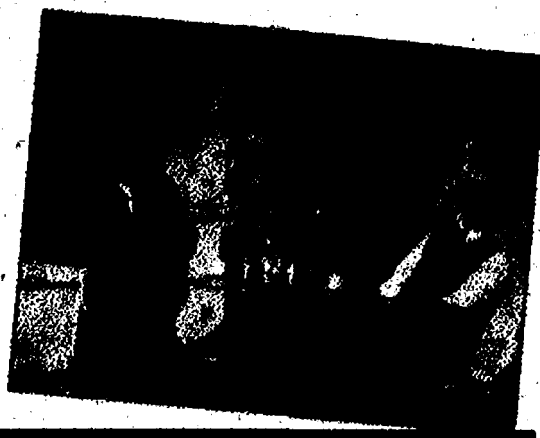

## DNRE investigates shooting

**Canadian goose killed on Sugarloaf Lake outside of Chelsea**

The Michigan State Police have turned over its investigation of an illegal shooting of a Canadian goose near Sugarloaf Lake last week to the Department of Natural Resources and Environment. Residents of Sugarloaf Lake reported that a man killed a Canadian goose with a BB gun from about 100 feet away in plain view of several witnesses, some of which were small children. The incident occurred

between 3 and 4 p.m. Aug. 4. State troopers were contacted and responded to the incident. "The only information that I have at this point is that a resident, who lives on Sugarloaf Lake, did shoot and kill a Canadian goose," trooper Kevin Curtis said. "The investigation has been turned over to Officer Jason Smith of the DNRE." Curtis said that the oil spill in Kalamazoo that occurred two weeks ago has tied up the DNRE's resources and they haven't been able to respond to the illegal shooting as promptly as normal. "Several of the DNRE officers have been pulled away and been working around the clock

trying to resolve that major incident," he said. Curtis said the DNRE would be resuming the investigation "as soon as possible." Witnesses to the incident report that the shooter was contacted by troopers, and indicated that the shooting may have been motivated by frustration at the number of geese in the area. Canadian geese are considered a federally protected natural resource by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. They can be legally hunted during hunting seasons with property licenses to control the population. Typically the DNRE office

## Changes coming for bus routes

**CSD transportation department finalizes plans for school year**

In preparation for the upcoming school year, the Chelsea School District's transportation department presented its review of route and policy changes at the board of education meeting Monday. District routes were scrutinized to determine the number of riders, distance to stops, and trip length while maintaining rider safety. Within the City of Chelsea, there will be several bus stops in selected areas to promote safety, because some areas of town do not have sidewalks or safe areas to cross busy streets. The continued use of transfer buses will allow walking students to catch a bus to their school from the school closest to their homes. The furthest distance that a city student would be expected to walk is 0.9 miles. Outside of the city, "designated hubs" will reduce the number of bus stops. For example, buses will pick up students at corners of main roads instead of traveling down long, narrow roads or into subdivisions. In a few cases, bus stops may be nearly 2 miles from a student's home. There has been a staff reduction of three to four drivers, but no layoffs due to retirements. Remaining drivers have taken both an hourly pay reduction and reduced hours. A mechanic and a secretary have been reduced to part-time. Although routine/daycare requests for transportation

alterations will still be allowed, the district will no longer accommodate changes in transportation for visiting friends. "We've taken last minute requests in the past for Johnny to go home with a friend, but these requests take a lot of our time on the phone to verify," said transportation supervisor Chris Frayer. "Also, with the reduced number of routes, the buses will have more students on them, so there really won't be room for extra students on a bus anyway." Final bus routes are posted near the end of August in the newspaper and online at www.chelsea.k12.mi.us under the transportation section of district departments menu.

### In other action

"The board approved the hiring of Kallie Nowitzke and Andrea Webber, two special education teacher consultants at Beach Middle School, as well as Lori Basar at North Creek and Laura Rauser, a part-time elementary art teacher and Shannon Teare, a part-time French teacher. The positions became available due to retirements and a resignation. "The board also approved giving authority to Superintendent David Killips to approve bids and contracts associated with the repair of A.D. Mayer Drive due to a rusted and damaged culvert. "What we essentially have there is a sink hole, which we'd like to have repaired before school begins," Killips said. Sinking funds would be used for the repair, which is expected to cost \$25,000.

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## Princeton Review: Eastern among the best

Eastern Michigan University is one of the best colleges in the Midwest for the eighth consecutive year, according to the national education services company The Princeton Review.

EMU was selected as one of 152 institutions The Review recommends in its "Best in the Midwest" section of its website feature, "2011 Best Colleges: Region by Region" on PrincetonReview.com.

In the site's profile of EMU, The Princeton Review describes an Eastern education as "a great value."

EMU announced a "0.0.0" freeze on tuition and fees, room and board for the coming academic year — the only public university in Michigan believed to have frozen tuition this year.

The Review bases its selections on a school's academic programs. It also takes into account student responses on an 80-question survey for the yearly project.

"We are excited to be selected for this honor, particularly because the designation is based on academics and reports from our students," said EMU President Susan Martin in a news release.

"It's an affirmation that we put students, affordability and education first at Eastern."

The 152 Midwestern colleges honored are located in twelve states: Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

Collectively, 623 colleges were named regional bests nationwide, constituting about 25 percent of the nation's 2,500 four-year institutions. The Princeton Review does not individually rank the 623 colleges in its list.

The Review asked students to rate their schools on issues such as accessibility of professors, academics, campus food, and campus life.

Eastern students cited the many opportunities to get involved in campus life at Eastern, along with its student center, which opened in 2006.

In one survey, an EMU student said: "The center is a great place to hang out with friends, study... curl up with a good book, meet people and get home work done."

downtown. They are originally from Troy.

"I think the Downtown Development Authority has their blinders on and they are not looking at the big picture," Colleen said. "I think the DDA should concentrate more on making Chelsea a destination city and making it an attractive place for businesses to come to."

The Beans was among about 75 area residents that stopped by to check out the Jackson Street Jam. Those in attendance held signs that read, "Let's save our buildings! Let's keep our past present!"

The free event focused on the historic Longworth buildings across the railroad tracks from the Chelsea Depot and the clock tower complex and featured several informational opportunities for attendees to learn about the Longworth buildings through musical performances.

The performers included local bands Dr. Dwayne and the Bad Boys from Spain and The Poor House.

Preservation Chelsea, a

grassroots group currently waiting for the DDA to review its development proposal for the Longworth properties, organized the event. If the DDA likes the proposal, the next step will involve hammering out the details of a purchase agreement.

Cathy Bean heads the Preservation Chelsea subcommittee that has been working on saving the Longworth and presented a proposal to restore and reuse it.

"We're trying to raise awareness and let people know that the DDA wants to tear these buildings down and put in parking lots," she said. "If the DDA and the council doesn't hear from anyone, they think residents agree with them."

Nancy Finegood, executive director of the Michigan Historic Preservation Network, kicked-off the informational presentations.

The MHPN is Michigan's statewide nonprofit organization for historic preservation and advocates for older historic buildings and good policies in Michigan that help people and communities save historic places.

"Rehabilitating these build-

ings for new uses will continue Chelsea's vibrant, charming downtown right to the clock tower and over to the depot," Finegood said. "Chelsea needs a vibrant connection that will enliven the corner and keep the historic character that Chelsea has carefully maintained."

Canadian geese in non-harmful manners as a precursor to violence.

• Throwing firecrackers or chasing geese with motorized vehicles is also illegal.

Individuals without the proper permits can't kill geese outside of hunting season or disturb nests with eggs present.

Sanctioned goose hunting seasons starts on Sept. 1 and continues until February. The proper permits cost between \$100 and \$200.

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# First Ride for a Cure deemed a success

## Cyclists raise funds for breast cancer research

A total of 101 cyclists crossed a pink finish line in Ann Arbor Saturday to raise money and awareness for breast cancer research.

The first-ever Komen Mid-Michigan Ride for a Cure gave riders a choice of 27-, 57- or 97-mile routes beginning and ending just off of Newport Road near Wines Elementary and Forsythe middle schools.

Each rider was required to raise at least \$500 in pledges to participate, in addition to a registration fee. The final amount raised is still being determined, but is predicted to be more than expected.

Tracy Weaver is a 16-year cancer survivor. In 1994, at age 33, she was diagnosed with

breast cancer. Her three daughters were all under age 10 at the time. Since then, Weaver and her family have raised more than \$10,000 by participating in other Komen for the Cure events like the Komen 3-Day Walks and Race for the Cure in Detroit, but cycling is her heart.

In the summer of 2009, Weaver and life partner, Todd McNeilly, thought it might be fun to combine their passion to support the Susan B. Komen for the Cure, with their recreational passion of cycling, both mountain terrain and road.

"If I could raise money for Komen and be on a bike, how fun would that be?" says Weaver.

They approached the Mid-Michigan affiliate of the Susan B. Komen for the Cure with the idea and the rest is history as the group raised nearly \$60,000 in donations from cyclists, and another \$30,000 is expected from sponsors, said Pamela Werling of Komen Mid-Michigan.

Ride for the Cure was more than a race. All participants received route support throughout, including a cheering station at Chelsea Community Hospital Saturday morning, complete with signs, songs and all things pink. Aid stations were located, along each route approximately every 15 miles and provided fruit, water, light snacks, first aid and restrooms.

Bike technicians were provided by Cycle to Fitness, and Huron Valley Ambulance was available for medical treatment. Riders also received meals, hydration, a custom-designed jersey and goody bag. A finish line party included music, refreshments, food and massages by the Michigan Massage Therapy Association. The entire event was sponsored by



specialized bicycle retailers and orchestrated by volunteers.

According to statistics, breast cancer affects one out of eight women in the United States each year. The mid-Michigan Affiliate is part of the world's largest grassroots network fighting breast cancer. The Mid-Michigan Affiliate has invested nearly \$1.5 million in community breast cancer programs in Clinton, Eaton, Ingham, Jackson, Livingston, Washtenaw and Shiawassee counties since 2001, as well as \$1 million toward national research.

## WASHTENAW COUNTY COURT BRIEFS

### Prison term extended in fatal hit-and-run case

An Ann Arbor man who already served more than three years in prison for causing a pedestrian's death along Packard Road in 2005 but had his conviction reversed learned he will serve another eight months behind bars.

George Feezel, 25, was recently ordered to continue serving his sentence stemming from the death of Pittsfield Township resident Kevin Bass until early next year, court records show.

Police said Feezel struck Bass, 39, while driving westbound on Packard Road near Clubview Drive in Ypsilanti Township during a rainstorm. Bass died at the scene, which Feezel initially left before family member convinced him to return.

He was initially convicted by a jury of operating a vehicle while intoxicated, causing death, due to trace amounts of a marijuana derivative found in his system. His first appeal failed, but the Michigan Supreme court overturned the verdict in a controversial 4-3 decision that also reversed previous court decisions designating marijuana derivatives as an intoxicant.

Feezel pleaded guilty to leaving the scene of a serious injury accident last month rather than go through another trial. Washtenaw County Circuit Judge Archie Brown sentenced him to serve three to five years in prison as a habitual offender for his third arrest. He credited Feezel with four years and three

months of time already served between the Washtenaw County Jail and the Michigan Department of Corrections, court records show.

A civil suit filed against Feezel by Bass' family is pending in Washtenaw County Circuit Court.

### Hockey league embezzler headed to prison for crimes

The Chelsea woman who embezzled nearly \$1 million from an Ann Arbor youth hockey league while she served as their bookkeeper was recently sentenced to prison.

Kimberly Knight, 46, was recently ordered to serve two to 10 years and two to 15 years in prison for siphoning the money from Ann Arbor Amateur Hockey Association bank accounts for personal use, court records show.

Circuit Judge Melinda Morris ordered the sentences to be served concurrently. In June 2009, Knight pleaded guilty to two counts of embezzlement for stealing more than \$934,000 while serving as AAAHA's lone bookkeeper from 2005 to 2007. Police reports show she took the money from an account earmarked for construction of an independent ice rink. The organization currently serves area children out of the Ann Arbor Ice Cube in Pittsfield Township.

Knight was removed after an audit uncovered irregularities with the account.

Morris delayed sentencing for a year to give Knight an opportunity to pay more

than \$700,000 in restitution. She paid a lump sum of more than \$70,000 to avoid jail last summer and consistently paid the required \$1,500 per month since, court records show. However, she failed to comply with Morris' orders to turn over tax records related to her husband's business and other documents in a timely manner.

Knight, who has filed for federal bankruptcy protection and put her home up for sale, was also charged in May with passing bad checks at the Dexter Pharmacy. She entered a not-guilty plea to the charges and faces a court hearing this fall.

Knight also faces civil suits filed by the hockey association and United Bank and Trust of Washtenaw, which claims she defaulted on a loan, records show.

### Dexter burglary suspect scheduled for trial in Sept.

The Dexter woman who authorities say is responsible for burglarizing businesses and homes in Scio and Webster townships during a weeklong crime spree is heading to trial.

Tera Bowman, 26, pleaded not guilty to multiple counts of second-degree home invasion and conspiracy recently after waiving her preliminary hearing in Washtenaw County District Court. Records show she is scheduled to stand trial in September.

Washtenaw County Sheriff's deputies arrested her in late May after they allegedly connected her to a business

burglary in Scio Township and a residential break-in in Webster Township May 12. She is also allegedly involved with burglaries reported at two Scio Township homes May 17.

A male accomplice has been identified, but has not yet been charged with any crimes. The duo is also suspected in several burglaries in Superior Township, Webster Township and Ann Arbor, as well as recent incidents in Livingston and Wayne counties, police reports said.

David Goldstein, Bowman's attorney, said the investigation is still ongoing.

"We're still looking at all the information and we're talking with the prosecutor's office to try and get it resolved," he said.

A pre-trial hearing is scheduled in Washtenaw County Circuit Court Aug. 19.

Bowman remains free after posting \$3,750 bond in June, court records show.

### Trial in rape of minor set for fall

The trial for a Scio Township man accused of sexually assaulting the 14-year-old daughter of a woman he was living with is scheduled for October, court records show.

Samuel Grevious, 37, faces jury selection Oct. 25 on first-degree criminal sexual conduct charges, and four counts of third-degree criminal sexual conduct.

He remains at the Washtenaw County Jail without bond.

He was arrested by Washtenaw County Sheriff's

deputies who received tips from the public on his whereabouts March 30. Authorities charged him after the girl came forward about the sexual encounters, which reportedly began at the beginning of the year.

Nader Nassif, Grevious' Ann Arbor-based attorney up until last week, argued that the girl's recollections were inconsistent and that Grevious was stuck in a bad living situation. He since has been replaced by a member of the Washtenaw County Public Defender's Office. No reason for the switch was documented in court records.

The victim's mother, a friend of Grevious' since high school, allowed him to stay in their home while and he was looking for a place to live and trying to find a job, police said.

Authorities also charged the mother, 37, for allegedly being an active participant in more than one of the assaults, and knowingly allowed Grevious to have sex with the girl as part of their living arrangement.

Her name is not being used to protect the victim's identity.

Court records show a preliminary hearing scheduled for July was delayed until Sept. 1 while she undergoes a psychiatric evaluation at the Forensic Center for Psychiatry in York Township. She remains in custody without bond.

Authorities said the victim is staying with relatives.

Lavin has been touring since 1985, but her book covers a lot more than that.

