tend to oversimplify it by judging what children learned on the basis of achievement test scores.

Most would agree that absolute score differences (just higher scores) are no measure of teacher effectiveness. Obviously, not all students of the same grade begin the year at the same level or possess the same skills. If we used that measure, everyone would fight to teach only the most gifted and motivated students.

So, should we use a growth or value added model to see whether individual children show a year's progress in a year? I ran across Daniel Willlingham describes

in less than three minutes! six problems (some conceptual, some statistical) with evaluating teachers by comparing student achievement in the fall and in the spring.

Among them are biased data when some children move away during the year, the effect of others on how teachers do (such as the help or hindrance of a building administrator), and the effect of peers — is the classroom cohort rowdy or well-behaved? I've spent enough time in classrooms to know that sometimes there is a student who seems to suck all the oxygen out of the room, making life difficult for everyone else.

I might add that some years (when going through a messy divorce, or when grieving the loss of a child or a spouse) will find a typically great teacher unable to think or function as well as usual. Should she be fired? Are her students permanently harmed?

I think of the lessons in compassion and in dealing with difficult people that I and my children learned from such sub-optimal school years — which reminds me of all we learn that is useful in life but not evaluated on tests.

A related conceptual problem with using test scores is that they focus on short-term gains. Most of us, in higher education and then in adult life, did not find that the abilities to research, evaluate, learn, and apply things on our own — were much more vital to our success. Yet these skills are not evaluated on most tests,

Portfolios of student work give a superior picture of student abilities, but they would be very expensive and time-consuming to evaluate in a fair way if we cannot find the time or money for essays in our achievement tests, then, realistically, we'll never use portfolios

This hints at the major problem with test results as a measure of student learning. To make massive testing programs' at all affordable, we have made them much less valid over the years. Our MEAP writing test, forexample, used to require legions of low-paid evaluators. Not only was this very expensive, and so time-consuming that Michigan was penalized by the federal government for being late with the scores (under No Child Left Behind rules), but it proved nearly impossible to get consistent grading from so many evaluators. So, the writing test today involves very little actual writing.

You get what you measure, especially if the tests have high stakes, and we are not measuring the complex skills that our children need for life success. Even the gains we do measure can be evanescent, disappearing soon after the tests were scored.

(rightly) fears that basing teacher pay on test scores will encourage even more focus on test fodder and test preparation alone, at the expense of more. worthwhile endeavors.'I recently heard an impassioned speech about education outreach plans for the Yankee Air Museum that involved teaching children forgotten history and engaging them in exciting activities, since schools no longer do. My reaction was a sad acknowledgment that, yes, if it's not on the MEAP, our teachers don't have time for it anymore. We trade hundreds of students (and their indispensable funding!) back and forth every year with charters and schools of choice — and those decisions are most likely made on the basis of test scores. The draconian penalties levied by NCLB are base largely on test scores. And now we want to raise the stakes by basing teacher pay and job security on them, too?

Meler says this better than I could: "There is an axiom in the social sciences known as Campbell's Law that says that the higher the stakes on a particular social indicator (e.g., a single test score), the more the use of that indicator corrupts the original intent, as it encourages people to manipulate the system to look good on that indicator regardless of other effects. We see that happening already—retaining The moment she inked the legislation there were demonstrations in Arizona and across the nation protesting and vilifying her.

We admire Brewer for her action and we hope she gets more support to stand by this bold move.



with all of the new jerky flavors that previously weren't offered at the jerky store.


Tolliver is a Chelsea Area Chamber of Commerce board member.

Teaching the next generation of anglers

One of the biggest concerns of fisheries and wildlife managers is recruiting future participants. With hunting and fishing

participation on a downward slope, managers wonder where the next generation of hunters and anglers is going to -come from.

At least one natural resources educator thinks he has the answer: from Michigan's cities and their suburbs.

