# **Commission rules** on marijuana

Council to address text change to ban dispensaries

The fate of medical marijuana dispensaries – and a text change banning any establishment that does not comply with state, federal or local laws in Chelsea - now rests with the city council.

On Nov. 2, the Chelsea Planning Commission unanimously approved a text change in its zoning ordinance that would prohibit medical marijuana dispensaries in the city. The

change is expected to be on. the council's agenda for first

said Jim Drolett, planning and zoning administrator. "This text amendment would apply to any use that is contrary

reading at its Nov. 23 meeting,

to federal, state or local laws or ordinances," Drolett said. There are six commercial districts and one office district in the city in which under cur-

rent zoning regulations medical marijuana dispensaries would be allowed, and the amendment states that "uses for enterprises or purposes that are contrary to federal, state or local laws or ordinances are prohibited.".

**Planning Commission** Chairman George Kinzer said there is a conflict between state and federal laws and the issue is

something the commission has discussed during several previous meetings.

"Some form of medical marijuana dispensaries are legal in Michigan; federal law says they are not legal - how it works out is yet to be determined," he

Although Drolett has received some phone calls about dispensaries, there are no pending applications or established medical marijuana dispensaries in the city, he said.

"I was not comfortable with this at the beginning ... but I'm more comfortable with it now, and I think it's the right thing to do," commissioner Peter Feeney said.

When Planning Commissioner Casey Blair expressed concern that the city was setting itself up for a lawsuit, council member Cheri Albertson, who is the liaison to the Planning Commission. cited an Oct. 5 report from the Michigan Municipal League that said there were two ways municipalities could "deal with this issue.

One way was to regulate dispensaries through zoning regulations.

On Sept. 28, the city council placed a 60-day moratorium on the establishment of medical marijuana dispensaries while the Planning Commission deliberated on the issue.

# City receives audit report Report shows decrease in property taxes, revenue sharing

Chelsea's finances were given a "qualified opinion" for the fiscal

year ending June 30 by its auditors Plante/Moran, during a presentation to the city council at a recent meeting.

A two-year comparison of the general fund showed a decrease of 19 percent in property taxes and a decrease of 18 percent in state and federal revenue shar-Cheisea City Manager John

reduced its general fund millage by 1.8 mills after the Chelsea Area Fire Authority millage was approved by voters.

Hanifan said that the city.

"This also contributed to the 19 percent reduction in property tax revenue ... roughly half of the 19 percent," Hanifan said in an e-mail.

In anticipation of decreased revenues, the city reduced its expenses by 8 percent in almost every department with the exception of public safety that had a slight increase because of wages and benefits.

In 2009, the city's general operating year-end revenue was \$5.13 million, while in 2010 that

total was \$4.32 million. CHELSEA For the same time period, Cheisea's year end expenses were \$4.68 mil-

lion in 2009, while in 2010, the expenses totaled \$4.34 million. A five-year comparison of the city's fund balance showed \$253,000 in 2006, \$321,000 in 2007, \$1.2 million in 2008, \$1.58 mil-

lion in 2009 and \$1.56 million in 2010. The auditors called the city "proactive" in increasing its fund balance, which in their opinion, was lower than it should have been. Auditors typically like to see a fund bal-

ance of between 10 to 15 percent

Local author debuts book Chelsea resident traces history of Michigan wines



Kegerries said the book includes riveting stories involving, among other things, the National Prohibition Act of



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
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

Jean Overman of Inkster was among the crowd that attended the weekend conference.


Overman, who is the director of Operation Refuge in Inkster, which is a community development agency, said she really enjoyed the session on permac-

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
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
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
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# House offers haven for veterans

### Salvation Army Hope House helps veterans meet objectives

Just around the corner from the Salvation Army store and the Michigan Stadium is a beacon of hope for veterans: the Salvation Army Veterans Haven of Hope House.

The Hope House opened in 2004, and since then has helped more than 70 veterans get back on their feet, find housing and either begin employment or enroll in school.

The facility can house seven veterans at a time, and they are free to live there for up to two years. During that time, they receive assistance in completing their goals, whether it is to return to school or begin employment.

"My responsibility is to help them meet their goals: Veterans can set their goals as they come into the program, and as they continue in the program, sometimes those goals change," said Jennifer Brown, director of the Hope House.

'Maybe someone comes in with the thought that they want to start working and doing something like that, and then they're here for a few months and think 'Maybe I'll go back to school.' So, goals are re-evaluated.

"They have short-term goals that can be completed in under a year and then we look at long-term goals that can be completed over time. But our main goal here is for them to regain independent housing, as this is a program for homeless veterans.'

But living at the Hope House doesn't mean a free ride. Residents are required to participate in upkeep of the house, including cleaning chores, lawn maintenance in the summer and snow shoveling in the winter, in addition to attending groups and working to improve their lives.

'While they're here, they're doing things to help them be successful. So some of them are getting mental healthtreatment; some of them are getting substance abuse treatment; they're attending various groups to help reinforce what they're getting in their private consultations; and they're also working on being healthy physically."

To be considered for the Hope House, veterans need to be admitted to the Staples .

Family Center, which is an emergency center. They are given food, personal hygiene items and a place to stay. Eligible veterans are transferred to the Hope House. To be eligible, they need to have a source of income since they will be providing their own bedding, food and personal hygiene items.

When they come here, they do purchase and prepare their own individual meals, although we do provide holiday food. They're responsible for their

own meals, hygiene items, laundry soap, but the Salvation Army provides the house, common household supplies, and we take care of all the maintenance," Brown said,

"A lot of our veterans start their work therapy at the **Veterans Administration** through CWT (Compensated Work Therapy). They get paid, so that's a big plus, and the other plus is that they're coached along and given things and ways to improve their work performance, so when they

go out into the greater world, they've had some training there so it will help them to be successful.

Veterans who are unable to work because of disability are required to participate in volunteer work with the American

Red Cross or local parks. "It's important that this not become just a 'couching'. type program. Everybody is expected to be productive while they're here in their own way. Being productive is very important," Brown said.