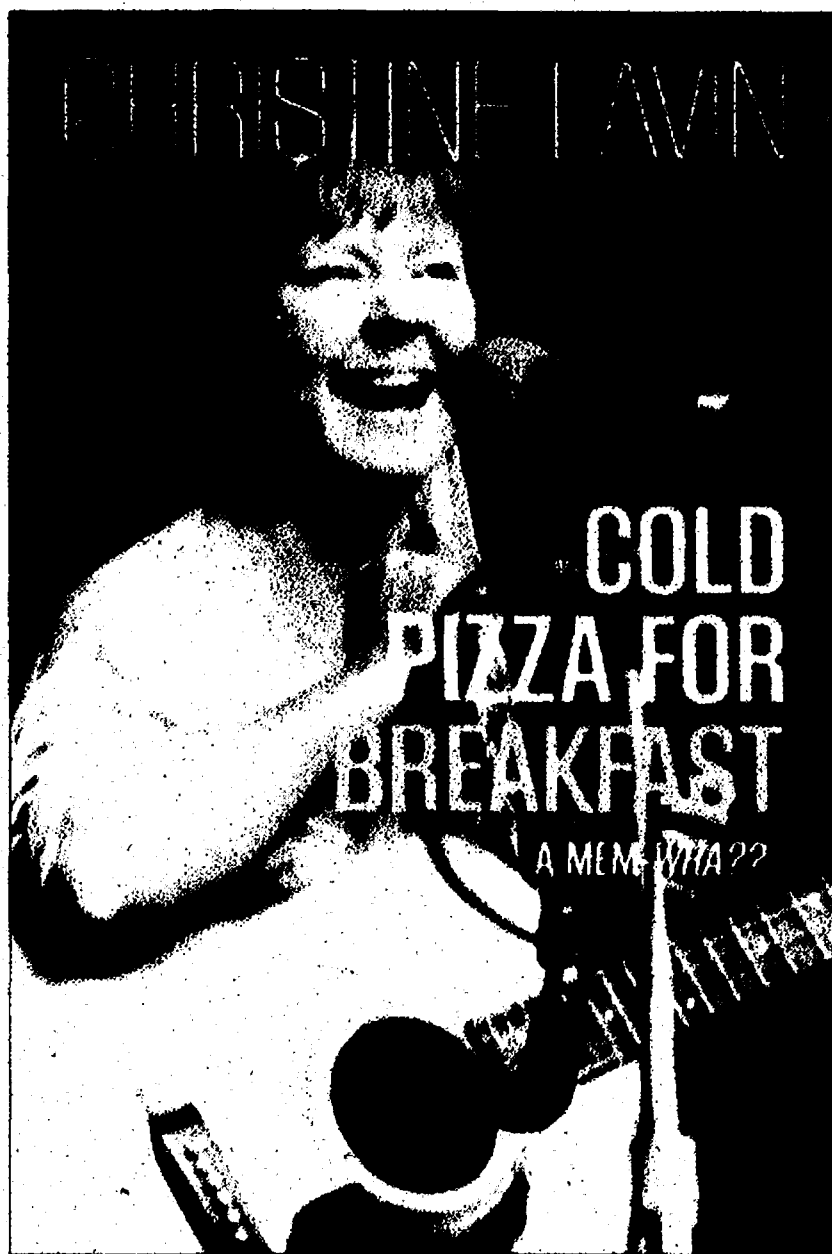
She writes in her preface, "Instead of a business plan, I've followed hunches, my intuitions, and my

## Ann Arbor doctor returns from tour of Iraq

After serving a 90-day rotation in Iraq, Dr. Robert Vaidya of Ann Arbor has returned to IHA's Hospitalist program.

Vaidya has been a member of the Michigan Army National Guard for five years. He was called to serve in 2009 and deployed Jan. 2, less than two months after getting married.

While serving as a physician deployed overseas, Vaidya's responsibilities included attending sick call, a primary care walk-in clinic for soldiers and contracted workers and leading triage.

He faced challenging decisions, including when to call for Medivac transportation for those needing higher level care, since sand storms,

enemy activity and medical necessity affected when to evacuate critically ill patients.

Once a week he also took 24-hour emergency call for injuries or military casualties. They treated U.S. military, contracted civilians and anyone with life, limb- or eyesight-threatening injuries.

Even though he was already trained in internal medicine, Vaidya had to do a great deal of preparation before leaving for Iraq.

He completed a trauma rotation as a resident in an inner city hospital in Lansing and also took a military course in battlefield injuries and care.

Despite his training and medical background, he said

the conditions were still shocking.

"The hospital was a tent, and all the medical equipment had to be brought in," Vaidya said in a news release.

"It was sandy, dirty and sweltering, with high temperatures around 109 degrees."

Vaidya realized all of the resources we have in the United States are often taken for granted, even the tests ordered by physicians. In Iraq, medical staff had to think critically and determine if a test was medically necessary, given the risks of patient transportation for obtaining testing.

Vaidya said he deeply values the time he spent caring for soldiers and seeing firsthand the sacrifices they

make. Looking back, Vaidya had a new appreciation for his life in the United States.

"It humbled me to see how people in other parts of the world live," he said. "They deal with bombs and violence every day. They're used to war."

Vaidya and his wife, Carolyn, were still newlyweds when he deployed. She was scared, but knew that this was something her husband wanted to do for his country.

"I didn't know before he left how proud I would be of him, and proud of our soldiers now that I have a better understanding of what they sacrifice," she said.

Vaidya is five years into an eight-year commitment to the National Guard. Now state-

side, he serves one weekend a month making sure soldiers are physically fit for deployment while awaiting possible deployment again.

"He has returned to prac-

ticing as an IHA Hospitalist and we are fortunate for his safe return," Jeff Dimaya, executive director of IHA ClinSite and the IHA Hospitalist program.

drive to a small seaside town, indulge in local foods and read the local weekly newspaper.

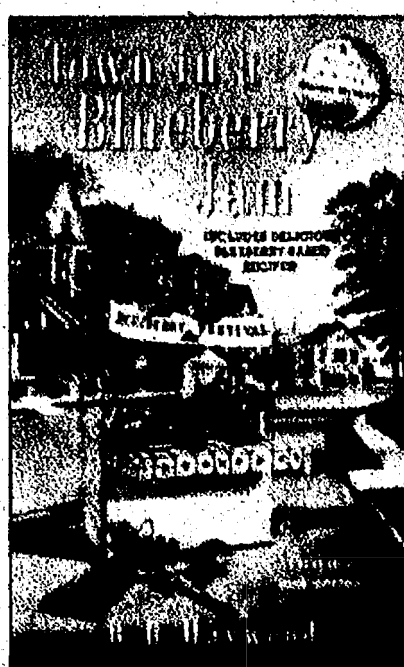
Two murders take place and a handyman is accused, which sets Candy Holliday into snooping mode as she helps solve this whodunit.

It then said: "Businesses that make the extra effort to market themselves to customers face-to-face are few and far between."

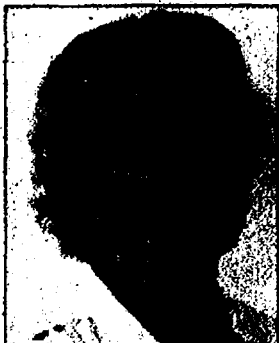
I'm not convinced. I believe that there are lots of local businesses that do a fabulous job of connecting with customers face-to-face.

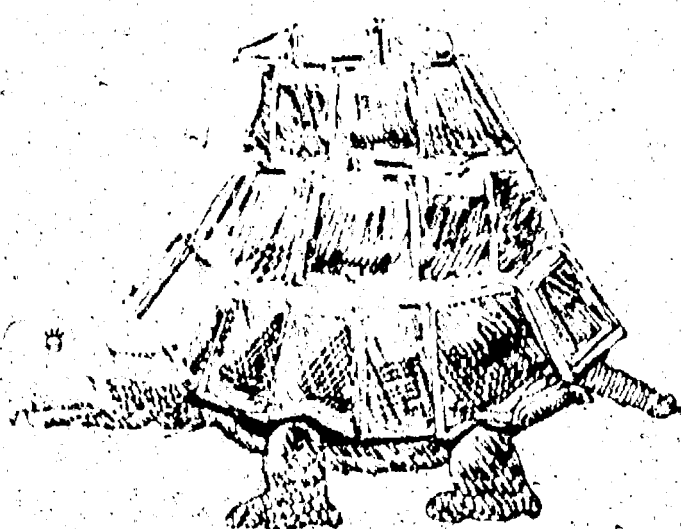
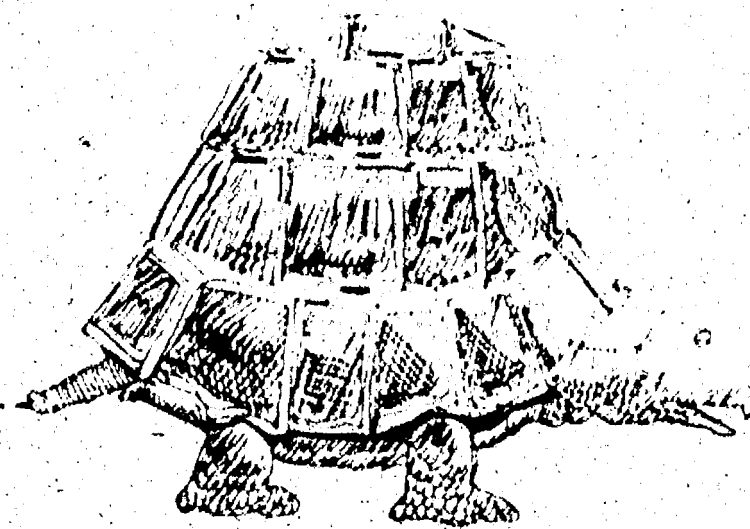

The bruising primary election is over. The state now has one Republican and one Democrat vying for the top job in Lansing.

The postelection media focus is on the winners and losers, and how they got there. But yet, for some reason, another name is on the radar screen.

## OUR TAKE: Editorial State should take texting law further

The new ban on texting while you're driving has been in effect for over a month now.

Basically, there are few main complaints. There's still that group of citizens who want to argue about their rights are being infringed upon.

And there are some people who still believe they can do both — text and drive. Of course, the latter also generally believe anyone can walk a tightrope blindfolded with your hands tied behind your back.

A third complaint, much more legitimate, is from law enforcement officers, who say it's difficult to enforce the new law because often you can't tell if a person is texting or merely dialing a telephone number. While texting is illegal, use of a cell phone in your car is not.

However, this most important concern by police could be quickly resolved if our state legislators merely took the ban a step further, forbidding all use of cell phones by drivers unless they have the hands-free headsets.

We know this would tax the restraint of some people, particularly teenagers, who swear they'll die if they can't use their phones almost every minute of the day. Unfortunately, they're right about "dying."

Texting is a deadly function.

Passengers could still have and use cell phones and a driver could carry one and could pull off the road or into a parking lot if he or she needed to make a call.

The new law is badly needed and should have passed even more quickly than it did.

Currently, the new law prohibits a person from reading, typing or sending text messages using a wireless two-way communication device, including a phone, while operating a moving motor vehicle on a street or highway.

It's a civil infraction that results in a \$100 fine for a first offense and a \$200 fine for a subsequent offense. However, no points will be added to a driver's record for a violation of the ban.

Even with just the ban on texting, Michigan roads should be a lot safer. There is no doubt that texting while driving is dangerous.

However, as dangerous as the practice is, research conducted by the Allstate Foundation revealed that 62 percent of teen drivers admit to using their cell phone, while 49 percent admit to texting while driving.

Previous versions of the legislation made texting a secondary offense, meaning police would need some other reason to stop a driver.

But the latest law — wisely — makes it a primary offense, which allows officers to pull over drivers they see texting.

The effort to ban texting is national. TV icon Oprah Winfrey has a program asking people to pledge not to text and drive.

The pledge, found online, reads: "I pledge to make my car a No Phone Zone. Beginning right now, I will do my part to help put an end to distracted driving by not texting or using my phone while I am driving. I will ask other drivers I know to do the same. I pledge to make a difference."

With most people conceding that texting is dangerous, it shouldn't be too big a leap for the Legislature to take the ban a step further and prohibit all drivers from using hand-held cell phones while they are behind the wheel. It's just common sense.

# Eyster honored with birder award

In 2002, Harold Eyster of Lima Township was looking out at his bird feeder and saw a species he didn't recognize. "From then on, I was quite serious about birds," he said, adding that he had later identified the bird as an American Tree Sparrow, which is common in Michigan only in the winter.

"That's why I didn't recognize it," he said. His interest has paid off. In 2009, the American Birding Association named Eyster the "Young Birder of the Year."

Eyster has entered the contest every year since 2007. "I won the overall contest this year," he said, adding that in 2007 he won the illustration module, and in 2008 he won the illustration module and the field notebook contest.

"Since I won the overall contest, I can't enter again," he said.

Recently he entered the Half-Day Big Day contest in northwest Ohio's Magee Marsh in which he won a trip to Ecuador.

"We had to try to see how many species we could see in six hours. We saw 99, so we won," he said.

He plans to go to Ecuador in November.

"November and February are the best times for seeing the largest number of species. It's the rainy season, when you see lots of birds. They mate during the rainy season, and when they nest they sing so it makes them a lot easier to find," he said.

Eyster also had the chance to speak at the Wilson Ornithological Society in New York.

"I gave a presentation this year about the history of the name of the MacGillivray's Warbler," he said.

The bird was named by both a scientist named Townsend, who had already given it a name when John James Audubon decided to give it the name it has today.

"Audubon knew that Townsend had already named it. It shows that Audubon had no integrity," Eyster said. Though Eyster is home-



schooled, he considers himself a junior this year, taking some classes at Chelsea High School.

He loves nature and going on hikes with his family, and doesn't keep complete track of how many birds he has seen.

"I've seen about 400 in North America," he said. "I've seen about 159 on our 10 acre property."

He has also gone on birding trips to Costa Rica and China, as well as a birding trip this summer to Colorado.

One of the most interesting birds he has seen is the American Pipit, an uncommon migrant that comes through in the spring.

"It is brownish and blends in very well," he said.

Eyster said he was looking for Pipits and couldn't find any in a nearby field, which is a natural habitat for them, so he decided to play a recording of

the Pipit's song. Suddenly the field was covered with Pipits flying around him.

"Most people would walk right by and not see them," he said, adding that he doesn't usually bring recordings of bird songs with him when he goes birding.

"I had never tried it before," he said.

Another bird that he wants to see is the Clark's Nutcracker.

"They are related to the jay family and they are famous because in the fall they collect a lot of nuts and hide them in crevices," he said. "They have a remarkable ability to remember where they hid them. They have done scientific studies and watch them hide the nuts in places and find them again."

He said he has always wanted to see a Clark's Nutcracker because most people think of birds as not very smart.

"These birds are very smart," he said.

Another bird he has always wanted to identify is the Yellow-Bellied Flycatcher, because it looks similar to another type of bird. The only way to identify it is through its call.

"I've never caught one singing, so I never identified it," he said.

He has seen White-Winged Crossbills, however, right in his backyard.

"They are (finches) with a different bill shape," he said. "The top bill crosses over the bottom bill. They use the bill to get nuts out of pine cones."

He said that these birds are usually found in Canada, but every once in awhile they are seen in Michigan.

"I was filling the bird feeder when I saw about 30 finches with crossed bills eating cones off the spruces in our yard," he said. "It is one thing to go somewhere else and see a new species. It's another to have them come to you in your backyard."

"They're amazing to look at and watch them open spruce cones with their odd-looking bills."

Eyster looks in his backyard daily for birds, and often goes on birding trips where he includes his other hobbies: drawing, and nature. He finds birding a good way to combine drawing and problem solving.

"It's difficult to find birds, and very rewarding when you finally identify them," he said.

He also does a lot of woodcarving, and has carved many different birds and made an Atl-Atl, a primitive spear that was used about 2000 years ago and is still used by Aborigines. Last year, he threw his Atl-Atl as far as he could, then recorded the lengths and sent the results in to a contest.

"I am first in the world for youth for people under 16 for the contest," he said.

He said he likes all aspects of school and education.

"Enjoy learning," he said, adding that when he grows up, he wants to work at a job that combines science, art and birding.

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# Residents tour future site of Dexter Arts Center

Two-dozen visitors toured the old gristmill building at 3515 Broad St. Aug. 4 prior to holding the second Dexter Arts Center public meeting.

John Simonds led a tour of the entire facility, including the 2,100 square foot main floor of the building where the art center would be located.

The tour also took visitors through the upper and lower levels, and a loading dock area, although these areas aren't officially being considered for the center.

Simonds said that he needed to hear from volunteers and members of the DAC board on what they needed a year down the road — the likely earliest start time for any sort of construction work to re-purpose the building.

Current construction estimates project \$15 per square foot to finish the building interior, which includes heat, wiring and a finished floor.

"I would like to keep the inside rough," Simonds said. "We'll put in insulation and keep the integrity of the structure as it is now."

The volunteers will be out in force this weekend during Dexter Daze to promote the art center, which will be located in an upper floor space in the same building that Artistica currently operates out of.

DAC Program Coordinator Rowyn Baker passed around a sign up sheet for volunteers to sit at the Dexter Area Chamber of Commerce table during the weekend festival.

Lisa Wandres, owner of Artistica, reported that until enough support was garnered, space in Paul Bishop's building would more than likely be available.

"Paul is a very community minded person, so I don't see any problems there," Wandres said.

Simonds has brought on consultants to assist with creating an effective proposal to commu-

nicate with banks for funding. Board members established their mission statement during the meeting, which reads:

"Dexter Arts Center's purpose is to enrich lives and build a vibrant community through the arts. We inspire creativity, learning, and personal growth through our arts programs, performing and visual arts presentations, and community collaborations. We promote the enjoyment of the arts through outreach, private instruction, classes, performances, and special events for all ages."

The group also established a distinction and relationship between the DAC and the gristmill once converted to a usable space for arts instruction.

The DAC will hire specific instructors to offer instruction in a number of disciplines.

Representatives from Washtenaw County Community College said during the meeting that they were potentially interested in being a part of the gristmill arts redevelopment, but have not made a commitment, and were attending the meeting to stay informed.

The DAC volunteers also discussed a potential fundraiser tentatively called "Stock the

Arts Center" that they'll be unveiling in the coming months, as well as plans to approach Detroit Public Schools to purchase furniture from the 30 school buildings that are closing in the next two years.