Gary Williams is the outdoor and environmental education coordinator for a joint venture. run by the Michigan State University **Extension Service and** the Department of Natural Resources and Environment. For a number of years, Williams headed up a program at the Pocket Park at the Michigan State Fairgrounds that, for at least one half day a year, got the computer game controllers out of the kids' hands and replaced them with fishing rods. Some 2,000 people (about 85

percent youngsters, the rest their adult chaperones) attended Williams' program annually The youngsters received a crash course on fishing, a little bit of basic biology, and then were turned loose around the facility's Lower Peninsula-shaped fish pond to target the 5,000 or so hybrid bluegills stocked there. The kids fished for about two hours.

The results? Well, Williams says that roughly 99.9 percent of them caught fish. And 100 percent said they wanted to go

fishing again.

"The introduction to fishing should be successful and easy." said Williams, who left a career in human resources almost a decade ago to take on the task of educating youngsters in conservation. "We should eliminate all the barriers that we can. With the future of the

tion program at state parks and recreation areas at Pontiac Lake, Proud Lake, Maybury, Muskegon and P.J.

Hoffmaster. The program starts youngsters with easy-to-use spincasting equipment. with simple bobbers, hooks and kernel corn for bait.

"A lot of kids are squeamish," says Williams. "So I eliminated the worms. They don't need to be bothered with something squirming around. I've found that whole kernel corn works well."

Williams and his assistants patrol the fishing area, offering advice and assistance to the youngsters. If the crew finds a youngster who's just not getting it, they'll help hold the rod and set the hook whatever it takes - to get the youngsters into a fish.

"We survey the kids toward-the end of the session and work with those who have not been successful." Williams said. "We don't want kids walking away saying they did not catch a fish. That is unacceptable.

Williams says the youngsters are enrolled in the program from a variety of youth-oriented organizations - park and recreation centers, boys and girls club and 4-H Clubs, for instance. The youths arrive by bus from all over Michigan.

 Depending on the ages of the youths, Williams -who has access to bows and arrows through the DNR's Archery in

the Schools program - will introduce the youngsters to archery foo, but not unless the kids are mature enough and strong enough to be successful at sending an arrow downrange. The one thing Williams doesn't want, he says, is to give the youngsters an unsatisfactory experience.

That's because Williams is almost as much social worker as he is educator. In his last job, he worked with an agency that assisted adults with substanceabuse issues.

"It's been a joy to get out of that and work with kids so they don't wind up in a situation like that," he said. "If I can change lives and give some positive alternatives to drinking and drugging, isn't that a good thing? It's about making a difference, We've got to make a difference."

Not that Williams is ignoring the education part of the equation. He's also part of the Great Lakes Education Program, a fourth grade curriculum, introducing youngsters to environmental studies.

The program features a 50-foot boat that takes youths out on the Detroit River and upper Lake Erie to learn about and explore the Great Lakes ecosystem.

The boat has four learning stations and each station one has two activities - one while the boat is in motion, one when it is anchored - and all youngsters rotate through the activities during the course of their half day on the boat. They'll take plankton and bottom-sediment samples, test the dissolved oxygen in the water and learn about marine knots and navigation.











'Boeing-Boeing' delivers laughs

Nathan Mitchell's handling of the off adapted and performed "Boeing-Boeing" by Marc Camoletti is the most tense play production I've seen yet.

Mitchell's chops as the Purple Rose Theatre Company's fight choreographer shine through as his actors masterfully maneuver Bartley Bauer's 70s era apartment set. when they're not maneuvering around and through each other as the show becomes increasingly hectic and fast-paced.

Audiences have seen comedy done again and again at the Purple Rose, but from what I've seen, it's never been quite like this.

In "Boeing-Boeing" Bernard. played by Jeff Thomakos. is an expatriated Wisconsinite living the good life in Paris - or rather the good triple life, as the '70s era player is in active relationships with three different women.

In fact he's engaged to all three, which fits the character perfectly Comparing Bernard to an evil version of John Ritter circa the "Three's Company" days wouldn't be that much of a stretch, although his brand of villainy is that of a lecherous cartoon character.