Some rules for living in the Hope House include adhering to the drug and alcohol-free policy, both inside and out of the house, a midnight curfew and keeping their rooms clean. Residents have their own rooms, but share common areas such as the dining room, kitchen and living room.

The exhibit was provided to the Hands-On Museum by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.


"The idea is really introducing people to the wonders of the Great Lakes," said Mel Drumm, executive director for the museum.

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
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

# Veterans Day a time to remember

About one year ago, Karen Lobbs, a dear friend of mine, sent me an attachment on the Internet. That attachment inspired me to write a story of that same name.

composed and sung by a person named Terry-Kelly. In it he asked that we all give two minutes of our time on Veterans Day in silence to honor those real heroes — those being the ones who didn't return.

I was stationed in Vietnam in 1970 and 1971. I was assigned to the 71st Evacuation. Hospital in Pleiku. Republic of Vietnam. This was located along the Cambodian bor-

I was never able to talk about Vietnam without my eyes welling up, so I would always give the excuse that there was nothing pleasant about Vietnam, so why talk about it. Or, I would change the subject or r just leave the room.

There may not have been anything pleasant, but there was plenty to talk about. Through some personal therapy a couple of vears ago. I learned to do exactly that.

It was about the fifth time I heard my brother, Wayne, use the words: "Do not die with your music still in you." That finally spurred me into action.

I told the story to my wife, Janet, and son, David-Scott. I later wrote a story about it and I will tell it in part here.

I was not in the Army for two or three years. I was a career soldier and retired in 1982 after 22 years. My specialty was medical records, so I was mostly assigned to hospitals throughout my career.

In Vietnam, I was in charge of receiving and admitting patients and initiating their medical records. We also were responsible for securing their clothing and personal

These patients were brought in by chopper, ambulance and sometimes in body bags. We tagged every patient with a wristband as they entered, whether they were alive or not. That wristband with a register number became our immediate means of identifica-

We would then talk to the patients and get as much personal information as we could. Then we would secure their clothing and

Looking through their wallets and viewing pictures of family members was not easy to do. There were times that I would be the first person they remembered talking to after being wounded.

On more than one occasion I was asked, 'Please don't tell my wife." I can also remember the joyous reactions of those not so seriously wounded, but wounded enough that they knew they would be going home.

In some cases, this might have been without an arm or a leg. You were allowed to cry only once to maintain your sanity or you might have wound up on the psychiatric ward, as was the case of one of the men who worked with us.

I went home on leave in April 1971 and It was a song titled "A Pittance of Time." , as we de-planed at the SEA/TAC Airport in Washington, we were greeted by mobs of protesters. They called us killers and swore

I thought, what a welcome, and they were allowed to do most anything they wanted to as long as they didn't cross a certain line.

I might add that a group of our men were so happy to be home they actually got down on their hands and knees and kissed the ground. That was something they talked about on the plane and they vowed to do it.

When I returned to Vietnam in May, we had turned the hospital over to the ARVN's and became a small medical detachment with 30 inpatient beds. Most of our people were reassigned or sent home. We had only nine enlisted personnel left in our company.

The war was supposed to be winding down, but a couple of days later we were hit with a mass casualty that I never thought we would live through. There were 47 casualties and we were considerably understaffed.

There was one patient who was placed with the dead on arrivals that I heard sounds coming from. As I knelt down to him, all I could see were the whites of his eyes. He had more than 90 percent body burns. Nothing short of a major burn center could help him and that would only prolong his agony.

I put my hand on him and he asked me if he was going to die. I then heard him say with his final breath: "Mom."

That incident stayed within me for 37 years before I was able to talk about it. One of our nurses, Lynda VanDevanter, wrote a book of her experiences, "Home Before Morning." This book inspired the creation of the TV Series "China Beach," which

ran for 64 episodes. In June 2008, I wrote my Vietnam story at my mother's house in Florida. The number 23 became very prevalent for some reason. I was 23 when I was drafted into the Army; 23 years later I met and married Janet: 23 years later I incurred Parkinson's disease.

When we returned from Florida, we decided that I should visit "The Wall" in Washington, D.C. We did so in July 2008.

David-Scott and I walked to the memorial from our hotel. This was a very moving experience for me, especially when David-Scott presented me with the Vietnam Veterans hat that I will forever cherish.

Since there are so many draftees listed among the 25,000 names on this wall, I urge anyone who was drafted during the Vietnam era, who hasn't done so already, to take this trip to Washington and visit this memorial.

While there, recite this modified version of this adoge in prayer: "Here, but for the grace of God, went I."

As I gazed at the names on the wall, it didn't matter to me how they were spelled. This is what I saw: Among others, I saw 23-year-olds lined up on stretchers in the emergency room. I saw one 23-year-old with a self-inflicted bullet wound completely through his head. I saw 23-year olds in body bags. I saw 23-year-olds on psychiatric wards. And, I saw one who didn't quite make it to 23 as he died in my hands at the age of 22 - and ·I don't even know his name.

Now let's go to August 2007. While walking on the treadmill doing my daily four miles, which I had been doing for two years, I suddenly lost complete control of my legs and was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease.

This is pretty well controlled with medication, bicycle riding and yoga. I have been taking lessons from the very best of yoga instructors. Her name is Connie Fedel of the Taylor Recreation Center. She has helped me tremendously.

The way we met is another story in itself. After writing and talking about my Vietnam experiences and the fact that I quit drinking, my mind became much clearer, and I sometimes think that incurring Parkinson's is some kind of a blessing.

The nightmares have pretty much ceased. but I continue to have "moments" at times.

As I wrote in a recent story for "Stars and Stripes," Janet and I attended a Michigan State football game a few weeks ago. The Michigan State Marching Band played one of the most beautiful renditions of "The Star Spangled Banner" that I have ever heard. Prior to the last stanza, they paused for a few seconds. My eyes were focused on those Stars and Stripes and it took only those few. seconds for my thoughts to take me back to Vietnam.