The plan is to have the center stocked by Oct. 1, based on a list of material needs from those who have voiced interest in teaching at the center.

Simonds and Jerry Scrivo of MasterMind Consulting

Network said that the DAC would need to come up with \$2,100 per month at some point to make the art center a reality.

Organizers say they're hopeful that WCC will commit to establishing a crafts program in Dexter at the mill and that Dexter Community Schools might consider moving or establishing some programming in their space.

to Faith in Action or Dawn Farms," she said. "Our goal is putting the money back into the community."

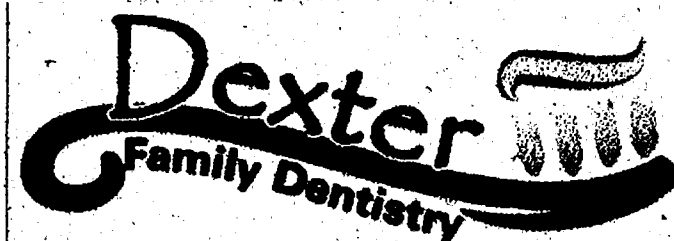
Arntson said volunteers are planning on 500 dinners this year, but have sold up to 1,000 in previous years.

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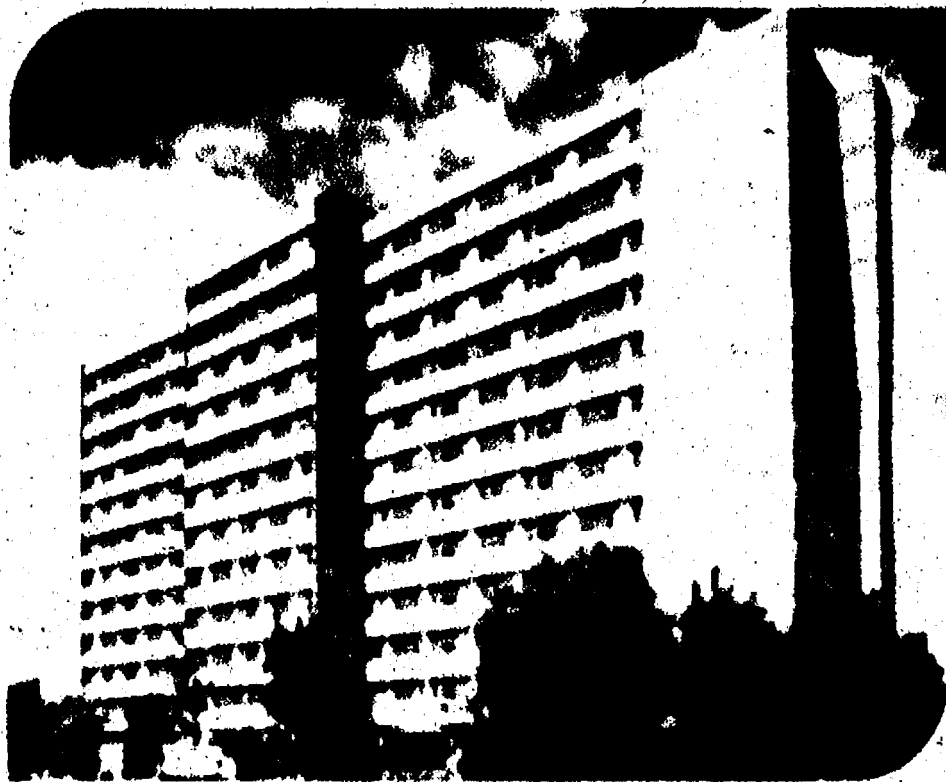
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# County: Give criminals 'fair shake' in job market

## Applications won't ask for felony disclosure

The Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners, in an effort to help reduce criminal recidivism and provide jobs to individuals with a questionable yet non-violent past, adopted a change to employment applications, but stopped short of approving policy changes for background checks.

In the proposed resolution, Diane Heidt, the county's human resources and labor director, recommended removing a box from the county's application form that is required to be checked off by anyone who has been convicted of a felony, regardless of its nature.

She also recommended eliminating mandatory background checks for some prospective employees of Washtenaw County, instead implementing a system where only certain positions would require a background check, such as jobs within the sheriff's department.

Heidt said they were working on a list of sensitive positions and had asked each department head whether he or she would like to be included on that list.

"There are some positions that wouldn't require a background check. This would eliminate the need for checks

for every position," Heidt said. This proposed policy change caused trepidation with some commissioners and confusion with others, as Ken Schwartz, D-2nd District, said he was unaware that they were essentially eliminating background checks for most county applicants.

"I guess I misunderstood the policy," Schwartz said. "I thought we were removing the box; then once we made that determination if that person was getting hired, we would be able to do the background check."

The proposed changes to the hiring policy would have only required a background check if required by law.

"The county would also not undertake a background check on an applicant unless such a check was required by law for a given position or of the county made a good faith determination that the open job position was of such sensitivity that a background check was warranted," according to a memo.

"In such cases, the county would provide, in writing, the reasons why the position required a background check and all applicants seeking the position would be advised that a background check is required for the positions."

Schwartz agreed with the idea of helping to clear the way for individuals who have been convicted of low-grade felonies, but agreed with several other commissioners about the potential danger and liability of removing the background

checks. "I think maybe we should table this to get a little more insight," he said. "There are some low-grade felonies in this state that are actually misdemeanors in other states and some of these people just don't get a fair shake. But the process needs to be cultivated a bit more."

A motion was made to table the resolution and policy changes to give more time for the list of positions actually requiring a background check to be completed, but the motion failed after first resulting in a tie vote. Kristin Judge, D-6th District, then pointed out that Ronnie Peterson, D-7th District, wasn't present during the vote and, by board policy, has to vote in case of a tie if he is in the building. Peterson voted against tabling the resolution.

Judge said her concern lied with the safety of county staff in the case that they hired an individual with history of violent activity or sexual assault. "I also didn't understand that we would be taking away some of the background checks."

Judge said, "Having a person who was convicted of a (criminal sexual conduct) felony and knowing they could be working with our Washtenaw County staff ... that's my concern."

Wes Prater, D-4th District, echoed those comments, saying an individual who has been convicted of a violent crime or sex crime shouldn't be employed by the county.

"I understand that people need to be employed, but

there are certain crimes that shouldn't be employed in this type of organization — sex crimes on kids, violent crimes — the county needs to know that information," Prater said. "I just think it's a bad policy the way it's written."

Leah Gunn, D-9th District, argued that these policies are in line with the Michigan Prisoner Re-entry Initiative, or MPRI, and that they have traditionally shown a high success rate for former prisoners struggling to re-adjust to society.

"If we remove the box, it does level the playing field. It gives people the opportunity to get their foot in the door."

"By having that box (on the application), it really stops the application process cold. I would like to give people a chance and then we could do a background check."

Gunn suggested a friendly amendment to approve the removal of the felony disclosure box on all county employment applications, but recommended striking the rest of the proposal, including all policy changes with background checks. Basically, the county would continue its typical hiring process without having the disclosure box, Gunn said.

The friendly amendment was supported and passed, moving the amended resolution from Ways and Means to the county's board meeting, where it was adopted unanimously.

Peterson supported the amended version of the resolution, but said they need to continue examining the county's

hiring practices to ensure they stay in line with the MPRI and follow what he described as a national trend.

"The policy should be for everyone, whether they have a questionable past or not. It should be for anybody who applies in Washtenaw County," Peterson said. "We have hired ex-felons quite a few times in the past. It's a question of what they've done and I think it's a valid point."

"We have hired those who have been in the system before. I can name about 10 off the top of my head and they have been very active and contributing members of county employment."

The newly elected

Democratic nominee for state House 53rd District, Jeff Irwin, echoed those comments, saying that he was disappointed the policy changes were removed. Before the final motion was made, Irwin attempted to bring state the policy in its original draft, but failed for lack of support.

"I'm disappointed," Irwin said. "I think that we have changed our course from doing something meaningful to doing something not so terribly meaningful."

## County launches 'Stuff the Bus'

### School supplies sought for needy children

Kicking off their 2010 United Way Campaign, Washtenaw County employees are reaching out to the public in an effort to collect needed school supplies for students in the county's public school districts through the "Stuff the Bus" campaign.

A school bus will be staffed Aug. 16 through 20 with volunteers outside of Staples, 3120 Carpenter Road, in Ypsilanti. Volunteers will be available to accept donations of school supplies from county employees and the public.

"Washtenaw County employees have always had a strong commitment to public service," County Administrator Verna McDaniel said. "It is this commitment that has inspired them to continue support the remarkable mission of the United Way."

Bill Reynolds, deputy county administrator, said the fundraiser benefits several communities throughout the county. "Essentially, what we're

asking people to do is buy a backpack or buy some supplies to put in a backpack and drop it off so we can put it in the bus," he said. "Eventually, we will hand them out to needy communities in the county that might not otherwise have a full set of supplies for their school days."

Reynolds said members of the community can purchase school supplies from any store and drop donations off at the Staples on Carpenter Road in Ypsilanti anytime during the week.

"We will also have boxes set up at any county building that will accept donations," Reynolds said. "Even if you don't want to take the time to go and actually buy the materials yourself, we will accept donations."

Reynolds said checks can be made out to United Way of Washtenaw County. "Stuff the Bus" should be written in the memo portion of the check. "Volunteers will go and buy supplies for someone and make sure that their name is credited with the donation," he said.

Reynolds said donations of backpacks, notebooks, protractors, pencil sharpeners, crayons, binders, papers, pens, colored pencils, compasses

and other school supplies are needed.

"We probably want to stay away from pointy scissors or scissors of any kind; there are a lot of other things we can get. Scissors are just a hassle when it comes to safety issues," Reynolds said. "Other than that, we're open to anything else."

Reynolds said the county has been partnering with the United Way and Staples for the past three years on the initiative.

"The important thing to recognize is that there are sections of our communities where kids go to school and simply don't have the materials to learn, and we really want to try and help that," he said. "The best way to do that is to make sure that

when they go, they actually have something in their hands so when they sit down, they can open up their school bags and take out their supplies and they don't have to worry about anything."

"This is a real concrete example of communities helping communities, and that's what we're seeking to achieve."

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
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# Fresh Five: An improved 2011 5 Series means a healthy BMW

BMW builds sports cars and SUVs, but the company is best known for sport sedans that set the industry benchmark for ride and handling.

The most important and profitable of those is the midsize 5 Series, which makes up 20 percent of the company's automobile sales, but accounts for about 40 percent of profit.

With so much of the company's wellbeing wrapped up in one car, BMW likes to keep the 5 fresh. Last redesigned for the 2004 model year, the 5 Series is all new for 2011.

For the first time, the 5 Series shares its basic architecture, now 55 percent stiffer, with the full-size 7 Series sedan.

The car is close to two inches longer than the outgoing model, with a wheelbase that's more than three inches longer. It's also a half-inch wider and the front and rear track are both 1.65 inches wider, giving the car a more stable base.

Underneath, the 5 Series trades front struts for an upper A-arm, dual lower link setup. BMW says the new design allows for better steering feel, improved ride and handling, more control of body lean, lighter materials, and room for larger brakes.

The new model also has 18-inch wheels standard instead of 17s.

In addition, BMW's developed a host of technology features to improve handling further.

The Dynamic Handling package includes Dynamic Damping Control, which electronically adjusts the shocks, and Active Roll Stabilization, which firms up the anti-roll bars to keep the car flat in turns. BMW's optional Integral Active Steering quickens the steering ratio at low speeds and slows the ratio at high speeds.

This year, the system adds active rear steering, which turns the rear wheels up to three degrees in the opposite direction of the fronts at low speeds to shorten the turning circle and turns them in the same direction as the

fronts at highway speeds to increase stability.

All of these features, plus BMW's typical 50/50 front/rear weight balance (OK, it might be 49/51), make the 5 Series the best handling car of its size. Proportioned like a Toyota Camry or Chevrolet Malibu, the 2011 BMW 5 Series drives like a much smaller car.

BMW invited journalists to drive the 5 Series, along with several other BMWs, on the 1.9-mile road course

at New Jersey Motorsports Park.

I was surprised how well the 5 Series compared to the smaller and lighter 1 and 3 Series.

The 5 Series was right at home on the track, turning in willingly, changing directions with ease, and sticking to the pavement. It exhibited a bit more lean and tire squeal in turns than its smaller siblings, but that only served to signify the vehicle was approaching the limits of its grip.

On a racetrack, this type of feedback can mean the difference between making it through a turn and sliding out of control.

The 5 Series is also quite comfortable on the street. BMW's deft suspension tuning helps it soak up bumps well. Models equipped with all the sporty goodies do become rather firm but not punishing. Plus, the car is smooth and stable on the highway.

Under the hood, BMW offers three engines.

The 528i model has a 3.0-liter inline 6-cylinder that gains 10 horsepower to 240. It delivers smooth, linear power that will be enough for most needs.

Zero to 60 takes 6.6 seconds, which is appropriate for a car of this price and class, and EPA fuel economy

estimates are 19 mpg in the city/28 highway with the lone transmission, a 6-speed manual.

The step-up 535i model keeps its 3.0-liter inline six, but it exchanges twin turbochargers for a single, twin-scroll turbo.

Power stays the same at 300 horsepower and 300 LB-FT of torque, but fuel economy is improved by as much as 11 percent.

When paired with the new 8-speed automatic transmission, the EPA ratings are 20 mpg city/29 highway.

The turbo six is completely devoid of turbo lag, has more willing power at all speeds than the base engine, and its balance of grunt and fuel economy makes it the BEST choice, in my opinion. Zero to 60 mph arrives in a quick 5.7 seconds.

Of course, more is always better, and the 550i comes with a twin-turbocharged, 4.4-liter V8 that produces and impressive 400 Hp. and 450 lb-ft of torque.

The V8 makes the 550i a rocket, launching it from 0 to 60 mph in just five seconds flat, but fuel economy suffers at 17/25 with the 8-speed auto.

The automatic, which is available with steering wheel shift paddles, shifts smoothly and is rarely out of sync with the driver's needs. The 6-speed manual available in all models shifts with a buttery smooth action.

BMW has also made changes to improve the interior. The new dashboard is angled seven degrees toward the driver to make controls on the center stack easier to reach. The dash is also set low to provide a feeling of space.

The interior ambience is typical BMW, with sturdy soft-touch materials, three flavors of wood trim, and knobs and dials that move with precision. Leatherette upholstery is standard, but Dakota and Nappa leather upholstery are available.

BMW's iDrive central control interface is standard, but it's updated for 2011, with several buttons around the controller that make accessing controls easier. It also adds eight programmable memory buttons that can be used to store radio stations or commonly used

functions such as navigation destinations or phone numbers. With these changes, iDrive is easier to learn and use.

Much of the car's extra length translates to extra rear legroom, which makes the car more family friendly. Front seat occupants have

plenty of space, and drivers will be comfortable thanks to a standard tilt/telescoping steering wheel and plenty of seat adjustments. There's also plenty of bolstering to keep occupants in place during aggressive cornering.

Prices are down more than \$1000 on average for 2011,

ranging from \$44,550 for a 528i to \$59,700 for a 550i.

With more space, improved fuel economy, and that unmistakable BMW dynamic character, the 5 Series is a better deal than last year. That should attract customers and help the company's bottom line.