In that vein Bernard does more damage to himself and his henchwoman, Berthe the French maid, played by the always delightful Michelle Mountain, and fellow cheesehead Robert, played bycorporate rather than going with the puke greens and rust oranges of the period. The shag rug is just shag enough for the occasion. Thankfully I wasn't reminded once of the time I skimmed James Lileks' "Hideous Homes from the Horrible '70s.

Christianne Myers' costumes are similarly well planned and period tasteful, from the stewardess uniforms to Bernard's turtle-necked circa 1970 playboy look:

The trappings take on an Austin Powers vibe once Bernard upends a hinged statue and presses a secret red button, revealing a crude and primitive (by today's standards) analog GPS airplane tracking map that pops out of the back of his couch.

The reveal of his lifestyle "tools" makes you view his apartment as more of a lair and is one of the funniest moments in the show - the tracking map. in particular looks like it would fit right in on the set of the original "Star Trek" or some other late '60s science fiction or James Bond movie set.

Speaking of "Trek," am I the only one who detected a hint of William Shatner in Thomakos?

Charlyn Swarthout and **Riannon Ragland are great** as the Teutonic bride-to-be Gretchen and the fiery professed Italian Gabriella, respectively.

As the show goes on Gloria, Gretchen and Gabriella, all stewardesses on three different airlines working three completely different schedules that don't overlap with layovers in Paris find those schedules changing because of the introduction of newer planes with faster engines. Not surprisingly Bernard, who appears to be putting off growing up in favor of his carefree polygamist lifestyle, predicts that it will take weeks, possibly months for the changeto affect him: "These things take time," he says confidently to Robert, who tries to talk sense into his old friend about his impending doom. There's an underlying mes-

sage about how quickly-our society has been changing over the past 50 or 60 years in the face of rapidly evolving technology, but it's hard to really think about high-concept messages like that when Bernard's girls are all in the apartment at the same time nearly missing each other as they go from one bedroom to another, to the bathroom and out for brief incursions outside of the apartment when Bernard, Robert and Bertha can convince one of them to do so.

Most of the hilarity stems from watching the three of them try to manage the situa--tion and seeing the suspicious reactions of some of the psychotic fiancées as they're covertly herded around to and fro on the flimsiest of slappedtogether-on-the-spot pretenses


As I said, there are some

My heart couldn't help but "thump in anticipation of a major catfight ensuing, or similarly when one of the girls would leave evidence of their. presence out in plain sight like a conspicuous flight bag from a competing airline.

One of the best and most physical scenes in the show involves Robert throwing a giant couch cushion onto a bag, diving through the air and striking a comfy pose just before his body hits it with a soft thud, all in order to cover up the evidence before it'snoticed by the wrong woman.

You feel like you're living on the edge of this precarious situation with these characters. Even though they're all presented with cartoonish flaws it's hard not to like them because they're just so ridiculous and silly. My judgment stopped just short of wanting to see the house of cards come down on their heads. Audiences haven't laughed, cheered and whistled guite this loudly based on what I recall from past performances at the Purple Rose Theater that I've seen. 





Center Stage Every musical needs a good set

As the cast members are working on the onstage action for Dexter Community Players' summer musical. "Curtains." they are also working on building the sets.

Since DCP is a community theater, it does not have a separate building crew. Along with costumes, publicity, selling tickets, and obtaining advertising for the program, the cast builds the set for themselves - sometimes with a few other volunteers from the community.

Last winter, "Curtains" director Jason Smith was already working hard on his plans for the summer show he is directing.

Part of that work was to find a set designer, and communicate his ideas to the set designer. Smith was fortunate to find that Leo Babcock was available to design the sets for "Curtains."

Babcock runs Babcock Design Studios in Saline by day, and has a musical theater resume that goes back many years, even going across the globe back to his college years. which included several theater roles in France.