That "moment" found me cringing as I approached this baby-faced 22-year-old with a half-smile on his face, whom I swear didn't look a day over 17. Now what could be pleasant about placing death tags on his right toe and left thumb?

When I entered the date on the story, "The Attachment," Nov. 17, 2009, I realized that 23 days later would be Dec. 10, which is David-Scott's birthday and, yes, he would then become 23 years old.

Now, as I close I'd like to refer back to Terry-Kelly's "Pittance of Time." I, along with Terry-Kelly, ask that we all give two minutes of silence at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month to honor those real heroes who did not return, and I further ask that my friends and relatives add 30 seconds to that in honor of the 22-year-old who died in my hands. It's just a pittance of time.

# our take. Editorial Election fallout will be huge

The fallout from last Tuesday's general election has been huge and, while most of it is over for now the ramifications of the Republican landslide in both Michigan and in Washington will continue.

One of the far reaching implications of the election in Michigan goes beyond the immediate winners and losers.

Lawmakers and the governor's office—and likely even the state Supreme Court—will get involved in next year's battle over redrawing boundaries for Michigan's congressional and state legislative districts, based on final results from the 2010 Census. The maps will be in place for a decade, influencing political races long after some of those elected on Nov 2 are gone from the state Capitol.

It's an under the radar issue for most voters. But it's always high-profile for those in the Republican and Democratic per-

And, of course, when we talk about political redistricting, the term "gerrymander" immediately enters the conversation. It's been a given for about the past 200 years.

Gerrymandering, officially, is a form of boundary redrawing in which the district boundaries are deliberately modified to favor one group or another, usually the political party in power. Republicans were in charge of the Michigan Legislature and the governor's office in 2001, the last time district boundaries were redone. Republicans will have the same advantage when it comes to approval of new district maps next year.

Origin of the word dates back to the early 1800s, when Massachusetts Gov. Elbridge Gerry signed a bill that redistrict.

Massachusetts Gov. Elbridge Gerry signed a bill that redistricted his state to the benefit of his Democratic Republican Party. When the map was finished, the contorted districts reportedly looked like a salamander.

While the term "gerrymandering" usually has a nega-tive connotation, it can be positive. If a district is redrawn to include members of a minority, then that group of individuals will have guaranteed presentation in the legislature or in Congress.

Maybe there's a better, fairer way of redrawing state and federal district lines, but no one has come up with it yet. And, most likely, no one will. Both parties enjoy the privilege of gerrymandering when they win a majority in a particular election

Changing the tradition would be very difficult, if not impossible. Getting our state leaders to agree on balanced budget has been tough enough. So, let the redistricting lines fall where they may — and may they somehow still turn out to be fair to

Also on the topic of elections and government, the
Republican landslide appears to have given governor-elect Rick
Snyder an easier, if not easy, ride when he takes office Jan. 1.
Not only did the GOP sweep the top elected positions, from
the governor down to the secretary of state and attorney general, but they also have regained control of the Michigan House and increased their advantage in the Senate.

Democrats have held control of the 110-seat House since 2007. But Republicans on Tuesday were able to win enough open

seats and defeat at least seven incumbents to retake the House.

The GOP also increased its majority in the 38-seat Senate. They now hold a 22-16 edge.

In addition to Snyder soundly defeating his Democratic opponent, Virg Bernero, the GOP's and Oakland County's Ruth Johnson of Holly won the secretary of state race and Bill Schuette of Midland took the attorney general's office by rela-

tively large percentages.

In Michigan, Democrats entered the election with a 64-42 edge in the House, with four vacant seats. Fifty-eight incumbents were seeking re-election, including 35 Democrats and 23

The switch to at least 58 Republicans is the largest single election swing in the chamber since the 1964 election, when the House went from a 58-52 GOP majority to a 73-37 Democratic one for the 1965-66 session.

Term limits are causing plenty of turnover in the Legislature. State law restricts senators to two terms of four years each and House members to three terms of two years

each.
Only nine incumbents were running for re-election in the Senate. The GOP has held the majority in the Senate since 1984.
Term limits is an area that we've said in the past needs to be re-examined and we continue to advocate for adjusting the regulation. Term limits is a good idea that has not materialized in practice as well as it sounded in theory.

With the constant changing of legislators, it's hard for any one individual to become fully acquainted with the system and then be able to work diligently for success. People, basically, just need time to properly learn their jobs. As any sports coach will tell you, a championship team is composed of young players and veterans. You need the mix to be victorious. A team of rookies, no matter how talented, will not likely succeed as well as one with veterans. as one with veterans.

The failed Constitutional Convention proposal was one place where many weak areas of the state's Constitution could have been improved. Now, it's up to the new governor, new legislators and the few semi-experienced ones to deal with critically

needed change.

Generally, Republicans campaigned against Democrats on both national and state issues, tying the candidates to President Barack Obama and outgoing Gov. Jennifer Granholm — both of whom have lost popularity in Michigan. We would hope that with this new GOP majority, the gridlock that has constantly left the Legislature stalemated will be relieved. This is not to say that everything coming out of Snyder's office should be rubber-stamped. It's a reasonable expectation that even Republicans may, from time to these meastlen what the governor is doing. But, ideally, the time, question what the governor is doing. But, ideally, the Republican majority should make compromise much easier and smoother.

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# County's bridges among worst in state

### Several bridges closed because of disrepair

Washtenaw County's bridges rank among the worst in the state, according to a recent report from the Michigan Infrastructure and Transportation Association. which represents highway construction companies and suppliers.

The county tied for second place in the state - with Genesee and Mason counties for the highest percentage of local bridges in poor condition.

In addition, Washtenaw County was ranked fifth, tying with Charlevoix County, with the highest percentage of all bridges that are in poor condition.

According to the report, 3,055 of the state's 10,831 bridges are rated structurally deficient or functionally obsolete with such things as either deteriorating

them to be closed.

"More money for bridges is needed statewide," said Roy Townsend, county road engineer. "We should be replacing two to three bridges every year, and we've barely been replacing

But not for a lack of trying to get funding from state and federal sources. The Road Commission submits five applications for bridge funding each year.