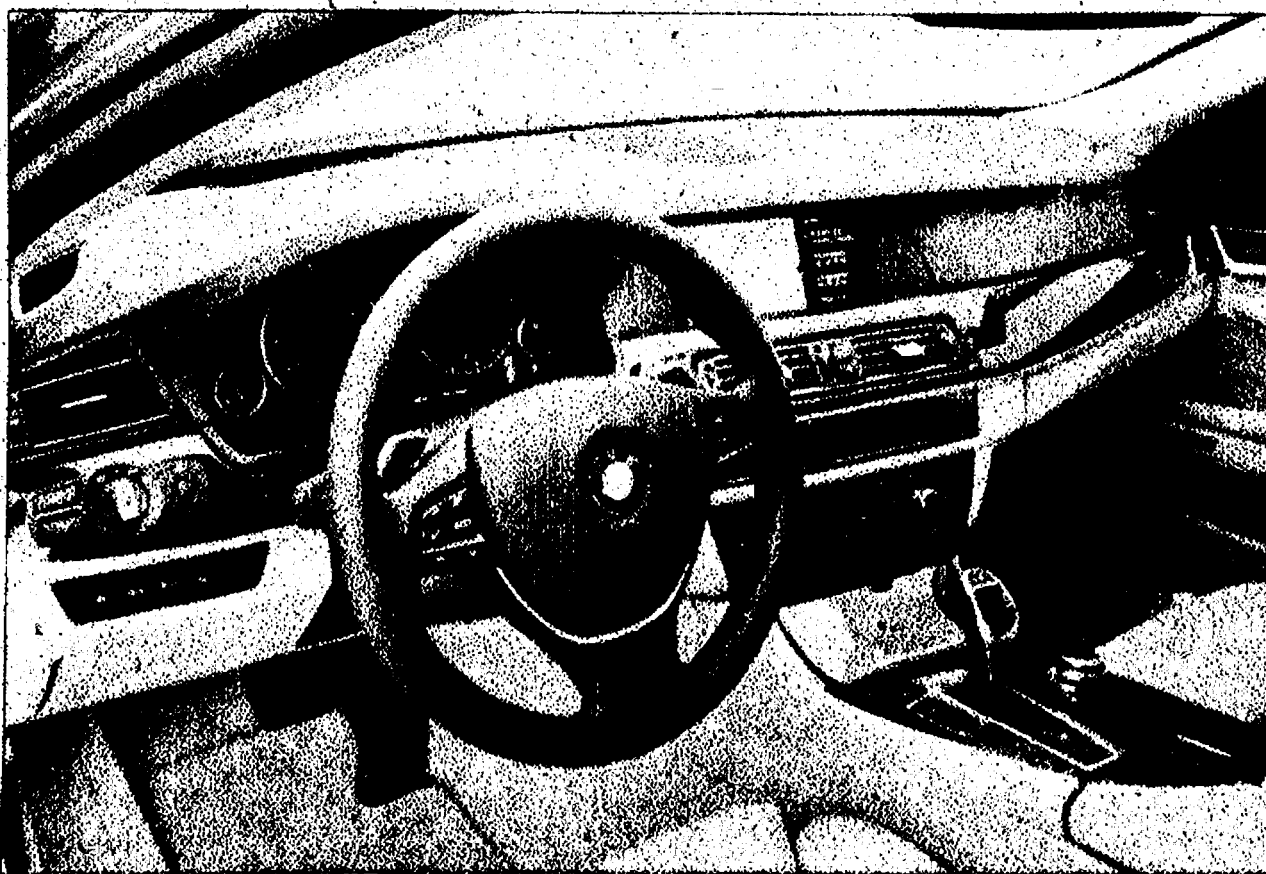

# To Infiniti and beyond

## Infiniti EX35

There are high expectations for the EX35 crossover and Infiniti's response is to give it the support it needs.



## A sporty-sedan driving experience enhanced by gobs of luxury

Scoring high on the fun-to-drive meter, the Infiniti EX35 crossover is as much a "driver's vehicle" as it is a utility vehicle.

Exhibiting the sporty driving characteristics that we've come to expect from an Infiniti, the EX35 provides just enough cargo-carrying capability to legitimize its utility credentials.

Easy on the eye, its styling sets it apart from competitors without being polarizing.

Although its interior might not be as roomy as some others in the segment, it's well constructed and richly appointed. In other words, the EX35 is well qualified to hang with the high-end crossover crowd.

Sharing a platform and some mechanicals with the G37 creates expectation for gutsy acceleration and athletic handling, and the EX35 doesn't disappoint.

This, despite the fact that its engine and transmission are actually carryovers from the old G35 rather than borrowed from the current G37.

Whether it's the \$34,665 entry-level base EX35 or the top-of-the-line \$38,265 Journey AWD, every EX35 derives its giddy-up from the same 297-hp, 3.5-liter V6. A 5-speed, driver-shiftable automatic transmission shuttles engine production to the wheels.

This V6/tranny duo musters sufficient power to reach 60 miles per hour from a stand-

still in less than seven seconds.

Both Base and Journey trim levels have standard RWD. For a \$1,400 premium, either can be upgraded to AWD.

The number of drive wheels makes a slight difference in fuel economy. The EPA estimates 17 mpg in the city and 24 mpg on the highway for the RWD versions. Opting for AWD trims 1 mpg from each number. My test EX35 was the \$36,865 RWD Journey.

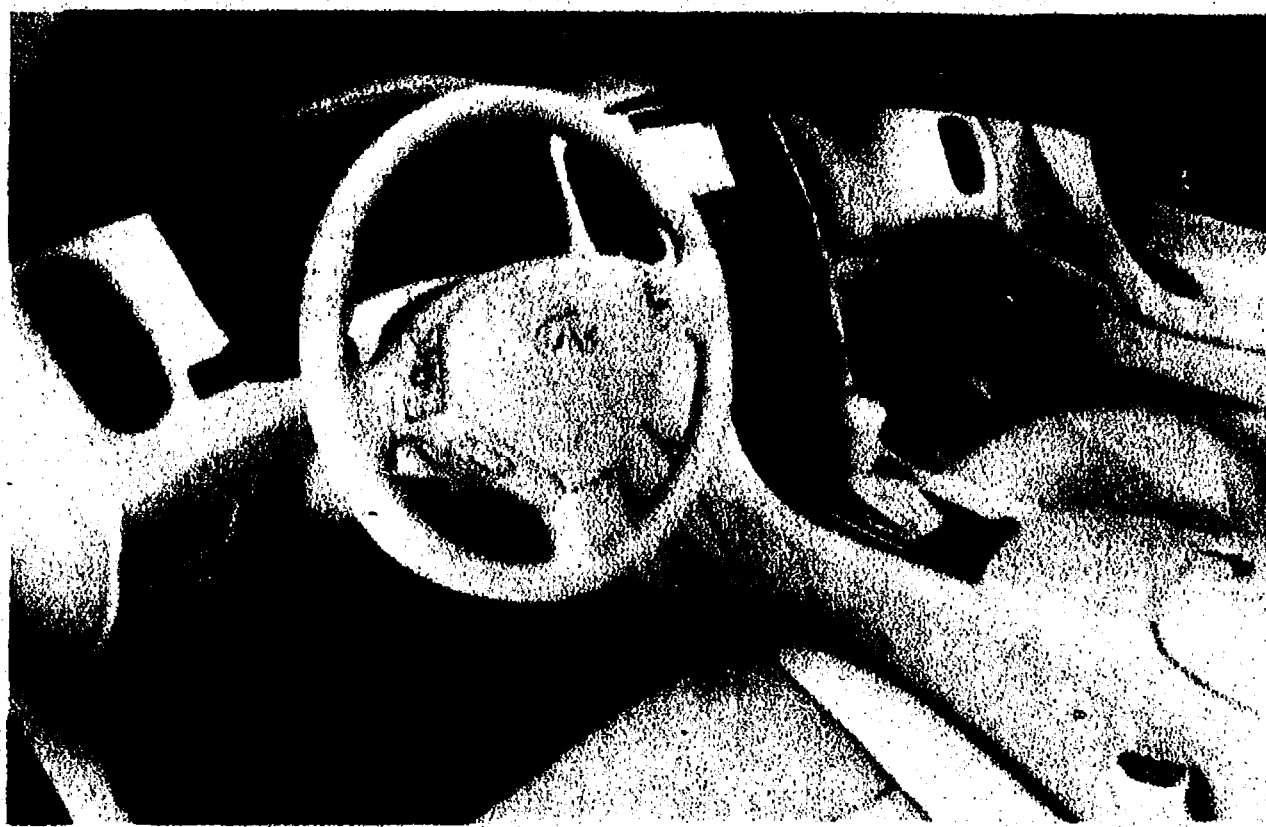
Striking an impressive balance between acute handling and passenger comfort, the EX35's independent 4-wheel suspension uses a double wishbone arrangement in front and a multi-link setup in the rear. Grabbing the pavement is accomplished with 17-inch alloy wheels wrapped in all-season rubber. All of these elements conspire to deliver remarkably agile control without diminishing passenger comfort. Simply put, the EX35 feels like a sporty sedan from the driver's seat.

Reeling in this crossover's forward momentum falls to 4-wheel disc brakes with antilock. Included in the base price are electronic stability control, traction control, emergency braking assist and electronic brake force distribution. Also beefing up the list of safety features are a rearview camera and six airbags.

The Technology Package is offered on the Journey trim as a \$2,250 option.

It includes Lane Departure Warning and Lane Departure prevention.

Not only does drifting out

of your lane sound an alarm when the system is engaged, but it also nudges the EX35 back into the appropriate lane. Intelligent Brake Assist with Forward Collision Warning are also included.

This will automatically slow the vehicle down and even stop it when the system calculates the distance is closing between you and the vehicle in front.

"Utility" is not the EX35's middle name. Infiniti bills the EX35 as a 5-passenger vehicle; however, rear-seat room is stingy at best.

With less than 29 inches of leg room, the backseat is really designed for small children.

Moreover, EX35 is RWD with a hump in the floor of the center seating position of the backseat, rendering it even less inviting.

By comparison, the Chevy Equinox has 39.9 inches of rear-seat legroom. Space for luggage behind the EX35's second-row seat is 18.6 cubic feet. Folding down the rear seat expands cargo space to just over 47 cubic feet.

This is well below the cargo-carrying capacity of its closest competitors, like BMW's X3 with 71 cubic feet of maximum cargo space.

Highly stylized, the cabin reflects Infiniti's luxury pedi-

gree. Soft-touch surfaces cover the interior.

A high level of craftsmanship and the abundance of quality materials combine to create an opulent environment. An 8-way power-adjustable driver's seat and 4-way power-adjustable front passenger seat are covered in leather, as is the split-folding backseat.

Configured with two separate pods, the front-seat area is roomy and comfortable.

Flowing into the center console, the center stack is filled with an intimidating array of buttons and controls for everything from the optional navigation system to the automatic

dual-zone climate control that's standard in the Journey. While the collection of knobs and buttons looks daunting, all systems operate intuitively.

Included in the sticker price of the Base crossover are full power accessories, cruise control, tilt-telescoping steering wheel, keyless entry, ignition, heated outboard mirrors, automatic climate control, automatic headlamps, and a 6-speaker audio system with CD player, satellite radio capability, iPod integration and auxiliary input jack.

Moving up to the Journey adds a 6-disc CD changer, power adjustable steering wheel, sunroof, heated front seats, auto-dimming rearview mirror, Bluetooth and wood interior accents.

Basically there's no charge for the navigation system; however, it's included as a freebie with the \$2,150 Bose and Around View Monitor Package that features an upgraded 11-speaker Bose audio system with a 2GB hard drive for music storage. Also included is Infiniti's Around View monitor that has cameras providing a 360-degree view around the vehicle.

If your need for real utility takes a backseat to your desire for a sporty-sedan driving experience enhanced by gobs of luxury, the EX35 is exactly what you're looking for. Its spirited performance, available technology, sumptuous living space and dynamic styling can make you forget its modest cargo-carrying capacity.

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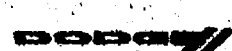
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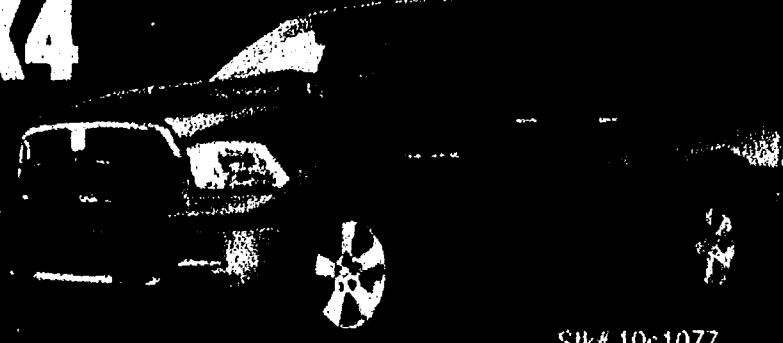


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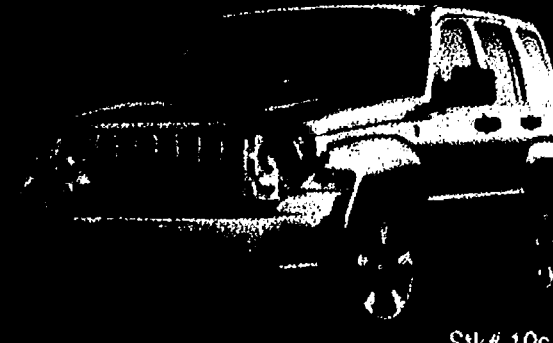


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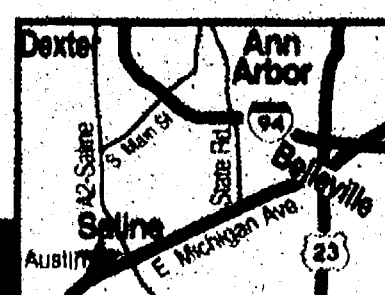
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## Blast from the past

# Encore's 'Sound of Music' a hit

Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein's "The Sound of Music" evokes fond memories for most people, whether it is the excitement of attending the Broadway version on stage, seeing the dizzying aerial view of the Alps on the big screen, or curling up in pajamas on a winter night to watch the annual television event.

The Encore Theatre in Dexter hopes to expand on those memories to create a new love for this local version of "The Sound of Music."

The show opens in the Nonnberg Abbey, with heavenly vocals by the nuns. The Mother Abbess (Jody Doktor) and the other nuns musically contemplate what to do about the problem postulant in the song "Maria."

After confessing that the most important lesson she's learned at the abbey is "to find out what is the will of God and to do it," Maria is sent to the widowed former naval officer Georg von Trapp's home to serve as governess for his seven children. While there, she is to ascertain her readiness to take the monastic vows.

As the classic story goes, Capt. von Trapp and Maria are not initially impressed with each other, but as time passes and he sees the life she has brought back into his home, he softens and they fall unwittingly in love.

New York City actress and 2002 University of Michigan graduate Leslie Henstock (Maria), has a remarkably beautiful voice and is especially animated and nurturing in scenes involving the children.

Paul Kerr, 30-year theatre veteran, plays the stern exterior of Capt. von Trapp well, but his gentle, loving side for Maria and the children is not as satisfying. Encore's regular Steve DeBruyne is always a hit, and his characterization of Max Detweiler provided needed comic relief during serious conversations about money, marriage, politics, and war.

Detweiler's friend and Capt. von Trapp's fiancée, Elsa Schraeder, was elegantly played by Elizabeth Jaffe. The von Trapp children were enjoyable to watch as they interacted with adults and each other. Despite their youth, each of the children are veteran actors. Their interest and energy prove their love for the stage.

It should be noted that aside from the one constant, Liesl, played by Madison Deadman, the other six children are double cast. Due to the excessive time demands, the Encore has two sets of von Trapp children, each performing in alternating shows. The "captain cast" performed on opening night. I did not have the opportunity to observe the "Maria cast."

Deadman did a fabulous overall job portraying the 16-year-old

Liesl. She shone in her rendition of "Sixteen Going on Seventeen" with her combination of vocal and dance talents. Sebastian Gerstner as Rolf supported her well.

When Maria flees to the abbey after being confronted by Brigitta concerning her true feelings for Capt. von Trapp, Doktor's clear soprano solo of "Climb Ev'ry Mountain" pleased the crowd.

The audience also loved Sister Sophia (Sonja Marquis) and her priceless facial expressions and mannerisms that clearly communicated her thoughts.

Toni Aulenti's set design showed creativity in the use of a variety of backdrops and props to transform the same primary structure into a number of locations. The Encore has a small stage for a show as big as "The Sound of Music," but the set maximized the space available.

Costume design by Colleen Meyer was not an easy feat. This was a large cast with many costumes, and several changes taking place in only moments between scenes. The most noticeable problem was the boys' uniforms, whose color varied slightly from the girls', but this did not detract from my enjoyment of the show.

Since previous Encore shows have boasted multiple instru-

ments, it was a bit surprising that only two pianos provided the musical background for "The Sound of Music." Most of the time the lack of full instrumentation went unnoticed.

Under the direction of Barbara Cullen, the Encore's production remained true to the wholesome, family-friendly story.

However, more than any other of the countless times I've watched "The Sound of Music," I left the theatre with

the profound sense of what was happening politically in Austria in the 1930s, as well as an understanding of the strength of a family who holds firm to their convictions through their faith in God and with the help of their friends.

Due to popular demand, a fourth week of performances has been added. "The Sound of Music" will say "So Long, Farewell" on Aug. 29.

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
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# Bicycle Touring Society helps fund road project

Ted Green, a member of the Ann Arbor Bicycle Touring Society, was the visionary behind a grassroots fundraising effort to resurface a portion of Huron River Drive.

On Aug. 5, he handed Washtenaw County Road Commission officials a stack of checks totaling about \$41,600.

The funds will help pay for a portion of a \$101,000 road resurfacing project for a stretch of road that's frequently traveled by bicyclists.

The fund-raising effort will help pay for a 0.77-mile section of Huron River Drive from Tubbs Road to Wagner Road, which includes a 3-foot paved shoulder.

Also contributing to the effort is Washtenaw County Parks and Recreation.

Several sections of Huron River Drive will get a facelift, including a 2.5-mile section from Zeeb Road to Tubbs Road that will include 2-foot paved shoulders at a cost of \$400,000.