More recently, he has had many roles with just about every theater group within a one-hour radius of his Saline home. So he has a great combination of architecturalknowledge combined with how musical theater works.

The communications between Smith and Babcock

eventually leads to architectural drawings of each of the set pieces. There are many small set pieces, and just a few large set pieces; one of which gets turned around backwards to become something else in different scenes - an economic choice, given that all of the set pieces need to be stored in the "wings" (to the side of the stage, usually out of the sight of the audience) during the scenes they are not in.

On the first Saturday that we have access to the DHS set shop, about 10 cast members show up for building, along with a couple other young menwho enjoy working with power tools. Some bring their own tools, and some use the tool kit that DCP owns. They are building a set piece that is a riverboat on one side and a grand staircase on the other.

Since the piece must be moved on and off stage quickly at scene changes, the stairs are designed to fold up easily. This presents a fun challenge for Tom Farnell, a cast memberwho has worked as a carpenter.

"When I heard there was going to be a giant staircase. I couldn't wait to get my hands on that," he said.

But the first day, we discovered that our lumber purchase didn't include the stair step pieces, so Farnell and the others concentrated on other pieces.

"I built a boat. A saloon bar got built. Kennedy (a young cast member) built the fence. I cut all the pieces and showed her how to use a drill gun and

she built all the fences. She loved it. We got the whole stairway thing figured out, (and now) we just (have to) get the materials for it. If we get it done soon we won't have to be painting it at dress reliearsal." Since Farnell worked as a

carpenter previously, he's a lot more comfortable with his knowledge and experience in the shop than onstage. While in high school, he

participated in musical theater, and this is now his third show with DCP after a many-year hiatus from the stage.

"I wish I was a better dancer. The only way I could do a cartwheel is if I was falling off a ladder," he joked.

He is trying his best, however, and described the sacrifices he makes for the show.

"I blew off a fake Beatle band to attend an optional dance rehearsal the other day," he said.

After the pieces are built, they can be painted. If a cast member is uncomfortable with the tools necessary for building, painting is a good job for them

Most set pieces are first painted in just one or two main colors. Cast members who are nervous about their painting abilities are reassured by Farnell's words: "When it comes to painting, you don't have to be a pro because it all washes off.

Detail paint is added later to give the illusions necessary to tell the story for "Curtains." Those cast members that enjoy this type of work sign up for a

But they are proud of their work, and ready to go home and relax for the rest of the weekend before Monday evening's rehearsal.

hinders Faith in Action

for slow summer months in Dexter

Faith in Action's Dexter location is facing greater challenges than usual this summer due to construction on Baker Road in Dexter Village. In fall 2008 Faith in Action expanded its services to

include another service point in Dexter to compliment its existing five day a week operation in Chelsea on the Chelsea -Community Hospital campus.

The office is currently opened every Wednesday due to the summer lull in donations and because of being located behind the new building where the downtown Dexter Pharmacy will be located.

"The goal was to make our services more accessible to the Dexter population that we have always served, and also to make donation of food and household items easier." FIA director Nancy Paul said. "Both of these goals have been met by having a space in Dexter, but the temporary glitch we're experiencing is because the building we were occupying was demolished for construction of the new Dexter pharmacy.

"The new location is behind the pharmacy and is blocked somewhat by the construction at the site.'

Paul said that FIA members expect that as construction proceeds, access will improve and make collection and distribution easier.

For now FIA volunteers have to make the most of their time in Dexter every Wednesday from noon to 7 p.m.

Paul is advising pantry donors and users to enter the single driveway off of Baker Road and from there turn left, through the construction, to the building toward the back of the site. Work crews have made a special effort to keep the route clear on Wednesdays during hours of operation, Paul said.

The summer decline in donations has been compounded by access difficulties at the site, according to Paul.

"As is common over the summer months, food collection currently has slowed," she said. 'The congregations, school and civic groups that work so hard to keep our pantry stocked

At the same time that donations fall the need amongst those who rely on the service increases as children are home from school for the summer - separated from access to the school free or reduced lunch program, she said.