In Washtenaw County 66 of its 135 local bridges, or 49 percent, were found to be in poor condition. Not all of these are under the jurisdiction of the Washtenaw County Road Commission, however. Some are city-owned or Michigan Department of Transportation bridges.

Of the 135 local bridges in the county, 33 bridges, or 29 percent. were deemed to be in poor condition.

According to a March 26 report on the Road Commission website, of the 111 county bridges, 43 were in good condition, 29 in fair condition, 23 in poor

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ness hours.

beams or decks that could cause condition and 16 were in critical condition.

There are a number of closed bridges in the county. including several in Lima Township.

But replacing them comes with a price. In 1992, the state program to replace local bridges was funded with \$440' million statewide and about 150 bridges were replaced, Townsend said.

Funding comes from a percentage of the state's gas tax and gas tax revenue has decreased by more than \$100 million since 1997, which is the last time the gas tax was increased, according to the press release.

The same level of funding is planned for 2012 and about 27 bridges and 13 rehabilitation projects will be funded.

'So, that's about 40 bridges across the state," Townsend said.

In other words, about onequarter of the bridge projects are being completed because there has been no increase in . funding since 1992.

"Plus, the cost has more than

doubled," Townsend said.

In four years, the Road Commission has received funding for two bridges, he said.

In 2010, the Dexter-Pinckney Road Bridge in Dexter Township was replaced. Before that, the Plymouth Road Bridge in Superior Township was replaced in 2009, the East Delhi Bridge in Scio Township was rehabilitated in 2008-2009 and in 2007-2008 the Dexter Main Street Bridge was replaced.

"It took us about 10 years to get funding for that," Townsend said of the Main Street Bridge.


A bridge replacement averages about \$1 million and state and federal funding pays for about 95 percent of the cost, he said.

"Disinvesting in roads and bridges when Michigan is desperately trying to climb out of a deep economic hole is shortsighted public policy," said Mike Nystrom, executive vice president of MITA in a press release. "While it's easy to point fingers and blame road agencies for the

poor bridges, the reality is that they've been underfunded for decades."

# Barn of the Year nominees sought

Nominations are now being taken for the Michigan Barn Preservation Network's 2011 Barns of the Year Recognition, an event held each year at the organization's annual conference in March.

The Michigan Barn Preservation Network is a nonprofit organization founded in 1995 whose mission is "Promoting appreciation, preservation. and rehabilitation of Michigan barns, farmsteads, and rural communities."

 The 2011 conference takes. place March 11 and 12, 2011, at Michigan State University, with a special pre-conference session March 10 on agri-tourism.

The recognition program includes four categories: Continued family private

agricultural use; Family private adaptive use: Nonprofit agricultural or

adaptive use; and · Commercial agricultural or

adaptive use. The barn must be used for one of these purposes, retain its overall appearance as a barn -both interior and exterior - and have been built before 1960:

As agriculture has changed, so has the use of heritage barns. While some barns continue in agricultural use, others are now being used as homes, offices, restaurants, retail outlets, meeting halls, museums and more. Barns that have been moved and rebuilt can be considered for recognition

It is not necessary that the person submitting the nomination own the barn or barns.

Anyone making a nomination should provide detail about the history of the barn and the work done to preserve it.

Send high-quality digital or high resolution digital scans of photographs of all four elevations of the barn, interior images and images documenting the barn work process before, during, and after. Photos will be retained for the MBPN's archives: Images sent on homescanners are not acceptable.

Owners receive a plaque, a one-year membership in MBPN. recognition by the MBPN at the annual conference and media coverage.

"The criteria that the judges use include the completeness of information provided about the barn and repair or maintenance work that has been done, quality and completeness of photographs that illustrate the work. the setting and visual appeal of the barn, the preservation of original materials or sensitivity of changes to the structure that maintain the character and the 'heroic effort' demonstrated by the nominee in preserving their barn," said Tom Nehil, chairman of the Barns of the Year committee, in a news release.

Barns will be ranked by committee members until a consensus is reached in each category.

Nominations must be postmarked by Dec. 31. Late nominations will be kept for the following year's competition if the applicant desires.

Historically, foundations fund projects in isolation. But we know making isolated improvements usually won't impact an entire community. This knowledge made the Board of Directors of the Chelsea-Area Wellness Foundation stop and think. separate communities called for something different than the project in Albert Lea.

Believing a sweeping plan would be most effective, the CWF initiative involves joint planning and funding of a community-wide, front-loaded.

comprehensive wellness initiative in each of our five towns. Initial efforts will be followed by continuing collaboration to maintain and expand gains.

Before we begin work in a given community we'd like the community to identify people to spearhead an initiative. This team should be made of people excited about our vision and community wellness and be representative of the primary community organizations. Our board refers to these teams as "wellness coalitions."

Once the wellness coalition is established we will ask the coalition to complete a civil assessment. The assessment will measure the community's capacity - or the depth of resources, especially human, available to pull off this major

Assessment questions will

explore previous collaborative efforts in town, citizen activities, leadership styles and other

measures of civil engagement. We will use the civic assessment and meetings with community leadership to help the CWF prioritize the order in which interested communities, in concert with the CWF. will undertake an initiative.

During planning, the CWF will provide guidance and expertise and the communities will bring their innovation, community goodwill and volunteers to the table. The final plan will highlight ways for residents to eat better, move more, connect in healthy ways and avoid tobacco and other unhealthy substances.

A commitment to impact the wellbeing of an entire community is big. But we did our homework and we think our

chances of success are high. High enough for the CWF to risk funding. High enough to ask community representatives what the community is willing to do to create a place where anyone who comes to town knows immediately it's a community committed to the

# Antique mall has grand opening this weekend

### Couple opens with 27 vendors in former bike shop

An old truck with a sign in its bed alerts motorists to the Chelsea Antique Mall, which opened its doors to the public on Sept. 15.

Located on the south side of Chelsea, the new venue opened with eight antique and collectible vendors and 26 days later. there were 27 vendors at the 1180 S. Main St. location.