This portion will be funded by stimulus dollars and Washtenaw County Parks and Recreation funds.

Also included is a 1.01-mile section from Wagner Road to Maple Road at a cost of \$200,000.

## Permission sought to pick elderberries in road right-of-way

What do elderberries, a new small business and the Washtenaw County Road Commission have in common?

Frank Duff, an Ann Arbor resident, came to the Road

Commission asking for permission to pick elderberries from several Road Commission rights-of-way.

He says he's found the berries growing in three townships.

Duff said he was working with the state of Michigan on paperwork to start a

small business and needed permission from the Road Commission to harvest the berries.

He's found them on Road Commission rights-of-way property in Freedom, Scio and Lima townships. To comply with state regulations, he told road commissioners that

he needed a letter of permission to pick the berries for his product. Elderberries, like strawberries and raspberries, grow naturally in several areas of the county.

Duff said the Food Co-op of Ann Arbor has expressed interest in selling his elderberry syrup. But, first, he

needs to comply with state regulations.

"This seems like a perfectly reasonable request," said Road Commissioner Doug Fuller, who referred the request to staff to work with the new small-business owner.

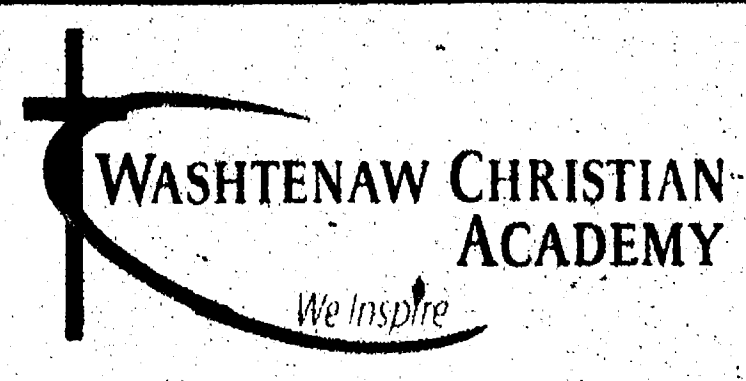
Duff said the syrup can

be used on pancakes and ice cream or ingested straight.

"I put it in my coffee as a sweetener," he said.

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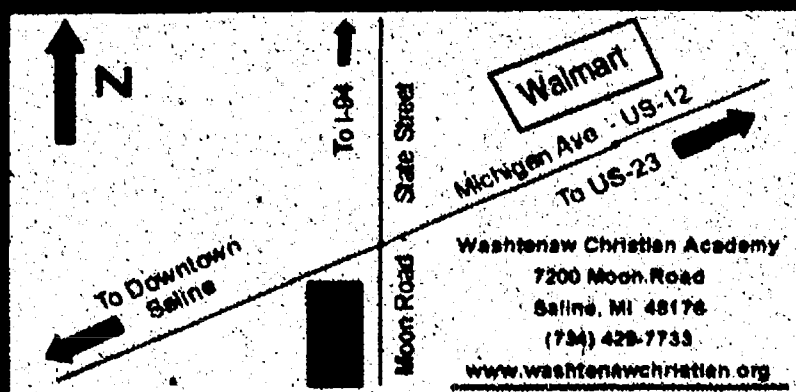
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# Grant funds Silver Maples' wellness path

"We hope it's true. If you build it, they will come. We'd love to see schoolchildren, teens, employees, families and the Silver Maples folks and their friends using the paths day in and day out."

The path provides a direct benefit to residents and staff of Silver Maples of Chelsea, creating an opportunity to exercise, get fresh air and view wildlife, Wilczynski said.

"This path provides a link with all of our neighbors, creating for the community of Chelsea a resource that may be used by all, with the opportunity to improve their health status using a safe community outdoor exercise setting," he

said. "We believe it's a part of our charitable non-profit role to give back to the community and this is one very tangible way for us to pursue this social responsibility."

The partnership between the various entities is another example of the positive level of cooperation and community spirit, Wilczynski said.

"I love the fact the path traverses private and public property helping to demonstrate the contribution of area non-profit entities to the community at large," he said.

Grand opening festivities with a ribbon cutting are planned for this fall, Shawn Personke, director of activities and public relations for Silver Maples said.

"We hope to design and publish a walking map that would also include the Pierce Lake Boardwalk loop, which is about 1.9 miles," she said. "We hope to have signage that commemorates the wellness path and recognizes each of the partners, as well as a sign that highlights the history of the Interurban trolley line. A third group of signs could include wellness tips and path etiquette guidelines."

"There's also the opportunity to expand by connecting the new paths with a path that leads to and from the Chelsea Wellness Center."

A walking path is an incredible asset to a community, and can benefit so many people, Personke said.

"We're thrilled to be part of such an initiative that can help Chelsea embrace wellness on so many levels. Wellness is a huge part of what we do at Silver Maples, whether it's putting

together a team for the Heart & Sole Run, providing membership to the Wellness Center for our residents, or supporting the local farmers' markets, we know that it benefits everyone in so many ways," she said. "The walking path is just one more step in the right direction."

Chelsea Schools Superintendent David Killips said the path is another example of how different community entities collaborate to provide more opportunities for Chelsea residents.

"I believe this will be just one example of how the Chelsea Area Wellness Foundation will be a tremendous asset to the community," he said. "I'd like to thank Jerry Wilczynski for spearheading this project and for having this vision."

Chelsea Community Hospital CEO Kathleen Griffiths said the hospital was pleased to support Silver Maples.

"This is a great opportunity to connect and encourage walking and healthy behaviors in our community," she said. "Silver Maples is a very important part of CCH and the Chelsea community. We're so glad the Chelsea Area Wellness Foundation awarded them this grant."

Fr. William Turner said St. Mary Church is happy to participate in the plan for a path through church property.

"Silver Maples has always been a good friend and neighbor that cares about its residents and their well-being. The new walkway is another example of that care," he said.

The group worked with the City of Chelsea for planning

purposes.

"The City of Chelsea is extremely happy and proud that Silver Maples received a wellness grant," City Manager John Hanifan said. "Not only will this benefit the residents of Silver Maples, but this will also begin to establish an 'end to end' path for residents and visitors to our community."

Cindy Cope, executive director of the CWC said many members supplement their center workouts with an outdoor walk or run.

"We're real excited about the new paths we'll be able to recommend to our members," she said. "It's not unusual for members to come to the center and head outdoors for a run or walk before or after their scheduled class or strength training program. We also have a seasonal running class that will benefit from the paths."

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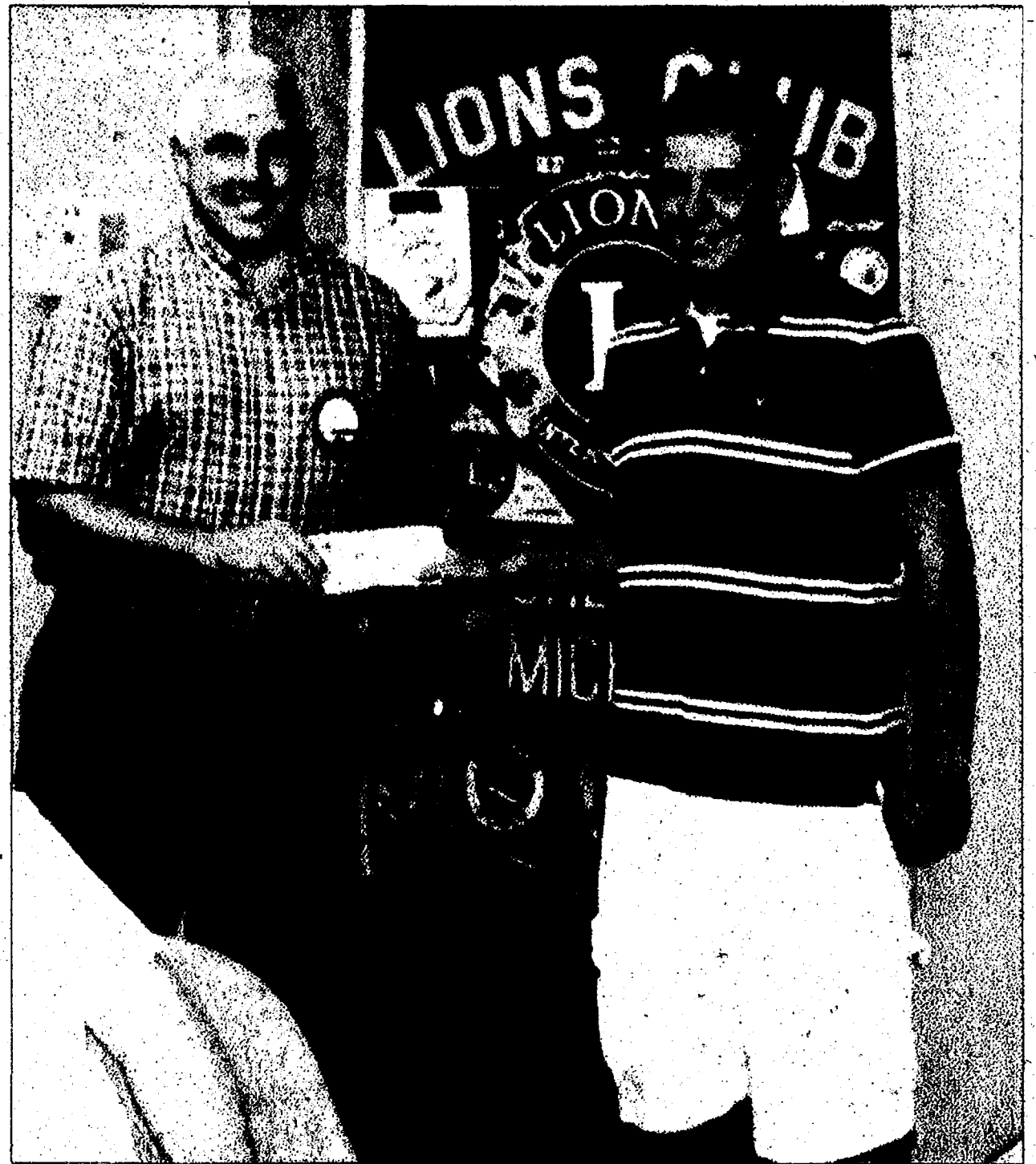
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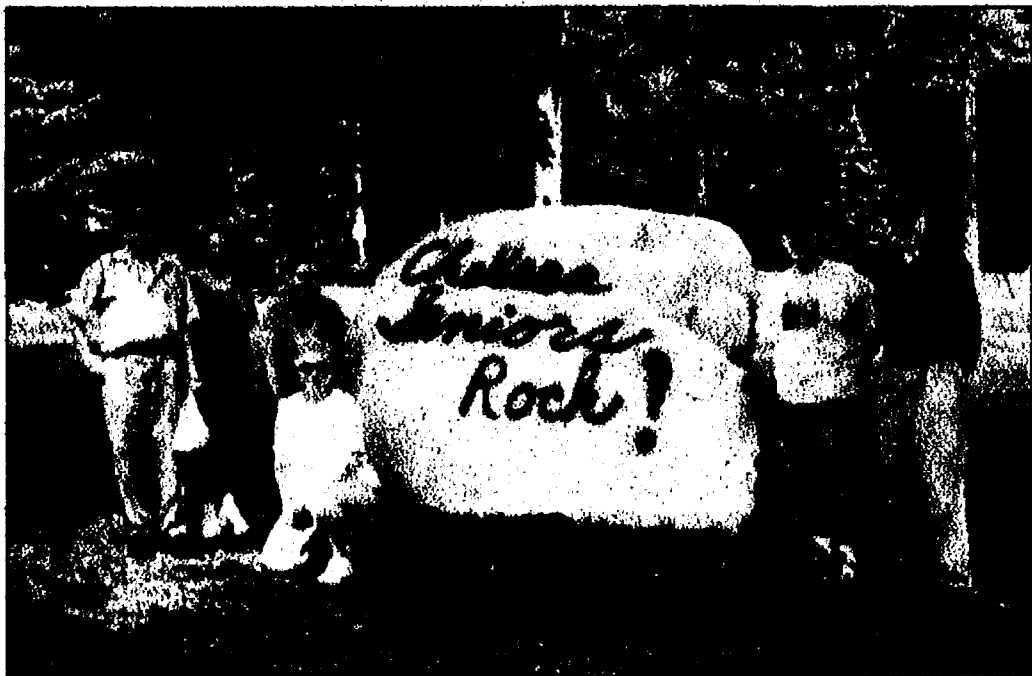

Modafferi said he started impersonating the music legends after retiring and looking for a fun hobby.

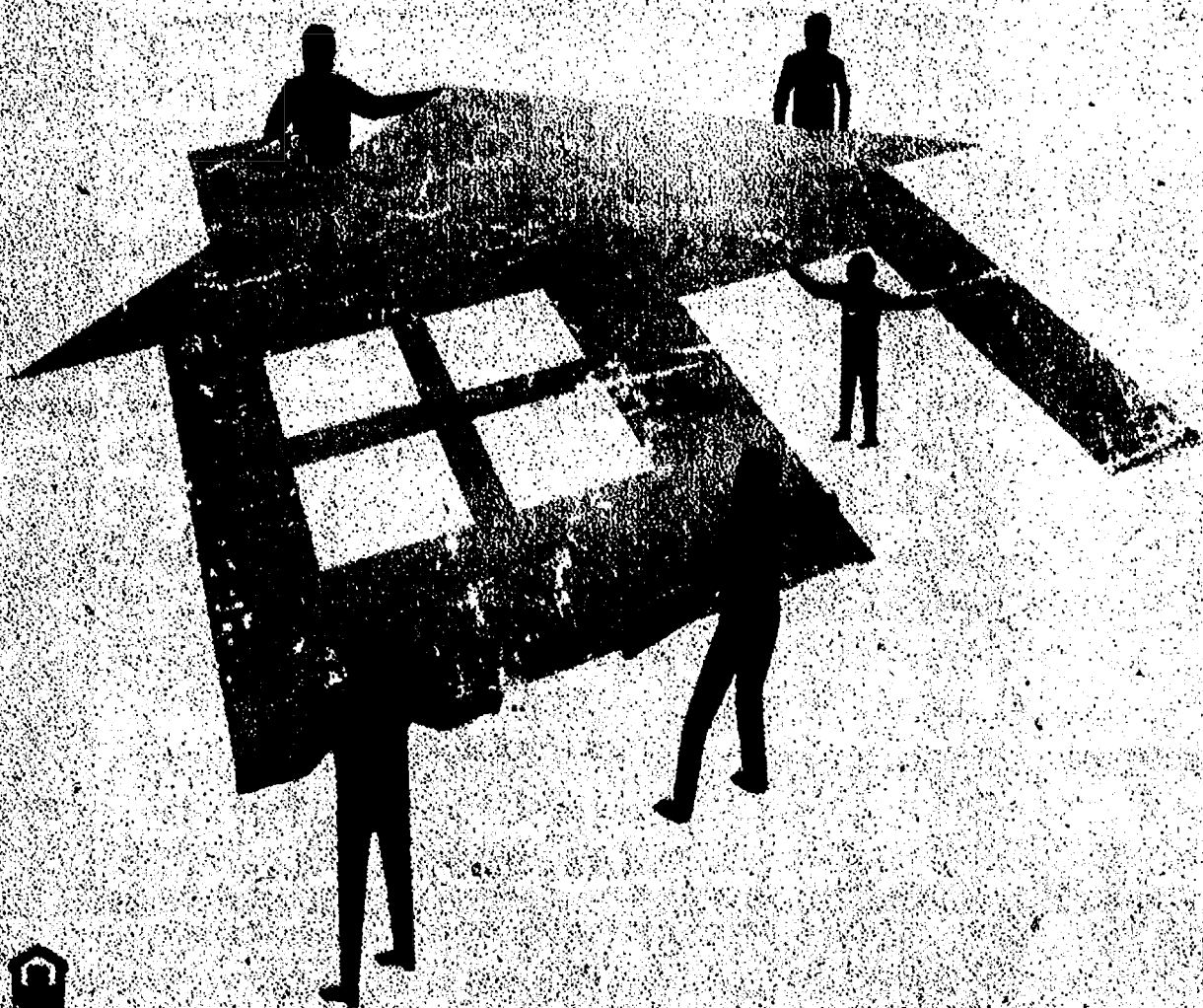
"I don't like the music that

The 33rd annual Ypsilanti Heritage Foundation Historic Home Tour will take place from noon to 5 p.m. Aug. 22.

Featured will be seven locations, including four 19th-century properties — three houses and a schoolhouse — in Superior Township. Throughout their history, all four have had strong ties to the city of Ypsilanti.

A also on the tour is 19th-century home on Ypsilanti's south side, the nonprofit Corner Health Center on historic North Huron Street and three modern loft apartments above the Spark East offices on Michigan Avenue.