Paul said that the Chelsea **Community Garden project has** helped some with food coming from two designated plots for growing fresh food for the pantry, FIA accepts donations of fresh food during the growing season at the Chelsea location.

FIA's 50 volunteers have been hard at work to make up for the slower summer months.

'Each week (they're) working in the clothing room, food pantries in both Chelsea and Dexter, and at the Community Garden. Their loyalty and hard work are the heart of what we do at FIA," Paul said

FIA also has several summer







Visitors get hands-on look into life during the Civil War era By Daniel Lai merrage Newspaces

Weekend thunderstorms and sporadic tornadic activity didn't keep families from turning out to the annual Blacksmiths, Soldiers and Log Cabin Weekend at Waterloo Farm Museum.

The museum, one of Jackson County's historic gems, came alive with Civil War encampments, tour of the 1850s Realy farmhouse, and demonstrations of blacksmithing and woodworking.

"The rain has certainly kept some people away this weekend." Arlene Kaiser said. "But there's not much you can do to plan for it. You have to take a chance and hope for the best." Kaiser said there was a moderate amount of foot traffic throughout the weekend. "We've gotten some folks who have been here and come back every year, and others who have never been here." she said.

Kaiser said one fan favorite is the Civil War encampments that are organized by the Sons of Union Veterans and the Michigan Soldiers Aid Society.

"They always do a good job." she said.

Mary Minney of Monroe was on hand to demonstrate wagon wheel rug making. Minney said she has been working with fiber art since 1988 and enjoys teaching hands-on workshops.

"I don't want fiber arts to be a lost art." she said. "I like to do make and take exhibits so people can try their hand at

something new."

Minney said a full-length rug usually takes between three to four hours to complete.

"It's a very 'green' hobby." she said. "There's no waste. Everything gets used." Minney said in the olden

days, families used old clothes to fashion hooked rugs.

"The hooked rugs became a heritage of clothing for the family," she said.

Steve Alling demonstrated how blacksmiths would forge ordinary household tools. "I've been doing amateur

blacksmithing since 1976," he said.

Amy and Amanda Lesser of Dexter demonstrated how to cook on an old-time wood powered oven.

"We're recent members (of the museum) and our son is out here this weekend as a

blacksmith," Amy Lesser said. "We're helping to volunteer this year."

Ken Giorlando, a volunteer with the Michigan Soldiers Aid Society, said he was delighted to set up shop in the old farmhouse.

"My favorite spot on the farm is the farmhouse, which is filled with accurate period furnishings that give the homestead a very authentic feel," he said. "So imagine my surprise when I was told that we in the Michigan Soldiers Aid Society were to set ourselves up in the house as if it were our own and present ourselves as family and friends living there during the Civil War. It was a dream come true.

"To me that is 'hardcore' - or 'progressive' in the least. For a civilian, to have a period house to reenact in doesn't get any better."

Throughout most of the weekend, Giorlando blogged about life on the farm and the responsibilities the MSAS had. "After a bit of careful rear-

ranging of furniture. we settled ourselves in for a Saturday afternoon at the farm, enjoying each other's company." he wrote. "The younger set played checkers for most of the afternoon, and the ladies sewed various items. Now understand that had this been 1863, I most likely would not have been sitting and visiting on a Saturday afternoon. There would have been too much work to do. Of course. the period dressed docent who sporadically led the tour groups through the house made a few comments here and there about the fact that we were not working, that she was doing all the work. "I reminded this young lady

that I am the employer and that if she wanted to continue to receive pay then she would continue to do her daily chores as required. She and I bantered back and forth like this throughout the day, much to

the delight of those present. and this was not inconsistent with the unhappy domestics who actually lived back in the 1860s."



Haggis hurling not for faint of heart

A general state of tender, boiled sheep's heart, lung and liver with spices, onions, suet and oatmeal and stock-stuffed in a sheep's paunch, which is then boiled for three hours.