Owned by Ed and Kathy Greenleaf of Lima Township. the antique mall fills the space formerly rented to Aberdeen Bike and Outdoors inside Chelsea Lanes, which has been vacant for two years. The bike shop moved across

the street to 1101 S. Main St. and doubled its space. "It's a great fit for Chelsea

that's become an artsy-craftsy community," said Ed Greenleaf. "So many people have come in and said. 'We needed this."'

There will be a grand opening on Nov. 13 and 14 and the mall is a participating store in Chelsea's Wine, Women and Shopping event on Nov. 13.

The idea to fill the space with antiques came from the couple's niece. Jamie Lane, who has a booth with such items as trading cards, knickknacks, beer mugs and steins.

"We were at a family gathering and she suggested the idea." Greenleaf said, adding the couple visited several antique shops for ideas for dividing up the 3,000-squarefoot front of the building.

Greenleaf is expanding the space into the back storage area of the building, which will add 10 more booths for a total of 4,100 square feet of vendor space. In fact, the Chelsea Area Historical Society was given donated space for an exhibit as

The booths range from 5 by 8 feet to 9 by 12 feet and there is one cash register for all purchases.

"We collect no commission on sales," Greenleaf said, adding vendors are sent checks on the 15th and the 30th of each month. "Half of them signed up for six months, the other pay rent for their spaces one month at a time.'

Sales are brisk. Greenleaf said, and vendors are constantly adding new items. They are in and out all the

"It was kinda sad to see Evelyn retired," said Scio Township Fire Chief Carl



Lucas Rogers, 2, of Ann Arbor, 'drives' the new Scio Township Fire Department Engine 1 on Halloween.




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



# High school athletes at risk for concussions

In today's sporting world, especially at the high school level, athletes are bigger, stronger and more explosive than they've ever been in years past.

In high collision sports like football and hockey, prep athletes today are routinely put together more solidly and are significantly more powerful than even 10 years ago. Because of that fact, high-speed crashes on the ice or the gridiron or other playing fields between athletes produce a greater risk of an individual suffering a

concussion.

While from afar, a concussion might not look as serious as an athlete breaking a leg or an arm in competition or pulling a muscle and needing help to reach the bench, but make no mistake about it, a concussion is not only immediately alarming, but its long term consequences and impact to the

brain and skull are what concern athletic trainers on the scene most of all.

Rachel Fitch, Belleville athletic trainer, said she takes any injury to the head very seriously.

"Some of the symptoms of a concussion include dizziness, being light-headed and sometimes looking like they are lost on the field." Fitch said. "When this happens they have to get out of the game because it can be a matter of life and death."

Fitch said at that point, an athlete needs to be taken to the doctor and seek medical attention. She said one of the telltale signs athletic trainers focus on when approaching an injured athlete is looking at a players' pupils to determine if anything is wrong.

Fitch said athletic trainers are also wellversed on what questions to ask an athlete and also how to pay attention to a players' actions after a big hit.

actions after a big int. ... "The helmets have bladders in them," she said. "There is air in the helmet to help protect their heads. We have to check that air and make sure it is there all the time."

If an athlete gets a concussion they must be cleared by a doctor before returning to practice or a game.

"A player could try and tell (a coach) there is nothing wrong and lie about it so they can play." Fitch said. "That is why we have to know everyone's personality and behavior."

Nate Santoni is a student athletic trainer from Eastern Michigan University who works with the Belleville football team.

"We have to know the players' moods,"
Santoni said. "We try to see if they are not paying attention or maybe they are moody or lethargic."

Santoni explained a concussion is when the brain smacks the skull and the connection rattles the brain. This causes a bruise


### State has detailed protocol when dealing with concussions

The Michigan High School Athletic Association protocol for implementation of sports playing rules for concussions

are as follows:
Any athlete who exhibits signs, symptoms, or behaviors consistent with a concussion (such as loss of consciousness, headache, dizziness, confusion or balance problems) shall be immediately removed from the contest and shall not return to play until cleared by an appropriate health care

The language above, which will appear in all National Federation sports rule books for the 2010-11 school year, reflects a strengthening of rules regarding the safety of athletes suspected of having a concussion. For 2009-10, some sports rules required officials to remove from play any athlete who was "unconscious or apparently unconscious or apparently unconscious." This new language reflects an increasing focus on safety, given that the vast majority of concussions do not involve a loss of consciousness.

This protocol is intended to provide the mechanics to follow during the course of contests when an athlete sustains an apparent concussion.

1) The officials will have no role in determining concussion other than the obvious one where a player is either unconscious or apparently tinconscious as is provided for under the current rule. Officials will merely point out to a coach that a player


is apparently injured and advise that the player should be examined by a health care provider for an exact determination of the extent of injury.

2) If it is confirmed by the school's designated health care professional that the student did not sustain a concussion, the head coach may so advise the officials during an appropriate stoppage of play and the athlete may reenter competition pursuant to the contest rules.

and can make the chemicals in the brain make the athlete behave differently.

"If a player has a concussion it is important to take them out of the game," he said. "There is a chance of them getting hit again and even getting second impact syndrome.'

Santoni said it doesn't have to be much of a bruise for a concussion to be serious. He said it is good to know what a player's normal readings are on a cognitive level, so athletic trainers can compare those findings if and when a player has a concussion.

Ypsilanti football coach Jason Malloy said any time a player is hit in the head it is serious.

"As a coach, I don't make a decision on whether or not they (athletes) have a concussion," he said. "With any head injury, they have to see the trainer. The trainer then determines if the athlete has any symptoms.'

Malloy said he has taken sports management classes in college. In those classes, he said instructors stressed how serious concussion injuries can be.

'Our kids never want to quit, so you have to be careful and make sure they don't get dizzy or have the other symptoms," he said. "They get checked by the trainer and the trainer makes the call."

Malloy, a former All-State linebacker

at Dearborn Heights Robichaud who went on to play Division I college football at Western Michigan University said a key to preventing concussions is teaching kids the fundamentals of their respective sport, especially if it's football, at an early age.