The following properties are on the 2010 tour:

1. A grand 1892 brick Queen Anne with Romanesque overtones at 113 Buffalo St., owned by Stewart Beal and Kathryn Macker.

2. The recently expanded and restored nonprofit Corner Health Center in an 1890s building at 47

N. Huron St.

3. Three modern loft apartments developed by Eric and Karen Maurer in the former Mack and Mack Furniture Building, one of the oldest structures in the city. The lofts are above the Spark East offices at 211-215 W. Michigan Ave.

4. The 1884 Italianate Geer-Miller house, at 8605 W. Ann Arbor Road in Superior Township, brought back to life over the last ten years by Glenn and Jeanine Miller.

5. The 1839 classic brick Esek Pray-Van Bolt house, with promi-

nent Greek Revival details, at 8755 W. Ann Arbor Road, one of the oldest dwellings remaining in Superior Township. Owners John and Jane Van Bolt have been stewards of this property since 1987.

6. The 1837 "Upright and Wing" McCormick-Williams farmhouse, at 9105 W. Ann Arbor Road in Superior Township, owned by Kay and Karl Williams. A barn dating from the 1860s is on the property.

7. The 1880 Geer School, at 9981 W. Ann Arbor Road in Superior Township. The school educated

students until 1982, and the community restored it in the late 1980s. Today it provides a history lesson and a one-room school experience for fourth graders in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

## Youth learn how to report on communities

Members of Eastern Michigan University's B. Side of A. (Business Side of Art) program unveiled their new digital magazine, "Concepts of Life" at their graduation ceremony Aug. 6 at the Spark East building in downtown Ypsilanti.

Slater said the B. Side interns chose topics like teen pregnancy, single-parent households and sources of local entertainment for youth, among other issues.

"It's necessary to have a magazine like this for youth in Washtenaw County," he said. "A lot of youth don't have this information, or they don't know where to find it."

"This is our opportunity to speak out and tell our side of

the story, and at the same time we can inform and educate."

Justin Lockard, who interned at Heritage

Newspapers, came up with the name of the website.

"I got to

see the project from start to finish," he said. "The most important thing for me was seeing my work come to a final conclusion."

Lockard received special recognition for outstanding performance along with Slater and students Richard Johnson

III and Keisha Degraffinreid.

Bidlack said though the B. Side program is finished for the summer, it will continue to employ five youth to update the website with stories and video through a grant provided by Michigan Works!

"We did our research and we heard several folks tell us if the site isn't

## Can you save for retirement, college?

As another school year approaches, you may be thinking about the day in which you'll be sending your children off to college. Can you afford to help them pay for school while still saving for your own retirement?

To implement the right mix of options, it's important to discuss your situation with a professional financial advisor, but here are some options to consider:

### Contribute to 401(k)

Since many people don't have unlimited funds available to save for retirement and college, it's important to get the most mileage possible from the money invested.

Try to utilize the tax-advantaged retirement accounts available to you. For starters, contribute as much as you can afford to your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan.

Not only can your earnings grow on a tax-deferred basis, but your contributions are generally made with pretax dollars, so the more you contribute, the lower your annual taxable income — which, in turn, could give you more disposable income to invest for college.

In 2010, you can contribute up to \$16,500 to your 401(k), or \$22,000 if you're 50 or older.

### Fund your IRA

Depending on your income level, your contributions to a traditional IRA may also lower your taxable income, again potentially freeing up resources for college. Plus, your earnings can grow tax deferred. If you qualify for a Roth IRA, your contributions are not tax-deductible, but your earnings grow tax

free. Withdrawals are also tax-free, provided you've held your account at least five years and you don't start taking withdrawals until you're at least age 59 1/2. Also, you can withdraw Roth IRA contributions without paying taxes (since you've already been taxed on this money), so you could use these funds, if necessary, to help pay for college costs, although ideally you'd like to leave your account untouched until you retire.

If eligible, you can contribute up to \$5,000 to your traditional or Roth IRA in 2010, or \$6,000 if you're 50 or older.

### Open a 529 college savings plan

Contributions to a 529 plan are made with after-tax dollars. However, when you contribute to a 529 plan, your earnings grow tax free. Withdrawals are also tax-free, provided they are used for qualified higher education expenses. (Withdrawals for expenses other than qualified

higher education expenditures may be subject to federal and state taxes plus a 10 penalty.) Furthermore, 529 plan contributions may be eligible for a state tax deduction or credit in certain states for residents who participate in their own state's plan. Also, the lifetime contribution limits for 529 plans are quite generous, and you can gift \$13,000 per year, per beneficiary, without incurring gift taxes.

To make sure you under-

stand the tax ramifications of a 529 plan, you'll want to consult with your tax advisor. It may not be easy to put away as much as we'd like for retirement and college. But you do have some attractive savings and investment options. Don't delay, because when saving for any goal, time is a great ally.

# Real-life von Trapp family inspires Encore's Cullen

**Director finds calling after viewing classic musical on stage**

For "The Sound of Music" Director Barbara Cullen, Richard Rodgers' and Oscar Hammerstein's classic musical is more than another show. It's where she discovered her passion for musical theater.

"My mom said that I sat on the edge of my seat the whole entire time," Cullen said. "I saw it in a big theatre in Cincinnati, Ohio, and from that moment on I knew I wanted to go into musical theater and sing and dance and act, and now I'm directing and choreographing."

"It's changed my life." "The Sound of Music" is one of those shows that several people have seen or at least been exposed to by way of the classic score, which includes the ubiquitous "Do-Re-Mi" show tune.

Tapping into her background, Cullen and Encore Artistic Director Dan Cooney have double cast many of the

children's roles, which will give kids as young as 5 and 6 years old a taste of the spotlight.

"I think for kids to see other kids performing is a really neat thing," Cullen said. "Especially when it's a life performance, and in this case we have so many great kids who came out and auditioned. It was difficult to pick who was the best kid."

"When I saw the caliber of talent that came out for our auditions I thought, 'let's double cast it,' and Dan thought that would be a really great idea too. All of the kids are just like little professionals."

Most of the children in the show are from the western Washtenaw County region and surrounding areas.

Cullen said that she hopes parents will bring their children to the show so they can enjoy the music that captivated her as a child, but she also hopes that adults who haven't seen the show realize that there are layers to the story that they will appreciate too.

"As a kid I loved the music and now that I'm older I realize that there's so much more

about the story that I didn't get when I was little," she said. "If you're not listening carefully or it's poorly directed, you can miss the subtlety."

Having headed six productions of "The Sound of Music," Cullen said she's still learning new things about it.

The story takes place during the Nazi invasion of Austria. Some of the core characters involve children and a group of nuns, one of which is the children's governess.

"She's going to teach these kids at a time when there's a lot of tension in the world," Cullen said. "That in and of itself is a wonderful layer to the story."

Much of what happens during the show is also based on the true story of the family von Trapp, an Austrian family that lived through the Nazi invasion and escaped the country.

Where the truth ends and the fiction takes hold is one of the aspects of the show that Cullen hopes will inspire wonder in the Encore's audiences.

Julie Schachinger was one of the students who participated in the musical theatre exploration program.

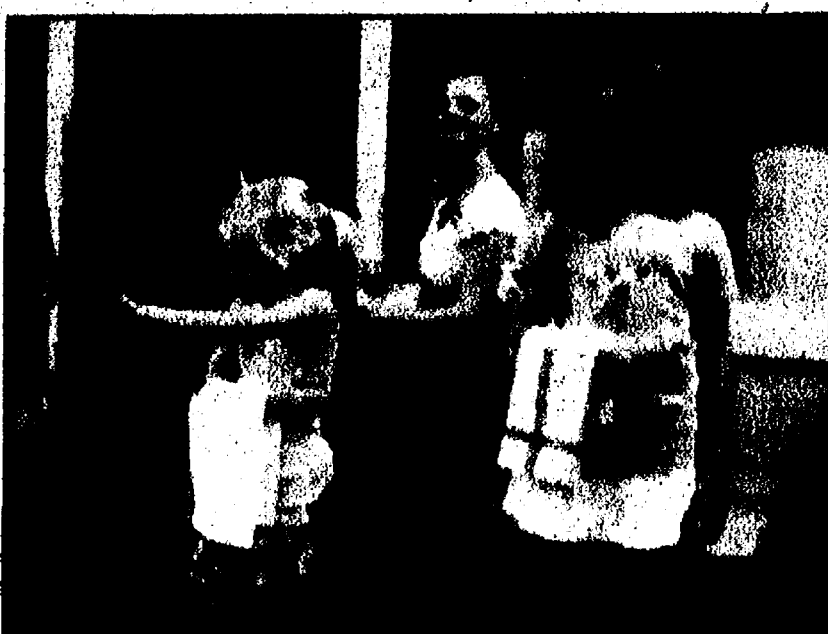
"I went to theatre camp last year, so I've already got some experience," she said.

Quagliata added that it was a treat to have kids with musical backgrounds join the program.

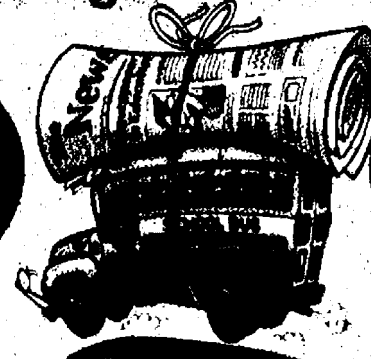
"This is important because everyone has their own background and we go over all of the different people that make up the theatre."

# Retiree subcommittee moves forward

City officials have begun compiling names for the important retiree subcommittee that is intended to tackle cost containment and new accounting rules from the Government Accounting Standards Board.

The background criteria for potential subcommittee members were approved last month by the city council.

Chelsea Police Chief Ed Toth, retired Wastewater Treatment Plant Superintendent Mel Leech, and non-city affiliated residents Will Johnson, who served as Chelsea Community Hospital CEO before retiring, and Fred Mills were tapped for the subcommittee.

The appointed body is expected to meet by the end of the month, and is expected to render recommendations on how to fulfill obligations to the city's pension fund by February 2011.

"We haven't finalized all of the details yet," City Manager John Hanifan said. "We want to get as many of the committee members appointed as possible by Aug. 9."

"The idea is to come together, look at the problem and come up with a set of recommendations."

The GASB 45 accounting rule will force local governmental bodies to more clearly define pension fund obligations in their budgets, as well as detail how those obligations will be met on a long-term basis.

The city's annual pension costs are \$1 million or 20 percent of the yearly budget.

Johnson said he's ready and willing to participate and dig into the fine details of the city's pension obligations.

He explained that the city is actually in very good shape compared to other state and local governments that are meeting obligations by handing out IOU's.

"For many years pensions of city employees were defined benefits, (but) the (city) changed that in 1995 ... to defined contribution plans," Johnson said. "The shortfall is for people in defined benefits."

Johnson said that it's his understanding that the subcommittee will recommend a way to responsibly meet those pension liabilities while at the same time doing right by the Chelsea taxpayer, as well as meeting the GASB 45

standards, which the city's bond rating will in part hinge upon.

"There are three or four ways to do that," Johnson said. "Increase taxes, increase obligations or the awful way of bankruptcy, or all three. Fortunately Chelsea is in good shape."

He pointed to a number of projects, including the new hospital addition that will be taking place in the near future, expansion of the United Methodist Retirement Community facilities in Chelsea and other capital improvement projects that will create jobs and growth in the community.

"We're in a strong position, and the city has recognized that it has a problem and is addressing it properly," Johnson said.

Leech, who has been retired for 17 years, said he has become very familiar with Chelsea's defined benefits pension system since leaving the city's payroll after 32 years.

"Things change over 17 years, and I'm the oldest or one of the oldest," Leech said. "This is something that I'm interested in for the future. If I can add something beneficial, I will."

Leech said that he understands that the city is going through the same hardships that businesses and individuals are experiencing, but he said that retirees also need assistance.

"It's tough to balance it all," he said. "It's been such a good economy for so many years

and things kept getting better for everyone, and now it's all of a sudden getting worse."

Toth said that he's focused on the question, "How do you try to fix (the problem)?"

He said that he has only two officers on the payroll yet to retire who qualify for defined benefits, while the rest are defined contribution.

As a former CEO, Johnson said that he sees the value in defined benefits versus defined contribution.

"We moved to defined contributions from defined

benefits in 1980, so we never got into any trouble," he said. "Ignoring this problem is like holding a live hand grenade with the pin out. The city took the hard step, now the question is how to be responsible to the taxpayer and the retirees."

"Luckily Chelsea's problem is relatively modest, compared to places like California or Illinois."

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# Wastewater treatment plant gets upgrade

## Changes include storage increase, better efficiency

After more than five decades in operation, Chelsea's wastewater treatment plant has received its largest upgrade in recent history.

The upgrades streamline wastewater operations, increase the plant's capacity from 1.1 million gallons of water per day to 1.8 million, and make the water discharged into Lutz Creek oxygen rich instead of oxygen depleted.

Discharging effluent into a body of water that is oxygen depleted can have adverse effects on aquatic ecosystems as it reduces the level of oxygen in the water body over time.

"The new headworks have four submersible pumps that are located in the bottom of the headworks. It also has a fine screening and automatic raking system for debris removal," said Water and Wastewater Superintendent Ray Schmidt. "There's also a vortex and cyclone separator for grit removal."

The headworks are where the wastewater treatment process

begins.

Samples are taken of the water prior to treatment and compared to post-treated water.

Another improvement is a carbon filter odor control system placed at the testing site that will reduce odor emanating from the plant.

"Since going online in May, the upgrades have made Chelsea's wastewater treatment plant the most modern for a city of its size in the country, according to city officials."

A new selector tank treatment process removes inorganic material such as sand, dirt and eggshells before the water is treated with a biological agent that removes phosphorus in lieu of treating the water with caustic and expensive chemicals.

The water is sent from the selector tanks to oxidation ditches, some of which are new, for secondary biological treatment. The microorganisms introduced to the water continue to break down waste while the water sits in the ditch.

"The new oxidation ditch is the same dimensions as the existing ones," Schmidt said.

The ditches are also where the catalyst for removing ammonia and phosphorus are introduced.

From the oxidation ditch the effluent is sent to a splitter, where it's directed to settling tanks also known as clarifiers.

Two of these tanks are new additions that were part of the major upgrade. The facility already had three tanks in place.

"As the name implies, heavy solids including microorganisms settle to the bottom, while the wastewater moves on to the disinfection stage," Schmidt explained. "A portion of the sludge is pumped to open air tanks and transported to be put into a farmer's field as a soil amendment."

The solid waste collected from the wastewater is stored underground in one of four tanks each with a 250,000 gallon capacity. A carbon air filter has been installed to eliminate odor when the tank hatch is opened.

"During biosolids hauling and land application we'll be able to run that air carbon filtering system when we open the hatches... It'll suck the air down through and we shouldn't

get the odors during biosolids hauling," said project engineer Tom Lardner.

The system then cycles back the bioorganisms used to break down materials in the wastewater back into the selector tanks where they're reapplied to another batch of incoming wastewater.

Those organisms are then pumped back in to be mixed with the incoming wastewater, which is a step that was missing from the wastewater operation prior to the upgrade.

The final stop for the wastewater is the new cleaning station, which has been built with an ultraviolet channel and two UV banks, which take the place of a chlorination process, thus saving additional costs, according to Schmidt.

Once disinfected with the UV system, the effluent is treated with a dissolved oxidant before being discharged into Lutz Creek.

The oxidant is what oxygenates the water and removes any harmful affects to the aquatic

life living in the creek.

"This aeration process is necessary to equalize the oxygen level in the treated discharge with the oxygen level of Lutz Creek," Schmidt said. "The wastewater in the plant is low in oxygen and discharging it into the creek lowers the level

of oxygen needed by aquatic life.

"Because the dissolved oxygen is higher than it is in the creek, water we're putting no demand on Lutz Creek."

## NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING VILLAGE OF DEXTER GENERAL CODE ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

Notice is hereby given that the Dexter Village Council will hold a public hearing on Monday, August 23, 2010 at 7:30 p.m. at the Creekside School Media Center, 2615 Baker Road, Dexter, Michigan, for the purpose of hearing public comment regarding amendments to the Village of Dexter General Code, Chapter 10, Article I, Animals and Article II, Dogs. Amendments include but are not limited to the following:

### Article I - Animals

#### Sec. 10-1. Municipal civil infraction.

Any person who violates any provision of this article shall be responsible for a civil infraction, subject to payment of a civil fine as set forth in section 22-38. Repeat offenses under this article shall be subject to increased fines as set forth in section 22-38.

#### Sec. 10-2. Domestic animals and fowl.

- (1) No person shall keep or house any animals or domestic fowl within the Village limits except dogs, cats, rabbits, canaries or small animals commonly classified as pets which are customarily housed inside dwellings as household pets.
- (2) Subsection (1) shall not apply to animals or fowl that are kept or housed at Village parks facilities for exhibition.
- (3) Subsection (1) shall not apply to the keeping of bees in compliance with all the requirements of Section 10-3.
- (4) Subsection (1) shall not apply to the keeping of chickens in compliance with all requirements of Section 10-4.