So the idea of "hurling" could take on a grosser connotation for some.

But the sport of "hurling" is actually throwing the haggis as far as possible. The Ohio border might not be far enough.

Haggis hurling is claimed to be a Scottish sport, says Leo Babcock of Saline and the MacGilvray clan.

"It's said that the haggis would be prepared for lunch for the man of the family who was out working the croft or cutting peat, by his wife. Walking from the crofthouse to the place of work could often entail a long way round to cross a river or low lying ground," Babcock says.

"The wife would throw the cooked haggis to the husband, who would catch it using the front apron of his kilt. If he dropped it, he either went hungry, or spent the afternoon scraping his lunch off a rock, or scraping bits of peat off his lunch."

It gives the term "fast food" a whole new meaning.

According to the Guinness Book of Records, the present world record for Haggis Hurling is held by Alan Pettigrew of Saitcoats, who threw a 1 pound, 8 ounce haggis 180 feet, 10 inches on the island of Inchmurrin on Loch Lomond in August 1984.

Saline is unlikely to see such a feat, but it's a fun event for one and all.

"We use a pretty friendly style of competition," Babcock says. "Anyone may enter and try for a prize in their individual class — men, women and children. One year we had the Women's National Champ compete and I'm pleased to report that local women were right in close competition with her.

"We use frozen haggis as it lasts a bit longer during our hot July days, and in my tenure we've not had to resort to using duct tape. It's a lot of fun and is a nice way for our visitors to get right into the thick of things."

In addition to haggis hurling, visitors can participate in an axe throw, tug-ofwar contest and much more.

Believe it or not, there are rules to the haggis throw:

1. The purpose is to compete for distance and accuracy from on top of a platform, usually a half a whisky barrel.

2. The haggis must be of traditional construction and recipe. Tender boiled sheep's heart, lung and liver with spices, onions, suet and oatmeal and stock stuffed in a sheep's paunch which has then been boiled for three hours. The haggis must land intact: a broken or split haggis results in disqualification.

3. At the time of hurling the haggis should be cooled and inspected to ensure no firming agents have been applied. Rules dictate the haggis must be packed tight and secure, with no extra skin or flab.



4. The sporting haggis weighs 500 grams, with a maximum diameter of 18 centimeters and a length of 22 centimeters. An allowance of plus or minus 30 grams is given. This weight is used in both junior and middle weight events. The heavyweight event allows haggis up to 1 kilogram in weight, but the standard weight of 850 grams is more common, with an allowance of

plus or minus 50 grams.

5. Judging is undertaken by the Hagrarian, with the assistance of the Cierk of the Heather and the Steward of the Heather. The Hagrarian checks each haggis is in order, the Clerk of the Heather blows the hooter to begin the hurl, and the Steward of the Heather measures the hurl (always in feet and inches) and confirms the haggis remains unburst.

Jousting tournament set for Saturday

S aline residents may recall the Christmas parade last December when a knight in shining armor rode his fierce steed along Main Street, followed by a gentleman with a bucket and shovel.

The knight was "Sir" Steven Schindler of Fowlerville, co-founder of the Lance of Laurentia and a member of the Great Lakes Jousting Association and International Jousting Association.

Schindler and fellow knights will return to Saline to thrill the clowds in a jousting tournament on the Saturday of the Saline Celtic Festival.


"This is a full-contact tournament joust, not a staged showy — 2,000pound horses with men encased in steel armor charging each other, making the earth shake," Schindler says. "You'll enjoy the sights, sounds and smells of a 14th-century joust."

Schindler has been riding and train: ing horses his whole life and has competed for years, on foot and horseback, with firearms, bows, lances or swords.

As dean of the Equestrian College in the Society for Creative Anachronism, he helped develop and implement the joust for the first time in the Middle Kingdom.

"I've been into history and martial arts, so combining all my interests made complete logic," he says. "I also get that 'high' from the competition where anything can happen.