"When I played, they taught us to hit

with the crown of the helmet," he said. "The culture is different now and it affects some of the sport. We want what is in the best interest for the safety of the student athlete."

Saline Athletic Director Rob White said concussions and the long-term threat they pose is more of a focus in today's sporting realm.

'We're paying much more attention to concussions now," he said. "Our knowledge of concussions has increased over the years. In the past, we might have sent a kid back out there before it was safe. Now, we are more cautious. The focus is on the safety and well-being of the athletes.

White said high school athletic departments are better prepared nowadays to handle a player who suffers a concus-

"Kids are faster, bigger and stronger than they've ever-been," he said. "We're better at diagnosing it (concussions). We have better training and more knowledge. The symptoms of a concussion are more readily known now. Recently, we sent our trainer to a clinic to learn how. to handle head injuries.

White said it's not only football and hockey athletes suffering concussions.

We're seeing concussions in all of our sports," he said. "We've already had a few concussions in soccer this year But what helps us is that our knowledge is so far greater today about concussions than it was 15 to 20 years ago."






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

I guess in some places it's OK to make fun of an opposing player, as long as you're quiet during the serves.






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# Chelsea falls in district


With Briana Carden serving. Chelsea tied the game at 16-16 and then took its first lead at



# Outstanding shrubs to attract birds into your winter garden

"Poor indeed is the garden in which birds find no homes." Abram L. Urban

Finding beauty in the winter garden can be elusive. How can you create a beautiful winter scene in your own landscape? Use trees, shrubs and low growing plants to build eye-pleasing structural vignettes for the winter frost and snow to dramatize.

Wisely select the right native plant material for those garden structures and your beautiful winter scene will be punctuated with exciting reds, blues, yellows, grays and blacks flown in by the many wild birds of winter. The birds will come seeking the protective cover and natural food you provide them in your bird-friendly garden habitat.

Native plants and birds have relied on each other for thousands of years. They have a mutually beneficial relationship that nurtures both parties by providing food and cover for the birds and seed dispersal for the plants.

If a beautiful garden scene can be designed using the hardy and low fuss native trees. shrubs and plants that birds seek out and especially need for survival during the winter months, then what a well orchestrated dance we'll have in our winter garden.

Birds need three things for their survival during any season: food, water and cover. Of these three elements, the most important one is cover.

### Cover is critical

Mature trees, shrubs and low growing plants together create the ideal combination of cover in a bird habitat. Deciduous trees provide branches for perching and cavities for" roosting. Evergreen trees and shrubs provide a source of dense cover that helps to shield birds from predators, winter wind, freezing temperatures, falling snow and freezing rain.

They also provide a beautiful backdrop for the winter scene vou view from your favorite reading chair. Shrubs provide shelter for wintering birds. especially dense, prickly ones. The dead stalks of grasses and wildflowers are sought out for

cover and food by a variety of birds including sparrows. finches and doves during the winter.

### Reliable food sources

Well-chosen plant material that provides good cover also pulls double duty as a reliable food source for birds during the winter. About half of wintering birds in the Midwest feed primarily on insects that overwinter in seed heads of wildflowers like Black-eyed Susan, or which are found in insect-laden tree trunks and branches.

Fruits commonly grown on shrubs and smaller trees as well as seeds from a variety of plants complete a bird's winter thenu.

"Many birds that eat insects primarily in summer, including robins, mockingbirds, bluebirds and thrashers, turn to berries for a good part of their fall and winter diet," Christopher Whelan of the Illinois Natural History Survey said.

Selecting native plant material that the birds have been relying on for centuries for food and shelter creates a magnet for winter birds.

"If you don't have native plants, you won't see as many birds," Dea Armstrong, Ann Arbor ornithologist said.

Add in a water source, which does not freeze, perhaps a supplementary feeder or two and your bird friendly habitat is ready for winged visitors. Outstanding shrubs that provide both cover and food

Although a healthy bird habitat includes mature trees, shrubs as well as low growing plants, let's narrow our focus and take a look at eight shrubs that could be an ideal addition to your landscape.

These shrubs are well adapted to the soil and climate conditions in Michigan. Our wild birds of winter love the cover and food these hardy and hearty shrubs provide them.

Wildtype Nursery Mason, Mich. www.wildtypeplants.com

This is one native plant nursery which propagates and sells native shrubs.

Michigan Holly (llex verticil-

· Why it's a winner: With bright red berries that emerge. in late summer and persist throughout the winter this: shrub is beautiful against a backdrop of snow. Cedar waxwings, bluebirds and robins savor the berries.

· How to grow: This medium to large shrub can eventually grow 6 to 12 inches high and wide. It grows well in sunny or partly shaded wetland habitats but also on dry sand dunes and grassland.

· Nice to know: This plant blooms in May and June with white flowers. It needs both male and female plants to set berries. This is a deciduous holly so it's leaves drop in fall.

Nannyberry (Viburnum lentago)

• Why it's a winner: It has creamy white, lacecap blossoms in May and June. The flowers change into yellow and red fruits that ripen to black attracting most fruit-eating birds, including bluebirds, brown thrashers, cedar waxwings, gray catbirds, robins and thrushes.

· How to grow: This large shrub reaches 15 to 18 inches in height and width. It likes shaded moist or wet areas but can adapt to sun and dry soil.

 Nice to know: The leaves of this shrub are a show all by themselves. Spring through fall it's leaves change from light green to bright green and then from orange red to purple.

Downy Arrow wood (Viburnum rafinewquianum) · Why it's a winner: Masses

of white, flat-topped flower clusters in May and June are followed by maroon leaf color. Dark blueberries in the fall are eaten by birds including Cedar-Waxwings and Robins in the winter.

· How to grow: This typically 3 to 6 inch shrub grows in moist to dry, sandy to loamy soil in full sun to part shade. This plant is a good size for foundation plantings.