Nothing in this ordinance shall prohibit the Village or a third party from bringing a nuisance action based on the keeping of animals.

#### Sec. 10-3. Bees.

No person shall keep or possess any hive of bees containing more than 2 stands or boxes of bees within the Village of Dexter.

- (1) Any person who keeps bees in the Village of Dexter shall obtain a permit from the Village prior to acquiring the bees. No permit shall be issued to a person by the Village, and no bees shall be allowed to be kept unless the owners of all residentially zoned adjacent properties (as defined below in subsection (3)) consent in writing to the permit and this consent is presented along with an application for a permit. Written statements waiving the distance requirement in subsection (3) below shall also be submitted at the time of application and become a part of the permit if issued. Application shall be made to the Village and the fee for the permit shall be as determined by Council resolution.

Permits expire and become invalid 5 years after the date of issuance. A person who wishes to continue keeping bees shall have obtained a new permit on or before the expiration date of the previous permit. Application for a new permit shall be pursuant to the procedures and requirements that are applicable at the time the person applies for a new permit.

- (2) Notwithstanding the issuance of a permit by the Village, private restrictions on the use of property shall remain enforceable and take precedence over a permit. Private restrictions include, but are not limited to, deed restrictions, condominium master deed restrictions, neighborhood association by-laws, and covenant deeds. A permit issued to a person whose property is subject to private restrictions that prohibit the keeping of bees is void. The interpretation and enforcement of the private restriction is the sole responsibility of the private parties involved.

- (3) A person who keeps bees on his or her property shall comply with all of the following requirements:

- a. Have been issued the permit required under subsection (1) of this section.
- b. Keep no more than 2 stands or hives of bees.
- c. The principal use of the person's property is for a single family dwelling or two-family dwelling.
- d. A person shall not keep bees in any location on the property other than in the backyard. For purposes of this section, "backyard" means that portion of a lot enclosed by the property's rear lot line and the side lot lines intersect with the rear building line of the single family or two-family structure and extending to the side lot lines.
- e. No apiary shall be located closer

than 10 feet to any property line of an adjacent property.

f. All enclosures for the keeping of bees shall be so constructed to protect the safety of the public and prevent vermin. A covered enclosure or fenced enclosure shall not be located closer than 40 feet to any residential structure on an adjacent property provided, however, this requirement can be waived as follows:

- (i) If the principal use of applicant's property is for a single family dwelling, to obtain such a waiver the applicant shall present at the time of applying for a permit the written statements of all adjacent landowners that there is no objection to the issuance of the permit.

- (ii) If the principal use of the applicant's property is for a two-family dwelling, to obtain such a waiver the applicant shall present at the time of applying for a permit the written statements of all adjacent landowners and of the occupants of the other dwelling stating that there is no objection to the issuance of the permit.

g. For purposes of this section, adjacent property means all parcels of property that the applicant's property comes into contact with at 1 or more points, except for parcels that are legally adjacent to but are in fact separated from the applicant's property by a public or private street.

h. If the above requirements are not complied with, the Village may revoke any permit granted under this section and/or initiate prosecution for a civil infraction violation.

- (4) A person who has been issued a permit shall submit it for examination upon demand by any Police Officer or Code Enforcement Officer.

#### Sec. 10-4. Keeping of chickens.

(1) Any person who keeps chickens in the Village of Dexter shall obtain a permit from the Village prior to acquiring the chickens. No permit shall be issued to a person by the Village, and no chickens shall be allowed to be kept unless the owners of all residentially zoned adjacent properties (as defined below in subsection (3)) consent in writing to the permit and this consent is presented along with an application for a permit. Written statements waiving the distance requirement in subsection (3) below shall also be submitted at the time of application and become a part of the permit if issued. Application shall be made to the Village and the fee for the permit shall be as determined by Council resolution.

Permits expire and become invalid 5 years after the date of issuance. A person who wishes to continue keeping chickens shall have obtained a new permit on or before the expiration date of the previous permit. Application for a new permit shall be pursuant to the procedures and requirements that are applicable at the time the person applies for a new permit.

- (2) Notwithstanding the issuance of a permit by the Village, private restrictions on the use of property shall remain enforceable and take precedence over a permit. Private restrictions include, but are not limited to, deed restrictions, condominium master deed restrictions, neighborhood association by-laws, and covenant deeds. A permit issued to a person whose property is subject to private restrictions that prohibit the keeping of chickens is void. The interpretation and enforcement of the private restriction is the sole responsibility of the private parties involved.

- (3) A person who keeps, or houses chickens on his or her property shall comply with all of the following requirements:

- a. Have been issued the permit required under subsection (1) of this section.
- b. Keep no more than 4 chickens.
- c. The principal use of the person's property is for a single family dwelling or two-family dwelling.
- d. No person shall keep any rooster.
- e. No person shall slaughter any chickens.
- f. The chickens shall be provided with a covered enclosure and must be kept in the covered enclosure or a fenced enclosure, at all times. Fenced enclosures are subject to all provisions of the Village's Fence Ordinance, Article 3, Section 3.17.
- g. A person shall not keep chickens in any location on the property other than in the backyard. For purposes of this section, "backyard"

means that portion of a lot enclosed by the property's rear lot line and the side lot lines to the points where the side lot lines intersect with the rear building line of the single family or two-family structure and extending to the side lot lines.

h. No covered enclosure or fenced enclosure shall be located closer than 10 feet to any property line of an adjacent property.

- i. All enclosures for the keeping of chickens shall be so constructed, or repaired as to prevent rats, mice, or other rodents from being harbored underneath, within, or within the walls of the enclosure. A covered enclosure or fenced enclosure shall not be located closer than 40 feet to any residential structure on an adjacent property provided, however, this requirement can be waived as follows:

- (i) If the principal use of applicant's property is for a single family dwelling, to obtain such a waiver the applicant shall present at the time of applying for a permit the written statements of all adjacent landowners that there is no objection to the issuance of the permit.

- (ii) If the principal use of the applicant's property is for a two-family dwelling, to obtain such a waiver the applicant shall present at the time of applying for a permit the written statements of all adjacent landowners and of the occupants of the other dwelling stating that there is no objection to the issuance of the permit.

j. For purposes of this section, adjacent property means all parcels of property that the applicant's property comes into contact with at 1 or more points, except for parcels that are legally adjacent to but are in fact separated from the applicant's property by a public or private street.

- k. All feed and other items associated with the keeping of chickens that are likely to attract or become infested with or infected by rats, mice, or other rodents shall be protected so as to prevent rats, mice, or other rodents from gaining access to or coming into contact with them.
- m. If the above requirements are not complied with, the Village may revoke any permit granted under this section and/or initiate prosecution for a civil infraction violation.

- (4) A person who has been issued a permit shall submit it for examination upon demand by any Police Officer or Code Enforcement Officer.

#### Article II - Dogs - the following will be added. Sec. 10-32. Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter, the following terms shall have the following meanings respectively designated for each:

- (1) Animal Control Officer: Any Police Officer or County designate provided that such persons meet the qualifications specified by Act 339, Public Acts of 1919, as amended.
- (2) Dangerous animal: An animal which has bitten a person so as to draw blood or caused a person broken bones or which has repeatedly attacked, chased or menaced any person or damaged the property (including animals) of persons other than the owner. An animal shall not be considered dangerous solely because it has bitten or attacked a person or any animal attacking its owner or its owner's family nor shall an animal be considered dangerous if it bites or injures a person who has, without justification, provoked it by attacking it or its young.
- (3) Own: To have possession or a right of property in an animal or to permit a dog or cat to remain on or about one's premises 10 days or more.
- (4) Under reasonable control: A dog which is:
  - (a) Secured by a leash held by the owner or the owner's agent,
  - (b) Secured by a leash which is attached to a stationary object and attended by the owner or the owner's agent, or
  - (c) On the premises of the owner or confined in a vehicle.
- (5) Violent animal: An animal which:
  - (a) Has killed a person or caused a person serious bodily injury, including, but not limited to, injuries resulting in hospital confinement or reconstructive surgery.
  - (b) Is owned, possessed, harbored or trained for the purpose of animal fighting.
  - (c) Repeatedly bites or in any way injures people.

Sec. 10-36. Nuisance Dogs.  
After 10:00 p.m. and before 7:00 a.m.,

animal noises audible beyond the property line of the property where the animal is located are presumed to be an annoyance and disturbance and are presumed to constitute a noise nuisance.

#### Sec. 10-38. Pet Ownership.

(1) Pet ownership of certain animals expressly owned by any residents shall be permitted in residential districts and shall include:

- A. Small animals (legal, nonprotected species) confined solely within the dwelling proper (e.g. rodents, birds and reptiles).

B. Marine (fish) species, except those prohibited by protective law.

- C. Domesticated dogs and household cats as single pets, providing they are in compliance with the ordinance.

2. Keeping possession or harboring of live dogs, cows, sheep, goats or any species of equines (is prohibited).
3. Keeping possession or harboring of protected species except as federally approved, is prohibited. Keeping possession, or harboring undomesticated animals of a wild or feral nature, or larger than a house cat is prohibited.

4. Any resident who keeps more than three (3) dogs and/or cats shall be required to first obtain a special use permit from the village council after a public hearing held in the manner required for special use permits under the provisions of the zoning ordinance of the village.

Any resident who keeps more than three dogs and/or cats shall annually on or before the first day of January apply for and obtain from the village zoning official a zoning compliance permit, which application shall certify under oath that the applicant is in full compliance with all the provisions of this ordinance and all other ordinances pertaining to the keeping of dogs and cats in the village. The fee for such permit shall be as established by resolution of the village council.

#### Sec. 10-39. Violations.

The owner of any dog or other animal shall be guilty of a violation of the chapter if:

- (1) The dog is at any time not under reasonable control.
- (2) The animal causes a noise nuisance.
- (3) The animal causes a sanitation nuisance.
- (4) The dog is over 8 months old and is not currently licensed or is not wearing a license tag issued pursuant to this chapter.
- (5) The dog, except leader dogs for the blind, discharges its feces on property other than that of its owner and the owner does not immediately remove such feces.
- (6) The animal is vicious.
- (7) The dog is at a location other than as specified in a confinement order issued pursuant to this chapter.
- (8) The animal has symptoms of rabies or has bitten or been bitten by another animal showing symptoms of rabies and the owner fails to notify an Animal Control Officer of that fact.
- (9) The owner fails to comply with all the terms of a confinement order.
- (10) The owner of a cat older than 8 months fails to have it at all times immunized against rabies.
- (11) The owner fails to provide the animal with proper food, drink or shelter from the weather.
- (12) The owner fails to provide the animal with medical attention necessary to prevent the animal from suffering.
- (13) The owner confines or leaves the animal in a vehicle or other enclosure without adequate ventilation to prevent the animal from suffering.
- (14) A dangerous dog, when kept out of doors, is not in a pen or kennel sufficient to restrain the dog and surrounded by a perimeter fence not sharing common fencing with the pen or kennel.
- (15) The animal, other than a dog, is dangerous and is not kept indoors.

(16) The person is convicted of owning a vicious dog and then acquires another dog within 2 years of the date of the conviction.

## Much has changed during mission

I first arrived in Niger just over a year ago. Much has changed since I first arrived, not only in my life here but also in the country itself. After a coup, kidnappings and an evacuation, Niger does not seem so uneventful and remote as it first did.

I have seen two areas of the country in depth. Both of my villages were fairly ethnically homogenous, putting Hausa and Zarma culture in focus against the peripheral and often nomadic Fulans and Touaregs; they have been small enough to get a feel for true bush life yet large enough to be connected to the rest of the region.

In other ways, I have begun to feel more part of Africa and West Africa in particular. While I took my first vacation to Europe, other volunteers went to Benin, Togo, Ghana and Burkina Faso. While our neighbors seem quite plush and lush compared to Niger's Sahelian climate, Francophone, West Africa shares a long colonial history. They all maintain a highly influential civil servant (fonctionnaire) class, a new interest in Chinese economic ventures, strong ties with France and a common currency.

Like much of the post-colonial world, West African borders were arbitrarily drawn by Europeans, and to a certain extent ethnic ties render political boundaries less relevant. Many of my villagers travel regularly to Nigeria and have relatives living there, even though it is an Anglophone, densely-populated, coastal state with an economy largely dependent on oil.

None of the above attributes apply to Niger, yet Northern Nigeria and Southern Niger are all Hausas belonging to the once-powerful Hausa kingdoms, which arrived at their zenith just before the Europeans' arrival.

The story of Sargunja Mangou, a Hausa warrior queen from my region of Arewa who lived at the end of the



In Niger, the people are focusing on the same things they have been for quite some time, sustenance and survival. Many of them care very little, if at all, about things like the World Cup.

19th century, is an interesting one. Descended from a line of kings, then queens, from northern Nigeria, she led a battle of rebellion against the French colonialists. Her territory, roughly corresponding to the Dogondoutchi department where I live, constituted one of the last holdouts of Animism against the influx of Islam that spread across North Africa centuries prior.

A couple of books and a film have been made about Mangou, and a volunteer recently completed a women's empowerment project using her story as a centerpiece. It is these types of stories that can forge a regional identity. In recent talks with villagers, though, it appears that not only her gender but also her animism can be a point of contention with current local culture.

Finding a way to incorporate her story into my volunteer work is one way I hope to bring back local history and pride into what can be a mundane, subsistence existence.

This first year has brought me back to square one in a number of ways. First, I have recently finished a training for those of us who will be guiding newly-arrived Peace Corps trainees through 11 weeks of learning to live in Niger. They will be in the same shoes we

wore exactly one year ago — baby shoes.

Also, the rains have returned: the experience of witnessing a red country transformed into green is something hard to fully appreciate after decades living with green lawns, expansive forests, and chains of lakes dotting the landscape. Now each rain truly feels like a blessing, not just for the coolness it brings but for the sustenance it will provide to my fellow villagers, "insha'allah" (if God wills it), as Nigeriens so often say.

In fact, it is such a vital element of the cycle of life in Niger that a month of little to no rain can cause widespread famine, like the one taking place throughout much of the country north of my village. Furthermore, at a moment when most of the continent have had their eyes transfixed upon Africa's World Cup games in South Africa, the majority of my villagers have little to no interest in the world's biggest sporting event.

Some may have heard news of it on the radio, others have seen a match or two in other towns, but most carry on with aching backs and calloused hands, tilling the earth with fire-forged picks and hoes as they have for millennia. They are too busy living to care about international soccer.

## 'I am IRONMAN'

### Chelsea's Strong competes in Lake Placid Ironman event

When Chelsea's Luman Strong stepped to the starting line at the 12th annual Ford Ironman in Lake Placid, N.Y., it marked more of an end than a beginning.

"The toughest part was actually not the race, but rather the training," said Strong, a teacher in the Chelsea school district. "Balancing training with full-time work, being a father and husband and all the other parts of life required an incredibly supportive wife and a weekly calendar planning session."

You just don't decide a few weeks (or even months) ahead of time that you want to participate in a triathlon. These events are grueling and challenging tests of an athlete's strength, will and determination - the ultimate test for the ultimate athlete.

"The training was almost a full year," said Strong, 39, who graduated from CHS in 1989. "The training required six days a week with one rest day. Almost every day I would wake up at 5 a.m. to get in an hour workout before work and then directly after work I would get in another hour to hour and a half

workout. I had to do longer workouts on the weekends."

And each workout had a purpose or focus.

"The first few months worked specifically on developing an aerobic base and as the race grew closer, the workouts grew longer and more intense," he said. "The final weeks I spent almost 20 hours a week working out: three hour runs and six hour bike rides were the longer workouts."

There are different levels of triathlons. A sprint triathlon is a half-mile swim, 12.4-mile bike and 3.1-mile run. An Olympic triathlon is a one-mile swim, a 24.8-mile bike and a 6.2-mile run. An Ironman triathlon, like the one Strong competed in last month in New York, is a 2.4-mile swim, a 112-mile bike and a 26.2-mile run (which is a full marathon).

Strong, who played football and ran track at Chelsea High School, first got the idea about competing in triathlons while in college.

"I really had no idea what it was all about, but I liked the idea of competing in the three different aspects of swimming, biking and running," he said. "My first triathlon was the summer of 1992. It was a sprint (the shortest version of triathlons) and although

I did not have a great overall time, I really enjoyed the event."

Going from an event such as Strong's first one in 1992 to what he competed in last month in Lake Placid is a totally different ballgame - like the minor leagues to the big leagues.

"The Lake Placid Ironman was much more of an organized and focused event for me as compared to the first one I did in 1992," Strong said. "I had planned to do this Ironman years in advance. I planned out training schedules for weeks and even months in advance. I joined a fitness center to have pool access and spent hours reading up on triathlon strategy."