"The athletic grace of the horses mixed with the competition of the riders is not to be missed."

The knights also will mingle with the crowds at Mill Pond Park on the Friday evening.

Action!

Jousters, clad in about 100 pounds of steel armor and wearing a steel helmet with slits to breathe through, ride huge steeds also clad in steel plating. Two warriors, with a shield on one arm and a long lance in the other, spur their horses to thunder at full tilt against one another.

The aim is to break the lance against the opponent — lancing the opponent in body locations earns points, and knocking him to the ground earns more points.

Lances are made from a solid wooden body into which is inserted either a solid or frangible wooden tip.

IJA Jousting allows the torso from the walst up as the target. Armor is supplemented with either a small wooden shield (ecranche) or specialist items of jousting armor called garnitures.

An IJA jousting match consists of a number of passes. During each pass, riders attempt to hit each other at the canter or gallop.

Points are awarded for each pass depending upon the quality of the hits scored. Points can also be deducted if a rider is penalized for any reason. The winner is the knight scoring the most points.

After the match, visitors will have the chance to meet and greet jousters and horses, as well as Medieval ladies and pages, get autographs, take photos and ask questions.

Gaelic football --- commonly referred to as Football, Gaelic, or Gah - is a popular spectator sport in Ireland. The game is believed to have descended from ancient Irish football known as caid, dating back to Medieval times.

It is a rough-and-tumble game played by two teams of 15 on a rectangular grass pitch with H-shaped goals at each end. The object is to score by kicking or striking the ball with the hand and getting it through the goals. The ball is advanced up the field with a combination of carrying, soloing (dropping and then toe-kicking the ball upward into the hands), kicking and hand-passing to their teammates. Theteam with the highest score at the end wins.

Pipes and drums will stir the blood

here's nothing quite as stirring as the sound of bagpipes and drums. Five bands will perform at this year's festival.

"These bands represent the best in Michigan," says Saline Celtic Festival Chairman Tom Todd.

-Grade 1 is highest ranking and Grade 5 the lowest. Detroit Caledonian, a merger primarily of Ann Arbor Pipes and Drums and Red Thistle Pipe Band, is currently the highest ranked band in the state, in Grade 4 and the most competitively oriented of those at the festival, Todd says. Ann Arbor Pipes and Drums won the Saline Celtic Festival band competition in 2009.

"Most pipe bands, especially those not specifically geared toward competition classify as Grade 5," Todd says. "Cabar Feidh, and Grand Rapids routinely finish in the top three in regional competitions, and are all excellent pipe bands."

... • Detroit Caledonian Pipes & Drums

This newly formed competitive Grade 4 pipe and drum organization based in southeast Michigan is a member and supporter of the Midwest Pipe Band Association.

The Ann Arbor branch of the band, formed in 1993, draws members from lower Michigan and Northern Ohio. It has competed at Highland Games all over the Midwest and in Ontario, Canada, since 1995. The band made its jump into grade IV competition in 1997 and into Grade 3 in 2007.

The band traveled to Scotland to compete in the World Pipe Band Championships in August 1997. Representing Michigan and the United States, the band was rated 16th in its grade.

The current band began in 1964 Bround the piping and teaching abilities of Dr. John Beaton, a chemist who emigrated from Scotland in 1956 to work for the Upjohn Company.

Beaton had grown up piping with the Boy Scouts and spent time with a band sponsored by Anchor Mill (now Coats & -Clark). He crowned his piping career by playing with the legendary Red Hackle Pipe Band in the early 1950s.

Beaton found a willing and interested group of learners and worked with them to instill the solid fundamentals of piping. After meeting in Beaton's basement for two years, an association was formed with the Portage Adult Community Education Center in 1966 that has lasted for over 30 years.

Probably the most visible appearance was welcoming the supersonic transport Concord into Battle Creek's W.K. Kellogg Airport. The band was asked to perform by Western Michigan University. An estimated 40,000 to 60,000 people watched the landing and welcoming ceremony.