Nice to know: Native

. Why it's a winner: Fourinch, snow white, lacecap flowers bloom in late spring followed by bright red, translucent berries. Berries persist into February. Its crisp and shiny dark-green foliage turns reddish-purple in the fall.

• How to grow: This plant prefers fertile, Well-drained, moist soil in full sun to part shade. It does not like dry locations. It grows 8 to 12 inches in height and width.

· Nice to know: This shrub is used for nesting by brown thrashers, catbirds, and many other songbirds. Avoid planting the nonnative, lookalike cousin called European Cranberrybush Viburnum because birds are much less fond of the fruits.

Alternate-leaved Dogwood (Cornus alternifolia)

• Why it's a winner: The flowers of this large shrub or small tree are exceptionally fragrant and delicate looking. The fruit makes a beautiful display as it changes from green to red to blue-black and is a favorite of at least 11 species of birds.

· How to grow: This plant is a good choice for well-drained. partly shaded locations. It likes moist or dry shady sites as long as it has good drainage. It grows 15-30' in height and

Nice to know: The more

sun this dogwood receives, the better it flowers and fruits.

Gray Dogwood (Cornus foemina)

 Why it's a winner: Named for its smooth gray bark, this shrub's leaves become purplemaroon in fall. Snow-white berries hanging from red stems provide a unique display through winter.

 How to grow: An adaptable shrub that usually stays under 8 inches tall, it grows under a variety of conditions from wet meadows to dry settings. It likes to spread into wide clumps and will need room to

· Nice to know: More songbird species use the plant for nest building than any other native plant. The berries are a preferred fruit of cathirds, mockingbirds, woodpeckers, robins, and bluebirds.

Ground Juniper (Juniperuscommunis var. depressa)

• Why it's a winner: This low, spreading evergreen shrub provides year-round landscape interest with its blue-green

How to grow: This shrub grows in dry locations with full sun. It reaches 3 to 6 inches in height and 8 to 12 inches in width.

· Nice to know: It serves as shelter for wildlife. Its dark

blue juniper "berry" is actually a fleshy cone.

Black Chokeberry (Aronia prunifolia)

· Why it's a winner: Providing four season interest, white-pink clusters of flowers in May are followed by glossy, green leaves in summer and then crimson foliage in fall. Blue-black fruits provide winter color.

• How to grow: This is a low-growing, adaptive shrub that can prosper under many site conditions, wet to dry Reaching 3 to 6 inches in height and width it is effective en masse or as a backdrop for lowgrowing pérennials.

 Nice to know: Songbirds enjoy the bitter fruit in winter months.

Create a winter garden wild bird habitat with a combination of native trees, shrubs and low growing plants that will draw colorful and lively overwintering birds to the cover, berries, insects and seeds hosted by these plants.

Attractively designing wisely-selected native deciduous and evergreen plants will provide beautiful physical. structure and form to your garden during winter's frosty and snowy days.

# Students mourn classmate's death

Eighth grade student found unresponsive by parents in home By Dave-Merchant

Dexter Community Schools administration officials have confirmed an eighth grade student at Mill Creek Middle School died over the weekend. The cause of the student's death was reported as a suicide according to a statement sent to parents from school officials on Monday. The name of the student has not been released as of press time.

Washtenaw County Sheriff's Sgt. David Archer, community engagement and media relations representative, said deputies were dispatched at 7:36 p.m. Sunday night to the boy's home. where first responders found the boy unconscious.

Police, fire and EMS vehicles responded to the scene.

"We don't know the exact cause of death yet because an autopsy has to be done," Archer said. "It could take up to a

couple weeks."

Dexter Schools Interim Superintendent Mary Marshall said in a written statement that the district was saddened tolearn that a Mill Creek student died on Sunday.

excited. Daniels' script is funny enough to give the actors plenty to work with, but also leaves them enough

leeway to let them be funny on their own.

I was slightly nervous about the lack of intermission, but with the quick pace and smooth transitions between scenes, you don't miss it in the least.

The cast did a fantastic job at making each character stand out on its own and yet mesh together so perfectly. Alex Leydenfrost (John Martin). Matthew David (Ken Porter), and Rhiannon Ragland (Hannah Porter) had solid performances, but Michelle Mountain (Beth Martin) stole the show for me. It's very diffi-

cult to play drunken scenes and not deliver them over the top. Her performance had many levels and was just a joy to watch. Vincent Mountain's set was

beautifully designed and well built. It could actually be the inside of a home. The set is complimented very well with Dana White's lighting design, which was a nice mix of neutral indoor light. and some really fun special effects lighting.

just prior to Veteran's Day, at the Chelsea Retirement Community, and many of the veterans who appeared in the film were in attendance.

From stories about the first news of the war and their enlistments, to the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Hawaii and the invasion of the beaches of Omaha, the veterans shared the horror (and humor) of what they experienced as part of a generation of Americans from coast to coast who were thrust into the mammoth war effort.

The documentary is the second in a community history project that's a collaboration between the Chelsea District Library, the Chelsea Community Foundation and the Chelsea Area Historical Society.

"WWII was a devastating global war that defined a generation and helped shape the world into what it is today."

said Chelsea Mayor Jason Lindauer in his opening

remarks before the screening. "The battles, the victories, the tragedies and the costs of the war are almost beyond comprehension. Eyery person in every American town, large and small, was affected and changed by this war."

About 25 veterans and their families were interviewed, and about 20 interviewees were included in the 90-minute film that was shot and produced by Video Farm Productions owned by Rob and Carolann Coelius of Chelsea.

"I salute all those who stood up and fought in the greatest and most terrible war in human history as well as those at home who worked and sacrificed for the soldiers overseas." Lindauer said.





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

# Itagic mystery

# Questions remain a year after family dies in fire

arb and Jake Richter can't help but feel a tinge of sadness each time they look out the large picture window of their Ann Arbor home andsee the barren field now across the street.

It hadn't always looked that way. And though the planted turf was a dramatic improvement from the charred hole left behind months after a devastating fire consumed 1701 Waverly Road, they are still haunted by the memories and the lingering questions about the blaze. Especially now that an entire has passed.