"In short, I dedicated essentially a whole year of my life - and thousands of dollars - toward competing in this one race. The first short triathlon I did I basically just showed up and winged it."

Strong, who said he spent close to \$10,000 to prepare for the Ironman event, doesn't belong to any of the local Ironman or triathlon clubs or organizations but highly recommends them to beginners. He says training with other triathletes is a huge help and encouragement, but it does require additional time commitments.

"With three young children at home, I decided to train on my own so that I could arrange my schedule around my family needs," he said.

But having the time to train is only part of what an athlete needs to compete in this ultimate test of physical endurance.

"Discipline and motivation are by far the most important necessary traits," Strong says. "To push yourself to get up at 5 a.m. every morning to train, to go out on long bike rides when it's raining, and to skip the ice cream and donuts requires a discipline and determined mind set. This is much more important than actual physical ability."

"I saw all sorts of body types and all sorts of ability levels on the course, but all the athletes had to have a large dose of motivation and discipline to get there."

When Strong finally got there he stood on that starting line and took a few seconds to reflect on how he made it to that spot.

"The start of the Ironman was a bit intimidating," he said. "It's a huge crowd watching and you are surrounded by some of the best trained athletes in the world. I had to remind myself of all the training that I had done and that I had what it takes to complete the competition."

He also thought about his training "team."

"After making it through a year of training, the race was actually not too taxing on me physically," he said. "Without my wife's support, I never could have accomplished this."

### Chelsea's Hardcastle honored for academics

University of Toledo junior Emily Hardcastle was named to the Division I 2009-10 Academic All American Team by the National College Golf Coaches Association. Hardcastle is a 2007 Chelsea High School graduate and has completed four consecutive semesters with a 4.00 grade-point average.

go to watch the home team beat the visiting team.

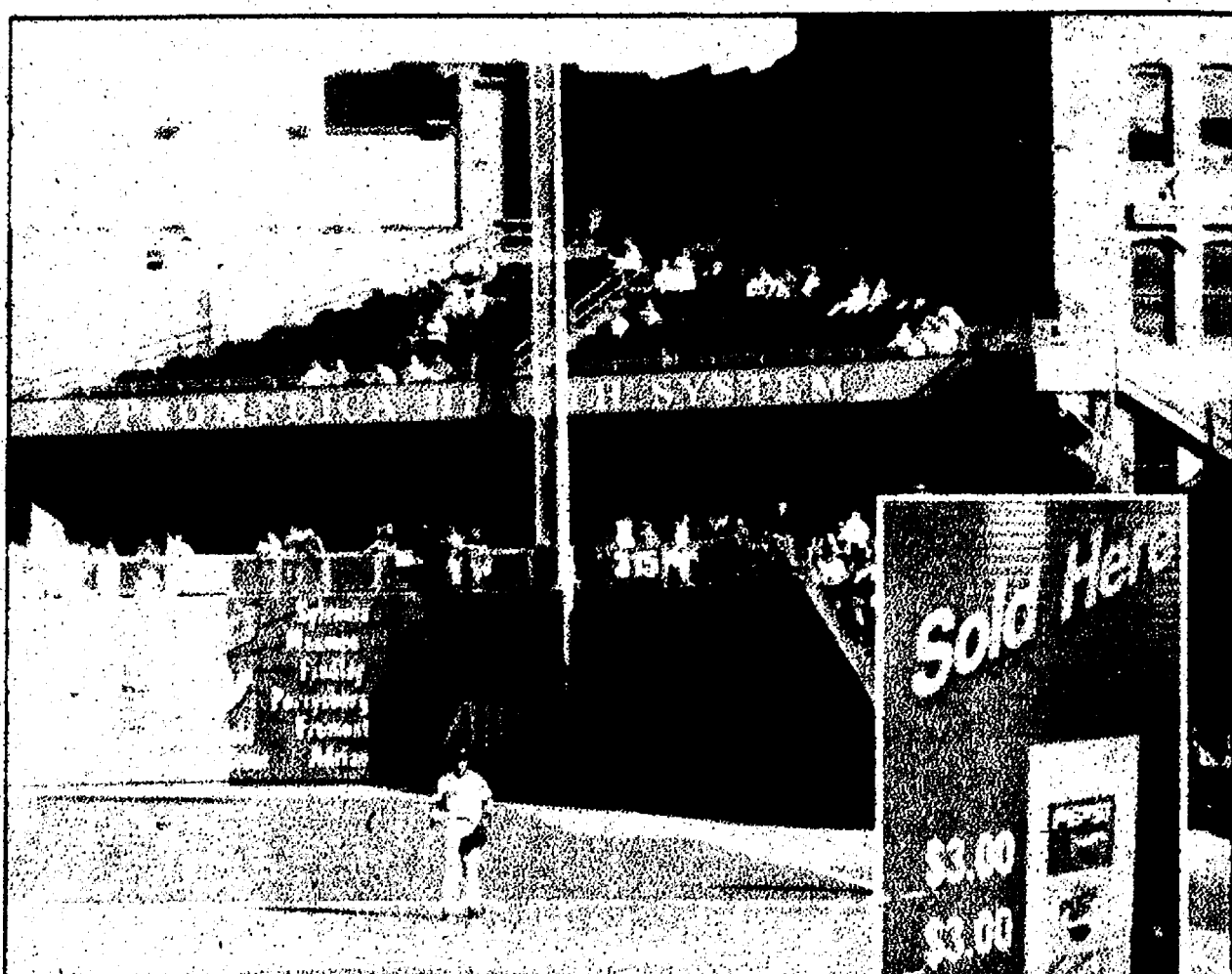
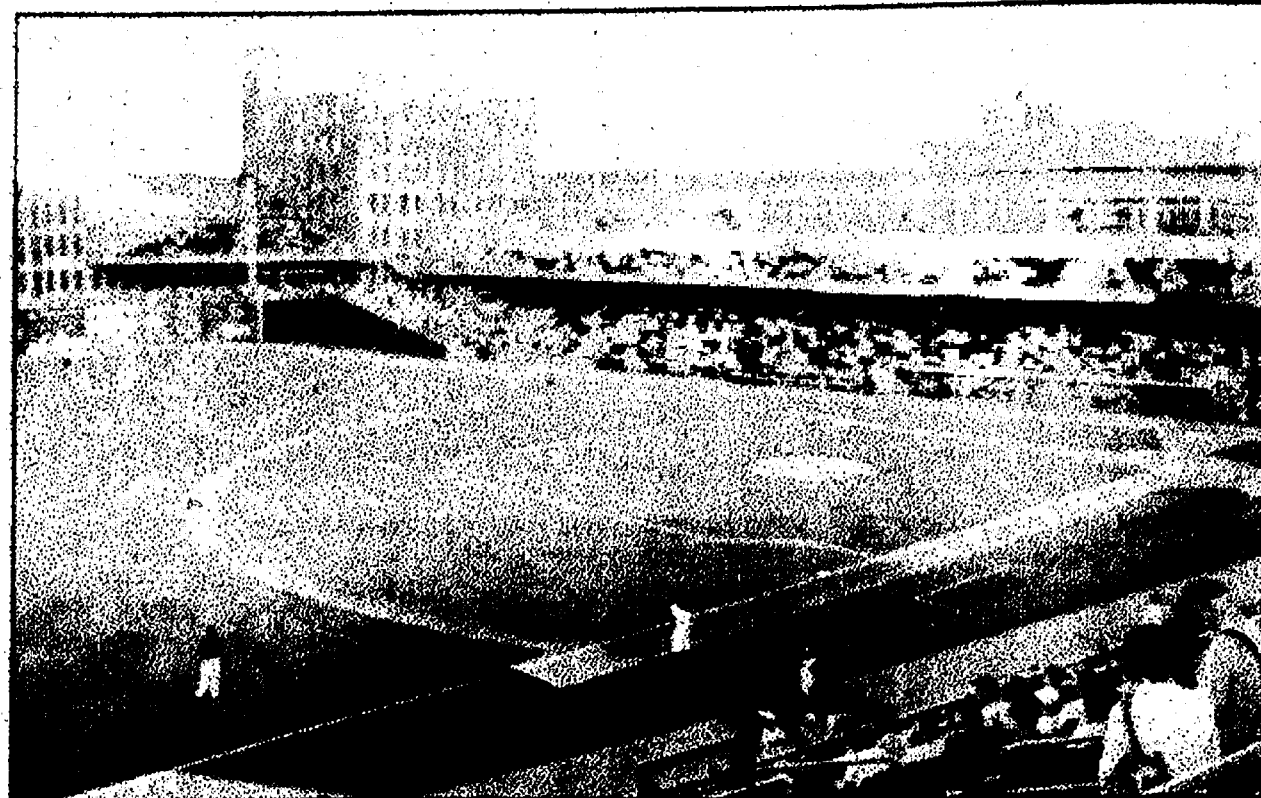
Toledo built a first-rate stadium that is convenient and comfortable. It allows fans a unique view of these gifted athletes that few people get when watching the big boys play.

**Don't forget your clubs when heading down to the Smoky Mountains**

Driving up to the 12th tee at Gatlinburg Country Club in Pigeon Forge, Tenn., elicits a response that is heard often in the Smoky Mountains.

"Wow!" The par-3 12th hole is 194 yards long with a 200-foot drop from tee to green. Called "Sky Hi," it's one of many dramatic holes at the Gatlinburg CC, recently named the No. 1 municipal golf course in Tennessee by Golf Digest.

The course is only a chip shot from the main drag of Pigeon Forge, a bustling gateway to the magnificence of the Smoky Mountains. The area has become a prime vacation destination for Michigan residents who have discovered all this area has to offer. Including golf.

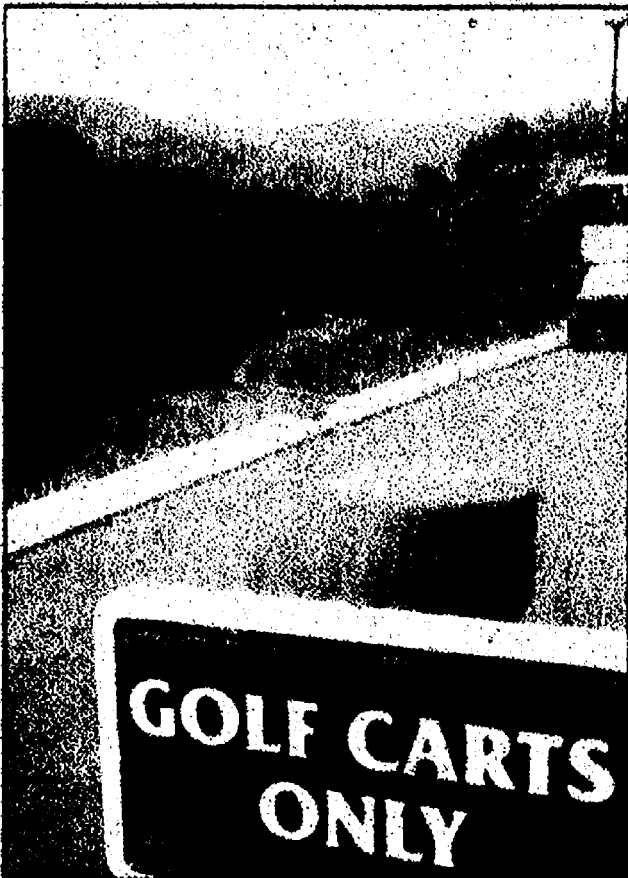
"I would say 99 percent of our players are tourists," says Rick Tucker, one of only two directors of golf the Gatlinburg CC has had since opening in 1955. "Something like 12 to 13 million people come through this area every year and many of them bring their golf clubs."

And for good reason. The area features a number of outstanding courses that offer challenges not easily found in Southeastern Michigan. The Gatlinburg CC course plays over 6,200 yards from the tips with challenging shots around every corner. While the front nine is a little more forgiving, you better have your "A" game by the time you make the turn. The fairways get a little tighter and the shots more difficult.

You also better have your swing figured out with the ball below and above your feet. Hitting off level ground doesn't happen very often.

"This is one of the most scenic courses in the country and it's also a very challenging golf course," Tucker says.

So next time you're heading to the mountains of Tennessee, throw those golf clubs in the backseat. And don't forget to put the camera - and some extra balls - in your golf bag.

## Saving the crops

Whitetail deer population has exploded locally, resulting in lost crops for county farmers

It's that time of year when farmers are looking over their crops. They're checking on which crops have survived the numerous floods this spring, damage from wind storms and also trying to predict their yields from what's left this fall. Soybeans, corn, wheat and hay are the main crops here in Michigan. It's also the main diet of whitetail deer which creates a major problem for farmers. Don Laler, a Washtenaw County farmer, has had wildlife biologists from the DNR study his farm. They've stated that as much as 50 percent of his fields have been devastated from the deer damage. Sadly, this has been happening for years to Don and other farmers in Washtenaw and surrounding counties.

The whitetail deer population has exploded in southeastern Michigan over the years. Scientific studies by the DNR have estimated the deer herd to exceed 2 million. Yet there's a disproportionate ratio of deer in our area of the state. Many farmers and property owners will tell you that Washtenaw County didn't even have deer prior to 1968. It was a big deal to see a deer back then. Deer hunters went up north to get that big buck because that's where they lived. Sadly, all this has changed for the worse. Bovine Tuberculosis (TB) has devastated the deer populations in the northern lower part of our state. If this doesn't alarm you, then this should. Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) has also taken hold in our state. This is an insidious disease that attacks the central nervous system guaranteeing a slow, painful and miserable death for the whitetail deer.

It's bad enough that we have these diseases in our state. Deer are social animals by nature. They often touch "nose to nose" when two deer meet up with each other. Sadly, Bovine TB is transmitted through the air and is inhaled by deer into their lungs. It doesn't take long before "pea sized" puss sacs occupy the lungs of the deer and then it's just a matter of time before weakness, starvation and death awaits the deer.

It's this very reason why the DNR has made baiting illegal in Michigan. So, all non-hunters who are feeding the deer in their backyard - stop it. You're not only helping to spread Bovine TB, but you're also breaking the law which could lead to stiff fines. That's correct. The fines for "baiting" or "feeding" the deer extend to all people, not just hunters.

The DNR is very concerned about the future of the deer herd in Michigan. Therefore, they have allowed crop damage permits to be issued to certain farmers.

The thought process is the population of deer needs to be reduced in order to quell the spread of disease and the financial loss to farmers. Simply stated, the deer density numbers are way too high in our area. So high in fact that Bovine TB could take hold and virtually devastate our local deer herd all together. This isn't hyperbole, it's already happened in the northern lower

Crop damage permits are only issued to farmers who show a significant proof of crop damage from whitetail deer. First, a farmer must show proof that significant damage exists. A farmer must then call their local police department ahead of time to inform them of the permits being issued. All deer shot and killed must be used for human consumption, no exceptions. All hunters must wear "hunter orange."

All deer harvested must be reported to the DNR within 24 hours by mail. Only does can be harvested or bucks with antlers less than three inches long. The farmer is allowed to have a total of three qualified shooters on the actual permit. The farmer is responsible for those shooters and their actions. All hunting laws and regulations apply and must be followed to the letter of the law. A center fire rifle may be used to harvest deer. There are usually three, five or 10 permits given at a time depending on the size of the farm. The DNR will then re-evaluate if more permits are to be given or not.

Remember that farmers and the DNR are not trying to eliminate all the deer. Rather, they are trying to maintain a healthy herd by keeping the carrying capacity within safe limits.

I know it's difficult for some people to understand the logic behind crop damage permits. However, it's the most effective way to save the herd and keep farmers from losing their farms due to the financial losses they incur from devastated crops.

I recently went on a crop damage hunt in Washtenaw County. I brought along my permit, 7mm rifle and a lot of bug spray. I went into a hay field about an hour before sunset and was shocked to see the sheer number of deer in the field. There were over a dozen deer feeding about 200 yards away. I saw a mature doe without a fawn and made a decision to take her out of the herd. She was old, probably not producing young anymore and was long in the tooth. It's not easy making a life and death decision, but necessary nonetheless.

I crouched down, put my rifle on top of the bipod and got ready to take the shot. I took three deep breaths to calm my respirations down and put the crosshairs squarely on the shoulder of the deer. The heart of the deer sits directly behind the shoulder and will ensure a quick kill should I hit at my point of aim. I slowly begin to squeeze, squeeze... then my shoulder recoils from the shot and my ears begin to ring. I look through my scope and the doe is down, she didn't as much as flinch and I have another deer for the freezer.

I quickly make my way to the doe while the other deer scatter, but don't leave all together. I'm often surprised they don't run away, rather they just move out of the way. I call the farmer and he makes his way over to my location with a four wheeler.

We take the doe back to the farm and gut, skin and quarter the meat in less than an hour. This deer will feed us for a couple of weeks and the farmer has one less deer eating his crops.