The Richters' elderly neighbors. Demetri and Ioanna Alexandropoulos, perished in the Nov. 1, 2009, inferno, along with their adult son.

The three bedroom, ranchstyle home with wood frame construction and brick veneer that stood on Ann Arbor's south side for nearly six decades collapsed. Everything inside was consumed in what many seasoned firefighters called the most devastating house fire they had ever seen.

The tragedy and the impact it had on the neighborhood became very personal for the Richters, particularly Barb. who mowed the grass and trimmed weeds where the house once stood: As the anniversary neared, looking at the empty parcei motivated them to place a pinewood memorial in the shape of a cross on the property late last month.

Other neighbors have since placed potted plants and flowers as the anniversary neared.

"They were very private people, and people that didn't communicate with a lot of others in the neighborhood, but I feel like we were there friends and the least we could do is remember them," said Barb Richter.

### A horrible night

The sounds were odd, Jake Richter thought as he awoke to some popping noises coming from somewhere outdoors. When he looked outside the living room window to discern the source of a strange glow, a strong dose of reality

"I just went out to the window and I saw a bright red glow coming from the house," he said, "I didn't see any flames, but knew it was

"To see a house burning like that with people that you know inside ... I don't wish that on anyone."

Several neighbors shared similar experiences with police who arrived on the scene, including some who tried valiantly to check for signs of the Alexandropouloses.

Flames ultimately reached as high as 30 feet tall and bright orange.

Reports showed the son had lived there, except for the past few years when he lived in Ypsilanti. He moved back to Waverly Road a few months before the fire to take care of his parents, according to reports.

The coordinated probe between the Ann Arbor Police. Department and Michigan State Police revealed that by the time firefighters arrived, they knew they could not save the structure. They also eerily knew that anyone inside wouldn't likely survive.

By the time the blaze was under control about an hour later, only the brick wall on the home's south side remained standing. No windows, no front door, no recognizable furniture or personal property.

Investigators were never able to establish the exact cause of the fire and to this day list it as undetermined. It will probably remain that way unless further information becomes available.

"There's a lot of speculation about what happened there," Ann Arbor Fire Marshal Kathleen Chamberlain said.

Something probably did set it off in the basement, but it's not clear what the circumstances were and what happened," Chamberlain said.

"The people in that house at the time are the only ones that could give us an indication of what happened, and if it was an accidental fire, they might -not have even known, had they survived."

### The anatomy of a fatal fire

While the exact cause of the deadly fire remains somewhat of a mystery, investigators outlined several factors that could explain how it spread so fast and became catastrophic.

Reports indicate that although they were reclusive, the Alexandropoulos family

had a reputation as "pack rats." The family held onto their belongings and stored much of their miscellaneous property in the basement, which ran underneath the entire structure.

Witnesses told police about cans of solvent leading from the kitchen to the basement, where the shelves were lined with similar cans, according to reports. The family had three lawnmowers and a snow blower, and both father and son appeared to work on them frequently, as did John with the family vehicles.

They stored car parts, oil and gasoline in the basement, which also was used as living quarters and a workshop by the couple's only child.

Johnny, 42, had a penchant for building and fixing electronics, and several neighbors noted Demetri's obsession with lawn-care equipment.

Both activities left an ample » collection of flammable oils, liquids and solvents in the home that may have made the structure rife for destruction once the fire started, reports concluded.

Jake Richter said it was not uncommon for Johnny, who was a contract engineer with steady projects from firms in Livingston and Wayne counties, to be welding in the home.

Investigators also repeatedly noted the lack of any evidence of working smoke detectors in the home.

No neighbors who were inside the house recalled their presence, and none of the dozen or so witnesses who police interviewed at the scene remembered hearing any sound off throughout the incident.

The fire was so severe that only major appliances, such as the refrigerator and furnace, were somewhat recognizable among the debris. Chamberlain said given the circumstances there was no hope of finding smoke detectors in the devastation.

The sheer sight of the carnage and literal hole in the earth outside their main window brought a high degree of anxiety and paranoia, the Richters said.

"We were so afraid about afire, that you would go to bed and think every strange sound was an emergency." Barb recalled. "We went out and bought five smoke detectors and a new fire extinguisher just because of that feeling."

### A tragic end

Smoke alarms or not, there is evidence that at least the elderly couple was aware of the fire and tried to escape. Neither Demetri nor Ionna's

bodies were found in areas that their bedrooms would have been in, according to reports. And neither body was surrounded by evidence of a mattress or bed frame, as would be expected if a victim was overcome by smoke and flames while sleeping, detectives noted.

Cadaver dogs didn't find the first body in the northwest end of the basement until about 11:15 a.m. that day, according to reports. Ionna (pronounced Joanna) Alexandropoulos was found next to what appeared to be a wall that would have been the hallway. The dog found Demetri's body next halfway through the main debris pile in the center of the scene, according to reports.

He also was believed to be in the same hallway when he was overwhelmed by the intense smoke that would have been piping through the single-story home.

His remains were covered by the brick chimney that collapsed from the first floor.

Investigators found the last body at the southeast corner of the home by 3:40 p.m., reports

The fire burned all three victims beyond recognition. Demetri was identified by a pacemaker serial number and ruled dead by smoke inhalation, reports show.

Authorities identified Joanna through her jewelry and ruled she died from hyxiation.

The initial autopsy report stated that their son died from a massive stroke and asphyxiation due to the fire. Investigators noted that he did not have soot or burnt lungs, indicating he died before the fire could have killed him.


The Greek immigrants reportedly settled resettled in Ann Arbor in the late 1970s and retired from the restaurant business shortly after 2000.

Attempts by court and city officials to contact loanna's brother and sister in Greece were unsuccessful. A nephew in Boston who once lived in the home after immigrating to the United States in 1977 was as close as they came. And reports said his last contact with the family was in 2008.

The legal ownership of any of their property and assets remains undetermined in probate court, reports show.

"It's just a very sad feeling to think about how it ended and not really knowing why." Barb





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
